

Chickens are not a year-round cash crop on some farms for the simple reason, if left to the man, he can never find time to consider the little things. He's too busy trying to make a "killing" on the big money crop. "Killings" seldom if ever happen, and when they do, it is over a period of years on the farms that are operated on a "live at home and board at the same place" basis.

Nerly every farmer or his wife keeps chickens. Some few farms are kept by the chickens, a garden and a milk cow. Pitt county needs to come out of its lethargy in the development of the poultry industry. The way to start is to look after the small things first, by forgetting 30-cent aristocracy and false pride. They are poor collateral at the bank for a loan. The time to begin activities is NOW.

The primary essential to the success of poultry is a commercial hatchery. The Chamber of Commerce has received many inquiries from men, women and farm children asking if such a custom incubator was available. To a limited extent it is. However, it is understood that an incubator of 12,000 egg capacity will be shortly installed. That's the right start in serving community interest.

CIVIL DICTATOR FOR GERMANY AIDED BY MILITARY, IS PLAN

Move Regarded as Only Hope Since Ministry Has Resigned

BERLIN, Oct. 4.—With the retirement of Chancellor Stresemann's coalition cabinet, there is considerable talk of establishing a civil dictatorship supported by martial law. The resignation of the ministry followed the rejection of the compromise proposed by the Chancellor on the eight hour working day law.

Other members of the cabinet followed the action of the four socialist members who withdrew when it was seen that an agreement suitable to their proposals could not be reached.

Hopeless Tangle.

The Stresemann government retired from office with the relinquishment of passive resistance in the Ruhr and the Rhineland as the only active accomplishment to its credit. While criticism of its usefulness in this score would seem to be not entirely fair, in view of the hopelessly tangled legacy assumed by it as the successor of the Cuno ministry, the Stresemann coalition in its political composition was such as to preclude in the long run any hope of productive results in the future of financial and economic reforms on account of the conflicting currents which hampered its deliberations.

Task Too Great.

With a theoretical Socialist in the ministry of finance and an industrialist party man as minister of economics, one chronic point of friction was promptly established. It led to the retirement yesterday of Hans Von Raumer, who held the latter post, as he had apparently wearied of carrying on a running debate with Dr. Hilferding on financial and economic dogmas.

This was only one of several minor paradoxes with which the Stresemann ministry was handicapped. The Chancellor's well-known optimism, which was praised as a useful asset when he assumed office, was unable to overcome the task of getting an economically and politically moribund Germany back on its feet.

Labor Federation Urged to Enter Arena of Politics

PORTLAND, ORE., Oct. 4.—Two issues loomed big in the opinion of labor leaders as committees continued to work on a mass of resolutions introduced at the annual convention of the American Federation of Labor here.

From three States and from one of the large international unions there have come demands that the American Federation of Labor enter actively into politics and from three States there have been received suggestions that unions amalgamate into single organizations, each to cover one industry.

Hoots greeted efforts today of Max J. Silensky, of Cleveland, O., to bring a resolution on recognition of Soviet Russia before the convention with a request that it be transferred to the committee on international relations from the resolutions committee, to which it had been assigned. His appeal to the committee from an adverse ruling of President Samuel Gompers was lost by an overwhelming vote.

Special Court Term For Trial of Negro

RALEIGH, Oct. 4.—Governor Morrison issued a call today for a special term of the Mitchell county superior court in order to expedite the trial of John Goss, alleged negro assassin of a 60-year old white woman, near Spruce Pines, last week.

BOLL WEEVIL BLAMED BY EXPERTS SPREAD SERIOUS PLANT DISEASE

RALEIGH, Oct. 4.—Supplementing the announcement made by the Department of Agriculture Tuesday that investigations had proved that the boll weevil is largely responsible for the spread of anthracnose, or "boll rot," S. G. Lehman, of the division of plant disease work, who conducted the investigations, today issued a statement giving fuller account of the discovery.

In his statement about the investigations leading to the discovery, Lehman said:

"The staff of this office has for some time suspected from a number of field observations made that the boll weevil was aiding in the spread of anthracnose from diseased to healthy cotton. We wanted to make sure that our suspicions were correct, so we determined to trace the matter. I caught a number of boll weevils from a field in which about 30 per cent of the plants bore bolls infected with anthracnose.

Fixing the Flame

"Each of these weevils was placed in a separate sterilized and carried to the laboratory, where it was given a bath in sterile water in order to wash from its body such disease spots as might be on it. When this wash water was examined, no less than 17 per cent of the weevils collected were carrying these disease germs along with the anthracnose, and so it seems that the pest is chargeable with another crime as heinous and costly as the original one.

