Most folks have gone the first mile without much trouble, the next mile is harder, the third is the one which balks a great many; the fourth is the easiest of all if proper organization prevails among producers to standardize and properly grade their products.

The outstanding incentive to raise the standard of farm products throughout many sections has been the curb market. This fact has been shown on the local market. In many instances, growers at first unfamiliar with grading and displaying products soon ascertained that they could not compete to advantage with those who graded their produce and displayed it so as to attract attention and ready sale.

Farmers and farm women working together can achieve effects in display that will work to the profit of all much better than individual increase the quality of products from a seasonal sales period into a stall market which will operate the year around. But the measuring rod of success must be remembered to make it possible.

WHITE HOUSE SCENE OF KLAN INITIATION, PREACHER DECLARES

Tells Audience Body Also Strong In U. S. Senate and House

CHARLESTON, W. VA., Sept. 22.—That the Ku Klux Klan held an initiation ceremony in the dining room of the white house, was the declaration made here by the Rev. Basil Newton, of Oklahoma, during a Klan celebration last night.

"We have 227 members in the house of representatives and 27 in the senate," said the speaker. "We held an initiation in the dining room of the white house and you know what it means," he added.

Members from Charleston, Huntington and Kentucky points made up the greater part of the audience.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 22.—The statement of the Rev. Basil Newton, made in Charleston, W. Va., that an initiation of the Ku Klux Klan was held in the white house, was declared by officials today "to be too ridiculous to be discussed."

"Spirit" Away Spirits Valued at 2 Million. Investigation Shows

ST. LOUIS, Sept. 22.—The exact amount of whiskey "spirited" away from the local bonded warehouse of the Jack Daniel Distillery was 893 barrels. Federal officials announced today. It was said to be one of the biggest whiskey robberies since the enactment of the prohibition law.

Each barrel contained 42 gallons and it was estimated that at the drug store, price of \$6 a pint, the stolen whiskey had a retail value of nearly \$2,000,000.

A complete check up today showed 894 barrels in the warehouse. One barrel, the one nearest the door, contained the full amount of whiskey. The others had been "milked" of their whiskey contents and refilled with water.

Saves Part Cotton Crop By Liberal Poison Application

RALEIGH, Sept. 22.—By making an investment of \$1,930 for poison and machines R. F. Stewart, of Aberdeen, was able to dust all of his cotton on 275 acres four or five times and will probably save one-fourth of his crop, or 109 pounds of lint per acre, this season, said Dr. R. W. Leiby on returning to the headquarters here of the department of agriculture from Aberdeen after closing the boll weevil field investigation station there.

Stewart normally made a bale of cotton to the acre before the coming of the weevil, said Dr. Leiby. This year he offered his fields in co-operation with the work being done at the agricultural field station at Aberdeen and under Dr. Leiby's direction a careful study was made of all conditions affecting the cotton during the year. Applications of poison were made according to the method employed by the station, and the percentage of punctured squares was so held down that nearly a full crop was made, according to Dr. Leiby.

Three Miners Killed.

WHEELING, W. VA., Sept. 22.—Three miners were killed today in an explosion at the Benwood mine of the Wheeling Steel and Iron Company it became known tonight when the bodies of Joseph Brillo and Michael Corda and J. J. Carskaden the latter a fire boss, were found buried beneath tons of coal and stone.

C. J. Hinson, evidently inspired by what he thought would be easy money attempted to impersonate tobacco growers at the Star warehouse yesterday, obtain their sales checks with the view of realizing the cash. Hinson made the attempt but that was as far as he went. The trick was discovered and Bruce Suggs, one of the proprietors of the warehouse called the police. Hinson was located and when arraigned before Mayor Clark today was sentenced to the county roads for 30 days on each of three charges, embracing trespass, impersonation and false pretenses.

KIWANIS LIVE AGAIN DEAR "OLD SCHOOL DAYS," SERVICES OF REV SHAMHART HIGHLY PRAISED

For one hour last night, Greenville Kiwanians forced time to turn backward in its flight and make them "school boys again just for the night." With W. H. Woolard as chairman, members of the club and their guests laughed with J. Frank Harrington and Charley Harvey as they recounted their early school experiences, and wept as Bert James told of Jim Starkey's fierce struggle to secure a strange hold on higher education. The old log cabin school came in for its full share of glory at the hands of every speaker as it was in such schools that many members of the club started their search for knowledge. The final touch was added to this part of the program with a selection "School Days" by the Kiwanis Krazy Kat Quartette. Composed of Heber Forbes, Charley Forbes, Jim Applewhite and Bert James.

