DRASTIC COURSE TALKED

Federal Officials May Seize Foreign Ships Carrying Liquor

WASHINGTON, June 28.—Treasury officials again conferred today over the proposal to apply the confiscatory provisions of the Volstead law to foreign ships bringing liquor into the ports of the United States.

It is understood that officials are agreed that it is the only course left open in the circumstances, but it was not indicated when a decision would be reached.

Continued, if not studied violation of the court's decision by an increasing number of foreign vessels entering New York with large quantities of beverage liquors under seals, it was said, apparently made necessary the drastic penalty of seizure, not only of the contraband beverage, but of the ships themselves.

Practice Must Cease. Officials declared privately that the present practice could not be tolerated much longer and steps to invoke the extreme penalties of the Volstead act were said to be imminent.

High enforcement officials, at a series of conferences today, discussed the situation and steps necessary to enforce observance of the nation's prohibition laws as applied to foreign vessels within American territorial waters.

New Instructions Issued.

A new treasury regulation was reported to have been drafted providing for additional instructions to customs officers to seize all vessels found bringing in beverage liquors, even under foreign customs seals, after adequate notice to foreign governments of the new and more drastic policy. The instructions also would provide for the arrest of the captains of such ships.

Expect Decision Soon. No official announcement of the government's plans was made today, information of the consideration of the ship seizure policy developing from the official conferences. It was stated, however, that an official statement on the question might be interpreted in a very few days.

Railroad Loses Control of Coal Mining Holdings

PHILADELPHIA, June 28.—A decree of the federal court based on the third modified plan submitted by the Philadelphia & Reading railway, segregating the railroad from its coal properties was signed in the federal court here today. The railroad is ordered to effect the dissolution in six months from June 27.

Russia-Japan Seek Basis Trade Pact

TOKIO, June 28.—Overtures undertaken between Japan and Soviet Russia in an effort to find a common basis on which the third conference to establish trade relations between the two countries may be valued, opened formally today.

Woman's Part On Farms to be Shown At State Meeting

RALEIGH, June 28.—What farm women in North Carolina are accomplishing will be the feature of the farm women's section of the farmers and farm women convention at State College July 31 to Aug. 2. Mrs. Jane S. McKimmon, supervisor of home demonstration work of the agricultural extension service, has announced.

Plans for this department of the convention now are being developed by Mrs. McKimmon and several speakers have been named. Mrs. Lacy McArthur, Cumberland county, will preside as president of the farm women's section and Mrs. J. B. Mason will head the home bureaus.

On the first afternoon, a roll call by counties will be one of the first events on the program. Each representative will tell what is being accomplished in home demonstration work in her respective county. Short talks on planning family meals, balancing the family diet and other subjects relating to foods and nutrition will follow.

Mrs. Palmer Jerman, president of the North Carolina federation of women's clubs, will be one of the speakers of the convention, having as her subject, "The Union of North Carolina Women for the Good of North Carolina." Mrs. R. R. Cotton, mother of women's clubs in the state and now honorary president of the organization, also is scheduled to make a brief speech.

Men Compelled to Abandon Test Flight

SAN DIEGO, Cal., June 28.—Capt. Lowell H. Smith and Lieut. John B. Richter, army aviators, who early today took the air in an attempt to set up a number of world's aviation records, were forced to descend at 10:25 o'clock this morning due to the generators of their motor having burned out. Smith and Richter had been in the air slightly less than 6 hours, when compelled to abandon their record efforts.

To Probe Charge of Flogging Ga. Woman

DOUGLAS, GA., June 28.—At least one white woman of this county, Zeila Rawlings, has appealed to Governor Hardwick for protection, following a number of beatings administered to women during the last few days.

Zeila Rawlings is not the mother of Milton Rawlings, paroled this week by Governor Hardwick, it was stated by Sheriff Tanner. The sheriff stated that he has placed six men under bond in connection with the whippings. The three women flogged are Mary Adams, "Sis" Rawlings and Mary Hightower.

Grower on Trial.

TAMPA, FLA., June 28.—Indications at the close of the first day's actual trial of Raymond O. Bennett, Jr., wealthy young citrus grower charged with second degree murder in connection with the slaying of Herbert M. Caruthers the night of May 23, were that the state would complete its direct examination of witnesses today.

Will Give Honor Insignia to World To 120th Infantry

RALEIGH, June 28.—All members of North Carolina's delegation in congress and state legislators and officials, have been invited to attend the ceremony at Camp Gann, July 19, marking the presentation of the insignia of the grade of Chevalier, Portuguese Order of Torre Espada (tower and sword) to the 120th infantry, which was a part of the Thirteenth Division, United States army, overseas during the world war, Adjutant General J. Van B. Metts announced today.

The ceremony will be held during the regular summer encampment of the reorganized 120th Infantry, National Guard. Brigadier General A. J. Bowley, U. S. A., commanding officer at Fort Bragg, N. C., has been designated by the war department to decorate the colors of the infantry. Representatives of the Portuguese embassy in Washington are expected to be present.

Notification of the honor awarded the organization was given several months ago through official channels in Washington. Plans for the presentation ceremony have been under consideration by headquarters in Washington and Raleigh since then. Adjutant General, will be among those present representing the headquarters of the North Carolina National Guard.

Arrest of Bank Employee Follows Her Return Home

ELIZABETH CITY, June 28.—News of the arrest in Great Falls, Montana, of John D. Sykes, Jr., former city collection teller of the First and Citizens National Bank, wanted here for embezzlement of more than \$25,000 of the bank's funds, caused more of a sensation in Elizabeth City than anything that has happened since it became known here last September that he had absconded.

However, developments in the Sykes case have been looked for here for the last two weeks since the return to the city of Penelope Lyons, cotton mill section grass widow, who disappeared from the city shortly before Sykes left and with whom he was believed to have been infatuated. Learning that the Lyons woman had returned home, agents of the department of Justice came to the city and subjected her to a searching inquiry.

Whipping Boss On Trial for Murder Alleges "Frame Up"

LAKE CITY, FLA., June 28.—Charges that the state conducted a school for instructing its witnesses, under "the manipulations" of G. Grimson, assistant attorney general of North Dakota, were made by the defense during the trial of Thomas Walter Higgins, convicted whipping boss, charged with the murder of Martin Tabert, of North Dakota. The defense alleged that funds "sent down here from North Dakota" were being generously distributed among the state's witnesses and also charged that Grimson freely distributed pamphlets among the witnesses as to his findings as the result of an investigation conducted by him into the death of Tabert.

General Booth To Be Buried In Home City In Hard Coal Supply

NEW ORLEANS, June 28.—The funeral of General A. B. Booth, adjutant-general and chief of staff of the United Confederate Veterans, who died here last night from complications following an injury, will be held tomorrow at the First Methodist church. The body will be buried here.

No Cotton Market July 4.

NEW YORK, June 28.—The New York Cotton Exchange announced today it would adjourn at noon Friday July 20, and remain closed until Monday morning, July 23, when it would reopen in its new board rooms in the Cotton Exchange Building.

