However, aside from appearances, the question of fire danger should be considered of paramount interest in elimination of such a heap of debris. Action should not be delayed.

Co-op Salaries Employees Range \$3000 to \$30000 R. B. Patterson Testifies

When court convened this afternoon R. B. Patterson, manager of the leaf department of the co-operative association in reply to question by Attorney Dunn answered: That he was drawing a salary of \$30,000 a year; that the assistant manager, Mr. Breedlove, was being paid \$25,000 yearly, and that the other assistant, Mr. Cheatham, was also drawing \$25,000 annually, but latter was not with the organization, his contract having been terminated last May.

The average salary in his department of graders was \$250 per month, and that there were approximately 10 of these. He testified there was also about 10 supervising graders at an average salary of \$6,000.

In reply to queries regarding the average advance on Greenville and Farmville markets by the association that the two payments advanced to the growers showed an average of \$15.63 per hundred pounds for the Farmville market and \$16.52 for Greenville.

Salaries of executives and other employees of the Tobacco Growers Co-operative association range anywhere between \$18,000 to \$30,000, J. Y. Joyner, director of the association and one of its organizers told the court today that those figures were approximately correct according to his best knowledge. Mr. Joyner was the first witness in the trial of the case of G. H. Pittman, against the pool in which he seeks to have his contract set aside on the charge of "fraud and misrepresentation" in procurement.

Qualifies Answers.

When the witness was asked by Ccl. Dunn, counsel for the plaintiff the direct question as to the definite amounts paid to association officials, Joyner explained that he could not definitely answer the exact figures, but gave the amounts as he understood them. Attorney Jefferson Levy, of counsel for the association objected to this line of questioning, but his contention was overruled. Joyner to further interrogation by Dunn whether or not the affairs of the organization had been conducted in a wasteful way, causing loss to the growers under contract, emphatically denied that such had been the case.

Answering another question the witness declared that he did not actually know whether 50 per cent of farmers growing tobacco had been signed or not. He explained that the organization committee met once a

High Lights In Co-op Trial

Causes of action set out by plaintiff—Contract with association obtained by "fraud and misrepresentation."

When contracts were made it was understood that they would not be binding unless the association obtained signers for at least 50 per cent of the tobacco produced in the tri-state territory, based on the figures of 1920 production. Contended this nullifies contract.

Witness denied assertion that waste had been shown in management of association.

Counsel for Pittman demand records of association be produced in court. After conference between attorneys or association a paper written on hotel stationery was submitted. This statement objected to by Attorney Dunn, who demanded complete and definite records. Court ordered that such documents be produced.

Continuing testimony Patterson said that 23,275,520 pounds of tobacco had been received on the Eastern Carolina markets last year. Slemp Invited to Sit In With the Cabinet

WASHINGTON, Aug. 22.—Railroad consolidation and re-organization of the executive departments were discussed with President Coolidge today by Representative Hill, Republican, Maryland.

Hill in a formal statement issued after his conference with the President suggested that inasmuch as Coolidge had solved the problem of relieving himself of some of the burdens of his office "by the appointment as his secretary of a man whose acceptance of the position raises it to cabinet dignity," that C. Bascom Slemp, the new secretary, might properly be invited to sit with the cabinet.

Forbids Wife To Become Cultured, She Asks Divorce

CHICAGO, Aug. 22.—Women of intellect and talent are not of the stuff of which good wives are made, in the opinion of James Ellington, a real estate agent, according to his wife, Mrs. Carol Willis Ellington, who filed suit for divorce in the superior court today.

A series of commands, forbidding Mrs. Ellington to do the things which together might be descriptive of the so-called "modern" woman of today, was given out by her attorney, including:

"Don't attend musical concerts.
"Don't see or associate with intellectual men or women."
"Don't sing or play the piano."
"Don't spend money on books."

On April 2, 1922, Mrs. Ellington's bill alleges, she attended an afternoon concert by Mme. Seumann-Heink. On her return, it is charged, her husband became so angered that he choked her and knocked her down.

When the "plain" wife could bear no longer, the bill alleges, she went to her father, an Iowa minister, and Ellington then forbade her to sing in her father's choir, on the ground that it was "culturing her voice."

DR. C. L. OUTLAND, NEW COUNTY HEALTH OFFICER ASSUMES DUTY

Dr. C. L. Outland, new county health officer has assumed his official duties. The new health officer is pleased with his duties in Pitt county he said today, and hoped to make it rank as the leading unit of the state in furtherance of promoting the public health. State Officials Say Cooper Should Quit

RALEIGH, Aug. 22.—In the midst of the uncertainty and depression which has seized upon the State administration, officials are becoming more outspoken in their declarations that Lieutenant-Governor W. B. Cooper, who is under bond to answer federal charges of conspiracy of the Commercial National Bank at Wilmington, should resign his state office. State officialdom's reaction to the arrest of W. B. Cooper, his brother, Thomas E. Cooper, and other alleged to be involved in irregularities surrounding the failure of the bank, was immediate and virtually unanimous that for the good of the state without reference to his own innocence or guilt, the Lieutenant-Governor should surrender his office.

