OKLAHOMA FLOOD DESTROYS HOMES, MILLIONS IN CROPS

Canadian River on Rampage Sweeps Valley; Hero Gives Life

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., May 29.—With damage from the overflow of the north Canadian river running into hundreds of thousands of dollars, the crisis is expected to be reached here when the two foot rise up stream yesterday arrives at this place today.

Hundreds of houses and stores in the southern bottoms have been washed away or flooded. More than a thousand persons are homeless. Unidentified hero gave his life today in rescue work, after he had made repeated trips rescuing imperiled persons. It is believed that the damage to crops will amount to more than a million dollars.

At present there is no way to determine or even estimate the property loss. It is reported that a number of lives have been lost, but this lacks confirmation.

Minnesota Women "Sold" on Politics

ST. PAUL.—The four women members of the Minnesota house of representatives in the session just ended took their full part in legislative activity, consolidated their efforts along certain lines, and came through "with flying colors" according to their masculine colleagues. They worked together for legislation of particular interest to women.

They are Mrs. Hannah J. Kempfer, Mrs. Sue M. Dickey Hough, Mrs. Ma-beth H. Paige and Miss Myrtle Galt. The interest they took in their work became a matter of comment. It was noted that they were the first at committee meetings and the last to leave.

Ruhr Coal Shortage Benefits Wales Says

CARDIFF, Wales.—Cardiff has profited enormously by the stoppage of coal shipments in the Ruhr Valley. Hundreds of thousands of tons of coal have been sent to French and other European imports which might otherwise have been sent from the Ruhr mines.

Some British coal merchants have proved that it is practicable to ship coal from Cardiff to Eastern Canada and undersell there coal from Pennsylvania. This is a new avenue of trade which Cardiff's thrifty coal traders are developing.

Trinity Will Play Varsity on June 5

DURHAM, May 28.—Now there arises a question among Trinity college alumni and students as to whether the Alumni-Varsity game on Monday of commencement or the Carolina game Tuesday, June 5, will be high in the sports deck. On Monday the famous team of 1908, which won 26 out of 28 games played, will battle the youngsters under Captain "Red" Ormand. This alumni-varsity game is only one of the new features which is expected to attract added thousands to the Trinity commencement this year.

The famous team of 1908 was coached by Dr. M. T. Aadkins, of Baltimore Oriole reputation and now practicing his profession in Durham. T. B. Suiter of Rocky Mount was captain of the team, and Rev. J. M. Daniel of Wilmington was manager. This outfit licked everything it came in contact with that year.

1,000 DEAD IN QUAKE, REPORT.

ALLAHABAD, Persia, May 29.—According to newspaper advices from Teheran, more than 1,000 persons have been killed by an earthquake at Turbatihaidari. The report states that the shocks covered a period of several hours and many villages are completely devastated.

In the absence of further details concerning the catastrophe, it is believed that the number of dead will go far beyond the estimate given. Suffering among the survivors is terrible and relief parties are being dispatched with food, in addition to a large corps of physicians and nurses.

BUSINESS NEEDS, PRESENT, FUTURE OF PITT COUNTY

BY CLOSS W. HEARNE, Member Greenville board of Aldermen

North Carolina is one of the very greatest states in the Union and the eastern part of it offers the greatest opportunities to be had anywhere. I have traveled considerably in the eastern part of the United States and nowhere is there more beautiful, more fertile farm lands than in this coastal plain section—in the heart of which Greenville and Pitt county are located. "The soil," as a prominent visitor from one of the western states said so a short time ago, "has hardly been tilled, much less brought to its full state of cultivation."

There are "acres of diamonds" at our own front door, and when I hear a man say: "I think I shall move to a land of greater opportunity," I mark him a man of not much vision and think it most probable that he would be as great a success here as anywhere else.

Shake-off Our Conceit.

It is true that we need a lot of things in Pitt county and Greenville, almost too numerous to mention. When we get so CONCEITED that we FEEL A SELF-SUFFICIENCY we should build a WALL AROUND US and ROT as other places, all of which will not be found in China.

The greatest need right now it seems to me is manufacturing of any and all kinds that would employ labor in the year round, and the kind of such a character as to utilize our raw material—the material that we now have and the extra amount that can be produced right here. We are too wedded to the one crop idea, in the light of the fact that we have a 9 months growing season out of every twelve.

