

Local tobaccoists who have, and always will believe that the auction system is the most profitable to all concerned and especially the growers, are now going forward making preparations for the handling of what now has promise of being one of the largest crops ever yet marketed in Pitt County.

Last year there were five warehouses for the sale of leaf tobacco

at auction. With Mr. Gorman withdrawing from the Co-Operative association and again placing his house on the open market gives Greenville six warehouses with floor space equal, if not larger than any other market in the whole of Eastern North Carolina.

While no great improvements are necessary, a majority of the local houses are undergoing minor repairs, and when the opening date

arrives on August 21, everything will be in readiness for the handling of the golden weed.

It is generally understood that there will be three sets of buyers again this season, and there is some talk of a fourth crew. Many are prone to believe that the additional buyers will be necessary before the season is far advanced.

HARDING'S PARTY LEAVES TACOMA TO VISIT ALASKA

First Executive to Visit Territory Since Coming Under Flag

ON BOARD U. S. NAVAL TRANSPORT HENDERSON, July 6.—President Harding was beyond American boundaries today enjoying life at sea in the comfortable cabins and on the decks of the Marine Transport Henderson. The president left Tacoma yesterday accompanied by Mrs. Harding and other members of the presidential party for a trip to Alaska. Every precaution has been taken by naval authorities to safeguard the voyage of the president and destroyers are accompanying the "Floating White House."

TACOMA, WASH., July 6.—In the midst of the blaring of bands and the farewell cheers of thousands of Tacoma citizens, President Harding sailed today for Alaska, the first Chief Executive of the Nation to visit that territory since it came under the American flag 56 years ago.

Floating White House.

A few minutes after 2 p. m., the scheduled hour of departure, the United States Naval transport Henderson, which, for the next two days will be in reality the White House, got under way, circled the harbor and steamed past the Tacoma stadium where a few minutes before President and Mrs. Harding had received the God-speed of Governor Hart, of Washington, and where the President had declared for an American merchant marine second to none.

As the big transport swung by the stadium, those assembled there to hear the President speak stood and cheered. Mr. and Mrs. Harding acknowledged the cheers and waved the farewell from the bridge until distance made them only indistinct figures to those on shore.

President Pleased.

The President, as he boarded the vessel, was in an unusually happy frame of mind; pleased by the reception given him in Tacoma, glad to obtain a few days of rest after the 15-day trans-continental trip, and overjoyed by the prospect of realizing the ambition he has held almost ever since he entered the White House—an ambition to visit the great northern territory and obtain first-hand information with respect to its problems.

Two days of steady sailing lay ahead of the party when it left here, up through the inside passage of British Columbia and Alaska. It will not be a monotonous voyage by any means, for the boat will pass up through narrow winding channels with mountains rising directly from the water's edge.

The first stop will be made at Ketchikan, either Friday or Saturday, and after a stay there the Henderson will go on to Wrangell, arriving there to spend Sunday, according to the tentative schedule.

Harding's Itinerary.

The arrival at Juneau, the territorial capital, has been fixed for July 10 and three days later the party will reach Seward. Four days then will be devoted to the trip up the Alaskan railroad to Anchorage, Chitkaaloon, Nenana and Fairbanks, within 200 miles of the Arctic Circle. At the Tanana river bridge at Nenana the President will drive the golden spike symbolizing completion of the railroad constructed by the government to provide an outlet for the rich interior district. The return trip southward will be made by motor over the Richardson Trail.

The President was accompanied by the three members of his cabinet whose departments are most directly interested in Alaska. They are Sec-

Authorities To Pass On Pictures Taken During Fight

CHICAGO, July 6.—Motion picture films of scenes around the circle and the crowds at the recent Dempsey-Gibbons fight at Shelby, Montana, but not of the fight itself have been submitted to federal authorities for inspection as the federal laws prohibit the interstate transportation of fight films for the purpose of exhibition. It was first reported that the films in possession of the agents were those of the fight proper and had been seized under orders of the district attorney.

