It is to be hoped that Mayor Clark, will use his power to give these germ-breeding spots prompt and undivided attention.

## Common Grades Bring Good Prices First Day; Growers Well Satisfied

With total offerings ranging more than 200,000 pounds and common grades dominating in demand at an average price of all receipts of 20 cents per pound, the Greenville tobacco market opened today.

The quality generally offered on the warehouse floors represented mainly the first and last curings with comparatively little of the higher grades.

However, the prices varied from 6 to 50 cents, at the approximate average indicated, according to estimates. Growers were all pleased, as the common grades brought from two to six cents more today for similar qualities than on the opening date last year.

#### Come From All Points

While receipts did not total those of initial days of other seasons, still, it was particularly gratifying, both to warehousemen and citizens generally to note that growers came to this market from a radius of 100 miles. Many of them were here for the first time, and if their expressions of satisfaction are to be taken as the basis of prediction, Greenville may reasonably expect deliveries from a much wider territory than ever before in the history of its market.

#### Movement Begins Early

Growers began to reach the city yesterday and virtually continued throughout the night and early today a steady stream of vehicles found their way to Greenville. When sales started this morning, there was every indication that the local market would inaugurate the 1923 season with encouraging prospects were confirmed that it would break previous records for receipts before the year closes.

Farmers who sold on the open warehouse, floors were smiles that reflected satisfaction. The downcast spirit of pessimism that dominated in 1920 was absent. The atmosphere of returning prosperity was prevalent and was inhaled with a feeling of stabilized security for the future.

#### Extend Cordial Welcome

Following the suggestion that business houses have representatives to greet farmers and extend the glad hand of welcome to Greenville and proffer personal service of various kinds, a number of business interests were represented. They mingled with the strangers and former patrons in a way that bespoke genuine hospitality that had its effect. It is estimated that about \$5,000 farmers and visitors were here today.

#### Opening in Wilson

WILSON, Aug. 28.—The Wilson tobacco market opened today with estimated receipts of from 360,000 to 400,000 pounds. Unofficial figures place the average prices paid between 20 and 22 cents per pound. Common grades were in greatest demand.

Denial of any conspiracy to crush competition was entered by representatives of the Standard Oil Company of New Jersey, represented by its vice president, R. C. Hayre, several division managers and J. H. Pott, chief counsel for the corporation in North Carolina. "There is nothing for us to do," he added.

"What Think Ye of Christ" was the subject of Rev. Mr. Price's sermon and his text was John 20:28-31. "And Thomas answered and said unto Him, 'My Lord, and my God.' Jesus said, 'Thomas because thou hast seen me, thou hast believed; blessed are they which have not seen and yet have believed.' And many other signs truly did Jesus in the presence of his disciples, which are not written in this book; but these are written that ye might believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God; and that believing ye might have life through his name."

MINNEAPOLIS, MINN., Aug. 28.—A national investigation of gasoline prices in an effort to fix the responsibility for varying prices will be undertaken by the national association of attorneys general in session here according to a resolution adopted today. A conference will be held shortly at Kansas City or some other central point to investigate the charges that fluctuating prices are a result of combination agreements between producing companies.

## Irish Hold Quietest Election In History, Public Uninterested

DUBLIN, Aug. 28.—President Thomas Cosgrave has been elected on the first vote and Richard Mulcahy, minister for home affairs. Present government officials from Wicklo were also elected.

DUBLIN, Aug. 28.—The electorate of the Irish Free State went to the polls yesterday in twenty-nine constituencies for the election of the 150 members of the new Dail Eireann, and up to the last the elections maintained the unique character of the previous campaign and were quiet and orderly almost to dullness. This was particularly the case in Dublin, while reports from the provinces tell a similar tale, with trifling exceptions in a few cases where enthusiasm outran discretion and caused slight disturbances.

The universal verdict is that this has been the quietest election in Irish history. There was no excitement, no laughter at the polling booths in Dublin nor in any of the waiting lines of voters. Judging from appearances, the public is taking only small interest in the affair, and the polling has not been heavy.

