NORTH CAROLINA BEING RECOGNIZED AS MODEL STATE

General Assembly of Georgia Discuss the Plans of State

ATLANTA, Ga., July 10.—North Carolina is being placed before Georgia legislators as a model state, in some instances, to be followed.

Long before the General Assembly convened, the Tar Heel state's system of taxation was discussed through out Georgia as one of the plans to be considered by the legislators when they met.

The plain system of income taxation met defeat in the assembly two years ago. North Carolina was mentioned in connection with the plan at that time, but little was given out on the relative success of the plan in operation there.

This year, Governor Walker included North Carolina in the several states whose taxation machinery and laws he studied. A personal report on North Carolina was given him. The feature of the system meeting with approval of some lawmakers here is the fact that no ad valorem tax is collected in North Carolina for state purposes. The income tax and special taxes on gasoline, automobiles and other subjects provide funds for governmental operations. The counties, for the greater part, use the ad valorem taxes for school purposes.

North Carolina's system of public schools, especially the plan of financing it, also is receiving attention. Superintendent of schools Ballard has mentioned the state in connection with improvement he is planning for Georgia. The Tar Heel highway system also is being studied by good road advocates in the assembly.

President of Bank Denies Connection With Its Closing

GREAT FALLS, Mont., July 10.—George H. Stanton, president of the Stanton Trust and Savings Bank here, which failed to open its doors yesterday, denies any connection between the closing of the institution and the financing of the Dempsey-Gibbons championship fight which took place at Shelby on July 4. L. Q. Skelton, superintendent of state banks, who is here to investigate the affairs of the defunct bank supported the statement of Stanton. Stanton was one of the Montana business men who assisted in raising the second \$100,000 of the guarantee to Dempsey for stage of the championship fight.

First National Bank Shelby Closed Doors Early This Morning

GREAT FALLS, Mont., July 10.—The First National Bank, of Shelby, Mont., of which the president was one of the backers of the Dempsey-Gibbons championship fight on July 4, closed its doors this morning according to information made public by L. Q. Skelton, state bank examiner, who is here investigating the condition of the Stanton Trust and Savings Bank which went into voluntary liquidation yesterday.

The Giant Liner Leviathan Arrived In France Today

CHERBOURG, France, July 10.—The giant liner Leviathan arrived here today on its first trans-Atlantic voyage as a passenger liner under the American flag. She landed 800 passengers here and continued on to Southampton, Eng.

LONDON, July 10.—The expected arrival of the giant Leviathan at South Hampton late today has created no little excitement among British circles. Besides the vessel's claim of the world's record for passengers and tonnage and the newspaper comments on the American millionaires aboard the liner the probable arrest of a large portion of the crew upon arrival at South Hampton is attracting wide attention. Four Scotland Yard detectives left London yesterday for South Hampton with 200 warrants for members of the crew who are said to have deserted British ships for higher wages paid in America.

Auditors Make Report Legislative Committee During This Morning

RALEIGH, July 10.—Auditors who have been employed to ascertain the financial conditions of the state made their report to the special legislative committee this morning. No details of the report and the recommendations were made public. W. L. Long, chairman of the joint committee, stated that no more witnesses would be heard by the committee but that the committee would concern itself acting on the recommendations of the auditors. The report as made by the auditors is of too great length for publication but the committee will extract the salient features for the press.

The Atlantic Coast Line to Spend Large Sum Improvements

NEW YORK, July 10.—The Atlantic Coast Line Railroad has authorized the expenditure of \$26,000,000 for cars, locomotives and other improvements.

"Yes We Have No Bananas" In Berlin

BERLIN, July 12.—Bananas have been so rare in Germany for the last two years that a Berlin fruit shop almost created panic by exhibiting two complete bunches on Potsdamer street. Crowds gathered about and eagerly asked the price.

The bananas sold for 5,000 marks each, which at the current rate of exchange was about six cents.

