## SPAIN IN GRIP OF REVOLUTION: ARMY SUPPORTS UPHEAVAL

Cities Seized, Banks Taken, Cabinet Faces Grave Crisis

MADRID, Sept. 13.—Army officers of Barcelona have revolted and martial law has been declared with the rank and file of the army joining in revolt. Word has not been received concerning the possible action of the naval personnel. A hurried council of the government cabinet was called at 3 a. m. to consider the grave situation.

According to advices from Barcelona the military are apparently determined upon the establishment of temporary government, which, it is intimated may result in the formation of a republic. It is emphasized that the leaders of the revolt are directing movements against the minister of foreign affairs and the president of the council. They are not dissatisfied with King Alfonso, who has always been popular with the masses, but according to statements the political system of the country is the basis of resentment and revolution.

BARCELONA, Sept. 13.—A state of siege was proclaimed here at 11:15 this morning, when the military authorities took possession of the city. All public utilities, including telegraph and telephone, were taken over by troops understood to be headed by General Primo Rivera. It is believed that the movement is just the beginning of a revolt which will break out in other cities and towns throughout the nation.

A statement published early today bitterly criticizes the present government and stigmatizes professional politicians for seizing full power and nullifying the rights of the king. Authorities of the new regime have proclaimed occupation of military headquarters and have seized the banks and control of prisons. The appeal to the populace sets out that every patriot is expected to give his life to the cause of better government, if necessary. Several military garrisons have adhered to the military move which is called a great coup.

### E. Patterson Held For Killing Patrick In Accident Smash

Following a hearing before Justice of the Peace J. F. Barwick, at Ayden today, Elliott Patterson, alleged driver of a machine that killed Matthew Patrick as a result of an accident near Grifton, early Sunday night was held for the superior court charged with manslaughter. His bond was fixed at \$2,000.

### A. G. Cox Company Awarded Judgment

In the Pitt county superior court yesterday A. G. Cox Manufacturing company was awarded a verdict by a jury against Charles McLawhorn, for the amount sought in the suit, less \$400.

### He Cannot Explain Loss of Destroyers

WASHINGTON, Sept. 13.—Rear Admiral Koonz, reported to the navy department today that he could not give an adequate explanation for the unusual position of the United States destroyers lost off the California coast last Saturday night.

## REPORT SEMENOFF DEAD IN EARTHQUAKE

A dispatch from Peking says General Gregorie Semenov, foreign Commander-in-Chief of the All-Russian armies and later Anti-Bolshevik leader in Siberia, was killed, together with a group of his followers, in the earthquake in Kokohama. Semenov came into prominence in 1918 when he headed the armed movement to break the control of the Reds along the Trans-Siberian Railway. He was the most prominent of the "White" or anti-Bolshevik leaders, until the army was cut to pieces. He visited the United States in 1922.

### Glad Gland From Ape Will Keep You Young

LONDON, Sept. 13.—If you want to remain young, Dr. Voronoff of Vienna claims that he can keep you so for many years by using what is called the "Glad Gland," which is extracted from a certain type of large ape found in South Africa.

The International Congress of Surgeons was deeply interested in this novel method of rejuvenating the aged.

Dr. Bubradi, of New Cavendish Street, a rival of Dr. Voronoff, claims to have a serum extracted from a gorilla which also makes the old young again.

### Duke Of York, Grace Vanderbilt Alliance Hinted

LONDON, Sept. 13.—Rumors that there might be another matrimonial connection between European royalty and the United States were revived here when it became known that Cornelius Vanderbilt had extended his lease on Brook House, in Park Lane, where Prince George had been a frequent visitor, usually with his sister, Princess Mary (Viscountess Lacelles) with whom Grace Vanderbilt is very friendly.

In connection with these rumors it is recalled that at another London season there was considerable whispering about a possible alliance between the Vanderbilt family and King George's second son, the Duke of York. Such reports were repeated generally for the reason, if no other, that should anything befall the Prince of Wales, the Duke of York, like his father before him, would become King, and Britishers are not ready to accept a commoner as Queen.

### DEMPSEY-FIRPO READY FOR TAP OF GONG FRIDAY

SARATOGA SPRINGS, N. Y., Sept. 13.—Jack Dempsey, in perfect physical condition to defend his heavy weight boxing title against Luis Angel Firpo, tomorrow night, it was announced today by his manager and trainers.

