Exhibit of Art, Economics Work of Pupils Remarkable Show

Here's a tip to you, young chaps of the graded and high schools that might serve you well in the years to come.

Just "lamp" that exhibit in the high school showing what the girls from the fourth to seventh grades can do in the arts and home economic courses. It will be found that the girl of tomorrow can do something more than powder her nose, talk clothes dancing and other forms of amusement.

Boys, your future sweethearts are going to be something more than animated dolls. They are going to know to sew, to make tempting pies and cakes, toothsome biscuits, beautify the home at small cost, and a thousand and one other things that some of the girls of today cannot do—possibly because of lack of advantages. But anyway that's your good luck. Just convince yourselves and drop in on that exhibit tonight. It's your last chance.

Remarkable Display.

To get down to the serious side of this exhibit. The work of the children is not only remarkable but marvelous. Specimens in crayon, ink, water colors, in many instances, are out of the amateurish class. They appear almost professional. And the best part of the course as emphasized by Superintendent Rose is, that art is not taught for art's sake but for practical purposes.

One of the best of the exhibits is house plan drawn by a child. It has background, shows fine perspective, drawn to scale and any builder could easily undertake to construct such a home.

Another attractive feature with a forcible lesson is a beautiful portfolio containing a map of the United States, with North Carolina brought in strong relief, Pitt county especially and Greenville in particular. It contains a message to the school children of Switzerland from those of Greenville. Within its covers are pressed flowers, tobacco and cotton leaves and other specimens of plant life, together with picture of the various classes, their teachers and outdoor school activities. This interchange of messages with the children of Europe is a novel way of "getting better acquainted," as Supt. Rose, expressed it. At the same time it gives an outlet to our community advantages that cannot be served in any other way.

Some Millinery Display.

The display of wearing apparel would make the eyes of an expert window trimmer sparkle as he realized what an effect could be produced with the assortment. There are dresses, aprons, night dresses, and a fine line of dainty, well made lingerie. As to hats, they are there in endless variety and beauty. The girls who made these hats are independent for life. Big millinery designers would grab them at the wink of an eye if they knew such talent was running at large.

To the masculine sense of sight they are gorgeous. When this is confirmed by women, there must be something to it.

Commended by Visitors.

Students of the commercial course also have a creditable display and their work was greatly admired and commended by visitors.

The exhibit is certainly worth attending. People of Greenville cannot appreciate the talent that is being developed in the courses of domestic science art and until they witness this colorful and interesting display.

Search for Bones of Pocahontas Is Stirring British

GRAVESEND, ENG., June 1.—Resentment at the action of Edward Gaston, American archaeologist and associates, in digging up the remains of scores of bodies in St. George's church yard in search for bones of Pocahontas continued unabated among townspeople today.

Inhabitants held indignation meetings and made their sentiments known to the church authorities. Some even threatened to petition for the removal of Canon Grudge, blind pastor of the church.

Japanese Fishing Boats Seized and Crews Jailed By Russian Government

TOKIO, June 1.—The Russian soviet administration in Siberia has seized several Japanese fishing vessels and imprisoned 72 members of the crew for operating within seven miles of the prescribed limit. Hereafter, fishermen have not been molested unless they were within three miles of the shore.

The Japanese government will make a vigorous protest to the Soviet regime, demanding the immediate release of the fishermen.

Fleet "Summer Dream" Calls Bid for the U. S.

WASHINGTON, June 1.—Thorough investigation has convinced Chairman Lasker of the shipping board, there is no prospect of a bid of more than a billion dollars made by John W. Slack, Silver Creek, N. Y., for the board's merchant fleet would ever be accepted.

Inquiry conducted by the board in conjunction with other government departments resulted Lasker said today that the offer had been definitely classified as a "summer dream."

MEXICANS STORE PROVINCIAL PALACE; 10 KILLED, 17 HURT

MEXICO CITY, June 1.—According to newspaper dispatches from Durango City, 10 persons were killed and 17 injured, some seriously, when a mob yesterday stormed the provincial palace in protest against the law limiting to 25 the number of clergymen allowed each religious denomination.

The trouble started when a crowd of 3,000 persons became so excited after listening to fiery speeches while spokesmen were awaiting admittance to the building that it started bombarding the palace with stones. Mounted police fired over their heads, whereupon the demonstrators disarmed the guards and in the wild shooting that followed three policemen and seven civilians were killed.

When the motor hearse bearing the remains of the former Democratic leader touched the city limits, church bells tolled and the throngs bared their heads as it passed on its way to the Kitchin home. WASHINGTON, June 1.—Eight thousand school children, gathered in American League Park to serenade President and Mrs. Harding as a feature of Washington's Music Week broke away from their teachers before the program was concluded and rushing good-naturedly, but wildly across the field, laid down a barrage of flowers on the Presidential party.

