

Would you believe that there are fewer mortgaged farms in the South than any other section? Would you believe that 70.9 out of every 100 farms in the South are free of mortgage? And here is another startling truth—North Carolina virtually ranks first in the list of recent statistics compiled by the Census Bureau places West Virginia first, but that state cannot be reckoned for agricultural production.

Out of every 100 farms in this state 82.2 are free from encumbrances! In the states of Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Michigan and Wisconsin, only 57.4 out of each 100 are free of mortgage. In the great grain states less than half the farms operated by owners are free of debt. These figures show with great certainty which state is taking the lead in progressive agricultural development.

There is no comfort to be drawn from other people's troubles. However, Pitt county folks should realize just how well they are off and should take every advantage to maintain the position of the county. The time was never so auspicious for intensive development of better farming, the poultry industry, pure live stock breeding and planting more trucking acreage than now. North Carolina leads the South.

Thigpen made an interesting report of the alumni and college activities.

Dr. W. H. Wannamaker, dean of the college of liberal arts delivered the principal talk of the evening. He dealt with the various phases of present day college life, urging upon the alumni and prospective college students that the emphasis in a college education be placed in the right place. He sounded a note of warning as to the idea that too much emphasis at the present time is being placed on athletics. He said all the colleges were now getting together for the distinct purpose of making athletics what they should be.

Dr. H. H. Wright, spoke for a few moments and declared that he was glad that the "alm" had now come when the state institutions and the church institutions are working together for the great common cause of education.

Raymond Turnage, of Ayden made some remarks reminiscent of the time when he was in college. The affair was very informal, and during the supper and afterwards the members engaged in singing the old Trinity songs.

Curtis Perkins is secretary of the local organization. J. H. Ross the present president presided. The supper was excellent and was served by the ladies of Circle No. 2 of the Missionary Society of the church.

The next meeting will be held in the same place in December. It is planned to make it a gala affair.

MUSCLE SHOALS DEAL QUESTIONED BY U. S. SENATOR

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18.—The authority of Secretary Weeks to deal with the Gorgas power plant at Muscle Shoals, to the Alabama Power Company was questioned today by Senator Ladd, Republican, North Dakota, who issued a statement saying he had no doubt Congress would "fully inquire" into the deal.

In two opinions, Senator Ladd said, the Attorney General had declared invalid the Alabama Power Company's options on the Gorgas plant and the transfer of the property looked to him like a "fishy effort" to get the property into the hands of the power company before Congress had an opportunity to dispose of it.

Hard Going for Rum Runners in Capital

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18.—Charged with violating the prohibition law, 5,982 persons have been arrested during the past 18 months by Washington police, with the co-operation of Federal agents.

This total is given in a special report submitted to the District of Columbia commissioners by Major Sullivan, superintendent of police, which said also that 34,354 gallons of intoxicating beverages of all descriptions, and 12,839 bottles of beer and extracts had been seized. In addition, 162 automobiles belonging to alleged prohibition law violators, were confiscated.

Government Orders Students Deported

SPRINGFIELD, MASS., Oct. 18.—Seventeen students from several foreign countries enrolled at the American International College here have been ordered deported by the Federal immigration authorities, it was announced by Chancellor C. S. McGown. The action had been taken because the students entered the country after the quota of immigrants from their countries had been filled.

It was expected that they would be allowed to remain under the status of students and Dr. McGown is making strong efforts to stave off deportation. The college trains foreign born students for work among their fellow countrymen here or in their native lands.

ASSERTS INDEMNITY BARS WORLD PEACE

Reparations Needed, But Not By Violence, Says Lloyd-George

CHICAGO, Oct. 18.—The blindness of force and violence is the alternative to a policy of deterring through careful examination of the capacity of Germany to pay reparations. David Lloyd George, the wartime Premier of Great Britain declared at an address at the International Amphitheater in the heart of the Stock Yards district. If Germany is refusing to pay, he added, the Allies can by such means determine that point and then force payment by marching together in any enterprise that is necessary.

Reiterating his endorsement of the proposal of Secretary Hughes for an international commission to ascertain Germany's capacity to pay, the former Premier declared that this was the only way to settle the troublesome question.

Discussing the situation on Europe with its exhaustion after the war and the reparations question as the most acute phase of the situation, Mr. Lloyd George declared that it was a fatal mistake to drive the German population in despair.

"We want reparations," he added, "and revolution is not the way to get them."

