

The Greenville police department is to be highly commended for its vigilance and efficiency in enforcing the various traffic regulations of the city—except the law that requires that glaring lights shall not be displayed by motorists. The constant and flagrant disregard of this ordinance should be enforced just as rigidly as others far less dangerous to public safety.

Greenville residents and those who are not, have found out that the police department can be depended upon to quickly detect various other infractions of traffic laws. If a motorist parks his car on the pavement between restricted hours he usually finds himself in court paying the cost, if not a fine. Certainly there is less danger from a parked machine than from one showing blinding lights.

With traffic growing heavier incident to the busy fall season, the risk of accident to both pedestrians and motorists increases. If there be skeptics concerning this assertion a cursory view in the several directions afforded at Five Points will be patently convincing that there is real concern to be felt in safeguarding against accidents.

"Rebel Legislature" In Oklahoma Dispersed By Military; No Resistance

OKLAHOMA CITY, Sept. 26.—The Oklahoma "rebel legislature" was dispersed by the military forces today, when an attempt was made to convene the body seeking to bring impeachment proceedings against Governor J. C. Walton.

The commander of the military forces read the orders of Governor Walton to the leader of the extra session movement, which prohibited the assembly during "this period of unrest." He told the members to disperse quietly. They left without resistance.

Those members who reported for the extra session left the corridors of the state capitol building at 12:05 leaving the military alone in command of the building. The first legislators to arrive at the capitol were met by troops carrying policemen's clubs and side arms, but none carried rifles. They were permitted to enter singly and a dozen had arrived at 11 o'clock. A score of state functionaries and officials were excused for the day.

Sentinels were posted at the entrance of the hall of the lower house and all carried service rifles. Similar guards were stationed at various points about the corridors. Representative W. D. McBe, leader of the extra session movement, filed the proclamation calling the lower house together and bearing the signatures of 64 members with the secretary of state.

All arrangements to prevent the meeting had been completed at 9:30. More than 100 guardsmen were stationed in the capitol and every outside entrance and all approaches were patrolled.

Military headquarters were established in the rotunda of the state house and the capitol grounds were swept clear of all persons by the military.

Headquarters of the "rebel legislature" have been established in a hotel. Whether any further attempt will be made to bring the body together, appear to be a matter of speculation. Just what the next move will be in the fight between the chief executive of the state in war on the Ku Klux Klan has not been indicated by either side to the bitter controversy.

NO TESTIMONY IS OFFERED BY WARD IN OWN DEFENSE

WHITE PLAINS, N. Y., Sept. 26.—A sensation was created at the trial of W. S. Ward, charged with murder of Clarence Peters, today when the defense rested its case without submitting testimony. After announcing that the defense would place no witnesses on the stand, Isaac N. Mills, chief counsel for Ward, renewed the motion submitted yesterday asking that the indictment against his client be dismissed and the jury be instructed to return a verdict of acquittal.

Judge Wagner, again denied all motions. Mills then began summing for Ward.

Ada Blackjack, a full-blooded Eskimo woman, is the sole survivor of the party of five who encamped on Wrangle Island in the Arctic Ocean, to claim it for the British Government. They were marooned on the island for two years. She nursed and fed Knight, one of the party of five, for five months and for more than two months lived close to his dead body, waiting to bury it. Many times when the little food she could gather up was stolen by polar bears. The little party on Wrangle Island was part of the Stefansson Expedition of 1921.

Greenville Public Library Gaining In Educational Value

According to the report of Mrs. Bell Hodge, librarian of the Greenville Public Library 200 volumes were added by purchases last year to the collection. The number was increased 93 by gift making the total 1,683 volumes. There were 832 borrowers during the year, while the volumes withdrawn from usage were 75. The library is open Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays of each week from 3 to 6 o'clock. It was organized and maintained by the women's clubs. By an appropriation of \$50 a month from the city the purchase of additional volumes has been made possible and a few necessary improvements made.

Large Shortage of Help Is Reported

RALEIGH, Sept. 26.—M. L. Shipman, state commissioner of Labor and Printing and director of the federal employment service in this state, today made public his weekly employment report for the seven day period ending Sept. 27. The report showed that applications for employment fell short nearly 100 of the number of requests for help made by employers to the six branch offices of the federal service, the number of registrations being 584, while there were 672 requests for help. Common laborers are much in demand.