Crop Insurance Needed to Protect Our Agriculture

WASHINGTON, July 10.—General crop insurance is feasible and is urgently needed for the protection of American agriculture, according to a statement issued here tonight by the department of agriculture. The progress made by insurance in other fields, it is added, leads to the belief that adequate crop insurance will not long remain undeveloped. Data on the subject is now being prepared by the department for the use of the senate committee at the next session of congress, the committee having been appointed at the last session to thoroughly investigate this subject.

"Billions of dollars are annually invested in farm crops," declares the statement. "So great is the risk in this investment that the farmers have been called gamblers."

Department officials, however point out that the risks of agriculture are unavoidable and should be as readily insurable as similar risks in other lines.

"It is regarded as absurd that agriculture should continue without adequate insurance facilities," declares the department's statement "in the face of the general application that has given to the insurance principle nearly all other kinds of enterprise. With proper statistical data as a basis for rates, means of supplying the lack ought to be obtainable."

Crop insurance, it is believed by department officials, should cover actual damage sustained and not theoretical losses resulting from failure to reap expected profits. Adherence to this rule would greatly lessen the difficulty of establishing a workable system, it is said. What the farmer needs is not an insurance contract which will guarantee him profits when nature fails to furnish them, but simply protection against crop damage so severe as to endanger his financial safety.

COW WAS CAUSE FAILURE DAWN TO DUSK FLIGHT

ST. JOSEPH, Mo., July 10.—The failure of the completion of the "dawn-to-dusk" trans-continental flight of Russell L. Maughan yesterday is attributed to a cow.

In making a sudden turn to avoid the animal Lieutenant Maughan landed damaging the plane to such an extent that he could not continue his flight. The flight was started from New York yesterday morning at 3:56 o'clock eastern daylight savings time and the accident occurred at 12:03 p. m. central standard time. Lieutenant Maughan stated today that while he is not a member of the local order of the Ku Klux Klan is defraying his expense at the health resort.

WHITE MAN LEAVES OFFICER TO BATTLE WITH NEGRO PRISONER

WASHINGTON, July 9.—Deputy Sheriff J. J. Hodges had a novel experience last night on the concrete road about four miles from here, near Cherry's Run. Scuffling with a large, portly colored man, whom he had under arrest, and a white man whom the officer called on to assist him in placing the negro in custody, instead of helping, fleeing from the scene in his automobile, is not what it's cracked up to be. The negro is now at large. The officer, although carried to the scene by the white man in his car, had to walk back home, a distance of several miles.

About eight or ten days ago Sheriff Harris was sent a warrant from Pitt county for a negro supposed to be Mack Perkins, wanted in that county for burglary. An investigation followed with the result, information was obtained that the negro wanted was in the employ of a white man by the name of Haynes, connected with the highway commission, building the road between Washington and Williamston. Mr. Haynes was consulted and the officers told that the negro in question had been in his employ but had quit.

Last night around 11 o'clock Haynes went to the home of Deputy Sheriff Hodges and told him (Hodges) he had found out where the negro was and that if he (Hodges) would get in his car he would take him to where the negro was supposed to be. The officer complied. The negro was found sitting in an automobile beyond Cherry's Run.

Officer Hodges left the car and went up to the negro, told him his business and to consider himself under arrest.

BODY OF T. B. NULL, ILLFATED BALLOON IS STILL MISSING

Remains of Roth Being Held for Instructions From Washington

CLEVELAND, Ohio, July 10.—The body of Lieutenant Louis J. Roth, pilot of the ill-fated U. S. Navy balloon A-6698 which left Indianapolis in the national elimination race on July 4, rested in an undertaking establishment here today pending instructions from Washington as to disposition.

The body was brought here last night from Port Stanley, Ontario on the fling boat Lina and was in charge of Lieutenant Strong, chief of the naval flying field here. Lieutenant Strong will leave here this morning aboard the Lina for Port Stanley to arrange for the shipment of the wreckage of the balloon and basket to the flying at Lakehurst, N. J., where Lieutenants Roth and Null were stationed.

On the flight over this morning a sharp look out will be kept for the body of Lieutenant T. B. Null, aid to Lieutenant Roth, who it is believed was undoubtedly a victim of the same fate as Roth, death by drowning.

