First Co-op Case Seeking To Annul Contracts will Be Heard Here Aug. 20

The first case seeking to declare void a contract between tobacco growers and the Co-operative Tobacco association, alleging fraud in its procurement will be called in Pitt county Superior court Aug. 20.

Complainant in the suit is G. H. Pittman, one of the best known men and tobacco planters in this county. Another suit similar in nature names S. M. Crisp, county commissioners as complainant. The latter case will probably be heard following disposition of the Pittman action.

Wide interest is being manifested in the outcome of the trial of the litigation among farmers. Many of the issues involved in the case follow closely the allegations contained in bills of complaint filed here against the association by more than 100 other Pitt county growers, as well as many in Martin county.

If precedent is to be taken as a basis for prediction, it is believed that counsel for the association will seek a change of venue in the trial of the cases.

When the matter of possible change of venue is discussed, it is pointed out, that Pitt county embraces a large area, and any talk that an unfair and impartial trial cannot be obtained in the courts of this county is without logical foundation. Judge Lloyd Horton will hear the cases.

Col. Albion Dunn, one of the best known lawyers of the state will appear for Pittman and Crisp. An array of legal talent will represent the interest of the association. Since the issues involved in the actions are so varied and comprehensive in scope, it is safe to predict that every point will be contested by counsel from all angles.

Senator Smoot Gives Gloomy German Future

NEW YORK, Aug. 14.—A picture of Germany on the brink of revolution and of Europe face to face with another devastating war, was brought home by Senator Reed Smoot, of Utah, who went abroad at the request of the late President Harding to study conditions in Germany as they affect the reparations problem.

Equally doleful was the impression brought back by Representative J. B. Aswell, of Louisiana, who also went on a tour of Europe. Both agreed that conditions abroad boded ill for America, particularly for the farmer, whose surplus crops they said Europe was not in a position to buy.

France to Reaffirm Position to Britain Framing Hot Reply

PARIS, Aug. 14.—Premier Poincaré who returned to Paris last night, following a conference with executives of the government announced today that he would reply to Lord Curzon's note point by point on the reparations question. He stated it would be an emphatic reaffirmation of the French view point.

Answer to the British note will probably be ready before the end of the week. It is no longer assumed in official quarters here that he entente has survived the present difficult situation. The whole matter is accepted as a perfectly calm light, and France has long considered that the entente were virtually defunct so far as possible cooperation between England and France on the terms of the Versailles treaty. Premier Poincaré will be careful to omit anything that might lead to disruption of relations between the two governments. He will leave the initiative, should a break in the cordial friendship come, to Great Britain, it is said.

Richmond Man Dies After Hold Up Attack

RICHMOND, VA., Aug. 14.—A pine board, one inch thick, five inches wide and two and one-half feet long, is believed by the police to have been the instrument which caused the death of Percy R. Robbins, 27, who died in a hospital yesterday from wounds inflicted Saturday when he was attacked by a gang of men in an alley near his home and beaten into insensibility.

Jennings French and William Ganzer, who were taken into custody last night, were remanded to jail today without bail on charges of murder in connection with Robbins' death. Preliminary hearings for the two youths were set in police court for August 28.

200 MINERS ARE ENTOMBED IN WYOMING CATASTROPHE

KEMMERER, Wyo., Aug. 14.—Two hundred miners are entombed in the mine of the Kammerer Coal Company, following an explosion here today.

Relief workers started immediate rescue. As they gained entrance to one mine the body of a pumpman was found. The explosion occurred in the lower levels in entry No. 15, which cut off men who were working in Nos. 26 and 28 pits. Rescuers declare there is little hope that the entombed will be reached alive.

Black clouds of smoke from the shaft was the first sign of the explosion. Nothing was heard above the ground as the blast occurred a mile below. Heart rendering scenes around the mouth of pits followed the disaster. Wives and children are weeping and patiently waiting at the mine in the hope that their entombed beloved may be reached before death claims them.

ROTARIANS HEAR INTERESTING TALKS ON BUSINESS; HARDING'S FINAL MESSAGE TO BODY READ

Paul L. Clodfelter, addressed members of the Rotary Club at its regular meeting last night. He spoke on "Banking and Business," developing the relations that must exist between business interests and financial institutions if common benefit is to be gained. His remarks covered a wide range of thought emphasizing the necessity of certain fixed practices that should obtain in the business world. At the conclusion of his talk Mr. Clodfelter presented each member of the organization with a copy of "Banking and Business Ethics," a valuable volume by W. E. Borden and C. L. Hooper, containing useful information that should be applied to every day life.