CHICAGO, Aug. 28.—Three thousand persons, half of them women affiliated with the International Ladies' Garment Workers' Union, were thrown into a panic at a meeting of garment workers last night when two gunmen suddenly burst into the hall, fired three shots at William Z. Foster, head of the Trades Union Educational League, who was speaking from the platform, and escaped. Foster who was unhurt, continued his talk.

BELMAR, N. J., Aug. 28.—Herbert Forman, 7, and Caleb Hubbard, 18, arrested last night after the fatal burning of Charles Spindler, 11, and William Hubbard, 16, were today arraigned before Recorder Algor and were held in \$3,000 bond each, on a charge of manslaughter. Both boys pleaded not guilty.

CHICAGO.—Adirondack Welsh-Dairy Maid, a pure bred Holstein owned by the Bridgeford Holstein Company, Patterson, Cal., is the only cow in the world which has produced more than 1,000 pounds of butterfat and 30,000 pounds of milk in three consecutive years, according to a recent announcement by the Holstein-Friesian Association of America.

## COOLIDGE BELIEVES HARD COAL STRIKE WILL BE AVERTED

## Gov. Pinchot, Is Also Hopeful Miners Will Not Walk Out

WASHINGTON, Aug. 28.—According to an official statement given out at the White House today President Coolidge believes "that progress is being made in efforts to avert the threatened coal strike in the anthracite fields, and he saw no reason for lack of confidence in the outcome."

HARRISBURG, Aug. 28.—Governor Pinchot, concluded his first series of conferences between the representatives of the coal operators and mine union officials today, in an effort to avoid a suspension of activities Sept. 1.

In an executive session that lasted for nearly three hours operators representatives spoke, explaining to him to date the terms of arbitration the seeking to satisfy the union demands. Gov. Pinchot saw union officials yesterday. At the conclusion of the conference, the governor did not have anything to say. However, he subsequently announced that he would again meet both sides of the controversy separately, with the view of compromising the differences.

## Voice Amplifier Makes Campaigning Easy Now

CHICAGO.—Fewer cracked or strained voices as the result of strenuous political speaking campaigns in the 1924 elections, and which at the same time may reach a much wider constituency, is seen in the applications of the loud-speaking devices used so successfully by the late President Harding on his tour to Alaska.

Candidates will be enabled to address millions of citizens without vocal strain or discomfort; it is indicated, as the instrument can be installed in any location, while atmospheric conditions cannot affect its operation.

President Harding was able, without straining his voice, to make himself heard to thousands surrounding the observation and of his car. Speakers of experience have stated that ordinarily only a few hundred can hear an open-air address by the average speaker, and then they must be close.

## SEES VISION OF EASE

Dr. Charles P. Steinmetz, whose achievements in the field of science have been of such great value that his opinions have a decided interest, and who is not given to idle and sensational talk, makes the prediction that a hundred years from now the world will have changed entirely its habits of labor and that men will live in a new industrial and economic paradise. Electric power then will be free as water, and four hours a day, two hundred days a year, will be the limit of enforced or self-mechanizing labor; transportation will be so advanced that laborers will live on small farms and raise the major part of their own food; every city will be spotlessly clean, and life will take on a new attractiveness that has never before been known.

The leisure that will accrue from shortened industrial processes will be utilized in productive diversions satisfying the particular instincts of the individual, according to Dr. Steinmetz, and educational interests will be stimulated with the result that man will become a more intelligent and expressive creature than he is in the mass of today.

Co-operative human effort will be the solution of most of difficulties besetting mankind. Wars will continue until we have learned the lesson in its final aspect, and men and systems cease to struggle against one another, instead of for one another.

Dr. Steinmetz ventures further into prophecy: "The collectivistic tendencies of the Slav peoples, in my opinion, will make them the dominant race of the future. The individualism of the United States, it seems to me, will persist, and we will have a civilization distinct from that of Europe." This makes clear that the sort of individualism to which Dr. Steinmetz refers is not incompatible with wise collectivism.

