Dry Agents Seize Liquor On Foreign Ships, Halt Removal

NEW YORK, June 23. — The American custom authorities charged by Secretary Mellon's latest order with seizure of liquor brought into this port by foreign ships under seals of foreign governments for their return trips had their task greatly augmented today when the French liner Paris steamed into quarantine with almost enough liquor in her hold to float her.

The group of customs raiders headed by Deputy Surveyor L. E. Sanders, boarded the British steamship Baltic and obtained the key to the wine room from the purser. After unlocking the door which officers of the ship refused to do, they ripped the British consular seals from the liquor supply for the return trip and formally turned it over to Palmer Canfield, state prohibition director.

Seizure was stopped, however, upon the receipt of a countermanding order just as the prohibition agents were about to cart it off the ship.

Authorities Puzzled.

One of the British vessels to defy the American dry edict and force a test case was the Cunard liner Berengaria. The fact that she intended to carry liquor across the three-mile limit had been well heralded and the Berengaria in New York had been deluged with orders from Washington on just how to act.

With two wet Britishers already on their hands, customs officials tomorrow face another deluge. The Paris which arrived today. Before she set sail it was announced carried in her hold many cocktail shaker full for the homeward voyage that on this homeward voyage and that on this select locker had been placed the seal of the French government.

And after today more deluge, for the ships arriving confirmed reports that following in their wake were many other foreign craft, all anxious to test the decision of the United States government.

Reporters Astounded.

Newspaper men massed at quarantine early this morning to see what Uncle Sam would do to the wet Berengaria, were permitted, after they had recovered from their astonishment at the Baltic's arrival, to view her liquor cache.

The homeward bound supply was stored in a forward hold. The wet goods were separated from food supplies by a paneled wall, through which reporters could see malt liquors stacked in boxes and wines in wicker baskets.

Seizure Proceeds.

Collector Elting, explained the seizure was temporarily halted because Dr. E. K. Sprague, local chief public health service, had not certified the amount of liquor to be retained for medical use. As soon as the certificate was issued Elting ordered the seizure to proceed. The liquor aboard the Berengaria will be seized this afternoon, the collector announced, adding this procedure would be followed with respect to all vessels bringing liquor under seals of foreign governments.

Says Priest Legatee Slew Half Brother

MONTREAL, June 23. — Adelard Delorme, former priest, charged with the murder of his half-brother Raoul, lived far beyond his means and was deep in debt at the time Raoul's death by which he stood to benefit in excess of \$100,000, R. L. Calder, crown prosecutor, declared as he opened his case.

One significant feature of Raoul's will was that it discriminated against his own sisters in favor of Delorme's sisters, the prosecutor said, while the former priest received \$62,000 and revenues from other legacies. A \$25,000 insurance policy, he said, he could prove was taken out by Raoul at the insistence of Father Delorme.

Good Character Saved This Man In Police Court

Character witnesses possibly saved Fred Glover, colored, from a heavy penalty when he was arraigned before Mayor Clark, today charged with assault. Mr. Harvey by whom he is employed told the court Glover was a steady worker and reliable. In view of the fact that it was his first offense, the mayor suspended judgment of any kind upon payment of cost.

Sylvia Melton, colored, her front name hardly suggestive of disorderly conduct—was charged with that offense. She was fined \$10 and cost. Charged with doing electrical wiring without license or permit, Hodger Smith, was allowed to pay the cost. A. H. Taft, paid the cost for failing to have a permit to do repair work on a building in the fire zone. The Young Mercantile company, was assessed cost for permitting an automobile to stand on paved streets between 1 and 5 a. m. Roscoe Perkins, colored, charged with disorderly conduct and vagrancy was fined \$10 and cost on the former complain and given 30 days on the county roads on the last count.

BANKING INTERESTS WORK TO RESTORE WALL ST. CONFIDENCE

NEW YORK, June 23.—Wall Street shaken to the depths by the sting of failures and the resultant loss of public confidence which followed the closure of widespread bucketing of customers' orders, breathed its first long breath in a week today when powerful banking interests, stepped in to the breach to stabilize the market.

While the banking support was confined to brokerage houses holding membership in the New York Exchange, the strength infused into that market carried prices up on both the Consolidated and the Curb exchanges, and a marked spirit of optimism prevailed. The rushing to cover by shorts aided in the strengthening process.