"Anthracnose is one of the most serious plant diseases in the South. It is caused by a fungus which grows in the tissues of the cotton plant and is carried over winter on and in seed cotton. We wanted to make sure that our suspicions were correct, so we determined to trace the matter. PURE-BRED CATTLE VITAL TO MILK SUPPLY OF COMMUNITY, HE ASSERTS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 4.—Speaking in his capacity as President of the Holstein Friesian association of America, former Governor Frank O. Lowden, of Illinois told the World's Dairy Conference that pure-bred cattle associations were doing a valuable work by improving the country's milk output.

"The average milk production for the entire United States," said Lowden, "is something like half the average production of the cows of the most advanced dairy countries in Europe. This would be inexplicable were it not for the fact that less than three percent of the dairy cows of America are pure-bred. This field for improvement, therefore, is vast, and the opportunity for useful service is stimulating in the extreme.

Pure Bred Value.

"The various breed, of dairy cattle, like other farm animals, are the result of centuries of selection. In the course of time the natural result was a specialized animal, which was a vast improvement upon the earlier stock. During the early history of America whatever cows happened to be a hand were brought over by the colonists. We were well along in the last century before we had anything upon our farms but the nondescript cow which was a product of the various early and careless importations.

TOBACCO CO-OPS GET ANOTHER JOLT FROM COURT IN BEAUFORT

WASHINGTON, N. C., Oct. 4.—What is believed to be the first ruling on the question of where a landlord member of the Tobacco Growers' Cooperative association gives a crop mortgage, and the mortgagee takes possession of the crop, either under order of the court, or under power of sale and that the landlord cannot be penalized, was decided here when Judge W. M. Bond, dissolved a restraining order obtained by the association against L. H. Witherington.

The Pamlico Chemical Company, was allowed to interplead. It was established that in February of this year, Witherington executed to the company a mortgage for fertilizer. The company asked that Witherington's share of the 13,000 pound crop be turned over to it and that the tobacco be sold on the open market. Judge Bond signed a decree holding that the fertilizer concern was entitled to possession of the tobacco, and that it could not be delivered to the association.

The association waived that part of the original bill of complaint in which the organization attempted to hold the landlord liable for 5 cents a pound for tobacco sold by non-member tenants. That question was first settled by Judge J. Lloyd Horton, in Pitt county superior court.

WHITE ENROLLMENT IN PUBLIC SCHOOL DOUBLED IN TEN YEARS; SUPT ROSE REVIEWS DEVELOPMENT

In 1913 the total enrollment in the Greenville schools both white and colored was 865. This year the total enrollment is 1838. In 1913 the white enrollment was 553. This year the white enrollment is 1152. In 10 years the enrollment in the white schools has more than doubled. There has been an average net increase of the enrollment for the past ten years of 55 a year.

In 1913 out of the total white enrollment of 553, there were 105 in the first grade alone; there were only 16 in the 10th grade and none in the 11th grade. This year with the enrollment in the white schools of 1152 there are only 145 in the first grade while there are nearly 60 in the 11th grade or senior class of the high school. These figures prove conclusively two things.

First, that the Greenville schools are keeping the pupils in school. The fact that there are nearly 60 in the graduating class of the high school proves this point. The second thing that the figures given prove is that the Greenville schools are eliminating "repeaters," that is, children who spend more than one year in a given grade. This is due in a large measure to more efficient teaching. The fact that one fifth of the children of the Greenville schools in 1913 were

in the first grade proves that at that time there were a large number of repeaters.

Repeaters Eliminated.
The fact that in 1923 with a total enrollment of 1152 there are only 145 in the first grade proves that the "repeaters" are being eliminated. There are two reasons why the "repeaters" should be eliminated as far as possible. First because it is bad on the child to have to spend two years doing the work that he should do in one year. It causes him to lose a year of his life. It makes him one year later getting to the place where he can assume the responsibilities of citizenship, and worst of all the more a child "repeats" the more discouraged he becomes, with the result that he soon becomes sufficiently discouraged to drop out of school.

Increase School Expense.
In the second place "repeaters" should be eliminated because they are added expense to the school, and its supporters, the tax-payers. If a child spends two years in one grade, it has cost just twice as much to educate that child in that one grade as it would have cost had he made the grade in one year.

Considering the above the Greenville schools are doing their level best to reduce the number of "repeaters" to a respectable minimum, and in the efforts the schools have met with good results.

