BOOTLEGGERS FEUD CAUSED BLAZE AND 3 CHILDRENS LIVES

Police Say Brooklyn Tenement Fired By Liquor Runners

NEW YORK, Oct. 9.—A heavy odor of kerosene rising from the ruins of the main tenement building of a group destroyed by fire early today which hang over the neighborhood leads authorities to the conclusion that the building were set on fire by bootleggers.

Charles Camarata, is in a hospital seriously burned, as a result of a vain effort to save the lives of his wife and three children. He does not know the fate of his family.

It was reported by many of the 500 rendered homeless by the blaze that the fire was result of a bootleggers feud. The fire started on the ground floor of the building in which the Camarata family lived.

Firemen and a large number of volunteers made thrilling and spectacular rescues of dwellers who were overcome in a rush to reach the fire escape.

Lorenzo Savage, negro "hoodoo doctor," is alleged to have confessed to killing Miss Barthel by crushing her skull when she refused payment for "curing her love ills."

BETTER PRICES RULE ON TOBACCO MARKET

Ready Demand for Better Grades; Growers Are Well Pleased

While the receipts on the Greenville tobacco market for the last few days have not shown increased volume, that act is offset by the better prices being paid for the better grades. There is a steady demand for the higher grades and farmers here today are unanimous in their praise and satisfaction over the prices received for the product.

Another indication that Greenville is maintaining increasing popularity as a market is shown by the number of growers who are selling here for the first time. Many of them are bringing tobacco from distant points, holding that prices offered and facilities provided by local warehousemen are well worth the trip.

Three farmers from bordering Virginia counties said today after explaining that it was the first time they had visited Greenville, expressed their selves as highly elated over the market and the "splendid treatment according to warehousemen." They stated they came on the strength of statements of other growers of their sections who had become regular patrons of the local market.

"There are many rules and suggestion for the suppression of accidents but unless every one takes safety prevention as a personal mission there can be little accomplished," he said.

"During the course of the safety congress here I had the pleasure to hear a distinguished delegate from out of town address the convention on the evils of reckless driving. That man, I can show, was arrested four times for reckless driving on his way to this city."

The prosperity of our country and the success and value of all business, industries and enterprises depend largely on the attitude of public.

The public mind is made up in the aggregate of every shade of thought from the old conservatism to the rankest forms of socialism preached on the street corner.

Any one who will make a trip across the continent, or travel from Canada to the Gulf of Mexico must become an optimist and gain increased faith in the integrity and fair-mindedness of the people at large.

The magnitude and variety of business interests and all forms of production, from agriculture and lumbering to manufacturing, banking, public utilities and transportation, mining and shipping working in open, private competition and yet under control of government, is a revelation of genius to make an intelligent person proud and patriotic.

It must not be forgotten that back of all this great manifestation of power, intelligence, harmony and stability is the "public mind" the consciousness of the commonwealth founded on well-informed, clear-thinking citizenship, that is not easily led astray by vicious leaders or confused sophistries.

The public mind is the greatest national asset.

COOLIDGE AND THE FARMER

President Coolidge is trying to give the farmer his day in court. The President has failed to hear discussions of the farm problem. He listened first to all who came to give him information. Then he started sending men who live close to the ground, "dirt farmers," and began asking questions.

In the way of getting down to the real facts which he made a reputation while he was governor of Massachusetts, the Chief Executive has tackled the farmers' problem. When administration announces finally its program of aid to the farmers, if the federal government, in fact, can help in a situation which largely due to economic causes it may be expected to result from sifting down of all the facts and recommendations emanating from many sources.

Within the last few days the President has called in the executive committees of the National Grange, representing a million farmers in all parts of the country, and representatives of the American Farm Bureau Federation, and he has talked with special representatives of the federal reserve district, embodying much of the great wheat growing region of the northwest. In the last group were bankers, business men, politicians and farmers. The President, it is said, gave particular attention to what the farmers had to say, questioning them himself.