FLINT, MICH., June 28.—Earl Santer, 23, arrested in a rooming house today after an exchange of shots with four police officers who sought him in connection with the killing of Avery Hudson, motorcycle policeman, was shot in the shoulder when he opened fire on them.

\$738,000 Asked To Build Farmville-Wilson-Bynum Road

The state highway commission received bids yesterday at Raleigh on 28 projects. On the Wilson-Bynum-Farmville road, nearly 20 miles long, the largest single bid ever submitted as low figure was received. The figures for the roadway and bridges are \$738,000.

The bid on the Elizabethton bridge is the largest cost for a structure of that type ever offered. The estimated cost is placed at \$417,000.

There were 128 bids, and many of them were regarded as excessive. Most of them will be rejected because of that fact, it is believed. However, it is expected that a few contracts will be awarded within the next few days.

Methodist Pastors Holding Conference

HIGH POINT, June 28.—The past-tow conference of the Methodist Protestant Church opened its first session here last night with Rev. J. R. Pritchard of Henderson, presiding. There is an unusually large delegation of the ministers from all sections of the state in the meeting, and indications are to the effect that this will prove to be the record attendance as well as the most interesting in the history of summer conferences.

This morning Dr. William J. Thompson, Drew Theological Seminary, Madison, New Jersey, gave the first of a series of lectures.

Big Fight Movie Rights Are Placed

SHELBY, Mont., June 28.—Disposition of motion picture rights for the Dempsey-Gibbons heavyweight championship fight July Fourth at Los Angeles company for \$5,000 was announced tonight. After dickering all day with local officials, Jack Kerns, Dempsey's manager, today turned his interest in the films, announced as thirty-five per cent of the proceeds, into the hands of Mayor Jim Johnson, treasurer of the fight, Loy J. Molumby, American Legion commander, Eddie Kane, Gibbons' manager, and Mike Collins, matchmaker, for disposal as they saw fit. They closed the deal with the Los Angeles company.

Coast Rum Patrol Strength is Increased

NEWPORT NEWS, June 28.—An other sentinel was added to the rum guard off the Virginia capes today with the arrival of the coast guard cutter Apache from Baltimore. The Apache joined the Mascoutin and Manning in the patrol of Hampton Roads. Two other cutters, the Pamlico and the Yamacraw, are held in reserve in the harbor.

A group of bankers representing a number of the leading financial institutions of the mid-west and eastern centers are coming to Greenville tomorrow as the guests of the Chamber of Commerce, it was announced today. The party will be taken on an inspection tour to various county points contiguous to Greenville, and will be entertained at a barbecue dinner at the Country Club.

Paul L. Clodfelter and M. K. Blount, in charge of entertainment arrangements have provided diversified amusements in connection with the dinner. One interesting feature will be music by a famed colored orchestra.

The financiers represent big interests in New York, Boston, Cleveland, Chicago, Pittsburgh, Philadelphia, Washington, Baltimore and other large money centers. The delegation is making a special trip to certain points in North Carolina to get at first hand a grasp on the rapid development the state is making. The bankers were entertained by Governor Morrison, at Raleigh, yesterday.

A number of men prominent in the business life of Greenville and Pitt county have been invited to meet the delegation. Special efforts are being made to make the visit memorable.

It is understood that several informal talks will follow the dinner when several of the visitors will give expression as to how North Carolina and Pitt county has impressed them.

Record Number Take State Medical Exam

RALEIGH, June 28.—One hundred and twelve medical students, representing twelve states, began their i-Mad-sen-cmfwy cmfwp p pp examination before the North Carolina Board of Medical examiners yesterday in their application for license to practice medicine in this state. Twenty-five reciprocity applicants for license were examined Monday and Tuesday to determine their fitness to practice in this state.

Grounded Liner Is Still on the Beach

PENSACOLA, FLA., June 28.—At 6 o'clock this morning a telephone message from the Santa Rosa Island life saving station announced that the Mallory liner Altamaha, which went aground on the outside beach yesterday morning at 2 o'clock, had moved closer up to the shore with the wash of the heavy seas.

Indicements Against 200 Miners Dismissed

INDIANAPOLIS, June 28.—Indicements against 200 coal operators and officials of the United Mine Workers and Mining companies returned Feb. 25, 1921, charging conspiracy to violate the Sherman anti-trust law were dismissed in federal court today, upon motion of Attorney General Daugherty.

Public Against Cut In Hard Coal Supply

CO-OPERATIVE SYSTEM STRIPS INDIVIDUAL RIGHTS FROM THE GROWERS, DEALER DECLARES

Grayson Thornton, Huntington, W. Va., has been operating a large warehouse in Huntington, which sells from eight to 10 million pounds of tobacco annually. Thornton asserts the pool has had as high as 50 organizers in his home section at one time, but only obtained a small percentage of growers to support the co-operative system. He has been engaged in the tobacco business for 25 years, and is active in keeping farmers informed with marketing conditions and looking after the welfare of their tobacco crop.

Here is how he compares the methods of the co-operative plan to the custom that obtained before its entrance into the field. He says:

In the early history of the tobacco industry of our country tobacco growers delivered their crops to commission merchants. These merchants made small samples representing each of the parcel of tobacco, and offered these samples for sale either privately or on what was known as tobacco exchanges. These exchanges were attended personally by the owners of the then few and small factories and, consequently, offered the minimum of competition.

As the industry grew and increased in volume it became obvious that other ways and means would have to be adopted to handle the larger crops.

The next step was the establishment of the auction hogshead market in the various large centers, with the system of bonded samplers or inspectors, licensed auctioneers, clerks, etc., with factory representatives or buyers attending these sales. This system continued for a long time and still exists in some sections in a small way, but it was found to possess some serious defects, namely: growers were compelled to pack their crops in hogsheads and often ship long distances from home; not be able to be present when it was sold; waiting more or less long times for their returns; expenses of packing and shipping heavy; opportunity for dishonest persons to under or over sample these hogsheads, thereby creating both loss and dissatisfaction to both the grower and the factories.

In the meantime the industry continued to prosper and increase, and it again became necessary to devise more extensive and efficient means of selling this important crop, hence the birth of the present loose leaf auction system, which retained all of the good features of the older system and eliminated the objectionable ones, and added new features to take care of the vastly enlarged conditions, with absolute fairness and justice to

all. Its advantages consisted of establishing ready markets practically at the door of every farmer. The grower does not have to pack and ship his crop, but delivers it in person, in his wagon, to his warehouseman; sees it sold and usually the same day he delivers it, he gets his entire proceeds in cash. He also has the privilege of not accepting the first price it brings if he feels it did not bring the market price, and offering it again at another time.

The factories have the advantage of examining every pound they bid on and grading to fill their own especial requirements. Each factory has their own individual representative on each market who openly bid against each other on all tobacco offered, which provides the strongest competition possible.