Carrett Case May Go To Jury Friday

CUMBERLAND, C. H., Va., Oct. 18.—Continuing the speed market yesterday and the day before in the second trial of R. O. Garrett charged with the murder of the Rev. E. S. Pierce, most of the important witnesses had been heard when the court recessed at noon. This afternoon the defendant and his brother L. C. Garrett jointly indicted with him for the killing of Pierce were expected to take the stand.

Indications were that all the evidence will be submitted late this evening and the case would go to the jury tomorrow.

READY FOR BATTLE

NEW YORK, Oct. 18.—Joe Lynch, of New York, world's bantamweight title holder, and his challenger, Joe Burman, of Chicago, both are down to weight for their 15-round championship fight at Madison Square Garden tomorrow.

KLAN OFFICIAL GETS ON CHEAP DRUNK

Two Spoons of Liquor Enough to Cause Ar- rest of Minister

ATLANTA, GA., Oct. 18.—The Rev. Calhoun Ridley, known as the Imperial Kludd of the Ku Klux Klan was scheduled to appear in police court today to answer charges of "drunk and operating an automobile" following his arrest yesterday.

The minister spent several hours in a cell at police headquarters before being released on \$500 bond. Officer Shumate arrested the Klan official after the minister was seen to drive his machine in zigzag fashion. The officer halted the machine and found the preacher terribly under the influence of liquor, he declared, and two bottles of liquor were found in the car. After his release the minister said that he had been in the country and met a man who offered him a drink, which he accepted, but denied that he was drunk or that whiskey was found in his machine. "I was not drunk," stated the Klan official, "the fact is I had a half pint bottle containing about two table spoonfuls of liquor. I took one drink before I was arrested."

France Quiet On Visit German Envoy

PARIS, Oct.—The second visit of Herr von Ho seh, the German charge d'affaires, to Premier Poincare could hardly be said to be fruitful, but it served to place in the hands of the French government Germany's latest contentions with respect to the payment of reparations.

No official statement regarding the visit was issued, but some details have filtered through the veil of secrecy which the French officials are observing.

MAN CHARGED WITH SLAYING BROTHER TO WED LATTER'S WIFE

Stripped Body, Buried It in Cotton Field, the Officers Assert

DOUGLAS, GA., Oct. 18.—Love Rogers, farmer, has been indicted by the Coffee county grand jury charged with the murder of his brother Alton Rogers. According to the authorities, the accused slayed his brother because he wanted to marry the latter's wife.

County officials declare that the murder was committed on the night of Nov. 18, 1922, and that Love Rogers following the deed stripped the body and buried it in a cotton field. Following the alleged crime Rogers accompanied by his brother's widow left here for Florida and were married. Mrs. Rogers says she does not remember where the ceremony was performed.

The grand jury took action after word was received that Rogers had told friends that he killed his brother. The sheriff began an investigation and found the body buried in the place indicated by Rogers covered in an old quilt. Rogers with his wife were then brought here for trial, the date of which has not yet been fixed.

Before leaving for Florida Rogers created the report that his brother had departed for other parts and nothing was suspected until the reported confession of Love Rogers.

Stock Selling Matter Sent Through Mails Under Federal Frank

NEW YORK, Oct. 18.—Stock selling literature of the Lever Lock Ram Company, of New York, has been sent to republican party workers on congressional stationery under the postal frank of Representative M. O. McLaughlin, Republican, of Nebraska, president and part owner of the corporation. The New York World says today.

The letters, the newspaper learned, were written on official stationery of Mr. McLaughlin and mailed free of postage in envelopes bearing the mark "Official Business—Free." The text, which it will publish, informs the addressee that an agent of the corporation soon will call to impart "confidential information" based on matter sent earlier.

Would "Go to Hell" For Bride, But Goes To "Cooler" Instead

HIGH POINT, Oct. 18.—Genevieve Owens Palmer, bride of less than three weeks experienced the humiliation of arrest on a charge of uttering worthless checks during a honeymoon and she faced the question as to what her future course should be since she discovered that the man she married had deceived her, causing her all the trouble.

She made a quick decision. She is through with R. F. Palmer, the good-looking 26-year-old northern youth who said that he fooled her because he loved her enough to "go to hell for her," according to what the couple have told the High Point police. Palmer is in jail here and his bride has returned to her people in Greensboro.

