Warren G. Harding Goes To Eternal Rest In The Bosom of Native Home

MARION, OHIO, Aug. 10.—Slowly moving throngs crowded the streets of Marion again today to pay the last public honor to Warren G. Harding, before the doors of the ivy grown vault will close upon all that is mortal of its loved son. It seems as though that not only Ohio, but every state in reach of this state sent legations to pass the bier or stand silent as the dead president is carried to his final rest. The congested sidewalks which front Center street, where the home of the father again sheltering his son stands behind a glowing wall of flowers.

The special train bearing President Coolidge, Chief Justice Taft, members of the cabinet and other high officials to the funeral arrived here at 12:45 p. m.

At 1:30 o'clock just 15 minutes before the hour set for the beginning of the ceremony the Harding home was closed to the line passing beside the bier. Thousands in the line five deep which extends from the Harding to the union station, a distance of a mile, and other thousands who have been unable to get into the line to wait the chance of a few moments glance at the face of the dead president, reconciled themselves to the stern disappointment that the opportunity had passed forever.

When it was announced that the line would be closed the crowds moved to vantage points to view the funeral procession as it moved to the cemetery where final services will be held.

Take Last Farewell

The day when human eyes will look last upon the face of Warren G. Harding, 29th. president of the United States dawned with many to pass slowly beside the bier which rested in the home of his father, Dr. G. E. Harding. Shadows stealing across peaceful fields denoting the first dawn of day saw Marion astir with thousands of friends, neighbors, admirers and others all consumed with the one objective—to pay final tribute to Ohio's great son. As the day advanced when the huge throng surged about the home of Dr. Harding, waiting the time when they might fall in line and with love and reverence pass by the casket of the nation's dead president and their beloved townsman and leader. Ineffable grief was depicted upon the faces of the sorrowing host. There was absence of clamor, but each face bore expression of resignation, that it was God's will, not ours, that "shall be done."

The brave and determined woman, Mrs. Harding—who has borne up under 14 r heavy ordeal for more than a week, it was apparent longed for the hour when the nation should have finished its glorious tribute and his fellow citizens might testify to their grief, that she could again lie closest alone for a short time with her dead, before the cortege moved on its final march to the cemetery, where it will be placed to rest for ever. Throughout the long dark hours of last night the casket remained open and all were freely welcome to pass and view the features of the man who had brought pride to Ohio and the world at large.

Impressive Scene

One of the striking and impressive scenes at the bier was when the staff of the Marion Star, of which he was editor for 25 years, stood mutely endeavoring to suppress the great emotion within their hearts. They loved their "boss" in life and they loved him in death. Few others came into closer contact with the dead chieftain than the employees of The Star, because of daily association.

Last night it seemed that every man, woman and child in Marion stood along the streets waiting until well after midnight to pay final tribute. No estimate can be given of un-

NATION STOPS BUSINESS AT FUNERAL HOUR

WASHINGTON, Aug. 10.—The nation will pay its last tribute to the memory of Warren G. Harding in silence today as the body is interred. From coast to coast from border to border every wheel of the federal government and virtually every industry will come to a complete standstill. Theatres and amusement resorts will close during the hour of the funeral and all professional baseball games will be deferred.

As recited by President Coolidge in his proclamation to the country announcing the death of his former chief, he did not proclaim it as national holiday, but rather a day of mourning and prayer which he knew would be voluntarily given by the people.

Such congregations and other bodies will gather to offer prayer for the lamented chieftain and bells will toll mournfully as the beloved leader is laid to rest. Not only will American ships at sea fly flags at half mast, but wireless advices from vessels of foreign registry show that they have flown their colors at half hoist since the announcement of the death of the president was first received.

Stays Single Until 50, He Then Weds Two In 10 Weeks

NEW YORK, Aug. 10.—Peter Hoffman wouldn't marry until he was 50, according to an affidavit of Detective Sergeant Daniel Devoy, filed in the Tombs Court here, and then he married two women within ten weeks. Hoffman was arraigned on a bigamy charge and was held in \$2,500 bail. The complaint against Hoffman was signed by wife No. 2, who was Ruby McLean, 28, when she met the defendant early this summer and married him on June 21 at the municipal building, she alleged. They went to live in East Sixty-third street and everything was lovely, she further alleged, until Hoffman walked into the house on Friday night with the former Louise Jensen, 35, who told No. 2 that she had been married to Hoffman in the municipal building on April 9 last.