He does not mean that the United States a century hence will be in the rear guard of civilization.

Such expressions from a thinking philosopher and practical scientist are worth while. They have a tendency to restrain the pessimism that now and then grasps all men and that assumes the world to be going backward or to have stopped going forward.

Such pessimism means paralysis of intelligent endeavor to hasten man's progress. Such visions as Dr. Steinmetz has seen are incentives to effort and life.

Thus far the president's friends have made it unnecessary for him to talk much.

### War Aviators Meet In Peaceful Contests

GOTHENBURG, Sweden.—The first international aviation meet in Europe since the war is now open in this city, bringing together in peaceful competition fliers and exhibitors from countries that five years ago were at war. Thus Germany is represented as well as France, England and the United States. The neutral countries participating are Holland, Switzerland, Denmark, Norway, and Sweden, Belgium, Italy, and Czechoslovakia. Even such far away states as Colombia and Siam are taking part. Great Britain's interest is shown by the personal visits of General Branchner, Director of Civil Aviation, who flew from England to Sweden, and Sir Samuel Hoare, the British Air Minister.

### Flies From Berlin to London, Back, 1 Day

BERLIN.—Berlin to London and back in one day was the record trip made recently by the German pilot, Pieper, engaged in the regular aerial service for mail and passengers. Pieper arrived at Bremen via Hamburg on the outward flight at 11 o'clock in the morning, and an hour and a half later resumed the journey to Amsterdam and the English capital. By 6:20 in the afternoon he was back in Bremen by the same route, and ten minutes later set out for Berlin.

### English Church to Aid Australian Emmigrants

MELBOURNE.—The Anglican church of Great Britain has undertaken to share with various of the state governments of Australia the cost of bringing over desirable Englishmen to settle in Australia. In Western Australia the government and the church will each contribute a third of the transportation charges, the remainder coming from private sources, and measures have been taken for the reception, placing and after-care of British settlers from the mother country.

### Bar Association To Promote Study of Constitution

DALLAS, Tex.,—Few, if any, residents of the United States will have excuse, after September 22, for not having heard something of the history of the constitution of the United States, or at least have given it some thought, if plans of the Citizenship committee of the American bar association mature.

Starting Sunday, September 16, a period of each day for the week ending September 22, in some part of the United States, will be set aside for meetings at which the constitution, its history, purposes, and attacks which are made upon it, will be discussed. The suggested program for the first day of the week includes sermons in churches of all denominations on the text "Remove Not the Ancient Landmarks Which Thy Father Have Set," taken from Proverbs, 22:28.

### Russian Pilgrims Journey Far to Show Respect for Nicholas

SOFIA.—The anniversary of the death by Bolshevik violence of Czar Nicholas II and the Russian imperial family was marked recently by an impressive memorial service in the church attached to the Russian embassy in this city. Russian pilgrims of all classes of society, from nobles to laborers, filled the beautiful structure, which is a gift from Nicholas II. Each member of the late imperial family was mentioned by name, the priest referring to "thy servant Nikolai," "thy servant Alexandra Feodorovna," "thy servant Alexi," and so with the princesses, Olga, Tatiana, Maria and Anastasia.

### Fraternal Congress Plans Broader Scope

FRENCH LICK.—Greater expansion of the fraternal congress' activities and legal problems concerning the regulations of fraternal societies, insurance readjustments, rates, field work and additions to the privileges of insured members, will be discussed at the twenty-fifth annual convention of the national fraternal congress, to be held here August 27-30.

Delegates representing virtually every fraternal society in the United States, with an aggregate membership of more than 8,000,000 and insurance benefits of \$50,000,000,000 will attend according to W. R. Shirley of Muskogee, Okla., national vice-president.

# Cub-Sox 1906 Series Goes Into History; Schulte Quits Game

CHICAGO.—With Frank Schulte dropping out of the professional baseball ranks this season, the last of the two great Chicago teams that battled for the world's championship in 1906 have quit, active participation in the game. Truly, Frank Chance, of "Peerless Leader" fame and Pat Moran, of the Reds, are very much in the spotlight of the sport today yet neither caught on the diamond in actual play.