Leviathan Breaks All Records For Sustained Speed

NEW YORK, June 23.—A wireless message from Albert Lasker, today, former chairman of the United States shipping board to President Harding, announced that the giant reconditioned liner Leviathan had broken all worlds records for sustained speed. The message was forwarded to Harding.

ASHEVILLE, June 23. — A. S. Storrs, administrator of the estate of Mrs. Lillian Storrs, has entered suit here for \$375,000 damages against the Southern Railway company as the result of the killing of Mrs. Storrs when the automobile in which she was riding with her husband was struck by a passenger train at a crossing near Statesville on Jan. 8, last.

Asheville Editor Elected President. State Press Body

BLOWING ROCK, June 23.—John B. Sherrill, of Concord, is out after trying for a quarter of a century to get disconnected with an official job in the North Carolina Press Association. He laid down the reins as president after serving in that capacity for two years and Charles A. Webb, one of the publishers here of the Asheville Citizen, jumped into first place in the official roster of the association.

Webbs election came after President Sherrill, who had been re-elected by a unanimous vote, positively refused to serve for another term. Before being elected to the presidency, he served for a quarter of a century as secretary and treasurer of the association.

Texas Klansmen To Secede From National Body

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., June 23.—San Antonio Ku Klux Klan and scores of other local organizations in Texas have adopted resolutions breaking with the Atlanta headquarters and deciding to withhold all money reports and other information from Atlanta officers until some order is brought out of chaos into which the national organization has been threatened by reason of contests for control of Klan rule.

Gospel Tent Falls, Four Slightly Hurt

RICHMOND, June 23.—Four persons were slightly injured at Longdale last night when a huge tent in which a revival meeting was being held collapsed during a windstorm. Approximately 1,000 people were in the tent at the time.

The congregation had grown restless as the rain fell in torrents and the wind whipped the big canvases. The noise of the storm drowned out the voice of the evangelist, Rev. Ed G. Caldwell, and the meeting was turned into song service. The evangelist sought to reassure his congregation and had just announced a hymn when the tent collapsed.

Farm Loan Board Increases Product List

WASHINGTON, June 23.—The federal Farm Loan board today decided to increase the list of staple agricultural products upon which loans may be made under the agricultural credits law to include, in addition to corn, beans (including soy beans), rice, hay, nuts and canned fruits and vegetables.

These additions make the list of agricultural products subject to loans include virtually all farm products excepting dairy and poultry. Both dairy and poultry products are being considered by the board as eligible to be used as security but no action is expected on that question for some time.

EXPECT SKIPPER DECLARES MARINE OFFICERS OVEREAT

LONDON.—Captain Selwyn Day is one of the best known of the mercantile marine officers and an A. D. C. to the king. He has been all through the mill at sea, and he says that the trouble with the officers on the big Atlantic steamers now-a-days, from captains down, is that they eat more than is good for them.

"Apprentices and junior officers in the passenger ships of today," he asserts, "all eat too much food, too often, and in too large quantities. Consequently, as they have no real physical labor to perform, at least 40 percent of them are physically unfit."

Onslow Farmers Use Fish For Fertilizing

WASHINGTON, June 23.—Farmers near Swansboro are using the feed fish recently washed ashore along the Atlantic Coast in Onslow county for fertilizing purposes, according to reports reaching here. Thousands of dead fish line the beach along scores of miles of shore line, reports state.

A number of theories as to the cause of the killing of the fish have been advanced. Some suggest that oil leaking from ships poisoned them while others think that volcanic disturbances occurred off the coast, killing the fish.

HARDING URGES MERGER OF RAILROADS INTO SMALLER GROUPS, AS PUBLIC BENEFIT

Kansas City, Mo., June 23.—Consolidation of the railroads of the country into a small number of systems is a rational, justifiable step, full of promise towards solution of the transportation problem, President Harding declared here in the second prepared address of his western trip.

"If the system consolidations will not afford the solution," he said, "then our failure will enforce a costlier experiment and the one great commitment which I hope the United States will forever escape."

Favors Railroad Board.

The executive expressed the belief that this one great commitment—operation—would be "a colossal blunder, which would destroy initiative, infect us with political corruption, create regional jealousies and impose incalculable cost on the public treasury."

Discussing relations between the carriers and their employees as a vital factor in the transportation situation, the President announced that he favored continuance of the Railroad Labor Board "under such modifications as seem most likely to make the plan

D. E. Oglesby, Farmville banker, was arrested today on a charge of manslaughter, in connection with death of his son Norwood, six years old, who was killed when a machine driven by Oglesby went into a ditch on the Farmville-Greenville paved road last Sunday.