MAN WHO PASSED AS WOMAN IS FREED OF KILLING

CHICAGO, Oct. 4.—Fred G. Thompson, who admitted being the husband of one woman while he lived as the wife of another man, was found not guilty of the murder of Edward C. Tesmer, shot in a holdup by a jury here, the verdict being returned after approximately two hours deliberations.

Thompson, taking the stand in his own defense near the close of the defense's presentation of evidence, broke down and sobbed like a woman, declaring he could not kill a man.

The defendant had been arrested by police on a tip that a man dressing repeatedly as a woman was seen going in and out of the apartment of Frank Carrick. This tip came shortly after the fatal shooting of Tesmer at the hands of a "spilling woman bandit" who, with a male companion, held up Tesmer and his wife as they drove up to their garage one night. Men and women rushed to congratulate Thompson on his acquittal.

OKLAHOMA ROW NOW CENTERS IN BIG LEGAL FIGHT

OKLAHOMA CITY, OKLA., Oct. 4.—Members of the legislature insisting on impeachment charges went into the district court today to test their authority as an inquisitorial body without the call of the Governor. Meanwhile, in a separate court battle the executive is marshaling his forces to prevent the certification of a constitutional amendment which was passed at a special election last Tuesday. A desperate fight is predicted.

Members of the legislature have declared they will take the case to the United States supreme court, if necessary. Until final decision has been reached they have pledged themselves to no further leadership.

Hearing on the appeal to make permanent the restraining order obtained by Walton against the election board to prevent that body from certifying the election results to the secretary of state is set for Oct. 9.

GOVERNOR PINCHOT WILL USE PADLOCKS TO CLOSE SALOONS

Warns the Philadelphia Booze Sellers Traffic Must Stop At Once

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 4.—Governor Gifford Pinchot, early today observed the open defiance of Philadelphia saloons of his order to close business under threat that they would be dealt with according to the "padlock action" of the prohibition law.

Tuesday the Governor and federal officials issued a joint order notifying more than 1,500 local saloons and cafes, to close an dismantle their places within 48 hours. A large force of United States agents and state police served the notices. Governor Pinchot, made the rounds last night to see for himself whether the order had been obeyed. He visited several places and found them all doing a flourishing business.

The governor made no attempt to make a purchase.

Find Poison In Body Of Society Woman; Husband Quizzed

Terence announcement by Dr. Alexander O. Goettler, of Bellevue Hospital in New York, that he had found mercury in the viscera of Mrs. Webb, but that tablets taken from the sick room were harmless.

Appearance before the grand jury of Mrs. Margaret P. Johnstone, wife of a former New York judge and intimate friend of Mrs. Webb, who left with the jurors her diary in which she had recorded certain facts preceding her friend's death which she considered suspicious. The grand jury sessions then were adjourned until Monday.

U. S. Form Marketing Bodies to Aid Farmers

WASHINGTON, Oct. 4.—President Coolidge today set in motion a plan designed to ameliorate agricultural depression. He designated Managing Director Meyer and Director Mondell, of the War Finance Corporation, to proceed into the Northwest immediately and assist in the formation of co-operative marketing associations, promotion of which the President believes will result in direct benefit. Meanwhile, the President and Cabinet are seeking to devise additional remedies.

McTigue Will Fight Despite Broken Hand

COLUMBUS, Ga., Oct. 4.—Mike McTigue, light heavyweight champion will fight "Young" Smolking here this afternoon at 4 o'clock, despite an injury to his hand sustained while boxing last night, it was announced shortly before noon by Captain Jones, of the American Legion, under whose auspice, the 10 round match will be fought.

MR. CORNELIUS BARNHILL DIES IN ROCKY MOUNT

Mr. Cornelius Barnhill died at the Rocky Mount Sanitarium this morning at 5 o'clock. Funeral services will be conducted from his home seven miles south of Bethel, tomorrow, at 1 o'clock by the Rev. John Rogers and Elder S. B. Denny. The interment will take place in Cherry Hill cemetery at 3 o'clock.

Mr. Barnhill was one of Pitt county's best known and most progressive farmers. He was held in high esteem by a host of friends.

FOR BETTER ADVERTISING

Edward W. Bok, who recently set aside a hundred thousand dollars for the best peace plan that could be devised, has now founded a series of eight annual awards for the best newspaper and periodical advertising in the United States and Canada. These awards will consist each year of a gold medal and \$8,500 in cash prizes and will be known as the Harvard Advertising Awards, to be administered by the Harvard Graduate School of Business.

