WORLD COURT AID TO CIVILIZATION, HARDING ASSERTS

Largest Contribution By
U. S. To Settle Trou-
ble, He Writes

WASHINGTON, June 7.—President Harding declared in a letter made public today, that by accepting membership in the proposed world court the United States "may make its largest feasible contribution to the stabilization of civilization, while at the same time surrendering nothing of the advantages independence now enjoyed by the American people."

The letter was addressed to Bishop Thomas Gailor, of Tennessee, who had written that there were many thousands of citizen, who deem it a matter of honor that in some way America should contribute its influence to rehabilitating Europe.

Big Gain Is Shown By Democrats In Iowa Special Vote

WASHINGTON, June 7.—Chairman Hull, of the Democratic National Committee, declares in a statement that the "rock-ribbed Republican Eighth Congressional District of Iowa, at a special election Monday, replied to the Republican claims of President Harding's rapidly growing popularity in the West and the wonderful benefits of the Republican tariff to the farmers by giving the Republican candidate for congress a bare 1,000 majority in a district normally Republican by between 8,000 and 9,000.

"After two years of Harding high tariff prosperity," the statement added, "these figures revealed the extent of the revolt among the indignant and ruined farmers, not only of Iowa, but in the great West. This great reverse amounting to a Democratic victory precedes a Republican revolution in 1924.

Kerr Not Candidate If Others Keep Out

TARBORO, June 7.—"As a tribute to the memory of Hon Claude Kitchin, congressman from the Second congressional district of North Carolina, and to his devoted family, I shall not be a candidate for the unexpired term of Mr. Kitchin in the National House of Representatives in the event that his widow or son will consent to be named by the district committee for this vacancy," declared Judge John H. Kerr in a statement here today.

"Should any candidate or candidates not concur in this arrangement, then I shall be a candidate also and shall enter the primary with the other candidate or candidates and submit the matter to a primary in the district."

Southern Textile Social Workers Meet

GREENSBORO, June 7.—The fifth annual session of the Southern Textile Social Workers association opened here this afternoon, with sessions, which will continue through Friday held at the North Carolina College for Women.

Present are welfare workers, Y. M. C. A. and Y. W. C. A. secretaries, preachers, mill executives and others interested in textile conditions in the South and their betterment. They come from the two Carolinas, Virginia, Georgia and Alabama.

A brief business meeting was held this afternoon, with the formal opening tonight. Dr. S. C. Mitchell, of Richmond University, making the principal speech.

STRIKERS BOMBARD STREET CARS AND CHASE CREWS

SCHENACTADY, N. Y., June 7.—Riots in which shots were fired and stones hurled, marked the traction strike here today. Cars were quickly abandoned during last night when they were bombarded. Six coaches were wrecked and strike breaking crews were chased to the barns and besieged there. The situation is rapidly becoming acute, and according to officials of the company, an appeal would be made for protection by state troopers. Traffic conditions are impossible and it appears that service cannot be maintained without assistance from the state.

Promotions will never come to many of our splendid young men until they view life differently from that of today. Promotions usually follow close application to one's position. The young men in the different business houses of Greenville are bright, capable, but until a change has been perfected, they have already risen to the height of their professional condition.

Man, Wife Murder 33 Persons, Both Will Be Executed

MOSCOW, June 7.—Vasili Komaroff, convicted of the murder of 33 persons and his wife as an accomplice were sentenced to be shot today within 72 hours. Neither betrayed the slightest emotion as sentence was passed.

No Date Fixed by Chinese for Freeing Foreign Prisoners

WASHINGTON, June 7.—The State Department today announced it had received a cablegram from Jacob Gould Schurman, American minister at Peking, which said there was no "definite indication" of how long it would be before Americans and others still held by the Chinese bandits are released.

Minister Schurman reports that "harmony appears to have been restored to the bandit camp and the captives are not suffering in health, though they are getting somewhat low in spirit."

