LASKER SUGGESTS PLAN TO DISPOSE MERCHANT FLEET

Would Create 18 Small
Concerns Controlling
Specific Routes

WASHINGTON, June 11.—Creation of eighteen subsidiary corporations, each to control one of the control one of the consolidated routes, was recommended to President Harding today by Albert D. Lasker, retiring chairman of the Shipping Board, as the basis of government operation of the federal merchant marine in case the efforts to transfer the ships to private operation finally fails. The government must assume complete control, Mr. Lasker declared, the system of operation agents having proven in his opinion a "vicious one," resulting in the placing of its "terminal facilities and the good will of its lines" in outside hands.

"Government operation, however," Mr. Lasker continued in the letter to the President, which was drawn in the form of a final report, "should always be with a view to ultimate sale to private owners."

One Controlling Body.

"In the event of the adoption of this plan," Mr. Lasker said, "these corporations will have the Fleet Corporation as the parent body controlling the general policies of its subsidiaries, and the responsibility for their operating resting in the separate entities. The subsidiary corporations will control the good-will and terminal facilities of their respective routes and will thus possess assets of steadily increasing value, the property of the government.

"In this light, while of course the officers and most of the directors of the subsidiary corporations should be practical shipping men who devote all their time to the enterprise, there should be invited on the respective boards in each locality citizens of eminence who would thus give a local interest to each undertaking. The twelve to eighteen routes indicated will require, to begin with, about 250 ships, replacing almost 400 ships now in these services, and these 250 ships will represent approximately 2,000,000 deadweight tons.

Must Settle Problem.

"After allotting these 250 bottoms for this service, we will still have on hand a little more than twelve hundred surplus steel ships. The first comprehensive survey to be made of the fleet is now practically completed, and it will undoubtedly prove that several hundred of these vessels, built for war purposes, are inoperable under peace conditions.

"Until the disposal of this tonnage is settled, the world's shipping industry will be disturbed, and the worst effects of this disturbance will be felt by our own marine interests. We should, therefore, at once accept the inevitable and break up these units. Of the nine hundred to one thousand remaining, I recommend that approximately two hundred, representing approximately 1,750,000 deadweight tons, be selected as a reserve to be employed in highly competitive routes if, and when, foreign owners actively oppose the expansion of our marine activities. The ships received for the operation of the twelve to eighteen corporations mentioned, together with the reserve I have just indicated and supplemented by our coastwise carrying capacity of 3,700,000 deadweight tons already in existence, would provide this country with an aggregate merchant marine of approximately 7,500,000 deadweight tons, a nucleus for a balanced merchant marine, for service in peace and war, and would place it in the second position among the maritime powers."

COTTON PRICES UP DURING LAST WEEK

NEW YORK, June 11.—In a week during which the weather and season exercised a restricting effect, the chief financial markets displayed a steady undertone. Cotton prices rallied sharply, wheat held its own and stocks ruled rather consistently higher.

For one thing, the financial mind was impressed with a number of evidences that industrial activity is being continued at a remarkably high rate. Pig iron production during May, for example, averaged 124,800 tons a day in comparison with 118,300 tons in April, which was, incidentally, the previous high record for all time. The steel trade appears confident, furthermore, and the present rate of operations will be continued for some time to come and the present level of steel prices will be supported by a revival of forward buying.

Cotton Advances On Rain Report in Belt

NEW YORK, June 11.—Cotton prices soared on a big general movement by reports of heavy rains in Oklahoma, Arkansas and Georgia today opening from 20 to 65 points higher and quickly advancing 72 to 87 points above Saturday closing. The closing was led by July which sold up to 28-65.

WASHINGTON, June 11.—Prediction there will be "congressional demands for an explanation of the waste of taxpayers' money," unless Chairman Lasker of the shipping board "abandons his plans for the million dollar joy ride on the reconditioned American liner Leviathan," was made in public statement by the democratic national committee today.

Referring to arrangements made for the six day trial trip for the Leviathan, the statement declares "an investigation of this junket de-luxe is certain to be forced by the democrats of congress."

