TOTERS OF LIQUOR
HEAVILY FINED IN
THE LOWER COURTJudge Cooper Hand
Violators of Turlington
Law Just Deserts

This morning was a busy session in County with Judge Cooper presiding and Solicitor Lanier appearing for the state. While several cases had been disposed of up to noon today, there remained still a few yet to be heard this afternoon.

Jesse B. Hill charged with selling and manufacturing liquor upon motion had his case transferred to Superior court.

Loid Pike, being found guilty of having liquor in his possession was assessed \$25. and the cost.

Charles McLawhorn on a charge of enticing tenant had his hearing taken to the upper house of justice.

Thurston Davenport pleaded not guilty of having liquor in his possession, but being found guilty Judge Cooper imposed a fine of \$50.00 and cost.

Lester Brown was fined \$25.00 for simple assault. The charge of carrying concealed weapon was dismissed.

Johnnie Johnson for assault with deadly weapon drew a road sentence for a period of eight months.

Charlie Hopkins had to pay \$25.00 and cost for buying liquor.

Tom Teel for assault was fined \$100.00 and cost. Upon his failure to pay same, he is to spend eight months on the county roads. The charge of abandonment of wife was dismissed.

George Griffin, unfortunately for him faced quite a few charges, all of which were pertaining to liquor. Judge Cooper fined him \$100.00 and cost for possessing a quantity of the fiery water, and as to the other charges, prayer for judgment was continued for a period of two years upon payment of cost and his providing good behavior.

L. J. Merritt was another to receive a fine of \$25.00 for having liquor in his possession.

Devoted Guard Keeps
Channel Light Burning

LONDON.—Bishop's Light, rising from a foundation of jagged rock near the Scilly Islands, welcomes eastbound liners to the English channel, and at the same time gives grim warning of the nearby labyrinth of dangers. It stands guard over waters where rest the skeletons of more shipwrecks than in any other marine graveyard of the world.

The light is 160 feet above the sea level, yet the waves that break forever at the base of the rock constantly dash over its topmost masonry. So trying is the service at Bishop's Light that the three tenders are given frequent vacations ashore. Two months of duty with one month ashore is the rule.

Borneo May Produce Rubber.

MANILA, P. I.,—British North Borneo has hundreds of thousands of acres suitable for the growing of rubber, according to Sir William Ryeoff, governor of that territory, who is in Manila for a short visit. He said the Japanese have large concessions at Tawao on the east coast of Borneo, where they have 20,000 acres planted to rubber.

Rigid Enforcement of
Liquor Regulations Be
Attempted by the U. S.

WASHINGTON, June 4.—Application to the letter of the Supreme Court's decision barring all beverage liquors from the territorial waters of the United States is provided in regulations issued by the Treasury to take effect after 12.01 a. m., June 10. Specifically the regulations apply the three mile limit as a dead line to liquor carried for beverage use on any United States or foreign vessel or as sea stores. It was by finding some means of exemption for liquor carried in the latter case that treasury officials had hoped at first to avoid conflict with foreign laws.

According to treasury officials, the only hope of alleviating a situation which most agree will be embarrassing to international commerce, is in remedial legislation from the next Congress.

FOUR PASSENGERS OF FORD
CAR ARE INJURED WHEN HIT
BY PASSENGER TRAIN TODAY

A Ford touring car, containing four passengers, H. O. Warren, Miller Warren, Miss Lillie Warren and Mrs. J. F. Latham, was struck by Norfolk-Southern passenger train number 17 at a crossing about one mile from Washington early this morning and completely demolished. The occupants, all of whom were injured, were immediately taken to Washington hospital where it was found that Mr. H. O. Warren and Mrs. Latham were suffering of serious injuries, and that the other two members had sustained bruises and abrasions of a minor nature.

Each member of the automobile party were residents of Chocowinity and they were en route to Washington. The approaching train was not seen or heard until the car had stalled in the center of the track, according to a statement of one of the injured, and then it was too late to avoid the accident.

Late information from the hospital was to the effect that all of the injured were doing as well as could be expected.

The train was in charge of conductor Tooley and engineer Basnight, both of whom are well known in Greenville, having served in this respective positions with the railroad for a long time. After carrying the injured party back to Washington the train continued its run to Raleigh.

IS HARDING WEAKENING

Having failed to persuade President Hard-
ing to abandon his advocacy of American
partnership in the international court, "ir-
reconcilable" republican senators have begun
an organized campaign to frighten him into
silence by representing his proposal as the
chief obstacle to republican solidarity and
success in the next national campaign. Both
Senators Moses and Borah, have publicly
sounded the keynote of the "irreconcilables"
crusade against the president.

There is evidence, neutral spectators of the
republican row believe, that the "irreconcil-
ables" have made some little headway with
their plan of intimidating Harding. Follow-
ing the announcement that Senator Borah,
would address a republican meeting in St.
Louis, the first city in which the president is
scheduled to speak on his swing around the
circle, and immediately after Senator Moses
proclaimed war against the international
court, word came from the White House that
the number of speeches to be delivered on the
presidential tour had been greatly reduced,
and that Harding had changed his itinerary
on the homeward trip and would return to
Washington by way of the Panama canal, in-
stead of across the continent as originally
planned.

From the White House also comes the semi-
official information that the president has
given some sort of assurance to some one
that he will discuss the international world
court proposal, once or twice, possible thrice,
in the course of his trip, and then only to
make his position quite clear to the country,
that "controversial subjects" will be avoided,
and that the whole question will be "left to
the people."

It is plain that the hope of the "irreconcil-
ables" is to force Harding into further con-
cessions. Borah has made a direct appeal
to radical groups, seeking to turn against the
president some of the voters whose prejudice
Harding captured and later capitalized in
1920. Borah merely uttered a challenge that
the "irreconcilables" mean to repeat through-
out their campaign.