Immigration On An Increase In Canada

OTTAWA, Ont., July 6.—Immigration into Canada increased 31 per cent during the first four months of 1923 as compared with the same period a year ago, according to figures compiled by the department of immigration and colonization.

Dr. Bowling has done extensive work in pellagra research and has written several papers for medical journals and societies on the subject. Differing from the usual idea that the malady comes from malnutrition, the doctor holds the theory that it is a germ disease. He has had patients sent to him from the whole country.

In connection with his work in Christian education which was also a factor in consideration of which the degree was given, the doctor told how he had been of assistance to many ambitious boys during the last 30 years. His system is to lend them the money and have it paid back to the college to be used in the same manner again.—Durham Sun.

Dr. Bowling is a brother of J. G. Bowling of this city and has many friends in this section who will be interested in the above item. The degree was given in recognition of his work on pellagra on which disease he is considered an authority throughout the United States.

Labor Coming To United States May Abolish 12 Hour Day

NEW YORK, July 6.—Entrance into the United States of labor from Mexico, Canada, Philippines and a few European countries will soon make it possible to do away with the 12 hour day in the steel industries according to a statement today of Elbert Gary head of the steel corporations. The announcement came as a result of the action of President Harding who prior to his sailing from Tacoma, Washington for Alaska yesterday, urged the directors of the steel industries to abolish the 12 hour day. The directors pledged to carry out the agreement as soon as enough foreign labor could be brought to America to make it possible.

Harry Wills And Dempsey May Stage Fight Soon

GREAT FALLS, Mont., July 6.—Harry Wills, negro heavy weight boxer will probably be Dempsey's next opponent according to a statement made here today by Jack Kearns manager for the champion. Kearns stated that he expected to finish his business here today and leave tomorrow for New York to close for a match between Dempsey and Wills which will probably be staged on Labor Day. "We want to fight Wills" stated Kearns, "if for nothing more than to convince the public that Dempsey does not draw the color line and is not afraid to fight." "I believe," said Kearns, "that the fight with Wills will draw better than a return fight with Willard for I consider there is no use for Dempsey to fight a man who he has already knocked down seven times in one round." According to Kearns the champion shares 33 1-3 per cent in the motion picture rights of the Shelby battle while Gibbons retains a share of 25 per cent.

Terrific Storm Kills 5 Persons Pittsburgh, Pa.

PITTSBURGH, Pa., July 6.—Five persons were killed by a terrific storm which broke over this city today. One man and one woman were killed by contact with electric wires struck by lightning, one man was struck by lightning while standing on the porch of his home and two women were killed when their auto was wrecked caused by skidding on the wet road.

Retail Business Good Says Head Woolworth Company

NEW YORK, July 6.—"Retail business is good and I cannot see any reason why it should not remain good for the year 1923 at least," was the statement made by the head of the Woolworth Company here today. "We do not hesitate to contract for merchandise for future delivery at present prices," said Mr. Parsons. "I find merchandise prices on a staple basis and we are willing to buy ahead. We will not be hindered by high prices on account of a shortage of help in the industries as was the case last year."

It is estimated that the Woolworth Company sales will reach \$185,000,000 this year.

City Ordinance Will Compel Railroads to Install Gates Or Place Watchmen At Tracks

Aldermen In Regular Session Transact Much Business Including The Adding of Many New Ordinances—Mrs. E. W. Harvey Chosen to School Board

The board of aldermen met in regular session last night at 8 o'clock, it being the first meeting of the new fiscal or term year.

Mayor D. M. Clark, Aldermen Hearne, Clark, Sellers, Forbes and Clodfelter, being qualified as re-elected officers for the ensuing term.

Attorney J. C. Lanier presented a petition asking that the Sunday open hours for filling stations be increased as follows:

From 8 to 9:30 a. m. and from 2 to 6 p. m. Mayor Clark and Aldermen Hearne and Forbes were opposed to acting on this petition without notice, so that anyone desiring to oppose same could be heard. Motion by Alderman Clark to grant petition was carried by vote of 4 to 2.

