

With moist climate, suitable lands, early maturity of truck crops and close proximity to large markets Pitt County can be made the Winter garden of the nation, if—holders of large land acreage would divide their tracts into small farms. Concentration of land in the hands of a comparatively small group of persons has proved the greatest barrier to development in many communities. This may be true in this county.

Where new settlers have come into a section and purchased small farms and reserved a part of their capital, in virtually every instance they have succeeded. Here is striking illustration: At Castle Hayne, just outside Wilmington there are 30 farmers owning from 20 to 30 acres each. Last year they sold more than \$200,000 worth of products. Twenty years ago this identical land produced a total YIELD of \$500 worth of crops. One of these farmers owns 20

acres. His gross sales for last season amounted to \$12,000. His net income was \$8,000. He built a handsome home out of his year's crops, lost more than \$2,500 in a bank failure, and still has CASH ON HAND.

Sounds like a stretch of the imagination, but it is true. WHY NOT APPLY THE EXAMPLE IN PITT COUNTY?

Adenoid and Tonsil Clinics to Improve Children's Health

RALEIGH, June 2 — Before the ringing out on crisp autumnal air again call "to books" the state board of health will have contributed through its tonsil and adenoid clinics to the physical betterment of close to 3000 children, thereby enabling them to take the greatest advantage of the state's modern system of schools.

Already definite arrangements have been completed for these clinics to be held in twenty counties during the present year. Other counties are tentatively arranging for this service and the indications are that the demand will be greater than the one hospital unit operated by the board will be able to handle.

Clinics have been held, during the month of May for Chatham county at Pittsboro, for Beaufort county at Belhaven and Washington, for Martin county at Williamston. Another is in process during the present week for Bertie county at Windsor. A total of 447 children have been treated thus far. In addition the board assisted the authorities of Pamlico county in the conduct of a clinic during March at which 200 were treated.

EXETOR, Ont., June 2. — Mrs. Silas Stanlake, her four young children and her brother were burned to death in a fire which destroyed the Stanlake home, at Sodom Lake, three miles from here early today.

Lumbermen Ruin Vast Acres of Virgin Forests Every Year

WASHINGTON.—Nearly one-half of the land area of the United States, or 822,000,000 acres, was originally forested, but today there are less than 470,000,000 acres of timber, including inferior culled and second growth and millions of acres of unproductive land. Of this amount only 138,000,000 acres are of virgin timberland.

"Mining" of timber instead of cultivation of this natural wealth as a crop, is held responsible for depletion of the country's timber resources in a review published in the yearbook of the department of agriculture for 1922. The amount at present being taken out of forests, is estimated four times the replacement by growth. More than 8,000,000 acres were destroyed in a recent year by 38,400 forest fires, and 75 percent of all lumber is still being cut from virgin stands.

While clearing forested land originally was undertaken to aid agriculture, the demands for timber soon outstripped the farm land demands, until now there are millions of cleared acres idle.

New York Bootleggers Happy, Governor Smith Signs Measure Repealing the State Dry Laws

NEW YORK, June 2.—Bootleggers throughout New York are happy today, as result of the action of Gov. Alfred Smith, last night signing the bill repealing the Mullan-Gage state prohibition enforcement law. With a few strokes of the pen the Governor affixed his signature to the legislature's repealing measure adopted some weeks ago.

In announcing his action Smith called for "common sense modification of the Volstead act by congress which would fix alcoholic content of permissible beverages at a point that would make possible the sale of light wines and beer in states that want them."

Telling newspaper men that he had signed the bill, Gov. Smith gave a lengthy statement covering the reasons which prompted his action. In part the statement says:

"U. S. Law Indefinite. "I yield to no man in my reverence and respect to the Constitution of the United States and I advocate nothing which will infringe upon the provisions of the eighteenth amendment."

"It is nevertheless a fact that the definition of an intoxicating beverage contained in the Volstead act is not honest or a common sense one. It is impossible to divert from the public mind the impression that the definition of an intoxicating beverage as containing not more than one-half of one per cent of alcohol was written by the fanatical drys in de-

"BULLET PROOF" PROPHET, 52 FOLLOWERS ARE SLAIN

MANILA, June 2.—Fifty-three fanatical Moros, including Akhara, self-styled "bullet proof" prophet have been killed in a fight with the constabulary on the island of Pata.

No details of the uprising have been received. For some time it is known that Akhara has extolled himself among his tribesmen as being immune from bullets. It is believed that the fanaticism he preached among the Moros incited them to attack the constabulary.