Move To Close 54 New York Saloons

NEW YORK, Oct. 18.—United States District Attorney Haywood, today filed 54 injunction nuisance suits in the federal court here, designed to close saloons, restaurants and cabarets under the provisions of the Volstead law.

THE MUTT DOG SHOW

A mutt dog show is to be given in the national capital by the Humane Educational Society. Officers of the Society have invited all the mutt dogs of the country—or at least as many as can attend to take part in the exhibition.

A mutt is the kind of a dog, it is explained, that belongs to the average Pitt county man and boy. Sometimes this kind of dog does not "belong," but lives in freedom by its wits. That is a hard way to live, and any dog in that state would welcome adoption by a boy. The only dog to be barred from the approaching show will be the one with the recorded pedigree. The judges will have taught to do with dog genealogy. It is what a dog is and not what his great-grandfather was that is to count.

The plebian dog is to have his day. Perhaps he is now expressing himself, by vibration of his tail and otherwise in somewhat his fashion:

"Yelp! Yelp! Pass the good news to Fowser Smith, Bowser Jones, Rags Brown and all the other regular fellows that we are going to have a plain business dog show. Dogs that have maids, manicures and footmen; dogs that have never felt the bite of fleas; dogs that have never dug for bones will not

be there.

"Creamed-fed creatures that have silken beds made up for 'em in the drawing room with a nurse to lullaby 'em to sleep will not have a look in at this show. Dogs whose ancestors went to England with William the Conqueror or came to America in the Mayflower, and never did anything after the trip, will not have standing room in this show.

"We dogs who play tag and ball with the boys, guard the home, terrorize the cats—that is, some cats—bark at intruders, strangers and every noise, are to be the whole show. The medals will be pinned on us! So yelp the news along that the mutt dog show is on the cards!"

UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE

Voters of Wisconsin will this fall pass on a measure which is not only interesting but unique in its provisions. It aims to protect workers against unemployment, through the aid of the state, with the co-operation of its leading industrial concerns. The measure provides that all employers of the state shall form themselves into a state-wide mutual insurance company and pay premiums in proportion to the regularity with which each keeps his labor force working. Thus the employer who "hires and fires" indiscriminately will pay a high premium, while the employer who exhausts all means at his command to keep his normal force will have his reward in the smaller premium assessed against him.

According to the sponsors of the proposal, there will be a steady incentive to keep the employment of all labor continuous, no matter whether the individual employer is out of sympathy with the plan or not.

This measure provides that, in order to take care of the unemployed, the state insurance company shall pay benefits at the rate of a dollar a day for men and women and fifty cents a day for boys and girls between sixteen and eighteen years of age. The unemployed, provided they have worked six months continuously for one or more employers, will be entitled to a maximum benefit for a period of six weeks, with this limit increased to thirteen weeks after the third year. Workers who are idle as a result of a strike are not entitled to any benefits.

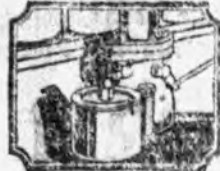
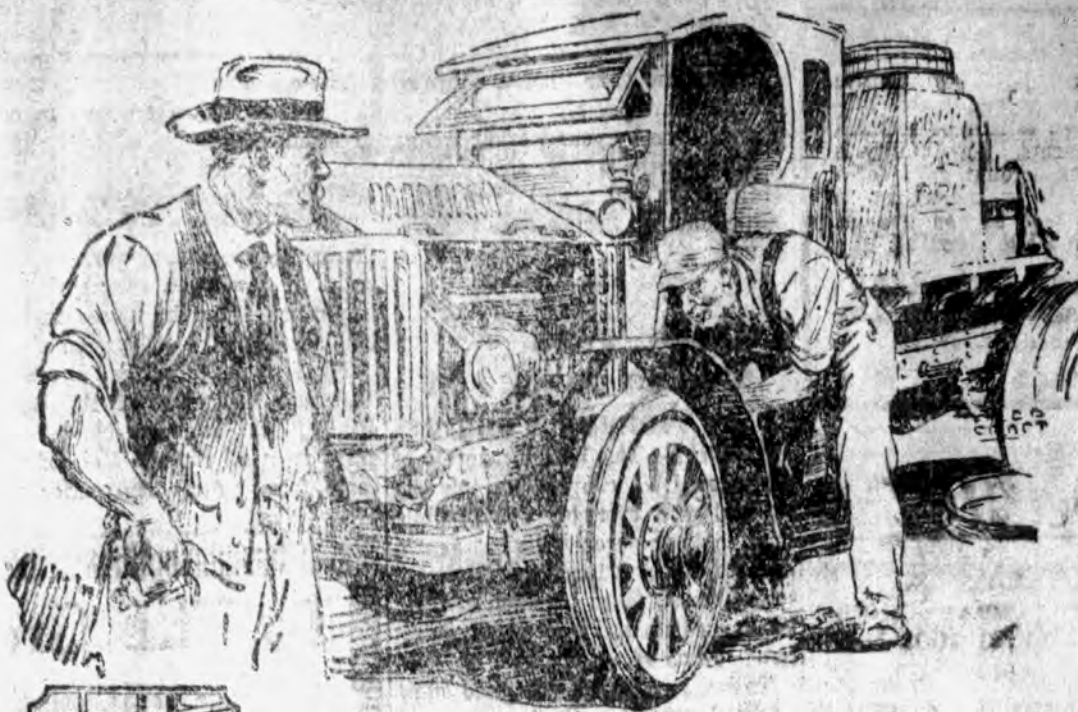