Up to the time that Schulte resigned from the Oakland club of the Coast league, seven of the former stars of the two 1906 teams still had something to do with baseball. Schulte was the only one actually playing, however. The others were: Cubs: Chance and Moran, who are managers and John Evers, who was with the White Sox last year. Sox: Nick Altrock, now with Washington but who is on the coaching line and never plays; Frank Isbell, owner and manager of the Wichita club of the Western league and Ed Walsh, who is now scout and pitchers' coach for the White Sox.

Intimate details of the series remain in the minds of the baseball public even to this day, judging by the many reminiscences heard at any gathering of baseball fans. It was remarkable in one respect at least. The underdog had the big. The Cubs came to the big event hailed as world beaters in every sense of the word, while the White Sox had triumphed in the American league by a scant margin and were known as the "Hittles, Wonders." Few, outside of rabid and partisan fans, believed the Sox had a chance to win. But win they did in a most impressive manner. The series was then a five-game affair, three wins out of five games deciding the victor.

## "Religion Great Need, Declares Justice Taft"

BOSTON.—The need of religion in the present crisis is stressed by Chief Justice William H. Taft in a statement issued by the Unitarian News Service in connection with announcement of the thirtieth biennial meeting of the General Unitarian Conference, of which the chief justice is president. The meeting is to be held September 11-16 at New Haven, Conn., in the buildings of Yale University, in conjunction with the annual Ministers Institute and chapter convention of the Unitarian Laymen's League.

"Honest doubts in respect to the orthodox creeds, says the statement of the chief justice, 'should not be permitted to weaken the influence of religion or to engender inertia in the maintenance of religion and of the church. I feel as if Unitarianism in view of the discussions in our sister churches has become more and more important in furnishing a basis for religious inspiration. Such a conference as that the Unitarians will hold in New Haven, I doubt not can be made most useful in the present crisis.

# War Wounds Wrecked Guisto's Ball Career

CLEVELAND.—Gas wounds received in the world war have wrecked the major league career of Louie Guisto. The big first baseman who, during the spring season, gave promise of becoming one of the best in the game, has returned to the Pacific Coast, having been given his unconditional release by the Cleveland Indians on recommendations of his physician.

Guisto became a member of the Indians in 1916. Then came the war, Guisto serving service in France where he was gassed. He returned to America in poor physical condition. Since then he has been unable to stand the eastern climate.

After playing the Oakland team in the Pacific league during the 1919 and 1920 seasons, Guisto reported to the Cleveland club at the spring training camp, but his health failed to stand the strain and he was permitted to return to Oakland.

## Bachelor M. P.'S Acclaim Prince Of Wales at Dinner

LONDON.—Thirty-four bachelor members of the House of Commons dined in their unfettered estate just before Parliament shut down for the summer. There was plenty of wine and song, but no women were present when the celebrate legislators sat down to the banquet table to discuss a flood of stories, jokes and witty remarks upon the joys of the single man and the woes of the wedded.

The first thing the diners did was to toast the Prince of Wales—"the best and most popular bachelor." Then Sir Robert Horne broke loose with some stories, building up to this climax.

"In these days of the rights of women, we are told that the women no longer run after the men. The cause-trap never runs after the cause."

## Altoona Builds Fast Speedway

ALTOONA, PA.—Altoona's new speedway will be the fastest track in the world, and new world's speed records for racing motor cars are likely when the first event is held on Labor Day in the opinions of Jack Haines, the builder, and O. H. Haibe, veteran driver. Both men predict a speed of 24 miles an hour when 15 noted drivers meet in the opening race.

## Wurzberg Beer May Go Higher

WURZBURG, Germany.—Beer drinkers are watching the German hop crop anxiously. If the production this year is not great the price of beer probably will not even higher than has been predicted by the brewers. An increase of 350 percent in paper mark prices is scheduled for the near future, and still more may be expected, as the efforts of the government to peg the exchange rate of the mark do not seem to be meeting with any permanent success.