This caused a row, in which Hoffman is alleged to have told No. 2 that she "must take the air" and get out of the apartment. She left but immediately reported the matter to the police.

DIXIE PAYS GLOWING TRIBUTE IN HONOR OF DEAD PRESIDENT

ALANTA, GA., Aug. 10.—entire south today bowed a farewell salute to a gentleman of the north. Down below the imaginary line of this famed Southland people stood by in heightened sorrow and in silent reverence, as Warren G. Harding reached his home city today. That he was from the other side of the line mattered not. Different political views mattered not. News of his death offset harsh angles of politics and blended a nation into a world of tender remembrance, and today Dixie bowed in genuine grief in sentiment covering the world to him

who lies dead in the little town of the mid-west.

Down through the mountains of the Carolinas, Virginia, Tennessee, through the red hills of Georgia, Alabama, the low verdant valleys of Mississippi and Louisiana, to the wide swept ranges of Texas and Oklahoma and the palm fringed peninsula of tropical Florida and throughout the states that make-up the land called Dixie, the grinding wheels of commerce were stilled, for it was holiday, a strange, hushed holiday for a man not a republican president, but a president of the republic.

GOD UNDER TITLE OF PARENTHOOD USED FEW TIMES IN THE OLD BIBLE

LAKE JUNALUSKA, Aug. 10.—God was spoken of under the title of parenthood only seven times in the old Testament, declared Bishop Edwin H. Hughes, of the Methodist Episcopal church, in an address at the Southern assembly here, under the auspices of school of missions of the Methodist Episcopal church, South.

In five of these, Bishop Hughes said, he was called the "father of the Jewish people; in only two, the father of individual men. In the old Testament there is only one prayer addressed to God as "father," declared the speaker.

"But," continued Bishop Hughes, "after Jesus came and taught, the spell of orphanhood was broken. So 265 times in the New Testament God is named under the title of fatherhood. Thus the parental name sprinkles the records of the new covenant."

"But that doctrine of parenthood does not stop with God alone. We are to be like Him. If we do become like Him, there must be in us

the growth of his own sense of parenthood. He called the palsied man who must have been older than himself by the earthly calendar, 'son; and he called the woman who touched the hem of his garment and whom the context reveals as surely older than Christ 'daughter.' It would not be natural for so young a man to do this now; and it is all an evidence of that overflowing parental mood that was in Christ as the revelation of God. But one of these persons to whom Christ showed the fatherly nature was a foreigner—out beyond the uncovenanted mercies of Israel. But the divine fatherhood in him claimed that fragment of the heathen world. "It must be so with us. 'Tis not the will of your father in heaven that one of these little ones should perish. Why? Just because He is the 'father.' That word purged of the weakness and sentimentality which we too often associate with it, carries the gospel in its arts.

Says He Was Beat Up By Thugs Of Rich Sportsman

NARRAGANSETT PIER, R. I., Aug. 10.—John R. Fell, millionaire sportsman of Philadelphia, has been cited to appear before Judge Watts tomorrow to answer charges of assault and battery brought by his confidential secretary, John Morvisech. Morvisech, a former captain in the German army, was believed to have been drowned following a fight on the sea wall. Later, however, he was found in hiding and told a vivid story of his escape from his assailant. The police were preparing to press a more serious charge of manslaughter.

According to the secretary's story, Fell and Bernard Quinn, a former police officer, and Fell's chauffeur set upon him near the Carlton Hotel. After receiving service cuts and bruises he jumped into the water to escape his attackers. He then swam for a quarter of a mile to a point of a mile to a point on Tucker's wharf and held on to a yacht anchored there. He rested, then swam to Point Judith Country Club, and asked for shelter, but was refused.

Finally after he had walked about six miles he reached the cottage of a friend, where he was taken in and cared for.

WANT GASOLINE PRICE FIXED IN N.C. BY CONCERN

RALEIGH, Aug. 10.—Representatives of the Standard Oil Co., the Texas Co., the Indian Refining Co., and other companies distributing gasoline in North Carolina have been summoned into a conference with Attorney General James S. Manning here on Sept. 5, in an effort to reduce and stabilize the price of gasoline without recourse to the courts under the Justice anti-trust act.

