Legionnaires See Vivid Film Story; Cause Is Lauded

A vivid, inspiring story of how interest in a local legion post was lost and revived at Spray, N. C., inspiring addresses, Adjutant Robert Denny, Greensboro, Charles Sloane, Asheville, district representative of the American Legion of the Veterans bureau and W. "Tom" May, Van Planck, Greensboro, president of the Southland Film company, and entertaining the Women Auxiliary were the features of the meeting of Pitt County Legion Post, at the Wayside Tea Room, last night.

It was the largest and decidedly the most enthusiastic gathering of the post during the year. The room was artistically decorated in the national colors and the event proved an altogether enjoyable and instructive affair.

Lanier Welcomed Guests.

The speakers and the woman's auxiliary were guests of the post. Post Commander J. H. Waldrop presided. J. C. Lanier made a charming address of welcome replete with witticisms. He briefly recounted the purposes and objectives of the local post and of its determination to remain always in the front as one of the leading units of the country. Mrs. C. M. Warren, responded. Dr. C. O'H. Laughinghouse, introduced Adjutant Denny.

He impressed upon his comrades that the best and most effective way to teach Americanism was to live it. He declared that every member of the organization should live such a life as would inculcate into the youth of the land just what the principles of government represented. "To live and diffuse the spirit of Americanism, should be the one big purpose of every legionnaire," he declared.

Personal Visits Urged.

Sloane reviewed in detail what had been accomplished for the benefit of veterans confined in hospitals. He spoke of personal experiences at Otter and other places and explained that no conception could be had of the appreciation of veterans in institutions of personal visitation of friends. He asked that more feeling of personal interest be taken in those who suffered more than others by writing an occasional letter and whenever possible visit an institution.

The remarks of Sloane were supplemented by "Tom May" who also said personal contact with veterans in hospitals in most cases was the most desirable and effective treatment that could possibly be administered.

It was Southland Film company, of which May is president that made the gripping picture "The Hitching Post" which was filmed at Spray, N. C. The story combines the history of the death and resurrection of how a post lapsed into chaos because of lack of interest. The film develops how six stout hearted veterans would not sit calmly down and see their unit die without a struggle. The various methods resorted to revive interest are graphically brought out. The picture was shown at the conclusion of the banquet and speech making, at White's theater after the regular show at that place in compliment to the local post and its guests. Manager Jackson of White's theater expressed gratification that he could extend such a slight favor. The picture was a decided hit.

Legion Prize Winners.

Prizes for legionnaires leading in obtaining new members were awarded to O. H. Lassiter, G. C. Webb, J. Hicks Corey.

Considerable interest attaches among members of the post concerning both the state and national conventions. It is expected that several members will attend the San Francisco meeting in October. FILIPINO CABINET QUILTS, RESENT WOOD'S ACTION

MANILA, P. I., July 18.—The Philippine Islands and the city of Manila is virtually without native participation in the higher departments of government today as a result of the resignations of four cabinet members, the president of the senate and speaker of the house of representatives. The secretary of interior and mayor of Manila had previously resigned.

The administrative affairs are wholly in the hands of Governor General Leonard Wood and his American appointees. He and his assistants will assume the burdens of the government until successors can be found to fill the vacancies. So far the governor general has not indicated how he intends to meet the situation.

The reasons given for the resignations were objections to the policies of Gov.-Gen. Wood to intervene and control even to the smallest detail both insular and local governments and absolute disregard of orders or suggestions of authorities.

Bondsman Tried To Hush Woman Flogging Charge

LUMBERTON, July 18.—W. R. Surles a Proctorville merchant, who is one of the bondsmen of the three defendants held in connection with the flogging of two women, admitted under cross examination this morning that he had tried to get Mrs. Hattie Purvis, one of the victims, to "hush up" the affair "for the good of all concerned."

Stephen McIntyre, voluntary assistant of Solicitor McNeill, in conducting a severe cross examination asked Surles whose welfare he had in mind when he was seeking to hush up the affair. Surles replied that it was for the welfare of the "community and the church."

After a brief interval for the hasty mobilization of their witnesses the defense began a terrific counter offensive against the character of Mrs. Purvis, with half dozen well known women of the little town where she lived swearing that she was varying degrees of bad, and three of them declaring without equivocation that both she and Mrs. Watson ought to have been whipped.

