

Vegetable exhibitors at the Pitt County Fair Nov. 6 to 10, will do well by exercising care in the selection and arrangement of their exhibits. In the first place, the successful exhibitor will pick out those that are true to type. Second, the individual specimens should be uniform in size and shape. Another important point is to see exhibits are free from blemishes caused by insects.

The skillful judge will carefully examine each individual plate looking for blemishes and immediately put aside the exhibit showing any signs of defects. Above everything, it should be remembered that all vegetables should be clean. Names of the variety of vegetables should be given, if possible. Different varieties should not be mixed, since each has its characteristic, form, size and colors.

The same rule that applies to displays of vegetables obtains in all other fair exhibits, in so far as attractive display is concerned. With a growing list of entries and prizes in the Pitt Fair, it is suggested that everyone contemplating participation gives special attention to attractive display. Competition in all departments for awards promises to be keen, but they will be worth working for.

Mitchell Citizens Jeer Military In Effort To Return Blacks To Job

SPRUCE PINE, N. C., Oct. 1.

The first effort to bring back the negro laborers who were driven from their work here last Wednesday by a mob, following an attack upon an aged white woman had failed up to noon today. There is considerable speculation whether they will return in the face of threats that have been made by citizens of this section.

Word was sent to the headquarters of construction gangs which had moved to an adjoining county that laborers could return and be assured of military protection, but no reply had been received early today.

Jeers were hurled at the soldiers as the horses of the Asheville cavalry were being unloaded. There has been no general outbreak but there is occasional "ragging" among the young men witnessing the work of the guardsmen.

A deputy sheriff was stopped outside of this place last night by a mob, who asked him, according to his statement, whether "you are with us or against us." There are many wild rumors afloat. One is that a reward of \$300 has been offered by the leaders of the mob for anyone who carries messages for Mayor Fuller or Colonel Adams.

The military forces are expected to be increased today by a company of infantry from Concord. The guardsmen are prepared for any emergency.

RALEIGH, Oct. 1. — Governor Morrison telegraphed Adjutant General Metts in charge of guardsmen at Spruce Pine today to send the woman to Raleigh for the purpose of identifying John Goff, arrested near Hickory Saturday, and now held in the penitentiary, as her alleged assailant. According to advices the escaped convict was described as the man who attacked the woman.

Morrison in telegram to the sheriff of Mitchell county said: "It seems to me that a special term of court should be held as quickly as possible. Please consult county commissioners and let me know if they do not think a special term of court should be called to try John Goff. As I see it, such action should be taken as soon as possible. Consult woman and bring her here at the state's expense to identify the negro."

HUGGINS SAYS YANKEES WILL COP PENNANT THIS TIME FROM GIANTS; MCGRAW DISSENTS

NEW YORK, Oct. 1.—Miller Huggins, diminutive manager of the New York Yankees, will lead his men this season in their third successive attempt to win the world's baseball championship.

Though his personality has been overshadowed by the aggregation of Yankee stars, regarded as one of the greatest in diamond history, Huggins has earned a large share of the credit attached to the achievement of capturing three straight American League pennants.

In 1921 and again in 1922, when his club won pennants but lost in the world's series to the New York Giants, Huggins was made the target of criticism by many baseball experts. They said Huggins was not strict enough with his men, that he could not rule them, that they did as they pleased.

Cleveland gave to Yankees a hard fight for the pennant in 1921. The St. Louis Browns made a close race of it last year but this season the Yankees have won by a margin that leaves no doubt of their superiority. Huggins' men have worked together in winning their third pennant. They played as a team, not the set

CLASH FEARED BETWEEN CIVIL AND MILITARY AUTHORITIES OKLA. ELECTION TOMORROW

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., Oct. 1.—Instructions to jail every person attempting to interfere with the special state election tomorrow were sent today to all county election officers by the state election board. "If anyone attempts interference in this election have them thrown in jail at once," is the substance of the order.

