EXPECT OVERFLOW OPENING CROWD AT PAMLICO ON FRIDAY

Rush Finishing Touches On New Sound Resort at Pamlico Beach

Pamlico Beach, the summer resort which was last year purchased by J. C. Lanier and S. T. Hooker, two local men, is nearing completion and will be in readiness for the opening which is to take place next Friday, June 1.

This announcement will be of interest to many people of this vicinity who have noted with interest the plans to make of this spot a convenient place for pleasure seekers and those who delight to spend their vacations down by the sea. If present indications spell anything, an overflow crowd will be on hand next Friday to usher in the season there and to congratulate the owners on the improvements they have brought about.

At a very considerable expense a new hotel building has been added, and the old one remodeled, giving 40 rooms for the convenience of guests. These hotels are two story buildings, situated within thirty feet of the water's edge overlooking one of the prettiest spots that can be found in North Carolina.

New Dance Pavilion

Just in front of the hotel, out over the water, is the new dance pavilion, large, comfortable and commodious with ample floor space to accommodate and crowds that may be present. Then, just off from the pavilion, and over the water, are ten bath houses, with two shower baths.

Those who have visited Pamlico Beach in former years state that the bathing is unexcelled, with a sandy bottom entirely free from snags or holes. Beginning with a shallow depth, the water gradually deepens for about a hundred yards before it reaches six feet, thus making it ideal for ladies and children. Fish exist in the surrounding waters in great abundance, thereby affording fine sport for those who delight in the rod and reel.

All Modern Comforts

Another point in favor of this resort is the excellent drinking water which is secured from an overflow well. Physicians who are acquainted with this water freely recommend it to sufferers of indigestion and stomach troubles, and the Taylor Brothers, well known physicians of Washington, frequently advise patients to go there, rest and drink this water.

Added to these advantages which nature has lavished on this spot, the new owners have not spared any expense to add all the comforts possible. DUBLIN, May 28.—President Cosgrave's confidence that Ireland is returning to normal conditions has been amply justified by his week-end visit to Kilkenny, which formerly was a disturbed district. There was no need to take extra precautions and when Mr. Cosgrave arrived Saturday night with only two or three personal attendants, he was received as a guest of honor and numerous addresses of welcome were presented to him.

Today's big open air meeting was a great success. Mr. Cosgrave devoted his speech to justification of the government policy, reiterating that there could be no modification on account of Eamon De Valera's recent negotiations.

OVER 2 MILLION WORKERS NOW ON STRIKE IN RUHR

BERLIN, May 28.—More than two million miners and tens of thousands of metal workers are now on strike in the Ruhr district, according to a special dispatch to a newspaper here today.

Although it is believed in official circles here that these figures are greatly over estimated, it is thought undoubtedly every mine centre in Ruhr is idle as a result of action of communists who are visiting the pits and forcibly ejecting workers. No further disorders are reported since yesterday. The casualties for the week-end stand at seven killed and 93 wounded.

She bases her attack on the allegation that posters used to stir up enlistments are now "false advertisements of army and navy life."

Klansmen Convicted, Given Workhouse Term

MINNEAPOLIS, May 28.—Roy N. Miner, Exalted Cyclops of the Ku Klux Klan, of Minneapolis, and three others of the five defendants convicted of criminal libel against Mayor George E. Leach, were given workhouse sentences by Judge F. M. Nye. The fifth defendant, Shirley Reichert, a notary public, was fined \$50 with the option of 30 days in the workhouse.

Miner and Gladys Kennedy drew maximum sentences of 90 days; Geo. Silk, Hopkins, Minn., publisher, and Tom Sullivan received 60 days each. The defendants received stays of sentence pending a motion to set aside the verdict.

RANDOLPH & CO. GET VERDICT IN COURT

Randolph and company obtained a verdict in Superior court against Mrs. Josephine Phillips, directing the restoration of an automobile, and another against D. M. Clark, executor of the estate of H. M. Phillips, directing payment of certain amounts accruing from sales of products of a storage battery business.