Mr. H. L. Smith, secretary of 3rd St. and Elizabeth street and Latham Chamber of Commerce asked the town to pay a bill amounting to \$29.13 for expenses incurred in building tables for Curb Market. Request granted and bill ordered paid.

Permission granted S. T. White to attach an electric sign on the 5th street side of his store building at Five Points.

Petition presented by H. L. Smith, secretary for Chamber of Commerce, for paving 5th street where it connects with the Falkland road. Petition approved and granted, and finance committee directed to devise ways and means.

Letter received from school board naming E. B. Ferguson incumbent whose term expires July 1. Mrs. E. W. Harvey and H. A. White from whom the town is to elect a member of the school board under the law governing the election of school boards. The ballot being taken Mrs. E. W. Harvey was declared unanimously elected.

Ordinance prohibiting turning with bright lights in the Town of Greenville and limiting lights on automobiles to those displayed as "dimmers," unanimously adopted.

Ordinance requiring watchman or gate at A. C. L. railroad tracks on Dickinson avenue, after July 20th, 1923, and repealing railroad stop law at said point, unanimously adopted.

Ordinance requiring watchman or gate at Norfolk Southern tracks where it crosses 10th street, unanimously adopted.

Ordinance requiring meat and fish markets to have concrete floors, unanimously adopted.

J. O. Duval unanimously re-elected clerk for ensuing year. J. C. Tyson unanimously re-elected treasurer for ensuing year. Lester Jones unanimously re-elected chief of police.

HARDING FAVORS PRESENT ROTATION SYSTEM OF JUDGES

Charlotte Judge Discusses Question Before Lawyers of State

BLOWING ROCK, N. C., July 6.—"To abolish the rotation system would remove much of the romance, fascination, and attraction for the office of judge," declared Judge W. F. Harding, of Charlotte and a judge of the superior court, here today "but the office is created not for the judges pleasure and comfort, but for the convenience and service to the people, whose servant he ought to be."

Judge Harding spoke before the North Carolina Bar association in session here on the subject, "The Feasibility of Abolishing the Rotation System of Superior Court Judges in North Carolina."

"In North Carolina," he asserted "there are twenty judicial districts. This discussion will not take into consideration that the state has been divided into two divisions. The division of the state into two sections has not affected the system as it existed before or will, other than to make it slightly less inconvenient to about four judges, two of whom live in the extreme east and two who live in the extreme west, and to deprive the other judges of the delightful pleasure of going over the entire state and thus touching shoulder to shoulder the personnel of the profession throughout North Carolina."

"The constitution since 1875, provides that the judges (of the superior court) shall preside in the courts of the different districts successively, but no judges shall hold the courts in the same district oftener than once in four years. It is also provided that the governor may require any other judge to hold one or more specified terms in lieu of the judge assigned to the district, and now by later amendment, emergency judges may be created."

Suggesting as a remedy for the present conditions that a change of the Constitution be made so that a judge might remain in his own district all of the time and cancel or fail a term of court as it was needed or not, Judge Harding declared that "perhaps one third if not one half more work could and would be done." He illustrated his point to the attorneys present by an example of the travel and expense involved in a judge going from one end of the state to the other only to cancel a term because of no business while in a nearby district to his home there may have been a congestion of the docket which might have been relieved.

Judge Harding developed the thought in the course of his address, which he said had been often expressed in recent years that the state had advanced to such an extent since 1875 that some of the laws do not give a free and accurate expression of the life of the state.

"The progress that has been made in the educational development of the state; in good road building; in the religious activities among the laymen of the church; could never have come to pass, as has been observed by all who would behold in the past few years, if the lawyers of this state had failed to interest themselves in the forward movement and had thrown the weight of their influence against it."

