BOATS LIQUOR PUZZLE

Seizure Talk Wanes; Officials Hope Solve Problem Soon

WASHINGTON, June 29.—That federal officials are in a quandary to reach a satisfactory solution concerning foreign ships coming into ports of the United States in violation of the decision of the supreme court is manifest today, by reason of those in authority not to give out anything definite as to what course will be pursued. No intimation could be had from any of the officials as to when a decision would be reached.

Seizure Talk Wanes.
The talk of seizure of ships which this government contends are openly violating the prohibition laws has run against a snag. It has been found that to carry such a plan out new regulations must be drafted. It is the understanding, in well informed quarters that the prohibition unit of the treasury has been charged to work out a line of procedure which might make seizure possible.

Acting Secretary Gilbert is hopeful that foreign shipping lines will view the situation from another angle and will refrain from bringing liquors to the shores of the United States only under the prescribed conditions of "medical use."

To Enforce Law.
From unofficial sources it is learned that a number of foreign shipping companies were ready to abandon their programs of bringing to this side of the Atlantic under seal a sufficient stock of bar liquor to supply passengers on the return voyage. It has been made plain that this government would not continue to tolerate what was regarded as a studied effort by foreign shipping concerns to antagonize the enforcement of the federal dry laws.

Former Bank Head of Raleigh Convicted

RALEIGH, June 29.—John H. Hightower, president of the defunct Central Bank and Trust Co., of Raleigh, will be sentenced today by Judge E. H. Cranmer in Wake county Superior court following his conviction yesterday in the first prosecution ever brought in North Carolina under the statute making it a felony to receive deposits of a bank, knowing the bank to be insolvent.

Hightower was sentenced to not less than two and a half nor more than four years in the penitentiary. The sentence was appealed. He was released in \$15,000 bond.
A motion was submitted by Willis Smith, attorney for Hightower, asking that the verdict be set aside. It was explained that one of the jurors was a depositor after having denied the challenge to counsel for the defendant. When asked by Judge Cranmer, whether he had anything to say, Hightower, told the court that he acted in good faith and tried to save the depositors to the best of his ability.

Mrs. Galena Newell Not Seriously Injured

LIVINGSTON, MONT., June 29.—The condition of Mrs. Galena Newell, daughter of the general superintendent of the Atlantic Coast Line, who was injured in Yellowstone park when a tree hit an automobile in which she was riding was reported as favorable today. No bones were broken, and her injuries are not regarded serious.
Four other members of the party in the automobile were not hurt.

Fire Threatens Soldiers Home At Hampton, Va.

HAMPTON, VA., June 29.—A call for assistance to extinguish a fire that is raging at the National Soldiers Home near here has been sent out to nearby towns. The blaze which started in the mess hall was soon beyond the control of the fire apparatus of the institution. The fighting forces of three cities are now battling to check the spread of the flames which are rapidly gaining headway.

The mess hall is a large frame structure. A strong wind gave the blaze greater intensity. Approximately 500 veterans are inmates of the home, including many shell shocked soldiers of the world war.

State Banks Are In Good Condition Inspection Shows

RALEIGH.—The condition of state banks in North Carolina is much better than usual," the State banking mercantile National Bank, at Wilmington a survey conducted after the failure of two national banking institutions.

"After the failure of the Commercial National Bank, at Wilmington, and the People's National Bank, at Salisbury, both of which are not under the jurisdiction, of the state banking department," said Judge P. Pell, of the corporation commission, "we made a survey of the state banking field and decided that after the failure of several small banks, whose weakness is attributable to these national banks and to the shortcomings of the old banking laws, the days of state bank failures will be over."

The state banking department is one of the branches of the corporation commission and Judge Pell is most directly interested in the supervision of the work.

The Commercial National Bank was closed by the comptroller several months ago, Thomas E. Cooper was head of the institution and W. B. Cooper, lieutenant governor of North Carolina, a stockholder. J. D. Norwood, chairman of the state democratic executive committee, was head of the People's National bank when it also was closed recently by the federal banking department.