What had started as a quiet serenade was turned into a wild rush of eager children when, anxious to present either to the President or Mrs. Harding a bouquet they took the short course of hurling the flowers at Mr. and Mrs. Harding. The President and his wife withstood the barrage bravely at first, but soon the bouquets began coming so fast and thick they were compelled to ward off the rain of blossoms.

New Russian Party Started in London

LOONDON.—The anti-religious policy of the Soviet government and the general gravity of the Russian situation, have set up a new state of ferment in Russian circles of London and the continent.

The result has been to bring into being a new Russian group, the National Progressive Party, which recently held a meeting in London. It was then declared that the aim of the party was to work for the holding eventually in Russia of a great national plebiscite which should set up a constitutional assembly, which in turn would decide the future of Russia. The party adopted as other planks of its platform the complete freedom of religious life; respect of persons, property and trade; open trade for all with no special privileges for Germany or any other state.

The death of Representative Claude Kitchin, is not only an irreparable loss to North Carolina, but to the entire nation. No man in public life during the last 10 years has occupied a more conspicuous and commanding position in national legislation, and possibly no man within the same time rose as rapidly as a constructive Statesmen in Congress as he did.

As chairman of the powerful ways and means committee of the House, where matters concerning the finances of the country originate he molded legislation that is written into the statutes and has proved of estimable benefit to the people. His genial disposition, unswerving integrity, partly fidelity and devotion to convictions won for him an enviable position with the leaders of both national political parties. As a debater he ranked with Conklin, Blaine, Carlisle, Blackburn, "Uncle" Joe Cannon, Champ Clark and many other famous orators. As a parliamentarian, he was without equal in Congress. The late James Mann, republican leader and his intimate friend "Uncle Joe" frequently had occasion to have that fact indelibly impressed.

Mr. Kitchin was a man of extraordinary vision. He was big enough not to let party creed influence him in legislation in what he believed affected the interest of all the people.

ple. He was just blooming into the flower of still greater achievement when he was stricken with paralysis three years ago. Despite his affliction, he maintained an active interest in public questions so far as his health would permit, and maintained that spirit until the last.

And while his body rests in the little cemetery near his beloved home, Scotland Neck, his memory will live down through the ages, as a brave, honest, imperious man who bowed alone to death.

Germany After South American Shipping

HAMBURG. — Regular shipping service between Germany and the western coasts of Central and South America is provided for in an agreement concluded by all the German lines interested in the traffic.

It is planned to have one ship go through the Panama Canal every ten days by way of Bremen, Rotterdam, and Antwerp to western ports in South America. Every six weeks one ship is to go through the Strait of Magellan to western South American harbors by way of the same intermediate stops in Europe.

Harvard Clubs Will Meet, Kansas City

KANSAS CITY. The twenty-fifth annual meeting of the Associated Harvard Clubs, May 24-26, is expected to attract several hundred alumni from widely scattered regions of the United States to Kansas City for the revival of college fellowship and the discussion of problems connected with the university. Most of the 110 clubs, constituents of the association, are expected to have representation.

The organization was instituted primarily to enable Western men to participate in university affairs, according to Leighton Miles of this city, vice-president of the Southwestern district of the Harvard Clubs. Among the subjects on the program for discussion are relations between the college and graduate schools and secondary schools; the relation of the university and alumni bodies; the duty of Harvard as a national university, the Harvard war memorial and the Theodore Roosevelt memorial.

One good way to judge a play is by the number of times it has been played. If audiences enjoy it, they recommend it to their friends and so it plays night after night making new friends all the time. He knew what would make his audiences weep, as his great tragedies will testify; but he knew equally well what would make his audiences laugh, and no play bears stronger witness of this than the hilarious story of "The Taming of the Shrew."

There is also a rollicking, romantic element to the story in the plight of Bianca, the pretty younger sister, whose father will not let her marry until her elder sister, the ill-tempered Katharine, has found a husband. The efforts of Bianca's suitors to find some man brave enough to marry Katharine; their meeting with the swaggering, adventure-loving, Petruchio, and his boast that he will marry Katharine and make a model wife of her; the way he carries out his boast; and the fight among Bianca's lovers as to which one shall marry her after her sister is safely out of the way, make up a play that is comedy and romance from beginning to end.

