The county agricultural agent will be glad to advise you on the subject. You want to be able to call your hens and tell the "layers" from the "liars," and then sell the "liars."

Remember all hatching should be concluded this month. It is too late for egg production and next year's breeders after June 1. Bear in mind that the poultry industry has not even a toe hold in this county yet. Its importance as a ready money income cannot be over estimated. Plan to enlarge your flocks NOW. We're going to hit the grade this year with the throttle wide open!

PETROGRAD OPERA HOUSE RUINED BY FIRE, MANY KILLED

Panic Stricken Audience Trampled to Death in Rush

HELSINGFORS, FINLAND, May 31.—The immense Petrograd opera house was burned last night and many in the audience were killed during the panic stricken rush for exits, according to dispatch received here today.

The dispatch gave no details as to the actual number of killed and injured, but it is believed that the death list will probably exceed more than 200 dead, and a considerable larger number of seriously injured.

The building was entirely destroyed and the fire broke out during the presentation of an opera. The audience included a number of persons prominent in the Soviet political and social life, it was stated.

German Girls Prefer Strike to Pay Mark

ESSEN.—Thousands of women and girls have been thrown out of work due to the closing of factories in the Ruhr as an outcome of French and Belgian occupation, but nevertheless domestics are as difficult to acquire as in the cities of the United States. This is largely due to the fact that the women and girls draw strike funds of one kind or another, either from the municipalities or from the Berlin government which usually amount to more than they would receive for household services.

In many instances the women are furnished lodging and food by the authorities, and in addition, as part of the passive resistance program, they get a weekly allowance of marks as pin money. Near Essen an old German barracks has been converted into a sort of camp for unemployed women, and in this place alone more than 400 women are quartered.

Says Women Cause Half World's Woes

LONDON.—Half the miseries of the western world are caused by women fighting against men, declared Dr. Josiah Oldfield, the eminent British physician, lawyer and author, in a recent London address. In spite of countless ages of experience, the doctor added, women had failed to excel even in cooking, yet they set up as competitors of men in all walks of life. "Far more homes are made miserable by envious women," he said, "than by dominant or brutal men."

Receiver Asked For Ku Klux In Atlanta

ATLANTA, May 31.—Receivership of the Ku Klux Klan is asked in a petition filed in the Fulton county superior court today by David Rittenhouse and others of Philadelphia, charging mismanagement to W. H. Evans, imperial wizard. The petition also charges Evans and W. J. Simmons, imperial lempor, entered into collusion in the settlement of a recent controversy involving control of the organization.

Captives See Hope Of Freedom With Release of Allen

TIEN TSIN, May 31.—Hope for the speedy release of all foreign captives held by Chinese bandits, brightened almost to assurance today with the news that Major Robert Allen, United States army, and W. Smith, Manchurian, Eng., had been freed unconditionally and that of the prisoners remaining in the impregnable fortress Major Roland Pinger, United States army, and Lee Solomon, had been moved to better quarters.

A message from Thac-Chang said "negotiations are going on favorably."

Federal Judge Sorry Law Stops Heavier Blockade Penalty

RALEIGH, May 31.—Deeply deploping the provision of the Vgstead law which limited the punishment to six months in jail, Judge Henry G. Cogner, of the United States District Court, expressed regret that he was unable to send John Hudson, of Harnett county, to the federal prison at Atlanta for five years.

After the jury had returned its verdict, Judge Cogner related the history of the case, stating that four years ago he sent the same man to Atlanta for a year, that two years ago Hudson was again convicted and sentenced to two years in prison but that the sentence has been reduced to a fine at the earnest request of a number of prominent citizens of the Benson community.

New York Brokerage Concern Is Bankrupt

NEW YORK, May 31.—An involuntary petition in bankruptcy was filed today against Jones and Baker, one of the largest brokerage concerns connected with the curb market with branches in all parts of the country. The curb market suspended the firm upon notification that Alfred Cox, Jr., had been appointed receiver by Federal Judge Goddard.

Japan Joins Against Boat Liquor Ruling

WASHINGTON, May 31.—Japan has joined the group of foreign powers which have made representations to the state department in connection with the supreme court decision on ship liquor, on instructions from Tokyo. Views of the Japanese government were presented verbally today by Ambassador Haniharua.

Plan Fraternity Building.