Strange as it may seem, the representatives of the big farm organizations who have seen the President are by no means all in favor of a special session of Congress to help the farmer or of price-fixing by the government.

This may come as a blow to those members of Congress who have been demanding a special session, and perhaps will be little disappointing to those legislators who regard the national Congress as omniscient. In fact, some of the farmers have said privately they would be tickled to death if Congress did not meet until a year from next December instead of two months hence.

What the farmers want is not more legislation, they say, but the use of present agencies to build up more markets and to cut to some extent the cost of production.

OPPORTUNITY FOR PAPER MILL

New York state, which has one-third of all the paper mills in the United States, has been forced to import from Canada approximately 60 per cent of all the pulpwood used in the state's paper plants. Only 12 years ago that state produced all the pulpwood needed for its paper mills. Today the demand for the product of these mills is so great that orders cannot be filled.

In the light of this situation paper manufacturers will be compelled to establish more mills in centers of raw material. In this connection why not stir sentiment in the direction of locating a mill in this section of the state. Manufacturers declare that the cost of pulpwood is so heavy with promising increase that paper prices will be forced up. Experts have declared that raw material for manufacturing paper is available in this state. The location of such a plant would be a boon not only to Southern publishers but to other consumers of paper in various quantities and varieties.

Because of the existing conditions a great number of publishers are buying through jobbers their newspaper from Norway and Sweden. The cost is high, but shipments are decidedly more certain than from domestic mills. In the circumstances, it is likely that manufacturers will continue to depend upon their supply of pulpwood from Canada until spruce forests are planted on the hills and mountains in the northern area of the country. Reforestation is a slow process. It appears inevitable that the prosperity of the industry is threatened, which, in the last analysis means that the price of the cheapest product, on which newspapers and periodicals are printed will soar to such figures many will be forced to discontinue—or at least a large part of them.

Commercial organizations might invest profitable time in going into this problem, and, if conditions justify the predictions stated by experts make an organized effort to locate a paper mill in this part of North Carolina.

PUBLIC OWNERSHIP OF ELECTRIC LINES SCORED BY RAIL HEAD

ATLANTIC CITY, Oct. 9.—Public ownership was scored as "socialistic and in nine cases out of ten saturated with politics and inefficiency," by C. D. Emmons, of Baltimore, president of the American Electric Railway association, addressing that organization in convention here today. Several thousand electric railway men from all parts of the world were present.

"The problem before all who would preserve a prosperous, sane nation is to demonstrate to the unthinking the fallacy of demagogues who advance the socialistic cause and the ruin that lies in adoption of their nostrums," Mr. Emmons declared.

The Detroit municipal street railway situation was cited by Mr. Emmons as an example of the inability of municipal control advocates to keep their promises. There, he said, city officials proclaimed, at the end of a year's municipal operation, that they had made a "profit of \$1,000,000 under a five cent fare" only to be compelled to admit, a few weeks later, that the so-called "profit" was gone and that a fare raise and a new

bond issue would be necessary to keep the lines running.

"The people of Detroit were promised the five-cent fare, extended service, the finest equipment and payment for the property out of earnings, and no more bond issues by municipal control advocates," he said.

"Such promises are easily made, but not easy to live up to. Were it possible for a municipality to employ labor and buy materials at lower prices than privately owned companies must pay, demagogic promises might be kept. But one cannot escape facts, and the fact in the case of Detroit is that when it became necessary to increase the wages of employees of the Department of Street Railway, those in charge of the railways could turn only to the taxpayers for the additional money, and they increased the fare to six cents, plus one cent for a transfer. They did right, but they did nothing different from what every privately owned property has had to do in similar circumstances.

Expert Haitian Shots May Enter Olympics

PORT-AU-PRINCE, Haiti.—That Haiti will be represented in the 1924 Olympic games for the first time in her history was practically decided at the conclusion of a two-day national rifle contest here in which 43 picked shots of the Gendarmerie d'Haiti matched their skill as riflemen. President Louis Borno, Brig. Gen. John H. Russell, American High Commissioner, and Major General Douglas C. McDougal, Chief of the Gendarmerie, have taken up the matter of Haiti's representation and if the financial phase can be arranged a five-man team, with two substitutes, will carry the red and blue flag of Haiti to France and compete in both the team and individual rifle matches scheduled between June 21 and June 29, 1924.

