SHERIFF, CONSTABLE
KILL EACH OTHER IN
STREET PISTOL DUEL

Quarrel Over Service of
Court Papers Leads
to Texas Tragedy

MARSHALL, TEX., Oct. 17.—The sheriff of Marion county and the constable of Jefferson met on the street last night and without a word shot each other to death.

Both men, C. B. Rodgers, sheriff, and W. B. Proctor, constable, were past 50. The constable, came upon the sheriff as he was leaving against a water hydrant, the few witnesses to the tragedy said and opened fire. The sheriff lost control of his legs, but with his hands gripping his pistol whipped the weapon out and fired. He hit Proctor once in the hip and again in the heart. A shot from the constable's gun struck Rodgers in the head while the latter was stumbling and slipping to the ground. Another shot went wild.

According to police the trouble was aroused through court papers given to the constable, but not served and a fine being imposed on the sheriff in consequence.

Good Crops Increase
Farm Wages in State,
Official Survey Shows

RALEIGH, Oct. 17.—Farm wages in North Carolina have increased during the past year on account of the bright outlook of the crop production, but due to reports that the labor supply is 20 percent short of normal, the farmer is unable to compete with the urban and public work wages, declared Frank Parker, of the Co-operative Crop Reporting Service, today when he issued a report on farm employment conditions in North Carolina.

In his report Parker says in part: "The present wages by the month without board average \$37, according to 400 reporters from different parts of the State. This is \$2 more than a year ago. With board, the average wage is \$28, or 10 per cent above last year. The wages by the day, without board, including the daily earnings of piece workers, are \$1.80, and with board, \$1.44. This also is slightly above last year's wages.

TIES HERSELF TO
PIER, LEAPS TO
DEATH IN LAKE

CHICAGO, Oct. 17.—The body of Miss Anna A. King, a governess, was found in Lake Michigan, tied with a cloth to a pier at Hubbard Woods. In the pocket of her coat, lying on the pier, were a notebook and a copy of the poem, "Pappa Passes."

Miss King had written a letter to Miss Erna Wellman, a friend, not long before her death in which she asked to have her body cremated, and said: "What does it matter if a person goes crazy? Why should I go on with the drudgery of the world?"

This letter was read at the inquest and a verdict of suicide was returned. She had appeared depressed last week and had left a small amount of money in an Oak Park bank "to pay her burial expenses if anything should happen to her," a banker said.

YONKERS, Oct. 17.—Howard Taft and James Randle, both 22, were arraigned before City Judge Boote charged with driving an automobile upon which the license number plates had been changed. Rev. M. S. STATE RAISING
GREAT VARIETIES
OF HAY CROPS

RALEIGH, Oct. 17.—North Carolina grows a great many of different varieties of hay crops, perhaps more than any other state, according to Frank Parker, agricultural statistician of the Crop Reporting Service of the Department of Agriculture, who today announced the results of an investigation into the yield per acre of hay crops grown in this state.

Mr. Parker said that, according to information he had obtained the important North Carolina hay crops this year have made the following yields per acre, expressed in pounds and averaged for the state: Cowpeas 2,050 pounds, millet, sorghum and sudan grass, 2,800; combination of cowpeas and sorghum 2,365; clover (all kinds) 2,440; timothy, including timothy and clover mixed, 2,250; alfalfa 3,100; soy bean, 2,500; grain cut green 2,170; peanuts 1,410; Johnson grass 2,860, and the average for all tame or cultivated hay 2,028.

R. O. GARRETT FIRED
FIRST, SAYS GODSEY

Saw Minister With Gun,
But Defendant Opened
the Attack

CUMBERLAND, C. H. VA., Oct. 17.—John T. Godsey, eye witness to the slaying last June of the Rev. E. S. Pierce, told on the witness stand here today in circuit court the history of the shooting. He declared that a few minutes before the minister was killed he saw a pistol in his hand, but that the first shot was fired by R. O. Garrett.

Godsey was the first witness called today. Judge White, had electric light installed in the court room last night in order to hold night session to speed up the trial.

Godsey testified that he was 300 yards from Pierce's home when he heard a woman scream. He ran toward the house and saw Pierce with a shotgun. R. O. Garrett took the gun from the minister, he said. Larkin Garrett, jointly charged with his brother of the murder was standing by the side of R. O. Garrett he swore.