In the first action Randolph and company sought to recover \$1,000 on a title note, alleged to have been the balance due on the purchase of a machine by Phillips. In 1920 the concern made a claim for return of the automobile. Mrs. Phillips contested the action and gave bond pending the trial of the case. The jury ordered that the automobile be returned to the plaintiff company, no cash judgment was made. 7 Dead, Many Hurt In Car-Auto Crash

DETROIT, May 28.—Seven persons were killed and several injured, two dangerously when an interurban car bound from Pontiac to Detroit struck a blue touring car eighth miles north of Detroit early this evening. The dead include four young women and three young men.

The accident happened when an automobile, the driver of which is as yet unidentified, going north on Woodward Avenue, swung out of the line of traffic to pass another car. The machine swerved into the interurban tracks and was struck squarely in the center.

DANIEL VICTIM OF POLITICIANS, DIXON ASSERTS IN SERMON

Political Jealousy Is Cause of Evil Today, Says Evangelist

Declaring that Daniel was cast in the lion's den primarily because of jealousy due to his fight for honesty against more than 100 greedy politicians, Rev. C. P. Dixon, colored evangelist addressed an audience of approximately 2,500 of white and colored persons in Forbes and Morton's warehouse last night. He declared that envy and hatred for righteous things as espoused by Daniel caused the latter to become the victim of a what is understood in present day parlance as a "frame-up."

The deliverance of Daniel by God, he said, was living evidence that He would always stand by and protect those who lived and talked His word. Unscrupulous politicians throughout the world are having a baneful influence in our life today, he avowed. Their threat is "dance to our music, or you will get the same treatment Daniel received," he stated. He reminded the audience that the same just God that protected Daniel presides now to succeed and keeps constant protection over those who live clean, honest upright lives.

Sunday afternoon he addressed a meeting of 1,000 men, held for their exclusive benefit.

Zion church, under whose auspices the series of revival services are being held, said today that he would greatly appreciate the loan of additional chairs or benches by any one having a few to spare, in order to provide additional seating accommodations.

Rev. Shaw, also stated since the meetings are not being held on a guaranty basis, and that the large expense must be met by voluntary contributions, he would be glad of any financial support, regardless of amount that the people of Greenville might care to give.

Chicago, May 28.—Railway labor as represented by heads of 15 of the 16 standard unions have mapped out a legislative program for submission to congress, which would abolish the federal railroad board, it was learned here today.

Would Split Expense of Catawba College

HICKORY, May 28.—Speaking on the question of the Reformed Church, which is holding its general Synod here, assuming control and guaranteeing support of Catawba College, former Congressman A. R. Broderick, of Hanover, Pa., stated at a mass meeting, that he was in favor of the Synod helping the institution on a fifty per cent basis of its needs and suggested \$400,000 to be the first appropriation for this purpose.

SEEK SLAYER U. S. DEPUTY MARSHAL; DOGS ARE USED

COVINGTON, Ky., May 28.—Bloodhounds have been sent to Mauldon, to aid in the search for John Hurst, who is alleged to have shot and killed J. H. Short, deputy United States Marshal late Saturday when the latter attempted to arrest him on a warrant charging illegal manufacture of whiskey.

Deputy Marshals from the entire eastern district of Kentucky have been ordered to join the hunt for the fugitive, who, according to dispatches, fled to the hills clad only in night clothes.

RECKLESS DRIVERS WARNED AND FINED

TERRORISTS FIGHT DORTMUND POLICE, HUNDREDS ROBBED

Search for Firearms Only Ruse to Steal Money, Jewelry

ESSEN, May 28.—Communist elements are still striving for the upper hand in Dortmund where disorders in the Ruhr on account of strikes and Communist disorders appear to be centered according to advices received from that district today.

Workers guards have taken up positions in the streets and all persons are ostensibly searched for firearms, but the complaint is general that money and valuables are the real purposes. Many have been robbed of considerable amounts, it is reported.

The terrorists methods at Dortmund today were preceded by bitter fighting between communists and the blue police at a nearby mine, resulting in the police availing off the communists after two policemen had been killed and 11 wounded, one fatally. The communists left two wounded.

CLERGYMEN AT RINGSIDE

The church, in Montana, as elsewhere, seems to regard prize fighting as an evil not to be tolerated and as one of the seventy and seven menaces to morality and civilization. In order to become better satisfied that the contention is proper, a group of clergymen of that state have been appointed as a committee to attend the fight between Jack Dempsey and Tom Gibbons at Shelby, July 4, so that they might be personally horrified by the iniquity of the proceeding and be better qualified to aid in the campaign for the repeal of the Montana boxing law.