CHILD HURLED TO DEATH IN AUTO ACCIDENT, THROAT IS SLASHED AS CAR HITS POST

Hurled through the windshield of an automobile when it struck a telegraph pole at Bethel yesterday, Chas. Alton Lewis, 11 year old son of Chas. Lewis, was almost instantly killed. As the body of the child plunged through the windshield shattering it, the sharp jagged edges slashed his throat, severing the jugular vein.
He was accompanying his sister Miss Hortense Lewis, 16, from the family home one mile west of Bethel on the Tarboro, to take a music lesson. On reaching the edge of town Miss Lewis noticed a small boy riding a bicycle along the road just in front of her car. She slowed down and pulled to the extreme right of the highway to avoid accident. While it

is declared that she reduced the speed of the car to about eight miles an hour, in some way she lost control and it ran into a telegraph pole. The sudden impact threw the child headlong through the windshield.

According to eye witnesses as soon as the car stopped Miss Lewis jumped out and ran to her brother's rescue. The latter made a heroic effort to regain his feet, but collapsed. He was rushed to the office of a physician and every medical service was employed to save his life. He died in less than 30 minutes after the accident. Miss Lewis was not injured. Funeral services will be held today from the family home.

Germans Penalized For Sabotage On Railroad By French

COBLENZ, June 29.—The French extended their occupation in Mayence from Bridgehead to Langen on Darmstadt-Frankfurt railroad line eight miles south of Frankfurt and Eschborn on the Frank-Kringsberg line seven and a half miles northwest of Frankfurt. The extension, it was explained is the penalty of recent sabotage on the railroads.

Contenders for Air Records Drop Into Bay, Plane Damaged

Capt. Lowell and Lieut. John Richter, army aviators, attempting to break air records were forced down into the shallow waters of San Diego bay at 4:30 this morning, by what army officials at North Island described as faulty gasoline and heavy fog. The plane turned completely over, but neither pilot was injured.
The plane is somewhat damaged.

Serious Shortage School Teachers In State, Reported

RALEIGH.—A serious shortage of teachers exists in North Carolina, according to Jule B. Warren, secretary of the North Carolina education association, an Miss Fifth E. Gilbert, his placement secretary.

Despite the fact that many additional registrations have come to the office of the bureau during the past few days, a large number of teachers still can be placed, said Miss Gilbert. Mr. Warren, who has just returned from a visit to summer schools in the western part of the state, reported that practically all of the better trained and qualified teachers have secured positions already and that only a small number is now available in these schools.

"Any teacher in the state who has not obtained a position, for the year is invited to use the services of the placement bureau," said Mr. Warren. "This service is rendered members of the association at cost. A slightly larger, fee is charged non-members. While placements cannot be guaranteed, registrants will be notified of positions.

Tobacco Market Opening Dates To Be Decided Today

ASHEVILLE, June 29.—Reports on tobacco crop conditions in their territories and decisions as to when sales shall start in the various producing zones are to be made public here tomorrow at the opening of the twenty-third annual meeting of the tobacco association of the United States.

Approximately one hundred delegates from Virginia, the Carolinas, Kentucky, Tennessee and Georgia are expected to be present. President T. M. Carrington of Richmond, said the convention was expected to be the most important in the organization's history.

A meeting of committees representing the association and the warehouse owners will be held today to discuss the proposed schedule of opening the sales season. The committees are composed of the following: Tobacco Association, E. G. Currin, Robert Haskin, C. C. Gregory, W. T. Clark, and A. B. Carrington.

Regular Electric Light and Power Service for Bethel

BETHEL, June 29.—It is practically assured that the people of Bethel will soon have the benefit of an all day and night electric current to be supplied from one of our neighboring towns, either Tarboro or Greenville. At a mass meeting a few weeks ago a citizens committee composed of W. R. Bullock, M. O. Blount, and J. P. Harris was appointed to act in conjunction with the town commissioners and make investigations as to the advisability of securing power from one of these towns and also the cost of transmission lines from the two points.