This year the winner of the first President's match, Sergeant Astrale Rolland, again proved his title as the champion rifle shot of the Gendar-

merie, a force of 2,400 Haitians officered by both American marine officers and Haitian lieutenants. Rolland scored 234 points out of a possible 250, averaging 47 points at each range, as against his 1922 score of 227.

Farmers Meet Here to Talk Agriculture

KANSAS CITY.—Effects of price reductions, the future prospects of the industry, marketing and other subjects of vital interest to the American farmer will be discussed by prominent men of the nation at the International Farm Congress, to be held in Kansas City October 10, 11 and 12. The agriculture of Canada, Mexico and several other countries will be represented by delegates appointed by their respective governments, according to W. I. Drummond, chairman of the board of governors. Virtually every important agricultural or kindred organization in the United States will be represented, most of them by executive officers.

CHAMBERLAIN LETTER GIVE ANECDOTE OF FORMER KAISER

LONDON.—Some interesting letters written by Austin Chamberlain to his family when, in 1887 as a young man he visited Germany to complete his education, are published in the September issue of The Empire Review.

Among other anecdotes the writer gives the following story of Prince Wilhelm, now the occupant of Doorn House, in Holland, and often referred to as plain William Hohenzollern.

"Prince Wilhelm, seeing one of the German officers, Goliz Pasha, who is serving in the Turkish Army, with three orders on his breast, asked for what service he got them. The pasha, after a moment's hesitation, replied: 'The first I got for flattery, the second for stealing, and the third for lying.'

Religious Knowledge

NEW YORK.—Representatives of the twelve leading Protestant denominations have joined recently in the incorporation of a new religious educational body known as "The Institute for the Advancement of Christian Knowledge." This was announced today by Judge Henry Wade Rogers, L.L.D., president of the institute. The first step in the institute's program, which contemplates the study of religious problems and engaging in religious surveys and research, will be to secure the publication of an American Encyclopedia of Christianity.

Plans for getting out the encyclopedia for American Protestants are already under way, with an editorial board of some Protestant scholars, headed by Dr. Joseph Cullen Ayer, professor of ecclesiastical history in the Divinity School of the Protestant Episcopal Church, in Philadelphia.

Long Terms For Moros Who Avenge Elopement

MANILA.—Hadaia is a Moro girl. Customs and religious rituals, in Moroland did not permit her the en-

joyment of a happy romantic life as would have been ordinarily hers as a birthright. She was in love with Lahaman, a young Moro from another tribe, and vowed to marry.

True to her promise Hadaia, in the Summer of 1922, fled from the paternal home to her lover and was married. The ire of her parents and fellow tribesmen was aroused and enemy grew between her tribe and that of her husband. But the marriage had already taken place, and the best that could be done was to demand a rich dowry from the family and tribe of Lahaman. Demand was made for that dowry, else Hadaia should return to her home and abandon her husband. But the dowry was not forthcoming.

Boys No Longer Used to Carry Wall St. Millions

NEW YORK.—Stories of the theft of stocks and bonds by immature youths, with a few years ago vied for frontpage positions in the daily newspapers, appear only infrequently now.

The answer is found in the almost universal absence of boys and young men in the roles of runners and messengers for the investment houses of lower Broadway, Wall and Broad Streets. The small satchels and portfolios containing valuable securities

which constantly are being exchanged between investment houses no longer are entrusted to beardless boys. Instead husky men, the majority veterans of the New York police and fire department, have been employed as messengers.