Of the 584 persons going to employment offices for aid in securing jobs, 560 were referred to employers, 268 were given jobs as unskilled laborers, while 116 were skilled laborers. CO-OP VOTES TO REFUND MONEY TAKEN FROM LANDLORDS ACCOUNT NON-MEMBER TENANT, IS REPORT

According to unofficial word, the Tobacco Growers Co-operative association has voted to return all deductions made by the association on account of the five cents per pound penalty collected from landlords members for the sales of tobacco by non-member tenants. No further deductions are to be made, pending supreme court rulings, it was stated.

This report follows the action of Judge T. H. Calvert, at Raleigh yesterday, in dismissing the 118 injunction suits against Pitt county farmers brought by the association seeking to restrain them from selling tobacco crops outside of the organization.

Counsel for both sides have consented to early advancement of the cases to the supreme court.

Cured War Veteran Halts Own Funeral, Says 'I'm Not Ready'

SACRAMENTO, CAL., Sept. 26.—George W. Ficks, Sacramento civil war veteran, has the unique experience of halting arrangements for his own funeral.

Officials of the American Legion and the Grand Army of the Republic received word that Ficks had died suddenly at Colfax, and immediately began arrangements for an impressive military funeral. This was interrupted by a telephone message from Ficks.

"I have been told," said Ficks, "that you plan to hold my funeral. I want to tell you right now that I shall not keep the engagement. You can cancel all arrangements. I am enjoying good health and hope it will be many years before you have the opportunity of fulfilling your plans."

Lipton Will Build New Yacht to Race For U. S. Cup in 1925

SOUTHAMPTON, Sept. 26.—Sir Thomas Lipton, who arrived here today on the Homeric, declared that he has definitely decided to challenge the New York Yacht Club for a race for the America's Cup in 1925.

"Beyond that I can make no statement for the moment," said Sir Thomas, "but a new yacht will have to be built."

"The reason for my return to England now is that I am to receive the freedom of Glasgow, an honor I appreciate more than anything that has ever been offered to me."

Cruelty to Jumping Bean, Society Holds

SANTA BARBARA, CAL., Sept. 26.—What constitutes cruelty to a bean? The Santa Barbara humane society has entered a fight to settle the question.

Merchants here have offered "Mexican jumping beans" for sale and to fill energy into the insects which dwell within have placed their displays in hot sunshine. The result is somewhat similar to the inside of a popcorn popper.

Now the humane society holds that exposing the larvae to sunshine is cruelty in the worst form and has started a campaign to prevent the exploitation of the beans. The state humane society has been asked to decide the controversy.

VULTURES REVEAL BODY OF GIRL, 15, HIDDEN IN BUSHES

MILLVILLE, N. Y., Sept. 26.—The half-eaten and partially decomposed body of Emma Dickinson, 15-year-old high school girl, was found today hidden in a clump of bushes 50 feet from a heavily traveled road two miles from her home at Port Elizabeth, a small fishing village near her. The girl had apparently been attacked and then murdered. The back of her head had been crushed in by a blunt instrument.

The disappearance of the girl from her home on Sept. 1 had never been reported to the police. Her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Thompson Dickson, today said she had failed to return after leaving home to visit a neighbor. The body had evidently been lying in the underbrush for more than two weeks. It was found by a passing pedestrian, who noticed a cove of vultures hovering over the spot.

51 Millions Invested By State In Autos

Fifty-one million dollars were invested in automobiles and trucks in North Carolina during the year ending yesterday when the number of licenses issued passed the 221,000 mark.

One year ago there were 168,100 motor vehicles in the state, 9,996 of which have gone into retirement, according to figures compiled by J. E. Sawyer, head of the automobile license bureau, leaving a total of 64,896 new vehicles purchased during the 12 months' period.

In six years the number of motor vehicles licensed to operate in the State has increased 400 per cent, rising from 49,480 on September 25, 1917, to slightly more than 221,000 yesterday.

Over 500 Students Expected to Register; Faculty Increased

The 1923-24 term of the Eastern Carolina Teachers Training College opened today with the matriculation of students. It was expected that the enrollment would reach around 500, the largest number in the history of the institution. Registration will be completed tomorrow, it was stated, and work will start Friday. A committee from the Y. W. C. A. is assisting in the work of enrollment.

Available quarters at the College are taxed to the capacity. The dormitories are completely filled and the overflow is being taken care of in private homes.

The annual faculty dinner will be held this evening at 6:30 in the Rotary Club building. Several valuable additions have been made to the teaching staff and a number have been added to fill vacancies caused by those on leave of absence.

