MYSTERY SHROUDS
SHOOTING MAN IN
HOME OF ACTRESSProminent Business Figure Wounded While
Calling On Fiance

NEW YORK, Oct. 12.—Milton Maas, wealthy vice-president of a chemical corporation, who resides in Asbury Park, is in a Stamford, Conn., hospital today, having been mysteriously shot last night in the South Beach home of Mrs. Ida M. Le Lie, a widow and former actress, who says she is his fiancee.

Speaking of the shooting Mrs. Le Lie said:

"I went for a walk on the beach accompanied by two dogs, leaving Mr. Maas in the living room. As I reached the porch two men ran from the shrubbery and threw me down. I struggled and screamed for Mr. Maas. He came rushing toward the porch, when a third man appeared from the bushes and fired at Mr. Maas twice. Mr. Maas collapsed and I fainted."

Following an operation at the hospital Maas told this version:

"I had just arrived and was entering the hallway of Mrs. Le Lie's home when I heard her scream from one of the rooms. Suddenly two men entered the hallway from the living room and opened fire. I went down at the first shot."

Condition, Is Reported

Collis Lewis, 16, was struck by an automobile driven by Mrs. G. H. Cox, Rebersville yesterday in Ayden and seriously hurt.

According to statements, Lewis who is a student in the seminary at Ayden was riding a bicycle and crossed the street directly in front of the machine. Mrs. Cox, it was stated, applied the emergency brake, but Lewis whose attention had been attracted turned his head and did not see the car.

Physicians said today that the extent of his injuries could not be determined for 48 hours. It was said that he sustained a fracture at the base of the skull as he is conscious only at intervals.

Bride 60, Claims 80

SCRANTON, PA., Oct. 12.—A writ of habeas corpus was granted today to Mrs. John Crane, 60, who charges that her 80-year-old husband of less than a month, was kidnapped by his two daughters of a previous marriage. Crane, a wealthy resident of the South Side, is now being retained by the two daughters, Mrs. Mary Grey, a telephone operator, and Mrs. Patrick Dougherty.

It is alleged by the daughters that he was tricked into marriage for his money. Mrs. Crane alleges that Crane is of sound mind, but that his daughters have attacked her because they have been disinherited by Crane since the marriage.

PANA, ILL., Oct. 12.—Six men are dead, three are seriously ill after having drunk poisonous liquor described as "the color," in a soft drink place here last night. Edgar Reyhill, stock trader, and a foreigner whose name has not been ascertained are critically ill, presumably from the effects of the poisoned whiskey.

FARM BOYS TO
JUDGE STOCK AT
THE STATE FAIR

RALEIGH, Oct. 12.—Over 500 farm boys, students in the agricultural high schools of the state, will spend Thursday and Friday, Oct. 18 and 19, at the North Carolina State Fair for the purpose of judging livestock and crops, according to an announcement today by Roy H. Thomas, state supervisor of agriculture, who has charge of the program for the farm boys while here.

"This is the third annual judging contest for vocational agricultural high schools and it will bring together the largest number of farm boys ever assembled for this purpose in the state," said M. Thomas. "Coming from 67 schools and representing 60 counties, these boys were selected from over 2,000 entrants in competitive trials at the local high schools."

The livestock judging contest, announced Thomas, will be held Thursday morning under the direction of Professor R. H. Ruffner, of the Animal Husbandry Division of North Carolina State College. Mules, horses, dairy cattle, sheep, swine and poultry are to be judged in this contest. Seniors in the livestock department of State College will grade the papers handed in by the contestants.

Faster Boats Needed
To Catch Rum Fleet;
Secretary Mellon Told

WASHINGTON, Oct. 12.—Faster revenue cutters are needed off New York and along the Atlantic coast to stop the rum smugglers, Admiral Reynolds of the coast guard has informed Secretary Mellon.

Congress will be asked to appropriate larger sums for the purchase and equipment of speedier vessels. A report by Admiral Reynolds disclosed that the Coast Guard has only one speedy vessel—the Seneca, now stationed off New York—capable of fighting off the rum craft. Coolidge Plans To
Reorganize Executive
Government Branches

WASHINGTON, Oct. 12.—President Coolidge today went at length into the proposed plans for the reorganization of the executive departments and independent establishments of the government, at a conference with Chairman Walter F. Brown of the re-organization commission.

It was decided to lay the Brown plans before the Cabinet, probably at next Tuesday's session and have a round-table discussion, so that each department head may criticize and offer any suggestions for changes he may deem desirable before the plans are put in final shape for presentation to congress in December.

Suddenly Herbert leaped from bed, screaming.

His father also jumped up, turned on the light and was horrified to see his son running around the room with a big rat holding on to his upper lip. The rat was sticking there tenaciously.

Finally, after Mr. and Mrs. Levy and an older son, Arthur, had chased Herbert all over the house, the rat let go and ran, with the whole family after it. But the rat outran them downstairs and disappeared. Patrick Horan of Bradford Street Hospital came and cauterized the wound. He found that the rat had bitten clear through the boy's lip in two places.