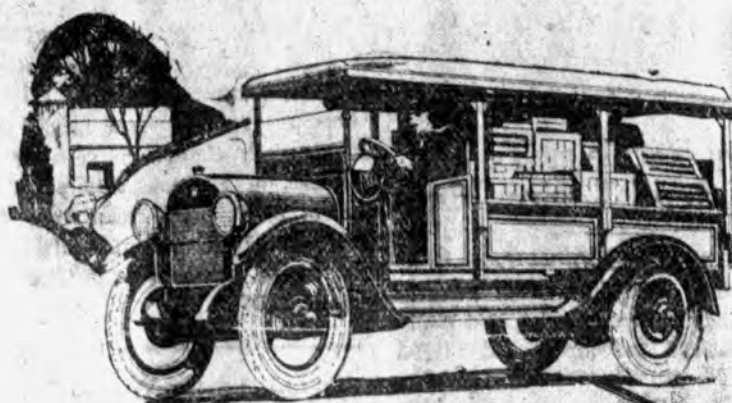

CALAMITY FOLLOWS GLOUCESTER BOATS IN FISHERMAN'S RACE

GLOUCESTER—While the ancient fishing port of Gloucester is preparing for the elimination race next Friday to choose an American challenger for the International Fishermen's Cup now held by the schooner Bluenose of Nova Scotia, there is talk on street corners and in the fore-castles of many a fishing boat of the "jinx" that has followed these international racing series from their inception in 1920 up to the present time. With much uncanny fact the superstitious fisher folk back their belief that international schooner racing is "unlucky," and that vessels and men who take part in it too often come to an untimely end.

Two staunch Gloucester schooners that ventured into the danger zone of inter-country competition, one of them a cup winner, the other an intended challenger, rest today on the sands of Sable Island. They bleached bones are often cited by believers in the Nemesis that stalks in the wake of racing fishermen. Bold shippers who sailed as masters or seamen on cup aspirants and contenders have met death in the adventure. Then there have been accidents, great and small, until the prophets of evil who say that "something is sure to happen when the schooners race" might appear to be amply justified.

The long record of mishap began in 1920 when the International Fishermen's Cup first was off red. During the elimination races at Halifax to choose that year's Canadian cup contender, the captain of one of the competing schooners fell overboard and was drowned while returning from one of the races. During the first international race series at Halifax in October, 1920, Benjamin Smith, one of the owners of the schooner Delawana, the Canadian competitor, died suddenly.

Leeds Fortune Left In Trust For Sister And Greek Prince

New York, Oct. 9.—Virtually the entire estate of the former Mrs. William B. Leeds goes to provide a trust fund giving life incomes to her second husband, Prince Christopher of Greece, and her sister, Marguerite Stewart Greene of Montclair, by the terms of her will, filed in Surrogate's Court today. The estate is valued at many millions.

Only minor bequests are made to her son, William B. Leeds, who married a Greek princess, a clause in the document stating:

"I make no substantial pecuniary provision for my son for the reason that he has been abundantly provided for by his father."

High Court Will Not Review Par Clearance

WASHINGTON, Oct. 9.—The Supreme court announced that it would not review its decision in the case brought by the Farmers and Merchants bank of Monroe, North Carolina, and others against the Federal Reserve bank of Richmond, Va., in which it held that States could by law authorize their banks to charge for their services in the collection of checks drawn upon them.

The Federal Reserve Board considered the North Carolina case vital in establishing its contention that under Federal law Federal Reserve banks had the right, which no State could impair, to insist upon all banks including those not members of the Federal Reserve system, to cash at par all checks drawn upon them which had been placed with Federal Reserve banks for collection.

Coolidge Asked to Save De Valera's Life

WASHINGTON, Oct. 9.—Senator man, accused of the murder of "one John Doe," true name unknown, and believed to have been Ed Meservey a ranch hand, appeared before Judge D. H. Young today, waived all rights to counsel and recited the details of the killing of his victim and of the subsequent burning of the body in a hay stack.

Following the recital of the details of the crime, Judge Young questioned the prisoner to determine the degree of guilt. Asked if he felt warranted in asking that the extreme penalty be not imposed, Kels said: "I do not."