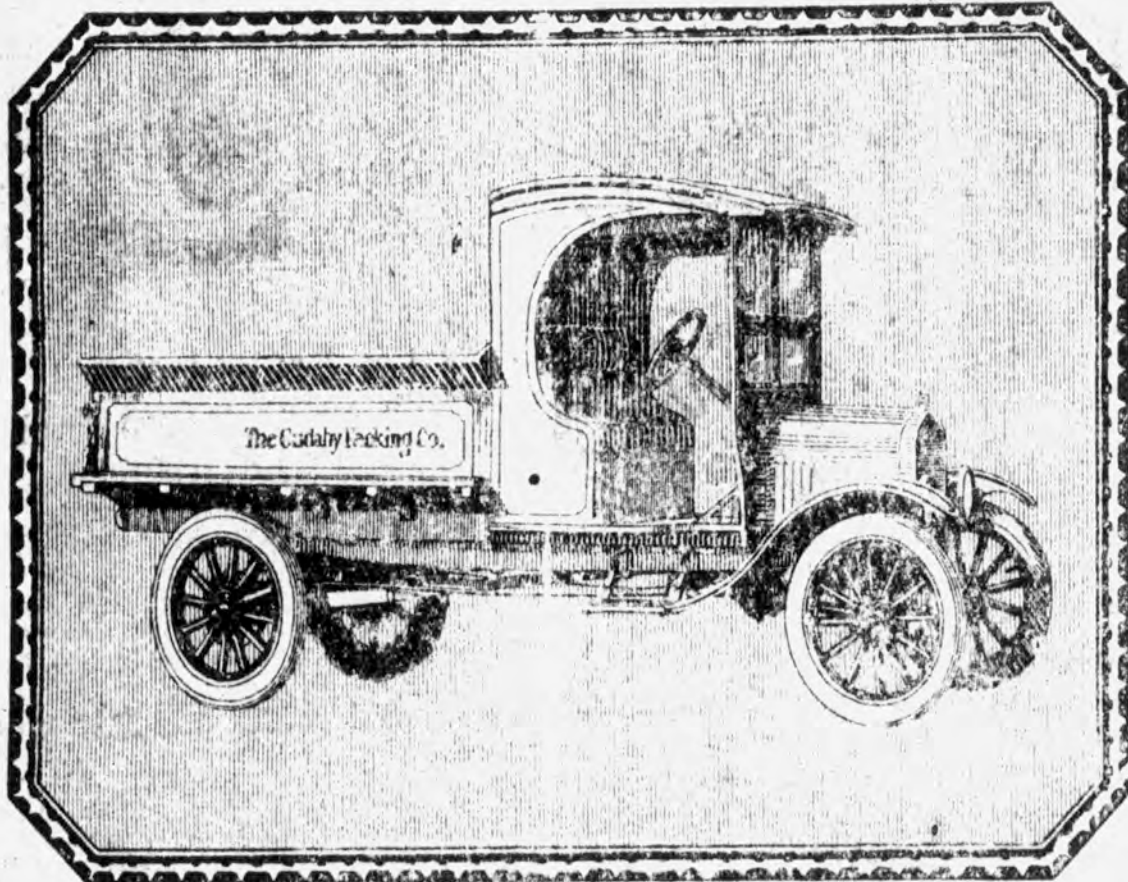
