Little Impression Is Made On Germans By Move In Ruhr

PARIS, Sept. 25.—Premier Poincaré's next move in view of Germany's announced policy of withdrawal of passive resistance in the Ruhr will be to submit the situation to the inter-allied council, it was intimated here today.

BERLIN, Sept. 25.—It was officially announced by the premier of the German federal states at a conference with Chancellor Stresemann that the passive resistance program was determined to safeguard the unity of the country.

DUSSELDORF, Sept. 25.—The news of the German government's determination to withdraw passive resistance in the Ruhr district created no impression upon the population of the valley. It was declared today.

BERLIN, Sept. 25.—In a statement Chancellor Stresemann announced that the German government had decided to abandon the policy of passive resistance in the Ruhr and Rhineland and ordered resumption of activities in all lines at once.

The Chancellor urged the employers to resume operations at their plants and mines immediately and advocated uniformity in this so as to avoid independent action which might be detrimental to the restoration of economic normalcy in the Ruhr and Rhineland.

Plans of Procedure.
No announcement was forthcoming regarding the method which the

Stresemann government will employ to apprise the occupying powers of its decision to call off passive resistance without having obtained the concessions which it had designated as indispensable conditions in previous utterances. The Chancellor may confine himself to a brief declaration in the Reichstag, which would also be considered as notification to the outside world that the government had reached its decision despite failure to secure in advance any concession from France or Belgium, thereby virtually making an unconditional surrender.

Mention Third Power.
There was a rumor in diplomatic circles that a third power had offered the government its good offices in the direction of vouchsafing it a formal adjustment of the Ruhr conflict which would not impose humiliating conditions in the nature of a signed capitulation, or formal admission of responsibility for its policy of passive resistance.

Whether the Chancellor definitely informed the participants in the conference that the government would unconditionally call off passive resistance could not be established, and the first indication of its resolve came later this evening when the Berlin newspapers were given a cautiously worded communique, in which the significant decision was buried in a cursory report of today's discussions with the representatives of the Ruhr and Rhineland.

MACON, GA., Sept. 25.—The state at the opening session today of the trial of Dr. C. A. Yarborough, dentist, on charges of flogging attempted to connect him with an anonymous letter received by W. O. Barnett. The latter charged that the dentist was the leader of the band of men who flogged him last February. The contents of the letter it was alleged were written on a typewriter in the office of Yarborough. Mrs. Eva McMichael, identifying the letter said she wrote it on the typewriter of the dentist at his office. A typewriter expert followed. He declared that the letter in evidence was written on the machine specified.

NEW YORK, Sept. 25.—Supreme court Justice Wagner, today denied the motion made by Isaac Mills, chief counsel for Walter S. Ward indicted on trial for first degree murder in the slaying of J. C. Peters. The motion was made after Attorney General Sherman had rested the case for the state.

HIGH SCHOOL ENROLLMENT NEARLY ONE-THIRD OF TOTAL ATTENDANCE; WORK OF LAST YEAR IS REVIEWED

The total enrollment for the Greenville graded schools for the past session was 1,926. Of this number 1,422 were in the white schools and 504 in the colored schools. The enrollment by grades in the white schools was as follows: First grade 139, second grade 159, third grade 136, fourth grade 142, fifth grade 117, sixth grade 88, seventh grade 91, eighth grade 79, ninth grade 91, tenth grade 72, eleventh grade 29.

There were employed during the last year 41 white teachers and 11 colored teachers. According to the audit recently made of all school funds by the George R. Dobb, county auditor, the amount paid out for the salaries of teachers both white and colored was \$84,203.41 the past school year.

For the past four years the books of the schools have been regularly audited by a reputable firm of auditors. The schools always secure the services of the same auditors who audit the books of the town. These audits of the school fund are open to the public and can be seen at any office of the municipal officers or at the office of the superintendent of schools at the high school building. For the past four years, there has not been found a deficit in the revenues of the schools. The schools have lived within their incomes each year.

TO CELEBRATE HISTORIC BATTLE OF KINGS MOUNTAIN; CAL MAY ATTEND

KINGSMOUNTAIN, Sept. 25.—The 143rd anniversary of the battle of Kings Mountain, considered by historians as one of the major events of the Revolutionary war, will be celebrated here Oct. 6 with Battery D, Fifth Field Artillery, said to date from January 6, 1776 and to be the oldest battery in America, participating in the exercises.

The Battery will be brought here from Fort Bragg by General A. J. Bowly, commanding officer of the fort. A military band, guns, field radio truck and military accoutrements also will be brought here for the celebration.