Sheriffs of every county have been urged by the state election board to study the election laws and particularly that clause that provides for a "safe ballot." The offices of Attorney General Short are being deluged with questions as to the validity of the election. All have been informed that the proceeding is valid. Sheriff Canner of Oklahoma county, announced that he was ready to deputize every man in the county to prevent disorder at the polls.

He said: "I have received written instructions from the governor to stop the election in Oklahoma county, also instructions from the Adjutant General and county attorney not to stop the balloting, but to see that a peaceful election is held. I will do my duty and enforce the law, regardless of Governor Walton. The people are bigger than the chief executive of the state."

TULSA, Okla., Oct. 1.—An injunction directed against the entire national guard and all officials operating under special state authority restraining them from interfering with the special election has been signed by District Judge Hunt.

PRESIDENT WRIGHT MAKES STRONG TALK TO COLLEGE STUDENT BODY

President Wright in the first Y. W. C. A. service at East Carolina Teachers College last evening made a strong appeal to the students to line up on the right side at the beginning of the new college year.

"One cannot stand at a standstill while in college either helps or cripples," he warned the students against the gross materialism, the standard of the dollar, that prevails today and made the prophecy that the pendulum would soon swing back the other way.

President Wright expressed the hope that each student would catch a glimpse of the finer, nobler things

of life. "Dream your dreams," he admonished, "for those who dream are the ones who shape the destiny of the world."

The Bible he gave as the great guide—the one book ever new. In closing he mentioned some of the temptations that would come in attractive form to the girls here this year.

The large audience of young women listened attentively to his message. He made a deep impression on the students by his earnestness, his sincerity, and by making them realize his deep interest in their spiritual welfare.

Later it was intimated to the officers that the operators had been called to attend a group meeting of bootleggers. However, the gathering place was not indicated.

Officers were also called to the Shelmardin section yesterday to "quell a disturbance." Investigation disclosed that W. H. Coward had become involved in a dispute with three young men. Coward, it was said, expressed his opinion of the youths in such forcible and impolite language that it could be heard for some distance. Coward had business elsewhere before the officers arrived.

'My Own' Should Meet Papyrus, He Declares

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1.—Setting forth recent performances of the two thoroughbreds, Brigadier General William Mitchell, the flying general of the Air Service has made public a letter to August Belmont declaring that unless the owners of Zev are willing to match him with My Own, the Jockey Club should eliminate Zev as an opponent of Papyrus, the English Derby winner.

"Some of the best informed men of the country," said General Mitchell, believe that My Own, owned by Rear Admiral Carey T. Grayson, is a better horse than Zev and should represent America in the international race. The owner of My Own he said, had offered to enter his three-year-old against Harry Sinclair's thoroughbred "at any time any place with or without a purse."

Coolidge Proclaims National Education Week November 18

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1. — President Coolidge issued a proclamation today calling for observance of the week beginning November 18 as "National Education Week."

"Every American citizen," the President said, "is entitled to a liberal education. Without this, there is no guarantee for the permanence of free institutions, no hope of perpetuating self-government. Despotism finds its chief support in ignorance. Knowledge and freedom go hand in hand."

"Education Week" is held each year under the joint auspices of the National Education Association, the United States Bureau of Education and the American Legion, co-operating with more than a hundred other national organizations, the purpose being to bring the people closer to their schools.

LABOR LEADERS URGE DEVELOPMENT OF INDUSTRIAL FRANCHISE AT LAST MEETING OF THE NATIONAL BODY

PORTLAND, ORE., Oct. 1.—Development of an industrial franchise "comparable to our political franchise" must be the next goal of the labor movement, the executive council of the American Federation of Labor declared today in its report to the Federation's annual convention.

Warning of the "threat of state invasion of industrial life," the council asserted that the hour has struck for "a pronouncement of the aims of labor that shall more nearly express the full implications of trade unionism."

"The close of the war marked for us a turning point in human relations," the report said, "and threw forth in bold relief the inadequacy of existing forms and institutions. Henceforth the movement for organization of the workers into trade unions has a deeper meaning than the mere organization of the mere organization of group for advancement of group interests."