The body picked up by a fish boat yesterday and thought to be that of Lieutenant Null was later identified to be that of Albert A. Year of Akron, Ohio.

Next Convention of Elks Will Be Held In Boston, Mass.

ATLANTA, Ga., July 10.—James G. McFarland, of Watertown, North Dakota, was elected Exalted Ruler of the Benevolent Protective Order of Elks at the first session of the Grand Lodges convention and reunion here today. In his speech of acceptance McFarland denounced Bolshevism, I. W. W. and all other ill-rounded isms and declared that the Elks were law abiding and law supporting.

Boston was decided upon as the place for the convention, though bids for the convention were put in by Portland, Ore., and other cities.

Aviator Distributes Poison Over Weevil Infested Cotton Field

CORPUS CHRISTI, Texas, July 10.—Fifteen cents per acre is the price charged by an aviator here to distribute poison over the boll weevil infested cotton fields. He dusted 400 acres in about three hours time. According to the farmer owning the fields it would have taken over three days to have done the work in the ordinary way.

Forfeiture Proceedings As Means of Disposing of Seized Liquor Now

WASHINGTON, July 10.—Forfeiture proceedings were decided upon today between treasury and prohibition officials as a means of disposing of liquor seized from ships violating the prohibition laws. Libel suits it was said will be against the contractor liquor instead of the ships bringing it in to port.

Lost Tombs Japanese Royal Line Unearthed

KYOTO, Japan.—Tombs of six imperial ancestors have just been discovered in obscure spots in the suburbs of Kyoto. They have been identified as those of the sons and daughters of Emperor Godaigo, who was banished to Oki Island by Ashikaga, the usurper, 584 years ago.

Your community is just exactly as clean, political and every other way as the citizens who compose it.

Even if the President is in Alaska this country seems to be running at its usual rate of speed.

If Al Smith expects to be President of this great nation he will have to come out of his boat and get on dry land. The "White House" is too dry for a wet man.

Every day in every way more candidates for the Presidency are being mentioned. The water is fine and as many as want to enter can do so—but one thing is certain—only one can be President.

The Farm Journal says that if Ford is elected President it will be the second time that a rough rider has held down the job. Ford has many friends among both the laboring and wealthy classes and if he is nominated for President no doubt he will give some one an interesting race.

THE SURPLUS AND TAX RELIEF

Merited applause has been the reward of the administration for the favorable financial showing during the fiscal year just closed, during which period the Treasury seems to show a surplus slightly in excess of \$300,000.

000. If this surplus is actual and not merely a matter of clever bookkeeping, Mr. Harding and his associates are entitled to full praise for their fiscal achievement.

But it is disappointing to find such leaders of the party in power as Senator Smoot, of Utah, slated for the chairmanship of the Senate Finance Committee, rigidly opposed to any consideration of Federal tax reduction at this time. It is even more disappointing to find such men deliberately inviting soldier bonus legislation at the coming session of Congress, legislation which, if enacted, will destroy all hope of lower taxes for a decade. The creditable balance now in the Treasury, it is admitted, is primarily the result of increased revenue. Executive economy may have contributed in some measure to that balance, but if the Federal income had not unexpectedly increased during the latter half of the year, there would have been a deficit in the government accounts, economies notwithstanding.

This increase was due very largely to the heavy receipts from imports. The duty collected on the goods purchased abroad is an indirect tax, of course, upon every man, woman and child in the country. The Fordney act rates are the highest ever levied by this government which means that taxes have been increased during the past year.

It would be the part of good policy, therefore, for the Republican regime to revise downward internal taxes. That regime is definitely committed to a high protective tariff. Such a tariff is now in effect and the American consumer, not the foreign exporter, is bearing the burden of it. There is no prospect, moreover, that the import duties will be lowered while the Republican party remains in power.

