ELECTION BOARD IS RESTRAINED FROM CERTIFYING RESULT

Oklahoma Voters Turned Walton Down; Want Extra Session

OKLAHOMA CITY, OKLA., Oct. 3.—A temporary restraining order to prevent the state election board from certifying the returns from yesterday's special election to the secretary of state was issued today by the state district court on petition of counsel for Governor J. C. Walton.

The order was granted immediately after the petition was filed. It enjoins W. S. McAllister, secretary, John Logan, deceased chairman, and Ira Mitchell, recently appointed member from certifying the returns of the election to the regular state official. The action was brought by Walton as governor.

Guard Still on Duty.

The state capital building is under guard again today. Frank Carter, chairman of the state corporation commission, declared that the guard was under orders to prevent the certification of the election to the state board. No explanation concerning the reappearance of the guard was obtainable at the office of the adjutant general. Later, Acting Adjutant General Frank Barrett, declared the guard had been merely transferred from the local armory as a precautionary measure. There was no significance attached to the appearance of the troops, he said.

Opponents of Governor C. Walton scored a sweeping victory yesterday in the most spectacular election ever held in Oklahoma. By an overwhelming vote, the legislature was vested with power to meet on its own call and consider impeachments proceedings against the Governor.

Despite Walton's effort to postpone the election and block it by armed force, the opposition was negligible and ballots proceeded to be cast in peace except in minor and scattered districts of the state.

The heaviest vote in the history of the state was polled.

Daughters Confederate Meet.

GREENSBORO, Oct. 3.—The annual state convention of the Daughters of the Confederacy opened here this morning. The sessions will be continued until Saturday. A number of social features are planned.

WORLD'S LEADING DAIRYMEN MEET; EXPANSION OF INDUSTRY DISCUSSED; DELEGATES TO VISIT BIG EXPOSITION

WASHINGTON, Oct. 3.—Dr. H. C. Taylor, chief of the bureau of agricultural economics of the department of agriculture, addressing the World's Dairy congress here today, declared establishment of dairy production in both hemispheres had done away to some extent with the periodical shortages which had resulted from seasonal changes in the northern hemisphere.

Citing the vast growth of international trade in dairy products, and pointing out that the American imports of cheese practically balance exports of butter, condensed and evaporated milk and other similar products, he declared "the outstanding points of significance are the development of dairying in certain countries of the southern hemisphere, the attendant prominent place obtained by these countries in the world's international trade, and the general decline of Canada and the United States as exporting countries."

Reviews Improvements.

Improvements in transportation, he said, have affected both quantity and quality of dairy shipments and refrigeration has made possible the transportation of fresh milk over great distances. It has come about, he added that the price received for dairy products in any one country is determined by conditions of supply and demand the world over.

BONUS IS CERTAIN AT NEXT CONGRESS SAY LEGION MEN

WASHINGTON, Oct. 3.—Enactment of the soldiers' bonus bill by the next Congress with or without the approval of President Coolidge is "absolutely certain," the Legislative committee of the American Legion will report at the annual convention in San Francisco next month.

Basing their conclusions on a poll of both the House and the Senate, the committee asserts that the bonus measure will pass the former by a vote of seven or eight to one. In the Senate, it is maintained, there are at least 68 members of the 66 in favor of the measure, four more than enough to pass the proposal over a Presidential veto.

Members of the legion throughout the country are warned against the campaign which, it is asserted, "big business" will make to prevent the enactment of bonus legislation. Those in the opposition, according to the committee, "no longer have to fear the measure, so the tactics of delay will be invoked and the old subterfuge of loading it down with unpopular or impractical amendments will again be attempted."

Woman's Club Will Hold First of Fall Meetings Tomorrow

First of the fall meetings of the Greenville Woman's Club will be held tomorrow afternoon at 3:30 in the Baraca class room of the Memorial Baptist church. Following the business session the usual social hour will be held.

Since the Club plans a program of unusual activities extending through the autumn and winter seasons, it is urged that every member attend the gathering tomorrow. Questions of vital community importance will be discussed and in order to achieve the projects close and earnest unity is necessary, it was stressed by officer of the club.