The committee has found that both of these towns are able to furnish the needed juice and will extend us welcome by way of a 10 year contract. The thing that will determine the town that we will connect with will be the ability to secure the right of way to build the transmission lines. Many along the lines have expressed themselves as being very anxious for the line to be built by their property so that they will be able to tap the line secure the splendid service that the town receives. A committee is investigating the possibility of a right of way to each town and will report on same at an early date.

Funeral Services For Paul Kitchin At Scotland Neck

SCOTLAND NECK, June 29.—Funeral services for Paul Kitchin, prominent attorney and brother of the late Claude Kitchin will be held here today.

Mr. Kitchin died at Seven Springs Wednesday.

Mr. Kitchin was twice a representative from Halifax county in the state legislature and once a member of the senate and was for many years county road commissioner. At the time of his death he was a member of the local school board.

In his early youth he was graduated from Wake Forest College after which he located in Roxboro, where he practiced law until 1901. After his return to Scotland Neck he was married to Miss Carrie Lawrence. Three children survive him, Francis and Travis Kitchin. Mr. Kitchin was 50 years old.

Factories Fighting to Get On Route Interstate Road

RALEIGH, June 29.—With two factions fighting for recognition, the state highway commission today is scheduled to decide on the route to be followed by the capital to capital highway through North Carolina.

Plans to bring the National Highway from Richmond to Columbia through Oxford, Durham and dividing it there with one road going through Chapel Hill, Pittsboro and Sanford, and the other following the Central Highway westward to Greensboro and Charlotte have been in the process of formation for the past several months.

The Raleigh-Sanford route has supporters who claim the highway course should remain as it has been for many years. Although the two proposed routes are the same length, Raleigh-Sanford supporters contend their route is further advanced in construction work.

Between Sanford and the Virginia line, over the present route, approximately forty miles of the distance either is paved or under contract. The other proposed route has about thirty miles of paving, it is stated.

MARTIN HITS AT CO-OPS

Martin County Growers Follow Pitt By Filing Several Suits

Following hard on the heels of Pitt county farmers, who have filed more than 100 suits to have their so-called agreements with the Co-Operative Tobacco association set aside on the alleged grounds of fraud growers of Martin county have taken similar action.

According to advices from Williamston today L. H. Rouse, J. M. Mosely, W. A. Vandeford, Bryant Andrews, T. A. Bunting, W. S. White, W. S. Liggett, E. A. Clark and J. F. Crawford, have filed petitions seeking the same relief as asked by planters in this county. Attorneys Critcher & Critcher, represent three of the complainants.

It is understood that a number of other farmers are expected to take similar action.

When the attention of M. O. Wilson, secretary of the association was directed to the action of the Martin county farmers, he is reported as saying, the small group of complainants did not reflect the real sentiment of a majority of the growers for the reason that the association had more than 800 members in that county.

It was learned today that while the association may credit Pitt county with a membership of 1,600 members that a good many of them are ready to follow the lead already initiated and test out the validity of their relations with the association in the courts.

Additional suits will be filed by growers in other surrounding counties within the next few days, it was authoritatively ascertained today.

Co-Operation Will Cut Cost of Living, Harding Declares

IDAHO FALLS, IDAHO, June 29.—Declaring that the need of the present is to shorten the bridge between producer and consumer, President Harding, in an address here, proposed a plan of co-operation among consumers, financed in part at least through carefully organized and supervised adoption of principles of the savings bank or the building and loan society.

The President further said as a result of studies and investigations he hoped to be able "to recommend for the consideration of the congress measures which shall represent a beginning along this line."

"One of the most engrossing problems of our time, confronting all countries and all societies, is the exorbitant cost of living," the president said.