If President Harding and his party associates are disposed to be fair to the American people they will find means of lowering purely domestic taxes while collecting their extortionate and indefensible import taxes. Moreover, if they are politicians of even second-rate order they will capitalize politically the Treasury surplus by giving the country a degree of relief from the levies which made that surplus possible.

The people will not be satisfied with the statement that the war debt stands in the way of tax reduction, or that means must be found to finance a soldier bonus or that good business requires the government to maintain a large Treasury balance. They want legislation which will lighten to some extent the tax burdens under which they have staggered since the beginning of the war period.—Richmond Times Dispatch.

Tax Cut Helps U. S. Farmers

(Special Correspondence)
WASHINGTON, July 10.—Indirect taxes imposed by the Fordney-McCumber profiteers' tariff are a bigger burden on the American people than the whole cost of the Federal Government, according to persons who have analyzed the figures recently made public by director of the Budget Lord. Private interests and individuals which really collect the tariff, it is pointed out, give the Government only one dollar in eight of the money they take from consumers.

Analysts of Director Lord's figures for the fiscal year just closed hold that even if the Harding administration were able to reduce the income taxes by \$200,000,000 a year, not more than 6,000,000 taxpayers would benefit by this reduction and they only in a small degree, while scores of millions of consumers would continue to face a high cost of living due to the tariff. The cost of the Government is now about \$4 per capita.

running at the rate of \$3,900,000,000 a year—including every charge and expense. The Fordney-McCumber tariff law is costing the people not less than \$4,000,000,000 annually on the present basis of prices. There is some prospect of cutting the cost of government under the Harding administration, but hardly any probability that the cost of living will be lowered, because the beneficiaries of the tariff, which is primarily responsible, will consent to no diminution of their "protection."

In 1921, the last year for which the statistics have been published, the Government received a total of \$719,387,106 in taxes on personal incomes aggregating \$19,577,212,528, net. In 1922, the tariff yielded to the government about \$550,000,000 in revenues while adding \$4,000,000,000 to the cost of living. Spread over the entire population, the amount collected in taxes on personal incomes represents added \$30.50 per capita to the cost of living, while giving the Government in revenues an amount equal to \$4 per capita.