The governors of the 13 original states, together with President Coolidge, Secretary of War Weeks, William C. McAdoo, former secretary of the treasury, state regents of the Daughters of the American Revolution and officials of the State of North Carolina have been asked to attend the celebration in commemoration of the battle which took place 143 years ago on the top of King's Mountain just across the border line in South Carolina.

The tentative program for the event calls for a mammoth street parade, athletic contests, including boxing and wrestling bouts and a football game; band concerts and appropriate speeches.

The celebration is being sponsored jointly by the Kings Mountain chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution and the Chamber of Commerce with the assistance of the city government.

LONDON, Sept. 25.—An exchange of Tel graph dispatch from Constantinople quotes an Ankara message as stating that the Turkish government has decided to press for the withdrawal from the straits of the flotilla of American torpedo boats stationed at Constantinople and that Adnan Bey, the Nationalist representative in Constantinople, has made representations to the United States High Commissioner there.

Salesmen Say Speed Laws Too Stringent

HIGH POINT, Sept. 25.—The present speed limitation on the good roads of North Carolina is too strict, in the opinion of the directors of the Travelers' Protective Association of the state.

The board in meeting voted its endorsement of the movement fostered by C. W. Roberts, the active vice-president of the Carolina Motor Club, to bring pressure to bear upon the next meeting of the General Assembly to revise the speed figure upward.

Tobacco Market At Henderson Opened

HENDERSON, Sept. 25.—With buyers and warehouse employees alike on hand, the stage is all set for opening of the Henderson tobacco market today for the sale of leaf tobacco by the auction method.

Three warehouses will be operated here this season—the Cooper, the High Price and the Planters. Only the first two were run last year. Increase in the number of houses is regarded as a good omen for the increased sales on the local market this season, as the facilities to be offered will be as fine as on any market this size in the old belt.

A set of buyers who are declared to be thoroughly capable and efficient and who have had many years of experience in the tobacco business will be on the local market.

"STARTLING" DEMONSTRATIONS IN "MENTAL TELEPATHY" GIVEN FOR BENEFIT OF ROTARIANS AT MEET

Members of the Rotary Club together with a number of guests were given a series of original and clever "demonstrations" in the power of "mental telepathy," last night at the meeting of the Club. The feature was the conception of Haywood Dail and Robert Brunson of what the suggestive power should be, even if it is not. In any event it was mirth provoking and sought to develop at the expense of the theory considerable speculation.

J. H. Rose, gave a summary of what the club is doing along the line of boys' work. He compared the activities here with those of other places, which showed that local Rotarians are well to the front in this important branch of effort.

TROOPS ORDERED TO HALT LEGISLATURE MEETING WITH GUNS

"Shoot to Kill," Says Walton to Guard In Okla. Klan Battle

OKLAHOMA CITY, OKLA., Sept. 25.—State troops are being marshalled here have been instructed to "shoot to kill" should such action be necessary to prevent the assembly tomorrow of the lower house, which is called for the purpose of impeachment proceedings against Governor J. C. Walton, for his fight against the Ku Klux Klan.

In the meantime, determined members of the legislature are quietly gathering to complete plans to meet in defiance of the orders of Walton, who holds that the attempted gathering is illegal and contrary to law. Walton issued instructions last night to Adjutant General H. B. Markham, to draw upon all the military forces of the state to block the proposed assemblage. He expressed the hope that no such measures would be required, but if necessary, the military had been ordered to "shoot to kill to disperse the legislature."

An order was issued today by the governor commanded all males between the ages of 21 and 35 to hold themselves ready to come to the assistance of the sovereign state of Oklahoma, when summoned by the governor or the adjutant general.

The order also explained that if it was necessary to respond, to bear such arms as they possessed or could procure. It was again repeated by Walton that the proposed extra session of the legislature is dominated by the Klan.

GOVERNMENT SELLS GORGAS MUSCLE SHOALS POWER PLANT; THE ACTION FORCES REVISION OF FORD'S OFFER

DETROIT, Sept. 25.—The sale of the Gorgas steam power plant to the Alabama Power Company by the government probably means that no further bids for the remaining Muscle Shoals property will be made, by Henry Ford, it was learned at his offices here today. Ford could not be reached, but it was stated by those who spoke with authority that when Ford bid on the property it was as a whole and not in part, as he realized the Gorgas plant was vital to the economic operation of the property, and that his offer was made on that basis.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 25.—Henry Ford's much controverted offer to buy Muscle Shoals was wholly upset when the government sold to the Alabama Power Company the Gorgas steam plant—a part of the property—at a price of approximately \$3,500,000.