To Destroy Snakes

SAN ANTONIO, Texas, July 6.—Poisonous gases will be used in the destruction of Texas rattlesnakes, according to present plans of the predatory animal bureau of the U. S. Department of agriculture, assisted by the chemical warfare service of the Eighth army corps area. Major George M. Malloran, chemical warfare officer of the corps, will begin experiments soon to determine which gas is the most effective in killing snakes.

THE CHAOS IN CHINA

Conditions in China are worse than chaotic, and just what the future holds for it is difficult to foresee. Today there is no government there that makes even a plausible pretext of governing. The best show is offered by Sun Yat Sen's Cantonese establishment, which the western powers have persistently declined to recognize as anything but an outlaw government. Had it been accorded a fair opportunity to demonstrate what it was capable of doing by these powers, the problem of China's future might be less insoluble.

There is at present time intense anti-foreign feeling throughout China. It is not checked by any cautious central authority, because there is no central authority, either cautious or otherwise, to cope with the situation. Foreign interests in China are, of course, jeopardized both by the lack of any real government of the Chinese for the power of the Occidental nations. The weakness of the foreign states was clearly indicated by their course in dealing with the recent bandit episode, in which numbers of their nationals were held captive for weeks. The diplomats threatened, but none of the nations took any steps to back its threats. This fact has

not escaped the comprehension of the Chinese hence frequently recurring outrages are to be expected. It is a question of how long the great powers, with numerous exposed interests finding no protection, can tolerate the existence of a nation without a government. Japan, with interests in China far exceeding those of any other nation, is keeping close watch on the situation, and is not averse to intervention should the present state of chaos not show speedy improvement. Probably the Japanese would have begun the task some time ago had they not been deterred by the opinion of Europe and America. It is doubtful if even this influence can keep them out much longer. Indeed, dispatches from Tokyo indicate that the Japanese government is almost ready to act. America and Europe may view the peril from afar with a measure of complacency, but for Japan such an attitude is impossible. — Richmond Times Dispatch.

Finger Print Experts Will Hold Annual Convention Soon

DES MOINES, July 6. — Expert criminologists from all parts of the United States will gather here August 15 to 18 for the convention of the International association for identification, which includes in its membership fingerprint and Bertillon specialists from virtually all the police departments and penitentiaries in the country. The organization is international in scope, having on its membership list members from Scotland Yard and operatives from some of the largest detective agencies in Europe.

Among the notables who will be present at the meeting will be W. J. Burns, W. A. Pinkerton and A. J. Rence, government identification expert in charge of that department at Fort Leavenworth.

Problems of identification and a discussion of the various improvements which have been made in the sciences of crime detection and prevention in the last year will consume much of the time of the convention.

ORDINANCE.

Be and It is Hereby Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the Town of Greenville in Regular Session Assembled, on the 5th Day of July, 1923:

Sec. 1. Sec. 2. That each and every person violating this ordinance shall upon conviction pay a fine of \$10.00 for each and every offense.

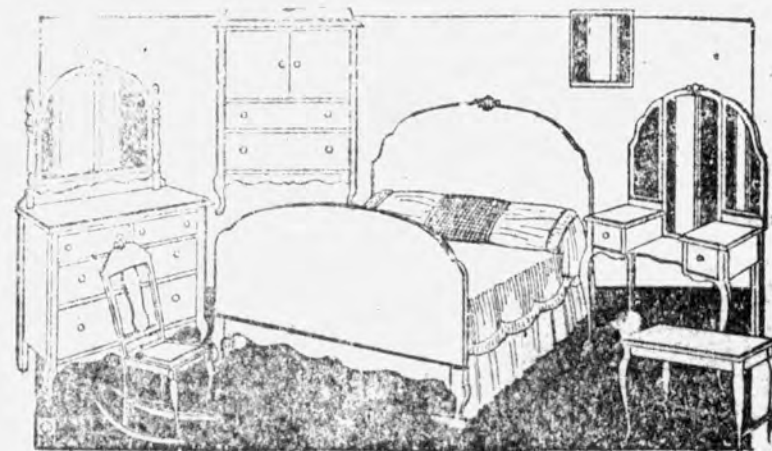