Sheriff Jackson served the warrant and he was released in \$1,000 bond for a hearing before Magistrate Tyson, next Tuesday at 10 a. m. Preliminary hearing of the charge against Kirk Corey, who was held by the coroner's jury as being responsible for the accident was postponed today by Magistrate Tyson until Tuesday.

The case has attracted considerable attention throughout the county and a large group of witnesses and interested persons gathered in and around the office of the magistrate early this morning. When it became known that a warrant had been issued for Oglesby, considerable surprise was manifested because it was not anticipated that such action would be undertaken. Oglesby was here to appear as witness. When the warrant was served he did not indicate any obvious concern, it was said.

It is understood that Col. Albion Dunn, has been retained as counsel for young Corey.

The accident which resulted in the death of the child followed when Oglesby claims that he was forced from the road by a car driven by Corey. This assertion has been flatly denied by Corey. He told the coroner's jury that both cars were speeding and that he could not possibly have forced Oglesby off the road and that when he passed the latter he drove his car into the dirt siding along the highway.

Since the coroner's inquest, it is declared, that several persons have been found who are willing to testify that both cars were racing and paralleled each other for more than 200 feet. In any event, it is expected, that the joint hearing will develop testimony that has not before been introduced in the case.

Would Cut Rates.

"I am frank to say," he continued, "I do not hope for compliance on the part of employees so long as decisions are ignored by the managers."

The sort of consolidation of the carriers which Harding advocated contemplates a constitution of the larger systems so that the weaker and unprofitable lines would be able to lean upon the financial strength of the stronger and profitable ones until the growth of the country makes them all earn a just return upon the capital invested. "The whole would be under rigorous government supervision."

Such a consolidation, the President asserted, would "effect a diminution in rates without making a net return impossible" and at the same time would "make sound finance possible for expansion."

In some communities there is unfortunate tendency on the part of some persons to blame everyone who is trying to make better business?

PUTTING DEVELOPMENT TALK INTO ACTION

During the last few weeks numerous wise and practical suggestions have been printed in The Reflector, signed by men identified with virtually every business and profession represented in Pitt County. Every one of the series articles fairly sparkled with suggestion and ideas have to do with diversified development of the county.

In the face of such a flood of prolific thought it is a rare paradox that no move so far as the public is informed, has yet been undertaken to put on the road to realization any one of the various suggestions. It is encouraging, however, to know that these personal expressions indicate a lively appreciation of what could be done here, although no real effort is being made to do anything.

It is not a guess to say that every man in this county wants to see it expand, but how many are willing to sacrifice a little time and risk a few dollars places a different aspect on the situation. It is also true, in event that any project should be undertaken which would add to the business volume of the community there would be a grand rush to get in on the pro rata distribution. There is palpable lack of unity of purpose among some of the citizens of Greenville who are forward looking in everything else except in the matter of organized movement to widen our resources. While this condition is unfortunate and acts as a deterrent to progress it is here in hydra-headed form. Cursory observation will reveal it in many instances.

Individual selfishness, greed and cupidity has STIFLED and KILLED the growth of more communities, than IT EVER MADE. Where lively, progressive cities and towns are found the foundation hqad of activities will always be traced directly to a citizenry that are "hitting on all six."

Greenville and Pitt County needs some of that spirit. A few well placed charges of high, aggressive, impersonal explosions of civil TNT would do more to make this county an all season production section than any other one treatment imaginable.

Bankers preach creed of saving, Merchants and other commercial interests decry and rant about the lack of even balanced business. The remedy is entirely with them. No successful salesagency ever placed products in a limited territory. But just as long as collective business complacently stands by contented with an active but at times uncertain trade of only a few months out of the year, that condition will continue to obtain.

This county has countless constructive leaders well equipped with initiative and force. If just one among that number could be found who would come forward with the determination that he needed and must have support for any worth while project, it is confidently believed that many of the obstacles now in the way of UNSELFISH CO-OPERATION would be for once and all settled.

EDUCATION BY BLOC

The bloc system as a substitute for the party system may contain some of the dangers chartered by anxious observers. The bloc system as a corrective of serious defects in our party system may yet turn out to deserve well of the country. In all fairness to the much discussed blockaders, the possible advantage should be run in a parallel column with the dangers.