He also said the international commission, headed by Brigadier General Connor, left Peking for Lincheng last Friday accompanied by Representative Wainwright, of New York, former assistant Secretary of War, who had arrived in Peking the day previous.

Mr. Wainwright returned to Peking and reported: "That the representative of the Governor of the Province of Shan-tung and the bandits appear to have arrived at an agreement by which every bandit who has a rifle or a pistol will be enlisted in the army."

STATE-COUNTY PLAN AIDS PUBLIC HEALTH

RALEIGH, June 7.—With the assistance of the state board of health 24 counties during the past year maintained health departments. The total expenditures amounted to \$214,831.35. Of this amount \$62,500 was contributed by the State, and the remainder of \$152,331.35 came from the counties.

The program of work, together with the cost, varied in the several counties. Some had only the health officer devoting his time and energy toward the protection and promotion of the public health. Others had in addition to the health officer one or more nurses, a sanitary inspector, and in some cases skilled laboratory technicians. A few had permanent dental clinics for the benefit of their school children. The budgets varied from \$4,200 to \$27,500.

Regardless of personnel or size of budget, however, in each county the program of work was based upon a carefully calculated basis of costs whereby the relation of expenditures to result achieved might be easily ascertained. For the first time in the United States it was made possible to measure, in a manner fairly accurate, the public health work in terms of dollars and cents.

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Five Death Dancers Continue Stepping

CHARLOTTE, June 7.—Four men and one woman continued to move about the floor this morning at 12:20 o'clock contesting for the endurance staged at a local amusement park. At that hour John Britt, Farrington Costen and John Harper of Wilmington and S. Barefoot of St. Petersburg, Fla., had been dancing continuously for 51 hours and Miss Lincoln of New Haven, Conn., had danced for 26 1-2 hours. All of the contestants appeared to be in good physical condition.

PLANE, ONCE MISTRESS OF SKIES, NOW DEBRIS MASS

DAYTON, O., June 7.—The army dirigible TC-1, one-time mistress of the skies, in mass of twisted steel and iron at Wilbur Wright field today, as a result of an explosion and fire during a severe electrical storm last night.

Two men were injured when they jumped from the doomed craft to earth, a distance of 40 feet. A military board of investigation has been appointed to determine the cause of the accident.

It is believed the explosion and fire was caused when the big bag charged with electricity came into contact with the steel towers when the big ship was caught and swung around.

7 DEAD; 100 HURT IN GERMAN RIOTS OVER RUHR TANGLE

Workers and Police In
Serious Clash, Order
Finally Restored

BERLIN, June 7.—Seven persons were killed and more than 100 injured in yesterday's demonstration at Leipzig, a special correspondent of the Associated Press, announced today.

The dead included the head policeman while the rear 15 policemen were among the wounded. Thirty-seven of the injured are in serious condition, it was declared. The demonstration was in protest against the Ruhr occupation and lack of employment. Order has been completely restored.

Offer New Payment Plan.

BERLIN, June 7.—Germany's amandatory reparations note which was handed to the entente and the United States government's today, proposes a system of annuities estimated to total one billion two hundred million marks annually, if an international loan is not available for immediate capital payments. Annuities would become effective in 1927, and their number and amount would depend wholly on the degree of Germany's economic recovery.

Banker Is Convicted Conspiracy Charge

GREENSBORO, June 7.—B. H. Hedgecock of High Point, once convicted and sentenced to serve three years in the State prison in connection with the failure of the Home Savings Bank of High Point, was again found guilty on another charge growing out of the same failure by a Guilford county superior court jury tonight a few minutes after 10 o'clock declaring him and Will Switzer, former merchant of High Point, now of New York, guilty of conspiracy and misappropriation of funds of the bank with recommendation for mercy for Switzer.

Hedgecock was cashier of the bank at the time it was closed by the State Corporation Commission April 29, 1922. Sentence will be passed Thursday. The amount of money involved in the case tried today was over \$12,600.

