SHRINERS MEET IN NATIONAL CAPITAL FOR GREAT WEEK

Imperial Council Will Open Session During Today

WASHINGTON, June 5.—The national capital became today the playground of Nobles of the Mystic Shrine. Crowds already on hand for the annual convention of the Imperial Council, which will begin formally tomorrow, were augmented hourly by new arrivals from North, South, East and West, from Canada and even from such far away places as Hawaii and Panama.

All day and far into the night Pennsylvania Avenue was a confusion of noise and color as each arriving delegation marched to its headquarters behind the bands. Washington weather greeted the visitors and the marchers found that the wide expanse of asphalt on the famous thoroughfare gave back a heat akin to that of the "burning sands" of a desert.

The day's arrival included the automobile caravan from California. There were some 500 cars in line, but there remained only a few of those that started from the Golden Gate a month ago. Western mud had halted many of the original starters, but as they came east the Californians were joined by Nobles from many points in the Middle West. Pennsylvania Avenue was a mecca for many of the Shrine hosts during the day, but for many more it was a day of sight-seeing, with corridors of public buildings crowded. President Harding, himself a Noble, had the entire first floor of the White House thrown open to the Shriner and the executive officers, lobbies and the famous Green and Red rooms were overrun during most of the day.

Beginning with that of Imperial Potentate James McCandless, of Honolulu, early in the day, there were many pilgrimages to Mount Vernon. The Imperial Potentate and his divan were welcomed by Gov. Trinkle of Virginia, and his staff, and after a formal exchange of greetings, the Shriner laid a wreath on Washington's tomb.

Incident to the gathering of the Shriner, President Harding dedicated the "Zero Milestone" south of the White House and a reproduction of the boyhood home of John Howard Payne, author of "Home, Sweet Home," which has been erected in Sherman Square, near the Executive grounds, in connection with "Better Homes Week."

Other attractions for the visitors included a motorboat parade on the Potomac, a concert at American League Park by the band of Syrian Temple, Cincinnati, and a "wild west" show.

The first formal function in connection with the convention was a banquet and reception given tonight by Almas Temple, of this city, to Imperial Potentate McCandless and his divan.

Five Killed and Forty Injured When Train Is Derailed

DURAND, Mich., June 5.—Five persons were killed and about forty other members of the local order of Knights of Pythias were injured today when a special train on the Grand Trunk line was derailed two miles west of here.

British Trade Unions Now Face Hard Times

LONDON.—Trade Unionism is passing through anxious times. The membership during the last two years has decreased more than 1,500,000 and the accumulated funds, which had reached nearly \$300,000,000 have been exhausted by the heavy drain of unemployed benefits.

The general council of the Trade Union congress is planning a "Back to the Union" campaign in an endeavor to make up the loss in membership. The statement of the council is that there are 15,500,000 wage earners in Great Britain, of whom only 500,000 are members of trade unions.

MEMBERS COUNTRY CLUB MEET TONIGHT

NORTH CAROLINA IS FIRST IN VALUE IN TOBACCO GROWING

WASHINGTON.—A comprehensive picture of the American two-million-acre, half-billion-dollar tobacco industry is contained in the 1922 yearbook of the department of agriculture which has just come from the press.

Although the tobacco crop covers only about one-half of one percent of the acreage devoted to all crops in this country it has a high value to the acre and requires a great deal of labor both in the growing and manufacture. Most of the crop is grown in a few states, Kentucky, North Carolina and Virginia being the leaders, but some tobacco is grown in 42 states. The three named produce nearly two-thirds of the output, while Kentucky alone produces at a third of the total.

In 1919, the latest year in which the figures are complete, tobacco was grown on nearly 450,000 farms. North Carolina stood first in value of the crop, Lancaster county, Pennsylvania, was the leading county in acreage and production, and Hartford county, Connecticut, was second. There were 10,291 tobacco manufacturing establishments employing 183,000 persons. The internal revenue from tobacco amounted to nearly \$300,000,000 yearly.