President Harding and those who feel with him name no names when they register their protests against blocs. But it is pretty well understood that the reference is to a fairly large section of the American people

engaged in the production of crops and livestock. What we now call the bloc movement would once have been called an agrarian movement. Assuming that Capper and Brookhart are a menace, will it be harder to keep in check Capper-Brookhartism in 1924 than it was to defeat other agrarian movements? We doubt it.

More important are the educational facilities which the bloc opens up. A farmers bloc that is mobilized for attack is a bloc that is also mobilized for self-enlightenment. There will be raids on the railroads and other "interests" in the next congress; but already there are signs that the farmers have learned that there is something much more to their troubles than "There's the enemy!" They are learning to think upon what the farmer can do for himself. The rise of the farm bloc has been paralleled with the notable forward movement of the farmers' co-operation in crop financing and in marketing. The bloc is an encouragement to self-help.

The farmer is learning other things. He may cry out against the railroads out of force of habit, but some of his leaders have been thinking of what the tariff has done to put the farmer at a disadvantage as against the city man.

They have also been thinking of what economic prostration in Europe has done to rob the farmer of his wheat market.

The bloc has been studying as well as fighting.

STRAW VOTE FAVORS HENRY

The fourth publication of the poll of voters being taken by Collier's Weekly shows Henry Ford materially in the lead as a presidential favorite.

With 128,276 votes cast, Ford received 38,467, as against President Harding's 27,170, and McAdoo, third in the list, far behind with 10,526. Ford leads in the home states of Harding, Johnson, Underwood and La Follette—all presumably "favorite sons." A dispatch quotes Ford as saying that there will be four tickets in the field—Republican, Democratic, a "third" and the Henry Ford ticket, and that the result will be to throw the election of the President into the House of Representatives.

The prospect, is to say the least, an interesting one.

CEMENTING PAN-AMERICAN PEACE

Augustin Edwards, Chilean Ambassador to Great Britain and president of the fifth international conference of American states, recently held under the auspices of the Pan-American Union at Santiago, Chile, asserts that real progress toward South American disarmament has been made notwithstanding press statements to the contrary. Edwards says that Argentina and Brazil have only two dreadnaughts each, and Chile has only one. A further "reduction" would be more or less a joke.

Latin-America, Edwards declared, with 90,000,000 population, is spending only \$200,000,000 a year on armaments as against an expenditure by the United States of four times that amount to protect almost the same population and a much smaller area.

"There is no armed peace in Latin-America," he declared. "We are avoiding that horrible error; we are not engaged in recruiting."

The twenty nations concerned have signed an agreement to settle disputes before an international commission and to concentrate no troops and commit no other acts of war preparation until the commission has rendered its report.

Selection of W. H. Rogers, as chief construction engineer in charge of the building improvements at East Carolina Teachers College is fortunate for the institution. His service is sufficient guarantee that the work will be done, and well done. By technical education and the experience he is particularly well qualified to carry through to satisfactory completion the work he is to undertake July 1.

During Rogers' connection first with the Pitt County Highway department and subsequently as resident engineer representing the State Highway commission he has rendered signal service in both offices. Under his supervision and counsel considerable mileage of hard surfaced roads have been built in this county. Never a public flaw has been echoed of his work. While his severance with the highway department is a loss to Pitt County, still in a larger field of activity, his abilities will have wider opportunities of development. It is a pleasure to know he is to continue with us, and we join with hundreds of his friends in extending our cordial felicitations on his promotion.

Rogers is not only a regular "fellow," but he is a regular engineer. Greenville and the nation will know more of Rogers as he proceeds in his profession,

WASHINGTON, June 23.—The project of the Van Sweringen group, now in control of the New York, Chicago and St. Louis railroad, to consolidate that property with the Lake Erie and Western, the Toledo, St. Louis and Western, the Fort Wayne, Cincinnati and Louisville Railroad and the Chicago and State Line Railroad has been approved in its entirety by the interstate commerce commission.

Offers to Put Stop to Liquor Running

NEW YORK, June 23.—John D. Appleby, former Prohibition Zone Chief for New York and New Jersey, in a letter to Prohibition Commissioner Roy A. Haynes made public yesterday, renews his offer to patrol the coast from Maine to New Jersey, or as far south as New Orleans, with airplanes equipped with wireless and searchlights, with speedboats and other modern facilities which he maintains are necessary to combat rum-running successfully.