Sandlot Ballplayers Given Medical Aid

CLEVELAND.—Sandlot baseball players in Cleveland who are injured in games have been assured of medical attention without cost by action of the board of directors of the Cleveland Amateur Baseball and Athletic Association.

Arrangements for protection of the sandlot players is with Dr. M. H. Castle, physician for the Cleveland baseball club. Having in his charge a corps of nearly 50 physicians for service to industrial workers during the week he will turn over the organization for baseball protective work on Saturday afternoon and Sundays, when most of the factories are shut down.

The County Commissioners are to be commended for this timely action and no doubt they will soon see more attention paid to the traffic laws, the violations of which have caused untold suffering and loss of life.

MISS AMERICA LEADS IN FASHION

Many moons before the treasure of Luxor was unearthed, and while Tutankhamen was still sleeping peacefully in the valley of the kings, there was launched three lustrous Egyptian blues and it was prophesied that they would be among the leading colors for spring and summer. These regal blues were reproduced from the famous Egyptian collection at the Metropolitan Museum of Art, and were named Cleopatra, Rameses and Pharaoh. These are the blues which are now attracting the marked attention of fashion, for they step with the Egyptian influence in all things sartorial.

Before the World War America had been subject to the dictates of Europe in the matter of color. But when Europe was suddenly changed from a great field of art and industry, to an enormous field of battle, America seemed to be in the way of becoming a colorless country. Then the leading representatives of the silk, wool, cotton and millinery industries, met and gave their encouragement and support to the promotion of an organization, altruistic in character, which would act as a source of color information, and create as a means of interpretation, American Color Cards.

PRESERVING THE FARM WOODLAND

Observations lead to the conclusion that the woodland is the most abused portion of the average farm in this state. In these days of fast diminishing timber supply, proper care and management of the woodlands, mean much, not only to the farmer himself, but to the country at large. We feel, therefore, that your interests, as well as ours, will be materially benefited by observing, as far as practical, the following suggestions which have been outlined with the object of bringing about a better utilization of the wood and timber resources of this state.

One of the surest and easiest ways of improving the quality of the woodland, and at the same time increasing the amount of the annual growth, is to use care when cutting a few cords to use or sell, or when taking out posts or lumber for improvements on the farm buildings. While the amount of fuel wood cut yearly on the farm is small, averaging between 10 and 15 standard cords for home consumption, this amount is taken out year after year, and may amount to a considerable part of the annual growth of the woodland. Fifteen cords of wood is equivalent to the entire annual growth of from 15 to 60 acres of woodland, depending on the soil and the species of trees.

Cord wood is a relatively cheap and abundant forest product, while fence posts, railroad ties, telegraph poles and lumber are examples of more valuable products. The more lumber and other high priced products that can be grown on the farm woodland, the greater the cash returns. All fuel wood should be selected in such a way that the cut over is left in better condition to produce more of these higher grades products. How can this be accomplished?

BARCELONA SYNDICATES SHOW BITTER ANIMOSITY

BARCELONA. — Terrorism has broken out afresh in Barcelona after a period of comparative calm. Both the Unified and Free Syndicates are participating in frequent assassinations, the victims being generally prominent members of the opposing societies. Hitherto the assassins have succeeded in escaping scotfree. In face of this fresh outbreak the authorities are placed in a difficult situation. For many years the system of suppressing the workers' union was tried, but during all this period the murderings continued.

Pork Is Popular Meat in America

WASHINGTON.—York and lard are two of the largest items in the food supply of the American people. The average annual per capita consumption for the last five years was 67.3 pounds of pork and 12.5 pounds of lard, as compared with 60.9 pounds of beef. In several recent years the consumption of pork alone has exceeded that of all other meats combined.

A study of the hog production industry included in the 1922 yearbook of the department of agriculture

shows that among the farm animals hogs are exceeded in numbers only by cattle, and in value only by cattle and horses. They are produced on three-fourths of the farms of the country and represent over ten percent of the value of the nation's agricultural production.