Cotton Showing Great Deterioration

WASHINGTON, D. C.—June 5.—Cotton is showing deterioration in eastern section with considerable replanting necessary and growth has been retarded by rains and cool weather over large areas the department of agriculture said in a monthly crop review. Peaches are showing improvement while apples have good promise though dropping heavily in Atlantic Coast orchards. The outlook for fruits is generally good. Shortage of farm labor continues.

50,000 Elks to Meet In Atlanta, July 9th

ATLANTA.—Not less than fifty thousand Elks from all parts of America are expected to be present at the annual convention of the grand lodge of the order which meets in Atlanta July 9 to 16. The gathering will assemble delegations from Maine to Hawaii with present indications pointing to representation from a large majority of the 1,000 lodges in the country.

This is the first time that a convention of the grand lodge of Elks has ever been held in the Southeast and the first time in ten years that the order has come south.

VIOLATORS OF NEW LIQUOR LAWS ARE SENT TO THE ROAD

Alfred Tripp Defendant Before Judge Cooper In County Court

Yesterday afternoon's session of the county court was fully as busy as the forenoon meet, and probably contained some cases in which the general public are more interested as to learning the outcome. Violators of the Turlington liquor act again featured, in fact nearly every case was pertaining to some violation of the recently enacted law.

Claude Mayo was adjudged not guilty of carrying a concealed weapon.

Possibly one of the most important hearings of the afternoon was the case of Alfred Tripp, a white man of the county, who was being tried under an indictment of receiving, transporting and having in his possession liquor. This same defendant has faced the same court at a very recent date for practically the same offense. Judge Cooper yesterday sentenced Tripp to four months on the county roads. The defendant is allowed to give a bond of five hundred dollars for his appearance in court on the fourth Monday in October to begin serving his sentence. This being allowed him because of his growing crop.

Herman Evans was found guilty of possessing liquor and fined \$25.00 and cost notwithstanding his plea of not guilty.

John Best was assessed a fine of \$50.00 for carrying a concealed weapon. He was also forced to pay the prosecuting witness the sum of \$25.

N. E. Garriss appealed to the Superior Court after being fined \$25 on a charge of cruelty to animals.

W. W. Cuthrell pleaded not guilty of assault with automobile. Judgment of the court was that the case was malicious and frivolous, and it is ordered that the witness Stanley Moore pay cost of action.

Lee Hardee who proved to be another violator of a portion of the new liquor laws was given his preference of six months on the county roads or leave the county for a period of two years. He was given two days in which to take his leave. He appealed to Superior Court on being charged with the cost for vagrancy.

Preacher Is Killed In Yard of Home In Big Shooting Affray

RICHMOND, Va., June 5.—Rev. E. L. Pierce, pastor of four Baptist churches in Cumberland county this state is dead and R. O. Garrett, county clerk is in a serious condition in a hospital of this city as result of a shooting affray in the yard of the dead ministers home at Cumberland Court House. Soon after the arrival here of Garrett and his brother local police were requested by deputy sheriff Smith of Cumberland to arrest both brothers on a charge of shooting and killing Pierce. Just what caused the shooting could not be learned here.

Speaker's Training Rules Bans Smokes

CLEVELAND.—A rigid training rule laid down by Tris Speaker, manager of the Cleveland Indians, prohibits players from smoking cigarettes or drinking anything stronger than one-half of one percent. The veteran manager-star believes physical fitness offsets minor playing defects. He expects his men to be the stumbling block of all 1923 pennant aspirants.

The Cleveland outfield, with Speaker in center, Summa in right and Jamieson in left, is at least on a parity with any in the league. In the opinion of Speaker, he regards Summa as the greatest outfielder found by a major league club since Ty Cobb marched out of Georgia to fame in the baseball pennant wars. In Jamieson he has the "triple-threat" excellent fielder, heavy hitter and ideal lead-off man.

NEGRO IS KILLED BY DINKY TRAIN

Gus Williams, a negro in the employ of the Construction Company this morning while jumping from a dinky train loaded with material, received injuries which resulted in his death a short time after the accident.