J. C. Gaskins, made an interesting talk in which he recounted the value of Rotary and its principles as a great auxiliary in cementing the ties of fellowship between men and its functions in social, welfare and business work of the community.

Excerpts from the speech made by former President Harding, who was an ardent Rotarian, a member of the Washington Club, before the International convention in St. Louis, last June were read.

The message, follows: "Oh, fellow-Rotarians, your service is not alone in developing your ideal. It is the putting your ideal into practice. The thing that the world needs today, more than anything else, is to understand that only service will bring about restoration after the tumult of the world war. If we can all get down to service, humble service, helpful service, and appreciate the things the humanity must do to insure recovery, then there will come out of the great despondency, and discouragement, and distress of the world a new order; and some day I fancy I shall see the emblems of Rotary in the foreground, because you of Rotary, representative of the best we have in America, have your big part in making service, one of the appraised offerings of humankind, worth while."

It was decided to hold an early meeting of the club at Griffin, when the citizens of that community will be its guests. The entertainment committee were instructed to make suitable arrangements. The date will be announced as soon as the details of the program has been formulated it was said.

OPERATORS AND MINERS SEEK TO AVOID STRIKE No Extra Session Of Congress Now, Coolidge Declares

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14.—Representatives of union miners and operators in the anthracite field were summoned today by the Federal Coal Commission to meet in New York City Wednesday to renew negotiations designed to avert a suspension of anthracite production September 1. The summons, which constituted the first step of governmental intervention in the existing deadlock over a new wage contract was issued with the approval of President Coolidge after he had discussed the situation with Chairman Hammond, of the coal commission and Dr. George Otis Smith, a member of the commission.

It will be the design of the commission to act solely as agents of mediation and conciliation for the time being, its object will be to work out some compromise which will result in the continued operation of the mines, whether questions in controversy between the miners' union and the mine operators are settled immediately or left to some form of arbitration later.

Mrs. Melissia Tyson left this morning for Freemont to attend the burial of her sister, Mrs. Sarah Beddard who died Monday p. m. at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Long, of Sanford. Mrs. Beddard was well known here having been reared in this county. She was an aunt of Deputy Clerk of Court E. F. Tucker.

OPERATORS AND MINERS SEEK TO AVOID STRIKE No Extra Session Of Congress Now, Coolidge Declares

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14.—There will be no extra session of congress. Reports, rumors and predictions that have been flying about Washington for the last few days were set at rest when official announcement came from the White House today by President Coolidge, that there was no need at the present time for a special session in advance of the regular meeting in December.

It was explained that the new administration has a plan to furnish a substitute in case a strike is declared among miners in the anthracite fields. Should the suspension of activities in the mines become inevitable, the administration was prepared to deal with the situation in such way as to prevent suffering among consumers, it was said.

Bethel Plans Special Masonic Meetings

BETHEL, Aug. 14.—A special county wide meeting in the interest of Masonry is being planned by the Bethel Lodge for Wednesday and Thursday morning. Grand Master H. M. Poteat, of Wak, Forest will be here to deliver an address to Masons and the general public on Wednesday evening at 8 o'clock in the school auditorium. On Thursday morning he will speak to Masons alone in the local lodge. All Masons are urged to attend these lectures. The public is especially invited to attend the lecture, Wednesday evening.

MAN KILLS WIFE, HER MOTHER THEN HACKS BODIES

BEDFORD, Mass., Aug. 14.—N. T. Sekos was arrested early today charged with murder when a box containing the remains of two alleged victims was found in a field. According to authorities Sekos confessed to having slain his wife, Natalie, and her mother, Mrs. Katherine Baker, last Saturday afternoon.

He told the police that a quarrel started over domestic affairs resulted in the tragedy. He asserts he was first attacked, but finally overpowered the women and with a knife and bat fatally stabbed them. Sunday, according to his story, he took his two children to Boston, leaving them at his mother's home. He then returned to the scene of the killing and that night went into the cellar, hacked the bodies into pieces, placed them in a box and buried them in a field.

