PROPER METHODS OF USING BOLL WEEVIL POISON IS EXPLAINED

Time to Begin Dusting With Poison Against The Cotton Pests

RALEIGH, N. C., July 11.—The time to begin dusting with the dust poison method against the boll weevil is not the same for all fields, Franklin Sherman, chief entomology, State College and department of agriculture, stated today. A field which is heavily infested, Mr. Sherman asserted, will need dusting earlier than one which is only lightly infested.

Mr. Sherman said farmers who are planning for this work with the aid of county agents of field workers may look to them for the "word" when to start the dusting.

"Weevils invaded the fields from mid-May to mid-June," continued Mr. Sherman, "and the examinations of field workers showed a few fields which needed dusting in last days of June, and the work has begun in these fields. The majority of fields will be in need of dusting somewhat later, perhaps beginning about the middle of July. No exact date can be named for all fields. The grower should be in touch with county agents or field workers on this method, and should be thoroughly familiar with the process as described in our Extension Circular 137 which may be had from county agents."

"The old rule to 'start dusting when 10 to 15 percent of the squares are punctured' has proven a good general guide on the side of economy that point was reached in a few fields at the close of June, others will reach it week by week, and it seems probable that in most of our heavily infested region, south and east from Raleigh, the infestation will reach the dusting point by the middle of July or soon after."

"This statement," Mr. Sherman continued, "is not intended to replace the advice of the county agent or our field workers, but it is meant rather for those who are not in touch with them, and who may need this general reminder. Those who intend to dust are urged to get in touch with the county agent or our field workers, and to study Circular 137 so they can learn how to judge the matter for themselves."

Says Europe Should Refrain From Giving Advice to America

PARIS, July.—"America knows its own business best, can judge for itself whether or not it will join the League of Nations, and this without any advice from European countries," Gabriel Hanotaux, former French Minister of Foreign Affairs, said recently to The Associated Press.

"There is no doubt in my mind that the United States will eventually cooperate more closely in European affairs, but whether this takes shape in the form of joining the League is a matter of Americans to decide," Mr. Hanotaux continued. "America is well able to look after its own affairs, and it is my impression that no blame can be directed against Washington from Europe because of failure of the American senate to ratify the pact of the League of Nations."

"For the present it behooves us to try and settle our own muddled situation before attempting to give advice to America," Mr. Hanotaux continued.

Burlington Plant Destroyed By Fire Late Last Night

BURLINGTON, July 11.—The plant of the Thompson-Sexton Manufacturing Company located between this place and Graham was almost completely destroyed by fire last night. The losses were about \$66,000 with \$13,000 insurance. The origin of the blaze is unknown. Three automobiles were also burned but they were covered by insurance.

Bank Examiners Expected Render Report Tomorrow

SHELBY, Mont., July 11.—Reports of the bank examiners who are working on the books of the First State Bank which closed its doors here yesterday will be available tomorrow. Meanwhile the depositors of the institution, of which James A. Johnson, treasurer for the Dempsey-Gibbons fight promoters is president, are marking time awaiting the final outcome. No statement is available as to the exact amount of cash in the vaults. The cashier of the Shelby bank stated that he heard no little criticism and many of the depositors drew their funds from the bank as soon as Johnson agreed to help the promoters to raise the second \$100,000 of the Dempsey guarantee. Johnson's personal losses range from \$100,000 to \$150,000 in his attempt to "save the fight and good name of Montana." None of the funds of either of the banks were used in connection with the fight according to a statement of George H. Stanton, of the defunct Stanton Trust and Savings Bank of Great Falls.

Cotton Mills Of State Leading In Use Of Product

The cotton manufacturing industry in North Carolina used in 1912, 328,407,879 pounds of the raw product. In 1921-22 the amount used was 531,768,116 pounds. Figured in bales of 500 pounds each this is 1,063,536 bales of cotton.

The percentage of increase in the use of the raw product in this industry is relatively greater than that of any other state, engaged in the cotton goods industry.

In 1912, 3,321,426 spindles were employed in the cotton mills of the state; in 1922 this number had increased to 5,905,102. Looms in use in 1912 were 58,961; in 1922, 74,240. The spindle increase in North Carolina mills has been for each successive year since 1912 greater than that in any other state in the Union. The rate of increase since 1912 is 44 per cent.

In proportion the value of fine yarns manufactured in the state, is greater in value than that made in any other state. In the value of ticks and denims the state leads the nation.

Chamber Commerce Directors Called Ho Meet Here Tomorrow

The regular monthly meeting of the directors of the Chamber of Commerce will be held in the Chamber Commerce office tomorrow night at 8 o'clock.