Then John Hedgepeth took the stand to account for his movements on the day of the assault alleged against him. He encompassed an alibi, even to the sort of pants and shoes he was wearing, and to finish his direct testimony he admitted that he was "sorter mad" when his sister told him about being whipped, but under pressure stated that he didn't try to find out who did it.

Turks Accept Terms of Allied Peace Treaty

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 18.—The Turkish government today authorized Ismet Pasha to sign the Lausanne treaty.

LAUSANNE, July 18.—The Turkish peace treaty will be signed July 24 or 25, according to present expectations. The Allied and Turkish delegates now at Lausanne will be the signatories of the main treaty and the other documents to be signed including the agreement for control of the Turkish straits. The Russian soviet government has been invited by telegram to take part in the signing of the straits convention.

The agreement reached last night on the disputed questions of concessions and the evacuation of Turkish soil by foreign troops will be adopted at a plenary session of the conference this afternoon, it is expected.

The accord represents a victory for the United States, whose representative, Joseph C. Grew, minister to Switzerland, was successful in his insistence that the policy of the open door and equal opportunity in the Near East be adopted. Had it not been for his tenacity the tentative agreement, made last week unfavorable to United States interests would have been included in the treaty.

Morrison Calls Prison Measure Only a 'Fool Act'

RALEIGH, July 18.—A ruling by Attorney General J. S. Manning to the effect that the failure of the legislature to make an appropriation for the state prison after it had provided that the prison maintenance be placed on an appropriation basis nullified the act, has dissipated all suggestion of a special session of the legislature to cure the defect of the law.

Discovery of the failure of the legislature to make provision for the maintenance of the state prison created grave concern in state circles, opinion differing materially as to the effect of such neglect.

State Treasurer B. R. Lacy joined Governor Morrison and State Prison Superintendent George Pou in criticism of the measure, which was a bill proposed by the Citizens' committee of one hundred on Penal Reform. Lacy and Pou declared it a "fool bill."

Prominent Educator Dead.

SAILSBURY, July 18.—Benjamin Skinner, prominent educator of this state and formerly an instructor at state college of agriculture and engineering died at the home of his daughter here last night. The body was taken to Raleigh today for interment.

Capital Stock Tax Must Be Paid U. S. Before July 31, Fiat

To avoid penalty, returns and payment must be made on or before July 31, 1923, of the miscellaneous occupational taxes the special tobacco manufactures' tax and the special tax on the use of boats, provided for by the Revenue Act of 1921, says U. S. Collector of Internal Revenue.

Capital stock tax returns also must be made on or before July 31, payment being required on 10 days notice and demand by the collector.

The revenue act provides that "every domestic corporation shall pay annually a special excise tax with respect to carrying on or doing business, equivalent to \$1 for each \$1000 of so much of the fair average value of its capital stock for the preceding year ending June 30 as is in excess of \$5,000. In estimating the value of capital stock the surplus and undivided profits shall be included. Every foreign corporation shall pay annually a special excise tax with respect to carrying on or doing business in the United States, equivalent to \$1 for each \$1,000 of the average amount of capital employed in the transaction of its business in the United States, during the preceding year ending June 30."

Every domestic corporation must make a return on Form 707 even though the law may indicate that it is exempt from tax. The question of exemption is one for determination by the commissioner of internal revenue.

Farm Labor Exodus Has Not Hurt State

ATLANTA, GA., July 18.—Exodus of farm labor continues, according to the southeastern fortnightly crop report. July 1 to July 15, made public here today by the United States department of agriculture, North Carolina, the report added, reports a net gain in some counties at the expense of states further south.

The past two weeks, continued the report, have been favorable to all crops, except that certain localities were suffering from rain. A good downpour is now needed by practically all of the territory. Georgia and South Carolina can need it particularly.

Greenville will have hospital accommodations for 35 patients by Oct. 1, and 30 additional before Jan. 1, it was announced today when contracts for remodeling the Dail apartment house on East Fifth street, and an independent unit to be situated in College View extension at the foot of Summit street were let.