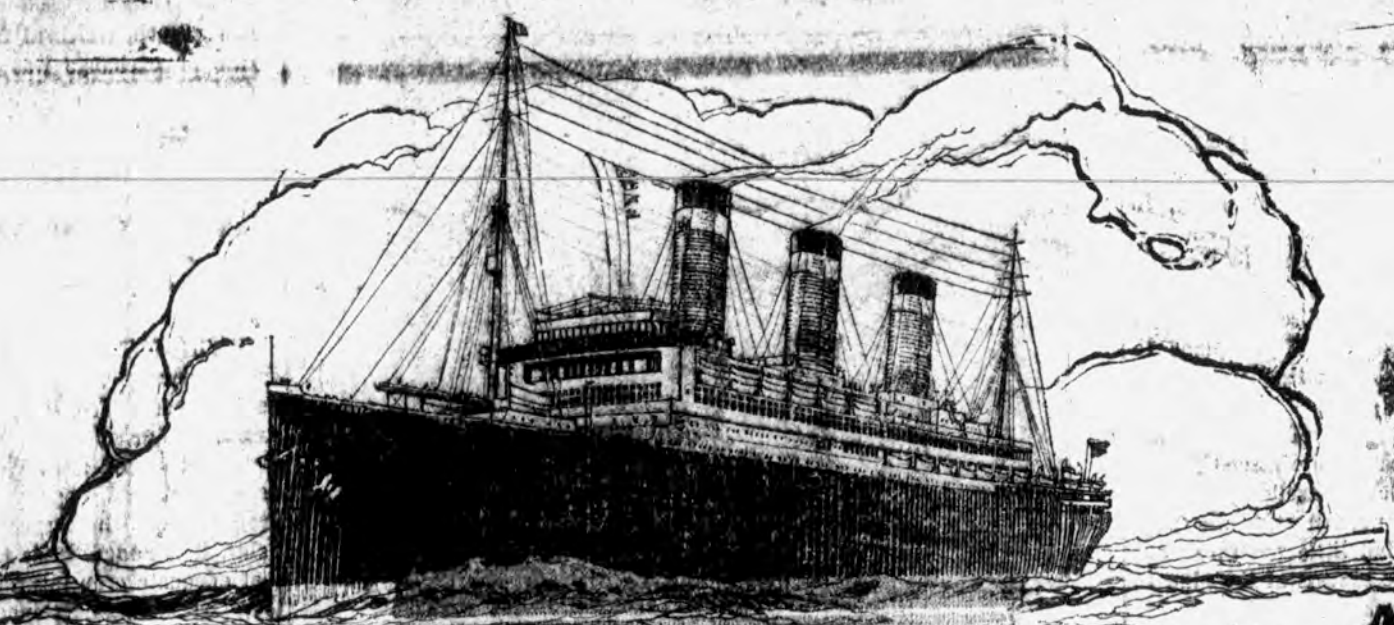

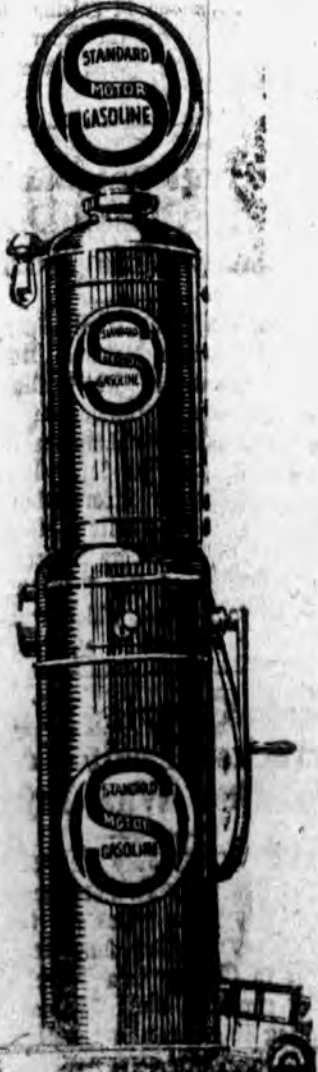

LONDON, July.—The latest plan for commercial aviation in England is the establishment of a British Imperial Airship service, which will connect England with all the British possessions by regular air routes. The first part of the scheme, which was originated by Commander C. D. Burney, R. A. F., provides for the establishment of a service of super-Zeppelins to Australia. This has been placed before the Air Ministry, and there is every prospect of its adoption. The Burney scheme would immediately make England the foremost country in commercial aviation, and add considerably to the strength of the air forces.

The fact that England has not already a gigantic fleet of commercial planes is not due to lack of enthusiasm on the part of the commercial aviation companies. The English companies now operating air lines to Paris and Holland, with the aid of subsidies from the government, are making a success of their projects.

The government has previously been reticent in accepting these plans because of the huge sums involved and the small chance of such lines ever paying, but it is now expected that the Air Ministry will push the establishment of new air routes.

Briefly the scheme provides for the establishment at once of a super-Zeppelin service between London, India and Australia. The Zeppelins will carry 200 passengers, goods and mail, and make the trip to India in three and a half days and to Australia in a week. Such airships will be capable of a non-stop flight of 12,000 miles, at half the cost of the present time between these places to less than one-fourth the present time.

If the scheme is approved the service will start in about eleven months with a bi-weekly service of passenger ships from London to Bombay and a little time later, to Perth, Australia. The ships will not use gasoline as fuel. They will be the first to use a non-inflammable mixture of kerosene and hydrogen, which has just been perfected by experiments under the direction of the Air Ministry.

The second stages of the Empire service will be the establishment of a route to Canada, which will be followed by services to South Africa, HongKong and Singapore.