Bank Wreckers Given Long Terms In Penna.

YORK, Pa., June 11.—Thomas Bard, defaulting cashier of the City Bank, was sentenced today to 22 years in the penitentiary, and William Boll, assistant cashier was given 15 to 20 years, in the York County court, after they had admitted embezzling more than a million dollars from the institution.

The banks was closed the latter part of April.

RUM FLEET ON JOB

NEW YORK, June 11.—The rum fleet which came back Saturday to harass federal prohibition authorities in New York had increased from eight to 12 vessels, Solicitor Barnes, of customs service, said today.

Surry County Banks Advance Money to Buy Guernsey Cows

Co-operating with the dairy farming office of the agricultural Extension Service and J. Luther Wood, agent for the Federal Farm Loan Board, seven of the banks in Surry county have loaned money to farmers for the purchase of forty-three head of Jersey cattle, the North Carolina Department of Agriculture announced tonight.

The cattle was bought by A. C. Kimrey, of the dairy farming force, in the eastern part of Tennessee and now have been shipped and distributed among twenty-nine Surry farmers.

"Seven banks agreed to put up \$2,000 each, to be loaned to farmers for a period of three years, in notes for one, two, and three years, at six per cent interest," according to J. A. Avrey, head of the farming office.

"Twenty-nine farmers took advantage of this offer, buying forty-three head of fine Jersey cattle, for which they paid a total of \$1,700. These cattle were all pure bred, registered animals, and will be used as foundation stock for the building of better dairy herds in that county."

"This movement is a direct outgrowth of a Jersey Breeders Association, which we organized in Surry county last year."

FEW CASES HEARD IN COUNTY COURT

There were few cases for hearing before Judge Cooper in the county court this morning. A large number of the defendants on the lower court docket are principally those under indictment of alleged whiskey violations and pistol "toting."

Tom Manning, senior and junior were assessed with the cost on a charge of assault.

When the prosecuting witness failed to appear in the case of Hunter Keeton charged with abandonment, the court ordered a nol pross with leave.

Wince Fleming was acquitted of an assault charge.

Blaney Sanders alleged possessor of whiskey in violation of the Turlington act had his case transferred to superior court.

Saunders Little was also asked for a jury trial in superior court on a charge of carrying concealed weapon. His motion was granted. As was like Smith and Tobe Wilkes both up for the same offense as Little.

Daniel Phillips was freed of the charge buying liquor. Ophelia Jeanette from whom the purchase was alleged to have been made was also acquitted.

Mayor Clark Named Head of State Body Municipal Executives

Mr. Clark has been active in the work of the organization and his elevation was in recognition of his ability and knowledge of the needs of municipalities, it was announced.

Activities of the association cover practically the entire state and the office of president is a distinction and honor.

Kabul, Afghanistan, Now Has Telegraph

KABUL, Afghanistan.—The first telegraph line connecting Afghanistan with the outside world has been officially opened. It runs from Kabul the capital, to the city of Peshawar in northwestern India. Formal greetings between the Amir of Afghanistan and the King-Emperor of India, George V, were the first messages sent over the new wires.

5 Dead, Thousands Homeless In Flood In Southwest States

KANSAS CITY, Mo., June 11.—With many reported killed, thousands driven from their homes and property damage estimated in the millions of dollars, many districts in Kansas, Oklahoma and Texas are flooded.

Torrential rains over Kansas for the last three days caused rivers and smaller streams to overflow destroying crops in the lowlands and swamping residential and business sections of several towns.

Flames Destroy Railroad Station Big Property Loss

PHILADELPHIA, June 11.—Fire virtually destroyed the train shed of the Broad street station of the Pennsylvania railroad here early this morning, including a large quantity of mail and a number of baggage and passenger coaches.

The loss is placed at approximately \$1,000,000.

Many firemen were overcome and the lives of passengers occupying sleeping cars standing in the sheds were endangered. With one exception, all the passengers got out of their berths and made their way through the blinding smoke to safety. William Kelly, whose address could not be learned, became confused and was overcome by smoke. He had just arrived on an incoming train.