It would be an amusing situation if the committee, instead of being scandalized should be converted to the manhood, muscle and skill displayed. This is what happened to several church laymen who attended the recent boxing bouts in New York for the benefit of the milk fund. They went to damn and they came away to praise. There may be Scriptural warrant for thinking that St. Paul attended prize fights in his time with more pleasure than disgust. His injunction to Christians that they should not beat the air suggests that he was not unfamiliar with the manly art.

It is possible he knew something about solar plexus blows and left hooks to the chin. And no one can fail to remark that his allusions to the prize fighter are rather complimentary than otherwise. There is not anything to show that he admonished Christians-

ty of the necessity for repealing the boxing laws of Rome.

It is hoped that the committee will spend a pleasant July 4, and while it is hardly to be expected during the combat they will admonish Dempsey to knock the devil out of Gibbons or urge Gibbons to wipe up the earth with this son of Belial opposite him, they may gain something in the way of information they seek.

Most clergymen are good fighters, both by nature and grace. It is barely likely that members of this committee of missionaries to the prize ring will come away with just a little thrill of sympathy and admiration for the manly powers and combative qualities which they have seen in action.

HOW ABOUT A COMMON SENSE LEAGUE

The latest addition to the vast list of every sort of conceivable organization is the "National Honesty Bureau." Its promoters announce that it is for the express purpose of making honesty more prevalent among American youth. Its principles are worthy and laudable and it agrees with modern practice.

The bureau may not be useful, for it is hardly to be supposed that an organization with national headquarters and everything will greatly help in the inoculation of honesty in youthful bosoms that have resisted the beneficial influences of their own homes and communities. However, such organizations have the sanction of custom, and have, in fact, become almost epidemic.

Societies advocate good housekeeping, temperance, art, science, poetry, efficiency, and—for all one knows—faith, hope and charity. There is scarcely a quality of the human mind or a form of human activity which is not boosted by some enthusiastic group of citizens. This gives rise to wonder how the world ever managed to progress at all in the days when people were left to their own devices.

About the only organization which has not yet been formed is the BUREAU OF COMMON SENSE.

Can it be that that commodity is TOO SCARCE to be worth fostering?

WHY NOT EXCLUSIVE FARM COLLEGES?

There should be a check upon the tendency of agricultural colleges to enter into competition and become sort of reflection or imitation of universities. Essentially, universities should be held to cultural courses and agricultural colleges to industrial and production programs.

For instance, in Michigan, the agricultural college, is moving to secure full university status and title. A decade ago, this would have occasioned vigorous protests, but not now. The University of Michigan is so immense and still contemplating greater expansion, that it would welcome the relief afforded by the segregation of the agricultural section. Thirty years ago the cry was that there was too many colleges, and absorption and federation were urged. Now the cry has reversed itself—there are too few colleges, and college after college is restricting the number of freshmen.

The fact remains there is an over-supply of professionalism and as a nation we are becoming weaker in elementary soil production. Hence the cost of living will mount higher and higher, especially with restricted number to do the dirty work.

In several states there is now room for two state institutions, or soon will be. Many of them have two institutions already. But the state name should be borne but by one, and this is an injustice to the younger and smaller institution rather than to the older. The younger institution cannot have full esteem so long as it is regarded by some considerable number of persons as nothing more or less than a pale insipid reflection of the older.

Making the farmers college like the universities is a great MISTAKE.

As a matter of fact it should be less like a university and the students should get SOIL ON THEIR BOOTS AND THE SMELL OF CATTLE AND HOGSPENS MORE INTO THEIR SYSTEMS THAN CHEAP PERFUME.

SEEK REMEDY TO CHECK BUG PESTS, ASKS FARMER'S AID

RALEIGH May 22.—By means of the insect survey which Franklin Sherman, chief of the division of entomology, is now making in North Carolina, he reports that it may be possible later on to give advance notice of epidemic outbreaks of such pests as the Green Bug, Chinch Bug, Hessian Fly, Grasshoppers, Cotton Leaf Worm and others. Sherman is co-operating with the federal bureau of entomology in compiling records of insect outbreaks the abundance of the insects, and other items of information. These findings go into Washington where they are compared with findings from all the other States and the information is then returned to the different states.