Coolidge Seeks Aid Governors to Enforce Various Federal Laws

WASHINGTON, Oct. 3.—Invitations were sent out from the White House today to governors of 48 states for a conference with President Coolidge, Oct. 20, to discuss law enforcement particularly as applied to prohibition, immigration and the anti-narcotic statute.

Hoosier Politics Rage In Wild Turmoil

INDIANAPOLIS, Oct. 3.—Republican politics in Indiana were thrown into a turmoil today as a result of charges and counter charges concerning the Republican state central committee meeting here Monday to consider Governor Warren T. McCray's financial affairs.

A declaration by John Moorman, Knox, Indiana, political adviser to Governor McCray, that Monday's meeting was ordered by President Coolidge, at the instigation of former Governor James P. Goodrich was followed by a subsequent denial by Mr. Goodrich. Mr. Goodrich in return asserted that charges by prominent men that Mr. McCray had been guilty of actions involving the most serious consequences alone led to the meeting.

Grave mystery surrounds the death of Mrs. Gertrude Gorman Webb, 40, wife of Charles Webb, New York broker, who died at the ultra-fashionable Westchester-Biltmore Country Club, her uncle, William T. Hunter, of Philadelphia, charging she was slowly poisoned. Mrs. Webb inherited a fortune of \$2,000,000 from her mother and father, the late Mr. and Mrs. Samuel Jennings Gorman. Much mystery also surrounds the Gorman estate, founded in 1657, and their home at Greenfield Hill, Fairfield, Conn. The latter home a mansion, was erected 27 years ago, but was occupied only twice. Just before her death Mrs. Webb visited the home and planned to reopen it. Mr. Gorman's second wife, Mrs. Margaret Lohman Gorman, died in the house shortly after it was left at her command, and his third wife refused to live there.

CAVALRY CHASE MYSTERY LIGHTS IN MOUNTAINS

SPRUCE PINES, Oct. 3.—Cavalry men are combing the mountains today in an effort to cover the cause of the signal lights flashed between two high mountain points last night. These lights revived the excitement which prevailed last week following the exodus of negroes driven from Mitchell county. The mystery of the lights had not been solved this afternoon.

Negroes are arriving today to resume work on highway construction. Identified Negro.

RALEIGH, Oct. 3.—John Goff, escaped negro convict, was positively identified by the aged woman, whom he is alleged to have assaulted near Spruce Pines, last week and which caused the deportation of all negroes from Mitchell county. She arrived here only today accompanied by a deputy sheriff and went to the penitentiary where she identified the negro.

Goff denied that he had ever seen the woman before.

EUREKA, CALIF., Oct. 3.—What is regarded as one of the most atrocious crimes ever perpetrated in this country was disclosed today, when Alexander Kells, wealthy butcher, of Lodi, Calif., confessed to the authorities that he had killed a stranger on his ranch near Lodi, set fire to the body in a haystack to enable his wife to collect life insurance amounting to \$100,000.

After six hours of grilling questioning, Kells told the officers that he had taken the action because he was in financial distress. He explained that the man he killed he did not know. He picked up the stranger at an employment agency in Lodi and took him to his ranch where he shot him, he said. According to his story he then placed the body in a haystack and set it afire and fled.

For three weeks, the charred remains were believed to be those of Kells and were buried after the most elaborate funeral ceremony ever held in the country.

In detailing the heinous story Kells did not display the slightest concern, authorities declared.

Employment Bureau Finds Jobs For 2,000

RALEIGH, Oct. 3.—M. L. Shipman, commissioner of the state department of labor and printing and director of the United States employment service in North Carolina, today issued both his weekly and monthly employment report, the weekly report showing that 610 persons had been placed in positions by federal employment offices in this state during the week ending Sept. 29, and the monthly report indicating that a total of 2,234 persons were furnished work through the same offices in September.

Of the 2,234 persons given work through the federal employment offices in North Carolina during Sept. 1815 were men and 419 women. The majority of them were unskilled laborers.

