NEGROES CAUTIONED
TO PASS JOHNSTOWN,
PA., WHEN TRAVELINGMayor Orders Exodus
Of Blacks, Forbids
Future Visitors
To City

NEW YORK, Sept. 14. — Mayor Caulfield of Johnstown, Pa., has not only ordered all negroes who have resided in that city less than seven years to leave, but has also issued an order forbidding all future importation of negro labor to that place, according to an announcement made by the American Liberty association today. Caulfield also added that all negroes visiting the city would be compelled to register with the authorities, and unless they could give satisfactory reasons for their presence in that city they would be compelled to leave without delay. It was further stressed by the mayor that no public gatherings of negroes would be tolerated, except church services.

The association has made a vigorous protest against the action of the Pennsylvania mayor.

JOHNSTOWN, PA., Sept. 14. — Mayor Caulfield, has figured in western Pennsylvania more or less prominently because of his radical ideas for the last few years. He was the first to attempt extreme enforcement of the prohibition laws, in Pennsylvania and after he executed his authority along that line which resulted in his indictment and conviction, he went to the other extreme and shocked the country when it was announced that Johnstown was as wet as the "Atlantic ocean." The order requiring negroes to leave that city, is said to be the result of the recent race riot here when three policemen and one negro were killed.

Many Million Dollars
Hidden Away, France

PARIS, — All over France men and women for years have been hoarding American currency. It became available in large quantities with the coming of American soldiers during the war, and the French were quick to see its value. Today people are wondering how many dollars are concealed in the "woolen socks" of the republic.

The estimates run from \$1,000,000 to \$5,000,000. Recently a Frenchman living in Chaumont who kept a candy store during the war, disclosed to a friend a strong-box containing over \$2,500 in American bills of various denominations, which he said he would sell when the franc reached 20 for one dollar. "There are a good many men in this town alone who have more than I," this man declared.

St. Louis Clinic Draws
Children Many States

ST. LOUIS, Sept. 14. — The St. Louis Medical Society, in a report of its free clinic for poor children this year stated that slight to complete correction was accomplished in 94 of 97 cases already disposed of, only three children being declared beyond assistance.

The clinic which the society conducts each year, beginning in April, is said to be the only one of its kind in the United States, for free, hospital, medical and surgical care is provided. During the present year children from states throughout the west and south are being treated.

SEEK TO CLEAR

WASHINGTON, Sept. 14. — It became known here that Secretary of War Weeks before his conference here last week with Henry Ford, had obtained from the department of justice an opinion as to the status of the Gorgas power plant, the inclusion of which in the Detroit manufacturer's offer for the Muscle Shoals Alabama property the secretary had developed legal obstacles.

The opinion was transmitted several weeks ago but neither the war department nor the department of justice would make known its nature or discuss its possible effect on the Ford negotiations, which have been in statu quo since the last congress failed to act on the manufacturer's offer to take over the government's war-time properties at Muscle Shoals. It was assumed, however, that the opinion dealt with the legality of the Gorgas plant contract.

Call In Accident

Dr. G. G. Dixon, of Ayden, had a close call in an automobile accident on the hard surfaced highway between Bethel and Greenville last night. He was returning from Rocky Mount where he attended the state convention of the American Legion. He left Rocky Mount about 7 p. m. Just after leaving Bethel on the highway and near the bridge across Gdine Creek, Dr. Dixon noticed a car coming. He turned out of the road sufficiently to pass the other car, placing his right hand wheels on the dirt.

He said he had forgot that the bridge, now across the creek was only a temporary affair and not near so wide as the road, and that together with lights of the other car having blinded him, his right hand wheel never touched the bridge but can clear over the creek, causing the car to turn turtle and to remain in a bottom-side up condition.

Spanish Cabinet Quits,
King Refuses Demands;
See Success of the Revolt

(BULLETIN)

MADRID, Sept. 14. — King Alfonso this afternoon asked Primo Rivera, leader of the revolt in Spain to form a new cabinet.