When the play is given here, as a part of the Chautauqua program, the role of Katharine will be played by Miss Olive Oliver, one of the foremost Shakespearean actresses in the American theatre. The role of Petruchio will be played by Louis Leon Hall, who has been leading man with many of the famous stars, including Nat Goodwin, Robert Mantell, Walker Whitesides and Nance O'Neill. Robert Strauss will have one of the principal comedy roles and the remainder of the cast will be made up of experienced and able players. Miss Oliver, Mr. Hall, and Mr. Strauss have just closed a long season on tour with Fritz Leiber in Shakespearean repertoires.

New Metal Coins to Circulate in Berlin

BERLIN.—It will not be long before the jingle of metal coins will again be freely heard in Berlin shops and banks. It is estimated that there will soon be 210,000,000,000 marks in aluminum "small change"

in circulation.
The enormous depreciation of the mark has made the pfennig pieces such insignificant bits that they have disappeared from virtually all cash tills. Before the war there were one and two-pfennig coins in copper, five, ten, and 25 pfennig pieces in nickel, and 50-pfennig coins in silver, besides the ten and 20 mark gold pieces.

Michigan to Honor Famous Trainer

ANN ARBOR.—The decision of the University of Michigan to name the new Ferry Field Club house the "Yost Field House" did not come as an inspiration but rather as the result of a demand to thus honor the football mentor, from followers of the Maize and Blue in every part of the world. For months past the athletic authorities have been deluged with requests that this tribute be paid the coach. The letters came from alumni associations, state officials, men high in official life of this country, including Judge William Day, of the Supreme Court of the United States, and the university body. The requests took the form of petitions, resolutions and letters which in some cases approached demand.

Keep Up, Individuality of Workers' He Says

MONTREAL.—The individual is the world's biggest problem, Robert B. Wolf, New York engineer and industrialist, declared today in an address on "Management Engineering in the Paper Industry" at the spring meeting of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers.
"In no other period of the world's history has the group spirit found such material expression as in this twentieth-century development of corporate industry," said Wolf, who was a member of the Hoover committee on Elimination of Waste in Industry of the Federal American Engineering Societies.
"In the past men have combined into groups for productive purposes, but never before have we seen such grouping of groups and these larger groups into still larger corporate units and the startling fact is that most of this has taken place within the lifetime of the men who are still in active charge of industry."

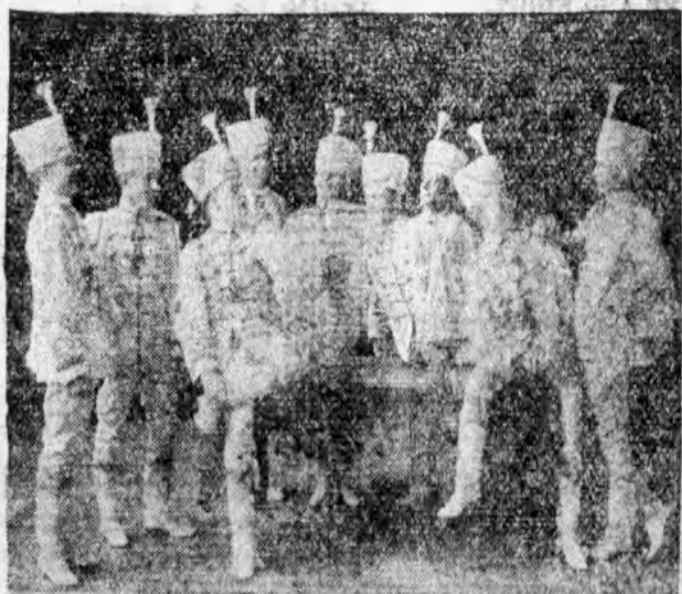

Make Perfume From Odorless Plants Now

PARIS.—Professor Daniel of Rennes appears to have discovered a process which will cause to come true Shakespeare's verse: "A rose by any other name would smell as sweet"

By taking two plants of the same species and grafting one on the other, notably a wormwood on a chrysanthemum, he found that not only the grafted wormwood developed remarkably, but its flowers gave off a perfume much more powerful than that of the original plant. Moreover, the chrysanthemum had given to the wormwood flower something of its own scent. Professor Daniel collected the seeds of the grafted wormwood and the following year obtained from them some very fine plants.

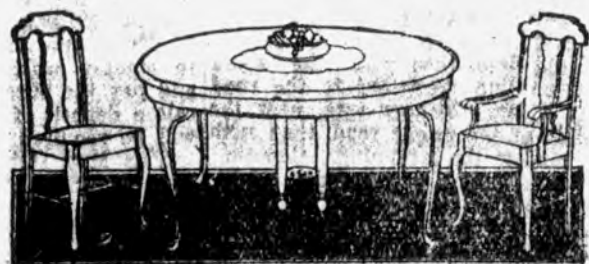