The contracts for erecting the new structure were awarded to O. G. Gulley, local contractor. Work will be started at once and under the terms of the agreement the Pitt Community Hospital will be a reality within a comparative few weeks. Materials for the new building have been ordered and construction will begin upon arrival. It is planned to complete the two units and have them both in admirable working shape before Christmas.

An order has been placed for every modern device and convenience known to medicine and hospital equipment for the first unit. In appointment it will be one of the best in the state, and superior in many ways to cities of more pretentious size. The initial investment including equipment will represent \$100,000. The real estate holdings of the institution are of such dimensions that additional units may be added as required.

With the two units in operation Pitt county, will have the service of a 65 bed hospital which can be increased to 200.

The question of establishing a hospital here has been agitated from time to time for years. However, only recently the proposal took tangible form when a group of Greenville and Pitt county physicians undertook a determined move to fill an urgent and growing necessity. They have been untiring in their efforts which will shortly be brought to fruition.

U. S. Moves To Bust Harvester Combine, Separation Demanded

WASHINGTON July 18.—Separation of the International Harvester Company into at least three distinct corporations, with wholly separate owners, stockholders and officials, was demanded by Attorney General Daugherty in a petition filed in the Federal District Court at St. Paul, Minn., yesterday.

Such a step is necessary, the attorney general's petition declared, because the dissolution decree originally entered against the company in 1918 had proved "inadequate" to break up restraint of trade and restore competition in the production of harvesting machines and other farm implements.

DANCER GAINS POINT ON PERJURY CHARGE

NYACK, N. Y., July 18.—Evan Burrows Fontaine, and her mother, have won a point in their attempt to quash a second indictment charging them with perjury in connection with Miss Fontaine's \$1,000,000 breach of promise suit against Cornelius Vanderbilt Whitney, it was learned today.

Supreme Court Justice Seeger yesterday granted a motion of Edward J. Collins, attorney for Miss Fontaine and her mother, which will permit him to inspect the minutes of the grand jury which returned the second indictment.

NOTED WEATHER NEWS WRITER DIES AT AGE 85

NEW YORK, July 18.—Professor Brooks Maury, for 35 years a member of the New York Herald editorial staff, and a meteorological expert, died suddenly yesterday of heart disease. He was born in Fredericksburg, Va., in 1838.

According to a statement given out by the department of the Interior Alaska has produced in all \$335,526,460 worth of gold and \$8,833,992 worth of silver.

Germany has delivered the first of a series of giant airplanes to Moscow. It is built almost entirely of aluminum, has 200 horse power engine and will carry six persons at a speed of 100 miles an hour.

The 100 mills of the Southern Pine Association shipped, during the first five months of this year more than one and a half billions feet, the largest amount for any similar period in the nine years record of the association.

Farmers of five states, Kansas, Oklahoma, Texas, Nebraska and California met in Wichita, Kas., yesterday to adopt measures calculated to increase the price of wheat from 25 to 30 cents. So long as the price is made in Liverpool, with the wheat of the world in competition, it is a very difficult undertaking. The special delegation, sent from Minnesota to the exposition at Gothenburg, was received by King Gustav of Sweden and royally welcomed. The delegation was also decorated by the King and made knights of the Order of Wasa.

Canada has become a strong competitor of the United States in exporting beef. Over 10,000 cattle have been shipped to England and before the close of navigation the number will reach 50,000. The price paid will regulate the prices offered to American shippers.

The league of nations credits the American delegation to the opium conference with contributing to a large degree in the progress made. There would be no trouble in controlling the traffic were it not for selfish commercial interests, both individual and national. It is well known that certain European governments almost control the traffic and receive a very large income therefrom. Dealing in opium is on a par with poison gas or any other business that makes for the destruction of human life, but the click of the cash register has a more potent influence than any other known force.

Rapid City, situated in the eastern foothills of the Black Hills, in western South Dakota, is destined to become one of the great cement manufacturing districts of the western half of the United States. A state-owned cement manufacturing plant is being constructed for which \$3,000,000 was voted by the voters of South Dakota. The Portland Cement Co., is also erecting a big plant in the same vicinity.