This development forces a revised offer from Ford if he wishes to bid for the remainder of the project. He previously had informed congress that unless the Gorgas plant were included in the sale his bid did not hold.

Political observers who have pro-

posed to see some connection between Mr. Ford's offer for Muscle Shoals and the Presidential boom which bears the manufacturer's name, predicted today that the next development would be reverberations in the coming session of congress which possibly might develop into something bearing a relation to the coming convention campaign.

Some time ago the War Department notified Ford that the department of justice and the Judge, Advocate General of the Army had held valid its contract with the power company which required the government to either move the plant from the power company's land or sell it to the company.

Today was the last, under several extensions of time in which the department could make a decision. Ford's engineers in Detroit wired the War Department a request for another extension, which the power company declined to grant and Secretary Weeks came to the decision that under the circumstances it was more advantageous to the government to sell than move.

Half American Men Virtually In Rags, He Tell Clothing Experts

CHICAGO, Sept. 25.—About 5 per cent of the American male population is practically in rags, Fre Voiland, president of the National Association of Retail Clothiers, declared at a meeting of the association here today, adding that the retail clothing stands in the midst of a virgin field of endeavor. Last year only 52 hats were sold for each 100 American men and 62 suits were sold for each 100 men, he said.

"This means," he said, "that should a series of material misfortunes befall American men overnight, about one half would either have to see refuge in overalls or go to bed."

CUT AND PLOW COTTON STALKS UNDER EARLY TO FIGHT WEEVIL

ABERDEEN, Sept. 25.—"If cotton stalks are cut and plowed under before frost, many boll weevils will be forced to enter winter quarters in a weakened condition and their chances of surviving the winter to attack young cotton plants next spring will be materially lessened," said Dr. R. W. Laiby, of the boll weevil laboratory in a statement issued today.

Dr. Laiby urged the picking of this year's crop as rapidly as possible and the destruction of the old stalks immediately afterwards. The sooner these stalks are destroyed before the first killing frost the more

effective will be this weevil remedy, he declared.

In order that cotton growers might know when to expect frost, Dr. Laiby said that from records furnished him by the State weather bureau, the extreme southern and eastern tier of counties of North Carolina usually experience their first killing frost between November 6 and November 10. The counties within the upper coastal plain, he continued, have their first killing frost usually between Nov. 1 and Nov. 6, while those counties in the lower Piedmont section are visited by their first killing frost between October 25 and October 30.

A NOVEL THEORY

The report of the Federal Coal Commission, just issued, propounds one of the most novel theories for control of public and semi-public utilities in the history of economics. The commission believes that the sentiment of public opinion may be transmitted to the coal operators in some subtle and esoteric way effective public opinion is to quit using coal, so emphatically that prices will drop.

One of the best ways to work up a good, sit around in your overcoat in an unheated house and generate a heat of wrath against the people who monopolize the anthracite business and the labor leaders who are apparently in cahoots with them. Most persons by this process could get "het up" enough not only to transmit heat waves to the operators, but to get along very nicely without furnace or fuel for the rest of the winter.

The commission informs us, with humiliating frankness, that public opinion must be relied upon to correct abuses in the coal indus-

try and bring about such reforms as will insure fair prices and a consistent supply. This is tantamount to saying that public opinion by the same processes, may regulate freight rates and the business of transportation without the intervention of an Interstate Commerce Commission. The same theory may be carried further, and public opinion relied upon to protect American industries so that the Tariff Commission may be dispensed with. Or why have a Congress, Supreme Court or President? Let the public opinion run the country.

The Coal Commission should know by this time what the state of public opinion is in regard to the operators. There certainly has been enough public opinion heat generated. If the theory is sound, then it should have been transmitted long before this, both to the commission and to the operators. But something has gone wrong. There's a wire crossed and all this public opinion has been wasted.

It was the general opinion that the Federal Coal Commission had as one of its chief purposes the business of suggesting means by which the very considerate force of public opinion could be made active. It seems to have misunderstood its mission and to have wasted its time.

Possibly the New York pressmen's strike is another of those little things for which the Moscow International will assume credit.