Two objects are aimed at by the Attorney-General—the first to frustrate what is regarded as an effort on the part of the Standard Oil Co. to drive smaller operators out of business in North Carolina by allowing dealers handling their products certain advantages, and the second to provide for a uniform price of gasoline to the consumer throughout the state.

Thus far Judge Manning has not intimated that he would go to the lengths of the North Dakota Governor and urge the people of the State to organize themselves into combative units and buy gasoline at wholesale. His energies are directed toward the wholesaler and not to the man who sells gas in five gallon lots to retail trade at a profit said to range from four to nine cents per gallon.

Romeo As Sleuth Uncovers Loot In His Secret Trust

CAPE MAY, Aug. 10.—Romeo who doubled as Sherlock Holmes resulted in the arrest today of two men as automobile thieves and solved, according to Sheriff Redding, the chain of thefts that stirred Cape May county recently. The men arrested were Joseph Hand of Camden and George Hedron of Camden.

A young man from the rural districts informed Sheriff Redding that last night he had kept a "date" with a girl of Rio Grande, N. J. The girl's parents don't think much of the youth, it appeared, so he has been meeting the girl clandestinely. They saw the lights of an automobile late last night turning out of the lonely Bear Swamp Road and, deciding to investigate, found a cache of \$10,000 of miscellaneous loot.

Sheriff Redding and aids waited near the hiding place and said they arrested the two suspects when they drove up in a machine. Sheriff Redding promised to use his influence with the girl's parents in behalf of the suitors.

The Reflector Gives First News Pictures Of Harding Funeral

Demand China Pay For Outlaws Who Captured Foreigners

PEKING, Aug. 10.—Indemnity and punishment for the bandits who captured a party of Americans and foreigners and held them in the mountain fastness near Fuchow last May is sought in a formal demand upon the Chinese government in a written document signed by 15 foreign ministers. Although the nationalities of four foreign powers were victims of the outlaws other diplomatic representatives joined in the demand.

STORE IS BLOWN UP AFTER WARNING IS HAD FROM KU KLUX

Community Row Over Schools Said to Have Been Trouble Origin

RALEIGH, Aug. 10.—The small country store owned by Sacks Jackson and operated by his wife, Mrs. Florence Jackson, on the road between Creed man and Raleigh was wrecked by a dynamite blast last night.

The destruction of the building is said to have followed the receipt by Mrs. Jackson, of a letter of warning purporting to have been signed by members of the Ku Klux Klan in which she was notified to remove her store which was a sort of community gathering place from that section.

The objection to Mrs. Jackson and her store, according to the letter and other information gathered by the authorities dates back to a neighborhood quarrel, as to the best way to improve the community schools. Mrs. Jackson did not know that her place had been destroyed until this forenoon. The Jacksons live a mile north of Raleigh.

Sheriff Harrison accompanied by several deputies left for the scene early this morning. They will make a thorough investigation of the affair.

RALEIGH, Aug. 10.—Stacey W. Wade, insurance commissioner will leave Raleigh on Sunday night for Madison, Wis., where he will attend the national convention of the securities commissioners (Blue Sky) on Aug. 15. Mr. Wade, who is president of the Southern group of securities commissioners, will make a report on the meeting recently held in Atlanta. From Madison, Mr. Wade will go to Minneapolis, Minn., where he will be a speaker at the National convention of insurance commissioners to be held in that city on August 20.

Harding Cabinet To Remain, Is Report

WASHINGTON, Aug. 10.—What resignations may be submitted by Cabinet members as a result of President Harding's death, it is considered improbable that any will be tendered, the new President immediately.

All the Cabinet officers, it was indicated today, will continue to serve at least for the present, in conformity with the request of President Coolidge that they not even submit their resignations as a formality.

Governor Invited On Booster Club Tour

RALEIGH, Aug. 10.—Governor Cameron Morrison has been invited by the Roanoke Booster Club to accompany a party of Roanoke business men on a tour of western and Piedmont North Carolina, Aug. 24, it was stated at the Governor's office today. Included in the party will be Governor E. Lee Trinkle, of Virginia, and four members of his official family; Mayor Fishburne, Roanoke and Congressman Clifton, Woodrum, of Virginia.

The party will leave Roanoke on the morning Aug. 22 and will visit a number of points in Southwest Virginia and going as far as Tennessee as Johnson City.

