Maughan Sets New Air Record, 'Frisco Before Sunset,' He Shouts To Crowd

OMAHA, NEB., July 19.—Lieut. Russell Maughan passed over Kearney, Neb., at about 1:30 p. m. central time, according to a telephone message received here. He was reported flying at an altitude of approximately 2000 feet.

ST. JOSEPH, MO., July 19.—Carrying a bundle of today's New York morning papers which he hopes to be able to sell in San Francisco late this afternoon, Lieut. Russell L. Maughan landed here at 11:25 o'clock central standard time ending the second leg of his "dawn-to-dusk" transcontinental flight.

His machine proved to be in perfect condition according to reports of his mechanics here after a hasty inspection and Maughan declares that he is confident that he will be able to reach his destination before sunset.

He stated that he has had no trouble whatever, since he left New York this morning. The aviator maintained his stride of 160 miles per hour on his jump from Dayton, Ohio to this city a distance of 560 miles. He left Dayton at 7:43 a. m. central standard time.

Maughan departed from St. Joseph at 12:03 central standard time on the third leg of his flight.

The next scheduled stop of the daring aviator is Cheyenne, Wyo. The next halt will be at Salsboro, Utah. Maughan is flying a Curtiss pursuit plane. According to weather forecasters along the line which is being traversed by the aviator the weather is ideal for flying. In order to reach San Francisco, the flight from Mitchell Field, N. Y., to the former place must be made in 16 hours and 15 minutes.

INDIANAPOLIS, IND., July 19.—Lieutenant Maughan passed over this city at 8:34 central standard time.

CHRISTMAN, ILL., July 19.—Lieut. Maughan in his coast to coast flight between dawn and dusk passed over here 9:18.

HANNIBAL, Mo., July 19.—Flying high and at a furious rate of speed Lieut. Maughan passed north of here at 10:17.

Pou Knew All About the Prison Bill, She Asserts

RALEIGH, July 19.—"Until the object of the state prison is primarily one of remaking men and women rather than making money, it can never become the reformatory institution it should be," declared Mrs. Kate Burr Johnson, Commissioner of Public Welfare, on her return from Chapel Hill, when she reiterated her statement that the bill fostered by the committee of one hundred placing the state prison on an appropriation basis had the expressed approval of George Ross Pou, superintendent of the state prison.

Discovery of the fact that no appropriation had been made by the legislature for the state prison after the passage of the act changing its method of maintenance, led to grave fears that a special session of the legislature would be necessary to cure the defect. A ruling of the Attorney General to the effect that the legislature to perfect the method it proposed, nullified the act, relieved the situation. Statements by Mrs. Johnson were directed at newspaper stories in which Mr. Pou was quoted as disapproving the bill, and confessing ignorance of it until informed within the last few days, and laying responsibility for it at the feet of the welfare agencies of the state.

Brookhart to Urge Soviet Recognition

NEW YORK, July 19.—Senator Smith W. Brookhart, of Iowa, said he planned to call on Secretary of State Hughes and report to him the results of his personal investigation of conditions in Russia, from which he returned recently.

"If he asks my opinion about the matter," Senator Brookhart added, "I shall unhesitatingly recommend that the United States arrange for a speedy recognition of the Russian republic."

The world eventually will be forced to recognize the Soviet government as a power to be reckoned with, he declared, and he predicted that it would be only a question of time when the leading nations of the world seek Russia's friendship.

Garrett's Resist Any Attempt To Get Venue Change

RICHMOND, VA., July 19.—Counsel for Robert O. Garrett, clerk of Cumberland county circuit court and his brother, Larkin C. Garrett, county commissioner in Chancey, who are under indictment for the murder of the Rev. Edward Sylvester Pierce, Baptist minister of that county, formerly of North Carolina, issued a statement today containing a sweeping denial of charges filed by the prosecution that Robert O. Garrett had made a practice of obtaining appointment of his friends and political supporters as jury commissioners and that both brothers by various acts of intimidation have brought about a situation in the county that would make it impossible for an impartial trial of their case to be held there.

The allegation will be used by the prosecution as a basis for a plea of a change of venue when the case is called for trial July 26, before Judge B. D. White, of Princess Anne, who has been designated to preside for Judge George J. Hundley, of the Cumberland circuit.

