Country Club Opens Here Tomorrow Odd Fellows Honor Grand Master Currin

S. B. CURRIN LAUDED BY ASSOCIATES AT BANQUET LAST NIGHT

Men High in Fraternal Order Pay Tribute Greenville Man

Devotion and unrestrained fidelity of Sam B. Currin, Greenville, to the organization of Odd Fellows and what it represents was paid to him by the leading dignitaries of the order at banquet given last night in his honor at the Wayside Tea Room. The testimonial was given by Covenant lodge of Greenville of which he is an active member and leader. In recognition of his elevation to the exalted position of grand master, of the organization—the highest honor that can be conferred by the order in the state.

Ranking members of the organization from various sections of the state were there to pay homage and tribute to their brother member as an Odd Fellows and citizens.

F. C. Harding Speaks.

Toastmaster W. H. Woolard and Hon. F. C. Harding extended appropriate welcome to his visiting members of the organization. Mr. Harding paid an eloquent tribute to the principles for which organization stood for and maintained. He emphasized the power and influence of fraternalism as the underlying foundation of higher ideals and thought of life. Mr. Harding particularly brought out that the local lodge had no reason to feel and boast a greater satisfaction than having Mr. Currin as a member than the state organization should feel in having him as its head. Harding's speech was punctuated with humor and a world of truisms that were enjoyed and roundly applauded.

Mayor D. M. Clark, a guest, made a happy talk in which he recounted the inestimable value of fraternalism and its active power in the every day life of humanity. He stressed the code of fellowship as practiced by the organization as an example to better living and spreading the influence of better understanding throughout our social and business life.

Currin's Work Praised.

A magnificent tribute to the worth and charter of Currin was made by W. H. Overton, Durham, past grand master, in which he recited the work of Currin in spending the best years of his life in bringing to public attention the doctrines and teaching of Odd Fellowship throughout the state. The future objective of the organization was told by J. D. Berry, Raleigh, grand secretary, who made the prediction that more than 5,000 new members would be enrolled during the next year. This optimistic outlook for the order was confirmed by S. L. Whitmore, Greensboro, deputy grand master for the western section of the state, who declared that the prospects for the constant increase in membership was never brighter.

Predicts Leadership.

M. L. Shipman, grand treasurer, spoke at length, on the spirit of friendship, truth and love upon which the organization was founded, and expressed the view that North Carolina would show within the next 12 months the largest gain in membership of any state in the Union, for the reason, as he said, it had the biggest leaders.

In the opinion of E. A. Womble, Raleigh, district supervisor, the lodge was entering upon the greatest expansion in its history. This he explained, was true, because within the state was to be found the element that underlies all success co-operation and unity of purpose. Dr. T. H. Flemmons, also paid a splendid eulogy to Mr. Currin, and Hon. Julius Brown, spoke along the same lines.

BROOKLYN MAN IS NEW SHRINERS HEAD

WASHINGTON, June 6.—Conrad V. Dykeman, Brooklyn, N. Y., was elevated to the position of Imperial Potentate of Ancient Arabic Order Nobles of the Mystic Shrine today.

President and Mrs. Harding again opened wide the door of the white house to visiting shriners, thousands of whom were shown through the famous parlors of the mansion, while at the executive officers delegations from dozens of temples were received by the chief executive.

The army and navy exhibits, rowing and swimming meets and concerts by the score are among the variety of events on the entertainment program.

Kansas City was selected for the 1124 meeting of the shrine.

It is computed that all the houses in New York and London could be built out of the lava thrown out by Vesuvius since the first recorded eruption.

When Mr. Currin rose to speak, he declared that he was fully aware of the importance of his office, and was determined to carry out the program before him to the best of his ability. He emphasized that the deficit against the Orphans Home, at Goldsboro, would be discharged before the next meeting of the order in Raleigh next May. Currin declared he considered the work an honor and privilege and to sense a sacrifice.

At the conclusion of the banquet Mr. Currin was presented with a crimson pillow cover bearing the emblem of the organization. The presentation speech was made by Mr. Harding.

