Oklahoma In Second Act of Martial Law Drama In Klan Fight

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., Sept. 17.—Governor Walton, in proclaiming martial law declared that Oklahoma City was the headquarters of the Ku Klux Klan and that the sovereign power of the state had been defied by the grand dragon of a semi-military organization, who had publicly stated in substance that the power of the body could not be broken by the state. Walton added that he hoped the power of this "criminal organization" would be destroyed.

Governor Walton addressed the state labor convention at Henryetta today.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., Sept. 17.—Oklahoma is in the second act of its martial law drama. The mandate placing the state under military control became effective Saturday midnight. The military forces have succeeded the police authorities here and machine guns have been leveled from the courthouse and city hall. The grand jury has cancelled military court investigation and troop commanders have fixed the hours when citizens are to go to bed and when they can make their advent on the streets.

Tulsa, Oklahoma City and Sapulpa and the countries in which these cities are situated are absolutely under martial law. General B. H. Markman, in command of troops at Tulsa, is expected to arrive there early today by airplane. His hurried flight was unexpected. Apparently the rest of the state is not feeling military pressure, although no statement that other places would not be occupied by the national guard has been made by state officials.

Question Execution Powered.

Special interest has attached to the grand jury session in view of the fact that it was called in response to petitions charging Governor Walton with using State employees to check signature of an initiated petition for an election on a constitutional amendment to grant the state legislature specific authority to convene without call by the Governor. Such use of State employees, it was charged in the grand jury petition is in violation of the law.

The question of a special session of the legislature has been vexing administration leaders several months. Several members of the legislature have declared their belief that the body has authority to convene itself provided business other than law-making is considered.

Agitation is Acute.

When the agitation became more pronounced last week, Governor Walton issued a warning to members of the legislature not to attempt to hold an extra session, and threatened legislators with jail "for the remainder of his term," if they ignored his orders.

Fire Loss In State For August Shows Decrease, Report

RALEIGH, Sept. 17.—"A high water mark for a low fire loss record" was the paradoxical epigram used by State Insurance Commissioner Stacy W. Wade in announcing today that the fire in North Carolina in August was \$84,689 from 88 fires, as compared with the former low record of June, 1922, when there was a loss of \$105,908 in 96 fires.

In August 1922, there were 126 fires, representing a loss of \$221,298, according to records of the State Insurance Department.

Analysis of the detailed fire report issued by Commissioner Wade shows total property at risk in August, this year, is valued at \$1,526,000, on which insurance was carried in the sum of \$1,325,000. Of the total loss of \$84,689, \$56,000 was due to seasonal and extra hazardous risks in a relatively small number of fires, according to the report, which gives as losses in this class a saw mill and lumber plant, burned at a loss of \$35,000; fires due to lightning, \$11,000; and tobacco during barns, \$11,500.

HIGH POINT WILL STAGE "PAGEANT OF PROGRESS" OCT 25

HIGH POINT, Sept. 17.—Marking an epoch of modern advancement, especially in the field of road building, a "Pageant of Progress," the production of which has been estimated to cost \$2,500, will take place here Oct. 25 with city and state officials and other prominent citizens participating.

The Governors of four states—North Carolina, South Carolina, Virginia and Tennessee, have been asked to attend. Governor Morrison, of North Carolina, and Governor McLeod, of South Carolina, have accepted. The other governors have not been heard from. Frank Page, chairman of the State Highway Commission, has accepted and invitation to attend.

One of the outstanding features of the pageant already arranged for will be an address by W. A. Blair, of Winston-Salem, on the old plank road, which was built by the state many years ago from Fayetteville, through High Point, to a Moravian settlement near Winston-Salem.

DOKIES TO HOLD BIG CEREMONIAL AT FAYETTEVILLE

A big Dokie initiation ceremonial is to be held at Fayetteville, Oct. 14. This was decided at a recent meeting in Rocky Mount of Zeta Temple Dramatic Order of the Knights of Khorassan. Dr. W. T. Rainey, Fayetteville, will be in charge of the arrangements for the event.