Several matters of vital importance to the community at large will consume the thought of the governing body. President Turnage, in speaking of this occasion, said: "I want to see each director at this meeting and ready for action."

It is now expected that from this gathering will come some important announcements on matters pertaining to general improvement and expansion.

Capture Moonshine Stills Of This State Shows Decrease June

SAILSBUARY, July 11.—The moonshiners of North Carolina lost 111 illicit stills, 1234 gallons of rum, 67,925 gallons of malt liquors, 17 automobiles and other property valued at \$30,000 during the month of June according to the report of the prohibition forces in this state made public in a statement this morning by A. B. Coltrane, at headquarters here. 660 arrests were made and over 100 prosecutions recommended. The seizures made in June were smaller than those of either April or May.

WILL SALVAGE \$5,000,000 IN GOLD

LONDON.—After nearly a month's salvage work, the wreck of the Peninsula and Orient liner Egypt, which was sunk off Ushant in collision early in 1922 is thought to have been located. The bulion on the sunken vessel is said to amount to about \$5,000,000, and British engineers and salvage experts have undertaken to recover it.

CRIPPLED CHILDREN OF PITT WILL ATTEND CLINIC TO BE HELD IN CITY WASHINGTON DURING TOMORROW

Dr. Miller, superintendent State Orthopaedic Hospital, will hold a free clinic at Washington tomorrow, Thursday July 12. This clinic is conducted for the benefit of the crippled children in the counties surrounding Beaufort county. From all indications there will be quite a number of children from Pitt county there for this examination. The welfare office has on record the names of 20 children who expect to be present at this clinic for this examination, from Pitt county. The parents in most instances have signified their intention of taking their own children. The children that have no other way to go will be brought to the court house where Mrs. Richard Williams, representing the Red Cross, will be in charge and will accompany this group to Washington to be in general charge of the children from Pitt county. The clinic will be held at the post office building from nine o'clock in the morning until five o'clock in the afternoon. As has been stated before this examination is merely to find out what can be done for any child who is crippled in body or limbs and to ascertain if any correction can be made. There is no expense attached and every child that needs this examination should attend this clinic. All persons who are interested in the welfare of crippled children should make a special effort to assist any who may not have a way to go, in going to Washington on this date.

Air Service Chief Puts Stop Further Single Day Flight

DAYTON, OHIO, July 11.—All further attempts to fly across the American continent by the light of a single day were called off today by the chief of the air service. The action it was stated was in compliance with recommendations by officials of McCook Field here.

ST. JOSEPH, Mo., July 11.—

Lieutenant Russell L. Maughan who was forced to land 10 miles north-east of here Monday in his attempted "dawn-to-dusk" trans-continental flight, left the flying field here at 8:04 o'clock central time this morning for Dayton, Ohio, from where he will fly to Mitchell Field New York. The plane which was damaged Monday has been repaired and Lieutenant Maughan is expecting no trouble on his return trip. He expects to reach Dayton within 5 hours and after spending tonight there will hop off for New York in the morning.

Umpire Quigley Was Knocked Unconscious By Foul Ball Today

PHILADELPHIA, July 11.—Umpire Quigley was hit on the left side of the head by a foul ball and knocked unconscious in the second inning of the first game between Philadelphia colored, charged with cursing and Cincinnati here today. Terrific Explosion At Cartridge Plant Results Many Deaths

Alton, Ill., July 10.—The toll of dead claimed by a terrific explosion at the Western Cartridge Company plant at East Alton, this afternoon, reached a total of 11 when two more women employees succumbed to their injuries shortly before midnight. The number of injured was reported to be 23, ten of whom were only slightly hurt.

Alton, Ill., July 10.—Eight persons were killed and 26 injured in an explosion this afternoon in the metallic shell department of the Western Cartridge Company plant at East Alton.

Three of the dead were women. They were Mrs. Mittle Warren, of Alton, mother of ten children; Miss Anna Gorman, of Alton, and an unidentified employee. The men: William Brummer, of East Alton; Frank Benns, of Alton; Russell Reburn, of Brownstown, Illinois; Charles Hawkin, of Alton, an Howard Hunter of Alton.

Three of these injured, it is feared will die, while three others are said to be in a serious condition.

More Worry For Board About The Ship Liquor Law

WASHINGTON, July 10.—Reports of consumption of private liquor stocks by passengers on board government-owned ships have brought before the Shipping Board the question of its jurisdiction in the matter, with the resulting decision that its authority, as exercised through the ship's captain, does not run to the extent which would permit any interference with the passenger's actions. It was indicated today, however, that this decision might only be temporary, and that steps would be taken to obtain a positive ruling on the question, presumably from the department of justice.