The letter indicates that he and his associates have assembled the necessary number of airplanes, boats, motor cars, trucks and other land equipment. He suggests that immigration authorities should be aboard the airplanes and speedboats because they are authorized to board suspected boats and search them.

Neuse River Tonnage Grows. NEW BERN, June 23.—A total of 277,139 tons, valued at \$6,382,364, was carried on Neuse river during the year of 1922, as compared with 15,479 tons, valued at \$4,761,122 for 1921, according to figures compiled by the local office of the United States engineers just made public. The principal items were lumber,

117,822 tons; timber 59,843, 19,035 tons; fertilizer 13,404 tons and cement 9,448 tons.

High Point Calls Pastor. HIGH POINT, June 23.—The congregation of Friends church of High Point, through its pastoral committee, has issued a call to Rev. Thomas Sykes, of Portland Maine, to accept the local charge, succeeding Rev. Samuel Haworth, resigned. Rev. Mr. Sykes, of Portland Maine, to accept date.

Rev. Mr. Sykes, who holds the pastorate of the Friends meeting in Portland, also is general Secretary of the New England yearly meeting.

Destroy Big Still. WASHINGTON, June 23.—Prohibition officers captured and destroyed a one hundred gallon copper moonshining liquor distilling plant near Batts Cross roads Wednesday afternoon. Indications were that the plant had been in operation a few hours before it was raided. Twelve hundred gallons of beer were poured out. No arrests were made.

Crowds Gather to See Yale-Harvard College Boat Race

NEW LONDON, CONN., June 22.—The crews of Harvard and Yale, rivals for more than 50 years in the most picturesque of college boat races, a long, four-mile pull. Have polished their stee in preparation for the 56th renewal of the event, to be rowed downstream today on the Thames river.

Advance crowds of followers of the Blue and Crimson flowed into New London throughout today giving promise of one of the gayest and greatest of regatta gatherings. Tomorrow they will find places on the long, tarpaulin covered observation trains or on the river banks, follow the progress of the even-swept boats and cheer the straining oarsmen.

The colors of the universities are fluttering for the opening races between the younger crews. These events are over a two-mile course between the freshmen and second varsity crews.

Yale comes to the regatta with one of the finest crews in her rowing history. Fashioned from green timber less than a year by a new coach, young Ed Leader, who previously won fame with the University of Washington eight, the Blue varsity has been one of the few undefeated eights of the year. It has beaten Columbia, Cornell, Pennsylvania and Princeton. Straight-backed, indefatigable, well distributed, this Blue eight is one of Yale's greatest athletic turnouts.

Harvard too, has a good crew, although its earlier races have not been so impressive as those of Yale. The Crimson finished third in the triangular event with Navy and Princeton on Lake Carnegie and was beaten by Cornell on the Charles.

FEARS ANOTHER WAR.
CAPETOWN, South Africa.—General Smuts, speaking recently at the Union of South Africa government, defined the British Empire as a grouping of free states held together by their common allegiance on terms of freedom and equality, and operating on a basis of consultation. The famous South African leader said it was quite possible that another great European calamity might arise, and he therefore urged that the position of the British Empire be defined. The European war, he said, arose from the fact that the position of some of the great powers was not clearly defined.

Gibbon's Friends Believe Dempsey Will Be Outboxed

ST. PAUL.—When Jack Dempsey answers the bell in the prize ring at Shelby, Mont., July 4, to defend his heavyweight title, he will meet a style of opposition somewhat different from that he has faced since he took the crown from Jess Willard.

In Tommy Gibbons of St. Paul, the champion will find a boxer of consummate skill, a man with a "mean punch," not afraid to mix in a toe-to-toe exchange, and a ring veteran who has never been knocked off his feet.

Gibbons fans recognize the power of the champion, the danger in his terrific rushes. But they look to Gibbons' boxing ability to go a long way toward offsetting Dempsey's rushing tactics.

These same boxing fans, who have been fighting the Dempsey-Gibbons battle in clubs and other places of congregation ever since the word came that the fight was "on," are not, as a whole, boasting of what Gibbons will do.

It would be an exaggeration to say that in any considerable quarter of the challenger's home town there is confidence that he will defeat Dempsey. His own brother, Mike Gibbons, once famed as "The Phantom" in middleweight circles, does not feel that confidence.

But there is always "the chance," and in Gibbons' hands that prospect brightens for many. And if there is no confidence, there is hope, and that to the fight. Victory for Gibbons, however, would be a surprise in his home town.