Sherman is now compiling the complaints of insect damage reported to his office from time to time during the last 20 years. He finds from the thousands of complaints received that certain pests are at their worst in definite regions and their injuries confined to certain parts of the year.

To help in this work, Sherman states that interested farmers and county farm agents could render a distinct service by reporting accurate observations to him, giving about the following information: When was the pest first seen for the season? When does it first become common on the plants that it attacks? Is it more destructive or less destructive than usual? How does it compare with last year?

DREAMS OF YEARS FINALLY REALIZED BY THIS CHINESE

SEATTLE, Wash., — Marches and clashing of the opposing armies in China have not disturbed the serenity of Chin Gee Hee, one time track laborer laundryman and merchant in Seattle and now president of the Sun Ning Railway, greatest in South China say Seattle friends who have kept in touch with the "Chinese Jim" in 1905.

Despite his 78 years, Chin Gee Hee remains actively at the head of the various enterprises which have earned for him the sobriquet "King of South China" since his return to his native country from the Pacific Coast in 1905.

The Sun Ning Railway, first in China to be constructed by Chinese capital independent of aid from any government is the fruit of a dream that came to Chin Gee Hee 60 years ago when, as a common laborer he aided in the construction of a branch line of the Southern Pacific in California. Two years before he had begun life as a laborer in the California gold fields.

Chin Gee Hee held to his vision. In the seventies he went north and worked on the construction of the old Columbia and Puget Sound Railway, now a part of the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul system. It was not long before he became a contractor in a small way, using Chinese labor and by the time the road was completed he had acquired some capital.

In the early 80's Chin Gee Hee established a small laundry here, branching out as a merchant in partnership with Chin Ching Hock. Following this venture he founded the Qong Tuck company, a mercantile establishment still in business under the direction of his nephew, Chin Keay.

The fire of 1889 which destroyed the business section of the city took Chin Gee Hee's store along with the rest but before the ruins were cold he had started the construction of the first brick building erected in Seattle after the fire. It still stands.

During the anti-Chinese riots of 1886, Chin Gee Hee was ordered from the city by a mob but remained under the protection of a small group of residents.