Because another coal strike is threatened operators are urging industries to buy coal now and store it. This method involves, not only heavy expense, but in many instances is impracticable because of limited storage facilities. However, it may be safely asserted that there will be no shortage of coal. It will be recalled that the United States Coal Commission, in its report on the anthracite industry, recommended government operation and control of the coal mines in the event of another strike, or any other emergency which threatens the nation's fuel supply. It will also be recalled that the administration is definitely on record as favoring this plan.

The National Reform association conference at Wino Lake, Ind., has issued an address to the leaders of 75 nations of the world, asking them to "join in setting up the Kingdom of God on earth, acknowledging Jesus Christ, Lord of Lords and King of Kings, so that justice and happiness and brotherhood and peace may prevail through the whole earth." The preamble sets forth all efforts to avert war have failed, and it is now the time to try out Christianity. There is no question of the success of this plan, if it could be adopted, but with Pagan, Jew, Gentile and Infidel all equally interested such a program will be more difficult than to enforce the "golden rule" industrial plan in our own country. Human nature will have to be made over—and that means a long tortuous road.

GERMAN WORKERS AT POINT REVOLT

Nearly 300,000 metal workers, employed in 450 plants in the vicinity of Berlin, are striking for higher wages based on the increased cost of living. They ask for 1,000 marks an hour more than the court of arbitration granted them. If the demands are granted the highest paid metal workers will receive 10,000 marks an hour, or the equivalent of 6 cents American money. This the employers refuse to grant. Such a condition inevitably promotes communism or anything else that offers relief.

In a recent interpellation in the Reichstag with regard to the high cost of living, the Social Democrats severely attacked the government for its finance policy. The Social Democratic speaker asserted that the well-to-do classes, who were called to pay taxes on their income in April, 1922, paid 58,600,000,000 marks. The 10 per cent tax deduction made from the wages of workmen and salary earners for that month alone, amounted to 219,200,000,000 marks.

The riots which have occurred in all parts of Germany are the outcome of the embitterment against those men who are profiting by the situation.

It was demanded that the amount of capital owned by German industrialists in foreign countries should be examined, and the government was warned to find a solution before the mobilization of the masses outside of the parliament would become necessary.

Says Russia's Future Rests Speculators

PETROGRAD.—Only two profitable careers are open in Russia, says a young man today, and they are speculation and banditry. A bandit, an old civil engineer told the writer when riding on the train from Moscow to Petrograd the other day.

This engineer, who occupies an important post with the state railway administration, said that he earned a salary which is the equivalent of about \$15.00 a month. His son, who is a speculator and admittedly not over scrupulous in the way he turns his profits, makes fifty times that amount.

"Our salaries are so low in the state service that no ambitious young man, particularly if he is married, can reconcile himself accepting them. Therefore, to win a fortune or live comfortably, he must become one of that hated class in Russia and elsewhere, a speculator. The only other lucrative profession is that of a bandit, or hold-up man."

"People who blame the speculators forget that it probably will be they, with their quickly secured profits and faculty of taking long chances, who will ultimately build up Russia. It is not a long cry from speculating in merchandise to taking a chance on building a railroad or developing a mine. They are the pioneers, breaking away from old Russian traditions and becoming men of business. Exactly the same kind of pioneers or speculators in your Wall Street helped build up America."

Bones Of Ancient Mammal On Display

YUMA.—A petrified specimen believed to be part of the backbone of a prehistoric mammoth or dinosaur with fragments of the ribs still attached has been brought here from the Mohawk district in eastern Yuma county and placed on display.

The bones were found in sandy soil but portions of quartz adhering to the bone are believed to indicate that the remains have been under pressure for centuries.

SPAIN DISTURBED OVER NEW LOSSES MOROCCAN WAR

LONDON.—Spain is facing a grave crisis over the Moroccan situation, says a Reuter dispatch from Madrid. The problem appears every day to be farther from a solution. The situation is extremely delicate, and the abortive attempts which have been made to arrive at a bloodless settlement have only aggravated it.

The Moroccan campaign is unpopular in many quarters, the corresponding continues, and the facilitating policy which has been the outcome of many recent changes of government has so far produced no definite results. The territory lost in 1921 has never been entirely reconquered and the civil protectorate which was declared last February exists in little more than name inasmuch as the Rif leader, Abdelkaym, is still in possession of a large portion of the zone and has been able to make his own terms with the Spanish in regard to the release of prisoners.