Senators Home From Europe With Varied Views On Conditions

NEW YORK, Sept. 26.—Reinforced with first-hand information which probably will figure in debates in congress this winter, a group of United States Senators and Representatives returned today on the Leviathan from Europe, where they studied political and economic conditions. Some of them also attended the International Parliamentary Union at Copenhagen.

Among the returning legislators were Senators Robinson, of Arkansas; McKellar, of Tennessee; McKinley, of Illinois; Swanson, of Virginia; and Representatives Longworth, of Ohio and Baker of California.

Judge Rules Mah-Jongg Calls For Proficiency Now

MANILA. — Mah-Jongg, the great Chinese game of dominoes, is not a game of chance. A competent court of the land has ruled thus, and it is ordered.

The above decision was rendered in a case against Teo Tong, Lee Loy, So Chee and Kuong Chang, all Chinese, arrested on the charge of gambling. The case came before Judge Manuel V. Moran, who based his decision on the case of the United States vs. Libby. In his decision, however, Judge Moran regrets the fact that local authorities have not approved any measure regulating the game, as he believes that Mah-Jongg is a game in which fortunes may be won and lost.

"Princess Petrolia" To Be Crowned Soon

TULSA, OKLA. — Plans for a gathering here of oil interests, to be known as the International Petroleum exposition and congress, at which discussion of every phase of the petroleum industry will be interspersed with exhibits of educational value and recreational features, are being rapidly concluded by committees of local oil men. The exposition and congress will open October 8 for one week.

Governors of 18 oil producing states, cabinet members and heads of government departments at Washington have been invited. Oil men from every state in the union and a number of foreign countries have indicated they will be here. The exposition will bring together ten associations, eight of which are definitely engaged in various branches of the oil business. Each association will hold a convention.

Undertaker In Will Bars Formal Funeral, Orders Secret Burial

CAMDEN, N. J., Sept. 26.—Fredrick Roedel, Jr., undertaker, in his will forbade his relatives to give him a formal funeral. Roedel's father was an undertaker and a brother in law was an undertaker.

A SPREADING EPIDEMIC

There is an epidemic, virulent as sudden epidemics are likely to be, and infectious, that is sweeping the world. Recent manifestations in scattered places can lead to no other inference.

Premier Mussolini of Italy may have been the carrier for this disease; mayhap he inherited it from some germ springing from the mummy case of despotism. General Primo Rivera in Spain caught it and assumed the style of the tyrant and, equipped with a name like that of a nickel cigar, set a fast pace for developments when he expelled his political opponents from his country.

A symptom of the disease is a breaking out in manifestos, embargoes, pronouncements and orders that have no regard for the comfort or rights of others. It had seemed that such an epidemic could not find a place in a democracy like America, but it is here. Just how the germs of this malady crossed the Atlantic is unknown. They took flight to Oklahoma, where Governor Walton has broken out in a violent rush of coercion, and in Johnstown, Pa., they have become evident in the person of Mayor "Joe" Cauffiel.

In every instance, the virulent dictatorship reveals itself in a desire to expel from the neighborhood of the afflicted person any who disagree with him.

With Mayor Cauffiel, the disease has resulted in a unique manifesto ordering all negroes and Mexicans not able to show proof of seven years' residence to pack up and go elsewhere hurriedly. With Governor Walton the euphoniously named Mayor seems to be a fit candidate for observation.

Diagnosticians are at a loss to account for the spread of this epidemic of absolutism. Tryanny seems rife once more; not the tryanny of kings, but an equally obnoxious type. Dictatorship inevitably leads to tryanny. Lenin and Rivera are as much despots as any rulers of our age.

With the outcroppings of the symptoms of dictatorship and absolutism in America there can be no compromise. The evil virus must be identified and isolated and an anti-toxin prescribed. Preventive measures may be applied by a careful scrutiny of the mental

health of candidates who present themselves for election to executive offices.

HEALTH OF THE WORKERS

A healthy man who likes his work and keeps contented will do his best. On the other hand, the unhealthy worker is usually dissatisfied and causes what is known as labor turnover, which is the dropping out of one employee and the breaking in of another.