RIOTING IN GERMANY EXTENDS MANY DEAD SCORES ARE INJURED

Separatists Blamed for Trouble Started At a Meeting Sunday

DUSSELDORF, Oct. 1.—The German version of the outbreak yesterday when more than 20 persons were killed and scores injured, many probably fatally, blames the French authorities.

A report issued by city officials says that three security police were attacked with crowds by the French military of the shot was then fired, the report states, by some one in the ranks of the separatists. The shot precipitated a pitched battle.

Excitement Rages. This city is still seething with excitement and further trouble is feared. Soon after noon yesterday all the manifestants from points in the "Rhinland republic" reached the city. They numbered approximately 15,000, which was shortly formed into a procession of more than 40,000 demonstrators. Just as William J. Matthes, separatist leader, began speaking, declaring "we are not animated by hatred toward none, but only desire peace, security and tranquility," several shots were fired.

Panic Follows. In the panic that ensued a small group made a concerted rush for the speaker. The security police fired a fusillade and the shooting became general, the police being especially active in smashing their way through the crowds and taking prisoners, many of whom were transferred to headquarters.

French military forces were rushed to the scene and ordered the Green police to cease using their revolvers but, according to the French, the police refused and continued to fire. The cavalry seized many of the police and surrounded their barracks, quelling the disturbance in a few minutes.

Bridge Approach Is Made Safe by Fence

The north approach to the county bridge spanning the Tar river has been made virtually safe against accident by careful motor drivers by the erection of substantial fencing by the Highway Department. The fence painted white, extends along both sides of the highway bordering on deep fills. With this safeguard it is practically impossible for motorists to collide or force each other off the road, despite glaring lights.

A TERRIBLE WARNING

Less than an hour before the passenger train that was flung into a rain-swollen creek near Casper, Wyo., reached the bridge spanning the stream, a track-walker had inspected the structure and reported it as safe. The storms had filled the banks of the creek and a torrent was rushing beneath the tracks. When the train struck the bridge it gave way, weakened beyond the point of endurance. Whether it was in dangerous condition when the track-walker inspected it will probably never be known. Perhaps it was.

The accident occurred after 9 o'clock at night. The inspection was made after dark. It may be questioned whether there was any chance of positive assurance of safety in such circumstances. At any rate, the train went through the bridge, and it was estimated forty lives were lost.

All through this country are such conditions daily menacing the lives of those who travel by rail. Here was a bridge across a creek that was known to be subject to freshets. It had stood for a long while, but, as the accident tells tragically, it was unsafe. The known factor of danger was discounted. No part of a railroad is safe unless it is secure beyond the factor of possible risk.

The railroads of this country have been for a number of years in straits for funds, and improvements urgently needed for the maintenance of a high standard of security have been checked. Some of the more affluent of the corporations have gone ahead recently in track straightening, track doubling, bridge rebuilding and other improvement works, but an immense amount of reconstruction remains to be done. Doubtless this Cole Creek bridge on the Chicago, Burlington and Quincy line was on the list for eventual replacement. It was trusted too long.

American railroading is much more safe than it was a few decades ago. Tracks have been doubled over an enormous mileage, and all features of equipment have been improved. Still the accidents continue as traffic grows, as trains multiply, as schedules are crowded and as equipment wears out. But nothing can excuse the continued use of tracks that are under any degree of suspicion.

If the Cole Creek bridge in Wyoming was in doubt in the least degree it should have been abandoned at the first question. Far better completely to interrupt the traffic for a long enough time to make the necessary repairs to put the structure safe beyond doubt than to sacrifice two-score of lives.

MOTOR CAR AS TEACHER

The New Oldsmobile

An entirely new automobile, in a new price class, has been created for the American public, according to an announcement today by the Olds Motor Works of Lansing, Michigan. This new car is of the six-cylinder type, with six body styles, at a price ranging between \$750 to \$1005.00.