Accompanied by a small band of faithful followers he left here at noon for Albany, where his party boarded a train for New York City.

NEW YORK, Sept. 13.—Like a lion in a cage pacing restlessly back and forth Luis Firpo, kept himself in seclusion in his apartment today. He would halt at frequent intervals to gaze in the direction of the Polo grounds where the fight will be staged. He declared confidence in his ability to wrest the crown of champion from Dempsey.

### Asheville Lands Next Meeting Of

ROCKY MOUNT, Sept. 13.—Asheville was selected as the next meeting place of the department of North Carolina of the American Legion at its annual convention here today.

The department opened the second and final day session with a parade in which it was estimated 1,500 legionnaires participated. The parade was reviewed by Major General L. Juene, commander of the marine corps, who also made the principal address at the morning session of the Legion. Officers will be elected at the session late this afternoon.

Cut Typhoid Cases. DURHAM, Sept. 13.—Only seven cases of typhoid fever have been reported to health authorities here this year, according to official records.

### FIRPO-DEMPSEY FIGHT

Bulletins will also be announced from Charles Horne's drug store.

### Invention Simplifies Bank Deposit Records

DAYTON, OHIO, Sept. 13.—Report of a new invention at the National Cash Register Company office is accompanied with announcement that its manufacturing plant may be doubled in size within a short time. The new invention is a register carrying twenty totals, built especially for general banking business. The register has been tested in one of Dayton's banks.

By means of the new register the exact condition of an account is recorded on the customer's passbook and on the bank's permanent record at one operation. The machines post book and ledger cards, automatically and keep the teller's ledger, showing total deposits and total withdrawals for each day.

### Germany Concedes Ruhr Fight Lost

BERLIN, Sept. 13.—Tacitly admitting that the Ruhr fight had been lost and there could be no prospect of the internal reconstitution of Germany until the foreign conflict had been adjusted, Chancellor Stresemann today remarked to a gathering of editors: "Candor is preferable to illusion, and Germany desires to speak out plainly."

Informal contact with the occupying powers had revealed the gravity of the existing differences, which, he said, primarily involved the question of German sovereignty and the restoration to Germany of complete administrative freedom in the Ruhr.

### Deputies Find Boy Hiding Near Still

Deputy Sheriff Whitehurst and Cox, uncovered a 60 gallon liquor still in full operation yesterday in Chicod township about two miles from Black Jack. As the officers approached the location of the still they stumbled over a youth who was lying on his back in a thicket. He gave him name as Major Adams, but could not give the deputies a satisfactory explanation of his presence near the still. He was taken into custody and subsequently released on bond.

### U. S. Drive To End Railroad Crossings

WASHINGTON, Sept. 13.—Because of the ever increasing slaughter of motorists at grade crossings the Bureau of Public Roads has started a campaign for the elimination of those "death traps," which total 50,000 in the United States. Death sentences against 214 dangerous railroad crossings in thirty-five States are now being carried out by the bureau.

New surveys are being made of public roads, and when a highway is to be constructed with Federal aid extreme efforts are made to avoid grade crossings. One-third of the rail crossings on roads being thus constructed are being eliminated.

### New Tax Rate Fixed

CHARLOTTE, Sept. 13.—Mecklenburg's tax rate for the year 1923-24 has been set by the county commissioners at 87 1-2 cents on the \$10, representing an increase of 11 1-2 cents over the rate of the previous year.

### San Francisco Teacher Killed In Japan

San Francisco school teacher, has been officially reported as having lost her life in the earthquake and fire in Kokohama, Japan. She was on a six month's leave of absence for a tour of the Orient and arrived in Yokohama only two days before the disaster.

### Rev. W. P. Shamhart, To Quit Pastorate Christian Church

The Rev. W. P. Shamhart, who has served nearly four years as pastor of the Christian church here, will leave the pastorate Oct. 1. During Rev. Shamhart's service in Greenville he has made host of friends not only in Pitt county but throughout Eastern Carolina.