One of the serious notes of the evening was struck by Herbert Austin in a carefully prepared talk on "The Rising Cost of Education." He showed by statistics that while apparently there had been a considerable increase in the salaries of teachers, that the decreased purchasing power of a dollar had virtually led to a reduction in salary. The speaker also pointed out that measuring by the purchasing power of the dollar, "we were spending in 1920 only 53 cents more per capita than we were in 1900, and this in spite of our greatly increased per capita wealth."

Husband On Silence Strike 20 Years, She Now Seeks Freedom

SPOKANE, Wash., Sept. 22.—Because her husband has been on a "silence strike for 20 years," Mrs. Mattie Hammerly asked that her marriage to Henry Hammerly be dissolved. The bill of complaint explains they were married in 1889 and have 10 children. They have not talked to each other more than a dozen words to each other for more than a fifth of a century. All communication between the couple has been carried on through their children.

RADIO OPERATORS GRILLED BY NAVAL COURT OF INQUIRY

SAN DIEGO, CALIF., Sept. 22.—At today's session of the naval court of inquiry investigating the wreck of seven destroyers off Honda, California, Sept. 4, four men responsible for the operation of a radio compass on Point Arguello came in for a grilling from the questions from counsel for 13 naval officers, the defendants in connection with the disaster investigation. Lieutenant Commander, John A. Whaley, superintendent of communications for the eleventh naval district was the first witness.

Blackmail Plot Told By Witnesses Ward Murder Trial

WHITE PLAINS, N. Y., Sept. 22.—The climax of a day of surprises in the trial of Walter S. Ward, charged with the murder of Clarence Peters, came when charges of a blackmail plot against George S. Ward, wealthy baker, father of the defendant, were suddenly introduced as evidence by Deputy Attorney General O'Neil.

The charges were in the shape of a complaint signed by James J. Cunningham, who was reported to have told Sheriff Werner he knew the details of the Ward blackmail story. Threats of moral disgrace were made against the elder Ward by the black mail gang and Walter S. Ward transmitted the threats to his father, who did not act on them, the complaint said. The charges came after Sheriff Werner had testified the Wards had made no complaint of blackmail to him.

Marcotic Traffic Bared to League

GENEVA, Sept. 22.—The charge that great quantities of harmful drugs are being manufactured in Switzerland and clandestinely imported to the United States and Canada caused a stir during today's discussion by the League of Nations' opium commission, which yesterday decided to recommend an international conference for the promotion of the fight against opium.

SEA TO SEA AIR COMMUTING IN FIVE YEARS, IS PREDICTION

SAN JUAN, Porto Rico.—Within five years it will be a common thing to fly in six hours from New York to San Francisco. This was the startling prediction of Lt. Col. Harry Graham, of the U. S. Army Air Service, recently.

"Our investigations have shown that at altitudes of from 30,000 to 40,000 feet there are air currents traveling from 150 to 300 miles per hour," said Col. Graham.

SHE DESCRIBES MATRIMONY AS FORM SLAVERY

COLORADO SPRINGS, COLO., Sept. 22.—Chiefly because "marriage is a sort of slavery," Mrs. Oliver H. Belmont, of New York, president of the National Women's Party, declared here that she would not recommend marriage for any girl.

"I will not say, in so many words, that marriage is a failure," she said, "but it seems to me that statistics speak for themselves."

Most of the opposition to the equal rights movement comes from the women "of the clinging vine type," Mrs. Belmont said. "Intelligent men are with us. Among the men our only opponents are the 'small town men' and the church organizations."

Mrs. Belmont was here to preside over the Western State Conference tomorrow of the National Women's Party and to attend the Equal Rights Memorial Pageant, which is to be given in the Garden of the Gods Sunday afternoon.

New York Papers Sign Contract With Pressmen's Union

NEW YORK, Sept. 22.—The New York Newspaper Publishers Association and the International Printing Pressmen's and Assistants' Union have signed an agreement under which the international union will endeavor to run the presses of the metropolitan dailies while the local union, suspended from the international body, remains on strike.

The agreement calls for dissolution of the local union and a revocation of its charter. The contract was signed by newspaper owner, President Berry and other officers of the international union.

WILL TEACH AMERICANISM IN THE PUBLIS SCHOOLS OF THE STATE

RALEIGH, Sept. 22.—Steps are being taken by the state board of education to put into effect the law sponsored by the American Legion and passed by the last general assembly, requiring the teaching of Americanism in the public schools of North Carolina. It was announced today by the department of public instruction.

Letters were sent by State Superintendent A. T. Allen this week to publishers, asking them to submit suitable text books for the new compulsory course, and it was stated in letters sent to the various city and county superintendents of public instruction that the State board expects to select a proper course of study and appropriate text books for the teaching of Americanism by Jan. 1, 1924.

CONTRACT FOR TRANSMISSION LINE HERE TO BETHEL AWARDED

The contract for the construction of the entire power transmission line from Bethel to the Greenville power plant has been awarded to R. H. Bouligny Inc., according to announcement today.