RICHMOND, Va., May 31.—A deed transferring lot at Lee Circle here to the Kappa Alpha Holding corporation, at a consideration of \$40,000, was recorded in the chancery court here today. It was the first step in plans to erect a building for national headquarters, which has been opposed by some chapters outside of Virginia.

DRESSER MUST PAY WIFE \$100 ALIMONY LOOK FOR BANNER DAY CURB MARKET

RALEIGH, May 31.—Following withdrawal of his lawyers and his bondsman, Raymond L. Dresser, defendant in the sensational divorce suit which has already brought forth three other court actions with still others in prospect has been ordered by Judge Thomas H. Calvert, resident judge of the seventh district, to pay his wife, Mrs. Anna L. Dresser, temporary alimony in the sum of \$100 a month and to pay her lawyers \$250.

The criminal case in which Dresser is accused of immoral relations with Mrs. Nellie Stonebanks was continued until June 25, attorneys for Mrs. Dresser, the prosecutrix, consenting to personal recognizance in the sum of \$500, in view of the order granting alimony and the fact that the co-defendant has fled the State.

Court Rules Alcohol Content of Whiskey Need Not Be Proved

NEW YORK, May 31.—The United States circuit court of appeals ruled today, that the government need prove alcoholic content of whiskey or whether it was fit for beverage purposes in cases where indictments charge violation of dry laws, in which liquor is specified as whiskey.

"All American" Music Program at Asheville

ASHEVILLE, N. C.—"All-American" music will characterize the program of the thirteenth biennial festival of the National Federation of Music Clubs here June 9-17, and is expected by its sponsors to prove that it is not always necessary to turn to Europe for good music and to show that eventually America should be the music center of the world.

Two outstanding features of the festival, which will also mark the twenty-fifth anniversary of the organization, will be the appearance of a Festival Symphony Orchestra, composed of 45 first-chairmen of various symphony orchestras; and a Festival Chorus of several hundred voices. Hadly, American conductor, will lead the orchestra, and Charles N. Boyd will direct the chorus.

To date 104 members have been recommended for the degrees of Bachelor of Arts. Last year's class numbered 88. Several will receive the degree of Master of Arts. New features added to the commencement this year are expected to see all previous records attendance broken by thousands.

The first public appearance of the noted preacher in this country will be at the commencement at Trinity. Rev. McFayden is being mentioned as a possible candidate for parliament from his district.

Milton Winner In 500 Mile Auto Race In Speedway Classic

INDIANAPOLIS, May 31.—Tommy Milton, of St. Paul, Minn., achieved the ambition of his brilliant racing career when the second time he won the 500-mile automobile race over the Indianapolis Motor Speedway, repeating his victory of 1921 before a crowd of 150,000. It was the greatest throng that ever witnessed a sporting event in America.

Milton's time for the 500 miles was 5:28:06.27, giving him an average speed to 91.4 miles an hour as compared with the record-breaking speed of 94.48 a year ago. Harry Hartz, of Los Angeles, who finished second in the 1922 race, thundered across the finish the five miles behind Milton, while Jimmy Murphy, winner of the 1922 race was third, about 13 miles behind Hartz.

Klan to Hold Big Konklave in Wayne

GOLDSBORO, May 31.—Thursday June 14, is the date of the big konklave of Klansmen from all over Eastern North Carolina and other parts of the country to be held in Goldsboro.

This became known when it was learned that an official of the Klan, presumably from Atlanta, Ga., the imperial headquarters, had secured permission of the authorities to use the fair grounds in which to stage their ceremonial.

The ceremonial, or rites, will be open to the public, this official also intimated, but so far no invitation to attend has been extended to those outside of the order.

The gathering is known as the International convention of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew.

WILSON, May 31.—Representative Claude Kitchin, former minority leader in the lower branch of congress, died here at 6:14 this morning. His death had been expected hourly for the last three days, and he began sinking rapidly shortly before last midnight. He had been in a semi-conscious condition since Monday, but rallied yesterday afternoon. He had a relapse, when the last spark of hope for his recovery was abandoned.

Dr. C. A. Woodward, said death was the culmination of complications which developed after he suffered a stroke of paralysis in 1920. He had never been in good health, the physician added. His wife, daughter, son and other members of his family were at his bedside when the end came.

Definite funeral arrangements have not been given out. With the announcement of the death of her distinguished husband, Mrs. Kitchin, is the recipient of a constantly growing flood of messages of condolences from dignitaries and friends of the late Representative throughout the country.