There are many auction warehouses and practically all are independent of each other. Their only income consists of fees, or commissions, based on the price the crop brings, so that these two vital conditions create the strongest possible warehouse competition, with the inevitable result that in order to succeed each warehouseman uses every means within his power to obtain the largest possible price for his customers; to provide the best conditions and render the greatest service, as his very existence depends on the success and satisfaction of the growers.

A few objectionable features crept into this system, such as pin-hooking, etc. But the immutable law of competition compelled both warehouses and buyers to eliminate this practice. The loose leaf warehouseman's expenses are numerous and heavy, his commissions are small, usually averaging around one cent per pound, for which he provides warehouses, auctioneers, bookkeepers, clerks, labor, and supplies the finances to the farmer until the factory reimburses or pays him, and many other expenses.

During my 25 years' experience I have never known a warehouseman to grow rich from the warehouse business. It cannot be done. Also a warehouseman is in no sense a middleman, as he receives no profit as such from either the farmer or the buyer. He simply provides a means through which the farmer and the buyer are brought face to face to do their own bargaining and trading in the fairest and most open manner possible. His compensation is small and he is usually wrong.

Under the co-operative system we revert back to the tobacco industry, but with many EVIL and OBJECTIONABLE FEATURES added. Among them, ELIMINATION OF ALL COMPETITION (EXCEPT WRANGLING AMONG THEIR SALARIED OFFICIALS) both as to buyers and warehousemen, arbitrary and compulsory grading by men with NO INTEREST OTHER THAN THEIR SALARIES, large openings and opportunity for GRAFT and FAVORITISM, all INDIVIDUAL RIGHTS TAKEN FROM THE GROWER as to what or other sums his directors may feel inclined to take, and the unfortunate member is forced to comply with all the above and much more, without RECOURSE or COMPLAINT, besides waiting for his HARD EARNED MONEY for UNKNOWN LENGTHS OF TIME and RECEIVING it in SMALL SUMS and DRIBBLES WHEN HE DOES GET IT.

It is the history of all business that no business ever succeeds that DEPENDS WHOLLY ON SALARIED MANAGERS with no other interest or incentive other than their salaries. The auction system is more soundly established today than ever before and it is with us to stay as long as the tobacco industry lasts.

REAL PATRIOTIC OBSERVANCE OF JULY 4

On July Fourth, this nation will celebrate Independence Day. Cannon will roar, bells ring, salutes be given the flag, speeches made, fireworks displayed, a general outpouring of patriotism and gladness will mark the "day of days."

It is right and fitting that we thus commemorate the birth of this country. But it was never right and fitting that we make of it a day for the slaughter of the innocents, a day of human sacrifice, a day of agony to little children, and torture to their parents.

It is not so long ago that the universal use of fireworks and firecrackers, toy cannon, and gunpowder, left a train of accidents, deaths, burnings, maimings and blindness as the sad reminder that we celebrated, indeed, "not wisely, but too well."

In the larger cities the custom has had an enforced passing; wise police laws prohibit the sale or use of explosives in unskilled hands, and demand that the burning of powder be a municipal, rather than a private privilege.

But all over the country are smaller towns

and villages, where the city fathers say, "Oh, let the children have their fun," as if any good kind of fun to use to show reverence for the flag and gratitude for liberty!

An Independence Day which is only an excuse to make a noise, would better not be celebrated. Independence Day celebrations which foster patriotism, which brings forth and emphasize the glory of liberty, the privilege of freedom, the priceless heritage of heroism and patriotism which the fathers of this country left us; they are well worth while. But that may be done, and better done, without risking a single finger, a single eye, a single life, by leaving the loveliness of patriotic fireworks and the thrill of the boom of cannon and bomb, to skilled hands hired by municipalities that want them.

U. S. Will Extend Marketing News Service In State

RALEIGH, N. C., June 28.—Extension of the market news service of the United States department of agriculture, involving the establishment of one of the largest commercial leased telegraph wire and radio telegraph systems in the world today was announced by the department in a bulletin received here. Raleigh, Richmond, Clemson College and Jacksonville are contemplated as points on the southeastern circuit, in addition to Atlanta as a branch office. The main extension, according to the announcement, is from Kansas City to the Pacific coast, with new offices at Denver, Salt Lake City and Portland, Oregon. In the southeast, a branch office is to be established at Atlanta. Already field stations are operating in this territory, covering the major producing districts. Offices at other southern points, it is stated, are being considered. "Additional branch offices for reporting the markets on fruits and vegetables will be opened early in July at Denver, Salt Lake City, Portland and Atlanta," reads the bulletin. "Offices are now located at San

Francisco and Los Angeles. A live-stock and meats service will have additional branch offices at Denver, Salt Lake City, Portland and Atlanta. The leased wire will run into San Francisco and the entire west coast will be effectively covered both by radio and wire telegraph from San Francisco.

Home Economics Education Work Will Be Widened

RALEIGH, N. C., June 28.—Effective the first week in July, the State division for vocational education will start a system of instruction through co-operation with manufacturing industries in North Carolina, Alabama being the first county in which the work will be inaugurated, it was announced tonight.

Six mill villages, in which the Osprey, Altamahaw, Glencoe, Carolina, Hopedale, Aurora and Haw River mills are located, will be the scene of the first instruction under the new plans. Miss Margaret Jones will be in charge of the classes which will continue throughout the year. Each village will be organized into a club class and will meet with the instructor twice a week, their work being conducted on the short unit basis, six to ten lessons composing a unit.

Meal planning, child care and feeding, dress making and other phases of home economics will be taught by the teacher, and through a broad promotion of this program the living conditions in mill villages are expected to be greatly improved, it was stated by Miss Margaret Edwards, supervisor of vocational home economics in the state.

In Mecklenburg, the Chadwick-Hoskins Mills and the Highland Park mills are among those co-operating in preparations to start the instruction. Manufacturing industries in Gaston, Buncombe and Davie counties also are assisting in the work.

Famed Specialists Compare Notes At Medical Gathering

SAN FRANCISCO.—The 15 sections of the American Medical association, now in session here, opened their separate meetings on the various specialties today. In the section on medicine Dr. Walter M. Boothby of the Mayo Clinic told how the utilization of food by the body is changed when a patient has exophthalmic goiter.

"Such people burn up much more food material, so that the net cost of their muscular work is about twice that of normal persons" he said. "This has a definite relationship to the care of such patients, not only under ordinary circumstances but also in connection with preparing them for necessary operation."

Dr. George Blumer, formerly professor of medicine in Yale University, told the convention that infectious jaundice was becoming more prevalent in the United States. Professor James M. Anders of the University of Pennsylvania urged a more frequent use of water by the physicians. Both cold and hot water applications to the surface of the body have definite effects which can be used in the treatment of disease, he said. Professor Anders urged the equipment of every hospital with adequate installations of apparatus for making the fullest use of water in treatment.

He responded at once, it is said, and after he left the hospital continued the treatment at his residence here.

**ALBERTA COLLEGE GRADUATES
FIRST WOMAN AGRICULTURIST**
EDMONTON.—The degree of bachelor of science has been awarded Miss Sheila Maryatt, the first woman graduate in agriculture from the University of Alberta. She completed the prescribed three-year agricultural course with honors in a class of several hundred men.