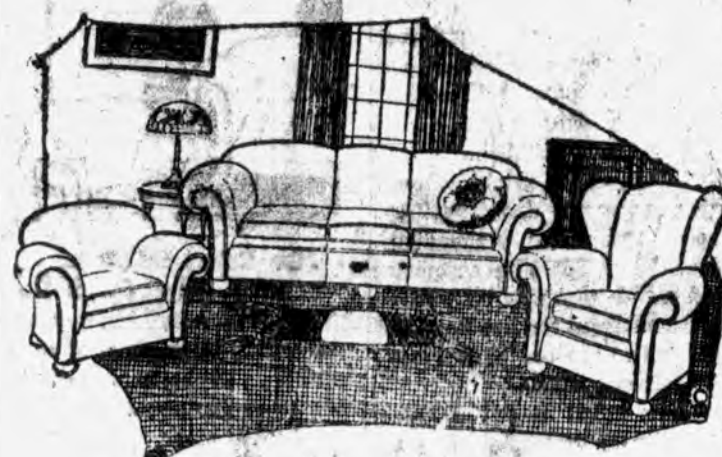

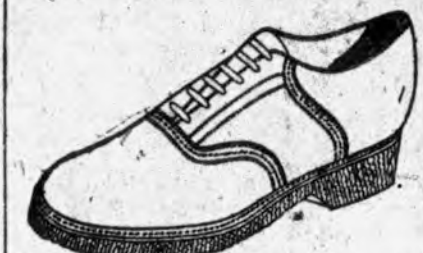

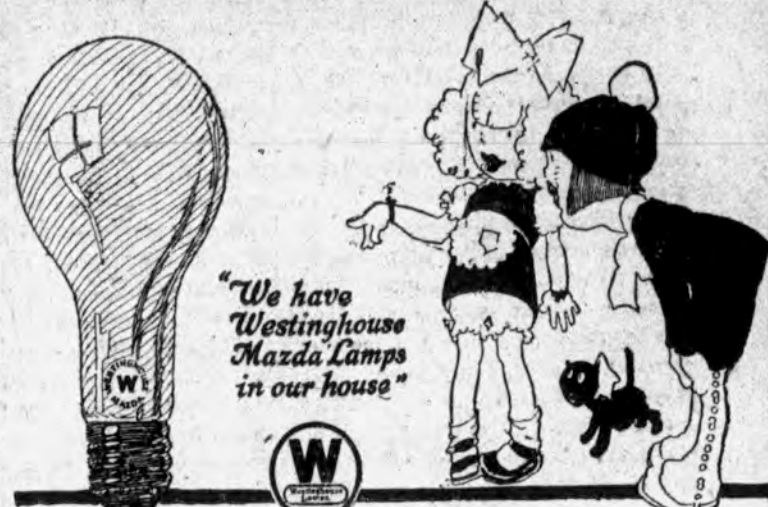

SEES NAVAL STORES INDUSTRY RESTORED IN EAST CAROLINA

RALEIGH, May 22. — The naval stores industry of eastern North Carolina can be restored within a generation in the opinion of H. M. Curran, recently appointed Farm Forestry Expert of the Agricultural Extension Service, who has just returned here from a trip which carried him to all of the southeastern counties.

While a large part of the area has been severely burned, Curran stated, there is still an astonishingly good second growth on much of the area, some of it being large enough to be tapped. A little care he asserted, costing the State or the private owner but a few cents per acre, will reforest the whole area and secure a finer forest, considered strictly from the turpentine point of view, than existed when he first visited this section twenty-five years ago.

"The State and Federal governments are co-operating with the counties to stamp out fire," continued Curran. "The man who sets fire in eastern North Carolina is destined to be as unpopular in the Longleaf counties as a horse thief was in Texas. The splendid work of Col Joseph Hyde Pratt and State Forester J. S. Holmes is already bearing fruit. A newly appointed forester for the Eastern District is actively covering this region organizing the counties for fire protection, and so the future of the Longleaf Pine is bright."

Curran said that a properly tended forest in Eastern Carolina will produce twenty-five thousand board feet of lumber in twenty-five years. This is a thousand board feet on every acre each year he stated. He found that farmers in the vicinity of Elizabeth City are receiving twenty dollars per thousand feet for small logs delivered at local mills. Other regions of the east, he stated with poorer transportation and a longer haul to the mills, are receiving less than half of this.

SCIENTISTS READY TO STUDY ECLIPSE

LOS ANGELES, Calif.—When the shadow of the moon ends its diagonal dash across the Pacific Sept. 10 next and strikes inland near Santa Catalina Island near here, pilgrims from all parts of the world will be on hand to watch the first total eclipse of the sun visible in the United States since 1918.

Regarded as the most important aviation are deflected from their September eclipse will attract thousands of scientific men to southern California, and preparations have been made to facilitate the work of observers and to accommodate the various scientific organizations which will hold gatherings in this city in connection with the phenomenon.

While the total phase of the eclipse will be visible from Santa Catalina Island, several expeditions from American and European observatories will await the obscuration at Ensenada, Lower California, where the period of totality will last three minutes and 35 seconds, as against two minutes and 38 seconds at Santa Catalina.

Some of the scientists will photograph stars in the vicinity of the sun in an effort further to substantiate the Einstein theory, according to which light rays, being matter and therefore subject to the pull of gravitation by the proximity of a heavenly body.

Encourage Better Homes for Workers' Families of Nation

WASHINGTON. — There are two sides to a ten dollar bill. One side is the effort that goes to earn it; the other is the care and intelligence which go to the spending of it. One side is the man's contribution, the other side is the woman's. The whole question of wages is affected by the home-maker's ability to get value for her money.

In such manner, Secretary of Labor Davis sets forth the significance of the Better Homes in America campaign to be conducted during the week of June 4 to 10. Secretary Davis is a member of the National Council for Better Homes in America. Other members are Vice-president Coolidge, Secretaries Hoover and Wallace and Mrs. T. G. Winter, president of the General Federation of Women's Clubs.

"The campaign is a woman's campaign," says Secretary Davis. "They

they are taking inventory of home values to determine on standards.

"The best American wage earners know that the pay check at the end of the week belongs to the family. They know also that a forty-five dollar a week wage does not do as well in some families as a thirty-five-dollar a week wage does in others."