According to the dean of that school, the prizes are offered to encourage merit and stimulate improvement in advertising, as one of the greatest and most important factors in modern life, and to the end that truth shall be recognized as the fundamental factor of greatest practical value in advertising. Jurors of award will be instructed to lay particular stress on accuracy and fair statement.

These awards will be made as follows:
A gold medal for distinguished personal service, to the individual deemed to have done the most during the year to have raised the standard of advertising.

Three awards of \$1,500 each, the first for the best national advertising campaign; the second for the best local campaign; the third for that research which has brought about the greatest economy and efficiency and has pre-

cluded unwise and wasteful expenditure. Four prizes of \$1,000 each, the first for the advertisement most effective in its use of English; the second for the advertisement most effectively accomplishing its purpose in a few words; the third for the advertisement most effectively in the use of typography, and the fourth for the advertisement most effective in its use of any class of pictorial illustration.

In explaining his reasons for offering these valuable prizes, Mr. Bok points out that now, with returning prosperity, more than a billion dollars is spent in advertising in this country every year, of which amount the newspapers receive considerably more than half. He adds that the day of haphazard advertising is over and that thought in planning and execution must be an integral part in any successful campaign.

These prizes will be welcomed by the Associated Advertising Clubs of the World, an organization that has done much to raise the standard of advertising and to put it on a higher plane than it ever held before. Taking "Truth in Advertising" as its slogan, it has carried on notably successful campaigns against those tricksters who seek to swindle the public by unwarranted statements. These prizes should call for the best efforts of advertising writers and managers, for the amounts offered make them well worth winning.

WELFARE COMMISSION REPORTS CONDITION LOCAL COTTON

DR. W. J. MAYO MAKES EXACT STATEMENT OF CURE FOR CANCER

ROCHESTER, Minn., Oct. 4.—At a meeting of the general staff of the Mayo clinic, held a few days ago, Dr. W. J. Mayo referred to recent newspaper comment on his remarks made with regard to the present status of the cancer problem, quoting him as declaring, in substance, that there was no cure for cancer. In the course of a lecture in London in July Dr. Mayo said, "There is no medical cure for cancer," in other words, no medicine taken internally will cure the disease. Continuing, he said that a great deal of experimental work was in progress in all parts of the world, all of which gradually was adding important knowledge concerning this serious disease. But, unfortunately, these investigations, which have been made on animals, have not, as yet, any direct application to human subjects.

Dr. Mayo, in his talk to his staff, said that the cure of cancer depends on diagnosis and removal at the earliest possible time. In some manner, the laity must be taught to understand these truths. Experience in the Mayo clinic has been that 71.8 per cent of patients operated on for cancer when the disease is still localized, that is, has not extended beyond the primary focus, are cured by operation, and the large majority of the remainder greatly benefited, and many have been cured even when the disease had extended beyond the primary focus.

Surgical operation is the only method of removal to be seriously considered.