Liquor Business On
Increase, Says Report

SALISBURY, Oct. 12.—One hundred fifty-seven illicit distilleries were captured, 17 automobiles confiscated, 554 gallons of liquor and 119,844 gallons of malt liquor, poured out by federal prohibition agents operating in North Carolina during September, according to the monthly report issued by State Prohibition Director A. B. Coltrane.

A decided increase in the liquor-making business over the three summer months was indicated in the report according to the director. This was probably due to the colder weather, he stated.

Episcopal Church To
Rebuild Japan Missions

NEW YORK, Oct. 12.—The national council of the Episcopal church has given instructions to the Rt. Rev. T. F. Gailor, bishop of Tennessee and The Rev. Dr. J. W. Wood, executive secretary, department of missions, to proceed to Japan at once and obtain information for permanent reconstruction of church property destroyed in that country by the earthquake. More than two million dollars in property was lost in the disaster.

Woman Builds Home;
Husband Only Helper

NEW LONDON, Oct. 12.—Mrs. John Horback of Wallingford, Conn., who decided last spring that her family should have home of its own, and began to build it herself, although she had no experience in that line, has progressed so far that it will be ready for occupancy before the snow flies.

The three-room structure is ready for plastering. Mrs. Horback's husband helps her when he is not at his regular job. Their two small children also have helped.

WEEKS DEFEATED
MUSCLE SHOALS
PLAN, FORD SAYS

DETROIT, Oct. 12.—Henry Ford's offer for the purchase of the Muscle Shoals project in Alabama is still before congress and will not be withdrawn, Henry Ford said in a statement, his first public assertion since the sale of the Gorgas plant to the Alabama Power Company.

Ford charged that political influences were brought to bear to keep him from obtaining the plant and these "same influences prevented a vote in the House last spring" on the sale of the Muscle Shoals to the Ford Motor company. Ford says he found he was negotiating with Secretary Weeks and not the government.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 12.—Secretary of War Weeks as well as the cabinet meeting today declined comment on the statement of Henry Ford, that he had been responsible for the sale of the Gorgas steam plant—a part of the Muscle Shoals property—through political influence. Ford charged that Weeks' action had prevented his acquisition of the property and the same influences would continue to obstruct his control of the plant.

Alumni Celebrates
103rd Anniversary
Of State University

CHAPEL HILL, Oct. 12.—Everywhere—at home and in foreign lands—the alumni of the University of North Carolina paid tribute today to the 103rd anniversary of their alma mater's birth. Just 103 years ago a little band gathered at the East, the first state university building in America of the oldest state university in point of operation in this country.

The exercises were preceded by a meeting in Girard hall at which J. W. Graham, J. C. Webb and Colver Cobb, were among the speakers. The university exercises began at 10:30 with the faculty and students forming in front of the alumni building and marching to memorial hall. W. H. Everett, secretary of state, delivered the principal address. The names of 57 alumni who died in the last year were read. President Chase presided and read hundreds of messages of good will coming from all sections of the United States and foreign countries.

WEEVIL LIKELY
TO COST U. S. ITS
COTTON POSITION

NEW YORK, Oct. 12.—The supremacy of America as the leading cotton producing nation of the world is threatened by the ravages of the boll weevil which has been largely responsible for the destruction of between 20 and 25 per cent of the cotton crop this year. Edward E. Bartlett, president of the New York Cotton exchange, declared in a statement issued: "The extermination of the boll weevil, in my opinion," he said, "is one of the greatest problems that America has to solve. I believe that with an appropriation of a few million dollars, the government might organize a fight upon the weevil which in two or three years would exterminate the pest."

POSSES SEARCH FOR
TRAIN BANDITS WHO
KILLED 3 IN HOLDUPSouthern Pacific Flyer
Robbed by Former
Employees, Report

REDDING, CALIF., Oct. 12.—The wooded peaks of a mountain on the border between Oregon and California are believed to shelter a little group of men who yesterday held up Southern Pacific train No. 13, killed three trainmen and injured a score of passengers in an explosion when they forced their way into the mail car.

They obtained no loot. Bands of armed citizens including Oregon state police are seeking them. All available indications show that the trainmen were shot down in cold blood as it is believed they were recognized by the train crew as former railroad employees.

The manner in which the robbery was planned and their escape shows that they were familiar with the country and the operation of trains, railway officials declared.

The robbery and slaying were believed to have been the result of one of the most carefully planned hold-ups in the history of Western railroading. Only two men participated in the robbery, according to reports received here. One version of the robbery was that an explosion blew away part of the roof of the tunnel, causing it to cave in on the train. As the engineer brought the train to a stop the two robbers advanced to the locomotive and shot the engineer and fireman.

