25 Million Required For Army Air Service Says General Patrick

WASHINGTON, July 30.—The air service of the army will require an appropriation of \$25,000,000 for the coming year if the service is measurably to keep pace with the expansion of the British and French services, according to the estimates prepared by General Patrick for submission to congress this winter.

This estimate is based upon a report of the war plans section of the war department after weeks of study and investigation. The appropriation asked for is the minimum figure needed of the air force is to be maintained efficiently at its present "small and inadequate status," officials insist.

Equal Amount Next Year. Moreover, the report of the war plans section shows that a equal amount must be provided the following year if the service is to be kept from retrograding. Of the amount of money sought for the coming year \$15,000,000 would be expended for new equipment and the remainder for general operating expenses.

If this amount, which is practically double the sum set aside for the service this year, is made available congress will be told that it will be possible to bring the existing force up to a high standard of efficiency and will pave the way for the eventual development of an adequate peacetime defense organization.

Say Strikers Blew Up Water System Closing Mills Down

SYDNEY, N. S., July 30.—Work was stopped today at the British Empire Steel corporation on account of the cutting of the water supply due to several mysterious explosions police were advised that several men were seen fleeing from the scene of one of the explosions.

According to the authorities, one of which of which was in the heart of the city were caused by bombs and resulted in heavy damage. Additional damage is expected to follow from the sudden cutting of the water supply, causing a complete shut down of the plant.

The city is planning to supply the plant with a small quantity of water to cover vital needs.

The confession was made in a hospital where he is confined since the loss of both legs in the Duquesne railroad yards where he was employed as a switchman shortly after the crime.

ACQUAINT THE YOUNGSTERS WITH DELIGHTS CAMP LIFE

RALEIGH, July 30.—A movement to acquaint farm youngsters with the delights of camping out, started several years ago in North Carolina as a part of the extension work with young people has taken hold rapidly, according to S. J. Kirby, in charge of the agricultural club work of the state college and department of agriculture. Most of these camps are being held during the present month but many of them have the dates set for the month of August. It was stated.

Kirby and Miss Maude Wallace who handle the junior work for the home demonstration division are now co-operating with the various county agents in helping with these encampments.

The clamor this act caused forced Governor Smith to order Attorney General Sherman and Supreme Court Justice Wagner to call a second grand jury, which re-indicted the young killing has never been told, Ward having confessed himself with declaring he killed Peters when the latter tried to blackmail him.

No Lack of Work In Nation, Survey of Situation Shows

WASHINGTON, July 30.—Employment conditions are described as generally good throughout the country in a report made public today on a special survey by the employment service of the department of labor shortages of various kinds of labor are reported in several states, notably Indiana, Kentucky, Michigan, New Jersey, Pennsylvania and Rhode Island, while in others, particularly in the Southeast, surpluses, mostly of minor importance, are reported, but generally the supply and demand are reported fairly equal.

Conditions in Southern States, from which special reports were received are described as follows:

Alabama: It is anticipated that the next sixty days will show considerable improvement in the supply of labor in Alabama. At the labor exceeds the available supply present time the demand for common through out the entire state. Shortages are also noted in semi-skilled workers and in some of the building trades. Coal and ore mines are still being hampered somewhat by the scarcity of this class of labor.

Baptists Raise Over Half of 75 Millions

NASHVILLE, Tenn., July 30.—Total of \$44,003,005.70 in cash has been paid in on the Baptists 75 million campaign, up to May 1, 1923, by revised figures announced here. This leaves approximately \$31,000,000 to be raised by December 1924.

At a recent convention of the Southern Baptist convention in Kansas City, the conservation commission of the campaign was asked to push all interest of the forward movement with vigor in order that the full sum may be realized from the movement, as all even of the educational, benevolent and missionary causes fostered by the campaign stand urgently in need of their full allotment.

J. E. Warren, Well Known Farmer, Died Sunday Afternoon

Mr. J. E. Warren, aged 61, died at his home a few miles north of this city yesterday afternoon at 1:30. The interment will take place tomorrow afternoon at 1 o'clock at Gum Swamp church burying ground.