Reports circulated for the last several days that Mr. Shamhart expected to end his connection with the local church caused expressions of deep regret by a large number of Greenville residents, including many of his congregation. He has not announced his future plans.

### Red Cross Forwards Shipments Clothing And Food To Japan

WASHINGTON, Sept. 13.—Japan's dire need of clothing and building material to protect the multitude of earthquake sufferers was recognized today by the American Red Cross which authorized the quick shipment of hundreds of thousands of pieces of underwear and outer clothing, as well as large quantities of corrugated iron sheltering. Urgent requests came from the stricken area that the advent of cold weather made immediate action imperative.

An indication that the Japanese government is fearful that freezing weather will take a heavy toll from the half-nourished population was found in a message received at the Japanese embassy here.

### MURDERS RICH WIFE THEN THEN KILLS HIMSELF

SCITUATE, MASS., Sept. 13.—Murder and suicide today ended the marital troubles of Hley P. Disher, 40, and his beautiful and wealthy wife, the former Elsie Cheney, who was ten years his senior. Disher called his wife to his room in her palatial summer residence, on Pierce Road and shot her through the head with an army revolver. He then turned the weapon on himself and died after two hours of agony.

Mrs. Disher was a member of the widely known Cheney family of Connecticut, silk manufacturers.

### Mrs. T. E. Langly Dies At Her Home Near Greenville

Mrs. Thomas E. Langley, 62 years old, died at the family home, a few miles north of Greenville last night at 9:30, following a protracted illness from cerebral embolism and nephritis. Funeral services were conducted at 2:30 this afternoon from her late residence by the Rev. W. P. Shamhart, pastor of the Christian church. Burial was made in the family plot.

Mrs. Langley was Miss Fannie Cooper, daughter of the late Nashville and Mary Cooper. She was born and reared in Pitt county. She was a woman of the highest ideals which was reflected in her daily life of Christian effort.

Mrs. Langley is survived by her husband and five daughters: Mrs. John Barnhill, Misses Eula, Ella, Sammie and Mary Louise, all of this county; also two sons, William and Carl Langley. The pallbearers were: E. R. Dudley, J. H. Randolph, J. B. James, S. J. Everett, J. R. Moyer, V. C. Fleming, J. E. Everett, J. E. Jones.

### Shoots Wife And Holds Police At Bay For Hours

BELLEVILLE, ILL., Sept. 13.—W. C. Cochran, who held the local police force at bay for hours after having shot and seriously wounded his wife, mother-in-law and two police officers, surrendered today after his supply of ammunition became exhausted. He was brought to the St. Clare County Jail uninjured.

Barricaded and heavily armed in a house the apparently crazed man held off a score of police and deputy Sheriffs today after he shot his wife. The body of the wife lay in the front yard while the man within maintained a steady fire whenever an attempt was made to enter the yard. A call was sent to St. Louis and word was received that an armored car with machine guns was being sent from there.

### Fish Hatcheries Locations Decided

MOREHEAD CITY, Sept. 13.—The State Fisheries Commission Board completed its executive session today. Among the matters of importance handled by the board at this meeting was the decision to establish a bass hatchery near Fayetteville and to locate the main trout hatchery near Marion.

Auxiliary trout hatcheries will also be established either at Roaring Gap or at Boone and at Chimney Rock in Jackson county or at a site yet to be decided upon in Haywood county provided land and water rights and other requirements of the board can be acquired.

Greenville's water plant, already considered the finest of its size in the state, is to be further improved by the installation of a complete bacterial testing equipment. Announcement to this effect was made by Superintendent Williams today. He further stated that practically all of the equipment had arrived and will be put into operation in the near future.

The installation of this testing equipment will throw an absolute safeguard around Greenville's water supply, as it will be possible to carry on the same tests locally as have formerly been made by the state board of health at the state laboratory of hygiene, Raleigh. Under the present arrangement it is necessary to send samples of water to Raleigh periodically for a check on the operation of the local plant, but when this new bacterial testing equipment is put into operation it will be possible to conduct these tests daily, or as often as may be necessary to insure an absolutely safe water supply for the citizens of Greenville.

### Insures Pure Supply

Extensive tests that have been conducted during the past year through the co-operation of the state board of health have proven beyond any question that the Greenville plant delivers an absolutely safe water supply to the city under all conditions of turbidity or pollution that may develop in the Tar river.