The government's policy was to reorganize the army and make a determined bid for the conquest of the zone, but the recurring demands in the press for the cessation of hostilities and the punishment of those responsible for former defeats forced it, for a time, to abandon the idea of further aggressive action. The army was, however, reorganized and newly equipped with tanks, aeroplanes and other modern instruments of war.

Viennese Too Poor To Pay the Doctors' Fees

VIENNA.—Hundreds of doctors in Vienna are having hard times, these days, keeping themselves and their families alive. The people cannot afford to pay their fees, which are 10,000 crowns, or 15 cents, for a visit. Many physicians' families get meat only once a month, and live chiefly on bread and potatoes.

Ninety percent of the people in Vienna belong to sick benefit associations, and seek the help of an outside doctor only as a last recourse. Furthermore, few foreigners come nowadays to Vienna in quest of medical aid. The home doctors discourage them from taking the journey, representing the local facilities for cures as good as anything to be had in Austria. It is evident the local practitioner does not want fees to slip through his fingers for the benefit of the profession in another country.

Far Away Borneo Offers Easy And Cheap Living Now

LONDON.—British North Borneo appears to be as near paradise as it is possible for the tax burdened man of today to get.

No income tax is collected in the district. There is only a nominal land tax, railway fares have not been increased since 1911, tobacco is cheaper than in any other place in the world, chickens sell for a shilling apiece and whiskey for eight shillings a bottle.

These facts are not taken from the circulars of a colonization agent, but are found in the official report of the British government authorities in the district.

Would Call Halt On Summer Furs

WASHINGTON.—Fashion's decree that women shall wear furs the year round has aroused great apprehension among naturalists, says a bulletin of the National Geographic Society, whose officials believe that some of the animals that are abundant today may soon be in the class of the auk and the dodo.

"It is only by educating the American public to the need for periods of protection for these animals," the bulletin says, "that we will be able to preserve one of the country's most valuable assets for the enjoyment and profit of future generations."

Orchestra Enabled To Travel to Resort With 40,000 Marks

BERLIN.—An American dining in a Berlin cafe the other night tipped the leader of the three man orchestra 20,000 marks for playing on of his favorite airs. The amount was then equivalent to only thirty cents, but it looked so stunningly large to the musician that he scarcely heard the American add: "I'll send a waiter around, and you boys tell him what you want to drink."

"If you don't mind, sir," the leader finally replied, "we'd rather have the money for that, too."

Another 20,000 marks put the leader in ecstasies, for he explained it would help the orchestra greatly in reaching a summer resort where it was going for work because the cafe proprietor would not grant an increase in wages.

Find of Precious Stones Reported

MELBOURNE.—A remarkable find of precious stones has been reported near Wyangala, about 25 miles from Cowra, New South Wales, and not far from the once-famous Mount McDonald gold and copper mines. The stones, which comprise diamonds, rubies, sapphires and turquoise, have been submitted to experts who declare them genuine.

The diamonds were found in blue pug clay similar to the pug clay in which South African diamonds are embedded. The sapphires are of a brilliant hue, and the rubies a deep red.

Prince of Wales Wears Many Suits

HARROW, Eng.—The Prince of Wales is in the front ranks when it comes to quick change artists, as was witnessed during a recent five-hour visit to the famous Harrow school.

The prince arrived at noon dressed in the uniform of a colonel of the Welsh guards and inspected the Officers Training Corps. He changed into morning clothes to lunch with the headmaster, and then put on flannels for an hour at rackets. Afterwards he donned a lounge suit for tea, but he kept this on when he drove back to the palace.

WANT CHANGES MADE IN STATE STOP LAW

GREENSBORO, July 18.—Changes in the North Carolina "stop" law in relation to vehicles and railroad crossings are recommended by the local post of the Travelers Protective Association, adopted at a meeting last week. The changes sought are: Stop signs to be removed from in front of switches and spur tracks; stop signs to be moved from main highways where they are placed to cover side roads that branch from the main road and then cross tracks; railroad companies not to be allowed to let the law interfere with the construction of underpasses or overhead bridges where these are necessary.