HILL'S WINE TEST CRY TO BE MET BY HAYNES, HE SAYS

BALTIMORE, Oct. 3.—Action "appropriate to its character" will be taken regarding Representative John Phillip Hill's wine making activities, and it will be taken by Commissioner Roy A. Haynes personally. In commenting on Mr. Hill's wine experiments in the cellar of his home here, Haynes said today:

"I am keeping the matter entirely in my own hands. It is true that two chemists of the prohibition unit were designated to make a chemical analysis of the wine reputed to have been manufactured by Congressman Hill at his home, knowledge of which was brought to the attention of the prohibition authorities by Congressman Hill himself."

Commissioner Haynes said he had not yet received an official report from the chemists who tested Mr. Hill's wine, but that he would act when the report is received.

GERMAN CITIES TO PAY SHARE MILITARY COST

BRUSSELS, Oct. 3.—Six cities in the occupied area have recognized the legal occupation by the French and Belgians in the Ruhr by agreeing to furnish their quota of the expense of the armies of occupation. It had been held by the Germans who refused to furnish money, that the action was contrary to the terms of the treaty of Versailles. The cities in the group are Dueseldorf, Essen, Dortmund, Witten, Hörde and Bochum.

BERLIN, Oct. 3.—This afternoon the Reichstag was still stubbornly dealing with the issues raised by the socialists. The latter are demanding that Chancellor Stresemann's legislative program will not discriminate against the working class and that a regular eight hour day be established. It is also insisted that the central government assert undiminished military and civil authority in Bavaria.

Federal Body Will Aid Pressed Growers

WASHINGTON, Oct. 3.—President Coolidge, continuing his study of the agricultural situation through conferences with farm organization representatives, received and took under consideration today a proposal that as a means of relieving the farmers of the country the War Finance Corporation accept settlements made by foreign buyers of American farm products.

The proposal was presented to the President by the executive committee of the American Farm Bureau Federation, which like the executive committee of the National Grange, received yesterday by the President, called by invitation of the executive.

CONVICTS IN LIBERTY DASH KILL ONE GARD; WOUND FOUR

EDDYVILLE, Ky., Oct. 3.—The boldest convict outbreak ever attempted in this state was undertaken today when several convicts led by "Monkey" Walters, alleged Louisville murderer, procured arms in some way and killed one guard and wounded four.

The convicts tried to escape through the main entrance, but were deflected and took refuge in the dining room of the prison where they were cornered. They maintained a steady battle with guards and towns people. The guards firing constantly on the prisoners who promptly returned the shots.

THE THIRD PARTY PLANS

To nominate or not nominate a candidate for President in 1924. That is the question which is exercising leading lights in the farmer-labor party. Senator Mangus Johnson of Minnesota, at a convention of the American labor party in New York the other day, suggested that it might be well for the farmer-labor party to continue during the next four years perfecting their state organizations in preparation for the big push which has the White House as its objective. Morris Hillquit on the other hand, asserted without reservation that the farmer-labor party could be powerful enough to nominate its own ticket in 1924—undoubtedly meaning that it also would be powerful enough to elect it.

There is a vast difference between nominating a candidate for President and electing him, however, as Senator Johnson appears to realize. There have been other candidates for the presidency in the fields beside those of the republican and democratic parties for many years, including the prohibitionist candidate, the socialist and the labor party, so called. In 1912 there was a big split in the republican party and the rise of the bull moose. But even with a Roosevelt at the head of the third party the supremacy of the old parties was not overturned.

Senator Johnson said in his speech in New York, however, that if the republicans in 1924 nominate a "standpatter" for President, and the democrats go and do likewise, the farmer-labor party should be strong enough to name its own candidate. This is in line with the recent private conversations and open statements of other so-called progressives and

radicals of the Senate.

But suppose for the moment that the farmer-labor party decides it will put a presidential nominee in the field and seriously contest for the election next year. Who is likely to be their nominee and what would be his chance.