Mr. Warren was born in this county on June 12, 1862. He always made his home here being one of the county's most influential and successful farmers. He possessed a strong christian character and for the past 35 years has been one of the most loyal members of the Gum Swamp church. Mr. Warren was married four times, his wives being Misses Martha Morris, Estelle Pollard, Lula Coggins and Daisy Harris. He is survived by his wife, three sons, W. E. Warren, Greenville; Jeremiah Edgar and Thaniel Warren and one daughter, Mrs. R. E. Harris, Greenville.

After the battle a posse was formed to search for the four moonshiners who were the escape to the hills. The agents reported that several days ago they located the still cleverly concealed and that they had been maintaining vigilance since that time in an effort to catch the operators. Not until this morning was their vigil rewarded when they found four operators at the still and one standing guard. The snap of a twig revealed their presence and the sentry fired. Other illicit whiskey makers ran to assist the sentry and general shooting followed. Within an hour the operators broke away, taking their two wounded with them.

R. S. Taylor, Warsaw Editor Killed By Train

WARSAW, July 30.—R. S. Taylor, founder and editor of the Duplin Record, was run down and instantly killed by a shifting engine of the Atlantic Coast Line here yesterday morning. Taylor, who was deaf, was a member of the board of directors of the State Institution for Deaf and Blind former president of the Deaf and Dumb association of North Carolina and at his death a member of the legislative committee of the latter institution. He was about 42 years old and leaves a wife and four children. He had been in newspaper work in this county for many years.

Belgium Transmits Her Answer to France

PARIS, July 30.—The text of the Belgian reply to the British communication dealing with reparations was received at the Quai D'Orsay this morning and the French and Belgian replies will be delivered to the British foreign office tomorrow morning.

M. Poincare, who is spending the week-end at his country place at Sampigny, had his first real repose after 19 months in the Premiership interrupted during the day to receive the contents of the Belgian note over a special telephone from the foreign office.

Attempt On to Set Up Republic In Greece, London Head

LONDON, July 30.—Reports have reached the British government that an attempt is being made to set up a republic in Greece in place of the monarchy. Ronald McNeill, secretary of foreign affairs told the house of commons here this afternoon.

For some time there has been some suspicion that a plot to overthrow the present rule in Greece has been under way. It is known that a plan would receive more impetus that it is generally accredited.

The Greek legation here has announced that there is no truth whatever in the reports of a republican revolutionary movement in Greece. It is stated that these rumors have been appearing for some time in the European press, but that only last night the legation received emphatic denial of a report from the Athens government.

President Harding Will Be Rushed To Capital When Condition Permits

SAN FRANCISCO, July 30.—President Harding will be rushed to Washington City on a special train as soon as he recovers sufficiently to be able to make the trip which will probably be about two weeks.

Further developments in the condition of President Harding, who is ill at a hotel here as a result of ptomaine poisoning is anxiously awaited here by his physicians. Two San Francisco physicians were called into consultation but up to 9 o'clock had not been recalled.

Neither Brig. Gen. Sawyer, the president's private physician nor Lieutenant Commander Boone, assistant to General Sawyer, would make any statement except a bulletin at 10 o'clock, which stated that all was quiet around the sick room of the president.

While it has not been definitely stated, it is not believed that the president will be able to participate in any of the programs provided for his trip to Pacific coast cities. This is indicated by the announcement that the president would be rushed back to Washington just as soon as he was able to travel.

"SENTENCE YOURSELF," FREQUENT COURT VISIT TOLD BY MAYOR

Will Baker, living near Greenville, is really not bad at heart, but can find things to do other than work the police court. He is well acquainted with Mayor Clark, because of his frequent appearance before the court for being drunk. Baker, declares he does not "look on the wine when it is red," but admits he does fall for the corn substitute when it is white and "tempting." The mayor has imposed every reasonable sentence within his power and has urged the young man repeatedly to refrain from visiting him so often on "official business." He has been fined ranging from \$10 and costs to \$50 and sentenced to the county roads. All of this, it appears has had no effect on him.

When he appeared before the mayor today, he came up smiling and willingly admitted that he fell from the water wagon with such a thud that he had not recovered. The court and Baker were both in a quandary. Finally, as a solution, Mayor Clark, suggested one way out would be to allow Baker to sentence himself. After deliberating for a few moments Baker said he believed about \$12 and cost would cover his latest infraction of law. "I'll compromise," said the court, "we'll make it \$10 and cost." He was discharged with the warning admonition from the mayor to "go and sin no more."