Miss Maryatt, sister of the Hon. Irene Parly, minister without portfolio in the Alberta provincial cabinet, has announced that she will take up a quarter section near Alix, Alta., and will apply scientific agricultural methods to the land. Miss Maryatt believes that women can succeed as farmers just as well as men.

Detective Turns to Science.
LYONS, France.—France always is interested in developing modern methods of tracing down criminals, and M. Locard, head of the Lyons detective bureau, is giving his attention to dust.

Recently he was confronted with three prisoners whose occupations it was necessary to ascertain despite their efforts at concealment. M. Locard placed the clothes of each man in a large paper bag, shook them, got the dust thus dislodged from the bag, analyzed it and determined that one man was a mason, another a carpenter, and the third a coal dealer.

England's Grist of Letters.
LONDON.—In the 12 months just ended the British postoffice handled the enormous number of 3,300,000,000 letters, 500,000,000 postcards, 1,500,000,000 printed papers, 175,000,000 newspapers and 120,000,000 parcels. The total is 5,595,000,000 pieces of mail.

New Sanatorium for Woodmen.

SAN ANTONIO, Tex.—A feature of the annual convention of the Woodmen of the World here early in July, will be the dedication of the order's new war memorial sanatorium, erected at San Angelo for members of the society afflicted with tuberculosis. The hospital will care for 1,500 patients, and is the first of four to be established in four states for the treatment of tuberculosis.

HUGE AIRSHIP PLANNED FOR HAMBURG-NEW YORK SERVICE

LONDON.—An airship to carry 300 passengers on a regular service between Hamburg and New York, says the London Daily News, is now in course of construction. The ship will be more than 900 feet long, fitted with 12 engines of 260 horsepower each, giving a speed sufficient to make the journey between the two cities in 45 hours.

When not in flight the plane is designed to float on the surface of the docks at Hamburg and New York. **London Ball Game Draws 3,000**
LONDON.—The first baseball game of the season in London attracted a crowd of 3,000. It was a close game, or "match," as the British papers called it, the team of American students at Oxford losing, 5 to 4, to the American Legion team of London.

Labor Department Shows Big Progress Throughout State

RALEIGH. — Reflecting general progress in North Carolina industries, the complete 33rd report of the department of labor and printing was made public here today by Commissioner M. L. Shipman. Delay in presenting the completed report in printed form to the public was explained by the commissioner as a result of legislative printing having precedence over the other material in the state printing office.

The report covers practically every industry in which North Carolinians are engaged and contains what is described by manufacturer, as a mass of valuable data on industrial conditions throughout the state. Governor Morrison received the original copy of the report December 15, 1922.

North Carolina, says the chapter devoted to cotton, woolen, silk and cordage mills, "ranks second in the manufacture of cotton goods in the states of the Union and maintains its lead over the other southern states." This industry leads all others in the state in the number of wage earners and in the total amount paid in salaries and wages. There are three cordage, three silk and seven woolen mills in the state, according to the report.

Knitting mills come second in the textile industries and during the last ten years, the number of establishments engaged in this business has more than doubled, the report says. 142 mills being recorded as active.

Henderson Ready For Medical Meet

The address of welcome will be delivered by H. B. Perry with a response by Dr. J. B. Wright in behalf of the society. Dr. H. H. Bass then will deliver the president's address. Rev. Isaac Wayne Hughes will give the opening prayer.

Seek Accurate Data Wind Pressure on Sails

BOSTON. — Important changes in the art of sail cutting may result from experiments being conducted by Professor Edward P. Warner, of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, on a small boat in the Charles River Basin. Realizing that radical alterations in hull designs have resulted from years of experiments and measurements of resistances, and that the art of sail making had not kept pace with boat construction, a small group of yachtsmen about a year ago began to discuss the effect of wind on sails.

After investigation they came to the conclusion that no accurate data on the subject had ever been compiled and that "rule of thumb" methods still prevailed.

POISON TAKEN FROM 24,000 REPTILES TO SUPPLY SCIENTISTS

BROWNSVILLE, Tex. — Three glass jars, hermetically sealed, each filled with yellowish crystals, repose on a shelf in the office of W. A. ("Snake") King, at "Snakeville," on the outskirts of Brownsville. The crystals in each jar represent the collection of poison from approximately 8,000 rattlesnakes, and, according to Mr. King, there is enough poison in the jars to kill several regiments, if it were properly applied.

King annually buys and sells thousands of rattlesnakes, and at "Snakeville" there are at all times hundreds of rattlers of all sizes and descriptions. For several years he has been collecting poison from the reptiles, crystallizing it in a small kiln and sending the crystals to scientists in all parts of the world who are endeavoring to find a remedy for snake bite.

Few people in Brownsville realize the volume of business which flows through "Snakeville." They daily see scores of boxes labeled "Dangerous Reptiles; Handle With Care," leave and enter the express office, but it is an accustomed-grown sight. Dozens of Mexican snake catchers are required to keep the stream of reptiles moving into King's pens.

Dr. Spivak stated that a study of the diets of a large number of families indicated that the caloric value of the daily meals increased, breakfast having the smallest value, luncheon the next and dinner the largest.

INDIANS LOSE TRIBAL ARTS BY WHITE MAN'S CULTURE

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla. — The rapid adoption of the civilization of the white man has resulted in the loss to the Five Civilized Tribes of at least six of the principal arts of their forefathers, according to J. B. Thoburn, of the Oklahoma Historical Society.

The lost arts include those of pottery and crockery making, the making of horn utensils and ornaments, the use of Indian weapons and their manufacture, the tanning of hides, the construction of dwelling houses and the preparation of foods by Indian methods, Thoburn said.

"If every one will take care of the pets during the warm months, there will be no fear of hydrophobia, or rabies in any American city," according to the society. "It should be remembered that a dog does not perspire like a human being, and that the only way he can relieve himself of the excessive heat is by opening his mouth and panting. Frequently a person sees a dog lolling its tongue trying to expell heat and exertion and a cry of mad dog goes up. The original cause of the trouble, with very few exceptions, was that the dog was making himself comfortable."

India Reports Good Crops. LONDON.—According to advices from India the spring crops in that country are the finest that have been seen in many years. Throughout Northern India the granaries, which are well stocked as a result of last autumn's excellent harvest are overflowing.

Prices have fallen steadily for the last six months and now show signs of touching lower levels than any which have been reached for ten years. Economically the poor man in India today is in a far stronger position than he has been for some years.

BRITISH UNEMPLOYMENT SHOWS MARKED DECREASE

LONDON.—A fall in the number of unemployed on May 14 to 1,168,600 from 1,218,267 April 30, is considered by officials of the Ministry of Labor to be significant as indicating a steady revival in trade.