The various body types of this lower priced six-cylinder line will consist of a five-passenger car; two passenger roadster; a five-passenger, sport touring; a two-passenger cab, a closed car designed especially for business use; a four-passenger coupe and a five-passenger sedan. An unusual feature of all these models is their extreme "easy riding" qualities. It is literally impossible to throw any one from the seat on the roughest roads.

The company says the car was designed to meet the long felt need of a six-cylinder automobile at a price within the reach of everyone. Only through the cooperation of the engineering staff and the great resources, purchasing and manufacturing facilities of the General Motors Corporation could such a car be produced at such a low price.

The stream line body effect with high hood and cowl has been followed by the designers. The car has a wheelbase of 110 inches with an engine that develops more than 42 horsepower by actual test. The engine is of the removable "L" head type. The valves are unusually large, being 1 1/2 inches in diameter, creating great efficiency. The valve lifters are of the mushroom type, designed to distribute wear evenly. Valve guides and the entire valve lift assembly are exposed to a constant oil mist from the crankcase, insuring quiet operation.

The cylinder block and crankcase are made in a single casting. The crankshaft is balanced two ways, both statically and dynamically, and has three large bronze-backed, interchangeable Chadwick bearings, as perfected for Liberty aircraft engines.

All the latest improvements and developments brought out during the last few years both by automotive engineers in this country and abroad, have been incorporated in the new Oldsmobile Six. The engine has three point suspension and is of the high efficiency type, operating smoothly and quietly at all speeds, with a quick pick-up in traffic.

The oiling system is unusually efficient; the three camshaft bearings, three main bearings and the six connecting rod bearings, as well as the timing gears, are lubricated by oil under regulated pressure from a gear type pump. Perfect cooling at all speeds is provided by a large capacity Harrison honeycomb radiator and pump circulation. Water circulates entirely around each cylinder, valve seats and spark plug openings.

The pistons are of grey iron of special design, ground on sides and top. Three well fitted piston rings give perfect compression. The cylinder walls are given a glass like finish by an automatic "honing" process. The combustion chamber, entirely in the cylinder head, is dome shaped—the latest development in engine design—insuring efficient fuel mixture, resulting in great economy in gasoline. The intake manifold provides a sure method of heating the fuel before it enters the cylinders. A vacuum fed system is used.

The engine has a displacement of 169.3 cubic inches and develops over 42 horsepower by actual test. This power combined with a correct axle ratio gives great pulling and hill climbing ability.

A gallon of gasoline will give from 20 to 25 miles, and a gallon of oil from 800 to 1000 miles. Because of scientifically cooled engine design, perfect balance of the crankshaft and all moving parts, together with excellent workmanship, vibration has been eliminated to a greater extent than is usual in six-cylinder automobiles.

The chassis of the car is built exceptionally rugged with a frame 51.2 inches deep and with four strong cross members. The popular type of Hotchkiss drive is employed. The power is transmitted through a propeller shaft having two flexible, fabric universal joints of latest design. Back lash, noises and rattles are eliminated. This type of universal joint is extremely long lived and the necessity for the lubrication of such inaccessible parts is done away with. The chassis is lubricated by the Alcomite pressure system.

The rear axle is of the one piece type, insuring maximum strength without undue weight.

The braking system is very efficient with the foot brake mounted externally on the rear wheels, on a drum 12 1/2 inches in diameter, and the emergency is mounted on the main drive

shaft just back of the transmission. An equalizer is used to distribute braking tension evenly on both rear wheels. A Borg and Beck dry disc clutch is used.

Delco electrical equipment for both starting and lighting is used, with a six volt Willard storage battery. Flat Lite reflectors, legal in every state, are used, eliminating need of special lenses. Extremely easy steering is achieved through the design of the front axle and the steering mechanism. The turning radius is 18 feet, an important feature in city driving and parking.

Both front and rear springs are semi-elliptic, the rear springs being underslung, placing the center of gravity near the road, providing unusual roadability at high speeds. Rear springs are 50 3/4 inches long, while the front springs are 36 inches long.