Honors For N. C. Man. NASHVILLE, Tenn., Aug. 10.—Roy J. Morton, graduate of the University of North Carolina, has been appointed assistant to Howard R. Fullerton, state sanitary engineer, and has already assumed his duties. It is announced by Dr. C. B. Crittenden, state health officer.

HARDING'S LAST MESSAGE

All that is mortal of Warren G. Harding entered upon its eternal sleep today in the bosom of his native state. His passing marks another victim of the cruel system of politics that besets the office of the chief executive of the nation on every hand. Those who know, will not deny that it was cruel big interests and selfish interests of political groups, led by radical leaders that undetermined the ertawhile vigorous physical constitution of Harding. He was an amiable, loyal but sensitive man and could not withstand its vicious onslaughts. The burden became too heavy and he cracked under it.

This same malicious system attacked Woodrow Wilson and shattered his health. It was applied to William Howard Taft, and forever ended his political life. Even Theodore Roosevelt, possibly the strongest man physically that ever occupied the chair as chief of the nation felt its effect. After leaving the White House it required more than a year's rest outside of this country to partly restore his health. And so it is becoming more evident with the constant turmoil promoted by politicians endeavoring to excite new and meaningless issues designed to harass the president that the system has become nothing less than a menace.

President Harding was quite fit when last words of President Harding could be

he said that at best "the office of president is a thankless job?"

But today as the body of Warren G. Harding is clasped forever in its tenement of clay among the people who knew him best and loved him, it is eminently fitting that the American people should have their attention directed to the last public address prepared by the late president, especially as the words it contained have a force peculiar and striking at this time. This address was planned for delivery in Hollywood, Calif., and was read there by George B. Christian, Jr. just before the president died.

The address was a declaration of sincere faith in the Christian religion and in the brotherhood of man. It was an appeal to the American people to use the teachings of that religion as a guide for their lives and especially to practice them in their dealings with their fellow men.

"I am," wrote the president, "a confirmed optimist as to the growth of the spirit of brotherhood. Science and genius are lending their aid to the removal of the obstacles to intercourse and understanding among the people of the world.

"We do rise to height when we look to the good rather than the evil in others and give consideration to the views of all. The inherent love of fellowship is banding men together and when envy and suspicion are vanquished, fraternity records a triumph and brotherhood brings new blessings to men and to nations."

Touching on religion, Mr. Harding wrote: "We should glorify our faith not by words, not by praise, not by display of arms, but by deeds and service in behalf of others. The Great Exemplar repeatedly urged this truth upon his hearers. There was nothing mythical or mystical about his teachings. The lessons He taught were simple and plain, so fashioned to be understood by the humblest among men that they appealed to the reason and emotion of all. A new commandment I give unto you, He declared, that ye love one another."

There never was a time in the world's history when there was greater need for close ties of brotherhood among the nations of the world and among the peoples of every land. There never was a time when these last words of President Harding could be

used with more telling effect as pointing the way to a universal peace so well established that it can never be broken.

This last message of the lamented President is well worth studying as between men and nations.

GOOD FALL OUTLOOK

Greenville merchants and other business men returning from the eastern markets and money centers are all unanimous in saying there is no cause for a pessimistic outlook regarding the autumn business. Although there may be no particular reductions in prices on staple articles at the same time there is little to indicate any appreciable increase over present figures. 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This country has made a considerable advance toward national prosperity since the beginning of the year. Although there have been setbacks and while farmers in some instances have suffered from low prices for some of their products, a large majority of the people have been able to add to their incomes and to increase their purchasing power.

Chicago Chemist Finds Method To Divide Elements

CHICAGO.—Two chemical elements hitherto considered invisible Dr. Harkins, professor of physical chemistry at the University of Chicago, whose experiments in this field

are expected to revolutionize the chemical theory of a century. Dr. Harkins explained how he tried to separate chlorine the greenish yellow gas used by the Germans when they first introduced chemical warfare. Chlorine has long been considered one of the 90 odd elements, like carbon, oxygen and hydrogen, which have defied all attempts at division. These so-called elements

are present in the earth and in the sun.

"For five years we worked," he said. "We tried all sorts of apparatus and used more than a ton of hydrogen chloride before it succeeded. The gas was diffused through the stems of church warden pipes. These pipes are made of white clay and have stems between 18 and 24 inches long. The lighter parts of the gas passed outward through the stems. The heavier parts remained, and thus we discovered that our so-called element, chlorine, could be separated and another time-honored theory had surrendered. Virtually all physicists and chemists in the United States have accepted the results."