More than 60 candidates will be initiated coming from various sections of Eastern Carolina. Preparations are being made to entertain fully 400 visitors. It is understood that Pitt county will be represented by a large delegation.

TANK GAS PRICES CUT TO 18 CENTS PLUS TAX IN N. C.

NEW YORK, Sept. 17.—Tank wagon prices on gasoline were reduced today one cent a gallon to eight Atlantic states by the Standard Oil and Gulf Refining company. The prices range from 18 cents in Washington to 21 cents in Virginia plus tax of three cents per gallon. The Texas company simultaneously announced it would meet the reduction, which covers New Jersey, Virginia, North and South Carolina in addition to New England states.

Clyde Tuttle Will Be Tried for Slaying Judge C. A. Jones

GREENSBORO, Sept. 17.—Four murder cases are on the docket for the two weeks' term of criminal court which convenes here today, principal among which is the case of F. Clyde Tuttle, young advertising man of this city charged with the murder of his father-in-law, C. A. Jones, former judge of the city court.

Judge Jones died Aug. 20 as the result of a pistol shot wound alleged to have been inflicted by Tuttle on the night of Aug. 1, following what was reported by police as a domestic difficulty at the home of the father-in-law.

The other defendants on the docket for trial on charges of murder at this session of court are three negroes of High Point, Pete Gray is charged with the murder of his brother, William Gray. He escaped following the alleged murder, but later was apprehended at Mooresville and brought to the Guilford county jail here.

Bud Lindsay is scheduled to be tried for killing his wife by oiling her clothing and then pushing her into a fireplace. She died shortly afterwards from burns.

William Brewer is charged with shooting Lyles Hayes to death on Aug. 11 following a reported quarrel over a woman.

With the exception of Tuttle, who is out under \$10,000 bond, all of the defendants charged with murder are being held in jail.

Son Left Battle Flag Only Out Of Father's Millions

NEW YORK, Sept. 16.—A battle flag of Company K, 79th Regiment, New York State Volunteers, which saw active service in the civil war, is the sole bequest to Andrew R. Baird in the will of his father, Colonel Andrew D. Baird, who died Sept. 4, leaving an estate which has been provisionally valued at \$3,000,000.

"This will is perfectly satisfactory to me and the whole family," said Andrew R. Baird today. "My father, though that flag worth more than all his money. In fact, he valued it as priceless. I agreed with my father in that, and when he came to make his will I asked him to leave me only the flag."

Big Tobacco Pay Roll.

DURHAM, Sept. 17.—There are 4,388 persons employed in tobacco manufacturing in Durham, according to official records, which also show that the annual pay roll of two of the larger tobacco manufacturing companies here amounts to a total of \$2,555,987.

Announce Rules For Teachers' Prizes In Essay Contests

RALEIGH, Sept. 16.—Rules and regulations governing the recently announced contest for three \$50 prizes offered by the North Carolina Education association for articles dealing with educational problems were announced today by the executive committee of the association. The contest is open only to members of the public school teachers' organization for the year 1923-24, according to the regulations, which place Feb. 15, 1924, as the time limit of the contest.

A list of 51 suggested subjects accompanied the rules and regulations of the executive committee. However, it was stated, "The teacher may select any subject within the educational field, provided of course, the subject affords an opportunity for real study and will give the teachers of the state information based on serious study of facts."

Contestants should not express opinions or deal in theories unless their opinions and theories are backed by facts obtained from study and research, according to an explanation of the rules and regulations and the purposes of the contest.

Heavy Entry List For State Poultry Show At Greensboro

GREENSBORO, Sept. 17.—The official North Carolina state poultry show will be conducted here Dec. 5, 6 and 7 under the auspices of the Central Carolina Poultry association and the North Carolina Poultry association and officials of the two organizations already are making extensive plans for the show, which they say is expected to be the best every respect ever put on in this state.