GIBBONS OUTRANKS ALL OTHER BOXERS DEMPSEY HAS MET

NEW YORK—When Tommy Gibbons, St. Paul heavy-weight, steps into the ring at Shelby, Montana, July 4 against Jack Dempsey, the champion, he may be compared in some respects to "Gentleman Jim" Corbett when that dapper boxing wizard squared off against John L. Sullivan at New Orleans in 1892.

Gibbons' chances against Dempsey have been belittled by a majority of the experts, and indeed, the Minnesota boxer appears heavy puncher enough to flatten the Coloradoan. But like his middleweight brother Mike, "The Phaltonn," Tommy is a master boxer, cool in combat, always clever, always fast, and a puncher of no mean ability.

At least a year older than Dempsey, an inch or two shorter and really a light-heavyweight, Gibbons may not be able to stand before the champion for 15 rounds. Except in age—Corbett was much younger than Sullivan when they met at New Orleans—Gibbons and Dempsey will be like "Gentleman Jim" and "Terrible John L." in that famous scrap of 31 years ago.

Sullivan's terrific punching power, like that of the Dempsey of today, caused many a sturdy opponent's knees to quake when he thought of it, and many of them were defeated by fear before Sullivan laid a glove on them. Not so Corbett. When Jim took his corner at New Orleans John L. scowled, shuffled his feet and spat on the ring floor, his customary greeting. Jim laughed and chatted with ringsiders as the gloves were being pushed upon his hands. He paid no attention to Sullivan.

Warsaw to Have Skyscraper.

WARSAW—This will be the first city in Europe to have a skyscraper of 20 stories, which will be completed next year. It is being built in terrace, becoming narrower every four stories. The building will have 1,000 office rooms.

Find Old Time Table.

HENDERSON—An old time table of the Raleigh and Gaston railroad, dated September 16, 1878, has been found in an old house being torn down here. The table reveals that no trains were operated by the road on Sundays and that during the week days only one passenger train was run. The table found is one of the sixth edition put out by the company.

PUBLIC SCHOOLS URGED TO TEACH HEALTH THEORIES

SAN FRANCISCO, June 28—The social organization was compared to an intricate machine by Dr. Oscar Dowling, state health officer of Louisiana, at a meeting of the Preventive and Industrial Medicine section of the American Medical association convention here today.

Dr. Dowling said that for proper operation, health is fundamental. "Health implies right conditions of growth and development for the child, proper heredity, prenatal care of the mother, recreational direction and an ideal environment," he added. "In securing these results every part of the body politic bears a reciprocal responsibility." He emphasized particularly the need for teaching the principles of hygiene, citizenship and the right social order in the public schools.

The discussion was continued by Dr. Frederick D. Stricker of Portland, Oregon, with a plea for more efficiency and less spectacular demonstration in public health work. He compared such exploitation to "Blue Sky" as it relates to stocks and bonds.

The session closed with a paper by Dr. John Sundwall of the University of Michigan, who urged constructive health activities in the public schools.

Gideons to Meet.

WINSTON-SALEM.—Winston-Salem will extend an invitation to the national Gideon convention, meeting in Oklahoma City, July 19-22, to meet next year in this city. J. H. Early has been elected president of the organization here and M. B. Fields selected as the delegate to attend the Oklahoma City meet for the purpose of inviting the Gideons to meet here next year.

Editor to Preach.

CHARLOTTE.—A newspaper editor will stop writing editorials long enough to share honors with a college professor and two ministers in occupying the pulpit of the St. John's Baptist church here the four Sundays from July 22 to August 12, when Rev. Joseph A. Ganes, pastor will be on his vacation. The editor is J. Ron McKissick, of the Greenville, S. C.

Soft Coal Miners Enjoy Homes Rented For Twelve Dollars A Month; Amusement Costs Are Reported Low



The men—and women and children, too—who live in the bituminous coal fields live well. They have advantages of which many city dwellers might well be jealous.

The lower picture shows a typical vine-covered cottage in which a mine worker and his family lives in one of the Colorado fuel fields. It has, like nearly all of them, a yard and garden space, is clean, comfortable, and attractive in every way.

Coal companies build these houses for their employees. In former years the experiment has been tried of selling the houses to the miners, but this has been discontinued as it was thought to be unfair because of the nature of the coal mining industry. The average life of a coal

mine is twenty-five years, and when the coal is worked out, the community often dies. The companies now provide the houses.

For these houses, the miners pay at a rate running from \$1 to \$2 per room each month. Usually the higher figure obtains. This means that a comfortable six room house, with modern improvements, is rented by the mine worker for \$12 a month. Can you match this anywhere else?

Consider, too, that at some mines the family fuel for cooking and heating is supplied for about \$1 a ton—at many mines it is entirely free—and that the lighting of the houses is done by the companies free of charge in nearly all cases.

The upper picture shows a visiting

nurse giving instruction to wives and daughters of miners in sewing. These visiting nurses are forming a more and more important phase in the life of a coal mining community—a phase which was unknown up until a few years ago.

When epidemics come, the visiting nurses have been the means of saving hundreds of lives of miners and their families.

Only nurses who can pass rigid tests are taken for this work. The first requirement is that they be graduate, registered, trained nurses. Two years' practical experience since graduation is required before they can be considered for the mine work, in most of the fields where they are used.