In well informed circles this action of the King is interpreted to mean that he is in full accord with the change in the conduct of the government, and since he has the solid support of the army and populace generally a wide departure in the administration of affairs is now expected. It is not all improbable that the proud Kingdom may adopt a republican form of government with Alfonso as president. From the proverbial grantees to the pesantry he is the most popular sovereign that ever ruled in Spain.

MADRID, SPAIN, Sept. 14. —

After protracted meetings of the cabinets, a message was sent to General Rivera, requesting him to abandon the movement for patriotic reasons but he absolutely refused to do so. The foreign minister, Santiago Alba, who is believed to be particularly obnoxious to the revolting elements, has resigned from the ministry, as well as the minister of labor Felix Arana.

The under-secretary of war, General Bernades Castro, informed the correspondents this afternoon that the minister of war had a long conversation on the telephone with General Rivera, who informed the minister that he had rebelled against some members of the present government. The captain general paid tribute to Premier Alcala and the minister of the interior, the duke of Almodovar.

Contradictory Reports.

Contradictory reports are very prevalent here. Although the under secretary of war told the newspapermen that King Alfonso had left San Sebastian by automobile for Madrid, there was an authoritative report much later that the king was still sojourning there and that he would not come to the capital until tomorrow.

MADRID, Sept. 14. — The entire Spanish cabinet has resigned. This action followed the return to Madrid of King Alfonso today. He was met at the railroad station by a large gathering of notables including the premier, members of the cabinet and a military escort. There was a determined effort on the part of the premier to obtain the king's permission to punish leaders of the revolt arrested in Barcelona. This he flatly refused. The entire cabinet then quit.

According to newspaper reports from Barcelona General Primo Rivera who led the military uprising against the politicians will preside, directly over a new cabinet to be formed by from the military and civilians of proved ability and who are independent of political connections.

PARIS, Sept. 14. — French official opinion is that the solution of the Spanish crisis will be reached in Madrid without tragic consequences. The attitude of the French government is one of absolute detachment except that events are being followed with general interest, and hope for the welfare of Spain.

ITALY WILL WITHDRAW TROOPS FROM
CORFU SHORTLY ENDING BITTER ROW

PARIS, Sept. 14. — The danger to the peace of Europe from the Italian occupation of Corfu ended last night when, after another difficult session, the ambassador's council came to a full agreement. Italy finally consented to evacuate Corfu before the end of September. It is understood they are to leave the island by September 27.

It was also understood the council agreed that if on the date of evacuation the inter-allied commission of inquiry reports that Greece has not done all possible to discover and punish the assassins of the Italian members of the Greco-Albanian boundary mission the 50,000,000 lire deposited by the Greek government shall be paid over to the Italian government as reparations.

Up to almost the last moment the Italians insisted that the powers ought to take Premier Mussolini's word as to the evacuation, and leave it to him to fix the exact date, after the reparation measures had been carried out.

The British ambassador insisted quite as strongly that public opinion throughout the world ought to be reassured by a definite arrangement that would put an end to the talk that Italy intended to remain in Corfu indefinitely. He asked that the Italian premier choose a fixed date which would be early enough to set all speculation as to Italy's intention, at rest.

Good Roads Extends
State Auto Business

RALEIGH, Sept. 14. — The development of good roads in North Carolina has so enhanced the growth of automobile bus lines in the state that a traveler can now make bus connections all the way from Bayboro, in Pamlico county on the coast, to Brevard, in Transylvania county in the mountains of the western part of the state, according to the North Carolina Highway Bulletin.

By bus the trip from Bayboro to Brevard is 500 miles in length, about 80 miles longer than the shortest possible highway route, according to a map showing the principal bus routes in the state. VOCATIONAL TRAINING

There has been in the past two years a notable increase in the attention paid by educators and by the general public to the subject of vocational education. In defense of this comparatively new phase of school work, the Federal Bureau of Education declares that many of its critics fail to comprehend that such training is concerned chiefly with efforts to remedy the deficiencies in the education of young persons who have secured all that they can of what the public schools have to offer. The great problem to be solved is the further training of those who have gone to work, at a comparatively early age, and without such training as is requisite to insure their success in life.