Ferrall Jackson had charge of the train, and when it reached Whitehurst store about four miles from Greenville, Williams jumped off to buy something in the store. In some unexplainable way his foot caught throwing him to the ground. The train which was heavily loaded struck him and he died a short while later.

A coroner's inquest was held and returned a verdict that the negro died from injuries received from his own carelessness.

ONE WHISKEY CASE IS GIVEN HEARING CITY COURT TODAY

Lee Hardee Placed Under Bond for Violating Liquor Laws

Willie Barber, Flossie Sellers, charged with disorderly conduct. Flossie Sellers paid fine of \$10 and one half cost and Willie Barber paid fine of \$20.00 and one half costs.

Sherman Williams, Linnie Branch, charged with disorderly conduct. Fined each \$10.00 and one half costs.

W. C. Fay, charged with turning wagon around in middle of business block. Paid cost.

Lee Hardee, charged with vagrancy. Sentenced 30 days on county roads. Appealed to County court.

Lee Hardee, charged with receiving, possessing and transporting intoxicating liquors. Bound over to county court under \$500 bond.

JAP BUSINESS MEN WANT RUSSIA TRADE

TOKIO.—Business and professional men of Japan who have been badly hit by the failure of Japan and Russia to negotiate a commercial treaty have started movements to secure another conference between representatives of the two countries. The Associated Chambers of Commerce have passed resolutions urging the resumption of relations with Russia, and, beside expressing their own government, propose sending a delegation to Moscow to carry on unofficial negotiations with the Soviet.

A plan has been formulated by a body of prominent business men, scholars, politicians and others to organize a large party to travel through Russia and observe political, economical and social conditions obtaining in that country.

Meanwhile, relations between the two countries have not been improved by some recent incidents. The latest is the refusal of the Soviet to allow the Japanese consul at Vladivostok to send a cable to his government in code. This step was taken because of the refusal of the Japanese government to allow Adolf Joffe, the Soviet delegate to send code messages to his government during his visit to Japan.

Flying Boat Weighs 9 Tons.

SOUTHAMPTON.—The new flying boat "Valencia" has a span of 112 feet, is fitted with two 650 horsepower engines, weighs 9 tons in flying trim, and has an estimated speed of 110 miles an hour.

COUNTY COMMISSIONERS VOTE TO PLACE TRAFFIC OFFICERS ON HARD SURFACED ROADS

There were several important matters before the County Commissioners in session here yesterday, and as consequence it was late in the afternoon before adjournment was taken.

It was the unanimous decision of the Board to place on the hard surfaced roads of the county traffic officers with the authority to arrest all parties exceeding the State law limit of thirty miles per hour. For the time being such officers will be under the direction of J. B. Harding, general county superintendent of the work now in progress on the various highways. It is understood that these additions will be made at once, and as the roads are completed other officers will be chosen. For such services salaries will be paid rather than commission which is being practiced by some counties.

Another important matter discussed yesterday, and finally passed was paving of the approximately two miles of road yet left open leading into Falkland. Just when the work on this stretch will begin has not yet been learned.

The commissioners also considered the price being paid for the capture of whiskey stills. Decision of the board was, that from this date all captors of liquor manufacturers will be paid the sum of \$5.00, and where the operator or operators are also taken then the officer is to receive the former price of \$20.00.

CAPACITY CROWD GREETED ARBUCKLE

CHICAGO, Ill., June 5.—Fatty Arbuckle former motion picture comedian appeared publicly here last night for first time since his trial on charge of manslaughter in connection with the death of Virginia Rappe. He was given an enthusiastic reception by a capacity crowd at the summer garden at which he has an indefinite engagement.

Two Pactolus Men Probably Champions In Landing Big Chubs

Messrs. Paul Davenport and Cecil Satterwhaite, of Pactolus are crowding today because of their catch on yesterday while casting in Perkins Mill Pond, a body of water near that little town. Their friends believe them to be the champion black water fishermen of this part of the State. Soon after reaching their point of sport Mr. Satterwhaite hung a chub that gave him the biggest fight of his life. After a long time the fish was reeled in and safely landed. He tipped the scales at nine pounds. Determined not to be outdone Mr. Davenport was soon pulling in what he thought would prove even larger than the catch of his mate, but when placed on the scales the fish fell quarter of a pound lighter. Besides landing these two monsters of the water the fishermen pulled in several others which were smaller.