BRAGG PRISONERS CAPTURE DESERTER

FORT BRAGG, July 18.—Aided by two prisoners awaiting trial, Private Louis Sariano, sentry, a member of Headquarters Battalion, Seventeenth Field Artillery, captured another prisoner attempting to escape. Two Swedish Acts Curtail Smuggling

STOCKHOLM. — A severe blow has been dealt the rum-running fraternity of Sweden through the adoption by the Riksdag of two bills which aim to curtail the activity of smuggling. One bill calls for the establishing of a special police force against liquor smuggling in the city and archipelago of Stockholm, and the other involves increased severity of punishment for violation of the liquor import laws.

The creation of a special patrol for Stockholm, and the appropriation of about \$35,000 thereto was passed only after considerable debate. The amendment to the smuggling law provides a maximum penalty of one year's imprisonment at hard labor for offenders found guilty of extensive smuggling of unlawful import for commercial gain. In certain cases also the master of a ship upon which smuggling has been attempted can be held legally responsible.

The Coat Gives the Dress a Place in the Sun



You take a blonde, blonde lady and you shove a smallish hat over her blue eyes, dress her in one of the new Chinese coats and she will look just as Oriental as any mannequin from the Rue de la Paix. Because the Indo-Chinese—with, in the case of coats, the accent on the Chinese—influence has mounted the throne of fashion as it threatened, and still reigns.

Mandarin coats are straight, without belts and often shorter than the skirt. The shortness strikes quite a new note as for many moons it has been an indecency to allow the merest rim of the dress to show beneath a long coat.

So here the lady boldly stands, with at least ten brazen inches of pleated green crepe de chine skirt showing beneath the coat which is completely Chinese from the yoke to the silver embroidery.

The yoke, which the embroidery blends into the body of the coat is patterned in design after the old priests robes and is topped by a small turned back and rolled collar of plain black. The cuffs are decorated with the same embroidery done in a heavy silver thread, as is the band down the side front. Red silkrope makes the coat itself. It is padded lightly in the Chinese fashion to make it snug for cold days.

The hat is of black felt, banded in flat white flowers, which rise to a crescent of two large red-centered blooms at the front.

Women Make Excellent Electrical Engineers

LONDON. — English women are turning their attention to professional vocations formerly confined exclusively to men. A number of them in London are engaged in civil, mechanical and electrical engineering, and there are at least half a dozen firms of women constructors who have completed larger building contracts.

America Heads List of International Multi-Millionaires

LONDON.—Who are the ten richest men in the world? asks the Sunday Express. It answers the query itself by giving a list at the head of which is Henry Ford, whose fortune it estimates at \$500,000,000. John D. Rockefeller comes next with \$450,000,000; Andrew W. Mellon secretary of the treasury, is third with \$150,000,000, and then follow the Duke of Westminster, Sir Basil Zaharoff, Hugo Stinnes, Percy Rockefeller, Baron H. Mitsui, Baron H. Iwasaki and the Gaekwar of Baroda, each with \$100,000,000.

James B. Duke, the tobacco king; George F. Baker, of the First National Bank of New York, and T. B. Walker, the Minneapolis timber landowner, the Express says, might be added to the list, since they all have fortunes estimated at \$100,000,000 while there are at least three other Indian rulers whose fortunes probably exceed this amount.

The Rothschilds, Guggenheims, Vanderbilts, Weyerhaeusers, and the Astors, says the writer, do not appear because their are family fortunes. The Rothschild wealth has been estimated at from \$250,000,000 to \$500,000,000 and that of the Astors at from \$100,000,000 to \$500,000,000.

Henry Ford is possibly the richest man in all history the paper declares.

He has a net business income of more than \$100,000,000 a year. He earns \$250 every minute. Ceresus may have been richer, since his famous gift to Delphi cost \$10,000,000, and that, reduced to today's terms might mean \$200,000,000.

John D. Rockefeller gave away \$500,000,000 to charity and to foundations before 1921. He is the head, however, of the biggest group of wealthy men ever produced by a single industry, and his private fortune must still rank him second.

Hawaii Will Fight For Rights, U. S. Territory

HONOLULU.—A concerted campaign to obtain recognition of Hawaii's status as a territory and its rights to the benefits and privileges enjoyed by states, as set forth in the measure adopted by the recent legislature, which is known as "Hawaii's Bill of Rights," is being waged by Governor Wallace R. Farrington and

other territorial officials.