All of which does not detract from the ability of the challenger, for the homefolk hold the view that no one is better qualified to test the merit of the champion, not even excepting Luis

Would Alleviate Hunger Pangs of Philippine Pagans

MANILA.—Governor General Wood has taken steps to bring about the economic development of the Mountain Province where the people, who belong to the non-Christian tribes, are engaged in what the chief executive terms "a desperate struggle for a bare existence." In a communication to Jose Sanvictores, director of the bureau of non-Christian tribes, General Wood asks that a plan be prepared which would eliminate the handicaps to the economic improvement of those regions.

The governor's communication to Mr. Sanvictores is based on a report submitted by Lieutenant Colonel Gordon Johnston, member of the governor's staff, who has just made an inspection of the Mountain Province in company with Colonel Edward L. Munson, United States army.

General Wood in his communication says: "I have always been very much concerned about the economic development of these people. In the course of 2,000 years they have been able to reclaim from their mountains a limited area of land to which water can be brought. In part this is due to the fact that these people, as well as a very high death rate, prevented undue increase in population."

Working Out Plan To Begin Forestry Experiments N. C.

RALEIGH.—Co-operation of all

forces working for the care of North Carolina forests was secured at a recent conference at Raleigh. The offer of Dr. B. W. Kilbre to permit the use of the woodlands on the Branch Experiment Station farms as areas for forest demonstrations was accepted by Director E. H. Frithling, head of the Appalachian forest experiment station.

Work of this branch of the U. S. forest service will now be extended to the different section of North Carolina in which these farms are located as soon as funds are available. State Forester J. S. Holmes promises fire protection to areas where experiments are to be made and to those areas where we plan to start intensive management of farm forests and the co-operative marketing of their products," says H. M. Curran, extension farm forester of the state college.

Curran states that Holmes' office is expending \$25,000 of state and federal funds for fire protection. Michigan spends \$400,000. North Carolina cut 1-14 billion feet of lumber in 1920, while Michigan cut only 3-4 of a billion. The forest area of the two states are about equal at the value of the lumber crops, the one to produce them and the ease of protection are all in favor of North Carolina "with proper care and protection, our forests will annually bring 100 million dollars worth of new wealth to the state," says Curran.

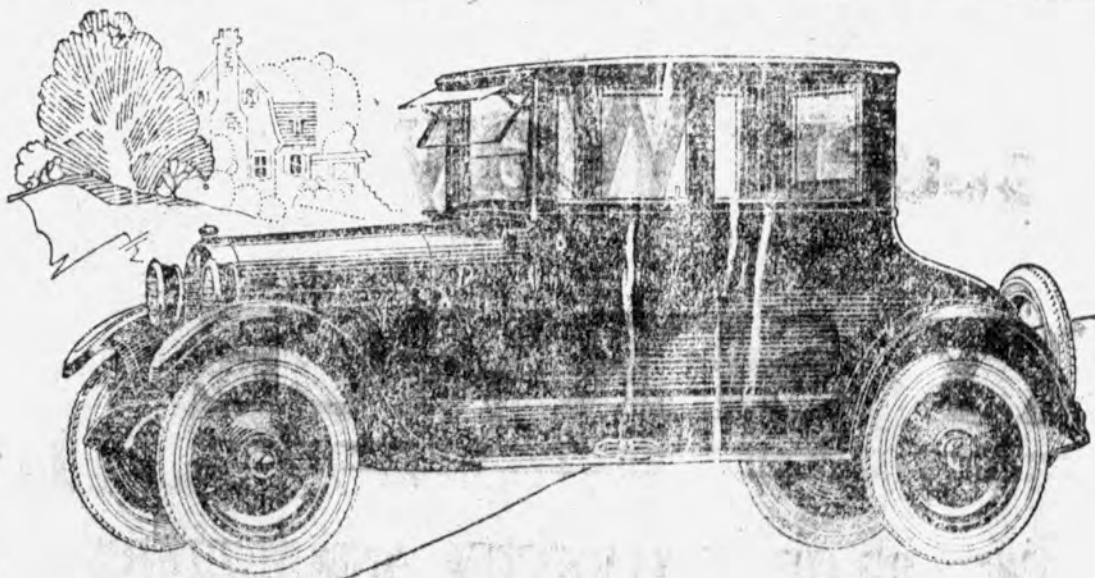
