HE WANTS TO KNOW "SECRETS," SALARIES, COST OF SELLING BY CO-OP

H. J. Edwards, Chatham, Va., large tobacco grower, and member of the co-operative pool, wants to know "the secrets," salaries, cost of selling tobacco etc. by the co-operative association.

In an advertisement in a Danville, Va., newspaper, he asks some pertinent questions of officials of the Tobacco Cooperative association.

The advertisement in part says: "We members want to know the secrets, such as salaries, cost of selling our tobacco, prices paid for PROPERTY and LEASES on PROPERTY; how much of the \$750,000 authorized capital stock was paid actually into the warehouse corporation of the bright leaf district of Virginia; the name and home office of this corporation, and its officers, who hold the shares amounting to \$110,000 and why did not the authorized common stock exceed the authorized preferred stock as provided in the contract. WHAT PERCENTAGE WAS ACTUALLY DEDUCTED from the SALE of OUR TOBACCO TO RETIRE the PREFERRED STOCK WHICH WAS TO BE DONE IN JUNE, 1923?"

"Why the warehouse department asked for the resignation of the warehouse manager at Rocky Mount, when it was conceded that he operated the most

successful and the most economical warehouse in the three states. Directors only have this power according to the laws under which we are operating. It seems that a premium should be placed on such employees instead of discharging them.

The question of the association attempting at this late date to inform its members that a non-member's interest in tobacco grown on a member's land, or a member's interest in tobacco grown on a non-member's land must be delivered to the association or pay 5c per pound on all such tobacco when the contract is not at all clear on this point.

We should be able to hear, the number of pounds of each grade delivered to the pool in the bright district of Virginia, how much of each grade has been sold and the price actually paid for each grade.

Last, but not least, the question of considering the advisability of subdividing the bright tobacco of the three states into two or more types in order to give the old belt a selling committee.

The following are some of the reasons for such action which are as accurate as we are able to obtain.

The association has divided all tobacco into three types: dark, bright and sun cured, and former selling committees to represent each type as provided in paragraph four (b) of the standard marketing agreement.

Since the bright tobacco is grown in such wide separated areas and includes distinct types, it seems that the value of our tobacco would be better understood by a committee residing wholly in the old belt than by the present committee, two of whom live out of this belt.

For the past seven years old belt tobaccos have sold from 10 to 24 cents per pound higher than certain southern types. That part of the crop sold through the pool in 1922 shows about 6c per pound difference in favor of the old belt, while old belt tobaccos on the open market in Danville brought about 12 cents per pound more than South Carolina tobacco sold for on the open market. The price thru the pool in South Carolina is said to have exceeded the open market about 2 cents per pound and the open market in Danville during the first three months of the season exceeded the bright pool of Virginia more than 4 cents per pound.

We quote Commissioner of Agriculture of

South Carolina which should be an eye-opener: "While the 1922 crop of tobacco was practically as large as that of 1921 and the quality was no better the price was nearly 100 per cent. higher, the result of cooperation."

If South Carolina, with a crop no better can double her price through cooperative marketing, why should we with a much better crop get less than 50 per cent. increase

in the old belt through the same system?