The territorial government is mailing to the governors of all of the states and to each member of congress a copy of the "Bill of Rights" which was approved April 26. A letter requesting aid in obtaining the recognition sought accompanies each copy.

The bill, containing 16 printed pages, reviews the history of the islands from 1853, when annexation to the United States was considered for the first time, until the present day.

"This declaration and its method of promulgation are extraordinary, unique in the history of legislation," the document says. "The reason for this procedure is that an extraordinary and critical situation faces Hawaii—one unique in history."

"For a quarter of a century Hawaii has occupied the legal status of full and complete political union with the United States as an integral part thereof, but a misunderstanding appears to exist in the congress and in the executive departments of the federal government as to the status, which has at times resulted in the classification of treatment of Hawaii as if it were an 'insular possession' in a derogatory manner to the dignity of this territory."

The document declares that "Hawaii is in no sense the 'property' of the United States, inasmuch as Hawaii became a part of the union by voluntary agreement as an independent nation, having sovereign powers co-equal with those of the United States." By the manner of its entrance "Hawaii acquired certain inalienable rights, contractual, equitable and moral, to the maintenance of which the good faith of the United States is pledged," the measure asserts.

Calls Octopus Shy; Not the Man-Eater of Fiction Writers

SAN FRANCISCO.—Devilish, better known as "polypus octopus longkongensis," are being caught at Santa Cruz, California, like flies in a trap, and the tentacles are being shipped to fish markets in San Francisco, New York, and other cities where they are sliced and sold at from 50 to 60 cents a pound, according to C. B. Florence, secretary of the California State Fish Exchange here. Mr. Florence says the sliced octopus tentacle makes a succulent table delicacy when properly fried.

While fishermen emulate Victor Hugo and other writers of fiction by telling of terrific battles with giant devilfish, usually ending by explaining how the fish reached one of its eight arms above the water and wrapped it around the boat, breaking the craft in two, Mr. Florence and Professor Harold Heath, department of zoology, Stanford University, California, state that this is physically impossible. Professor Heath describes the octopus as being "of a shy and retiring disposition."

"The devilfish has no bones or no structure of any kind," says Mr. Florence. "It cannot swim, but can only float on the water, or propel itself on the floor of the ocean by means of fastening its suckers on a rock and pulling itself along. Each of the eight tentacles are covered with cup shaped suckers, and these form a vacuum when fastened on an object. Fishermen haul them out of the traps with their bare hands and throw them in boxes in a manner that is extremely undignified to a fish that has an age-old fictional reputation of being a man-killer and boat-smasher."

In the picturesque food shops that line the narrow streets of San Francisco's colorful Chinatown, the tentacles of the devilfish may be seen hanging from hooks alongside many other articles that are strange to the native American. On the floors of the whole sale fish houses here the devilfish may be seen stacked in jelly-like heaps, with tentacles, in some cases, extending ten feet across, five feet from each side of the small, egg-shaped head.

The traps at Santa Cruz, where the majority of the devilfish are caught on the Pacific Coast, are built like fly traps, only much larger. The traps are made of wire, with a cone-shaped entrance for the octopus to squeeze through in order to reach the bait fixed for him. He has no trouble in entering the ever-narrowing funnel, but finds it impossible to leave. Usually, fishermen state, two or more are caught in the same trap.

Instead of being a fighter, the devilfish protects itself from attack by changing its color and hiding from its enemy, according to Professor Heath. He says:

"To agility and naturally acute senses should be added their surprising ability to change their color to harmonize with that of their surroundings, so that prey and enemies alike are usually unaware of their proximity. This color change is based upon minute elastic sacs filled with pigment and supplied with muscles for causing their expansion.

"As a devilfish crawls about on the sea bottom its color can be seen to change in a twinkling from deep chocolate through dull red and to gray. If sand or rock is encountered on the journey the skin is usually thrown into lumps and ridges, so that under all conditions the body is practically invisible."

However, if Professor Heath's opinion of the devilfish as a food is heeded, the fish will continue to be eaten by its celestial admirers and by a limited few who crave the unusual.

usual. Properly to place before the American epicurean a dish of tender octopus, Professor Heath says, something must be done "to destroy its rubber-like consistency."