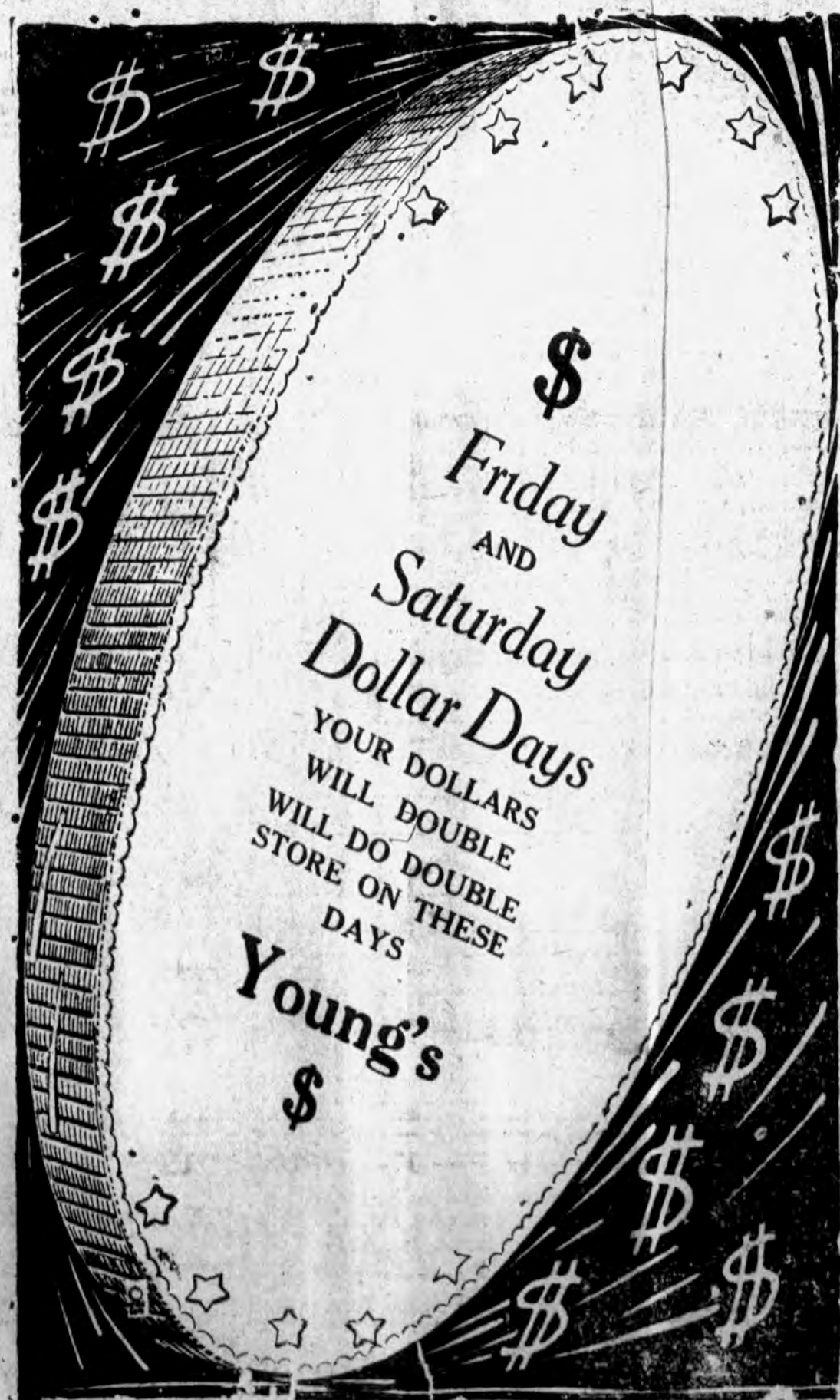

The two preceding years, the balances were against the country, which indicates a notable change in the currents of foreign trade during the last year.

NEW DREDGE MAY SAVE MILLIONS OF DOLLARS

CINCINNATI.—When the new government owned hydraulic dredge, now under construction at Charleston W. Va., glides down the skids into the Ohio river, some five months hence, a large government project will have started on its way.

This dredge is designed to eliminate a number of proposed dams in the Ohio river, which are now a part of the 54 government river dam projects on that stream. It does what government engineers confidently expect of it a saving of many millions of dollars will be realized.

To Repeat Wool Pool.

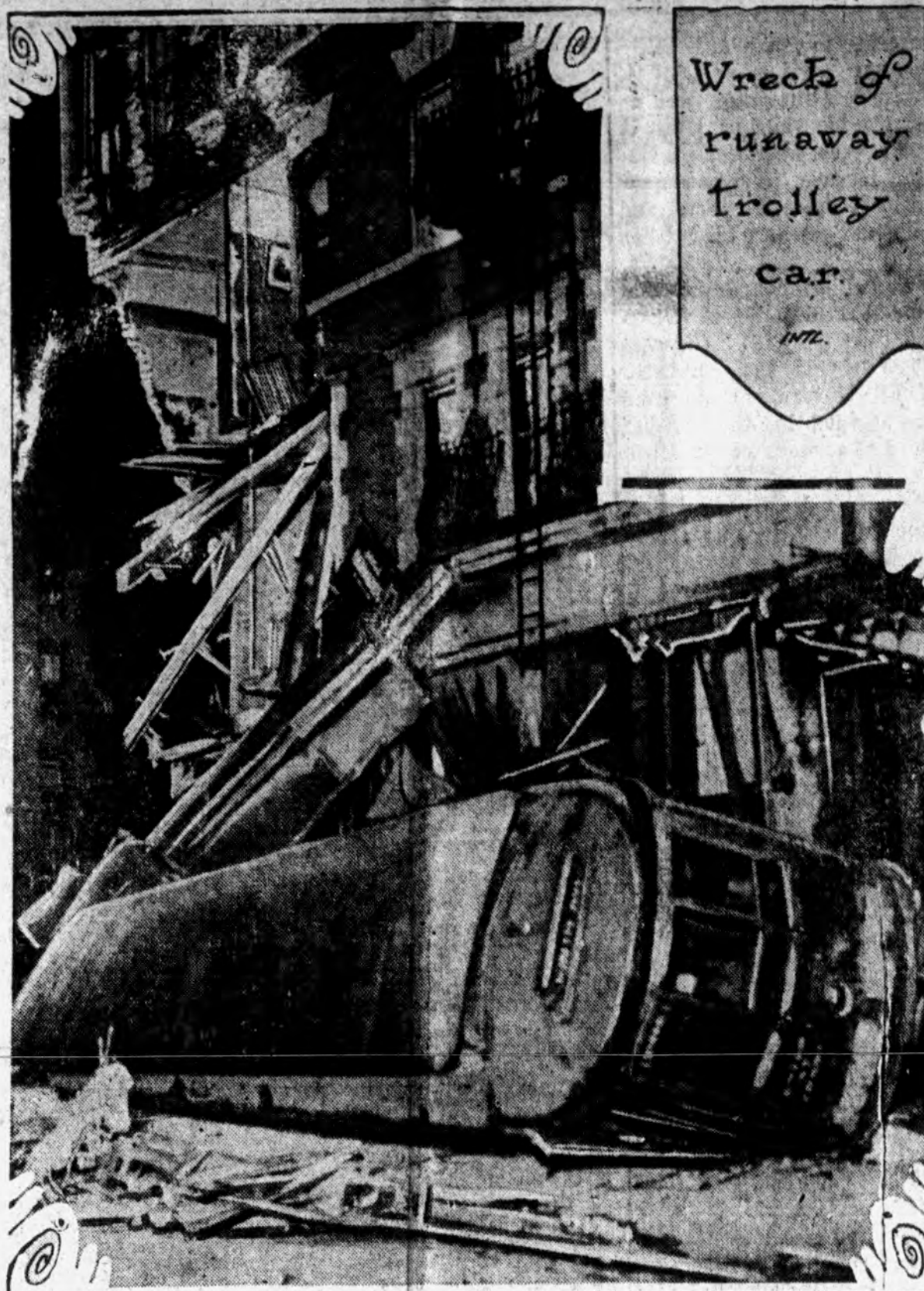

SAPIRO POOL IN TENNESSEE COUNTY, DREARY, DISMAL FAILURE, EDITOR ASSERTS

The Robertson County (Tenn.) Times in an analysis of the operation of the Sapiro pool in that section brings to light numerous illuminating facts that possibly farmers of Pitt County may be interested in absorbing.