"I believe the suggestion is worthy of careful examination and consideration," the president asserted "I am convinced that its discussion will be fruitful of good results and a reminder to some who are disposed to take unreasonable tolls from both the consumer and the public. This public has the right, the power and the ability to devise means to protect itself.

Negro Boy Drowns, Stepped Off Sand Bar in Grand Turn

Norman Spell, colored, 12 years old, was drowned yesterday in Tar river in grand turn. The child with several companions, it is said, was wading on a sand bar in shallow water. He ventured too far and fell into more than 15 feet of water. He could not swim and drowned before aid arrived.

Good Roads Repays Cost, Survey Shows

A good road is such a paying investment that it is the poorest kind of business judgment to do without it, according to the Bureau of Public Roads of the United States Department of agriculture. The bureau pronounces figures based upon a survey of traffic in Connecticut to prove its contention. An actual count of the traffic on the Boston Post road showed that the average weight of vehicles and commodities passing over the road in nine hours each day was 1,140 tons. Adding one third as a conservative estimate for the full day increases the weight to 1,500 gross tons daily. Experiments made at the Iowa Experiment station show that with gasoline at 24 cents a gallon the cost of moving this tonnage over dirt road would have been \$26.44 a mile, assuming the impossible, that such traffic could be carried over a dirt road. The cost for fuel for moving the same tonnage over a paved road would be \$11.70, a difference of \$14.74 a day. On the basis of 300 days a year the actual saving in fuel alone for moving this tonnage would be \$14,222. If the paved highway costs \$40,000 per mile, the average interest at 5 per cent would be \$1,000 a year, which, deducted from the saving on would leave a balance which would retire the cost of the road in less than 12 years.

This calculation does not take into account other savings in the cost

of operating commercial vehicles or value of the heavy movement of passenger vehicles.
In less developed rural sections the value of gasoline saved is reduced in proportion to the lighter travel, but the cost of the roads is correspondingly reduced, and there is no doubt that an analysis and comparison of the highway costs and the vehicle operating cost in any particular case will demonstrate the economy of improvement wherever the traffic is sufficient to call for any improvement at all.

Take Military Training

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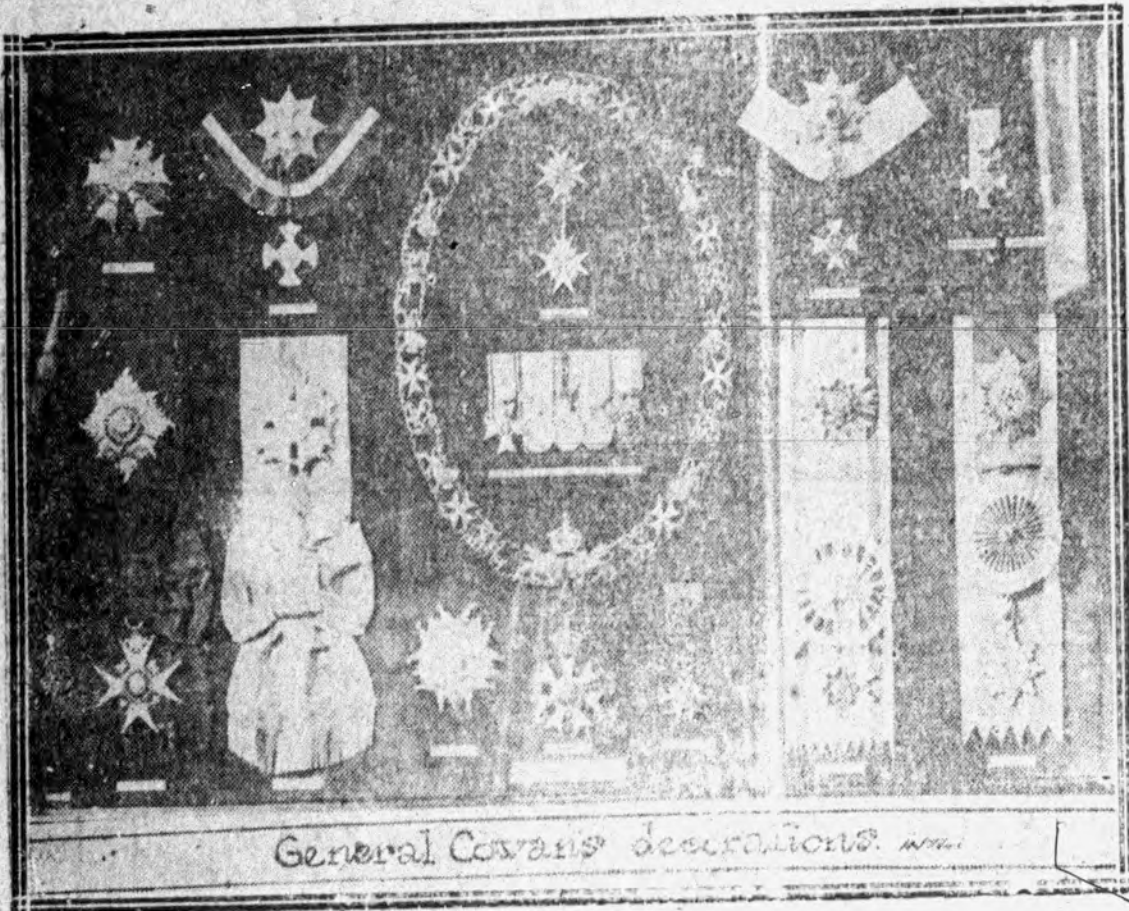
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MEDALS CANNOT BUY BREAD AND BUTTER