Predicts Hinduism Will Fall Before Forces of Islam

CALCUTTA.—Sir Rabindranath Tagore, Bengal poet and 1913 recipient of the Nobel Prize for Literature, says in an interview that on his last visit to America in 1920 he was greatly shocked and disappointed by the selfish, nationalistic spirit which he found, and that he did not intend to visit the country again. With regard to Indian affairs, the poet predicted that the Mohammedans would soon gain supremacy over the Hindus, bringing India under Mohammedan rule.

Tagore was found at his home and school at Shantiniketan (the abode of Peace), which is about four and a half hours by rail from Calcutta. When asked if he intended ever to go back to Europe and America, the poet said that while his first visit to America, 1916, had led him to believe that the United States had become so powerful and so advanced in civilization that she would be able to avoid war herself and would also, by economic pressure, be able to prevent long conflicts between other nations, his last visit had brought only shock and disappointment. The country was war-mad, he said, and without the patience to listen to philosophers, poets or dreamers.

"I am afraid many of the things I had to say were unpopular," he added, "because an intense spirit of nationalism was sweeping America. I am opposed to nationalism in every form. For me every question is an international one. The press and public men were clamoring for what they called 'hundred percent Americanism.' Ah, but that is a dangerous pattern."

In answer to questions regarding the future of India, Tagore predicted the conquest of Mohammedanism over his own religion of Hinduism. "It is possible," he said, "that Hinduism may be a religion of the past before many years, and the inhabitants of India converted to Islam by force. And who knows but that it might be a good thing for India if the Mohammedans were to overrun it again?"

"Hinduism is a religion of pacifism, while the teachings of Mohammed transform even our peaceful Hindus into fanatics with a lust to fight. Even now Mohammedanism is spreading rapidly in India. The latest figures show that there are more Mohammedans here in Bengal today than there are Hindus. So if the government falls into the hands of the Indian people, it probably will mean Mohammedan rule again. But even that would be preferable to the present government, because it would be government by our own kindred."

Says Mexico Needs Real Men for Offices

MEXICO CITY.—Storming of executive offices by office seekers at a ratio of 100 applicants for every government post has prompted General Calles, secretary of government and a presidential possibility for 1924 to declare for more manual training and less arts and science schools for Mexico.

"Mexico should create practical men, not social parasites," he is quoted as asserting. "The tendency to attempt to create professional men is a mistake. Of every 100 students hardly 20 secure degrees, and the remaining 80 dedicate themselves to securing public office."

List of World War Dead in the Allied Memorial Centre

OAKLAND, Calif. — Names of 84,324 heroes who died in the World War today repose in a vault in the Allied Memorial Center here. The memorial, a majestic monument of steel and stone, was erected on the banks of Lake Merritt, in the heart of Oakland, for the purpose of holding the names of every Allied soldier, sailor, or nurse killed in the world war.

Dr. Leroy F. Herriek of Oakland, who erected and maintains the memorial at his own expense, states that in time he hopes to have the names of every participant of the world war in the huge vault of the Allied Memorial Center.

Dr. Herriek stated that the Canadian authorities have promised to have a complete list of the soldier and sailor dead of Canada in his hands on July 1, and, he says, the names will be deposited on July 4 with proper patriotic services. This, the memorial founder stated, will be a departure from the usual method of depositing the names.

"I planned and since 1919 have carried out my plan of holding patriotic services for the depositing of names on each Memorial Day and each Armistice Day," said Dr. Herriek. "However, I do not want to keep the entire Canadian list out of the vault until next November 11, and I am going to break the rule of procedure this once."

"I do not know how long it is going to take me to get the names of the 1,500,000 soldier dead of France. The French war authorities have not finished compiling its list. I expect to have the Australian and New Zealand lists in time for next Armistice day, but I do not know how long it will take to get complete lists from England, Belgium, Italy and other allies. "The names in the vault today are all American, with the exception of 145 of Brazil's war dead."

The monument has the portraits of Washington, Lincoln, Roosevelt, and Wilson carved on the four sides, and is topped by an eagle. Dr. Herriek, a local physician for the last 30 years, was born in Wellington, Maine, in 1861.