None of the recently elected members of the Senate and House who bear the stamp of the farmer-labor party is known nationally for his accomplishments or abilities. In considering the republican progressives nationally known, to whom the farmer-labor party might offer the nomination, the mind naturally turns to La Follette of Wisconsin. Johnson of California, Borah of Idaho.

Borah, La Follette and Johnson, however, have not indicated a willingness at this time to head a third party, or in fact, to leave the ranks of the old party which in their own states has honored them so long.

The time before the election in 1924 is short to raise up a candidate of presidential timber, as the practical workers among the farmer-laborites must know. On the other hand, the discontent which brought about so much unrest in the agricultural sections and caused the recent elections in Minnesota, for example, of farmer-labor candidates for Congress, may subside before 1928, and then where would the third party proponents find themselves? One fundamental difficulty which the farmer-laborites must face is the fact that down at the bottom the interests of the producers of foodstuffs and of the producers of cloths, agricultural implements, etc., which the food producers must buy, do not run along together. There is always the danger that one wing or the other of the party may realize this fact.

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept.—Portland is preparing to entertain hundreds of delegates due here for the forty-third annual convention of the American Federation of Labor, which begins on October 1, and remains in session until the convention's business is disposed of, probably two weeks.

SHUN "MODERN" WIVES
Frankfort, Ga.—The Main, Ga. many Germans do not want their wives too modern. That is quite clear from the advertisements for wives appearing in the best German newspapers. A German wholesaler who has a flourishing business in Portugal, wants a wife between 18 and 22 who is able to adopt herself readily to the different conditions of life she will find in Portugal, but who is "not too modern in her ideas. She must not have bobbed hair, must be companionable, beautiful, good-natured and thoroughly domestic in her tastes."

MANUFACTURERS MAKING BIG RECORD IN 1923

Large increase in importation of manufacturing material from abroad and increase in distribution of manufactures to foreign markets. Manufactures now form over half of our total exports.

The busy manufacturers of the United States are bringing in manufacturing material from abroad at the rate of over \$2,000,000 a year. Already in the 7 months of 1923 for which detailed figures are available the imports of manufacturing material are 11.3 billion dollars, suggesting that the total for the year will approximate \$2,450,000,000, and exceed that of last year by about 50% in stated value.

Up to the end of July, says the Trade Record of The National City Bank of New York, the value of the manufacturing material imported was 58% above that of the same period of last year, while all other imports showed an increase of but 24%. Manufacturing material now forms nearly 58% of the imports of the United States against 52% in the same months of last year. Meantime the manufacturers are also pushing their sales abroad and with apparent success

since manufactures have formed 54% of this year's exports against 48% in the same period of last year.

What are the chief articles which our manufacturers find it necessary to bring into this world's greatest producer of manufacturing material? We are ourselves the world's biggest producer of iron, steel, copper, cotton, timber, hides, tobacco, petroleum, and sundry other less important manufacturing requirements, yet our imports of manufacturing material in the past decade averaged about 12.4 billion dollars a year and will be more than two billion dollars in the calendar year 1923.

The explanation of this large importation of manufacturing material into this world's greatest producer of factory requirements is found in our growing use of tropical and sub-tropical materials and also certain raw materials produced in countries having plentiful and cheap labor.

India rubber, for example, exclusively a product of the tropics shows in the 7 months ending with July, 1923 an importation of \$130,000,000 value against \$58,000,000 in the same months of last year. Our imports of tropical materials, \$30,000,000 against \$18,000,000. The fibers, chiefly tropical, are this year nearly double in value those

imported in the same period of last year. Raw silk, of which we produce none, totaled in the 7 months ending with July, 1923, \$22,000,000 against \$17,000,000 in the same months of last year; wool, of which we do not produce enough for our own use, totaled \$116,000,000 against \$45,000,000 cotton, \$40,000,000 against \$27,000,000; tin, of which we produce none, \$40,000,000 against \$27,000,000, most of it coming from the other side of the globe; hides, of which we do not produce enough for our own requirements, \$87,000,000 against \$49,000,000; copper, which comes because of our superior smelting and refining facilities, \$54,000,000 against \$31,000,000; and furs which come from all parts of the world \$60,000,000 against \$40,000,000 in the same months of last year. In practically all of these articles the quantities are also larger than in 1922.