The bodies for this new six cylinder line are made by the Fisher Body Corporation. The open models are finished in black, baked enamel. The seats are unusually deep and roomy, and there is plenty of leg room in both the front and rear compartments. Snug fitting curtains are provided, and open with all doors. One piece crown fenders are used on all body types.

The closed models are painted a maroon color, and are trimmed in striped velours. Fittings usually found in only higher priced closed cars are included as standard equipment. The equipment includes heater, dome light, robe rail, cowl ventilator, two piece ventilating wind shield door locks, transmission lock and sun visor.

Not a part of the car has been so designed that it is not possible to service it easily. In the case of the brakes, the part of a car which requires attention under varying conditions, every effort has been made to make the adjustment most easy. The rods connecting the foot brake pedal with the rear wheel bands have been built out side the frame of the car so that they are accessible without crawling beneath the chassis. The emergency brake is available by simply taking up one floor board in the front compartment. The engine is very "clean" in appearance and valves, carburetor, vacuum tank, electrical units and radiator connections are all so arranged that the removal of a bolt or two will result in freeing any desired part.

Besides ease in servicing, the new "six" offers unusually economical features. Its rugged frame saves the body from road strains which might produce disagreeable rattles and squeaks.

The cord tires are of the 31 x 4 inch size, making replacement costs low. Tires will also give exceptional

mileage due to the light weight of the car. The touring car complete, ready for the road, weighs 2390 pounds. The executives of the Olds Motor Works believe they have accomplished the aim of the majority of the automobile manufacturers of the country in putting out a six cylinder car at a price which will appeal to every car owner.

SODATOL FARM MATERIAL FREE TO ALL GROWERS

RALEIGH, Oct. 1. — Sodatol, a new explosive made from surplus war material, is now available to North Carolina farmers in carlot quantities ordered through their county farm demonstration agents, it was announced today by J. M. Gray, assistant director of the North Carolina agricultural extension service. Gray explained that no charge is made for the material, but farmers wishing to obtain sodatol will have to pay the cost of preparation and transportation.

Before the supply of picric acid was exhausted, he said, workers of North Carolina state college and the department of agriculture distributed about 225,000 pounds of this explosive to farmers needing such material for draining land, blowing stumps and other purposes.

There is now available through the same sources, he continued, a large supply of sodatol, which will be shipped from Gibbstown, N. J., to farmers agreeing to pay the cost of preparing the explosive and shipping it.