More than 1,200 fowls were exhibited at the show conducted by the two poultry associations this year. The number of entries this year is expected to be increased to at least 2,000, according to executives of the two associations who met here recently to make preliminary arrangements for this year's show.

Jacob Eberly, of Dallastown, Pa., and Charles Nixon, of Washington, N. J., have been secured to serve as judges at the fowl exhibit, it was announced. Mr. Eberly, who attended the state show here last year, has served as judge at some of the largest and most important poultry shows in the country, it was said. Mr. Nixon also is regarded as an expert poultry judge, chicken breeders here declare.

RIVERA SEEKS TO QUIET MOROCCO BY FORCE OF TROOPS

New Spanish Dictator Plans Prompt End of Agitation Now

MADRID, Sept. 17.—A new offensive is planned in Morocco by Primo Rivera, the new military director of Spain. It is understood that he will immediately send an army to Morocco to settle the entire problem there.

It is stated that the offensive will probably begin within the next week with 150,000 troops. The new parliament will be representative of all the interests of Spain, and a special department will be created where the people may submit complaints directly to the government for investigation, and where justifiable and immediate adjustment. The foreign ministry of war will be the only department of the old regime retained, it was announced.

PORT ZENDES, Franco-Spanish Front, Sept. 17.—The military director, formed as a result of last week's revolution has declared the expulsion of 31 leading officials including Sanchez Guellera and several prominent liberal leaders, it has been learned.

Rivera in Command.

MADRID, Sept. 17.—As the country now is governed by a military dictatorship, Rivera's title appears to be president of the military directorate, instead of president of the council of ministers. The foreign ministry of war will be retained, but it is understood that all other ministries and sub-secretariats have been suppressed. The various departments will be under control of a higher government official, to be chosen by senator; he must, however, submit all matters to the president of the directorate for decision.

Begin Rigid Economy.

The military directorate will begin rigid economy in the national expenses, but without prejudicing the functions of the administration. The government, Rivera declares, will propose and develop a policy of security regarded as indispensable for the welfare of the country. He has also appealed to the free citizen, to make the political parties more progressive, and thus enrich the Spanish race.

A decree naming Rivera as president of the directorate confers on him the power to pass upon decrees involving public health, which decrees will be law, ad interim, but he cannot modify laws passed by the Cortes.

A CULTURAL EVENT

In New York city, our modern Athens and the avatar of culture and art, last Friday night was held one of the most interesting social events of the season. More than 85,000 of the elite and others not quite so elite, eager for uplift and enlightenment attended and contributed nearly two million of dollars for the pleasure and gaiety that marked the occasion.

The event was distinguished by a one-sided debate between Mr. Jack Dempsey of Salt Lake City, Utah, and Mr. Luis Angel Firpo, of Buenos Aires, in which the former required less than four minutes to settle the argument, thus determining Mr. Dempsey to be vastly superior in fistic oratory.

Dempsey in addition to more than a half million dollars was given a testimonial of regard synonymous with the bay wreath of greenbacks instead of green leaves. Since Angel Firpo, did not become an angel in fact, he received a wreath representing more than 10 per cent of the receipts.

It is such pleasurable occasions that indicate clearly what strides humanity is making toward perfection. The deep interest that men feel in peace and amity is shown by the ordinary man's willingness to pay a good sum of money to see some fellow who makes a business of fighting sternly punished for his wicked propensities.

Both sides to that argument which occurred in the Polo grounds were animated by the most ferocious intentions. The contest, though brief, was sufficiently savage to satisfy all and the world, since the debate has been settled.

Those who attended will probably vote it a great social and artistic success, to say nothing of the financial return. The best man won. If there must be fights, let us always hope for something worth while.

ORGANIZED CHARITY

From cold figures and colder facts proponents of organized and scientific charity argue. They know what is best and how much or little, because they have tables of statistics charting past experiences. They mix circumstances and environments and propinquities in a mortar and deduce an analysis that is accurate and fixed.

But there is an element they cannot gauge and cannot analyze. It is human nature. There come times of great and sudden disaster and of unexpected catastrophes that create emergencies that may not be argued about. It is then that human nature, basically sympathetic and compassionate, rises to dispute with organized charity.