N. C. Flyer Is Killed When Plane Crashes

SACRAMENTO, CAL., July 19.—Jack B. Gregory, aged 26 of Charlotte, N. C., one of the aviators who have been writing from the sky at Los Angeles and San Francisco, was killed today when his plane in which he was traveling from Reno, Nevada, to San Francisco fell near Lake Tahoe, Cal. Word of the accident was brought in by Harry Turner a fellow aviator.

Mother Is Refused Her Child By Court

LOS ANGELES, July 19.—Superior Court Judge Leslie Hewitt has awarded the custody of five year old June Shosted to her aunt and foster-mother, Mrs. Elsie Shosted, denying the habeas corpus petition of the child's mother, Mrs. Lois Pollan, by which the latter sought to recover the baby she "loaned" to her sister in Kansas five years ago.

WOOD AND STAFF IN COMPLETE CHARGE FILIPINO AFFAIRS

WASHINGTON, July 19.—Final government today as a result of the resignation of four cabinet members concerned relative to the resignation of Manuel Quezon, Filipino leader and other executives of the Philippine government growing out of a controversy with Gov. Gen. Wood, will not be determined until the return of President Harding from his Alaska trip, it was announced today.

Reports from Wood and Quezon, submitting their respective sides of the dispute have been received here. MANILA, July 19.—The Philippine Islands and the city of Manila were virtually without native participation in the higher departments of their government today as a result of the resignation of four cabinet members. The president of the senate and the speaker of the House of Representatives. The secretary of interior and the mayor of Manila previously had resigned.

Audit Shows Deficit 86,468.13 N.C. Funds

RALEIGH, July 19.—A deficit of \$86,468.13 exists in the finances of this state according to the report of the special legislative committee appointed at the last session of the legislature made to the governor and council of state here this afternoon. This deficit after the report, is more than offset by uncollected revenues due and payable up to Dec. 1, 1922 and was not considered by the auditor making the report, they only considering such revenues as were collected up to May 18, 1923.

This condition of state finances, according to the committee's report, evinces after a note of accumulated school fund indebtedness amounting to \$710,000 has been eliminated from consideration as the extra session of the legislature had in 1921 authorized this school fund note to be retired from time to time as surplus occurred in the operating revenue. This note was not an item chargeable against the current revenues in the opinion of the committee, as it was accumulated over a period of years and the special session of 1921, recognizing this fact provided for funding it until such a time when from a surplus in the current revenues it could be liquidated.

The committee recommended changes in the system of auditing and saving for the states accounts. These recommendations were received and submitted by the auditor. The governor in behalf of the state accepted the reports and recommendations and the state auditor moved the adoption of the recommendations and pledged that the proper state officials would see that they be carried out. Council of the state unanimously passed motion. The meeting was held in the governor's office. Representatives of the press together with members of the council of state were present.

Seek Standard Names for Plants And Flowers

CHICAGO.—The chaotic state of affairs in the miscalling of names of flowers, plants and other perennials has made necessary the standardization of their names, and a report on the subject has been adopted by the American Association of Nurserymen. The compilation of names of these perennials, the result of more than ten years of actual work on the part of the sub-committee of the American Horticultural Society, is heralded as a great stride forward in the horticultural world. As an example, the committee pointed out that there are more than 2,000 names for roses. Many names have been used for the same rose, and this has resulted in complication.

Accused Floggers Move To Build Up Defense of Alibis

LUMBERTON, July 19.—More than a dozen witnesses were heard today at the trial of Mike Lawson, Jule Brogden and John Hedgepeth, accused in connection with flogging white women. Ernest Branch, testified that he was with Brogden, at the store of the former at about the time it was reported that the white robed figures were seen beating the women.

The biggest sensation during the hearing of the case was sprung when a duces tecum commanding the alleged grand knighthood of the realm of North Carolina and the alleged cyclops of the Fairmont lodge to bring into court the rosters and records of the organization. English Interests Fighting Co-Ops, Senator Declares

KINGSTREE, S. C., July 19.—United States Senator E. D. Smith of South Carolina, addressed a crowd of more than two thousand tobacco farmers and members of the Tobacco Growers' Co-operative Association at a great barbecue held here today to celebrate the success of the association in its first year of marketing and the opening of its warehouses for the crop of 1923.

Appealing to the tobacco farmer to win their economic independence Senator Smith hinted strongly at the dominion of the South Carolina tobacco markets by British financial interests and mentioned the Imperial Tobacco Company of Great Britain as a powerful factor in setting the price for the labor of the southern farmer and his children.