In fact these tests have demonstrated that the filtered water without chlorination is safe and with the dual chlorinating equipment aided by the bacterial testing equipment now being installed there can be no question as to the purity of Greenville's water supply.

### Greenville Takes Lead

The new filter plant has a possible capacity of three million gallons per day. The present rate of consumption is about five hundred thousand gallons per day, so that there is ample provision for the future in the present plant.

The entire plant and equipment is of the most modern design, and the Water and Light Commission intends to keep it up to the highest standard as is evidenced by the fact that Greenville will be the first place in East Carolina to maintain a complete laboratory to its plant equipment.

### Will Reorganize Body To Combat Diseases in South

ASHEVILLE, Sept. 13.—Reorganization of the Southern Tuberculosis conference, which passed out of existence in 1920, is expected today. A special committee is expected to report favorably on re-organization.

Dr. H. A. Patterson, field secretary of the National Association, discussed standards for classification and ratifying of sanitarium at the afternoon session, declaring that the South has only one-seventh of the number of beds for the treatment of the disease that it should have. Need for additional beds for negro patients was also stressed by Dr. Patton. Later Dr. Patton presented the new kind of sanitarium for arrested patients of tuberculosis, reporting that Potts-Memorial Sanitarium New York Memorial Sanitarium, New York State, will use large resources in studying the effect of various kinds of work in arrested cases.

### Hold Reckless Driver

ASHEBORO.—Hold responsible for Randolph county grand jury for the death of Mary Morrison, 5, whom he is alleged to have run over in an automobile here last March, Howard Hilliard, of this place, is under indictment for manslaughter. He probably will be tried at the December term of superior court.

### RESTRICTING AMERICANS

Citizens of the United States who sometimes indulge intrudes against the government at Washington for its exclusion of foreign-born persons, would do well to consider what occasionally happens to Americans in foreign lands. The Europeans either untutored or educated, wealthy or poor, who can pass the proper health and mental tests and who come within the legal quota of his country, can enter the United States and engage in a new undertaking or enterprise that promises an honest living.

But read what happens to an American who is so unsophisticated as to imagine that such things are being done in Europe.

Miss Edith MacGregor, an American girl of good family and education, who had gone to France last spring as a member of an American relief organization, or the expiration of

her enlistment, took her small savings and went to Switzerland. As she liked the environment, she planned to remain for some time and so sought and obtained employment in a respectable Swiss family as a tutor. A few days later she received a call from the police, who demanded her credentials as a licensed tutor.

As she could produce nothing like that sort she was fined two hundred francs, which was fifty francs more than she had at the time. She was obliged to leave her personal belongings as security, and was then promptly expelled from Switzerland. She finally reached Paris and obtained transportation back to the United States.

Americans who have travelled extensively, particularly those who have had business relations with people of other lands, knows only too well how limited are the opportunities allowed the ordinary individual, outside the United States and a few of the British dominions. Opportunity in most countries is regarded as synonymous with privilege, and privilege is a prerogative of the official class, the nobility and the wealthy.

The American left stranded in a foreign land soon discovers how mild and lax are American regulations for the foreigner, as compared with the foreigner's regulations for Americans. The contrast is one that would be well to bear in mind when reflecting on the alleged iniquities of American exclusion laws.

### SEPTEMBER CONTENTMENT

With September comes a contentment unknown at other seasons, is a contentment of successful middle age. It is a contentment that comes with the knowledge that the summer's work is done, of a man who is ready to pause and look about him before he plunges into the medley of the late harvest.

Nations have their seasons. The charm of Europe lies in the September contentment of the cities, of the country where the buildings

are finished, where hedge rows take the place of ugly fences. It is seen in the reflective, easy manners of the peoples who have no time to hurry.

France and Holland, England and Italy can rest with the feeling that their work is done. Russia is buried in the depths of winter, ice bound, but ready for the touch of a spring awakening.

The United States is hurrying in the heat of mid-summer. There are symptoms of social unrest. We have completed our growing time in the early days of the nations. We will in the years to come, grow into the contentment of September.