It is in such crises and emergencies that men feel the urge and need to help the suffering by giving personal expression to the universal spirit of brotherhood.

It is then that Lowell's estimate that "the gift without the giver is bare," is seen in its full truth. However little be the gift that is to relieve human suffering, it is an expression of intent and sympathy that has a healthful and helpful effect upon the giver and is an outlet for a natural impulse of tenderness, kindness and sympathy, a complete obedience to the commandment to love thy neighbor as thyself. Too long walled up and restrained, this impulse will become inactive and inexpressive and finally disappear from among human attributes.

It is the fault of organized charity that it stifles such impulses of pity. It makes kindness and compassion cold and abstract things. It speaks in dollars and cents laid by for an emergency and takes no account that it is murdering an impulse of human nature old as Divine Intent, that makes life at all worth living.

No science or organization has any business trifling with such impulses and robbing this sorry old world of the kindness of which it has all to little.

The old question of why a chicken crosses the road is still unsolved to the satisfaction of most motorists.

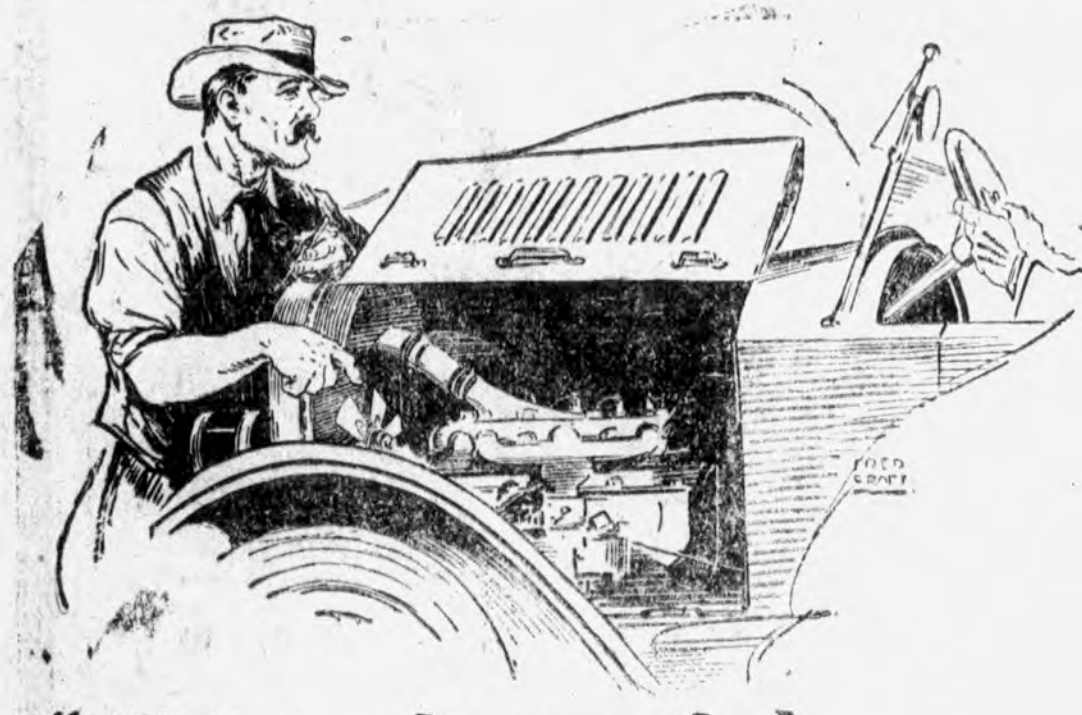

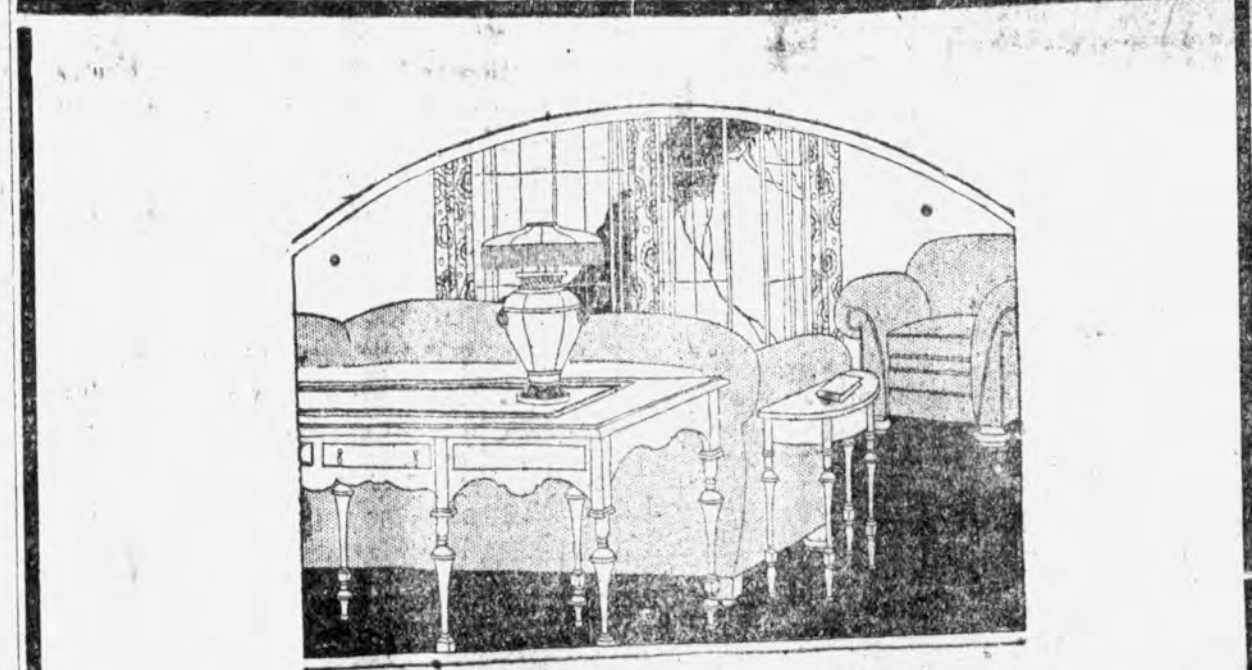

UNWORTHY CASES CONSUME TIME OF SUPREME COURT

WASHINGTON. — The Supreme Court is making no material progress in clearing its docket. When it meets October 1 to begin its next term it will find substantially as many cases awaiting consideration as a year ago.

This condition is not due to lack of effort, for no matter how fast the court speeds up its disposition of cases the accumulation upon it, docket keeps pace. The real trouble, in the opinion of attorneys practicing before the court, is that the appellate jurisdiction of the highest tribunal is sought by many litigants whose controversies do not present questions worthy of its consideration, and who should not be permitted to consume its time.

Congress has from time to time attempted to solve the problem by legislation, but laws are slow in reforming human nature. As long as the court is open to those who would use it to delay the execution of sentences or take a last desperate chance to have an adverse decision reversed, its dockets will be crowded with cases in which an appeal is asked merely to postpone the inevitable day when the prison doors must close on the petitioner, or when a judgment must be paid.

Owing to the congestion of business a case filed today will not be reached by the court for argument within 18 months unless it is included in that comparatively small number advanced for hearing out of turn. Although substantially 100 more cases were disposed of last term than in 1918, the court docketed during that period 50 more than in 1918, and had at the end of the term undisposed of only 40 less cases than it had at a corresponding period five years ago. The comparative insignificance of this inroad into the accumulation of business is evident when it is known that the number of cases annually docketed is in excess of 1,000. Should the court be able to maintain the progress made during the last five years, it will be 45 years before its docket is cleared.