Confer On Building New Colored School

Members of the board of aldermen and trustees of the city schools met today to discuss plans looking to the immediate erection of a new colored school to replace the building that was destroyed by fire several weeks ago.

Under the state law, it is understood, some type of building must be ready for the reception of pupils before the beginning of the regular term next fall. While no definite action was taken, it is believed the new structure will be completed in time to meet every legal requirement.

Saturday night near the midnight hour Mr. John Warner and Miss Evelyn Jones two young people of Washington, N. C., were married at the local court house by Rev. Chas. F. Hudson, a minister of the same city.

Yesterday morning Register of Deeds Claude Gaskins answering a telephone summons to appear at his office at once issued licenses to Mr. Geo. H. Bell, of New York City and Miss Elsie Martin, of Washington, Dr. W. P. Shamhart pastor of the local Christian church officiated, and the wedding took place in the court house.

THREE DROWNED

NEW ORLEANS, June 11.—Three persons of a bathing party were drowned at Grand Island yesterday and two others were rescued still unconscious today. The party were caught in swift under tow.

GERMAN RIOTS COST FIVE MORE LIVES; MANY WOUNDED

BERLIN, June 11.—Five civilians were shot dead and several seriously wounded in Dortmund rioting last night, according to semi-official advices, received here today.

The dispatch did not state who was responsible for the outbreak, although it added that troop reinforcements have arrived and occupied the city hall. It was stated that more than 100 persons were under arrest.

Husband Who Cut Wife's Throat Made To Give Own Blood

CHICAGO, June 11.—In what was termed by the police today to be an unparalleled case of retributive justice, a husband who had attempted to kill his wife was forcibly held and unwillingly made to give his blood to save the life he had tried to take.

As the climax to a family quarrel, Theodore Marty cut the throat of his wife, Martha and fled. At a hospital it was announced that an immediate blood transfusion would be necessary to save Mrs. Marty.

As a call for volunteers was about to be sent out detectives arrived with Marty. They forcibly carried him to the operating room, two quick incisions, were made and the transfusion completed. Mrs. Marty will live, the doctors said.

Britain Urges France To Accept Offer of German Reparations

LONDON, June 11.—Lord Curzon, a conference with the French Ambassador Count St. Aulaire, today urged the French government to accept Berlin's latest reparations proposal as the basis of further negotiations.

If France will do this, the British foreign secretary will inform Germany of France's willingness to discuss the problem collectively with the allies.

PARIS, June 11.—No reply to the recent German note is considered necessary so far as France is concerned, it was stated at the foreign office today. However, it was explained, if the allies desire to improve the opportunity to resume general discussion of the reparations question, France is ready.

Every Jail In State Will Be Furnished Bibles By Gideons

GREENSBORO, June 11.—The Gideons of North Carolina in their annual meeting here decided to place Bibles in every jail in the state.

This organization has long been placing Bibles in hotel guest rooms in the United States, more lately in penitentiaries and hospitals.

The meeting attended by about 75 Gideons and about 50 other persons, was featured by an address by Judge J. H. D. Stevens, Nashville, Tenn., National trustee. Gideon services were held in 17 churches of the city, with mass meeting at Reformed church.

PITT COUNTY BANKERS ARE A DOING GROUP

The Pitt County Bankers' association despite its brief life has outgrown its swaddling clothes and has attained its full majority in the sense of concrete purposes.

That fact was patently brought out at the meeting of the group last Friday evening. They met for fun and business and obtained a full measure of both.

Two projects demanded immediate attention and no time was lost in arriving at a definite conclusion, once the facts were understood, thus living up to the letter of the organization, "to discuss ways and means for the future development of Pitt County from which its business must be derived."

When Mr. Turnage, Ayden, brought to the attention of the association the urgent necessity for fighting the invasion of the boll weevil, it was decided that every banker and merchant in the county would pass the word along to their customers to use poison in eliminating the pest. There was no haggling about some farmers who might not be able to purchase the poison. If they cannot, we will finance them was, in substance, the unanimous response.