Scientists Still Split On Relativity Theory

PARIS.—A division in scientific circles has been made here by the relatively theory of Einstein, challenging old conceptions of time and space.

Former Premier Painleve, first a mathematician and later a politician, is threatening to drop politics long enough to prove that the earth has stopped turning. In fact he asserts that it never did turn. M. Painleve has a brand new theory of the universe, based on mechanics. He says Einstein is right, except that he is not right enough.

Professor Langevin, physicist of the College of France, inventor of the sounding machine by which ships may be piloted in any sea, has made what his friends describe as a religion of the Einstein theory, combating old theories and all others with much ardor.

Advertised Coods Reach You Without Lost Motion

A big part of the cost of living today may be charged to lost motion, slow, slipshod distribution of goods, and to old-style, wasteful selling methods.

For example, every year tons of fruit and vegetables rot on the ground, because it doesn't pay pick them. Discouraged growers plant less the next season, and the supply of food reduced. Meanwhile, consumers in the cities near by grumble over high prices. Demand and supply are not brought together.

Contrast this with the handling of oranges. \$1,000,000 a year is spent for advertising by the co-operative association of the California Fruit Growers. A large sum; yet it is only about one-fifth of a cent per dozen—one-sixtieth of a cent for each orange sold.

And this advertising has kept down the cost of oranges. To quote an official of the Exchange: "The cost of selling oranges and lemons through the California Fruit Growers' Exchange is lower today than it was ten years ago.

"In the twelve years since the first campaign was launched the consumption of California oranges has doubled. The American consumer has been taught by co-operative advertising to eat nearly twice as many oranges as before.

"Had the orange industry remained on the old basis, there would have been no profit in growing oranges. New acreage would not have been planted. Old orchards would most surely have been uprooted and other crops planted."

Advertising, properly done, saves money for the consumer and makes money for the producer by driving out wasteful methods; increasing volume and cutting down the cost of selling and distribution.

Good Fairies Teach Health Rules To Our Boys And Girls Under Plan Of American Child Health Association



If you are the doting parent of a school boy or girl, the probability is that within a very few days you will get from him or her, the startling bit of information that he or she has not only seen a fairy but has heard her talk.

This is simply by way of warning you, in that event, not to become flustered and have the child examined. It will not be an indication that he or she has seen a blur of Sir Arthur Conan Doyle's pet ectoplasm. Fairies do exist and they are appearing, gossamer wings and all the fixin's, in schools throughout the United States.

In this instance they are the Health Fairies, good nymphs who know all about what wise little boys and girls should eat and how they should live if they aspire to the prowess of a Babe Ruth or a Ty Cobb or, in the case of the girls, to the beauty of a Mary Pickford.

The Health Fairies appear before the children and in entertaining fashion tell the story of good health. The idea originated with the Child

Health Organization of America before that body merged with the American Child Hygiene Association and the two amalgamated organizations became the American Child Health Association, with Herbert Hoover as its president.

Sleep, fresh air and wholesome food are the ingredients conducive to good health, and they are advocated by the fairies in language children understand. Who couldn't understand a fairy? The American Child Health Association, having originated the Health Fairy idea, has so interested local child health groups throughout the country that they now are training their own fairies to carry on their work in the schools.

The Health Education department of the American Child Health Association, under the direction of Miss Sally Lucas Jean, is assisting these local groups in their work of carrying the health idea to children in an entertaining manner, rather than by the scientific lecture and technical text book system formerly in use.