It is in the hope of solving this problem that vocational schools have been established in all parts of the country, and their large patronage shows that young men and young women appreciate the efforts thus made in their behalf.

Most of them are part-time or evening schools and are developing rapidly as educational agencies for youths employed in gainful occupations during the working hours of the day. One noteworthy indication of their progress, says the Federal bureau, is found in the fact that while educators are realizing more and more clearly that vocational training is much too big a task for the school alone, business and industry are awakening to a sense of responsibility.

Employers are beginning to see the value of such training. Many industrial establishments now provide such schools, not only for their young workers, but for those of more mature age.

Both the army and the navy have, since the war, given much attention to this subject. In the summer military camps, vocational training is made a feature of the program. Every year thousands of young men attached to the Reserve Officers Training Corps are enrolled in colleges for special instruction. Similar work is being done in the navy, and the young men on shipboard are provided with textbooks and instructions to encourage them to make good use of their abilities.

Vocational education does not aim to interfere in any way with the work of the public schools, but to supplement it by offering to young men and young women further advantages in training for their life work. It has well prepared naCowkif

opened to them greater opportunities to become well prepared for advancement and its results prove their appreciation of its value.

GROWING WEEVIL MENACE

The dreaded scourge of the American cotton crop in the form of an uncontrolled insect pest appears to be making the usual heavy annual draft of destruction upon the fruitage of the crop in most of the principal cotton growing States, says Cotton News.

Owing to the comparatively light infestation of the insects during the months of May, June and July due in large measure to late planting and generally open weather over the belt during these months, the great masses of the growers seemed to have felt that their crops would be safe this year from the insects and not burden themselves with the extra expense and labor required in the purchase and application of arsenic poisons, and other preventive measures. The continuing widespread destructive ravages of the boll weevil under any and all kinds of weather conditions should forcefully teach every cotton grower that preventive measures must be adopted.

It is no longer necessary to conduct experiments for weevil control so far as the use of calcium arsenate as the basic poison is concerned.

The farm demonstrations conducted by the American Cotton Association this season have proved conclusively that liquid poisons are as efficacious as dry calcium and certainly less expensive and more reliable under rainy conditions. The impelling work which now lies ahead is to educate and induce every farmer who plants cotton to energetically adopt the known safe and practical methods of weevil control.

The first lesson embraces the plowing up of the cotton stalks before frost and as soon as the crop is picked out. This is very important and should not be neglected or postponed by any man who intends to plant cotton in 1924. When the green stalks are plowed up the sap in the plants dry out at once, there is no life-giving food left and the young larvae and adult weevils die. Even if some of the weevils should survive they will go into hibernation in lean condition and without sufficient vitality to last them throughout the long winter months. A weevil must be fat and in good physical condition to fast five months without food.

Second in order, plowing up the stalks to clear off the hedge rows, terraces and ditch banks and destroy all nearby places where weevils may successfully hibernate through the winter. A clean farm is not a safe place for boll weevils to camp in winter. The crops should by all means be rotated. Plant small grain, corn or other crops on the land planted to cotton this year.

By adopting these simple rules this fall and winter the foundation will be well laid for a cotton crop next spring that can be handled successfully with early poisoning and other conditions being favorable, a profitable yield of cotton can be grown. The main thing is get action by every grower.

control in popular government said Farmer. "The great problem is the fact upon which the financial plan is based. These facts must be accurate, complete and logically arranged. Ultimate decisions of the problems of government rest with those for whom the government is administered and it is of the greatest importance that these facts be in complete and so arranged that they will be readily adapted to popular understanding. They must be in terms that can be comprehended by the electorate if we are to secure that discriminating criticism that is essential in popular governments. People will not think logically and will take no interest in budgets made up in terms they do not understand.

In his address Farmer dealt technical phases of state government with special reference to state budgeting systems, outlined the systems used by a number of states especially by his home state of Indiana, and reviewed the history of the growth of the governmental budgeting system. He also briefly defined the word budget and told of its purposes.