DR. R. H. WRIGHT IN BRILLIANT ADDRESS REVIEWS HISTORY AND GROWTH OF TEACHERS COLLEGE

In an address that literally sparked with brilliance and facts Dr. Robert H. Wright President of the East Carolina Teachers College delivered the principal talk at the 14th annual commencement exercises of the institution. Aside from the address of Dr. Wright, the program included: Processional Hymn—All, Hail the Power of Jesus; prayer by the Rev. W. S. Harden; Chorus, the Glory of God in Nature; piano solo. The Mountain; Mabel Thomas; chorus, Swedish Peasants Wedding March. These musical numbers were followed by the presentation of diplomas, bibles and degrees. Dr. Wright also unveiled and made the presentation speech of a life size portrait of Hon. James Fleming, who offered the bill in the general assembly establishing the college. The painting was given to the college by the Sidney Lanier, literary society, together with private donations. May R. B. Muffy, was director of chorus.

The text of Dr. Wright's address follows:

When I think what this generation of men and women has done for the childhood of the world, when I see what we are leaving as an inheritance for our children, when I think what a muddle we have made of the world, when I see the task these children must undertake, I can scarcely look a little child in the face without hanging my head in shame. We are crying for peace and constantly sowing the seed of war. The god of hate rules the nations of the world and he is clothed in the armor Mars. The God of Love only can save us from another great world catastrophe. In the United States 61 to 85 per cent of all our taxes are paid for wars, past and future, and not over 2 per

cent for education. We pay at least 31 times as much tribute to the god of hate as we pay to the God of Love. But less than 2 per cent of just men industrial plants in the Piedmont section, and so 2 per cent will leave us. We are beginning to see, beginning to question what we are doing, and that fact alone will save us.

Influence of Training.

Stop for a minute and see what is going on. What does the German child hear around the fireside? Does it lead toward peace or war? Is it love or hate? As he is trained, so he will be. All he hears makes him hate the rest of the world. The same is true in France, Russia, the Balkan states, the Near East and in a less degree in England. The children of today will be the men and women of affairs tomorrow. Our children must settle with these. If America does not stop playing politics and carry love into Europe, then our children will pay dearly for what we do. It is a terrific task we are leaving and through our state to serve our nation, and through our nation to be of some service to the world.

Ignorance and superstition are a nation's most expensive luxuries. We are here to remove this luxury tax. Realizing that opportunities are only judgments to the unprepared we are trying to remove the judgment from the teaching force in North Carolina and place them upon the plane of opportunities.

Hope of Nation Childhood.

The hope of this nation is in its childhood and "No nation can ever greatly achieve whose youth do not greatly aspire." The best there is in our children will never be developed if they are not properly taught. Give

It was stressed that the success of the Chautauqua enterprise means more than protecting the guarantors from possible deficit. It carries the far reached conviction that Greenville believes in giving its people the advantage of a week of good, wholesome, clean entertainment.

New York's Market System Commended By Federal Expert

NEW YORK.—A snicky palate and the one-big-market habit are the principal reasons why New Yorkers pay so much more for fruit and the producing farmer gets for them, says a report prepared by Walter P. Hadden for the department of agriculture and the port of New York authority.

In the first place, it requires 141,000 carloads of the stuff each year to satisfy the hungers of the city's 8,000,000 persons, and all of it, as the first step in distribution from railroad to consumer is dumped in Central Market, a narrow stretch extending for a few blocks along the West Side waterfront of Manhattan.

This custom has grown up. Mr. Hadden explains, because all the jobbers of the city insist on seeing all the newly-arrived fruit and vegetables, and on comparing rivals' prices, before they will buy. Thus attempts to break the dominance of the central market have failed.

Then the problem of diversity arises. A few years ago, the report indicates, the public appetite accepted its produce in bulk—oranges for breakfast, always, or perhaps apples, and a few potatoes, onions and other common vegetables throughout the week.

CAN SEE SINGER AS WELL AS HEAR

LONDON.—A British inventor has produced what he calls the "Television," an apparatus which, he claims, will transmit sounds and images simultaneously without the use of wires. One can see the singer at the same time one hears his voice. He predicts the broadcasting of films by radio.

INDIFFERENT CITIZENSHIP

Gov. Cameron Morrison, recently addressing the Textile Manufacturers' Convention, described the "two great weaknesses of the country" as "an effort at class domination through the establishment of class will over common will" and "the indifference of the successful American to the discharge of his simple duties as a citizen."

It would be well for us all if more speakers of national prominence would stress these two evils in our common life. Class domination runs the gamut from capital oppressing labor, labor oppressing capital, reformers oppressing liberals, liberals trying to legislate the reformers out of existence, the bloc asserting the rights of a section of the country over the will of the whole, the military fire-eater wishing more and more preparedness, the peace lover trying to reduce us to helplessness.

"Class domination" is but another name for narrow vision; until we can all look at this country as a truly united aggregation of states, and not from the standpoint of the

particular interest of the particular state in which we happen to live and do business, we will probably continue to attempt class domination, and be, by just so much, a weaker country.