KIWANIS BEHIND PEACE MOVEMENT

ATLANTA, GA., May 31.—Kiwans were pledged to support any constructive movement toward permanent peace, the observance of Mother's Day and to give aid to disabled veterans of the World War in resolutions adopted by the national convention adopted by the national convention.

The resolution on peace as adopted declared that "Kiwans International hereby pledges its earnest support to any carefully conceived effort of movement toward permanent peace which gives promise of the maximum possibility of success, with a minimum probability of militaristic procedure involving the respective governments of the United States and the Dominion of Canada."

Support for veterans of the World War was pledged in a resolution declaring that the "Kiwans International, in convention assembled, realize that it is the patriotic duty as well as an economic duty of each individual member of Kiwanis to give wholehearted co-operation to the agencies carrying on constructive work of rehabilitation."

King Saved Pennies to Re-Fit Royal Yacht

LONDON.—King George's 30-year old racing yacht, the Britannia, which he could not afford to replace with a more modern cutter, has just come off the ways for another season of racing. She has been re-coppered, overhauled, and equipped with new running gear.

King George has never hesitated to say that he could not afford to build another big yacht, and last year he even went so far as to tell yachting enthusiasts that the Britannia would have to remain idle until he had saved up enough money to fit her out with new equipment.

Widely Known. Americans generally and statesmen all over the world associate the name Claude Kitchin, with the most powerful position in the legislative department of the government, when he served as leader of his party on the floor of the House of Representatives. As a debater he had no peer and colleagues both democrats and republicans alike recognized that his analytical mind held a fund of information that opposition was loath to arouse. Possibly no man in public life enjoyed the confidence and warm friendship of the members of the House as did Mr. Kitchin. Republicans found him for his sincerity and admired him for his superior statesmanship.

The people of North Carolina while appreciating him as one of its greatest sons and never lost sight of his transcendent abilities, preferred to regard him in personal terms as a citizen and lawyer and as a member of a family of prominent public men. His father, the late William H. Kitchin, served in congress, and William W. Kitchin, former governor of North Carolina, was a brother.

Held Powerful Position.

Claude Kitchin was born in Scotland Neck, March 24, 1868. He received his bachelor's degree from Wake Forest college at 19, and in 1890 was admitted to the bar. He subsequently practiced law at Scotland Neck. He was elected to Congress in 1910 and served continuously. Mr. Kitchin was majority leader in 64th and 65th, congresses inclusive and as chairman of the ways and means committee was one of the most influential members of the House in the financial and other constructive measures connected with national administration during the last few years.

Mr. Kitchin married Kate B. Mills, of Wake Forest, Nov. 13, 1888.

Funeral Tomorrow.

It was announced this afternoon that funeral services for Mr. Kitchin would be held tomorrow in the little Baptist church at 5 o'clock. The Rev. Dr. Charles Anderson, pastor of the church of which the dead representative was a member will conduct the services.

Burial will be made in the family plot in the cemetery near Scotland Neck.

MEMORIAL DAY HERE UNNOTICED

Memorial Day in Greenville was "observed" by the employees of the postoffice as a holiday and the banks were closed. A group of thoughtful girls and women sold Poppies for the benefit of the local Legion post. This summarizes how far the significance of the national holiday was felt and appreciated here.

Press advices from all over the state indicate that some sort of program was given in practically every community to commemorate the memory of American soldiers who sacrificed their lives in the World War. Our neighbor village, Winterville, thought enough of the day to celebrate it with a picnic and speeches of tribute to the heroic dead.

Since the recent conflict, May 30, is no longer regarded as merely a date designated to honor the memory of soldiers of the blue who fought in the civil war. Congress has made it national in character and purpose. It is the special day in the year, when the nation without regard to geographical location is expected to extend homage to the gallant boys who responded to the call of 1917, and died for the American flag that the peoples of Europe might survive.

It cannot be, it must not be, that interest and love for those who sleep in their tombs of clay, is waning over the short per-

iod of intervening years. But it does appear that Greenville should manifest public acknowledgement of just what Memorial Day means each year, by preparing in advance, a simple program of observance.

The reason it was not done yesterday was purely an oversight—just an error of omission rather commission, for braver, truer or more devoted hearts never pulsated the current of human life than the men and women of Greenville.

INEQUALITY OF EDUCATION

There are five million illiterates in the United States, says a recent survey made by experts. Researchers found it partly caused by public indifference to educational opportunity, and partly by inequality of educational opportunity, which makes it possible for one child in one state to get an education in half the time required in another.