Maps of Detours Placed in Hotels To Aid Motorists

RALEIGH, N. C., July 10.—The state highway commission, for the convenience of motorists has placed in the hotel lobbies of the state, large maps of the detours in effect during each month. This is a new service of the commission which became effective with the July detours.

the purpose of the maps, it is said, is to aid a traveler going from town to town where he will have to detour. A man at Greensboro traveling to Raleigh, for example, would only have to glance at the map in Greensboro and see if any detours are marked up on the Greensboro-Raleigh road. He would then be in a position to choose his road so as to avoid detouring or, if two roads were not available, he would at least be advised of road conditions before he commenced the trip.

This service, it is believed, will be of great assistance to motorists passing through the state as, because of the great amount of road construction now in progress, many roads are being replaced, temporarily by detours.

The detour reports of the commission which are issued monthly may be found in all public libraries of the state and will supplement the map so far as giving the exact mileage and location of all detours is concerned.

Large maps of the entire highway system of the state, it is stated, have been furnished to such hotels as would agree to display them prominently in their lobbies. These maps give the route number and are plainly marked so that a trip through the state made by route numbers taken from the map, aided by the route number signs which are along the roads at frequent intervals.

Weird Land, Sea and Air War Machine Predicted

MELBOURNE, Australia.—In the next war there will be craft that fly like hawks, swim like ducks, waddle like armoured tanks, and dive like seals in approved Jules Verne style, according to a British military official who is in Australia on a secret mission. Behind closed doors of laboratories and in secluded workshops says this authority, who desires that his name for the present remain undisclosed, there has begun, with government funds, the strangest and weirdest battle of wits that has ever been embarked upon.

"Tanks that swim, great metal sea destroyers that fly, uncanny air machines which dive silently beneath the water to hide themselves," he says, "and crews who must learn to live and fight in three different elements (land, sea, or air) are all necessities of the future." He states that Great Britain is building a giant airplane which cleaves the surface of the water prior to taking wing and develops 3,000 horse-power, and is also constructing the largest flying boat in the world. This winged vessel is intended to go out with the fleet for long periods.

"The hull of this new flying monster," says that British army man, "when resting on the water will ride out rough seas. It will taxi along the water like a surface ship, or speed through the air. It is to have anchors, foghorns, riding lights, and all the equipment of the ordinary vessel of the sea; while its crew within the hull will eat and sleep on board just like the crew of an ordinary naval craft."

The new machine will fight like a tank on earth, will be a super-destroyer on water, and climb to give combat in the air, and when concealment is required it will fold its wings, seal its hull and dive like a submarine beneath the surface of the sea. Science is striving to make these craft both silent and invincible.

Working to Complete The Graham Memorial During This Summer

CHAPEL HILL, N. C., July 10.—

According to an announcement made today by the Graham Memorial committee of the University of North Carolina, plans have been perfected for the completion of the campaign for funds for the building during the summer, and twenty representatives of the student body and alumni are now at work throughout the state in the interest of the movement.

Purpose of the Building.

The purpose of the building is to provide a student activities center for the use of the student body and at the same time do honor to the memory of Edward Kidder Graham, President of the University from 1914 to 1918. Subscriptions are being sought for it in recognition of the fact that if men are to be trained for effective participation in modern community life, they must have the proper setting for it—in this instance, a well planned, student activities building.

Building Sorely Needed.

The need of such a building cannot be overstated. The present Y. build in 1914 when the student body numbered 500, is hopelessly inadequate for the 2250 students to be enrolled in September. It is badly outgrown as the dormitories or the dining facilities were in 1920 when the students slept in three deck beds and ate in shifts. Furthermore, the student organizations have increased more rapidly than the student body, and have no place in which they can be carried on systematically and satisfactorily.

Location and Plans.

The building, which will be of the late Georgian style of architecture, brick with limestone trimmings, will be located on the Old Inn site. It will face west across the campus towards the Battle-Vance-Pettigrew dormitories, with north and south extensions facing respectively Franklin street and the wallway between the Inn and Alumni Building. The main entrance from the campus will be through a spacious portico, into a large social room, 40 by 80 feet, on the first floor, capable of being used for a variety of purposes, such as class and alumni banquets, meetings of the larger clubs, group singing, and other general get-together activities. It will also give direct access to stairways leading up and down, coat rooms, administrative office, serving room, and ladies' reception room. The basement will contain toilets, a barber shop, storage space, a large cafeteria, and a well-equipped kitchen connected with the first and second floors with a system of dumb waiters. The floor above the social room will be divided into fifteen rooms of varying sizes, which can be connected with folding doors, and will be used exclusively for student activities. The north and south extensions will provide quarters for the musical clubs, college publications, and student council, county clubs, the athletic association, and similar organizations.