LOS ANGELES, June 2.—Clara Phillips, convicted of slaying Mrs. Albert Medows, with a hammer will become a prisoner in the San Quentin penitentiary today, unless her attorneys obtain from the state supreme court a writ of habeas corpus preventing her incarceration until after she had an opportunity for another trial. She was recaptured in Honduras after her escape from the Los Angeles county jail in early December.

The ability of Greenville to do things has never been at issue. Citizens of the city and county usually get what they go after. It may take a little time to ignite the flame of interest, but once aroused it breaks out into a blazing torch of unrestrained energy and enthusiasm. The way in which the new Country Club was organized and financed is an example that clinches the assertion.

Only a short time back the idea of a Country Club was remote. Indeed, it was hardly an idea—it was merely a cherished dream of a few Greenville men. But all things that count are invariably the result of dreams. The world's greatest inventions and scientific discoveries today are the fruition of the day dreams of such men as Edison, Bell, Morse, Wright Brothers, Marconi, Pasteur and others who were all successively derided when they offered theories that have proved by demonstration of world-wide and indispensable use.

What some men have done on international lines, others are doing for various communities. So it is with the Country Club. The dream of such a recreation and amusement spot was at first reluctantly whispered about to sound out sentiment. It was found responsive. The movement was organized and under determined leadership the amount of money required to finance the project was subscribed within less than one week.

That's a remarkable record of achieve-

ment. Its success carries something more than the realization of the Country Club. It is an incontrovertible truth, that the people of Greenville and this county can do THINGS—DO THEM QUICKLY, in a way that stands for permanence.

In this connection the dreams of some of our folks about the development of our agriculture might appear far below the horizon of possibility. However, looking through the long visioned telescope of logical deduction, the hull of the great ship of faith is just beginning to loom. As the necessity for diversified agriculture becomes absorbed by our farmers just so, are we going to live in the reality of our dreams.

The man who would prophesy today, that within the next decade railroad sidings would be lined with stock pens, and we were shipping large numbers of purebred hogs, baby beeves, poultry and other farm products, besides feeding ourselves, would be called either a dreamer, or perhaps more brutally speaking, a plain NUT.

But it can be done. If the same spirit of organization and leadership gets behind the movement as in the case of the Country Club, our dreams of a greater, more progressive, and richer per capita county will soon be speeding on the way to living truth.

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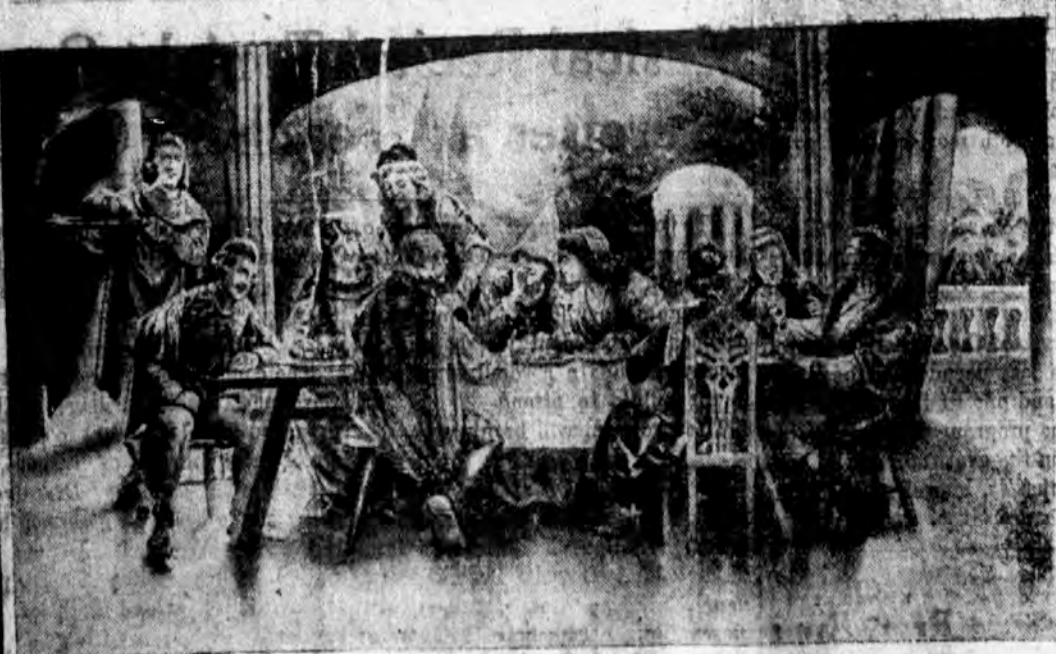

No Fake Stuff Used in Filming of "The Glimpses of the Moon."