VACCINATION FOR
SCHOOL PUPILS,
BOARD DECREES

A regular meeting of the Pitt County Board of Health was held with Dr. W. W. Dawson, chairman, Dr. G. G. Dixon, Dr. Joe Dixon, Mayor D. M. Clark, and Superintendent R. G. Fitzgerald present.

The work in general was discussed, as well as various means of improving the work of the department. The following rule was enacted:

"Be, and it is hereby ordained by the Pitt County board of health in regular session assembled, that from and after this date vaccination for smallpox shall be compulsory to all children attending school in any school district in Pitt county in which there is at any time a case of smallpox, and that this requirement for compulsory vaccination shall also apply to any and all children and other contacts attending school in other districts contiguous to infected districts who shall have come in contact with children attending school in said infected school district."

It was also urged by the members of the board that everything possible be done to advise the people regarding the preventative treatment for diphtheria. The health department is to put on a vigorous campaign, with the idea of informing the people in regard to this valuable treatment, it was announced by D. M. Clark, secretary.

SAYS POLICE KNOW
'MYSTERY' SLAYER

Lack Evidence to Arrest
"Butterfly," Sportsman
Murderers, Claim

NEW YORK, Oct. 17.—Slayers of Joseph C. Elwell and Dot King, better known as a "Broadway Butterfly," two unsolved murder mysteries, are known to the police, according to Police Commissioner Enright, but evidence is insufficient to warrant arrest. Elwell, sportsman and bridge expert, was slain in his apartment on night in May 1920, after he had been host to a roof party atop of one of the city's leading hotels. Dot King, was slain in her apartment last March.

Speaking over the radio last night on police problems, Commissioner Enright said: "In these unsolved cases the books are not closed until the principal involved is dead. The Elwell and King cases are not mysteries to the police department. The murderers are known, but the police are unable to get sufficient legal evidence to make arrests."

6 BANDITS ROB
HOTEL, BUT MISS
\$10,000 IN CASH

KANSAS CITY, Oct. 17.—One man stood guard with drawn revolver over six taxi drivers in front of the Hotel Baltimore at 5 o'clock this morning while five others entered the hotel, held up the night force and rifled the cash boxes of between \$3,000 and \$4,000, but overlooked \$10,000 in a drawer. They escaped in waiting automobiles.

As the bandits entered the hotel, James Brannon, house detective, was descending the stairs. One man, his face partly concealed by a handkerchief, upon being told by another member of the gang that Brannon was the house officer, took Brannon's gun and held him at bay.

SAN FRANCISCO.—A life-size figure of a nude woman, carved in stone, has been found in the heart of an Oregon forest by surveyors of the Southern Pacific railroad, according to the company's officials. The work of art was found by a surveying crew about four miles west of Crater Lake, Oregon.

MATERNAL AND INFANT DEATH
INCREASES, HEALTH WORKS TOLD

DETROIT, Oct. 17.—In spite of national legislation and other organized effort to reduce maternal and infant death rates, medical and public health workers today are having to face the fact that the present high mortality among mothers is on the increase in this country, was the declaration made today by Miss Mary Laird, Director of the Public Health Nursing association of Rochester, N. Y., in an address before the delegates attending the annual meeting of the American Child Health association today.

"After two and a half years' study of the nursing needs of the city," said Miss Laird, tracing the development of this first experiment in working out a visiting nurse service for Rochester, "we were convinced that the most neglected phase of nursing work in Rochester was skilled nursing care for its mothers."

Urged to Attend the
Services, Nov. 11

Plans for Armistice Day memorial services were completed by Pitt Legion Post, at a meeting in the Rotary building last night when Post members were also entertained at supper by J. C. Lanier and J. B. Kittrell.

The services will be held in the Jarvis Memorial Methodist church at 11 a. m. Sunday Nov. 11, and the sermon will be preached by the Rev. J. A. Ellis, pastor of Pullen Memorial Baptist church, Raleigh. Members of the organization together with many ex-service men of Pitt county as possible will form at Five Points at 10:30 and led by Post Commander Waldrop will march in a body to the church.