It's The Town Of Simpson Now, File Formal Documents

This is the a real day for the community known just as Simpson. It now enjoys the distinction of being a regular town, chartered and everything else, just like some of the more pretentious communities. Progressive folks of that place realized that expansion was at hand. They wanted an independent municipal government and set about to get it.

The necessary signatures were obtained and the matter was presented to Mayor D. M. Clark, as attorney for the petitioners to attend to the legal phases of completing the job. That was on July 23. On Aug. 22, less than one month, the charter was granted and was filed in the clerk's office of the court here today.

Mayor Clark went to Raleigh and presented the petition before the municipal board of control, composed of the attorney general, secretary of state, and chairman of the corporation commission. The commission has named these as the first group of officials for the new town: Mayor N. H. Boddard, and J. B. Hardee, W. H. Porter, W. J. Edwards, James Wetherington, J. Lonnie Tucker as commissioners.

Coal Conference Comes to Sudden End, Strike Seen

WASHINGTON, Aug. 22.—Sufficient stocks of hard coal are in storage to meet a normal demand for four months, according to a survey conducted by one of the government departments, it was announced today.

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Aug. 22.—Negotiations for a new wage contract in the anthracite industry ended abruptly leaving unrelieved the prospect of a suspension of hard coal mining Sept. 1.

Miners' union officials, who walked out of the joint meetings, said the efforts toward a peaceable adjustment of the conflict on the part of the industry itself had terminated because the operators were unwilling to concede any part of the demand for increased wages made by the men.

The operators asserted that the breaking point was the unwillingness of the union to submit its demands to the test of arbitration. Both sides, however, assented to the submission of a report on the situation to the United States Coal Commission, thru James A. German, secretary of the joint conference.

Virginia Dare Fund Is Being Subscribed

MANTEO, Aug. 22.—Fifteen thousand dollars have been raised for the erection of a monument at Fort Raleigh in honor of Virginia Dare, according to Dr. R. B. Drane who delivered the response to the address of welcome at the Fort Raleigh celebration Saturday.

When the amount raised reached a sufficient sum, arrangements will be begun for its erection. It is the dream of Dr. Drane that a monument shall also some day be erected at Manteo in honor of the Indian Chief, Manteo, who gave the white man a hearty welcome to the new country beyond the sea.

Bury Publisher Who Died Plane Accident

FAYETTEVILLE, Aug. 22.—The body of Alfred B. de Mesquita, head of the Fayetteville Observer and the Durham Sun, who was killed in an airplane accident at Popo Field, was taken to his home in New York City last night.

Robert H. Thompson, Jr., managing editor of The Fayetteville Observer, accompanied the body to New York, where Mr. de Mesquita's parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. W. de Mesquita, reside at 600 West 11th street, yesterday.

DELEGATES NAMED STATE MEETING OF PITT LEGION POST

Will Work To Elect Dr. Laughinghouse Commander

Election of delegates, and alternates to the state convention of the American Legion in Rocky Mount, Sept. 12-13, pledging unqualified support to Dr. C. O. H. Laughinghouse, for state commander, an address by Cal. K. Burgess, attorney of Raleigh, supper served on the lawn of the Wayside Tea Room and Gift Shop, were the outstanding features of the regular monthly meeting of the Pitt County Post, last night.

Mr. Burgess, endorsing the candidacy of Dr. Laughinghouse, paid a glowing tribute to the Greenville physician. He referred to the attempts to force on the state legion a slate of officers and warned members of the local post of the necessity of organizing to combat that movement at the state gathering.

He declared that because of Dr. Laughinghouse's superior "qualifications" for the office that he had devoted time in assuring to but before more than 500 legionnaires of the state many cardinal advantages possessed by the doctor for the highest office within the gift of this legion. Mr. Burgess urged the delegates to be on hand in Rocky Mount at least a day before the convention met to spread the word in favor of their candidate. "You might as well realize that you have a hard and difficult task before you, but I know that you are going to undertake it with the same dauntless courage and determination that characterized you in war time service," he declared.

"Go into the fight to win, but gain it without pledges or promises to any delegates or group of men, Burgess warned. More than 1000 badges were ordered to show that legion members were strongly behind their candidate and for distribution among delegates at the convention. Provision has been made to carry not only members of the post to Rocky Mount, but Commander J. H. Waldrop announced that every former service man would be provided with automobile transportation, if the desire was indicated in time. Fleets of machines will be parked about the court house on the morning of Sept. 13, and every man in this county who took part in the world war is urged to get on line and make the representation one of the outstanding features of the convention, Waldrop added.