Sees Safety in Parachutes.

LONDON.—Gathering 14 figures from all over the world, E. R. Calthorp declares there were 90 crashes of airplanes during the six months ended June 30. One hundred and six persons were killed in these accidents, and 64 were injured.

Mr. Calthorp says it is only by the introduction of parachutes, and the capable use of them, that fatalities can be materially reduced.

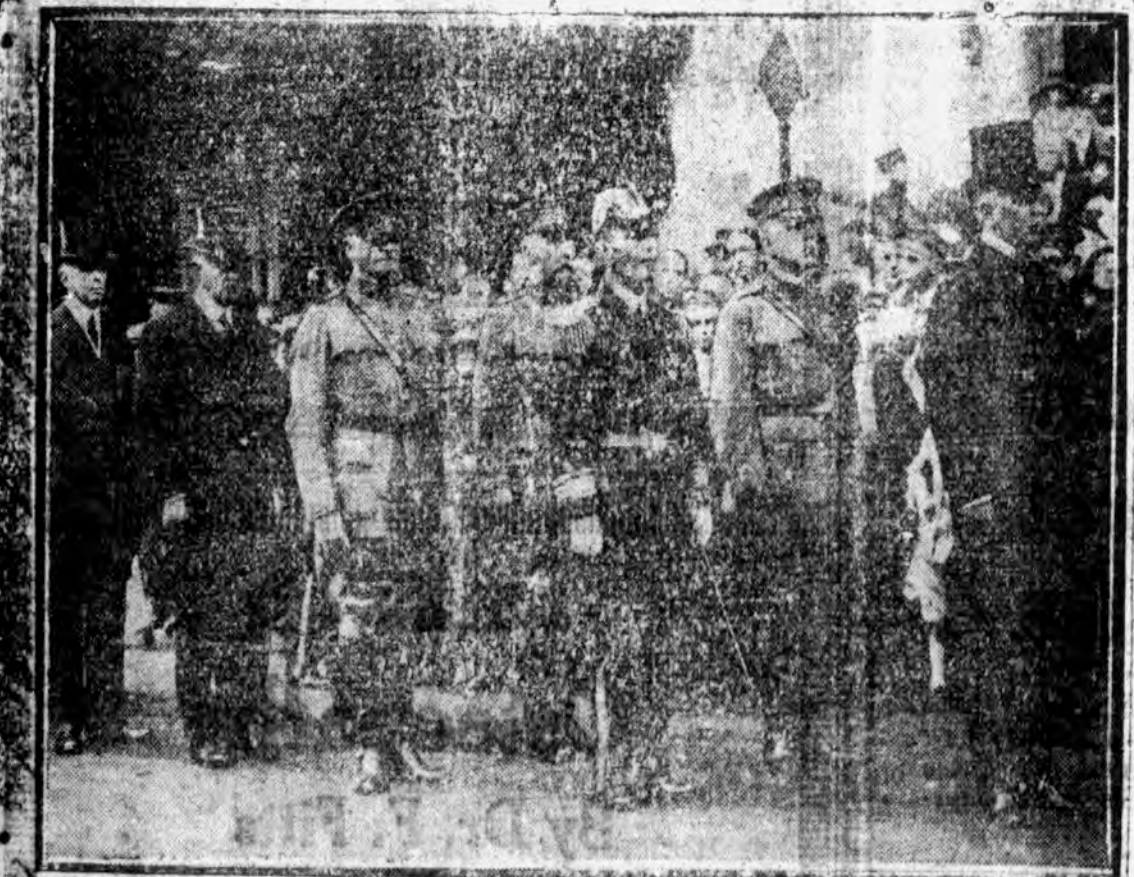