Here is how the editor of that publication discusses the co-operative system:

The Sapiro pool in Robertson County is a dreary, dismal failure, and sooner or later its officials will be forced to end their swilling at the trough of greed, to answer for the harm they have wrought. The first disappointing payment made by the pool to the members was not a drop in the bucket, and it seems impossible that the third payment will ever be reached because of the enormous expense. The second payment will have to be large and come soon to save the face of the Sapiro crowd. We freely admit that we now see how Sapiro intended to raise the price of tobacco, and we now admit that the plan will work to a mathematical nicety if given a chance to live. But the high prices for the coming crop of tobacco will be caused by short production, and it will be the rich farmer who reaps the benefit, and not the poor tenant who here and now in the month of April isn't going to be able to set out a crop for 1923 because he didn't get his money from last year. By absolutely legislating the tenants out of a living and putting a monopoly on the growth of tobacco, Sapiro will be able to hold the price high.

The association is an association of men, run by officials who are men. If the plan is good, and the men are bad, the farmer loses; but when the plan has DEFECTS and the MEN are BAD, the FARMER STANDS A GOOD CHANCE TO BE RUINED.

And the men are bad. Rotten officials have done more toward ruining the Sapiro association than all else. Some of the officials are objectionable because of previous deals in the old association. Some officials are objectionable because they were pinhookers last year. Other officials hurt the association because they are incompetent. There are officials drawing big salaries who know nothing about tobacco, but who obtained favoritism pull. In addition to organizational reward, the family reunion feature has hurt.

The salaries are too high, and the farmer suffers; political SCHEMING and INTRIGUE are OTHER things the FARMER has to pay FOR; then the EXTRAVAGANCE of useless warehouses, of SUPERFLUOUS EMPLOYEES, of CAR-LOADS of BASKETS, of hauling expenses digs deeply into the farmer. The farmer has had a good taste of politics in the Bingham Act, he does not understand the Willett Act, and he sees evidence of politics in organizing.

So much for the men. A second thing that has ruined the Sapiro pool could have been prevented by honest dealing. There were too MANY FALSE PROMISES, too MUCH MISREPRESENTATION, and too MUCH BLUFFING.

For instance, many farmers signed the contract because they were told their first advance would be SIXTY PER CENT, and of which this first payment would be larger than the whole price paid last year. The breaking of this promise has practically ruined nearly half the membership. It is well remembered that Judge Bingham told his hearers that the big thing about the pool was that it was to be managed by growers themselves—that they could find intelligent men among them—"WHEN BEFORE in the HISTORY OF YOUR TOBACCO INDUSTRY has money been MANAGED by the men who grow the crop?" asked the MILITIAIRIST POLITICIAN. Then it is recalled that SAPIRO TOLD FARMERS THEY WOULD HAVE A SEPARATE POOL, AND that they would not have to wait for West-

ern Kentucky in order to get a final settlement.

The farmers were told that they were organizing against the big buyers. Most of them deny that this result was attained. One organizer told the farmers that the pool would watch the loose floors on prices, and then place association prices higher than that.

Many farmers signed in the assurance that the contracts would NOT BECOME BINDING unless TWO-THIRDS of the ACREAGE went into the pool. The BOOKS were OPENED FOR NEW MEMBERS as soon as it appeared that lawsuits were brewing, but the pool has not yet got one-third of our tobacco—and will NOT GET IT!

Considering the above points on officials and on the tobacco promises, we invite readers to check over each word to find an untrue, speculative or imaginary statement. If IT IS TRUE, the pool is a DISGRACE to the MEN who SPONSORED it and an INSULT to the INTELLIGENCE of the FARMER who joined it.

THE CONSTITUTION TINKERS

Radical leaders co-operating with a number of governors of states are planning a governor's conference early in the summer to get widespread backing for a program in the next congress, which will include several amendments to the constitution.

Some of the constitutional amendments already proposed are, a minimum wage law for women and children, similar to one which the United States supreme courts has just declared unconstitutional in the District of Columbia; abolishing the electoral college, curbing the power of the supreme court so that a vote of the people can reverse its decision or set them aside, and other measures of similar character.

The whole program of the dissatisfied elements in this nation is to get away from an orderly government of checks and balances in favor of a "popular" form of government which would be constantly changing in accordance with the pleasures of whims of temporary political leaders backed by either an unformed, misinformed or thoughtless majority vote.

It will take the level headed elements in both parties to defeat the constitution tinkers in the next congress.

POLITICS IN SCHOOLS

Governor Pinchot is being attacked for that most modern of political crimes—"putting the schools into politics." It is, of course, up to the good citizens of Pennsylvania to determine whether the Governor's failure to reappoint the former state superintendent of schools is calculated to bring about that unfortunate result, but the seriousness of the indictment is indisputable; and there was a time when such a charge was almost meaningless in the average community.

Not all school systems are yet out of politics, but everyone nowadays knows that they ought to be.

SING AGAIN, YE ANGELS

PEACE ON EARTH, GOOD WILL TO MEN is a sentiment that has been almost universally admired for nearly two thousand years. The angelic singers were applauded when they made this the theme of their Bethlehem chorus, but up to the present time it has had comparatively little effect on international life and a very restricted influence on individual life. It is a curious fact that some of the most implacable haters are professional pacifists. But they need not worry as to the sudden termination of their occupation.

Little real disarmament has followed the Washington disarmament conference. No armies have been disbanded, and even in this country military encampments attract large numbers of young men. Japan is strengthening her navy. Great Britain has just launched a monster submarine and France is turning out a formidable air fleet. And behind the visible military lines the laboratories are concocting devilish devices of destruction.

The latest is the new type of powder, smokeless, flashless and impervious to moisture. All of which will add greatly to the effectiveness of war. Sing again, ye angels!

RESTORATION OF SILVER

Western states have the deepest interest in the fundamental problems of restoring silver to full 100 per cent parity with gold as a monetary metal for world use.

The world has never as yet accepted paper money except when supported by an adequate metallic reserve. At this time, one of the chief obstacles to a return to normal conditions in central Europe is the fact that no metallic money is available and that business is attempting to function with paper money.