Explaining the significance of the service Commander Waldrop and Adjutant Rogers urged that every member of the post stress a point, if necessary and take part in the services. In addition, Rogers asked that every legionnaire charge himself with the duty of getting at least one ex-service man to accompany him.

Importance of Armistice day and the place it fills in the world's history should ever be a green and reverent spot in the memory of every man who served in the great conflict, the adjutant declared. PROHIBITION POT AND KETTLE

Little is gained by the pot calling the kettle black. Governor Pinchot of Pennsylvania in an address before the citizenship conference in Washington last Monday practically charged that failure of the prohibition enforcement lay at the door of the federal government. Prohibition Commissioner Haynes, on the other hand, addressing the same conference, asserted that the failure of adequate co-operation on the part of the state and municipal authorities was to blame.

However, Pinchot and Haynes did unite on one thing, the blackness of politics as it is played in this country. Pinchot urged that the prohibition "enforcement service be taken out of politics." Haynes urged that politics be made "clean" by the people in the states, and insisted under such conditions there could be no doubt about the enforcement of prohibition or any other law.

What is needed is co-operation to the utmost degree between state and federal authorities in the war on those who are violating the Constitution and the dry laws. There is little to be proud of in any section of the country when it comes to the question of violations of the prohibition act. Undoubtedly the ventilation of these evils will do good.

Another thing that the citizenship conference served to bring out: The time has come when men in high places, merely because they are in high places, are not to be long immune from obedience to the prohibition law, if the people who say they believe in prohibition have their way. Senator Borah of Idaho, pointed out, that it is not the poor, ignorant foreigner or mountaineer who needs attention most, but those respectable citizens of means, who act as if prohibition applied in full force to the worker, the man who was forced to get his liquor and beer in the saloon, but not at all to them.

Repeated disclosures proved that those who can pay the price of protection need not fear molestation from either state or federal officers. They can sell poisoned booze and kill with perfect impunity. There is no question but that persons who can satisfy grafters have never been made to feel the penalties of the dry law.

Recent victims of bootleg hooch at least found out how far the labels on the bottles were not to be trusted.

The craze for knickers is said to have reached such proportions in the middle west that women are wearing men's trousers. That may be something new in that section of the country.

Oklahoma seems to have made up its mind.

MODEL TOWN MICHIGAN SOLD TO HENRY FORD

L'ANSE, Mich., Oct. 16.—Piquette, nine miles to the north of L'Anse in Henry Ford's town. The highest rent there is \$1 a month, electric light and water furnished at cost, the doctor's bill is never more than \$1.50 a month, and fuel families are unknown. The Detroit automobile manufacturer acquired possession of Piquette recently from Charles Hebard and Sons, Inc., pioneer lumbermen of the peninsula.

When the town was built in 1877 the owners set about to make it something different from other lumber towns. They wanted a community of comfortable homes and happy, contented workmen. They seemed to think more of the welfare of their

employees than they did of the profits of their enterprise. There are 405 cottages for the workmen, two churches—one Protestant and one Catholic—an amusement hall, a school, a clubhouse, a water-works and electric lighting plant, a telephone system, a general store where all residents shop, and a public playground and park.

Each workman pays the same rent—\$1 a month. He need never worry about coal, for he burns none. Instead he stuffs his big stove with hardwood from the company's forests, paying \$1.75 for a large wagon load—barely the cost of cutting and delivering. A doctor administers to the ills of the community at a charge of \$1.50 a month.

ALL PLANES DWARF IN COMPETITION WITH BIG BARLING BOMBER

DAYTON, O.—The Barling bomber is the largest airplane. The Martin bomber, the largest airplane in the air service before the advent of the Barling, is a pigmy compared to it. The Barling soon is to make a tour of the country. The exact itinerary has not yet been announced, but the machine will be at New York about Oct. 20.

The Barling has a wing spread of 120 feet, a height of 28 feet and an overall length of 65 feet.

The gasoline capacity is six tons, or 2,000 gallons. The oil capacity 1,356 pounds or 181 gallons.

Six Liberty engines are required to power the Barling.

The minimum crew required to operate the Barling consists of four men, but provision is made for a crew of eight.

The weight of the airplane loaded will exceed 40,000 pounds. Specifications require that not more than 5,000 pounds of bombs shall be carried at one time, but were anything so large as a 100,000 pound bomb developed, the Barling could lift it and fly for two hours.