It apparently was the original intention that the time of the court would be given to the decision of constitutional questions and legal controversies of national importance, and the establishment of precedents in disputed features of new laws. But when congress attempted to assist in that design by restricting the cases in which lower courts could grant appeals, it really opened a new avenue for overcrowding. It gave the court discretion to itself to determine when it would grant appeals.

American Films Provide Laughter For German Fans

MUNICH.—Horn-rimmed spectacles are now regarded by Europeans as the infallible label of Americanism. Harold Lloyd has displaced Charlie Chaplin in their favor. They have even, for the moment, forgotten bouncing Douglas Fairbanks, Tom Mix and the other professional wild-westers, and accept the bespectacled Harold as the typical American. And as it is difficult to reconcile the tortoise-shell blinkers with cow-camps and Indians, Europeans are getting somewhat muddled in their conceptions of American life.

For years cowboys and bouncers with egg-toed shoes and paddled shoulders represented American man-kind to Europe. The British comic papers and the British stage gave Europe its pictures of life in the United States. Then the movies came, to the fore, and Europe insisted on having films which would not violate its notions on how Americans look and act. Films of conventional life in the United States apparently do not appeal to European crowds. At any rate they are never shown.

The ordinary European film is so slow in its action that the movie houses rely very largely on American films for their "pep" and comedy. Europe produces tragedies without end. Italy, Spain, France and Germany stage sorrow and grief. Sweden also supplies many tear-wringers, and Russia is beginning to send soulful films into the houses of western Europe. So it remains for the Americans to supply something sniffling and lively.

Europe has starved and fought and suffered so long that it wants a change. European comedians have tried to make their fellow-countrymen laugh, but they have failed so far in their efforts to produce first class comedy films. Even the third-rate American comedies are more successful in Europe than the films in which the leading comedians of Europe have featured.

In those cases in which appeals were not granted by the lower courts, so that now endless periods of time are consumed hearing the petitions of litigants whose contentions are found in the end to be of insufficient general importance to warrant the supreme court in reviewing them.

The court cannot determine whether any particular application asking an appeal under a writ of certiorari possesses sufficient merit to warrant it without an examination of the papers submitted. Each justice therefore must prepare himself to discuss the case at a weekly conference, giving to each application substantially as much time as would be required to dispose of a case by a formal decision. Those cases which the court does decide to hear must then be studied a second time when they come up for argument and decision.

To Compel Bible Reading In Schools

SPOKANE, Wash.—That this is a Christian nation, that the American nation was founded on the Bible that all constitutional provisions are secondary to the laws of Christ as set forth in the Bible, and that the King James version of the scriptures is the official basis for the free fundamental law of God on which the nation is established is the claim of the Bible Fellowship of Citizens as made in a declaration issued today by R. L. Edmiston, of Spokane, a Presbyterian lawyer acting for the Synod of Washington of the Presbyterian church in the U. S. A., as well as for the Bible Fellowship of which he is president. The fellowship is the united interdenominational effort, following official action by the Presbyterian Synod, to obtain legal decree to compel the reading of the Bible in every American public school. Mr. Edmiston blames exclusion of the Bible from the public schools for the advance of criminality among young men.

The occasion for Mr. Edmiston's statement is the observance of the week of September 16-22 as constitutional week, at the recommendation of the American Bar association.

"We must," said Mr. Edmiston, "counteract the tendency of many interests that seek to show that our government is without Christ or Christianity, without God or church."

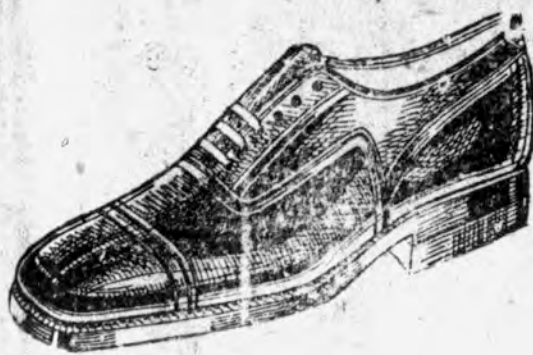