"The demonstration houses prepared for Better Homes week in June are concrete educational means of emphasizing the importance of home-making, and the decreasing necessity of thorough study of its technique. In the home is the nation, in the home is the basis of the best patriotism."

"There is nothing better we can do than make a thorough workmanlike study of the things that make for a better home, with architects, builders, interior decorators, students, musicians educators and spiritual advisors joining in a definition of home."

The Better Homes campaign began last year in a comparatively small way. The result of the first effort is shown in the preparations this year of many communities to have demonstration homes during the campaign week in June, according to those interested in the movement. Many of these have been started by chambers of commerce, others by groups of women or women's clubs.

Swedes Ask Vote In Business Plans

STOCKHOLM.—Organized influence and participation of workmen in the direction and control of Swedish industrial enterprises which employ 25 persons or more is recommended in a plan just submitted to the government by the official Committee on Industrial Democracy. The recommendation involves more general recognition of labor unions, while forcing the employer to heed administrative and executive advice from his employees.

According to the committee's scheme, so-called councils may be established in industrial plants of 25 or more employees, providing such a measure is approved by the authorized labor union concerned. In the larger concerns these councils shall consist of three to nine delegates for the workmen sitting with not more than three representatives of the employer. It shall be the duty of the operation council to utilize the technical experience of the individual workman for the good of the concern, and the employer must furnish the council with necessary information regarding production. The council also may pass on questions of change in the equipment and methods of the plant.

EASTERN CAROLINA NEW EMPIRE BY DRAINAGE PROJECT

Drainage districts in Eastern North Carolina, created under what is conceded one of the most efficient reclamation laws in force in the country, are rapidly producing a literal new empire within the State that calls aloud for scientific development.

Of these lands 600,000 acres already have been drained and are either in cultivation for agricultural purposes or are ready to be so utilized. The total acreage of lands in the State—chiefly in the East—which can be classified as unclaimed is 2,375,000 acres of which at least 500,000 would not be suitable at the present time for agricultural purposes, and 200,000 of which are peat lands, capable of great development as producers of fuel but not suited for the chief end of reclamation work, which is farm settlement. From this total must be deducted in considering the area that looks to reclamation and settlement in the future, the reservations for wooded lands which are, of course, an essential part of any scientific and workable scheme of reclamation.

The problem of the new empire, therefore, is how to make it ready for practical use in agriculture, including the clearing of cut-over ground, the equipment of the farms with suitable buildings, machinery and stock, and the purchase of the land itself by a class of thrifty homeseekers who will be given an opportunity to buy and borrow at long terms and work out their own and the land's salvation.

RED CROSS WILL OBSERVE 40 YEARS OF RELIEF WORK

WASHINGTON.—Forty years of relief work in fire, flood, war and other disaster will be celebrated by the American Red Cross this summer. Since 1882 the society has been first in offering medical aid, food, shelter and money to the victims of the world's calamities, in peace as well as in war, and now, Red Cross officials declare, while the primary conception of Red Cross societies was relief in war time, the American society has recognized its greatest task as the amelioration of suffering in peace.

"The sick and wounded victims of epidemics and natural calamities suffer none the less because their suffering did not spring from war," says Ernest P. Bicknell, vice chairman and former national director of the American Red Cross writing in the society's official bulletin, the Red Cross Courier. "The treaty of Geneva, which is the foundation and charter of all Red Cross societies, make no provision for any activities outside those connected directly with armies and with war. Not a great many years elapsed, however, before the world began to realize that the underlying idea of the Red Cross was more widely applicable to conditions of life."

The policy of the American society early became that of peace time preparedness for war's emergencies, since relief in war was the charter reason for its existence. To be prepared for war, its officers declared, it must maintain an active and efficient machine between wars. From the reorganization on this basis in 1905, the society dates its real growth in that public confidence and understanding which has brought it to its present place in American life.

BIG ENTRY LIST IN SCHOOL MEET

CHICAGO.—Arrangements for nearly 1,000 schoolboys to compete in its 19th annual interscholastic track meet today and tomorrow, have been made by officials of the University of Chicago Schools in 26 states last year sent 603 competitors, representing 142 academies and high schools.