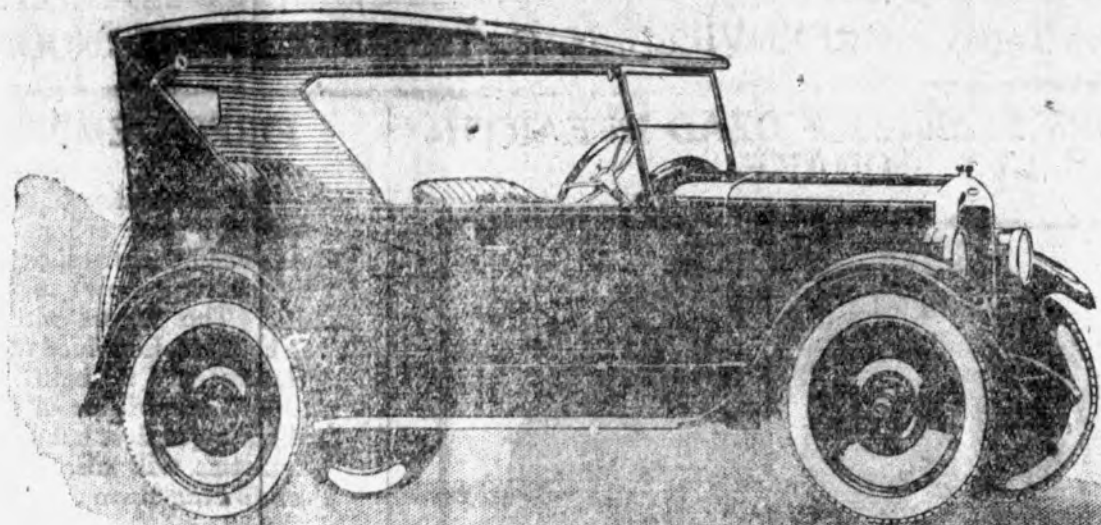
**Stamboulsky Hoarded Cash**

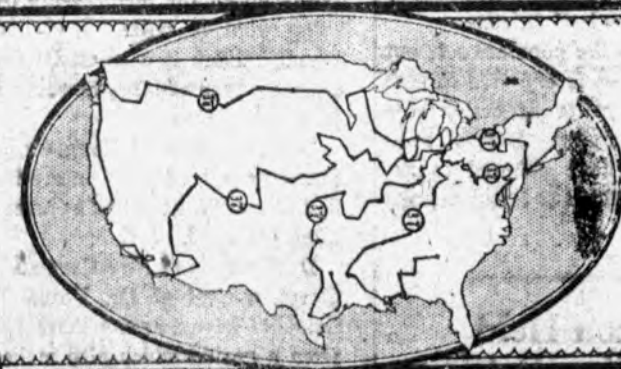

He is confident that his methods, unorthodox as they may be, will enable him to wear the world's heavyweight crown after his battle with Jack Dempsey at the Polo Grounds September 14.

Firpo has been best by advisers, well-wishers and the like, both in his pugilistic and business affairs, ever since he rose, to prominence in this country. But the Argentinian giant has

listened, then waived most of them aside.

Firpo's first pugilistic efforts here, early in 1922, showed him the rawest of novices but possessed of astonishing strength and a club-like right that offset all other handicaps. His amazing strength and punching power alone were responsible for his early victories over Sailor Muxted, Joe McCann and Jack Herman, third-raters.

Then, about a year later he returned to the United States to box Bill Brennan. Firpo won by a knockout in the twelfth round but only after sustaining terrific punishment. Again his bull-like courage and power pulled him through where his awkward attempts at ring science failed. He was guilty of the most elementary of ring faults, leading with his right. His footwork was of the crudest, and he had no effective defense.

Just before this bout he was put under the tutelage of Jimmy DeForest, veteran trainer, who had conditioned Dempsey for the fight in which he took the title from Jess Willard. Some effects of this tutoring were apparent when Firpo won from Brennan, but the South American was still lacking in many essential points of the game.