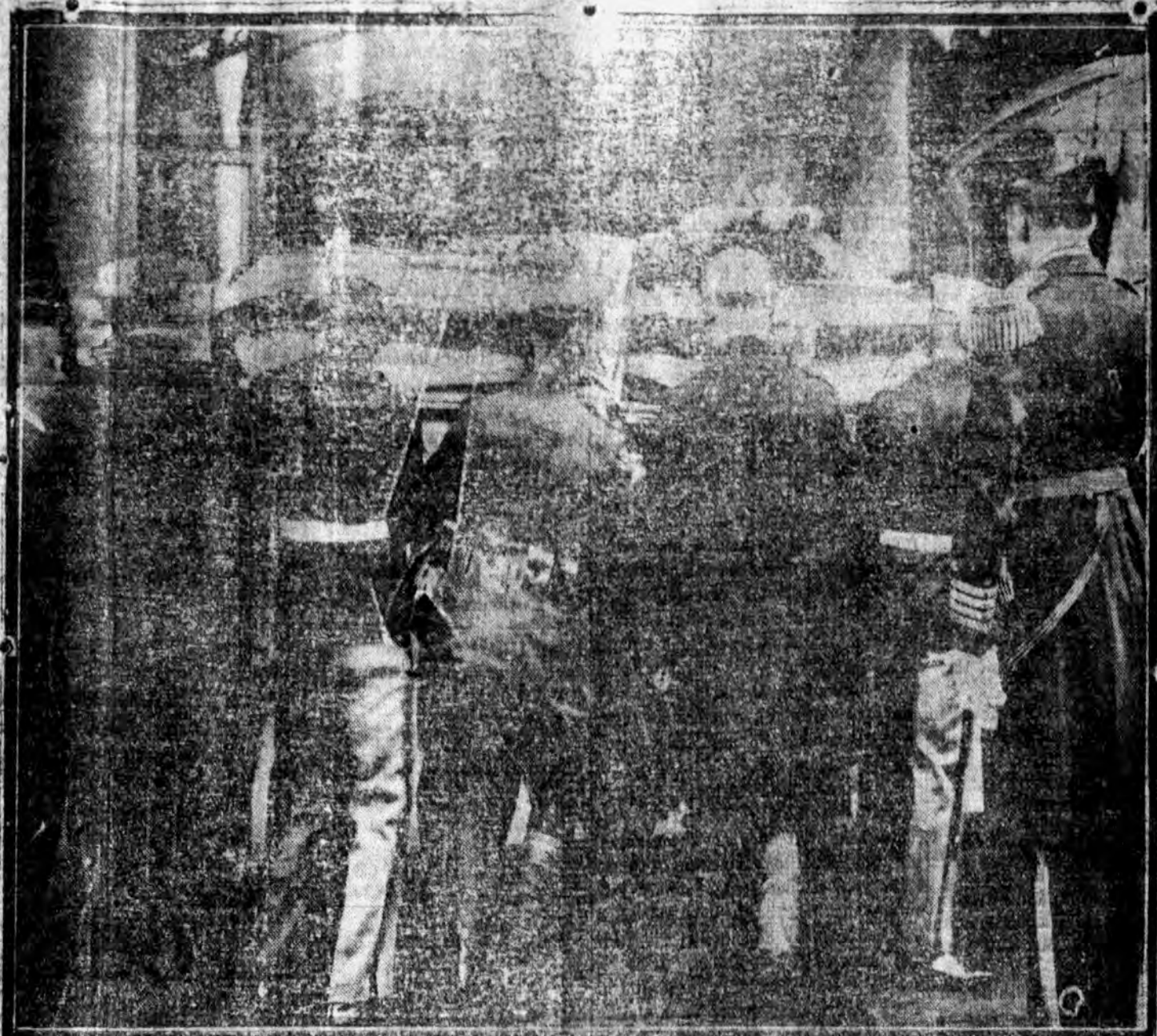
THOUSANDS IN REVERENCE TO NATION'S DEAD AT CHICAGO

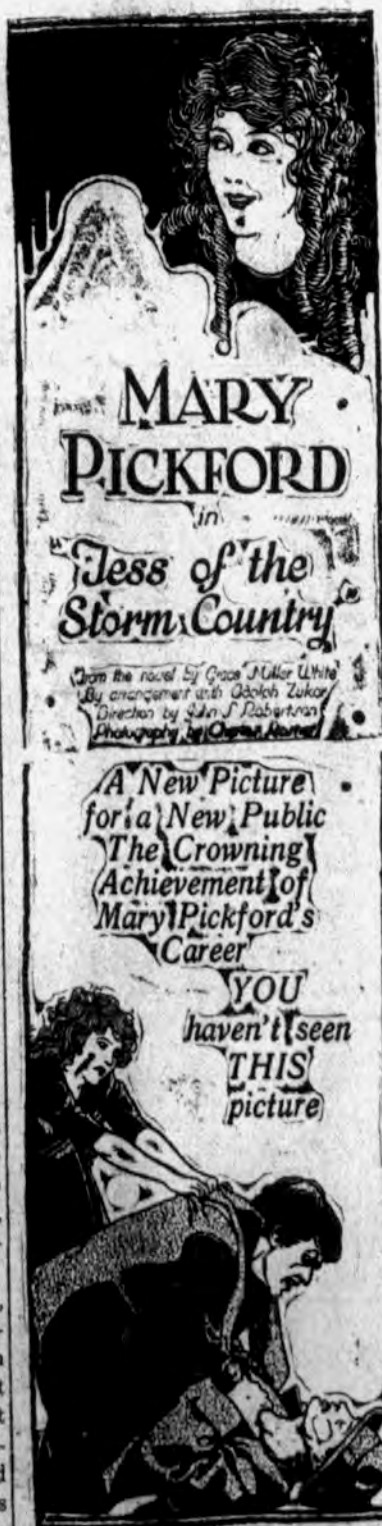

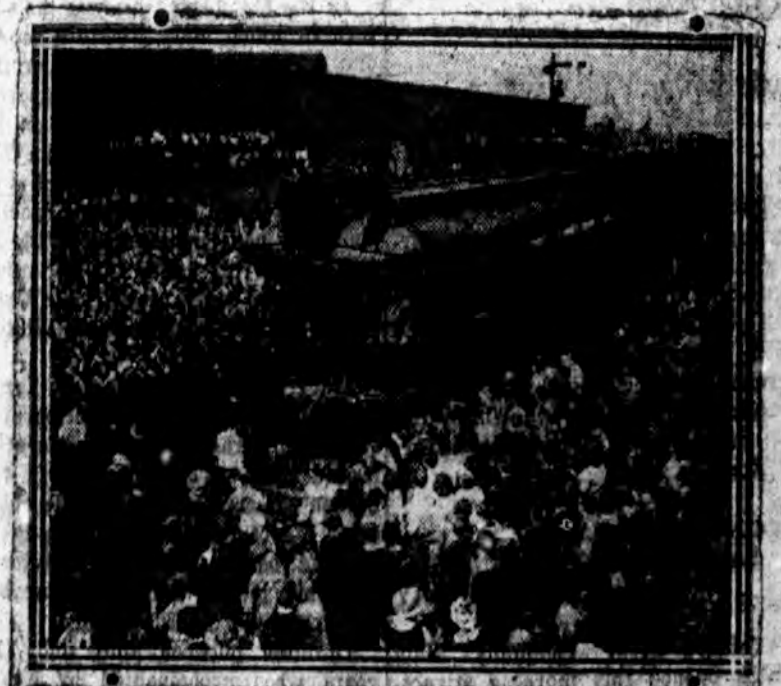

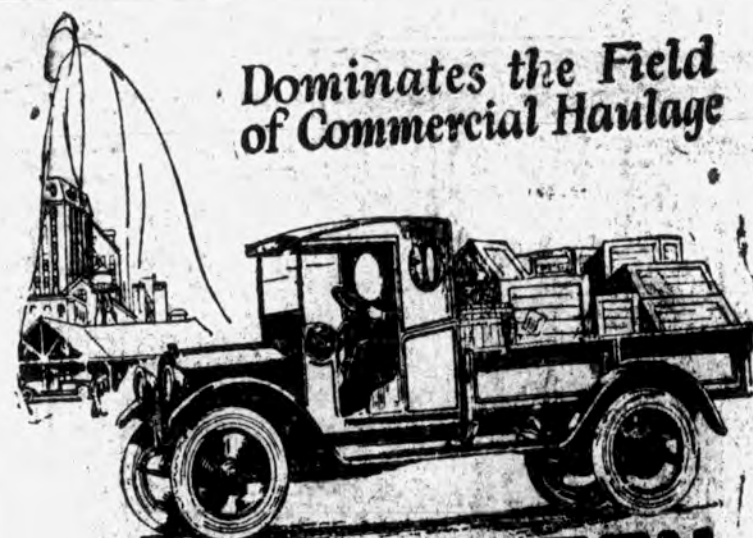