As an example, it is contended, that if a South Carolina child wishes to cover the same amount of work that a New Jersey child covers in eight years before he graduates from elementary school, the South Carolina child must go to school the full term of 14 years to do this. In other words, if he goes to school every day from the time he is six until he is 20, he will just be able to do it.

These figures are based upon the average length of term the schools in the two states are in session. Such a wide disparity in educational opportunity while fair to one, is unfair to the other.

There was a little news item buried in exchange about a man having been arrested under the law that is known in some states as the "lazy husband act." One is given to speculation how many wives read that little item silently and thoughtfully.

Pitt County farmers, listen to this: Farmers of Halifax county have purchased 6,000 baby chicks, a carload of holstein and Guernsey cattle, formed a seed breeders association and sold a carload of graded sweet potatoes in Los Angeles, Calif., at \$100 per bushel. That's a stride worth emulating.

A paper in a neighboring town that shall be nameless publicly and piously returns thanks because the women of that burg "are not ashamed to have dough on their hands and flour on their noses." Let it be known that our Greenville girls powder their noses just as often and just as well as any girls on earth—but they can't get their hands on enough dough, so far as that goes.

5 SOUTHERN STATES TIGHTEN DRY LAWS

ATLANTA.—John Barleycorn found himself more completely barred from two southern states, permitted restricted latitude in one, not a live topic in a fourth and a subject for humorous discussion in a fifth at the conclusion of sessions of state legislatures in five southern states.

In North Carolina and Tennessee prohibition laws were tightened, in North Carolina by making the state laws conform with the Volstead act, and in Tennessee state by revising old statutes. A previous law in North Carolina permitted a citizen to receive one quart of liquor every two weeks, and although that statute is superseded by the conformity act, courts may yet convict under the previous law, the state supreme court has held.

Tennessee's legislature passed a bill to make it a felony to transport into the state liquor in quantities of "one gallon or more," or to move it from place to place within the state. Another act prohibits any person from giving away, selling or furnishing for beverage purposes intoxicating liquor, the drinking of which "shall result in the impairment of health or body or death of any other person." A third measure bans possession of still apparatus, while a fourth amends a previous prohibition law to as to stike out the words "for the purpose of sale" of liquor, and to prohibit the manufacture of whiskey.

RAIL WORKERS URGE BOOST IN WAGES NOW

DETROIT.—Increase in wages for practically all its approximately 400,000 members throughout the country have been asked by the United Brotherhood of Maintenance of Way Employees and Railway Shop Laborers, according to announcement at national headquarters of the union here. The requests are for re-establishment of the wages paid under the Railroad Labor Board's decision Number Two, from July 1920, to July 1921, and the request is made that the increases be retroactive to February 15, this year.

Increases already have been granted this class of workers on 17 railroads of the country, while 28 other cases have been filed with the Labor Board, it is announced.

In announcing the step the Brotherhood headquarters declares that a recent survey showed two out of every three maintenance of way men to be in debt because of low wages, that but one in every seven has a bank account, and that half of them are without life insurance.

Western Athletes Strong Contenders At Track Meeting

PHILADELPHIA.—Coach Walter Christie's University of California track team, coming to Franklin Field next Friday and Saturday to defend the Intercollegiate A. A. A. title they won in 1921 and successfully defended last year at Harvard Stadium, probably will find keener and greater opposition among the Eastern stars

this year than they have before.

The Californians, strongest last year in the field, are without their crack shot-putter Jack Merchant, but Christie has improved his other field stars and has expressed confidence, after early victories over Stanford, Southern California and Nebraska, that his men will keep the I. C. A. A. A. title on the coast until they have won the event five times enough to obtain permanent possession of the championship cup.

California is strongest this year in the discus, shotput and javelin, pole vault and two-mile run. Dorr the two-miler, will go against such stars as Walter Higgins of Columbia, winner of the two-mile international event at the Penn Relay Carnival, and McLane, of Pennsylvania, the indoor champion.

"Brick" Muller, captain of the Golden State team has been hampered in his jumping by a foot injury, but is expected to be in condition for the meet. Leroy Brown of Dartmouth the indoor and outdoor champion, probably will be his most dangerous rival. Treyer has been developed into an exceptional jumper by Coach Christie. Wetter is California's ace with the shots.