Private Bartenders. As the situation now stands, the board is convinced that a passenger on the Leviathan, for instance, is entirely within his rights when he produces the making of a cocktail at his table in the dining saloon and acts as bartender to his companions. The wide police powers given the commander of a ship under common law and international customs, it was declared by officials of the board, were materially curtailed by the La Follette act as they affected the crew, and almost obliterated so far as they concerned passengers beyond the point where the safety of the ship and cargo is involved.

Regulations, promulgated by Chairman Lasker last October, requiring "dry operation" of government passenger and cargo ships, will be enforced as heretofore it was announced officially, but spokesmen for the board were emphatic in their opinion that at present nothing could be done to curb the passengers defying the Volstead act.

Greek Orphan Boys To Be Trained As Farmers

LONDON.—Two thousand orphan boys from Anatolia have been transported as farm colonists to the rich agricultural district behind the Macedonian front, through the efforts of the Near East Relief and the British Red Cross.

The Greek government has allotted 5,000 acres of land near Philippi to the Near East Relief, which is establishing three farm villages for the boys. Within a year, the boys will be able by hard work to establish themselves on individual farms.

This is the first farm experiment of its kind in Greece and the government farm experts will pay close attention to the initial stages of the enterprise.

School Bond Issue Defeated In Ayden

The result of the bond election in Ayden yesterday for the erection of a larger and more modern equipped high school building was defeated at the polls by a vote of approximately three to one.

Journal Is Found Giving Details of Flight of Balloon

CLEVELAND, July 10.—The navy balloon A-6698, piloted in the national elimination balloon race out of Indianapolis July 4, by Lieutenant Louis J. Roth, with Lieutenant T. B. Null as his aide, evidently dropped into Lake Erie late Thursday night or early Friday.

Lieutenant H. Strong, U. S. N., who went to Port Stanley today and shipped the wrecked balloon and its basket, which, with the body of Lieut. Roth, were recovered from the lake, to the naval air station at Lakehurst, N. J., said on his return tonight that he had come into possession of a journal giving the account of the flight. The last entry was made at 11 o'clock Thursday night. It showed that the balloon was flying at an altitude of 12,000 feet.

Examination of the bag showed that a rip panel had been pulled. Lieut. Strong said. This would indicate, he said, that the airman either were making a forced landing, or were trying to reach a lower altitude. An inventory also found showed no parachute was carried.

Family of Local Man Has Narrow Escape In Wreck

In a letter to a friend here, Mr. H. A. Bost who with his family have been on a visit to relatives in the western part of the state, writes that they narrowly averted serious injuries one day during last week when they were the victims of an auto wreck.

Details as related by Mr. Bost were very meagre. They were motoring in Davidson county near the Yadkin river, where the recent rains and red clay roads made traveling possible only at a very low rate of speed. A team of mules were met in the road, and in his attempt to turn out, his car skidded into a deep ditch, giving each member of the family a general shaking up. Mr. Bost and his oldest daughter, Miss Elizabeth were the only ones receiving injuries beyond minor scratches. The former was thrown against the windshield and his forehead just above the eye was gashed to the extent that the physicians found it necessary to take three stitches. The young lady was thrown clear of the car to the ground, but fortunately did not suffer serious injuries.

Mr. Bost and his family are expected to arrive here during tomorrow.

French Senate Ratifies Washington Limitation Treaty; Vote 287 to 3

PARIS, FRANCE, July 11.—The French Senate this morning ratified the Washington treaty of limitations of naval armaments without reservations by a vote of 287 to 3.

City Alderman Was Violating Liquor Laws and Paid \$50

WINSTON-SALEM, July 11.—George Agee, alderman for the first ward, in whose office the police found a small quantity of liquor when his offices were searched yesterday afternoon, entered a plea of guilty when arraigned before a magistrate this morning and was fined \$50 and costs.

College of Surgeons To Hold Meet in Chicago

CHICAGO.—Hospital standardization, scientific research, application of recently developed formulas in the control of disease, surgical and medical clinics and a series of technical discussions in the advancement of science, are among the features of the program of the American College of Surgeons, which will hold its annual meeting here October 22-26.

The surgical and clinical program will be carried out in 40 Chicago hospitals, medical schools and laboratories, according to announcement by A. D. Ballou, general manager of the congress. Membership in the college extends to every state in the union, Alaska, the Philippines, every province in Canada, Central and South America, England and the continent, China and other countries, Mr. Ballou said, all of which countries are expected to be represented by delegates.