"We are making rapid strides in progress, which should give courage and incentive to push forward still harder to a greater Greenville and Pitt county. Every one can help in this. It is not a one man, club, or one commercial organization task—it is for everybody—man, woman and child. It is up to us—everybody—to lend financial aid to organizations by those of faith and vision, and then lend moral support—the two kinds of support must go hand in hand. Finally, we must boost by word of mouth for all we are worth—"Toot our own horn."

Need New Blood.

"Again we should invite new blood to join us in our land of promise, provided they are the right sort and to encourage capital to establish industries remembering always it is 'Our Greenville—Yours If You Come.'"

"We have a number of good citizens besides the native born, who have made good here and are helping to build the community. We are proud of them and want and need more of their kind. So let's invite them in every way possible and then watch the community grow."

J. W. FOLK, FIGURE IN POLITICS DEAD

WASHINGTON, May 29.—Joseph W. Folk former Governor of Missouri and once a leading figure in Democratic party politics, died last night in New York.

Joseph Wingate Folk, one time Governor of Missouri, presidential candidate, leading light in the Democratic party for many years, and author of numerous important state laws, was frequently referred to as "the man who cleaned up Missouri politics."

His success in stamping out corrupt practices in the political affairs of his adopted state attracted nationwide attention just after the Spanish American war, and so impressed the people of Missouri that in 1905 they swept him into the governor's chair. Under the laws of that state an incumbent cannot succeed himself as Governor, but becomes eligible after an intervening term. Folk served as Governor until 1909, and according to his many friends throughout the state, could have returned to the job at any time since.

NEW COTTON LAW IN EFFECT AUG. 1

WASHINGTON, May 29.—In an endeavor to find a satisfactory basis for the regulations to carry out the new cotton standards act which becomes effective Aug. 1, Secretary Wallace, of the department of agriculture, conferred today with a group of cotton men.

Public hearings conducted during the last month in the South have developed widespread approval of the new act. It was reported, but opposition has developed in some cotton exporting centers to the provision in the law requiring that United States official cotton standards to be used in foreign trading. Department of agriculture officials hold it would be illegal under the new law for an American merchant to accept a foreign offer for a sale of cotton based on grades other than the United States official standards.

A delegation of Liverpool and Manchester, England, cotton merchants are now en route to this country and have been granted a hearing by Secretary Wallace, at which the exporting provisions will be discussed.

DE VALERA READY TO QUIT, PEACE LOOMS IN IRELAND

DUBLIN, May 29.—Captured documents made public today by the Free State government show that Eamon De Valera and his chief staff Frank Aitken, have definitely ordered a cessation of active hostilities by the Republicans, adding that "the republic cannot longer be defended successfully by your arms."

The statement emanating from De Valera comes as a quick change of attitude on the part of the republican leader and is regarded in Free State quarters as proving the effectiveness of the government's campaign. Scarcely more than a week ago, in a communication sent to the Associated Press, he declared that the "one sided truce" could not continue indefinitely, but this brought no response from the government to a definite end.

There will be no formal surrender of arms, but the order by Aitken that they shall be dumped is almost the equivalent, for arms dumps are easily discovered by the Free State patrols. It is believed the Republicans now are likely to concentrate their efforts upon the election campaign, believing that their chances of influencing the voters are greater with the cessation of the armed campaign and attacks on property.

"BLACK BILLY SUNDAY" TO LEAD RELIGIOUS PARADE

A parade of recent religious converts headed by C. P. Dixon, colored evangelist, who is conducting a series of revival services in Forbes and Morton's warehouse will be held Wednesday. The line will form at the warehouse at 7:30, and will move through the main streets of Greenville. During the revival more than 400 have professed Christ it is declared. In addition to the converts more than 500 others will march in the parade, it was stated. The purpose of the procession, it was given out, is to stimulate interest in church work and diffuse christian thought.

Considerable interest has been manifested in this novel manner of spreading the gospel and it is believed that fully 1,000 will take part in the religious march. Rev. J. S. Shaw, pastor of York A. M. E. Zion church, under whose auspices the evangelistic services are being held, urges every one who desires to be in line to report promptly at the appointed hour.

The evangelist addressed another large audience last night on "Dead Men Chained to Live Men." The subject was highly interesting, well interpreted and made a deep impression upon his hearers.

To night at 7:45, "Black Billy Sunday," will preach on "After The Ball." This subject, it is said affords splendid opportunity for the evangelist to develop a constant fire of homely truths. With the addition of more seats and benches ample provision is now available to properly provide for the white people, who are attending in growing numbers.