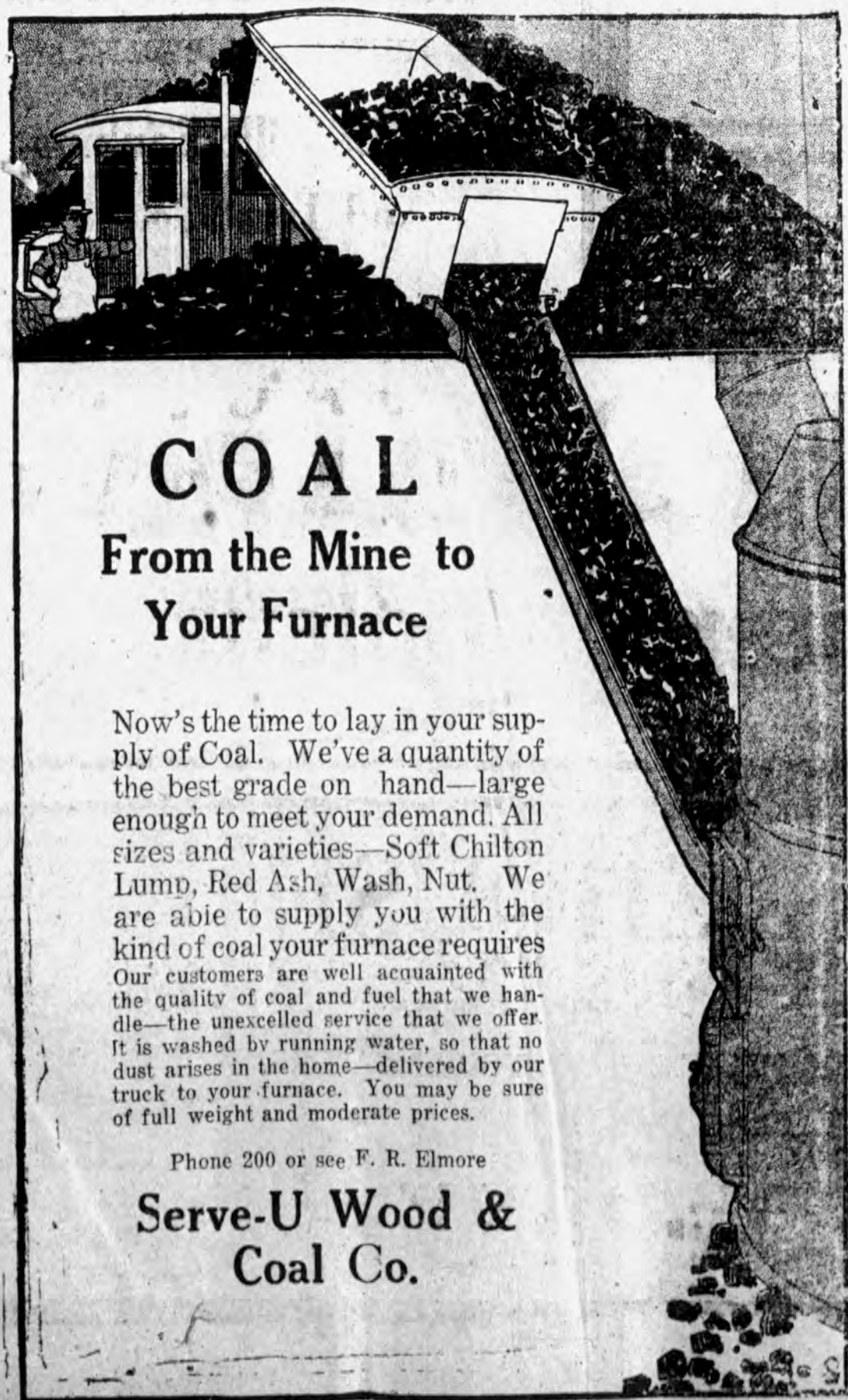

National Road Show Plans Are Ready for Event

RALEIGH, Oct. 1.—Plans for the annual convention and road show of the American Road Builders' association in Chicago Jan. 14 to 19, inclusive, are practically complete, according to C. M. Upham, chief engineer of the North Carolina state highway commission, who has been appointed manager of the show by Frank Page, chairman of the North Carolina highway commission and president of the American Roadbuilders' association.

The road show, at which road working machinery and materials will be displayed together with exhibits from various states of the Union reflecting the development of highways in those states, will be held in the Coliseum, Coliseum annex and the Greer building in Chicago, the same building in which last year's show was held.

The problem of sufficient space, although three large buildings have been obtained, has made it necessary to instruct exhibitors to "trim" their exhibits, said Upham. More and larger exhibits are expected for the show this year there have been at any previous show, declared the manager.

Uncertainty Is Seen In Business For Next Few Months

NEW YORK, Oct. 1.—Restlessness and irregularity in the markets of last week were interpreted in financial quarters as reflecting uncertainty over the course of business. Most observers agreed that while a good volume of industrial activity is in prospect this fall, the pickup from mid-summer dullness has been no more than what might be expected on a seasonal basis, and that a return to the high rate of last spring is unlikely.

The view prevails that the spring boom represented urgent buying to replenish stocks which had been depleted during the depression of 1921 and that the extraordinary volume of goods which is now being carried by the retailers is made up largely of deliveries of orders placed at that time.

Nevertheless, it is widely held that stocks of goods are moderate, that consumption is high and that the credit position is comparatively easy. In these important phases the situation differs radically from that of 1919 and 1920. Business men have shown unusual caution in making commitments and reports from banking circles indicate that great liquidity has been maintained in the working capital position.