That shows the spirit that does things. Those bankers were together on a proposition, that otherwise would have required weeks to agree upon, had it not been that the association brought them together as one working basis.

The second and possibly the largest question talked concerning the development of Pitt County, was the livestock industry.

Mr. J. L. Little sounded the keynote that is crystallizing into a definite program of diversified farming. He told the bankers that the initial move to better live stock was pasture lands, emphasizing the statement that he intended to see that tracts were converted this fall to that purpose. Moreover, farmers who wanted to go along in movement, would find the bankers ready to help in every way possible.

It is hard to conceive of a more generous, noble spirit of team work to place on a firm foundation one of the greatest and most far reaching branches of agriculture that enriches a community in pocket and puts achievement pride into the souls of men.

Mr. Little, as president of association has shown splendid executive ability and exemplary leadership. He has the confidence of every banker and business man in the state. He is careful in his predictions and weighs

his words well, but when he speaks it is with a lively appreciation of both sides of a subject.

BANKS GET STRUNG, TOO

Even the best banks always have a few bonds appraised at only a fraction of the original value. If the bank were so careful in its investments that it never bought any of these securities that go wrong, it would have to be so conservative as to be free also from any chance at large profits. Consequently it would never grow as fast as its more enterprising competitors.

The same is true of big stores which never have any credit losses—they can't obtain desirable new customers unless they take a few chances on customers who may prove up desirable.

At the present time, nearly every big bank and trust company in the middle west probably has in its vaults a few almost worthless bonds of once highly successful interurban traction companies. Automobiles, trucks, and paved highways have hurt the earning power of such railroads more rapidly than anybody was able to foresee.

FRANCE TACKLES SUGAR PROBLEM

Sugar has caused about as much commotion in France as in the United States. A bill has now been evolved on the theory that the sugar-beet factories are the culprits who have put up the price of sugar. Upon the net profits of sugar factories in excess of 40 per cent a year on capital the bill would levy a tax of 50 per cent, instead of the present income tax of 8 per cent.

RELATION BETWEEN FARMER, BANKER

By F. J. FORBES

The good resulting from the co-operation of the county agent, the Chamber of Commerce and the banker can scarcely be estimated. If the farmers of a certain section desire pure-bred live stock, cash capital is needed to buy in car load lots. If the project has the sanction of the Chamber of Commerce and County agent, the banker usually relies on their recommendation, and stands ready to handle the financial end. In this manner, also, the banker helps to provide boys' and girls' pig clubs, calf clubs, and other similar associations, with pure-bred live stock. Membership in the boys' and girls' clubs in 1914 was 23,000, while in 1922 the total membership was 600,000. This increased farm production credited to these clubs is almost incredible. For instance, the average yield per acre in the United States is 31 bushels of corn, and 179 bushels of potatoes per acre. These figures mean almost double the production of corn, and seventy-five per cent greater yield of potatoes. This increased yield made by the clubs comes at a time when the United States faces the problem of an average lower yield per acre in all farm products than that of farming countries of Europe and South America.

Eliminating Scrub Stock.

Another purpose of these clubs is to improve the quality of farm animals until "scrubs" shall disappear from American farms, and in their stead shall appear farm animals in which the owner can find satisfaction and profit.

This same banking support is back of much of the work of the Chamber of Commerce and county agent. Often a farmer feels that he should be using improved methods in raising his crops and in operating his farm, but he realizes that he must have money in order to develop his plans. The bank is always ready to consider granting him a loan, especially if the Chamber of Commerce and county agent approve the plan. In hundreds of cases this contact of the banker, the farmer, the Chamber of Commerce and the county agent has reached to the advantage of each of them, and to the community as well. The willingness of the bank to help in financing every sound business enterprise of the community is here demonstrated in the aid extended the farmer.