EL PASO, TEXAS, July 30.—Reared in a pigsty for 10 years, through the alleged malice of a step-mother, a 13 year old girl was found asleep in the pen, located near her home here, by Detectives Ivey Fenly and Ira Clin.

The child, scarcely the size of a three year-old could answer only simple questions. She said she had lived in the little pen as far back as she can remember, and that her food was always given to her through the bars.

Neighbors told the officers that her food consisted principally of scraps. Some of them have been taking milk to her pen. The step-mother said the child was put in the pen only to play. County Probation Officer Mrs. Emma Wenster took charge of the child.

Tenth Boat Goes On Reef In Few Days

VANCOUVER, B. C., July 30.—The tug Tyee of Seattle was today reported to have piled on a reef somewhere in the straits of Juan de Fuca which makes the tenth vessel which has been in distress in these waters within the last four days.

Irene Castle Denies Reported Divorce

NEW YORK, July 30.—Irene Castle, today added another touch of mystery to her matrimonial affairs upon her arrival here today on the Lafayette from Europe, when she flatly contradicted advice that she had obtained a divorce in Paris from her husband Robert E. Tremain, manufacturer of Ithaca, N. Y., whom she married shortly after the death of her former husband Vernon Castle.

"I have not obtained a divorce, and have not instituted proceedings for one, she declared, and will meet my husband when he returns next week on the Majestic."

Whites and Blacks In Clash, One Is Injured

CHICAGO, July 30.—One negro was injured and six arrested as a result of the shooting scrape and a fight between whites and blacks at a construction camp near Wirth, Ill., Saturday night. A number of shots were fired, but no one was injured but one negro who was hit over the head with a butt of revolver.

According to a statement made by the county highway police, there was no foundation to the report that one was killed and many seriously injured.

CO-OPS SLOW TO RECOGNIZE BODY BLOWS

Whether the patent truths spoken about the Tobacco Co-operative association, and its method of operation by Col. John F. Bruton, of Wilson, about two months ago are just beginning to be grasped by various local units of the association or whether they have been in a state of inertia is a moot question. However, after the lapse of 60 days the Wayne County association rushes into print with a resolution condemning the speech of Col. Bruton, and "demands him as a member of the Federal Reserve Banking System to show how the credit of our own members have been hurt or whether he is speaking officially or for his own selfish interest."

Commenting on the resolution Col. Bruton is quoted as saying: "I am willing to stand by what I said. If wrong, time will prove it."

One of the significant clauses of the resolution showing that all is not harmony in the ranks of the Co-op members reads: "We believe but for their misrepresentations and efforts to tear down the association, it would be 100 per cent loyal."

Supporters of the association are evidently under a wrong impression. It has not been "misrepresentation" on the part of such sterling citizen as Col. Bruton and others who

have the courage to speak their mind at is weakening association, but it is true statement of facts and conditions that is causing the split in the organization. Be it remembered that Col. Bruton is one of the most-esteemed and respected men of North Carolina. He is not given to talking at random. When he takes a position it is founded on solid foundation of truth and conviction.

It is not hard to read between the lines and recognize the source of such resolutions, an unbounded faith in the association expressed by some community local branches would in other circumstances provoke administration. There is no finer quality of human characteristics than LOYALTY. But in the light of existing conditions it wavered between the SUBLIME and RIDICULOUS.

Despite whatever the sentiment of grips of growers might be concerning the fate of the association, the fact remains that those who sold their crops last season through the organization have NOT RECEIVED FINAL PAYMENT. The Reflector would greatly appreciate it if any tobacco planter is able to produce written evidence from any one of the several executives of the association, stating when FULL AND ADEQUATE PAYMENT WILL BE MADE for their product sold last year.

It would hardly appear credible that the association is waiting for you to sell this year's crop to pay the ARREARS of the preceding season! Frankly, we are in the dark on the subject. However, we have not heard of any grower receiving a full settlement. There might be a number. We merely ask the question, WHO ARE THEY?

Several members of the organization were enthusiastic at the inception of the marketing system, according to their statements have failed to elicit any definite information covering questions on which they sought light. In one instance, a former advocate of the Sapiro-Bingham plan bid for a page advertisement in a newspaper possibly in the hope that some one would be able to give him the desired data as to inside "secrets" of the huge payroll of useless officials, investments, etc. of the association. This man, too, boasted of his loyalty a few months ago, but it is quite apparent that it has received a ruthless jolt.