Woodmen of World Unveil Monuments Near Shelmerdine

More than 1,000 Woodmen of the world guests and visitors attended the unveiling of two monuments to the memory of former members near Shelmerdine yesterday. The ceremony was conducted by Cedar Camp No. 167 of Shelmerdine. The principal address was delivered by E. B. Lewis, Kingston, who paid an eloquent tribute to the dead and graphically reviewed the purposes of the organization. He was introduced by Frank Stocks, Shelmerdine.

Following the ceremonies an elaborate dinner was served on the grounds.

Raid House of David Colony; Fail to Find Missing 'King' Purnell

BENTON HARBOR, MICH., Oct. 1.—State police, aided by Berrien county deputies, invaded the House of David colony here today in a fruitless search for Benjamin Purnell, missing head of the cult, sought on a warrant charging him with a statutory crime.

The raiding party consisted of more than 50 state police, deputy sheriffs and newspapermen.

They reached the colony before day light after throwing a cordon about the place and posting guards on all highways leading to it.

They trooped through the halls and corridors of Shiloh House, the temple home of Purnell. They poked into basement and attic, seeking subterranean tunnels, sealed rooms and secret passages through which Purnell's accusers charge he fitted when officers of the law sought him.

MOCKSVILLE, Oct. 1.—The Western North Carolina Field Trial association, organized at Booneville last spring, will hold its first regular field trials on the outskirts of Mocksville November 14, according to an announcement by officials of the organization.

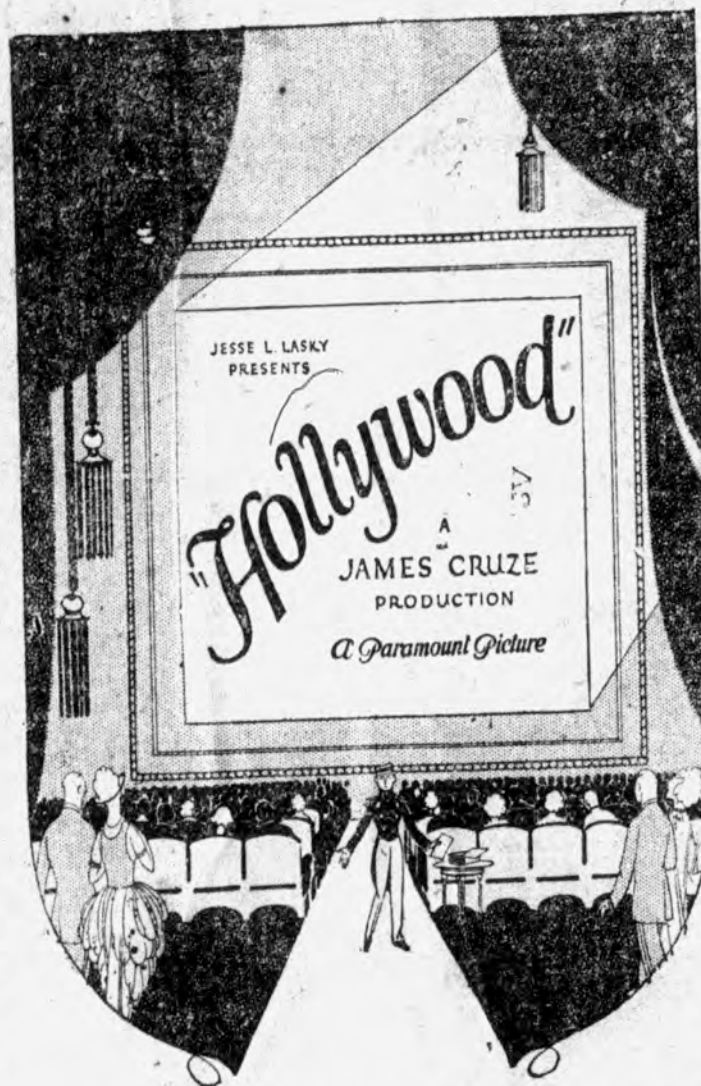