JOHN DAWSON MAY SUCCEED NORWOOD STATE CHAIRMAN

Kinston Man Prominently Mentioned to Democratic Fight

RALEIGH, N. C., July 11.—The State Democratic Executive Committee will meet here tonight for the purpose of receiving the resignation of J. D. Norwood, Salisbury, as State Chairman and probably naming a successor. John G. Dawson, Kinston, speaker of the State House of Representatives and prominent party leader is being prominently mentioned as the probable successor of Mr. Norwood, although names of others will be considered.

Mr. Dawson's appointment has been endorsed by a number of Democratic leaders, including Senator Simmons and former Lieutenant Governor O. Max Gardner, and his selection is regarded as a certainty by political observers.

Others mentioned for consideration by the executive committee at its meeting tonight include: Hugh Chatham, Winston Salem; W. W. Neal, Marion; S. C. Brawley, Durham; J. O. Carr, Wilmington; and Charles U. Harris, Raleigh.

Field Mouse Causes Drowning of Three Occupants of Truck

MARQUETTE, Mich., July 11.—A field mouse was the cause of the death of three and injury of two others when a truck of the Marquette county road force ran over an embankment and rolled into a pond drowning three of the occupants. The three who were drowned were riding in the rear of the truck and upon finding the field mouse also an occupant immediately started a chase. The rodent jumped from the rear of the truck upon the shoulder of one of the occupants of the seat who became frightened and lurched against the driver causing him to lose control of the truck. The driver and other occupant of the seat jumped from the machine as it rolled down the embankment and avoided death though they received injuries.

Lightning And Heat Causes 25 Deaths

CHICAGO, July 11.—Deaths caused in various parts of the country yesterday by excessive heat were supplanted today by casualties resulting from storms which brought relief to the sweltering areas. The deaths caused by the heat were 12 while 13 have been reported as due to lightning.

Chinese, Opium Being Smuggled Philippines

MANILA, July.—Smuggling of Chinese, and opium into the Philippine Islands from ports in British North Borneo continues on an extensive scale, according to Vicente Aldanese, insular collector of customs, who has just returned from a visit to half a dozen ports in the southern part of the Philippine archipelago.

Collector Aldanese declared that the immigration laws of the Philippines need to be changed to provide a penalty for those who are found to have entered the islands through illicit means. He says lack of this kind of a provision in the present law is being taken advantage of by the Chinese immigrants.

PORTUGAL CLOSES GAMBLING HALLS

LISBON.—All public gambling halls in Portugal have been ordered closed, and a wave of indignation has swept the larger cities as a result. Several newspapers have taken up the protest, claiming that where gambling formerly was supervised and forced to yield an income to the treasury, it has now been driven to cover, and is flourishing as ever before.

One newspaper alleges that loaded dice, marked cards and other trick devices have been substituted for equipment which, under the gambling regulations, was inspected by the police, and that the public has sustained tremendous losses as a result.

WIRELESS AGE
COMING DECLARE
BRITISH PEOPLE

LONDON, July.—Under the heading, "Coming of the Wireless Age," a British scientist contributes a striking article to a London newspaper, in which he predicts that wireless will be used in the near future for directing ships at sea, train and trolley services, traffic control on the road, fleets of battleships and aircraft. "It will be possible," he says, "to direct the path of everything moving on the surface of the earth, not even excepting human beings, by means of wireless."

The initial step in harnessing this potent and little-known force was the establishment some weeks ago of a wireless lighthouse on Inchkeith Island in the Firth of Forth. By means of this lighthouse, ships can be directed through the dangerous channels of the Firth by wireless, so that there is no possibility of their running ashore or being wrecked even on the darkest night or the densest fogs.

Steps are being taken, in conjunction with the British Board of Trade and the meteorological office, to internationalize wireless directions of ships at sea. At the present moment there is lying in Port of London a ship that has been specially fitted with powerful wireless receiving sets to give demonstrations of this new method of navigation in all the principal ports of the world.

Setting out from London, this missionary ship will sail for China, via the Mediterranean, Indian Ocean and the Straits, and thence on to North and South America, and back across the Atlantic to Europe and South Africa, giving demonstrations at every big port on route.

The most ambitious effort, however, will be a cross-Atlantic aeroplane flight which is to be made late in the summer. The machine will carry both pilot and observer, but their attentions will be confined to the actual flying side.

Setting out from Newfoundland, for the first 600 miles of its flight the aeroplane will be directed by the Glace Bay Wireless Station. Then it will be picked up and navigated by a wireless "lightship," cruising in mid-ocean, to a point where control

will be transmitted to Ogar, the big operating station in this country. The whole 2,000 miles of flight will be directed by wireless.