Cuts In Gasoline Prices Rages In Western Territory

CHICAGO, Aug. 14.—The Standard Oil Company of Indiana, announced today that it will reduce the price of gasoline six and six-tenths cents a gallon throughout the ten States in its territory, effective tomorrow morning. At the same time L. H. Nicholas, head of the National Petroleum Marketers' association, announced he had notified the independents to reduce prices five cents a gallon.

The territory affected includes Illinois, Iowa, Indiana, Michigan, Wisconsin, Minnesota, North Dakota, South Dakota, Kansas, Missouri and part of Oklahoma. The cut is already effective in South Dakota.

"I notified independents to reduce the price five cents," Mr. Nicholas said. "A cut of more than five cents is unfair and ruinous. A cut of six cents as much out of the line one way as he present price is the other."

The new prices were characterized by the Standard Oil Company of Indiana in its announcement as "far below the cost of production and distribution."

The Standard Oil Company said in its statement that it had no wish to injure competitors, but was inspired in making the reduction to meet the competition started by Governor W. I. McMaster, of South Dakota, and now extending to other State executives.

Dry Agts Active U S Reports Show

SALISBURY, Aug. 14.—One hundred stills were taken; 1115 gallons of liquor 84,846 gallons of malt liquors confiscated, and 21 automobiles were captured during July by Federal prohibition agents, according to figures given out by the state enforcement director's office today.

Stressman New German Premier, Policies Uncertain

BERLIN, Aug. 14.—The new German chancellor Gustav Stresemann today outlined plan today to stop the passive resistance of French occupation of German territory. The plan contemplates restoration to rights in the central Ruhr district which would help stabilize conditions in the Rhineland. He also advocated the release of all prisoners. These were the lights of his inaugural speech. He made no mention of the evacuation of the occupied area, but stressed that Germany was prepared to enter upon negotiations for complete restoration of her jurisdiction and freedom of citizenship.

BERLIN, Aug. 14.—Just what attitude Dr. Gustav Stresemann, the new Chancellor, will take toward "big business," now that he is installed as head of the Socialist-Bourgeois cabinet, is a question which is already actively agitating the minds of the politicians.

They recall that Chancellor Stresemann was wholly indebted to the influence and support of industrialists for his political advancement.

When the old political lines were forced to dissolve after the revolution in November, 1918, Stresemann, then a Reichstag leader of the old national liberal party, suddenly found himself marooned as the newly created Democratic party of Theodore Wolff refused to receive him into its fold.

Communists Call Off Berlin Strike

BERLIN, Aug. 14.—The general strike that has paralyzed business in Berlin has been called off by the communists and all transportation lines have been re-opened. It was announced today.

MAN NEARLY DEAD BEATEN BY GEORGIA THUGS TELLS STORY

Leaving For N. C. Tuberculosis Camp, Seized and Flogged

MACON, Ga., Aug. 17.—The receipt of a threatening letter by G. R. Griffin, lieutenant of police, was the latest development in the recent whipping of four white men by unmasked men.

Griffin defied the authors of the letter to face him, and declared he would gladly give his life if necessary, to round up the band. Two of the men whipped and ordered to leave town have complied, one left Sunday night the other yesterday. The third member of the quartet flogged who was ordered to leave the city within 36 hours, is still in a serious condition suffering from tuberculosis. The week preceding the whipping he had made arrangements to go to the tuberculosis camp in North Carolina.

Before he could carry out his plans, he was blindfolded and pushed into an automobile and taken to the outskirts of the city and almost beaten to death.

"I asked members of the band why they were beating me," he is quoted as saying. The reply was, "we are cleaning up the city." The battered man added that he was warned if he did not leave the city they would return and "kill me."

U. S. Stays Action Against Bucketers In N. Y. Inquiry

NEW YORK, Aug. 14.—New developments in the series of federal prosecutions growing out of the \$6,000,000 failure of E. M. Fuller Company, bucketshop brokers, caused United States Attorney Hayward to hold up for today the presentation to the grand jury of evidence against E. M. Fuller and W. F. McGee.

Postponement of the proceedings until tomorrow was ordered when Mr. Hayward was informed by newspaper man of the identity of "G. Shadron" and "H. V. Telfair," as they were listed at Ludlow street jail under varying addresses when they visited Fuller and McGee in jail.

Retail Merchants of South In Session

RICHMOND, Aug. 14.—Fully 500 retail merchants of the Southern states are attending the seventh annual meeting of the Southern Retail Merchants conference here today. Delegates were arriving last night and early trains today were expected to bring scores of retailers from practically every southern state.