Amanda Daniels, aged 66 years, a well known colored woman died at her home on East Third street yesterday afternoon at 4 o'clock, after a week's illness from a stroke of paralysis. The interment took place this afternoon in Cooper cemetery, services being conducted by Rev. J. S. Shaw, pastor of A. M. E. Zion church, assisted by Rev. C. P. Dixon.

Amanda was a loyal member of the Methodist church and one of the best known colored women in Greenville. She had many friends among both the colored and white people who will miss her.

She is survived by two sons, Charlie and Joe Daniels, also several grandchildren and one great grand child.

Axe Murderer Adds One More Victim to List of 19; Police Are Baffled

Riddick Quits as College Head, Allen Named Successor

RALEIGH, May 29.—Resignation of Dr. W. C. Riddick, president of the North Carolina State College of Agriculture and Engineering since 1916 was accepted by the board of trustees of the institution yesterday and the presidency will be formally offered to Dr. E. C. Brooks, State Superintendent of Public Instruction since 1919 during the next two weeks. Dr. Brooks will accept.

At his own request Dr. Riddick will be transferred to the department of engineering as dean under the Zook plans for reorganization of the college into four departments, which were adopted in principle at the meeting yesterday. Deans for the agricultural, scientific and business departments will not be named until a new president is installed.

A. T. Allen, director of Teacher Training of the State department of Education, will succeed Dr. E. C. Brooks as superintendent of public instruction in North Carolina when Dr. Brooks is elected president of N. C. State College as successor to Dr. W. C. Riddick.

Announcement to this effect was made by Governor Morrison following a conference with Mr. Allen Dr. Brooks.

"Mr. Allen is well fitted for the office in character and ability and his appointment is by way of promotion for efficient service," Governor Morrison said.

Powder Plant Lets Go, Five Killed, 3 Seriously Injured

FAYVILLE, Ill., May 29.—Five men were killed and three seriously injured in an explosion at the Hercules Powder company's plant here today.

The blast was in the belatin packing plant in which the five killed were working. The cause has not been fixed. The entire packing department was destroyed, but only one other building was damaged.

SEES COMFORT FOR ARCTIC EXPLORERS

STOCKHOLM.—A new type of motor-sleigh designed to provide the comforts of a Pullman car for polar explorers has been experimented with in the Arctic regions of Sweden and is now being perfected by the inventor, Mr. J. W. Sandstorm, chief of the Swedish weather Bureau.

Mr. Sandstorm in an address just delivered before the Swedish Physics Society declared that polar exploration ought to be raised from the level of hazardous sports to that of well-equipped scientific research. The explorer needs swift and reliable means of transportation, a dependable plant for the preparation of food, a comfortable bed, a table at which to work a dark-room for developing photographs, etc., and these advantages are all provided by the new motor-sleigh.

Seaboard Floats Loan.

WASHINGTON, May 29.—The Seaboard Air Line was given permission by the interstate commerce commission today, to issue \$7,737,998 in trust certificates.

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., May 29.—Police are seeking to solve the murder of Charley Graffeo, here last night, the latest victim of a series of axe assaults, during the last 42 months has taken the lives of 19 persons and resulted in injuries to 17 others.

Graffeo was found dead in his store with his skull crushed by a blow of an axe and his throat slashed from ear to ear. His pockets had been rifled and his store robbed.

Perpetrators have been sent to jail in only three of the long list of cases, and police claiming to have solved others declared the wounded victims refused to prosecute or cooperate in convictions.

Police and detectives are baffled in finding a clue that would furnish the slightest clue upon which to work. This series of unwarranted murders is one of the most puzzling that has ever come to the notice of police throughout the country, it was said.

Kitchin's Condition Is Reported Serious

WILSON, N. C., May 29.—While some improvement was noted last night, the condition of Representative Claude Kitchin, former minority leader in the lower branch of congress, was still very serious, and his physicians do not feel very much encouraged over his chances of recovery, according to Mrs. Lewis Suter, the congressman's daughter.

Mrs. Suter said Mr. Kitchin had "a very bad morning," but began to show signs of improvement during the afternoon and felt some better.

U. S. Consider Offer For Merchant Fleet

WASHINGTON, May 29.—The shipping board will investigate thoroughly the offer of more than one billion dollars for the entire government merchant fleet, Chairman Lasker, said today, and if bidders back up their proposals "there can be doubt but that the board will make award to them."