This is the keynote of an address made by an official of the Federal Department of Health on the effect of proper sanitary conditions in the workshop in promoting the health of the workers and their consequent influence on production. The address points out that if the shop is well lighted, well ventilated, contains plenty of elbow room, is not too warm in summer and is comfortably heated in winter, has the proper toilet and washing facilities for the workers, its hygiene is good. On the other hand, if the shop contains too much machinery, compelling the men to work too close together, if the light is poor, the ventilation imperfect, if in the winter it is cold and drafty and in the summer too hot, the employer has failed in his duty and cannot expect the greatest possible production from his plant.

To regulate workshop conditions, it has been necessary to develop a branch of general medicine, known as industrial hygiene.

The address gives this sound advice to employers: Eliminate the unhygienic conditions in your plant. Furnish good ventilation, proper lighting, cleanliness and accident prevention devices. If any of your workers are ill, send them to a physician. Keep up an educational department and teach them not only how to work, but how to study.

In many of the most important industrial plants of the state, employers have already put these principles into practice with results that prove their value. When a worker realizes that the concern which employs him takes an interest, not only in his health, but in his general welfare, he is pretty sure to do his best, whatever his labor may be. No longer is his health regarded as his own concern alone. Its protection is essential to the success of the plant and employers now place the true value upon it.

Allendale Farm Ginds Virtues In "Bad" Boys Now

LAKE VILLA, ILL.—Thirty years experience as director of the Allendale Farm has convinced Edward L. Bradley of the virtue of "badness" in boys.

Upon the 260 acres of land and water of the farm, "badness" is accounted a natural part of the development of Captain Bradley's 100 boys. Years ago Mr. Bradley devoted himself to a new ideal in boy culture, and his faith, he says, in the inherent goodness of American youth has yielded increasingly great returns.

Foundation of the farm, according to Mr. Bradley, might be taken as a protest against the institutionalism which oftentimes attempts to reform boys into "un-natural little angels." The other extreme was at first the policy at the farm and it has changed but slightly. The boys here are of the normal kind, Mr. Bradley says, made from "snaps, snails and puppy dog tails." They are encouraged to be themselves.

There are few warnings or "don'ts" at Allendale. But there is an unwritten law which no one violates. The boys may lie, steal, throw stones "normally," and pay for it only as they might in the best of homes, but whoever dares smoke a cigarette treads dangerous ground, and perhaps numbers his days at Allendale.

"Nothing so limits the future of a boy as the cigarette," Captain Bradley believes. That is the only thing we will not tolerate.

RAILROADS EXTEND FARE CONCESSIONS TO LEGIONNAIRES

INDIANAPOLIS.—The one fare rate for the round trip, authorized by all American railroads to veterans attending the national convention, is an inducement which is expected to take thousands of American Legion members to San Francisco, national headquarters here has announced. The convention opens October 15.

These rates, confined to members of the Legion, widows of deceased members and members of the American Legion Auxiliary, will go into effect at various dates from October 3, according to the distance of the states from San Francisco. Identification certificates have been issued through 12,000 Legion posts, which must be presented to the veterans' home station agent to obtain advantage of the fare.

"All Legionnaires must leave San Francisco in time to reach the original starting point by midnight of November 15," said the announcement. "The extended return limit, however, is sufficient to enable them to stop over at various points of interest on going and return trip, to make side-trips, or to take short ocean voyages, including trips to Hawaii. Within the territory west of and including Chicago, St. Louis, Memphis and New Orleans, tickets may be obtained which read in both directions via the same route. East of these cities the same route must be followed in both directions.

"Most Legionnaires will travel in special trains which have been chartered by the various state departments of the organization. Unusual decorations, banners, bands, quartets, bizarre costumes and other features will afford an interesting journey for the war veterans.

Armistice Program Prepared for Legion

INDIANAPOLIS.—American Legion posts in all parts of the country are preparing to observe Armistice Day with parades and ceremonies in honor of those who died in the world war.

Garland W. Powell, director of the Legion's national Americanism commission, has suggested a general program. Observances will start at 10:30 a. m. with the invocation followed by music. Then the post commander or presiding officer will deliver an address. At eleven a. m., the hour when the guns stopped firing on the western front, the gavel of the presiding officer will fall and all will stand with bowed heads while a silent prayer is offered for those who made the supreme sacrifice. At the end of 30 seconds the gavel will fall again and the program will be resumed.

Roll call of the men who went to war from the community will be read by the post adjutant. With the reading of each name, Legionnaires designated by the post commander will give a brief outline of the man's war record. Then will follow the remarks of the speaker of the day and the singing of the national anthem.