Similar cases are gaining rapid headway in Virginia and North Carolina. It starts out in spite of all the resolutions that came

passed between now and doomsday to the contrary.

If growers can do without their money for their product and work over a protracted period that is entirely a personal affair. But while they are patiently waiting for it let them cease their carping complaints about being "broke" and the hard times they live in. Above all things the world admires a GOOD LOSER!

Again, The Reflector reiterates that it has neither selfish interest nor personal gain at stake in its position relative to the association. The plan was given a fair trial. It cannot be denied that it has failed in notable cases to realize all that was hoped for it. More than 100 Pitt County farmers have confirmed this declaration under oath.

To those who still retain confidence in the organization, we say that is an unalterable

personal privilege. It is nothing more than a difference of opinion. It is immaterial to The Reflector through what agency you market your tobacco, and we know that every grower in Pitt and other counties of North Carolina and Virginia who brings his product to the Greenville market will probably be governed by conditions that obtain to his best advantage.

Greenville is out to lead all other markets this season. Indications point to a record crop and whether farmers pool their tobacco or sell it on the open floor is purely elective choice. But regardless of how tobacco is sold in Greenville is out to smash all previous records for the number of pounds handled and the HIGHEST PRICES PAID. JUST REMEMBER MR. FARMER, you are going to be the ones to put the new record across.

WOMEN'S ATTIRE AROUSES

ICE OF GREEK ZEALOTS

ATHENS.—Fashionable women in Athens, and foreign women who follow the modern trend in dress, are being terrorized by the violent activities of a local organization which terms itself "the Zealots of Christ."

The members of this association have taken a vow to compel modesty

in women's dresses by force. Women wearing low necked gowns or going about with bare arms are often roughly handled, and the exposed parts of their persons are smeared with tar.

In several cases recently the male escorts of women thus attacked have given the roughs some very severe beatings, but nevertheless the systematic campaign of molestation goes on.

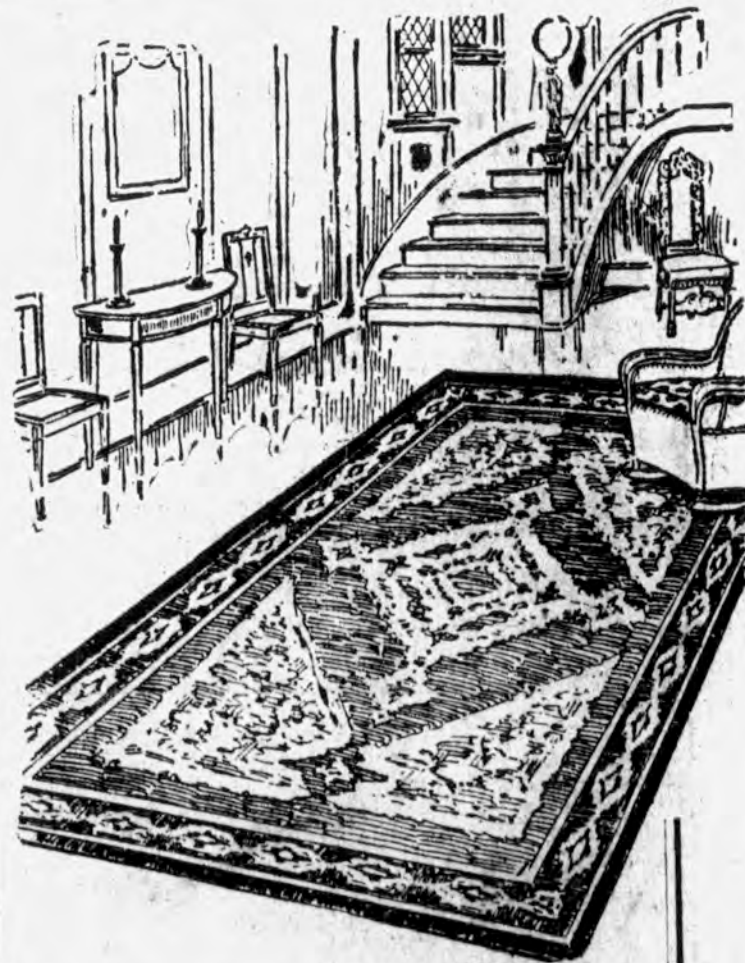