The initial session of the conference will be featured by the annual address of the president, A. L. M. Wiggins, and an address by Irving S. Paul, of the commerce department, personal representative of Secretary Herbert Hoover. W. E. Billheimer, of St. Louis, will be the principal speaker at Wednesday's session.

Gigantic County Fair Planned at Cleveland

CLEVELAND.—A gigantic county fair, already is assuming international proportions, will be held in public hall, this city, Oct. 6 to 16. It is to be known as the Cleveland National Exhibition and will have a display of agricultural products and implements, livestock, fruits and flowers from every part of America.

James F. Fleming, manager of the Ohio State Fair, is in charge of the exhibition.

Give him a statement, that's what he is entitled to. They want to know something about those fat juicy salaries that are paid men to ride all over the country and preach co-operative marketing and about the army of men who are on the pay roll for 12 months of each year.

By every right of justice that ever existed they are entitled to such a statement and putting the law on them when they fail to stand and deliver without such a statement will sooner or later be condemned by every right thinking man.

MILLIONS FOR NEW HOMES

Since the beginning of the current year nearly nine hundred millions of dollars have been expended in this country on the construction of new homes. No such record has ever been made in that period of time, and work is now proceeding at such a rate that the year is certain to show record breaking results in this important field of industrial activity. The record has been made in spite of the high cost of material and notwithstanding labor trouble among the building trade unions in a few sections of the country. Most of those troubles have now been settled and the work is going on at an accelerated pace to make up for lost time.

This remarkable showing in home construction is not confined to any one section of the country, but has been nation-wide in its scope. Reports from thirty-six states, covering seven-eighths of the country, all tell the same story.

Figures show how large a part of the many millions invested in building construction at the present is being devoted to the erection of new homes. At the end of the war there was in most parts of the country a house shortage, and the demand for homes was far greater than the supply. Since that time, the shortage has been greatly relieved, although the demand is still so greatly in excess of the supply that rents and selling prices are extremely high, as compared with pre-war figures.

They are becoming convinced that they can find no better investment for their money than such a home offers, and this conviction is making itself evident in the remarkable record of such construction in all parts of the country.

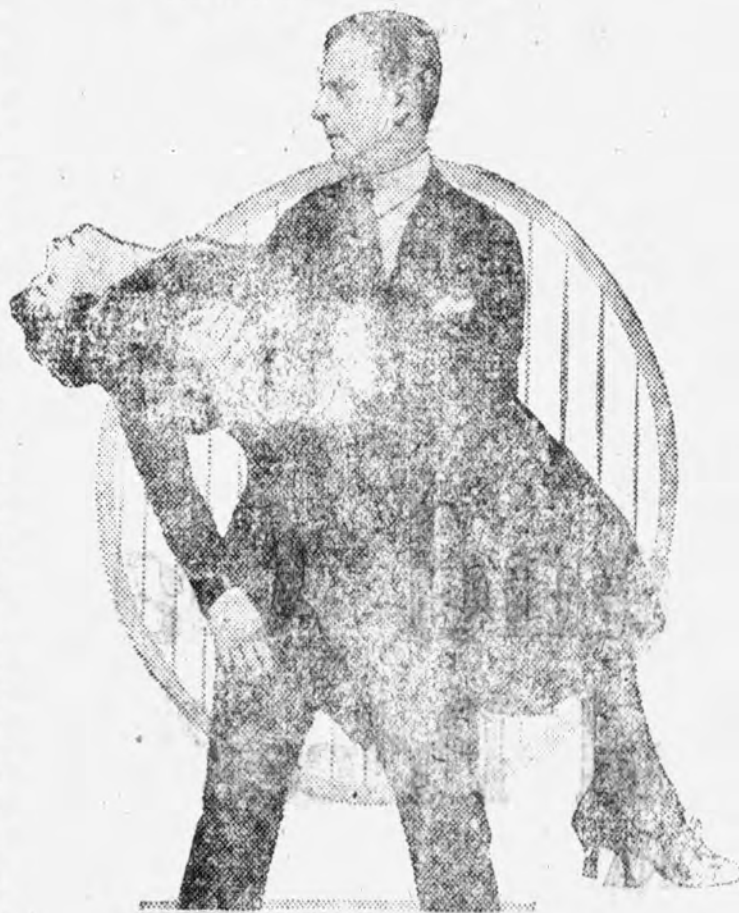