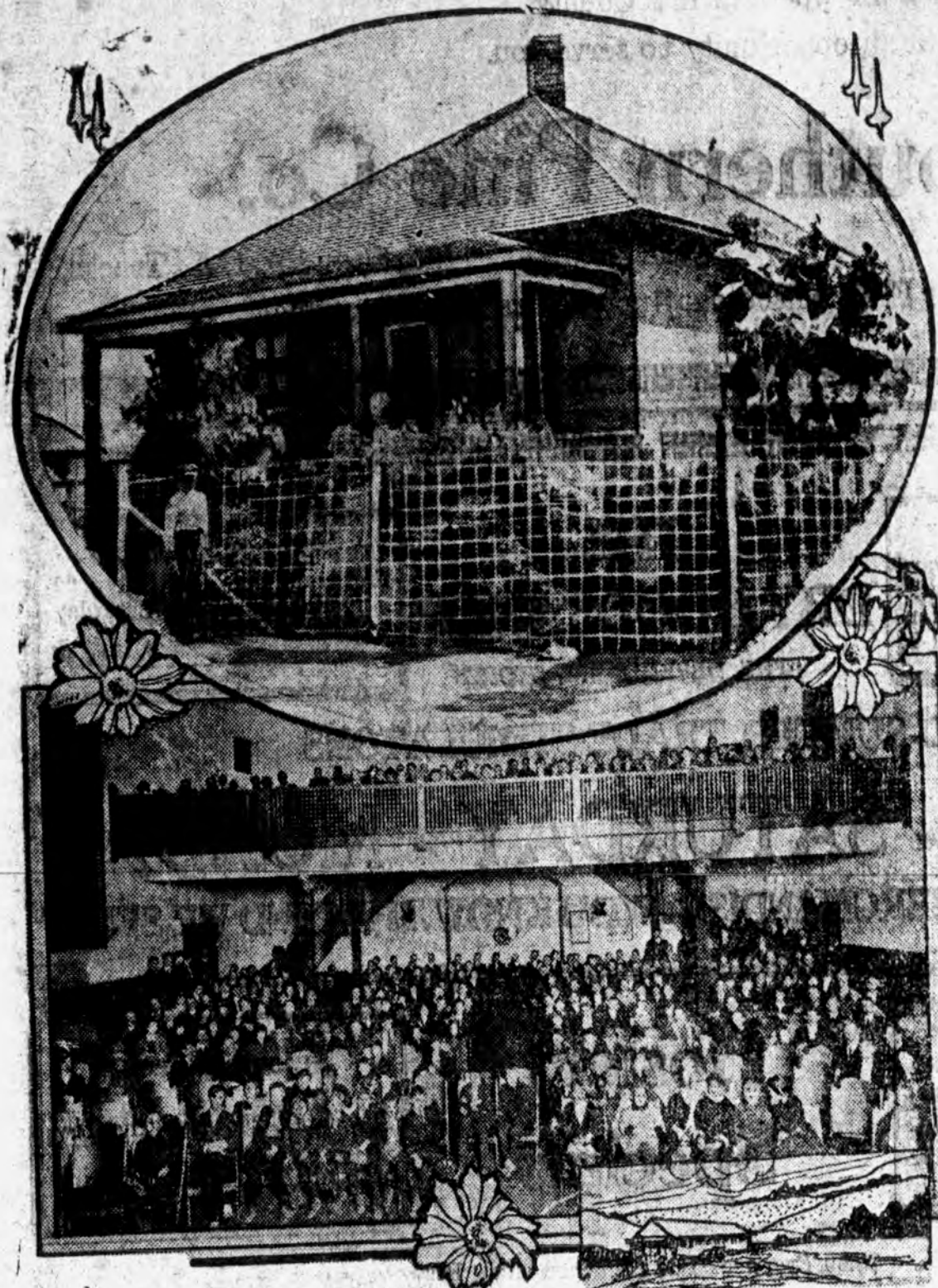

Miners In Soft Coal Fields Escape High Rent Wave Sweeping Country; Enjoy Good Homes at Low Rentals



A coal mining community of today is not the desolate, backwoods place that is commonly pictured. On the contrary, it is a modern, up-to-date place, having advantages for those living there which few cities can boast.

The mine worker lives in a comfortable, clean, attractive house, with modern conveniences, for which he pays a rental figure that must make the city dweller feel his hair with envy. The companies build the houses and rent them to the miners, the rate of rental being figured at from \$1 to \$2 per room each month. Usually the higher figure prevails.

The six room bungalow pictured above is almost completely surrounded by a flower and vegetable garden. It is not a leaky wooden shack or log-cabin, thrown together

as a makeshift. It is built of concrete, is good to look at, and above all, is livable and comfortable. It costs the miner who lives in it with his family \$12 a month at the most.

The mine workers living advantages do not end with the matter of rent. He gets his fuel in most fields for about \$1 a ton. That is all it costs him for heating his house and for cooking. In some fields coal is supplied free to the miners families. The company power plants in most cases supply light for the houses, either entirely free or at cost.

Medical aid and the services of trained nurses are supplied to the mine workers and their families in the bituminous coal fields. In some fields there is a very low rate charged for medical attention and ambulance. This service is a direct and great benefit to

the families of the miners and to the miners themselves, is not charity on the part of the bituminous operators. They know the advantage that accrues to the operation of their mines from keeping their employees in good health.

The other picture shows an amusement hall in a coal mining community. It is a big, concrete building, attractively fitted up inside as a club where the miners may play and have a good time during their hours of duty. Investments in amusement halls, churches, school buildings and the like have been found to be good investments for the coal mine operator. The coal mine operator knows the value of keeping his employees contented, and affording them and their family every possible facility for comfort, education and advancement.

LIBERALS IN SWEDEN INCLINE TO PROHIBITION

STOCKHOLM.—Prohibition as a plank in the liberal platform is responsible for a reduction in liberal party representation in the lower house of parliament from 110 members ten years ago to 39 at the present time.

At a recent extraordinary meeting of the Liberal party this question was discussed, and after a long debate on the question whether or not to include prohibition in the party platform, 77 voted for and 56 against its inclusion.

SWAINS PROPOSE AT 24; MAIDS ARE WON WHEN 21

LONDON.—High taxes and unemployment cannot stop Dan Cupid, or at least they could not in 1921, which is the last year for which full vital statistics have been completed in Britain. That year the marriage rate was 16.9 persons per 1,000, a rate that has not been exceeded since 1874, except for the war and post-war years of 1918-1920.

The usual ages for the newly-weds were 24 for the men and 21 for the women. Divorces were more numerous than ever before. Except for the war years, the birth rate of 22.4 per 1,000 living was the lowest recorded since 1837.

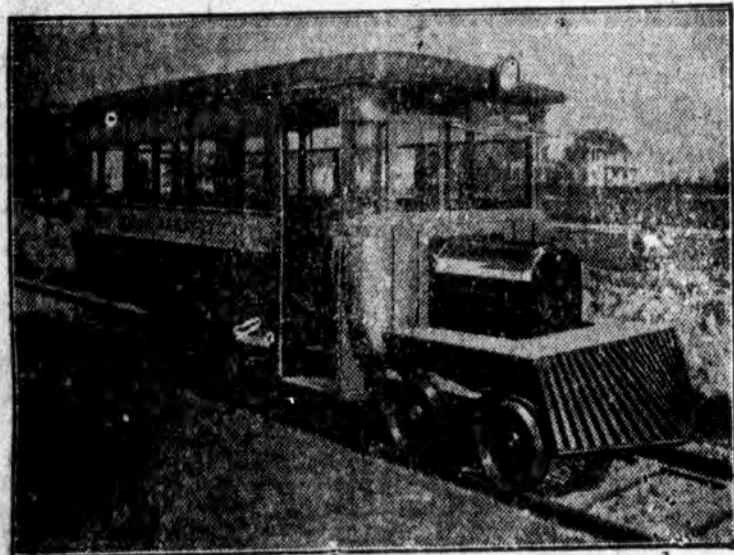

The latest attempt to use automobile busses on rails in the East occurred on Decoration Day when two Reo railway cars were placed in commission at Long Beach, L. I. Last fall when various trolley system throughout Long Island were being discussed as ancient, dilapidated and costly to operate, A. W.