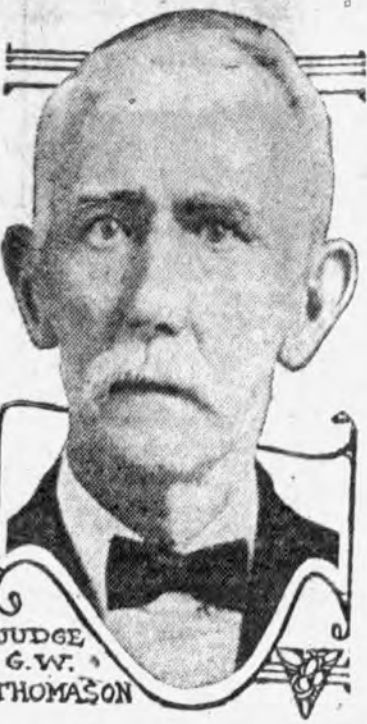

"UNDERGROUND" ORGANIZATION TO
BRING LABOR UNDER SOVIET BANNER

NEW YORK, Sept. 14.—A description purporting to show that the communist party of America was founded and dramatic secrecy top a mountain in the Cat-kills 28 months ago, and has mushroomed over the United States and Canada, is contained in the fifth of a series of articles made public today by the United Mine Workers of America, charging a movement to bring America under the banner of the Moscow communists.

At first the article asserted, the party was an "underground" organization, functioning in secrecy. To day, according to the miners, it has a membership, direct and auxiliary, of 1,000,000, with interlocking directorates binding it to 45 national organizations and 200 locals, and working in the open.

Prior to May, 1921 the communist international was presented as having become so impotent though federal prosecution and deportation of members that formation of an "underground" society was determined upon.

And so, having chosen one of the most historically primitive spots in the East as a setting, "70 communist leaders, representing the two factions of the communist party and the united communist party, gathered in the ancient hotel on the top of Overlook Mountain on the morning of May 15, 1921, to compose their differences and unite in a single group, to be known as the communist party of America," said the article.

"This assembly was not only at the command of Lenin and Zinoviev of the communist international, but it was accompanied with the threat that if the factional differences were not put aside and a united front presented for invading the labor unions of the United States, no more money would be forthcoming from Moscow for financing the revolutionary movement in this country. Up to that time Moscow had contributed money to both of these factions, but had decided that their hostility to each other was neutralizing the results of their work."