CORFU — From primitive but to Kaiser's palace is the fairy story reality of 500 Armenian boys, now enjoying the luxuries of the palatial mansion of the former German emperor, situated along the coast about five miles from here. The boys are all under American care, being the wards of the Near East Relief and directed by H. R. Murphy, of Lawrenceville, Mass.

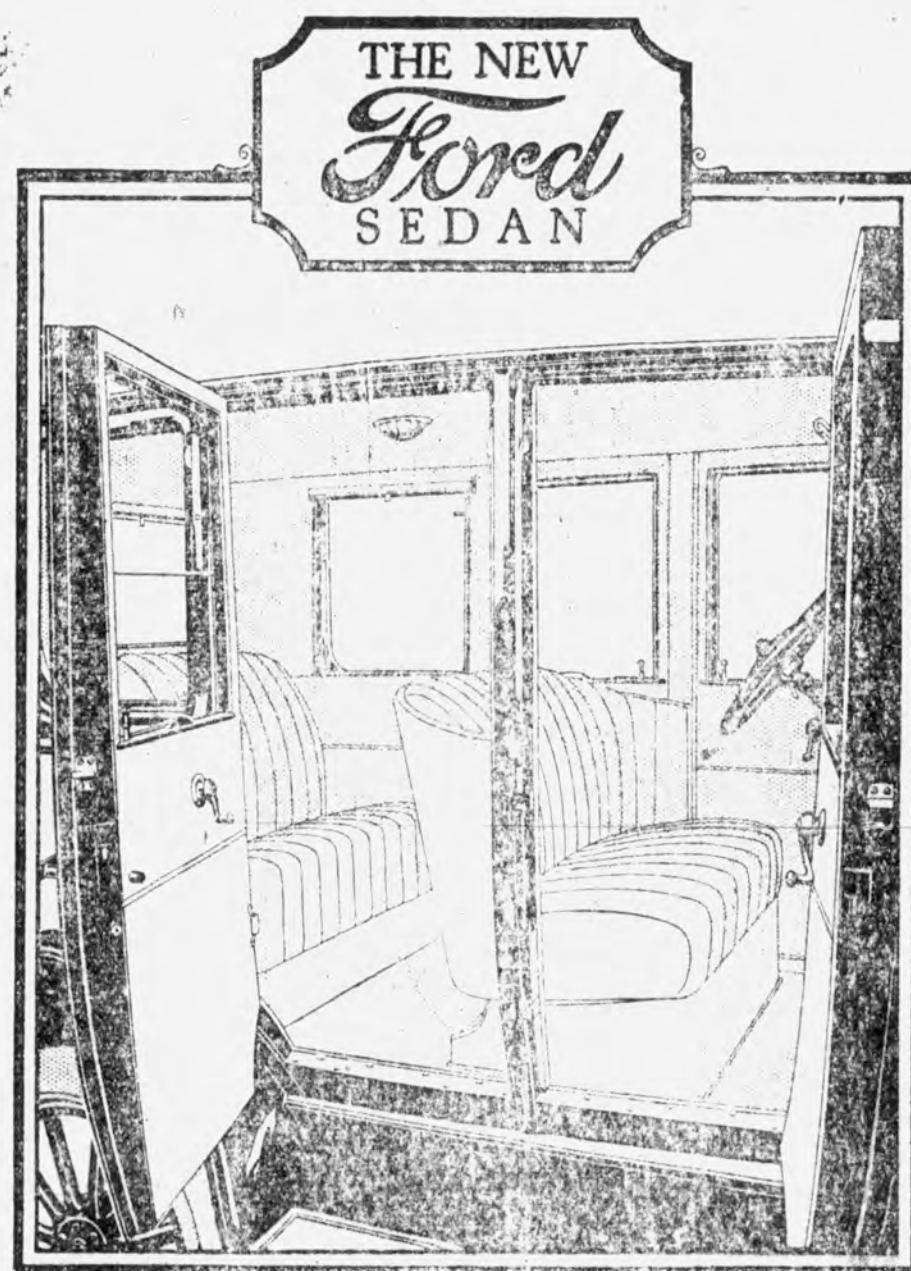