Welfare Course at University Opens On July 16

RALEIGH, June 29.—The fourth series of special summer institutes of public welfare to be held at the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill, under the auspices of the state board of charities and public welfare and the school of public welfare at the institution, will open July 16 and continue through July 27, it was announced by Commissioner Kate Barr Johnson.

The conference is being held for the purpose of discussing common problems of public welfare, to raise the standards of the work, to increase interest in the program in North Carolina and to contribute something to the whole field of public welfare and social progress and education, it was stated.

While the previous institutes have maintained an unusually high standard of interest, discussion and thought, reads the announcement in The Public Welfare Progress, issued tonight, "the 1923 institutes will attempt to enlarge their field of profit and service."

Among the speakers listed on the program are Judge Charles A. Hoffman, Cincinnati, judge of the Hamilton county juvenile court, who will discuss the procedure of his court and problems of juvenile delinquency; Louis Brownlow, city manager of Petersburg, Va., who will lecture on social work in relation to police powers; Miss Mary Rague, director of Mother's Pension work for Pennsylvania, who will direct the study of mothers' aid.

Suits Against Bank.

WILMINGTON.—C. L. Williams, receiver of the Commercial National bank, has filed an answer to the suit of B. F. Keith, who is attempting to secure a judgment of \$4,847.12 from the institution. Keith's suit is among numerous actions filed against the bank, while the receiver also has entered several suits himself in attempts to make collections.

Berlin Helps Needy Russians
BERLIN.—Three military barracks in Berlin have been converted into dormitories for needy Russian students. The German Red Cross, the Russian section of the League of Nations, the Young Men's Christian association, and the European Students Relief each contributed to the undertaking. This effort is typical of what is being done throughout central Europe to make more endurable the lot of self supporting students.

State Will Hold Election to Name Welfare Heads, July

RALEIGH.—June 29.—All county superintendents of public welfare in North Carolina come up for election July 9, according to an announcement today by the department of public welfare. These elections are held every two years.

Every county having a population of 32,000 or more by the census of 1920 is required by law to have a superintendent of public welfare. In counties of less population, the employment of a superintendent is optional. In counties not having public welfare officers, the school superintendents perform the duties which would develop upon a regular welfare official.

Forty five counties in the state now have whole-time superintendents of public welfare and nine part-time officers. The remaining forty-six counties depend upon the school superintendent for the performance of the welfare duties.