"We fought England because we had taxation without representation," Senator Smith declared. "We fought for it and won, yet when you come to selling the product that the education of your children depends on you haven't any more to say about it than a Hottentot in Africa. We sit down here like dumb driven beasts and allow others to dictate to us what our wives and daughters are worth."

British Note Ready To Be Sent Germany

LONDON, July 19.—The draft of the British note to Germany was completed today and it is expected that one sitting of the cabinet council tomorrow will suffice to obtain approval of the ministries, in which case the note, with covering letter, will probably be despatched to the Allied governments Friday for their approval, and to Washington, not necessarily for comment, but as a matter of courtesy.

It is generally understood that neither document will see the light officially until the note is in the hands of the German government, the date of which will depend upon how long the British government has to wait for replies from the Allies.

MINNESOTA'S CHOICE FARMERS' VICTORY

The fallibility of election forecasts was well illustrated Monday, when Minnesota acceded in the preliminary estimates with a narrow margin between the regular republican and the farm-labor forces in the senatorial contest, returned a rousing majority for Mangus Johnson, candidate of the latter.

The question that has been asked for some weeks has been answered. Minnesota for years a rock-ribbed republican state has now twice in close succession replaced republican senators with men of entirely different types of the old republican guard. First Frank Kellogg, now Knute Nelson. First Shipstead and now Johnson!

This result in Minnesota may be regarded as further evidence of the rise of a tide of dissent in the middle west. It immediately reviews memory of the populist movement of 1890-92, which rose to a height in 1894 and finally broke when the democrats precipitated the free-silver issue in 1896.

These radical movements occur with a certain periodicity in American politics. They are natural reactions. In this case the question of moment is whether the farmer-labor tendency will go to the point of forcing a modification of the policies of one of the major parties, or will progress to the point of the formation of a definite third party.

Just now these elements are in the relation of a third party to the major organizations. In the next Congress the two Minnesota senators will sit as independents, not being members of the republican caucus and assuredly not taking part in the democratic councils. They may hold the balance of power. As the Senate now stands there are fifty republicans—with a vacancy just caused by the death of Senator Dillingham of Vermont—forty-three democrats and two farmer-labor members. This apparently leaves the republicans with a majority of five. But the fifty include Brookhart of Iowa, Norris and Howell of Nebraska, Ladd and Frazier of North Dakota, Norbeck of South Dakota, and LaFollette of Wisconsin, not to mention Borah of Idaho and Couzens of Michigan. Each of these senators is in some degree at variance with the party program as framed by the caucus. Some of them do not attend the caucus. Others attend irregularly. Some definitely refuse to be bound by the caucus votes.

Recently at Chicago the farmer-labor party convention was virtually captured by the radicals and a split occurred. It was thought by some that this demonstration of the "boring-from-within" tactics of the communists would give affright to the Minnesota republican radicals and cause them to stand fast by their old party in the senatorial election soon to occur. But Monday's vote indicated that the farmers and workmen of the state did not consider the Chicago affair at all, or else concluded that they had nothing to do with it and, being intent upon putting a man of party independent in the state, proceeded with that purpose to the end of a big majority.

NO HALT IN INDUSTRY

While there has been some seasonal decreases in employment in a few industries during the month, the latest government reports declare that the present situation is a healthy one and that all indications point to unusual activity during the fall months. Wherever there have been any reductions of employment they have been slight and have been more than counterbalanced by large increases in many of the basic industries. The farmers of the country were, for a time, confronted with a labor shortage which threatened to prove serious, but the supply of workers rapidly increased and is now nearly equal to the demand, though in some parts of this state the farmers are having difficulty in obtaining all the help they need.

The output of motor vehicles of all kinds

has gone beyond all previous records, and many of the factories have been compelled to make large additions to their working forces. The steel and iron plants are running, even during the hot months, to capacity and are hardly able to meet the demands made of them. In the textile industry, the showing is a good one, with every promise of a better record than was ever made before.

Good road construction has created a great demand for common and semi-skilled labor in all parts of the country, and the year gives every evidence of remarkable progress in this important work. Thousands of miles of better thoroughfares are being built, some with federal aid, others by states, municipalities and countless alone. There has been no halt in this work on account of labor shortage, except in a few isolated instances, and it promises to continue active until the winter months. The canneries have now become active, calling for a large army of workers, and good conditions prevail in the foundries and machine shops, in the paper mills and in the lumber and woodworking industries.