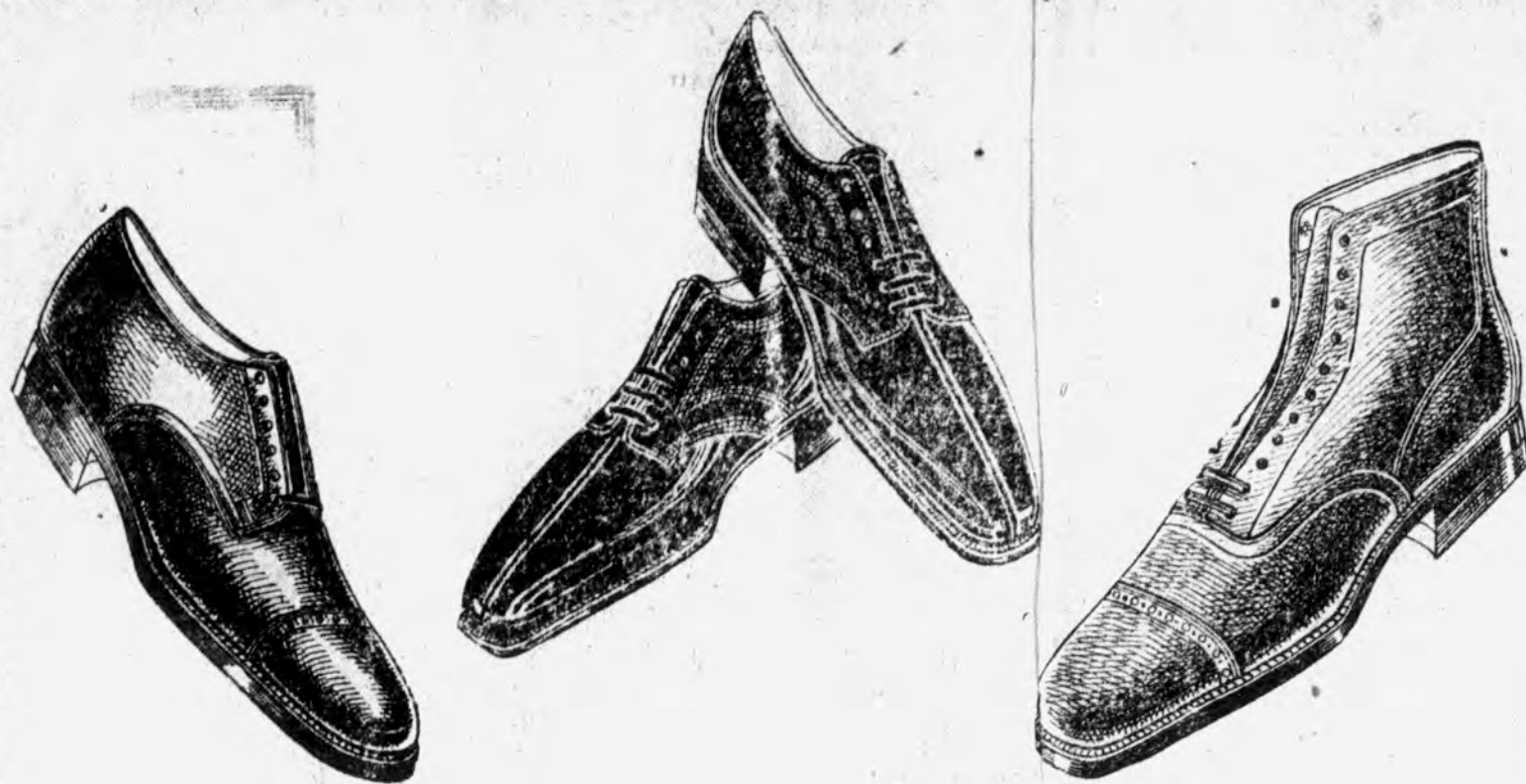
ered, Dr. Mayo continued, because it permits removal, with the growth, of surrounding tissues and glands that may have become involved in the disease. The X-ray, radium, and other agents have a field of usefulness in connection with surgery, but a patient should not be subjected to X-ray, radium or other similar treatment without careful surgical consultation since

if such agents are used while the disease is still local and fail to cure, and apply the method which experience would show to be the best method suited to the individual patient.

BAN ON WOMEN SMOKERS IN COLORADO PENITENTIARY

DENVER—Female prisoners in the Colorado state penitentiary are no longer permitted the solace of smoking within the walls of the institution, according to Warden Thomas Tynan. The male prisoners are to be allowed to continue the use of the weed, however.

In answer to protests against his action, Warden Tynan said: "It doesn't look well to see women smoke. If they want to smoke, let 'em keep out of the penitentiary."

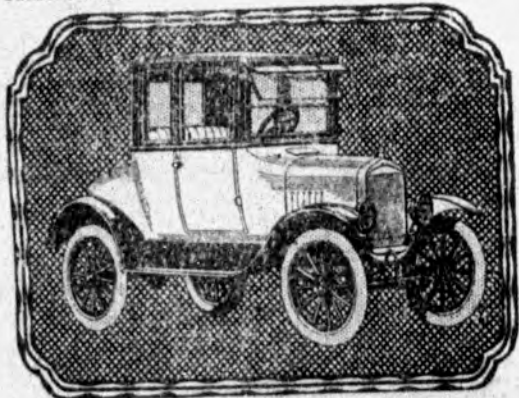

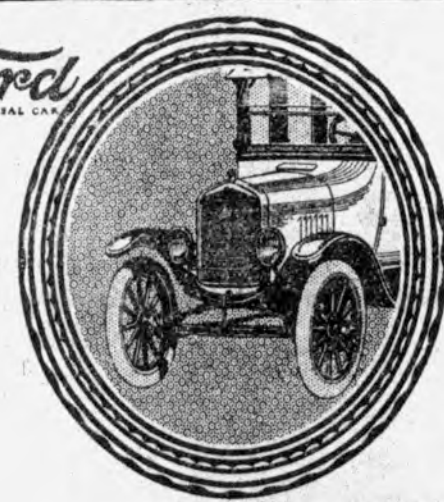