Harness Vermont River
To Supply Electricity

WILMINGTON, Vt. — The Deerfield Valley between this town and the Massachusetts state line is in process of transformation from a quiet, picturesque country with one little village and several agricultural communities to a great artificial lake. This reservoir of energy is destined to send power over electrical transmission lines to mills and factories many miles distant in Massachusetts. On either side of the valley are chains of high hills running almost parallel to the Deerfield River. Here and there the valley widens to include open fields, and again the hills close together to leave but a narrow pass for the river. At Davis Bridge, where the valley is wide, a dam is being thrown across. Under present plans the valley will be flooded in 1924.

Against the huge dam the river will send water from its sources in the Vermont mountains until it reaches a depth of 200 feet. The water will back up against the hillsides and submerge fields now under cultivation. It will cover the little community now known as Miller's Mills and will wash back to the outskirts of Wilmington. The lake to be created will be ten miles long and half a mile wide.

Alabama May Abolish
Convict Leasing System

MONTGOMERY, Ala.—One of the results of the recent investigation of alleged outrages in Florida prison camps will be to make the subject of the leasing of Alabama convicts one of the most complex matters to come before the Alabama legislature when that body convenes tomorrow, for its summer session, according to the opinion expressed by members in advance of the meeting.

Inspired by the investigations and their results in Florida, citizens of Alabama started an inquiry into conditions in this state and several groups now are demanding that the present lease system be abolished, despite the fact that the legislature at its January session extended the leasing system until December, 1928.

Governor Brandon has expressed himself in defense of the existing system, declaring the state should make no changes until some other employment might be arranged, enabling the state to continue them at work without loss.

The league of women voters of Alabama, who also have the aid of various legislators and many private

citizens have declared their intention of endeavoring to have the legislature repeal the extension measure at the coming session. Alleged unsanitary conditions, inhuman treatment, negligence of moral supervision and bad conditions in general are charged by those opposing the continuation of the leasing system.

The Emperor Godaigo dispatched his sons to nearby provinces to raise recruits for his campaign against Ashikaga and their tombs are scattered around the country. The Imperial mausoleum board is making a search for ancient graves, with the hope that discoveries will be made which will help in the study of the history of the country.

Danish Shipbuilders
Report Brisk Trade
and Bright Future

COPENHAGEN. — Danish shipbuilding yards seem to have safely weathered the post-war trade depression and are entering upon a period of comparative prosperity, says the Scandinavian Shipping Gazette.

The yards have come through the crisis very well, principally owing to the consolidation policy which has been followed. With the placing of new orders, the yards are able to work more or less independently again. They are all busy, and a few of them are booked up. Unemployment has benefited accordingly.

The yard workers, earlier in the year, voluntarily agreed to reductions in wages in order to make it possible for the yard shipbuilders to bid low.

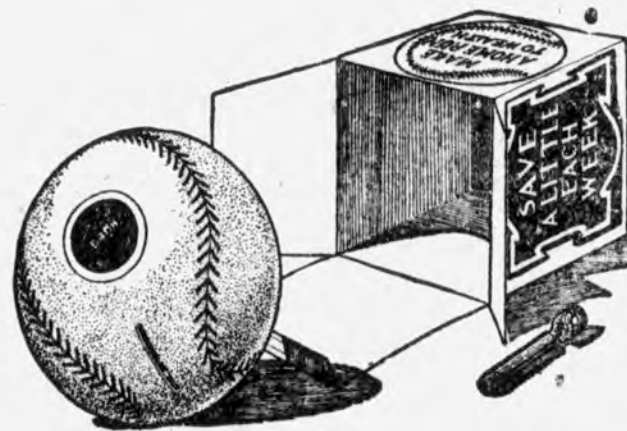

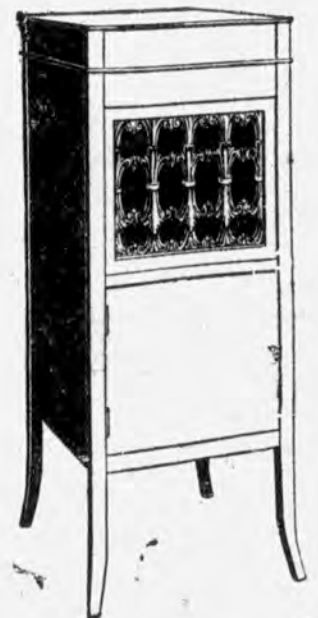