Tootell, of Bowdoin, is the East's most promising shot man. Captain Muller and Neufeldt probably will represent California in the discus, and Muller also will broad jump. Rose, of Pennsylvania, has been best in the East in the broad jump season.

Red Norris, of the Bears still is their mainstay in the pole vault. In Sherrill and Owens of Pennsylvania, joint indoor champions, he may find his toughest opposition.

Storrs, of Yale, is a javelin thrower of merit. S. S. Sorrenti, the Bears' javelin man, who finished second last year with a throw of 185 feet 7 3-4 inches hurled the spear 189 feet 10 inches at the California-Nebraska meet this year. Brander, of Pennsylvania defeated Sorrenti in Harvard Stadium in 1922 by less than an inch.

PEANUT CROP CAN BE MADE PROFITABLE

RALEIGH, May 29.—Though all conditions may be favorable to the growth of peanuts it is not possible to make large and profitable yields on soils of average fertility unless some form of lime is used with the crop states W. F. Pate, Fertility Agronomist of the North Carolina Experiment Station. Mr. Pate says that the grower may start with good vigorous seed of a suitable variety, may have good growing weather and

give thorough cultivation, but he must still use lime and commercial fertilizer containing plant foods in correct proportion.

As to lime, Pate says, "The peanut is a legume and since most of our cultivated soils are low in lime and sour, it is necessary to apply some form of this material. Either finely ground lime-stone or burnt lime may be used. The kind to buy will as a rule depend on the analysis of the material and the price per ton delivered. When large amounts of lime are used it is best to broadcast and harrow in. With small amounts it is best to apply in the drill before the peanuts are planted. When the crop is used in a three or four year rotation, the lime can be used for the preceding crop and good results will be seen in the yield of peanuts."

On the question of fertilizers for peanuts, Mr. Pate has found that the experiments give variable results, yet, he states "Many people think it is not necessary to fertilize to grow good peanuts. Except on land that is in a high state of cultivation or where peanuts follow in a rotation where the preceding crop has been heavily fertilized, the use of fertilizer will generally show a profit."

SMALL BLACK DOG ACTS AS MOTHER TO YOUNG LION

BERLIN.—Berlin's Zoo is probably more successful than any other in the world as a breeding place for wild animals. While it lost many inhabitants during the war, care was taken to keep pairs and the cages are gradually being restocked with animals born in captivity.

Strange foster families are developed by the keepers, who have learned the difficulties of competing certain mothers to look after their young under the unnatural conditions they face in captivity.

Seek Game Protection.

WASHINGTON.—Hunting clubs, game protective associations and other nature lovers, alarmed by the rapid disappearance of feathered game in America, are conducting an agitation to limit the use of the automatic shot gun; if not to abolish its use entirely.

CHANGING, HE SAYS**

LONDON. — We do not use our brains to half their capacity, says Sir Arthur Keith, British scientist, who has just returned from the African jungle where he made a minute study of the brains of gorillas and gibbons.

"Most of us," declares Sir Arthur, "have more brains than we know what to do with."

The famous anthropologist said that changes are now taking place in the human world more rapidly than at any former period, but that the time has not yet come for the production of supermen. During the war, he explained, the average stature of a man was 5 feet 6 inches, the same as in the neolithic period. The average for men leading professional lives is 5 feet 8 inches.

The scientist says he is convinced that certain characteristics which are easily recognized in the bodies of a large proportion of our modern population, are of recent origin. The most plastic bone in the human body, he said, is that under the gums, in which the teeth are rooted, and it is here that the most marked changes are to be noted.

team as much to their contrasting personalities as to their admitted superiority as pilots, in the opinion of aviators at McCook Field here, the home station of the men. They predict that the ability of the two men to work together in trying situations will bring further aerial honors to the United States Army.

Kelley's enthusiastic and impulsive nature gives the combination the necessary "punch," while MacReady, more staid and quiet, furnishes the "balance" which is a necessary element in carrying through many diffi-

cult situations, according to the belief of those who have observed the men working and flying together during the past two years.

A striking illustration of the divergent characteristics of the two fliers is given by Lieutenant Harold R. Harris, who, in a speedy plane, overtook the pair as they passed over Dayton in their recent transcontinental flight. Harris, getting a late take-off, pursued the big ship for some miles before overtaking it. As he came abreast, he says, the man in the cockpit carelessly threw up an arm. "That's MacReady," Harris says, he decided as he observed the action. For a moment the second passenger of the T2 did not appear. Then from the depths of the fuselage a bundle of blankets suddenly appeared and was waved frantically in the wind. "That was easy," said Harris. "I knew it was Kelley, without giving a second glance."