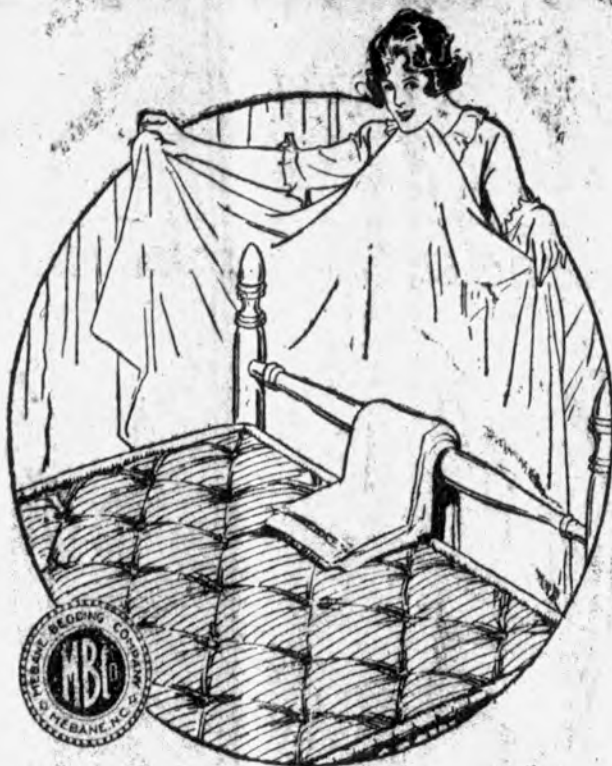

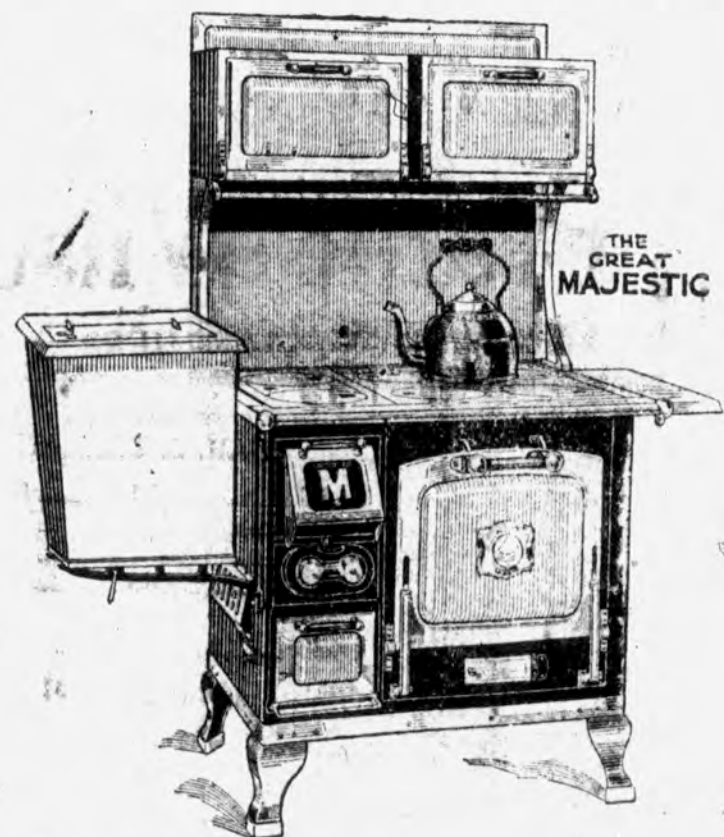

Seeks International Law To Deal With Non-Support Now

STOCKHOLM.—Effective international measures for the protection of children whose fathers, of a different nationality from that of the mother, seek to escape their responsibilities by fleeing the country may soon be arrived at, if the plans of K. H. von Koch, Swedish delegate to the Geneva congress of the International association for the protection of children, are carried through.

There are two general classes of cases which involve special hardships for the children, says Mr. von Koch. One is where parents of different nationalities become divorced, and the father leaves the country without providing for his offspring; the other is the case of the illegitimate child whose father leaves the country of the mother in order to avoid the responsibility of support, which may be legally demanded in Sweden.

Observers See Bright Outlook For Egypt

CAIRO, Egypt.—Egypt was never so tranquil or so full of promise for the future as it is today, in the opinion of disinterested observers in this city. Great Britain's decision to "stand clear" and give the Egyptians a fair chance to run the country themselves, has proved a wise measure, it is averred. It has allayed anti-foreign feeling, put an end to the subversive activities of revolutionary organizations, and created generally a much clearer political atmosphere.