The railroads are deriving no little benefit from this industrial activity. While the crop movement has scarcely begun, transportation demands are heavy, and many of the roads are now supplied with all the business they can handle. Managers of the most important lines, that have made large additions to their equipment, and are confident that the roads will be equal to any emergency and that there will be no great shortage of cars at any time during the balance of the year.

GOOD ROADS; BETTER SCHOOLS

Among the important educational movements in this country at the present time is the consolidation of rural schools, made possible by the building of good roads and the more general use of motor cars. As a result of this movement, in the place of a dozen or more poorly equipped school buildings, with inefficient teaching forces, one modern consolidated school is being made to serve the needs of several districts and is doing this in a far more satisfactory way than was possible under the old system. The estimate is made by a reliable authority that not less than half a million children in the country are transported to the new schools by motor cars or busses every day of the session and that the various states are spending from eight to ten million of dollars each year for this purpose.

This may not mean that the old-time district schools will entirely disappear, as there are still many sections of the country where the consolidated rural school is still impossible. Yet it does mean that the era of the Little Red Schoolhouse is passing and that before another generation it will no longer be a common feature of the countryside. That schoolhouse, framed in song and story, played a great and honorable part in the history of this country. Though it was sometimes little better than a barn, and a very poor barn at that, within its walls not a few of the greatest men this country ever produced received their early training and never forgot the lessons.

But times have changed for the better. The old-time country schoolhouse was lacking in what would now be considered decent accommodations. It was frequently insanitary, cold in winter and hot in summer. The desks were as a rule, crude in construction and there was little thought for the comfort of the children. Realization of these conditions has resulted in the present trend toward consolidated schools and the centralization of education in many rural districts.

Many of these consolidated schools are virtually equal to the best in the cities. Some of the buildings erected are imposing structures with all modern conveniences and are used as centers for holding social gatherings of all kinds for adults, as well as for the young.

Good roads have been an important factor in bringing about these better educational conditions in rural districts. The better roads have made consolidated schools possible, while the erection of such schools has increased the demand for more improved highways. Thus linked together, the two have proved of great benefit, not only to the school children, but to the whole population.

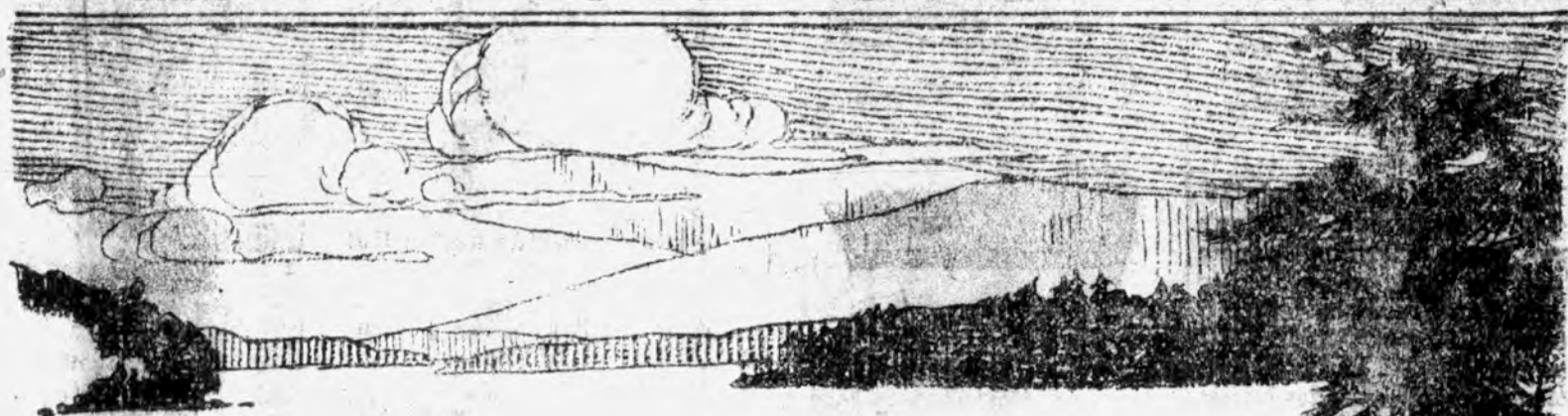

Tennessee To Build Fine War Memorial

NASHVILLE. — A \$2,000,000 memorial, testifying to the regard of the people of Tennessee for her sons who gave their lives in the world war, soon will take its place among the most beautiful and elaborate buildings of the kind in this country.