How are we paying for this \$2,000,000,000 worth of manufacturing material which we are importing this year? Chiefly with manufactures and the classes of food not produced in the countries which send us this raw material. Our exports of manufactures for the calendar year 1923 will exceed \$2,000,000,000, and foodstuffs nearly \$1,000,000,000.

England In Quest of Fighter Able to Win Heavy-Weight Title

LONDON.—England is fine-combing her ranks of youth and strength in search of a man of sufficient physique to meet the heavy-weight champion of the world. For 25 years the country has failed to produce a real heavy-weight leader. It is on this account that Tex O'Rourke, who has trained some of America's best fighters, has been brought to England to lend his advice to British pugilistic promoters and sporting clubs in their quest for a "British Hop."

At a recent meeting of boxing enthusiasts held in London to celebrate the "movement," the American expert gave an interesting account of the adventures he encountered in his search for a contender for the championship.

Ruthless Outlaws Reap Rich Harvest On Brazil's Border

RIO DE JANEIRO.—Frontier activities that bring to mind the stirring times of Daniel Boone are being reported in the local press from the Brazilian regions which border on Venezuela and the Guianas. According to these stories, and to reports that have been made from the trouble zones to the government, contraband runners, clandestine gold miners, and various kinds of desperados have been crossing the frontier into Brazil in increasing numbers and have been leaving trails of blood and ruin.

The vast regions of the Amazon valley, which are but sparsely inhabited, contain many forms of wealth that are within the reach of ruthless outlaws who act in small groups, as well as in big and powerful organizations. It is reported that fortunes in gold and precious stone, have been panned from the gravel of the northern streams of Brazil by outlaw miners; that rosewood, mahogany, ebony and other precious woods have been stolen from Brazilian forests, that cattle have been run off the poorly protected ranches; and the crops of outlying settlement farms boldly pilfered by raiders. The reports add that these outlaw activities have resulted in many bloody clashes between local inhabitants and bands of frontier runners.

The fact that boundary lines run through trackless wilderness makes it almost impossible to establish effective police protection. The few military posts of the Brazilian government and her neighbors are lost in the vastness of the zones they are supposed to patrol.

THE AMERICAN CIGARETTE IN THE ORIENT

Its use in the Far East steadily gains while shipments to Europe show a heavy decline. China the chief oriental market and steadily increasing her demand.

Twelve billion American cigarettes, an average of a billion a month, passed out of the ports of the United States in the fiscal year just ended. Curiously, too, says the Trade Record of The National City Bank of New York, nearly all of them went to the Orient which produces half the tobacco of the world and has ample supplies of labor with which to turn it into form for use. While the whole world made the acquaintance of the American cigarette during the war period, it was in the Orient that its use ripened into a "habit" while the European habit of the war years proved only temporary. Of the 12 billion cigarettes passing out of our ports in the fiscal year 1923 nearly 9 billion went to China alone, approximately 1 billion to the Straits Settlements and Dutch East Indies, and another billion to Siam, Hong Kong, Japan and the Philippine Islands, while Europe,

which took 8 billion in the year following the war, took less than one-quarter of a billion in 1923.

Curiously, adds the Trade Record, this American cigarette habit has developed in a section of the world which is itself a very large producer of tobacco, since out of a world production of 4 billion pounds a year India produces 1 billion, China 4 half billion and the other Oriental countries another half billion, indicating that half of the world's tobacco crop is grown in the Orient, which has increased its takings of our cigarettes, until nine-tenths of our cigarette exports now go to the Orient.