Tapestries, antique furniture, rare paintings and other properties used to give Allan Dwan's Paramount picture of Edith Wharton's novel, "The Glimpses of the Moon," a lavish and costly background were valued at \$712,050.00. All of New York's antique shops and art stores were searched for the materials used in making the Vanderlyn palace and Altrincham villa, homes of the idle rich, so that they might appear just as they were described by Mrs. Wharton in her novel.

In producing the screen version of "The Glimpses of the Moon," which will be on view at White's Theatre next Monday, Mr. Dwan carried reality to the last degree. Everything seen on the screen in this picture is real. There is no fake jewelry, no cheap hangings, and no ordinary oil paintings.

Jewelry Worth \$500,000.

The largest item in the property list was \$500,000 for jewelry, which is worn by the various characters appearing in the wedding scene. Among \$45,000 work of oil paintings on display in the gallery of the Altrincham villa is a Van Dyke, Madonna and Child, valued at \$15,000. Silver tea and dinner sets worth \$18,000 were used in the picture as were also \$50,000 worth of rugs. One piece of Bayeux tapestry valued at \$18,000 is shown in one of the scenes.

Among the other costly items on the property list which mounts into hundreds of thousands of dollars, are two crystal chandeliers, a bronze bust of Louis XV, two Venetian mirrors, one Spanish bed, Flemish tapestry, Gothic banners, four Louis XV bergères, two Louis XV arm chairs, valued at \$500 each, one Louis XV commode, one Louis XV sofa worth \$2,000, two upholstered Italian chairs and three pieces of rare Flemish tapestry worth \$2,000 each.

Expert Sees Cheaper Fuel From Lignite

MONTREAL.—Science's quest for a method that will add char to the available fuel supplies of the United States was described at a session of the Fuels Division of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers here recently by O. P. Hood, chief mechanical engineer of the U. S. Bureau of Mines.

"The Bureau of Mines is investigating the possibilities of a program," said Mr. Hood, "which has for its main features an inexpensive carbonizing device, and the use of the lignite char direct, without briquetting."

"Lignite char can best be described in a few words as a fuel rather near in analysis to anthracite coal, but softer, with a little more volatile matter, and thus kindling easier. In size it grades from pea coal to smaller sizes and is a stable product."

OPALS ILL REPUTE BLAMMED WRITER

CHICAGO—Opals have lived down the superstition of bad luck long associated with them and have become today one of the most fashionable and popular of gems, P. J. Coffey, president of the National Jewelers association, said in an address at the annual meeting of the organization here.

"Most people assume that the idea of bad luck attaching to the opal is of immemorial antiquity," said Mr. Coffey. "The fact is it is less than a century old. Sir Walter Scott in one of his last novels, 'Anne of Geierstein,' published in 1829, set the myth going. He introduced into his romance an imaginary opal to which he attributed a mystic malignancy that worked misfortune upon all who wore it. This fiction was the only basis the superstition ever had. But the wide vogue of Sir Walter as a novelist sent the myth broadcast to the ends of the earth. For centuries before his time the opal had been endowed in popular imagination with the beneficent properties of a talisman."

Plan Great Aviation Meeting in October

ST. LOUIS.—A "free-for-all" air race, from all parts of the country with St. Louis as its objective, is on the tentative program of the international air race to be held here October 1-3. The contest would be open to flying craft of all kinds, and the participants will be handicapped as to type and weight of machine, fuel consumed, and distance covered.

The contest is to be called the "On-to-St. Louis" race, and it is hoped to have a number of entries from Canada, should the National Aeronautic association approve.

The tentative program also includes a dirigible race, in which the army, and possibly the navy, would be represented; exhibitions of the helicopter and glider, the radio-controlled plane, the reversible propeller; glider launched from a dirigible; aerial combats and bombing of a dummy fort; and a race between a fast dirigible and an airplane.

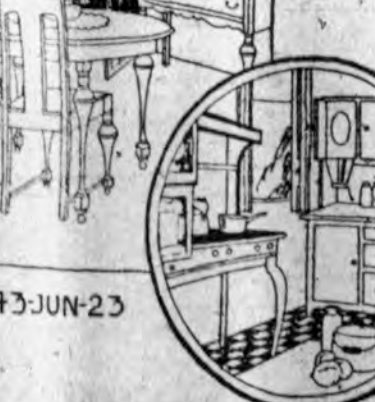