Poultry Asso. to Meet Thursday

The Pitt County Poultry association will have their regular monthly meeting in the Chamber of Commerce rooms Thursday afternoon, June 7th, at 3:30.

These monthly meetings will increase in interest and beneficial results from time to time. As a matter of fact they are monthly schools for the study of the poultry industry.

Unquestionably there is a great awakening along this important line. Plans are being laid for considerable enlargement. Financial returns from this industry can easily run into the millions during the next ten years.

To Erect Shrine In Memory Mary Twain

FLORIDA, Mo.—The plan to establish a Mark Twain Memorial Park here, where the humorist was born, has met with an encouraging response, according to officers of the Mark Twain State Memorial Park association, which is fostering the movement.

The executive committee has set August as "Mark Twain month," and the first week in September as "Mark Twain week." All lovers of the famous humorist should read at least one of his books in August, the committee declared, and heads of schools will be asked to have some sort of memorial program on one day in "Mark Twain week."

HUMAN SACRIFICE STILL PRACTICED

SALISBURY, Southern Rhodesia, June 5.—That human sacrifice still is practiced in some parts of the world was shown recently when six members of the local tribe were sentenced to death for burning a live man named Mandusa in order to appease the rain goddess. Rhodesia had been suffering from a severe drought and some of the native tribes ascribed it to wrath of a goddess who they believed had been violated. Inquiries led the tribal chief to believe that his son was guilty of having attacked the goddess and there upon ordered his incineration. Rain fell soon after Mandusa was burned alive.

Motorman Escapes From Angry Mob

NEW YORK, June 5.—A lone policeman with a drawn pistol held back several hundred persons in order to enable William Mooney surface car motorman to flee from an upper east side crowd which had stoned his car after it had killed a baby and its mother. Though Mooney's carelessness was responsible, Mooney escaped through one of the broken windows and sought refuge in a car barn two blocks away.

India Protests Against Duty on Automobiles

CALCUTTA.—The imposition of a thirty percent import duty on motor vehicles coming into British India has brought out a vigorous protest from the India Motor Trade association.

The argument is advanced that an enormous class, in urgent need of modern transportation, has been precluded from buying, and that the lower priced American cars are not meeting the situation. Motor imports were lower in 1922 than in 1914, 1915 and 1916.

The development of road transport is of special importance in a country with limited railroads, the association says, and India will suffer serious consequences if this restriction upon the industrial development of the country is not removed.

Golf Becoming Great Sport in Canada Now

OTTAWA.—Golf is rapidly becoming the national game of Canada. A report compiled by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics shows that on May 1, 292 golf clubs were flourishing representing an outlay in property and equipment of nearly \$10,000,000.

The unusual popularity of the game is illustrated by figures which show that in 1916 there were only 76 golf courses in the Dominion. Last year there were 218, so that the increase since first of the year has been 74.

It is also interesting to note that 81 of the courses are 18-hole layouts, while 211 are nine-hole links.

COURT DECLARES BAN ON FOREIGN LANGUAGES VOID

Encroachment Upon the Rights Conferred by 14th Amendment

WASHINGTON, June 5.—State statutes which would prohibit the teaching or use of foreign language in all schools below the eighth grade were declared void by the Supreme Court today as an unlawful encroachment upon the rights conferred by the Fourteenth Amendment which provides that "no state . . . shall deprive any person of life, liberty or property without due process of law." Justice Holmes delivered a dissenting opinion in which Justice Sutherland joined.

The question was presented to the court in cases coming from Iowa, Nebraska and Ohio. Eighteen other states, with similar statutes, participated.