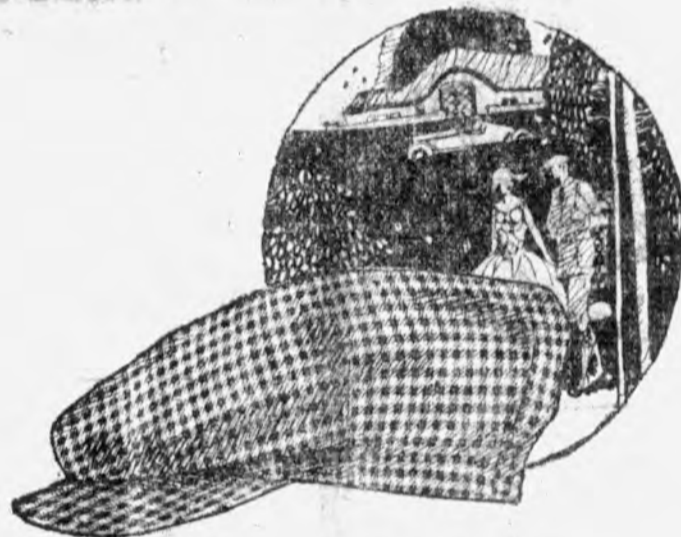

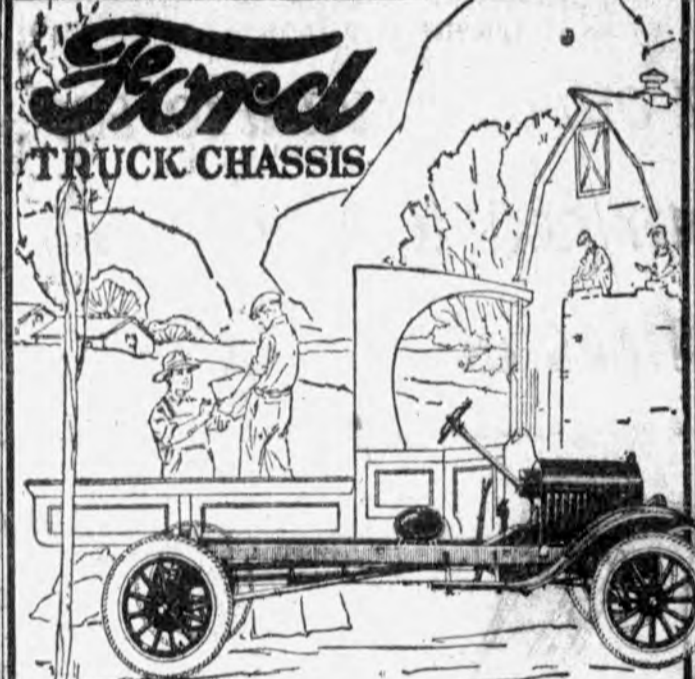

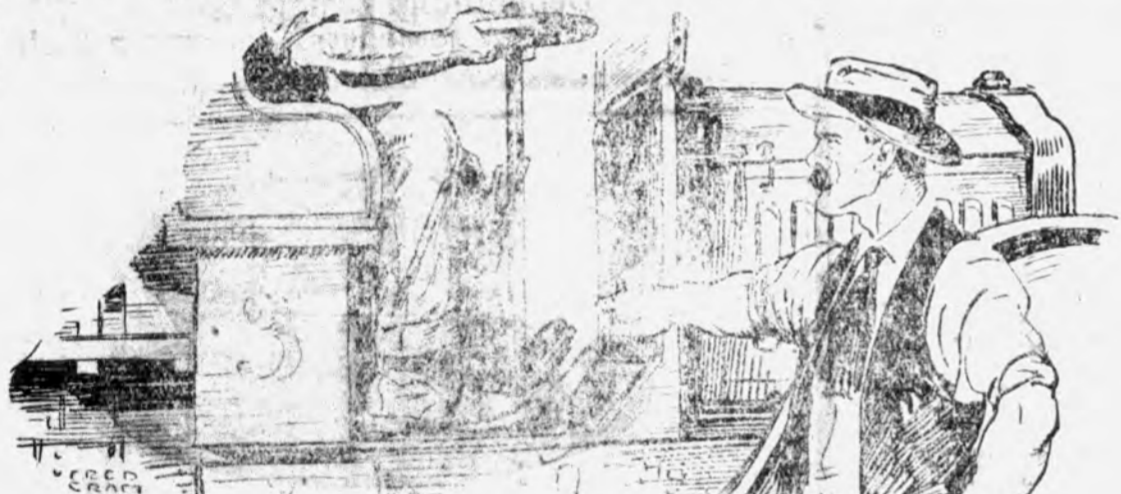

### FLOSSMOOR LINKS GREAT TEST FOR AMATEUR CROWN

CHICAGO. — Over nearly four miles of velvety turf at the Flossmoor Country Club, the national amateur golf championship will be decided during the eight days beginning September 15, and Jess Sweetser of New York, who won the title last year, will be there, to defend his honors against a number of former champions and several score-sterling golfers who have yet to feel the crown on their brow.