A committee was named to arrange suitable armistice day observance on Nov. 11. It was the consensus of opinion that since the date falls on Sunday, that it would be fitting that the legionnaires attend church in a body to hear a special sermon.

In appreciation of the consideration of Mrs. Travis Hooker, of the Wayside Tea Room, a rising vote of thanks was tendered for her generous hospitality and use of the rooms for legion meetings.

The next meeting will be held on Sept. 20. It was agreed that supper would be served. Other matters of importance will be taken up for discussion at that time, it was indicated.

GERMANY ALONE TO BLAME

Failure of Great Britain to open a way to the settlement of the German reparations problem was to have been expected. Both France and Belgium were well within their rights in refusing to consider propositions that would relieve Germany of any of her obligations. Both of these countries, which were the greatest sufferers from German military methods during the war, justly regarded the act of Great Britain in the nature of an unwarranted attempt at interference, based on a desire to create in Germany a greater market for British trade than there is at present time. This was the view plainly expressed by Premier Poincaré of France. Even the British Cabinet has admitted that this was its chief motive in seeking to bring to an end the French occupation of the Ruhr.

There can be no doubt of the fact that some of the conditions in Germany are deplorable, but this is due in large measure to the policies pursued by former Chancellor Cuno and his government. Count Harvey Kesler of Berlin, now in the United States as a spokesman for Germany, recently asserted that Germany is a sick nation, gripped by two mortal diseases, the destruction of its economic organism and the corruption of its currency.

For these diseases, Germany is alone to blame. This is eminently true of the depreciation of the currency, which now seems to have completely collapsed, despite belated efforts on the part of the government to save it. Many of the poorer classes are suffering severely, but on the other hand the disaster to the currency has produced a host of profiteers.

It is not to be wondered at that Communists have made recent sessions of the Reich-

stag a bedlam. Strikes have been encouraged among all classes of workers, and radicalism in its most dangerous forms has raised its head. But conditions such as these cannot well be cited by apologists for Germany in excuse for the failure of that country to pay its debts, for facts have recently been presented to show that, under good management, Germany's resources and its government receipts would soon turn into its treasury sums that would enable it to satisfy all creditors, without the aid of Great Britain, or of any other country.

MILLIONS FOR CHEWING GUM

The people of the United States are spending a million dollars a week for their chewing gum. Instead of showing any signs of dying out, the habit is growing, and the output of the factories is now more than double that of the years before the war. Among the American soldiers who went overseas to fight against the Kaiser's armies, were thousands of men who preferred to chew gum rather than tobacco, and they seem to have led many of the soldiers from other lands to adopt the practice. They seemed to find in it some relief in their long marches, and in their service in the trenches. Whether this be the reason or not, the world demand for chewing gum began shortly after the beginning of the war and has grown very rapidly ever since.

The country is today making chewing gum for the world, and the number of its factories is on the increase every year. It is now sending the product to nearly every land. To England alone it is exporting more than a million dollars worth every year. France is taking nearly half a million dollars worth, and every country in Europe, with the single exception of Germany, is a liberal gum buyer in the American market.

The amount of capital now invested in the chewing gum industry in the United States is placed at not less than thirty millions of dollars, as compared with less than ten millions in the years before the war. In this production the United States seems to stand alone; other countries depend almost entirely on the American production. There is no doubt that a great improvement has been made in the chewing gum of the present day. Put up in attractive form and offered at a low price, it has a ready sale, not only among children, but among millions of adults.

About all that can be said in favor of the habit is that it is harmless. It hurts neither the teeth nor the jaws. It adds nothing to the health, nor to the strength, and the constant movement of the jaws which it entails certainly does not make the human face any more attractive. Some say, however, they find comfort in it, and certainly the practice cannot be classed among the venial sins common to humanity.

Fears Outbreak Of Cotton Leaf Worm

RALEIGH, Aug. 21.—"Indications are that there will be another outbreak of the cotton leaf worm similar to the one experienced during the fall of 1911," Franklin Sherman, chief of the division of entomology of the North Carolina State college and of the department of agriculture, says. Sherman has received a report from the insect pest survey at Washington, D. C., to the effect that all conditions point the repetition of such an outbreak this year.

"The appearance of these worms in cotton fields always causes excitement and alarm," said Sherman, "though there is generally no cause for concern except when the cotton is very late. In fact, this worm is beneficial to some extent because they defoliate the cotton plants, sending the boll weevil into his winter quarters early and hungry."

NEW YORK, Aug. 21.—Federal secret service agents today raided the quarters of the Consolidated Importing and Exporting company in Lexington avenue and arrested five men and one woman on charges of counterfeiting United States revenue stamps, liquor labels and liquor prescription blanks.