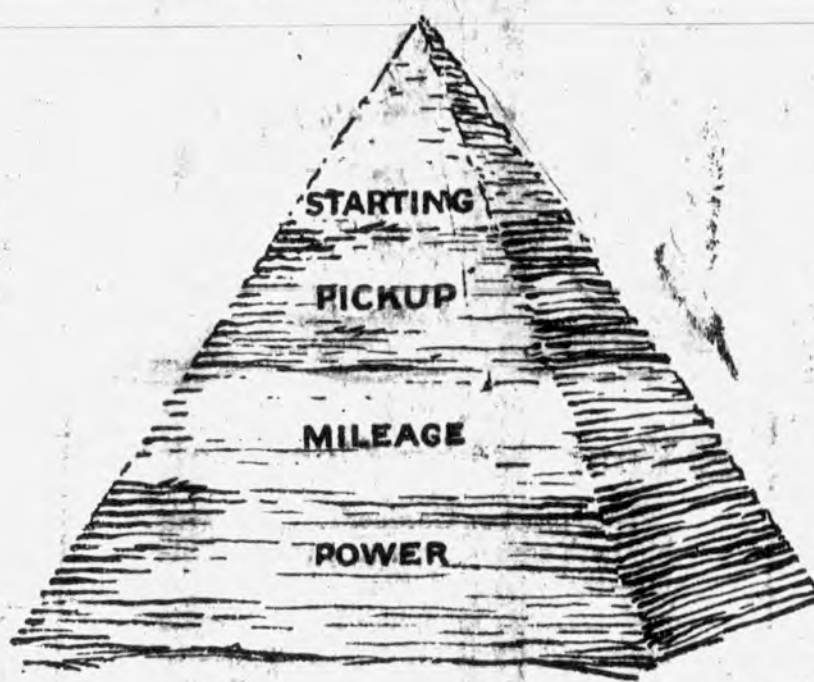

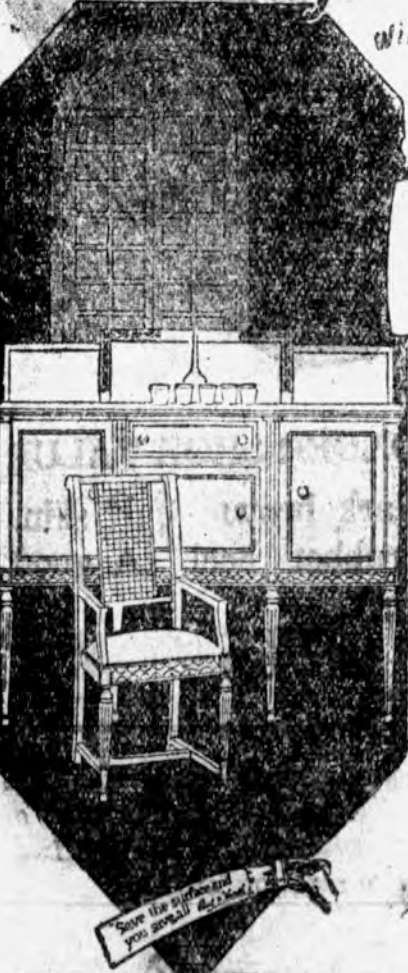

DEMAND FOR DAIRY FOODS EXPANDING SAY NOTED EXPERTS

WASHINGTON.—Only the healthy and growing condition of the American dairy industry has enabled it to withstand the drop in exports which came with the world readjustment. This also has been aided by a growing taste of the American people for dairy products, says Dr. H. E. Van Norman president of the World's Dairy Congress association which is preparing for its international meeting here in October.

"The United States has reached a point where the production and consumption of dairy products are almost equal," Dr. Van Norman said, "as is indicated by the fact that its exports and imports of dairy products nearly balance."

"The fact is that our dairy industry is in a healthy condition and it is kept so by our people's growing appreciation of dairy products. The fact that our consumption of dairy products today almost equals our production indicates a tremendously rapid growth in appreciation."