This big increase in our exports of cigarettes to the Orient as a whole occurs chiefly in the shipments to China which totaled in 1923 641,000,000 in 1913, 6,722,000,000 in 1918, 8,507,000,000 in 1920, and 8,789,000,000 in the fiscal year 1923. The number to the Straits Settlements in 1923 was 989,000,000, Hong Kong 284,000,000, Siam 239,000,000, Philippine Islands, 164,000,000, India 100,000,000. The tremendous fall off in European demand for the cigarette is found in the fact that while England took nearly 2,000,000,000 in 1919, Belgium exports about 5 times as much.

Savings in Rent and Other Necessities
Enable Soft Coal Miners To Afford
Comfortable Homes and Motor Cars



INTERIOR OF MINERS' HOME, JEROME, PA.

The above pictures show a typical home of a soft coal miner. They answer the often asked question "What kind of houses do miners live in?"

Jerome, Pa., with a population of 1,200, where the views shown here were taken, is, according to Bituminous Operators' Special Committee investigators, "a company town of uniform houses, painted a warm blue gray. The houses are of good construction and set on a hillside not too precipitous for comfort."

Bituminous coal operators long ago saw the wisdom of fostering pride in the upkeep of their homes among their employees. Radio sets, musical instruments, well chosen books and magazines are the rule rather than the exception in soft coal miners' homes—and miners' wives are encouraged to maintain scrupulous order and cleanliness within the house and out.

It is to the advantage of all concerned, the operators point out, for the miners to have as well appointed and even luxurious homes as possible. Soft coal miners are more fortunate than most other citizens in being able to afford luxuries, in that they have to pay only a nominal amount for such necessities of life as rent, doctor's care, light and heat.

Comfortable four-room houses at Jerome, for example, rent for \$8.00 a month. The operators make a small charge for electricity and coal is supplied to miners' homes often at less than the cost of production. Doctor and hospital charges vary from \$7.50 a month for a single man to \$1.50 a month for a married man, and this includes all expenses in-

cident to illness, however protracted it may be.

Miners, their wives and children have to pay only ten cents to see movies which show in cities for dollar prices and more, another saving in a matter which has come to be regarded nowadays as a necessity rather than a luxury. Nearly every mining camp boasts at least one moving picture theatre.

These savings enable miners in the soft coal fields of the country—and coal is mined in thirty States—to buy expensive automobiles, house furnishings and the like while still maintaining a comfortable balance at the savings bank.

The soft coal miners of one Colorado company collectively own automobiles valued at a little less than

\$1,000,000. In an adjacent community investigators report that 1,251 families living at the mines own no less than 1,123 machines—just a shade less than one automobile for each miner's family. Sunday motor trips to nearby larger towns have come to be regarded as a regular occurrence.

Education of miners' children is amply provided for by the operators. Modern high-grade schools and well paid thoroughly trained teachers are to be found in the present mining community.

Sewing circles for the women, club-houses for the men, illustrated lectures and Saturday night dances shared by both sexes, make for healthful community spirit and the upkeep of happy, comfortable homes.

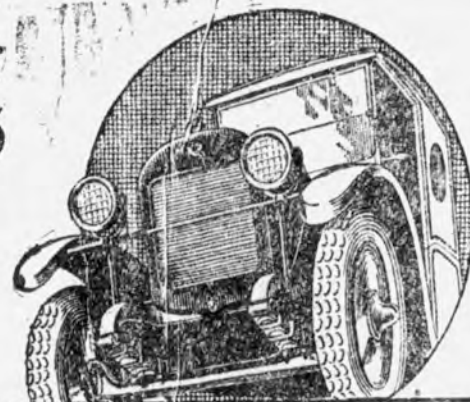

WASHINGTON, Oct. 3.—There were 1,126,418 marriages performed and 148,554 divorces granted in the United States during the calendar year 1922, according to statistics compiled by the bureau of the census and announced today by the United States department of commerce.

For the calendar year 1916, the last year for which these statistics were collected by the bureau of census, there were 1,840,684 marriages and

112,036 divorces reported.

Accepting as correct the figures announced by the department of commerce, there were in 1922, 1,063 marriages and 136 divorces per 100,000 population, as compared with 1,055 marriages and 112 divorces in 1916.