"Indifference to a citizen's duties" is chargeable against any man or woman who can, and does not, go to the polls. Any people deserves the kind of government it gets. If we don't like the government, in our hands lies the remedy. But if we don't take enough interest in our government even to vote for those who make it, we have no moral right to dislike it, or to criticize those who were placed in the governing bodies by men and women who did have enough interest in their government to make it.

Citizenship is not, primarily, a duty; it is a sacred privilege. It is a duty to practice the rights given by the privilege; failure so to do weakens the privilege of all, and the benefits this country gives to all.

IMPROVING RURAL SCHOOLS

The state-wide school survey made recently in New York State reveals the fact that children in the small rural schools are a year or more behind children in the city schools in reading achievement. Surveys made in other states show a like backwardness in reading on the part of rural children. The cause is to be found partly in the lack of adequate reading material in small rural schools. How bored the average adult would become if he were compelled to spend an entire year re-reading a book that could easily be read in a few hours! Children likewise are bored when they must spend an entire school year reading and rereading the single school primer, first or second reader provided for them.

Progressive rural boards of education are purchasing sets of supplementary readers for primary grades. Rural school patrons are raising money so that school officials may purchase annually library books suitable to the needs of even the smallest children in the schools.

Rural parent-teacher associations are subscribing, for schools, to standard magazines for children and youth, such as are widely recommended by experienced teachers for supplemental reading. Such activities on the part of board members and school patrons make available reading material that will enrich the experience of rural children, add interest to school work, and enable them to learn to read more easily.

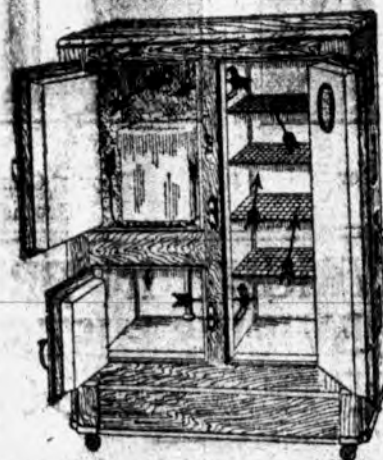

to the growing child the teacher who can inspire, the teacher who knows how and the possibilities of the young life will unfold. Yet we are constantly mindful of the fact that it is out of the heart that "are the issues of life" and "an educated fool is a bigger nuisance than the natural variety."

Come with me to the mountain top of tomorrow and look down upon the plain of today. See those fertile plains in the east, behold the orchard dotted sand hills, the smoke stacks of industrial plants in the piedmont section of North Carolina the rolling hills and beautiful scenery of the mountains. Note how the county seats are tied to each other with ribbons of cement, behold the happy homes of over two and a half millions of people, see how the master hand of Brooks with the 100 co-workers in education are moving the school houses into consolidated centres. Note will you, the scampering of 516,952 white children as they pour out of the homes for nine months in the year, see them joyfully wending their way to the public schools. These are they who will bring the state of today to the heights of tomorrow. Behold they are met at the schools by 15,254 teachers, but a close inspection will show us that 8,410 of these teachers have less than one year of college preparation for the work and 3,447 do not hold the Elementary B Certificate. Annually we need 2,252 recruits to hold the standard where it is. The people are interested, for they spend about six million a year on school house construction and the demand for the well trained teacher is ever increasing.

Purposes of College.

Look to the east and behold the efforts being put forth to add dormitories, library, student life building, heating plant and many other buildings at Teachers College. Why these efforts to build to expand this college? Because it is from here that many, many of the teachers must go to these children. This is the one college dedicated by the state to supply this demand and the children are growing into manhood and womanhood while we build. We must build, build, and ever build until every school room has in it a teacher who knows.

Behold the vision, 516,952 white boys and girls, our children down in darkness with their hands outstretched to you and to me begging us to send them some one who knows how to lead them out of darkness into light.

Come down off the mountain top of tomorrow and join hands with the men and women of today to do our duty by our children.

Cost of Ignorance.
There are those who say "but it costs too much, we can't afford it." Ignorance is more expensive than intelligence. The gas tax is cheaper than the mud tax and you are going to pay one or the other. Which will you pay? I prefer the gas tax. It is cheaper and it takes the bumps out of life's road.