While the majority of Tennessees troops were returning home from the greatest war of all history in the year 1916, and were being welcomed in the larger cities with fervent celebrations and parades, patriotic citizens inaugurated a movement designated to preserve to future generations a record of the contributions and sacrifices these sons of the state had made in the gigantic struggle for world peace.

Patriotism was still at fever heat when a measure was brought up in the General Assembly to build a \$2,000,000 memorial to the Tennessee world war veterans, especially to the memory of the Gold Star sons. The bill passed easily.

The state appropriated \$1,000,000, the city of Nashville raised \$500,000 and the county of Davidson put up \$400,000 and the post-war campaign crystallized into the plans for a structure which architects claim will be

The structure, according to the designs, will be fashioned after the classic Greek Doric order of architecture similar to the famous Parthenon, an exact replica of which stands in Centennial park in Nashville. There is also to be quite a similarity between this memorial and the new Lincoln memorial in Washington, the architect says.

Tracks of Ancient Race Are Found On Pacific Islands

HONOLULU. — Tracks of a hitherto unknown civilization that may have existed in the Pacific 2,000 years ago have been discovered on the islands of Necker and Nihoa in the Hawaiian bird reservation, to the northwest of the Hawaiian group proper, according to the revelations made by returning members of a government scientific party which is investigating and surveying the islands aboard the U. S. S. Tanager.

For centuries past these isolated spots have sheltered the secret of once powerful colonies that may have flourished prior to the main Polynesian migration which resulted in the settlement of the Hawaiian group, according to A. L. C. Atkinson, president of the territorial board of agriculture and forestry, who was one of the scientific party.

Time and the elements have failed to obliterate the traces of the temples, houses, and the agricultural systems of long ago and it is expected that the discoveries of the scientists may aid appreciably in the final solution of the problem of the origin and migrations of the Polynesian race.

For centuries past these isolated spots have sheltered the secret of once powerful colonies that may have flourished prior to the main Polynesian migration which resulted in the settlement of the Hawaiian group, according to A. 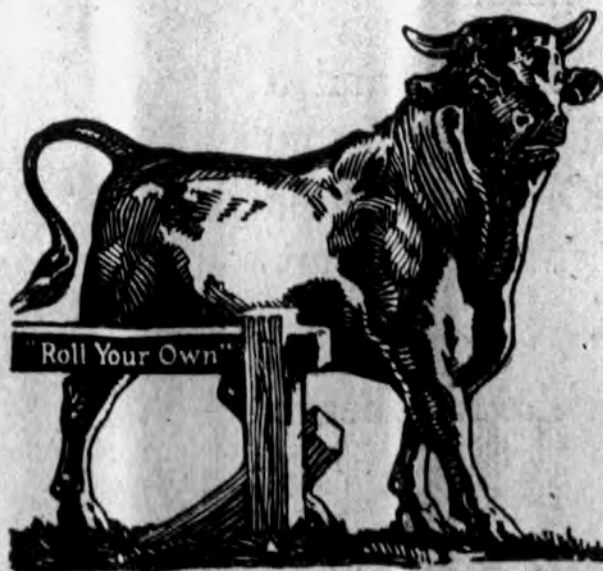

Committee Will Submit Audit of Finances Today

RALEIGH, July 19. — Chairman Long, of the legislative committee which has been going over the auditor's report of the state's financial condition, announced at 1:30 as he emerged from the Attorney General's office where the committee has been in session since 10 o'clock this morning, that the report would be made public shortly after 2 o'clock this afternoon. The report was submitted to the governor and state council at 2 o'clock.

RALEIGH, July 19.—The final report of the legislative committee appointed to investigate the condition of the treasury will be submitted to the public today and will contain a balance sheet showing the financial condition of the state as of December 31, 1922 and June 30, 1923.

It is probable, however, that the auditors' detailed report will go back to New York for revision but this point will not be determined until today. The revision, if made, will affect only estimates of revenue not yet received.

Chairman W. L. Long announced yesterday that the sub-committee appointed last week to draft for presentation to the full committee had completed its labors and will present a report this morning. The report will be considered and, after adoption of any changes which may be agreed upon will be made public.

The report will be formally presented to the governor and council of state today and the recommendations for improved auditing systems in the state government, designed to prevent any recurrence of the uncertainty as to the state's financial condition which has prevailed for the last six months, may receive immediate action.