Health education in the schools is only one of the activities of the American Child Health Association which, with Herbert Hoover as president, has recently been formed for the protection and promotion of child health work in this country. Pre- and post-natal clinics, infant health stations, conferences for mothers, care of the pre-school child, the establishment of an accurate and scientific bureau of health information for the benefit of mothers and teachers are some of the features of their program. Among the officers are such men as Dr. L. Emmett Holt, eminent child specialist; Dr. Livingston Farrand, former chairman of the American Red Cross and now president of Cornell University; Dr. Thomas D. Wood of Columbia University; and Dr. Philip Van Ingen of New York City. The old familiar call of "hot peanuts, five a bag," will return within a short time.

More than 980,000 acres were planted in peanuts last year, according to the department of agriculture figures, while this year's acreage is forecast by the institute's survey to exceed the million mark. The total yield last year was 623,507,000 pounds, valued at about \$20,222,000.

AMATEUR ATHLETES ABROAD READY TO TAKE MONEY

ROME.—In Europe the professional athlete is virtually unknown, and as a result amateurs are coming to expect, and even demand, indirect money payments for their services. Take football, for instance. Sometimes 50,000 people will pay gate money to witness an amateur game, and the players are loath to see all this money fatten the purses of the promoters.

America Seen As Olympical Winner

ROME.—With an army of 300,000 athletes from which to choose the 1924 American Olympic team, the United States is in the most formidable position of all the competing countries and looks like the sure winner of the Paris Olympiad next year, according to General Sherrill, the old Yale star and originator of the "crouch start," who is spending a few days in Rome after the meeting of the International Olympic Committee.

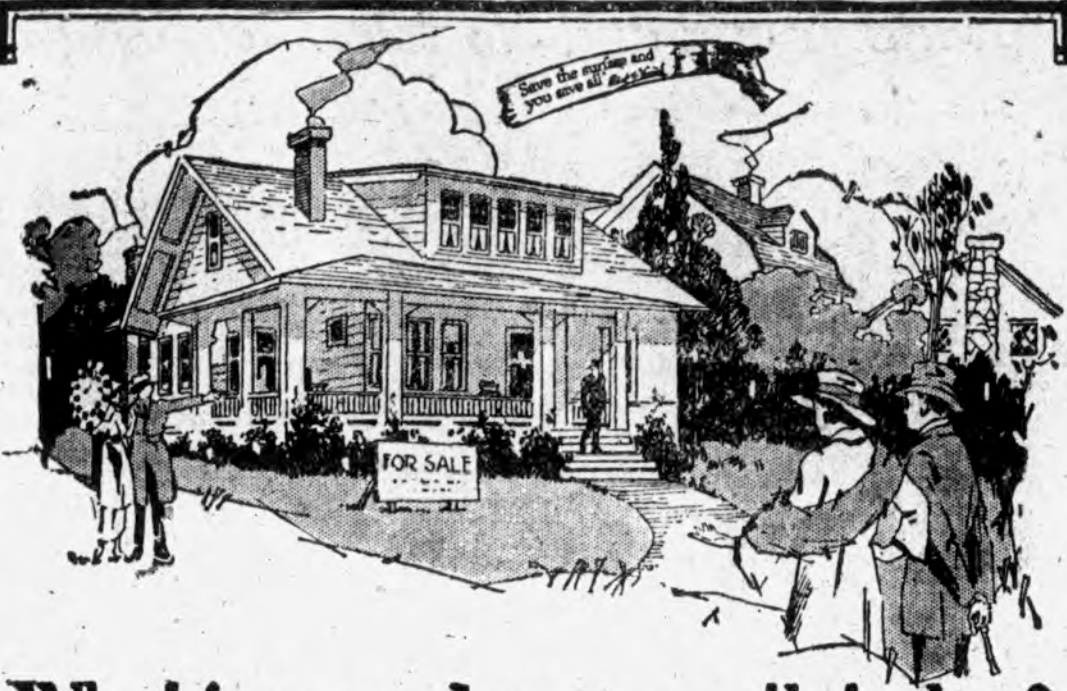
"We hate to boast," said General Sherrill "but we seem to have the best collection of athletes in the whole world, and there is no reason why we should not walk away with the honors."