"While our foreign business in butter and cheese does not reach a great volume, our domestic markets are constantly influenced by the condition that obtain in the world markets. The foreign business which we do carry on in dairy products also frequently has an importance out of all proportion of its size in the stabilizing of our domestic conditions. A few weeks ago, when our cheese market was particularly slow, an opening for cheese occurred in England. Our owners for stored cheese immediately 'unloaded' as much as they could on the English market. The deficit was caused by the failure of New Zealand, where the creameries are equipped to manufacture either butter or cheese, to pay the usual attention to cheese."

South Carolina Asks Help For Orphans Left by Fire Horror

COLUMBIA, S. C., May 22.—Help of the people of the United States in caring for the newly-made widows and orphaned children, whose husbands and parents were among the 77 victims of the Cleveland school house fire last Thursday, was asked today, by Camden the little resort town in the heart of South Carolina which has assumed the burden of providing for the stricken.

Governor Thomas G. McLeod, immediately upon the receipt of a telegram from the Red Cross advisory committee at Camden that outside assistance was needed issued an appeal to the country at large for funds to provide permanently for at least four widows and forty-two children, robbed of their means of support by the school house tragedy. Contributions he announced should be sent to the American Red Cross, which has undertaken to manage the entire relief program.

Railroad Men to Meet.

CHICAGO.—Interesting subjects, from the development of the locomotive and railway car to the training of apprentices in railroad work, will come up for discussion at the annual meeting of the American Railway Association here, June 20 to 22. It is believed the largest number of railroad men ever gathered together in one body will attend.

URGES PROTECTION FOR WORKERS EYES

NEW YORK.—Two hundred thousand accidents to the eyes of workmen occur in industry each year, and approximately 16 percent of the total blind population of the country, or 150,000, represent the industrial blind; these are two of the facts developed in an investigation of the eye hazards of industrial occupations which was conducted last year by the National Committee for the Prevention of Blindness. The study covered every state in the union and every industrial occupation in which there is an accident hazard.

The report points out that much already has been accomplished toward

alleviation of the eye accident problem in industry, but all this is merely a beginning.

"There are still countless plants whose operations present serious eye hazards, in which no goggles or other protective equipment are available. There are many plants where workmen still wear goggles in their pockets except when they are watched. There are still plants in which toothpicks, matches, handkerchiefs, pocket knives, and even the tongues of workmen are the instruments employed to remove cinders and other particles from the eyes of fellow workers."

Industrial accidents the report says, are responsible for an injury to a human eye every 2 1-2 minutes, day and night, 365 days a year.

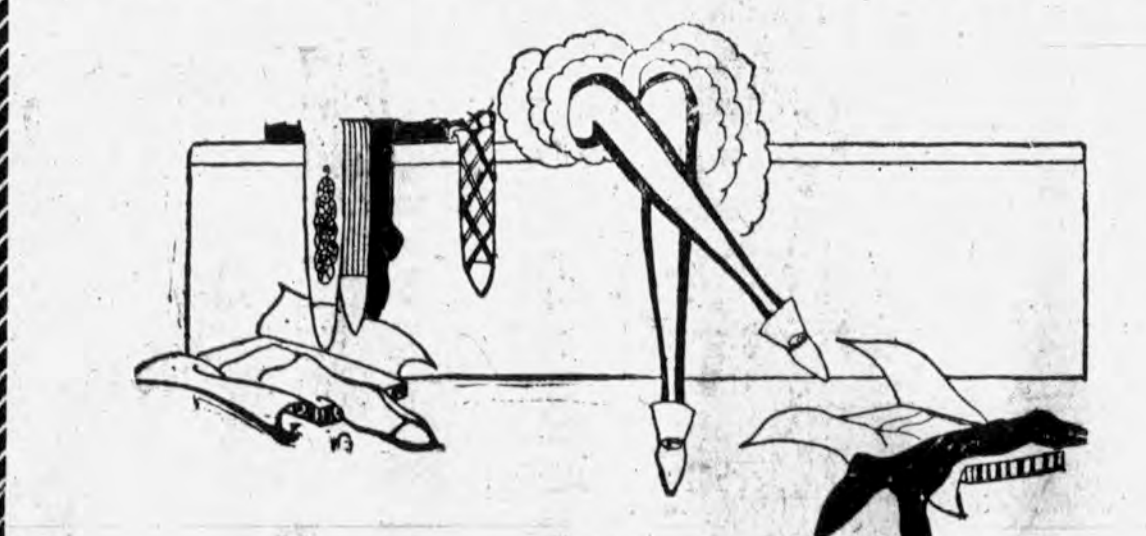