NORTH CAROLINA LEADS UNION IN NEW ROAD WORK

Measured by 11 different measures, and excepting only the per capita expenditure for road improvements, in which it stands first, North Carolina stands 17th on an average among the 48 states in its road activities, according to a tabulation prepared by the American association of State Highway Officials, of which Charles M. Upham, highway engineer for the state is secretary. The figures have just been made public here.

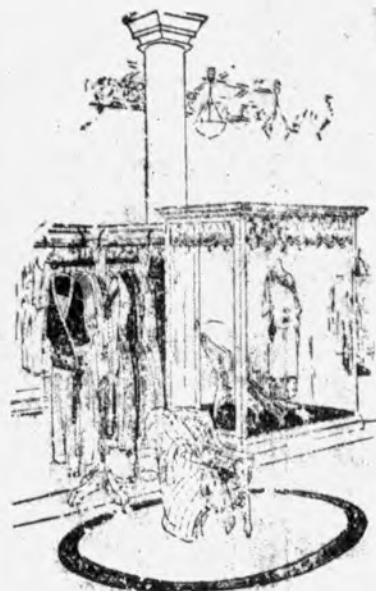

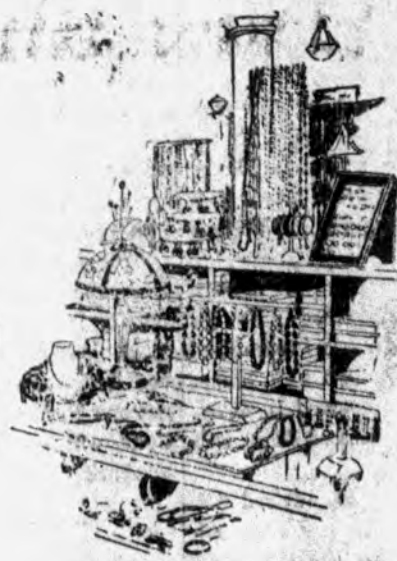

Speed of 250 Miles May Be Attained At St. Louis Air Meet

ST. LOUIS.—The Barling bomber, superplane of the United States army, whose initial flight at Wilbur Wright Field, Dayton, Ohio, attracted wide attention, will be on exhibition at the International Air races to be held here Oct. 1-3.

General Mason M. Patrick, chief of the Army Air Service, has promised that the plane, which is the most powerful in the world will fly to St. Louis for the air meet and aeronautical exposition. It is planned to have daily exhibition flights.

More than 200 airmen are expected to participate in the races. Italy, France, Canada and Mexico will be represented, and efforts have been made to induce other foreign fliers to enter. The cash prizes and trophies, respectively \$13,000 and eight cups, will be awarded the evening of October 3.

The third Nation Aero Congress will be held in connection with the races and secretaries Welles, Denby and Hoover, Postmaster General New and General Pershing are expected to deliver addresses.

In an effort to retrieve its laurels, the navy has nominated only its speediest craft and most experienced fliers and will have two new planes entered which are expected to develop a speed of 250 miles an hour, it is asserted.

General Patrick has advised the committee that among the army entries will be the two Curtiss racers and the Verville, Sperry, which were in last year's races at Detroit.

Mrs. Bertha Dale Horchum of Ransom, Kansas, who recently set a new altitude record of 16,300 feet for women, was one of the first formally to announce her entry. She will compete in the "On-to-St. Louis Race," an event for civilians who will fly their planes here from various parts of the country.

New Official Named.

WASHINGTON.—On the recommendation of Secretary Wallace, of agriculture, Howard M. Gore has been appointed assistant secretary of agriculture by President Coolidge to take the place of Charles W. Pugsley, who recently resigned to accept the presidency of the South Dakota State agricultural college.

New Primary Laws Compel Candidates To Come Forward

WASHINGTON.—The presidential primary, now the vogue in a full score of states, not only has become the bug-bear of many old-fashioned political bosses, but is also accomplishing the route of the time-honored practice of delaying the announcement of candidates until the last possible moment. Today in many states candidates must climb down off the fence many weeks before the national conventions, and say whether they will or won't.

The beginning of the 1924 primary season now is a bare six months away, and the filing of papers required of candidates in many cases already has become a burning question among those who cannot decide whether they hear a commanding popular call for their services in public office. Such decisions must be made much earlier than in times gone by and as a consequence of the spread of the primary system the next few weeks are expected to see the crop of candidates reach a stage much more advanced than the average for pre-presidential years in the past.

The first primary, that in New Hampshire, will be held March 11. North Dakota will follow a week later, and seven additional states, controlling some of the largest delegations that sit in national conventions, will have voted before the end of April.