The mud tax of ignorance has driven out of North Carolina many of her brightest sons and it has stood as a constant banner prohibiting others from coming in. Good roads, good schools, paved streets, water and light plants are community investments and do not belong to the old idea of taxation. They are investments that give us the maximum of returns for the money spent. The more reason that we invest in these things, the richer we will be and the more the progressive people from without will want to come here to invest their funds. If we do not invest money in education, we will pay even a larger amount as tribute money to ignorance. I prefer an investment in freedom to paying tribute to ignorance. It is either the gas tax of freedom or the mud tax of ignorance. Which?

Standing here at the end of this year and casting a glance backward to October 5, 1909 when our doors

were first opened to students, one is impressed with the wonderful development that has taken place. The dirt of the campus has become a beautiful lawn, the board walks have given place to cement, the dust of Fifth street, to asphalt pavement, the buildings have grown until our capacity is more than doubled.

Growth Student Body.

The Model School has grown up through debt and an unusual legal environment and is today a full-fledged part of the college property. The president has been moved from an apartment in a dormitory to a residence in front of the campus. The student body has grown from 174 to 395. High school work has been dropped from the course of study and only standard high school graduates are admitted. Our graduating class has grown from 18 to 112. A four-year course leading to the A. B. degree has been put in and now we are preparing teachers for any of the positions in our public school system including the high schools. A large expansion program is on and two more years our capacity will be increased more than 100 per cent.

This is all only the outward part. The heart, the soul, the spirit within this growing, throbbing young life is the same it has always been. This spirit is voiced in the motto of the College "To serve." We are here to burn that motto into the foreheads of all who enter our halls. "To serve" the childhood of North Carolina, and thus to serve our state, to our children. The least we can do is to give them the best preparation possible for this task. This must come through education and this kind of education can be given only by well trained teachers, teachers who see, teachers who know, and teachers who love.

Need Trained Teachers.

The hope of the world is in the childhood of today and the hope of the child is in the home, the church, and the school of today. The home is individual, the church is in a sense local, but the school is public. Here we can all unite, here we can work as a unit for the common good. Here in these community centers is our opportunity for united effort. The teacher is the heart of the school. How important then that we have only the best type of citizen as our teachers. We must train teachers, if we hope to save this generation of children. This, friends, is the mission of East Carolina Teachers College. May she hold her standards high and do her full duty by our children and may she grow until every child in North Carolina is taught by a teacher who knows how.

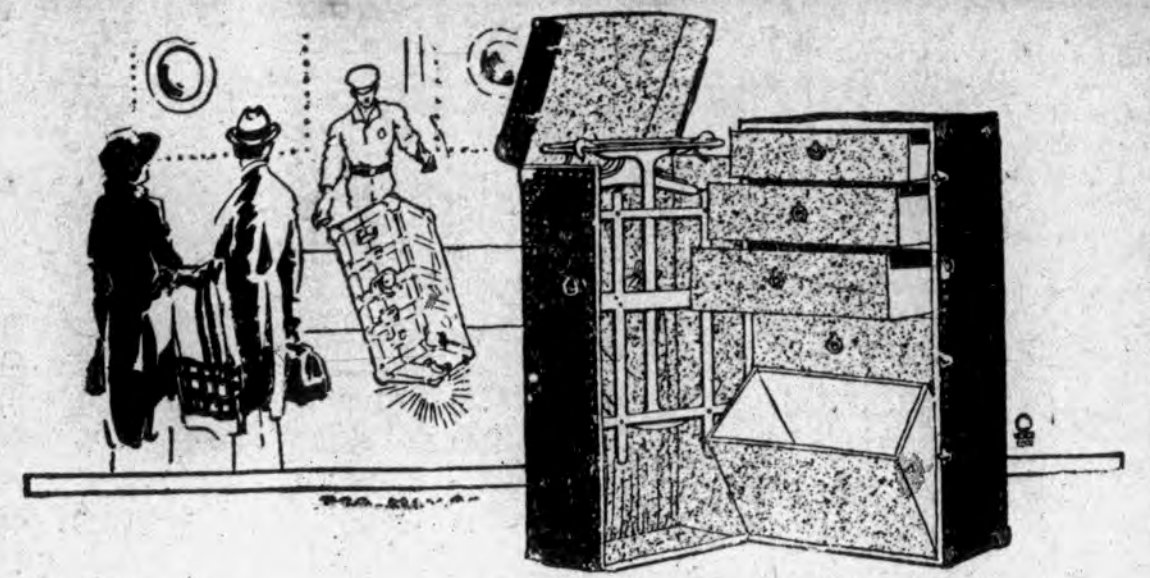