Rural banks are deeply interested in exhibits of farm products. Disposed with the help of the Chamber of Commerce and county agent, tend to arouse keen rivalry among farmers who, of course, are proud to receive credit and recognition for good results obtained. Many banks throughout the country hold such exhibits in their own banking rooms. Thus people living on the farms become familiar with the bank's interest in what the farmer is doing. It has been said that with the bankers and other business men continuing their support of the Chamber of Commerce and county agent, other ten years will witness great advancement in all that relates to rural life.

In nearly all meetings of bankers, we find a prominent place given on each program to the discussion of questions of better agricultural methods, and more favorable conditions of rural life. For years the American Bankers' association through its agricultural commission has been expending time, effort, and money in carrying forward this great movement. Since 1913 it has been publishing a magazine called the Banker-Farmer, the purpose of which is to suggest ways in which the banker can aid the farmer. Banks receive this magazine each month, and so are kept in touch with what others are doing. Each year a greater number of bankers become interested in studying the banker-farmer relationship, and how bankers-farmer projects are developed. Likewise, state bankers' associations have their agricultural committees which co-operate with the state departments of agriculture, and with agricultural colleges in promoting state-wide agricultural projects. Partly by reason of the influence of the American Bankers' association we have national laws affording farmer's improved facilities for making farm loans, and for marketing their products. The banker's influence has also helped in securing roads, better rural education and so forth. Underlying all this activity is the economic truth that upon the welfare of the farmer rests national prosperity.

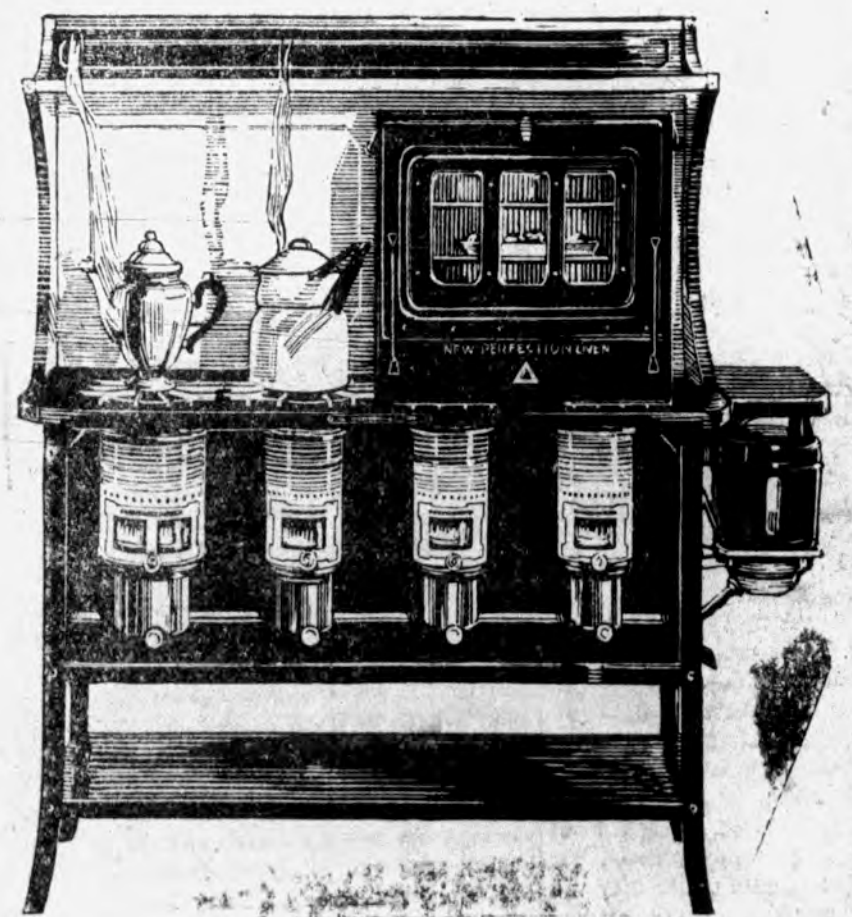