Justice McReynolds, who delivered the majority opinion, asserted "that the Fourteenth Amendment without doubt denotes not merely freedom from bodily restraint, but also the right of the individual to contract to engage in any of the common occupations of life, to acquire useful knowledge, to marry and establish a home and bring up children, to worship God according to the dictates of his own conscience, and generally to enjoy those privileges long recognized at common law as essential to the orderly pursuits of happiness by free men."

This liberty, the court added, cannot be interfered with under the guise of protecting the public interests by legislative action which is arbitrary or without reasonable relation to some purpose within the competency of the state to effect. Final determination of what constitutes proper exercise of police power is with the courts. Justice McReynolds asserted, and does not rest with the legislatures of the states.

While the Americans the court pointed out, have always regarded education and knowledge as matters of supreme importance which should be diligently promoted, and while it is the right and natural duty of the parent to give his children education many states have attempted to enforce the obligation by compulsory laws.

"That the state," Justice McReynolds declared, "may do much, go very far indeed, in order to improve the quality of its citizens, physically, mentally and morally, is clear, but the individual has certain fundamental rights which must be respected,

JUDGE GRADY VISITS CAPITAL FOR WEEK-END

New Bern, June 5.—Judge Henry A. Grady of Clinton, who apparently was thought to be hiding in Washington, D. C., during the past week-end put in his appearance here this morning to convene court, coming from Washington, where he had been since Friday morning. He was in Washington all right, he said, and his name is on the register at the New Willard Hotel.

"I left Greenville last Thursday, May 31," Judge Grady said this morning, "and took lunch in Wilson with my friend David M. Willford, who very kindly carried me over in his car. I spent Thursday night at the Richmond Hotel at Richmond, Va., and went on to Washington the following morning. I registered at the New Willard Hotel upon my arrival and was given room 831 in which I slept Friday and Saturday nights. On Saturday I took lunch at the Metropolitan Club and came to New Bern this morning, having left Washington, D. C., at 9:30 last night."

A CAMPAIGN FOR BETTER HOMES

To a public dulled with so many "weeks," most of which have been designed by professional uplifters, "Better Homes Week," which started yesterday, will come as a relief on account of its personal interest. The restlessness which has been so characteristic of the American people has never been conducive to a deep-seated appreciation of "home" such as exists in England and France. Americans, despite their affection for sentimental songs about the sweetness of home have rarely been attached even to a locality as have the Germans. "Home" has too often been but a temporary lodging place, abandoned without ceremony and usually without regret.

It is with a full knowledge of this fact that the "Better Homes in America Campaign" was started two years ago. The founders of the movement realized that, although there had been a great improvement in houses during the last twenty years, too many persons failed to distinguish between a house and a home. Many a family had bought or perhaps built a small house, but they seemed unable to throw off the feeling of transiency, and were at a loss to know how to give their new shelter that quality of permanency and used comfort which is such an essential in any real home. To help these people experts were called into consultation with the hope

that by obtaining the advice of architects, decorators, home economists and others it would be possible to put before them models which would be something more than good architectural samples.

These competent experts made a study of the American home in all its aspects. For their architecture they went back to the best early American examples—houses that had been built generations ago and had survived as homes. So also for the interiors they turned to what was best in the old, and adapted it to modern needs. Not content with approaching only these external aspects, they also gave thorough study to the economics of the home; the best labor-saving devices; the coolest kitchen arrangements; the best health precautions. They also went into the matter of budgets and of home cooking. They even went so far as to consider home music, and to embark upon the perilous procedure of suggesting a model home library, listing the books by tens and twenties so that they might be bought as circumstances permitted. With this list most book lovers will probably quarrel, objecting primarily to the order, but inasmuch as no two men will ever agree on the order of five books, the list should be accepted as a proposed guide rather than as a standard model. —N. Y. T.

TRAINED TEACHERS

With the closing of the Eastern Carolina Teachers College, today, there goes out from the school one hundred and seven trained teachers for the public schools of North Carolina. The value of a single one cannot be estimated in dollars and cents, as their influence in a community will mean more than any material possession. Education in this state is on the track to greater things and with this out going class to be added to the already efficient corps of teachers the educational outlook is indeed bright.