Under the terms of the agreement the company is to build in addition to the line two sub-stations. The contract for the material and equipment for rebuilding the local lines in Bethel was awarded to the Western Electric company.

In the circumstances, it is now believed, that the Bethel line will be completed in early December, and that place will then receive the same high class electric service as Greenville.

LEGISLATORS WILL NOT MEET IN OKLA. DEFY OF GOVERNOR

Walton Repeats He Will Jail Every Member, If Necessary

OKLAHOMA CITY, OKLA., Sept. 22.—A threat to close the state fair and placed in operation more rigid enforcement of martial law was made by Governor J. C. Walton, this afternoon unless members of the legislature abandon their plan of calling an extra session of the body scheduled to meet next Wednesday.

Charging that 68 members of the Oklahoma house of representatives are members of the Ku Klux Klan Governor Walton, declared today that the proposed session of the assembly called to meet next Wednesday would constitute an unlawful assemblage of the Klan under his martial law proclamation. The executive again reiterated his determination to imprison any member of the legislature who attended the session, declaring it was a Klan movement.

Many Arrests Made.
"But the Klan is whipped," Walton said at his field headquarters in the executive mansion where he has been confined for several days with a severe cold.

One hundred and eighteen cases of mob violence have been considered by the military court in Tulsa, since martial law was invoked there, Aug. 14. A number of men, a number of whom admit they are members of the Klan have been arrested as a result of the findings.

A joint commission composed of military and civil authorities, ended its first day's session at Shawnee, and three men were ordered arrested for parts they are said to have taken in flogging a man there last June.

Says Amrieca Excels In Use For Aircraft

NEW YORK.—"While other nations are developing air power as a destructive weapon the United States, following its traditional non-military policy, is putting aircraft to work," reads a report made public by the Aeronautical Chamber of Commerce.

"The Forest Service is utilizing planes in timber patrol in Oregon and California. The Coast Guard has aviators in its employ. The Coast and Geodetic Survey is remapping sections of coastline from the air. The Smithsonian Institution has found that aerial scientific studies of fisheries can be made admirably. The air mail of the post office department has operated with increasing efficiency for the last three and one-half years and only recently began night flying experiments which will reduce the time of the transcontinental trip to 30 hours or less.

South Bend Prepares To Observe Centenary

SOUTH BEND, Ind.—The manufacturing city of South Bend is making elaborate preparations to observe the 100th anniversary of its founding. South Bend was established in 1823 as a small trading post. From that modest start it has become a city of 100,000 and by a steady growth, one of the important manufacturing centers of America.

The celebration will begin Sept. 30 and close Oct. 6. The week is to be devoted to religious services, an historical and industrial pageant, receptions, kids' circus and other features. The outstanding feature will be a homecoming. It is the desire of those directing the affair that every former resident of South Bend return to participate in the event and to note how the city has advanced in every way.

JAPAN'S POWER TO RECOVER

Japan will not suffer any loss of prestige as a world power because of the enormous damage and terrible loss of life caused by the earthquake, tidal waves, fires and floods. The cities of Tokio and Yokohama will be rebuilt on a more imposing scale than ever; the accomplishment. These views, expressed by Major General Henry T. Allen, who commanded the American Army of Occupation on the Rhine, have the full indorsement of Japan's official representatives in the United States, one of whom has declared that a new Japan, greater, stronger and more substantial than before, will grow out of the devastation wrought by the disaster. Already the government of that country has entered on plans for reconstruction, and this work will be pushed forward with all possible speed.

Of course, this rebuilding will have to wait until the great task of relief for the suffering, of finding shelter for the homeless and food for the hungry, is accomplished. This may require months of earnest effort, but the millions of dollars contributed by the people of the United States and of other lands guarantee that means for this work will not run short. Never has the world witnessed a more wonderful display of international sympathy and friendship, never has there been a more

prompt and liberal response to a call for aid. Japan's credit was not harmed by the disaster. Even its bonds, listed on American exchanges were not depressed, but held to the prices quoted before the catastrophe. Japan came out of the war period virtually unscathed, from a financial point of view and billion dollars, which is inconsequential, as today has a national debt of but little over a compared with the obligations of the United States, of Great Britain and of France. Should Japan need a loan of half a billion or any other amount, for reconstruction, it could obtain the money easily in this country.

It is expected that Japan will look to the United States for the greater part of the supplies it will need for reconstruction. Many of the railroads of that country must be rebuilt, and the indications are that the most modern equipment will replace the old-style locomotives and cars formerly in use.

Japan possesses the power of recovery to a remarkable degree and can be trusted to put that power to the best use.

Out of this disaster, terrible though it was, will come a country of more substantial buildings and of better public utilities, and in the process of reconstruction the United States is sure to play a leading part.