The offer was presented by John Slack, president of the Columbia Postal Supply company, Silver Creek, N. Y., and he proposed to pay one billion, 50 million dollars "for all ships active and inactive and all other property of the shipping board's real, personal and mixed holdings."

Swiss to Vote On Prohibition Soon

LAUSANNE.—Inspired by American prohibition, the prohibitionists of Switzerland are engaged in a campaign to reduce the consumption of strong alcoholic drinks and on June 3 the people themselves by a referendum will decide the issue.

The private distilling of alcohol has increased so rapidly in recent years and the drinking of pure dregs of distilled liquor, which is given the popular name of "Schnaps," has become so widespread among the masses that the authorities have become alarmed. The medical profession has launched a movement for federal intervention and control.

London Gives to Charity.

LONDON.—A sum in excess of \$7,000,002 has been collected on the streets of London by public solicitation during the past seven years for charitable purposes.

The cost of collection is given at 12 1-2 per cent.

GREENVILLE NEEDS MORE HOMES

A nation wide movement to encourage the building of better and more homes during the week of June 4 to 9 has been officially designated by President Harding, in the hope that people throughout the country will give thought resulting in action to the lack of proper housing conditions that appears national in scope.

The public has grown tired of being asked to observe practically every week in the year for first one thing and another. Some of them are worth, while the majority are not worth passing consideration. But here is a vital problem that should command the attention of every town, hamlet, village and city of the United States.

This is the second anniversary of the better home campaign. It went over so big and

effectively last year that numerous building programs that were dormant were revived and carried out.

Greenville is not exempt in the matter of building activity. It is true, we have countless beautiful and well maintained homes, but our burning need is MORE HOMES. If the city is to expand, housing conditions must keep pace. Absence of desirable places for newcomers and their families to live has been keenly felt in many communities.

Progressive citizens say they want more manufacturing industries. On the assumption capital had decided to erect a plant here giving employment to even a hundred operatives, where would they find shelter?

It might be contended, following an old custom, that we will care for them some way. That does not meet the situation. The only sensible thing to do, is to start building small, modern homes to provide for those now compelled to live in unsatisfactory quarters because they are not financially able to build better homes for themselves. There is no lack of capital in this section for the profitable investment in that a modest building program.

Because of seasonal crop conditions, there is tendency to complain at this time of indifferent purchasing volume. This complaint could be corrected if several hundred Greenville people who can afford the expense would paint their dwellings, make minor repairs and in other ways improve their homes. The money thus expended would find circulation through building supply dealers, which would give employment to skilled and unskilled labor.

And when labor works it spends.

It is barely possible that some far visioned business man or group of business men, might see the advantage of a small modern apartment house. Announcement that such a structure was to be erected in Greenville would result in renting every apartment before the ground was broken. They would be sold on the blue prints. This is not an idle assertion, but concrete fact that would prove itself, if given a chance.

The Chamber of Commerce, other civic organizations, the Greenville Woman's Club and every progressive element should get squarely behind the better homes campaign. If this can be brought about, it is a safe prediction that the results would more than compensate for the effort.

Greenville needs more HOMES, and NEEDS THEM BADLY.

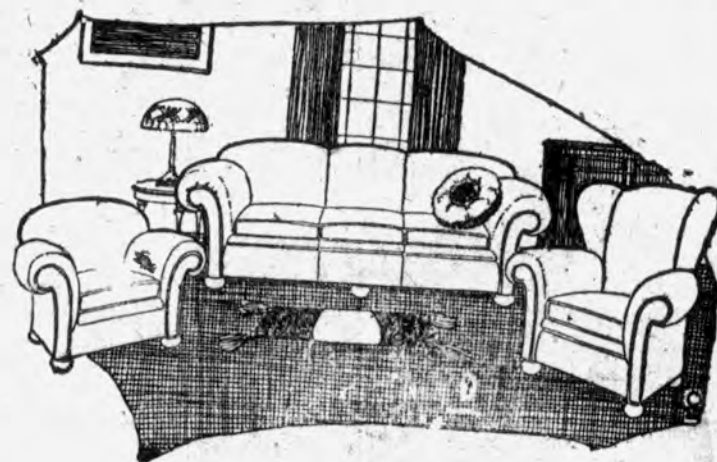