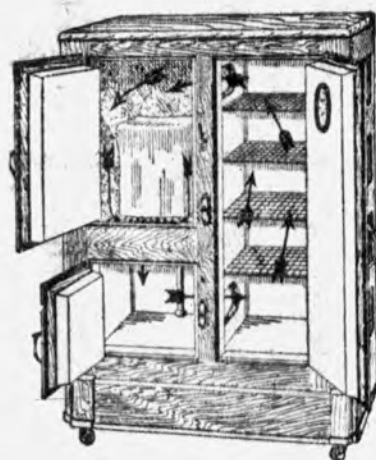

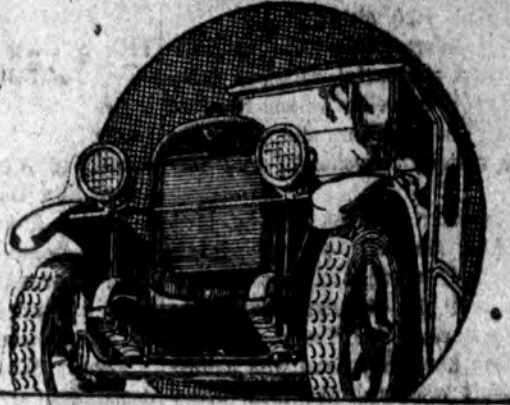

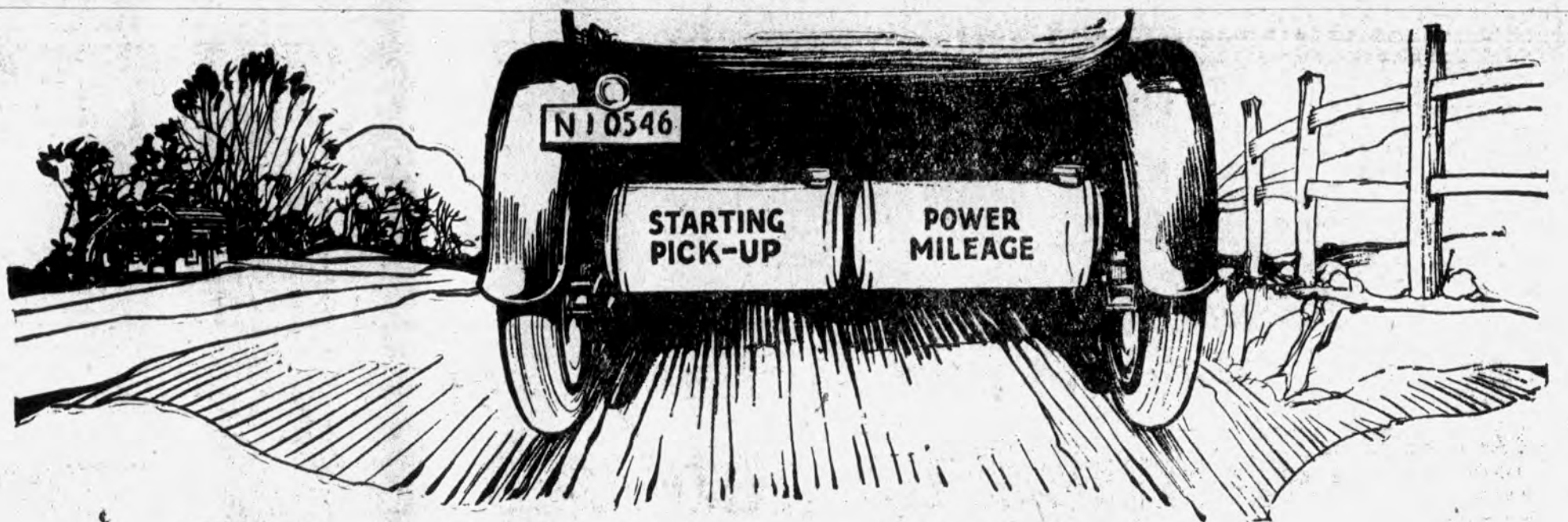