GLEISTENING MARBEL
CROSS MARKS SITE
OF HISTORIC MEETING

BENNINGTON.—Ground has been
broken here for the erection of a
memorial monument to mark the site
of the first meeting house in the
Hampshire Grants, now the state of
Vermont, which was intimately as-
sociated with the battles of Ticond-
eroga and Bennington in the Revolu-
tionary War and with the early his-
tory of the state. The monument,
which is the gift of Mrs. Elinor Spul-
er of New York to the Bennington
Battle Monument and Historical So-
ciety, will be dedicated on July 8.
In the centre of a Maltese cross
42 feet in diameter formed by embed-
ding 1,220 marble slabs in the turf
will rise a shrine of Vermont grey
marble 12 feet high and six feet
wide. On this will be placed an in-
scription telling the history of the
site and a low relief of the meeting
house and the other having a repro-
duction of the great seal of the state.
The inscription prepared for the
monument recites the erection of the
meeting house, "a plain building of
unpainted wood," in 1763-65 and
deals with the stirring events of col-
onial days as follows:
"Here the forefathers met in pray-
er for assistance against the oppres-
sive measures of New York and the
overwhelming power of King George.
Hither the settlers returned from the
capture to Ticonderoga, the battle of
Bennington and the surrender of
Burgoyne to offer their thanksgivings
and here were brought the 700 pris-
oners captured on August 16, 1777."

ST. LOUIS.—Administrative prob-
lems and the best way to introduce
a standard code of ethics among busi-
ness and professional men through-
out the world will focus the attention
of ten thousand delegates, to the
fourteenth annual convention of the
Rotary International, which opens on
June 18.
The number of Rotary clubs in the
world has almost doubled within the
last five years, and there are now
more than fourteen hundred club uni-
ts, divided into 39 districts in cities
of the United States, Canada, Mexi-
co, Denmark, Uruguay, Spain, Pan-
ama and Argentina, with one inter-
national organization in the British
Isles, Australia and South Africa.
Probably the most interesting busi-
ness to come before the convention
will be the discussion of the propo-
sition that Rotary clubs concentrate
their energies for a year in develop-
ment of programs that will have for
an object the introduction of stand-
ard codes of ethics practices among
business and professional men in all
business or professions represented
in Rotary.

Pay Heavy Toll

NEW YORK.—The causes for the
airplane accidents of 1922, and re-
commendations for the reduction of
future accident to a minimum, are
found in the annual report of the
Aeronautical Chamber of Commerce
of America to Secretary of Commerce
The chamber says the government
must provide air law and exercise
jurisdiction over all civil flying if ca-
sualties are to be reduced. The re-
port indicates that most of the 1922
accident were due to the itinerant
pilot who has no fixed base, is un-
licensed and unregulated by law, and
therefore has no presumptive respon-
sibility.
"Of approximately 1,200 civilian
airplanes in operation in the United
States in 1922," says the report, "be-
tween 550 and 600 were owned
among 130 established operators, that
is, individuals and organizations with
fixed bases and conservative business
policies; an equal number were dis-
tributed among itinerant pilots who
have no particular system and de-
pend for a living upon stunting,
tours, and extra hazardous assign-
ments."

Comfort, Keynote New Cotton Change

NEW YORK.—The latest thing in arenas will be thrown open about July 5 when the New York Cotton Exchange dedicates its new \$5,000,000 skyscraper home down on Hanover Square, amid the financial warrens of lower Manhattan.

Away up on top of the exchange, beneath vaulted domes and delicately tinted mosaics, will be a place for the bulls and bears to romp and roar in private pandemonium—the cotton trading pit. Just under the sky it will be, with broad, high windows overlooking the four quarters of the globe whence come the cotton and the gold in which they deal.

The new exchange adjoins the old one, on the little triangular park fronted by one and two-story buildings behind antique lamp posts, where traders still conduct the commercial enterprises on which their forebears embarked when New York began to be talked of as a coming mart of commerce.

Night Flying May Soon Be Popular

CHICAGO.—Night flying by aviator has been brought squarely before the public by the great non-stop flight across the continent by Lieutenant MacReady and Kelley and through this demonstration of its feasibility, general night flying and the delivery of mail during the night may become an accomplished fact before the end of the summer, according to I. J. O'Malley, of Chicago, in a recent address before the Chicago Aviation club.

"A great part of the plans for this epoch-making achievement in aviation now rests with the public utility lighting companies or the cities themselves," said Mr. O'Malley. "Guide or beacon lights are necessary for night flying particularly when stops are to be made for delivery of mail or passengers. A great start has been made in this respect, as well as in the construction of landing fields, and probably more work will be done in this direction during the coming summer."

"The United States Aerial Mail has developed a plan for flying night mail which seems thoroughly practicable, once the various cities over which the night mail passes agree to maintain the necessary lighting system and emergency landing fields."

London Swindlers Thrive on Victims

LONDON.—Swindling has taken the place of violence as the most prevalent type of crime, says Sir Leonard Dunning, Inspector of Constabulary to England.

"Times of violence have steadily decreased for years," says Sir Leonard in a spot, "Modern crime is civilized and educated because the criminal of today knows that it is far safer and more profitable to swindle hundreds than to ob one by knocking him in the head."

It has been stated that there are hundreds of professional criminals in England whom the police are powerless to arrest. Many of these people derive very large incomes by trading upon the credulity of a certain section of wealthy people. In the vast majority of cases the criminals are never prosecuted either because of the difficulty of proving the fraud against them or because the people victimized do not want publicity.