Cost of the Building to Be \$400,00.

In 1918, when the building was first proposed, the student body numbered 1000, building prices were low.

The present building reorganization of the University, was three years in the future. One hundred and fifty thousand dollars was the objective set, of which \$123,000 was subscribed, and \$80,000 has been collected. To meet present requirements \$400,000 will be required and subscriptions are being asked for on that basis, construction of the cen-

tral unit to be begun as soon as subscriptions and collections justify letting the contract.

Future Expansion Possible.

In the distant future, it will be possible to extend the building to the east. Ample space remains on the plot for the purpose and the architects have drawn the plans so that extensions can be made in complete harmony with the plans of the building itself and the general scheme of campus development.

Live Stock Declines; Meat Prices Rising

(Special Correspondence)

WASHINGTON, July 9.—Sharp contrasts between the decline in the prices of farmers, products at the farm and the rapid rise in the cost of living, particularly in the large cities, continue to be impressive features of official reports and statistics issued by the departments of the government. The most recent figures issued by the department of agriculture and the department of labor present striking disparities between the producer's returns for what he sells and the consumer's outlay for what he buys, particularly in the urban centers.

The department of labor reports the variation in the prices of certain kinds and cuts of meat between March 15 and April 15, this year, and discloses that practically all of these show an increase in cost to the consumer while the live animals from which they were derived were growing less valuable in the hands of the farmer. Some of the meats and the difference in their prices on the dates given were: Sirloin steak, 39.9 cents a pound in March 15; 40.4 cents a pound April 15; round steak, 38.1 cents March 15, 38.7 cents April 15; rib roast, 34.9 cents, March 15, 35.1 cents, April 16; pork chops, 31.3 cents, March 15, 31.9 cents April 15; lamb, (leg) 34.8 cents, March 15, 35 cents, April 15.

It will be observed that three kinds of meat are represented in this list—beef, pork, and mutton. All three underwent appreciable increases in price. While these several varieties were advancing to the consumer, the animals which supplied them were decreasing in price at the farm. In other words meats were dearer for every one except the farmer who was selling the hog, the steer, or the sheep.

The department of agriculture reports what was happening to the price of live stock in the hands of the farmer between March 15 and April 15. In that period of 30 days hogs declined 3 points, beef cattle 1 point; veal calves 3 points, sheep 5 points, and lamb 12 points. The prices of most of these animals at the farm continued to fall between April 15 and May 15. The department of agriculture puts the amount of this decrease at 1.8 per cent in the month ended May 15.

"The prices of meat animals—hogs, cattle, sheep, and chickens—to producers of the United States decreased 1.8 per cent from April 15, to May 15; in the past ten years prices increased in like period 0.4 per cent," says the department of agriculture's bulletin. "On May 15 the index figure of prices for these meat animals was about 10.9 per cent lower than a year ago, 3.7 per cent lower than two years ago, and 25.1 per cent lower than the average of the past 10 years on May 15."

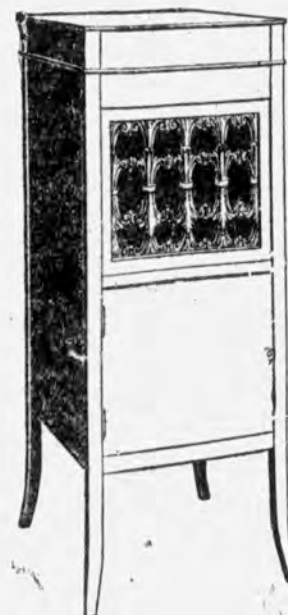