The Flossmoor links is one of the greatest tests of golf in the world, according to experts, having a par of 72 for its regular length of 6,508 yards. Several of the holes will use new tests far enough back of the regular driving places to make the distance nearly 7,000 yards, although par will remain the same. Seldom does a good golfer break through perfect figures on the difficult course, and only once in competition has any one broken 70.

The course lies 25 miles south of Chicago's business center, and is laid out over rolling ground, bedecked on several holes by trees and broken on four holes by rather precipitous hills of moderate height. Butterfield creek threatens to engulf misplaced shots on five fairways, and one hole claims as its only fairway a pond that reaches from tee to green, the unstable air but canopied by trees.

The grass is verdant and even, making the lies on the fairways perfect, while the putting greens are as true as carpet, despite their undulations, which test the skill of the putter.

Saturday will be devoted to elimination of superfluous players. Sunday will be given over to practice and driving contests, and on Monday the qualification will decide which 32 players are best fitted to play off the 32-hole matches for the title.

While Sweetser will be a favorite of many, the almost impossible task of repeating two years in succession will lead others to favor Hobby Jones of Atlanta, national open champion, who has averaged close to 70 for all rounds played thus far this year; Chick Evans of Chicago, who lost the finals to Sweetser last year, or some of the other stars who have been playing good golf this season.

The Flossmoor links, without counting the extra distances from the back tees, opens with a 512 yard hole, whose fairway bends to the right with a fadeaway green, but an easy par 5, if bunkers are avoided by placement. Then follows a short hole of 175 yards, whose main difficulty consists of bunkers around the green, which however, opens safely to the tee. This will be lengthened about 50 yards.

The real difficulty begins at the third hole, 550 yards regularly but nearly 600 yards for the tournament, where even the finest pair of shots can scarcely hop to get home to the uphill green, for the creek runs along the bottom of the slope leading to the flag. Most golfers are pleased to get a par 5 on this basis challenge.

### VAST SUMS COLLECTED PROMOTION POLITICAL REVOLUTION, IS CHARGE

NEW YORK, Sept. 13.—Collection of funds from American people of high and low degree for the promotion of social, economical and political revolution has become an organized industry in the last two years, it is charged by the United Mine Workers of America in an article of a series which purports to be an expose of a far reaching plot to spread the dictatorship of the communist International at Moscow over this continent.

Laborers, society leaders, school teachers and well meaning philanthropist, ignorant of the menace they are promoting, add millions of dollars annually to the war chest of the underground workers for revolution in America, it is charged. Other millions are described as streaming in from Moscow, Berlin and Stockholm to make a total impossible of estimate.

"The United Mine Workers learns from an authoritative source," says the author of the expose, "that the money from abroad is coming in through the usual international banking chan-

nels and that it is distributed to the accounts of various individuals in different banks after it reaches this country."

Capture of the miners' union is alleged to be the first aim of Communist agents in this country, as a step toward establishment of the "one big union" principle in all industrial labor groups. After that nationalization of coal mines under the soviet form of rule as a preliminary to nation of other industries; then forcible overthrow of the governments existing in the United States and Canada, and establishment of Communism after the Moscow pattern.

Since the mine workers' union was allegedly the first object of attack in the fulfillment of this program, solicitation of funds is said to have been most active among the miners. Money usually is asked for some "defense" or "relief" cause, the donors being led to believe "that it was to be used in the upbuilding and strengthening of their union organization and for other legitimate purposes."

Both men are working out on the stretch and frequently paddle across the bay to the mouth of the St. Louis river and 15 miles up stream to Fond du Lac, making a 30 mile round trip.