GRATITUDE OF JAPAN

From Japan have come many messages of heartfelt thanks to the people of the United States for their munificent contributions for the relief of the suffering in the earthquake-stricken Orient. To these messages, Japan's official representative, Ambassador Hanahira, has added his tribute in language which cannot fail to leave a deep impression. It was during the annual convention of the American Red Cross, held in Washington, that the Ambassador gave voice to Japan's gratitude and pointed out the far-reaching effect that would come from this proof of American friendship in his country's hour of need.

In this address, the Ambassador said: "The metropolitan area of Japan was torn to pieces by the forces of nature. The first flash of that dreadful news aroused in your country a universal manifestation of genuine human sympathy. Your whole people united in a noble movement of generosity which dispatched thousands of tons of food and millions of dollars in money to my destitute and homeless countrymen. It was such unmistakable evidence of the great-hearted and open-handed sympathy of America that it could not be misunderstood. In the very moment of our sorest need you did not fail us."

Speaking of the results of this action, the Ambassador declared that Japan will not forget, and he added that it will henceforth be difficult indeed for professional agitators to terrorize an ignorant public opinion to the point where it will countenance policies of

military aggrandizement on the ground of preparedness against fancied American threats. The natural reaction of a Japanese to the mention of America will be a thrill of gratitude and warm friendliness.

In the awful toll of death and destruction, the Ambassador found one bright spot for Japan. As the armament conference in which he took part proved Japan's sincerity to Japan, so the earthquake revealed to Japan the unstrained quality of mercy in the heart of America. So Japan will now proceed to the work of rehabilitation, with reinforced hope and confidence, courage and determination.

The friendship between this country and Japan cannot fail to be strengthened by this proof of genuine sympathy and by these expressions of gratitude.

A CREDIT TO LABOR

In two widely separated cities, New York and Portland, Ore., events occurred Wednesday which reflects credit upon organized labor. In Portland, the American Federation of Labor in convention revoked the credentials of William F. Dunne of the Butte, Mont., Central Labor Council as a delegate. The charge laid against him was that he was "a traitor to organized labor" on account of his activities as a communist.

In New York city the International Ladies' Garment Workers' Union ousted 19 of the 25 members of the executive committee of one of the strongest locals in the organization and debarred them from holding office after a trial in which it was shown that they were affiliated with W. Z. Foster's organization, and espoused his "boring-from-within" tactics in an effort to contaminate organized labor in America with foreign socialistic and communistic doctrines.

That organized labor in this country is thoroughly alive to the menace of foreign propaganda along this line, and resents it, is shown by constantly recurring incidents similar to those of Wednesday. Too much credit cannot be given labor for its watchfulness and prompt action when facts are developed warranting it.

Organized labor in America is not ready for communism yet, and from the signs of the times the foreign doctrines will never make much headway here. But as eternal vigilance is the price of liberty, the safeguarding of labor organizations from pollution must entail constant alertness and swift repudiation. "Boring from within" is insidious, and labor must continue to be constantly on guard, as it is showing itself to be.

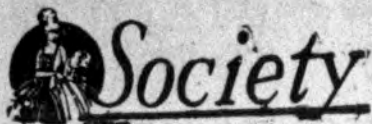

Waiter, Mussolini's Army Trainer To Visit Premier, Said

LONDON — The sergeant-major who gave Signor Mussolini his first military training when he joined the Italian army as a private in 1916, and who now is a waiter at an English seaside resort, will make a visit to Rome when his summer duties are over to accept an invitation to call on the Premier. Alfredo Carminati, the waiter, has become the idol of the Italian colony in England since the advent of Mussolini and his position has been enhanced by the receipt of a letter from Italy's "iron man" answering congratulations in which he is invited to pay a call.

"I had heard of Mussolini," said Carminati telling his story for the English papers, "but only as a Socialist orator in the streets of Milan. You can imagine my surprise when one morning in the winter of 1916 Mussolini and his Socialist friend, presented themselves at the barracks at Cassolovo and enlisted in the army."

Dokeys Initiate 50 At Colorful Ceremonial

FAYETTEVILLE, Oct. 12.—With all the colorful display of the Orient and the antics of the typical American at play, the Knights of Ziza Temple, D. O. O. K., held their annual ceremonial here last night, when 56 neophytes were initiated into the mysteries of Khorassan.

The ceremonial began immediately on arrival of a special train from Rocky Mount which brought more than a hundred Dokeys from Eastern Carolina.

Chicago Road Wins Big Railroad Prize

CITY — The Chicago North Shore & Milwaukee Interurban railway today was awarded the Charles A. Coffin Foundation prize, consisting of \$1,000 in cash and a medal contributed by the General Electric company, for having made the greatest contribution to electric transportation during the last year. The award was made to Britton L. Budd, president of the road and president-elect of the American Electric Railway association, at its closing convention session here today. A score of companies, from various parts of the country competed.

Savee accomplishments, popularizing service, gaining public good will, introducing economies through original and adapted ideas, improving construction practices, reducing accidents, improving employee management relations, and reducing new capital costs, were the basis of the award.

Storm Signals Flying Over the Reichstag