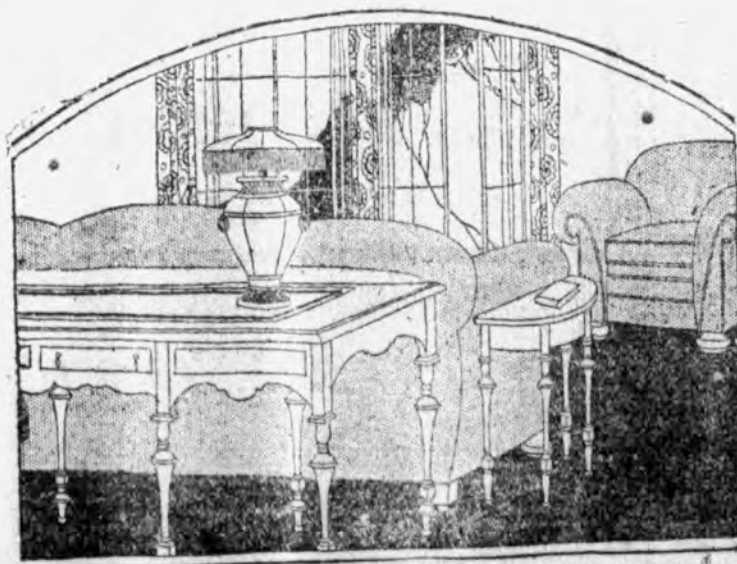

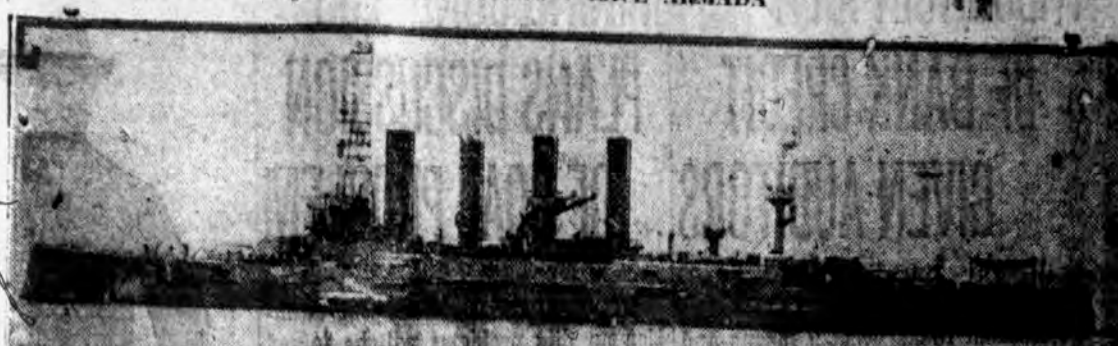
Villa's Large Domains Now Without A Leader

WISCONSIN IDEA OF BANK CREDIT GIVEN AUDITORS

ASHEVILLE, Sept. 14. — The "Wisconsin Idea," what it means and how it applies in the administration of the office of state treasurer, was explained by Solomon Levitan, state treasurer of Wisconsin, before the annual meeting of the National Association of State Auditors, Comptrollers and Treasurers in session here today.

"The Wisconsin Idea," Mr. Levitan said, "means in simple terms, 'The People First.' In the administration of the office of treasurer it means making use of the state's money to the best advantage for the people of this state."

"Some of the states have invested their state funds in government bonds that pay higher rates of interest. This looks like a stroke of good business when one considers that the banks of the state pay only three percent."

"But that is not the Wisconsin idea. Wisconsin believes in placing the state funds where they are needed. The farmer tries to borrow money and finds that his banker has none to lend, while the state treasurer has sent millions out of the state. Sending money out of the state in times like these is like feeding all of your pure fresh Holstein milk to your pigs and buying skimmed milk for your babies. Wisconsin believes in serving its own people first, and so its state funds are made available to communities that need them."

We have in Wisconsin 1,000 banks, and of these more than 630 have been appointed state depositories. When the tax payments come in, the money is distributed immediately to the various depositories, placed there on demand, but we usually give our bankers a reasonable time—generally 20 days—in which to provide the funds called for.

"The placing of the state funds in these many country banks has been not only an aid to the banker, but a boon to the farmer. These are hard days for the farmer; they need all the credit they can get."

MINING CONGRESS PLANS DISCUSSION OF COAL PROBLEM

MILWAUKEE.—The coal situation and its problems will be joined in discussion with those of the mining industry at the annual convention here Sept. 24-29 of the American Mining Congress and National Exposition of Mines and Mine Equipment. The relation between employer and employee in industry will be the principal subject.

A representative of the federal coal commission will attend for the purpose of presenting the viewpoint of the commission relative to the bituminous and anthracite coal industries. The report of this commission as it affects the soft coal industry will be published Sept. 22.

The industrial co-operation conferences during the convention will be directly related to the coal industry, in which all points of view will be represented. The Industrial Co-operative Division of the congress is now organized in 23 states. James J. Davis, secretary of labor, will speak on the essential factors in the development of a policy in obtaining permanent industrial peace in the mining industry.

In the metal mining section, three problems will be presented for discussion—that of silver producers in connection with the elimination of the protecting safeguards of the Pittman act, the question of a national policy relative to immigration, and the question of "blue sky" legislation of a national character as it affects mining conditions in western states.

The exposition will include 150 of the latest types of mine equipment and mining machinery, which is designed to emphasize the importance of the work of the standardization division of the congress and the necessity of a greater utilization of labor saving and cost reducing equipment and machinery in the expansion of the industry.
