Difference Between Toxins In Diphtheria Treatment Explained

Dr. C. L. Outland, Pitt county health officer in a statement issued today clears confusion which apparently exists in some quarters regarding the difference between toxin-antitoxin and antitoxin in the treatment of diphtheria. The statement says:

"We find that people are still confused in regard to the difference between toxin-antitoxin and antitoxin. The preventative treatment is called toxin-antitoxin, while the treatment given to cure diphtheria is called, as everyone knows, antitoxin. Another question which is commonly coming up is as to whether or not there is any reaction. Very rarely if ever in children under 10 years do we have the slightest symptoms, even if there is a reaction. It is usually very mild. The serum is given at weekly intervals, three treatments are required, and after four to six weeks after the last treatment 90 per cent of all who have taken it will not have diphtheria.

"Do not worry. See your doctor or come to the Health Department at once for further information."

Mariner Blames Strange Force For Pacific Wrecks

LOS ANGELES.—Neither tidal wave nor currents of seismic origin, but some other strange force was responsible for the recent wreck of

seven United States destroyers and the crash a few days later of the super-dreadnaught Texas and the freighter Steel Seafarer in the waters off Point Arguello, north of Santa Barbara, Calif., according to Captain Alfred Davis, a mariner of the old school who sailed his clipper ship around the Horn a decade ago.

The west entrance to Santa Barbara channel, between Point Conception and San Miguel islands, always has been in ill repute among seafaring men, said Captain Davis.

Surgeons Will Hold Congress In Chicago

CHICAGO.—Surgeon scientists in large numbers from all parts of the United States, Canada and South America are expected to attend the thirteenth annual clinical congress of the American College of Surgeons, which opens here Oct. 22 and will continue for four days.

Chief interest in the event will center about a series of clinics during the congress, according to Dr. Franklin H. Martin, director general of the organization. Visits will be made to various parts of the city to view clinical demonstrations embracing all phases of surgery.

CRIME WAVE IMPELS GOVERNOR BENGAL TO WARN PLOTTERS

CALCUTTA.—In proroguing the Bengal Legislative Council, Lord Lytton, the Governor, voiced a note of anxiety and warning regarding the recent recrudescence of violent crime in Calcutta and other parts of the province. These outbreaks are attributed to the work of secret revolutionary societies, having as one of their aims, the assassination of government officials.

The crimes of violence which have in the last few months deeply shocked the public of Calcutta have been generally assumed to have been the acts of ordinary criminals. The latest murder in the post office at Sankaritolia and the trial and conviction of one of the gang who committed the murder has revealed to the public the workings of organized revolutionary societies of which Bengal has had such an unhappy experience in the past. The revival of a menace, which many will remember as a hideous nightmare, and which everyone had hoped had gone forever, has created a situation in which the government will require, to an exceptional degree, the support of the public.

The containing influence of these gangs of fanatical idealists, who adopt terrorism through robbery and assassination as their weapon, is a danger to the younger generation from which no family can feel altogether immune.

Channel Swim Fat Man's Job.
CLEVELAND.—Swimming the English channel is a fat man's game. Carbis A. Walker of Cleveland, who swam across Lake Erie this summer but failed to negotiate the channel, said in explanation of his failure, "I was in the water 3 1-2 hours."

He said, "It was so cold it penetrated

my muscles. After swimming three miles I became delirious and then unconscious.

"It's a fat man's job—and only a man with a lot of surplus flesh on his ribs to withstand the cold water can succeed. I failed because I had kept down weight for fast swimming."

BUCKINGHAM PALACE CALLED A FIRETRAP BY BRITISH EXPERTS

LONDON, Oct. 18.—Buckingham Palace, home of King George and Queen Mary, is a firetrap subject to the gravest fire risks, according to revelations in an official report of a royal commission appointed to investigate fire prevention in England. The British public is alarmed at the possible danger to the royal family while in residence in the palace, for a fire during one of the brilliant court nights, when thousands of guests are at the palace, could easily result in a holocaust.

Though royalty itself may often be insignificant, royal residences rarely are, and Buckingham palace, as far as outward appearances go, is no exception. Each year thousands of tourists gaze in wonder and admiration on the imposing stone facade of the palace, one of the architectural sights of the British capital. Few of them know the palace front is a shell hiding an older building. It is like a beautifully decorated theater fire curtain which separates the people from the stage settings of a royal court.

Behind the noble palace front is a maze of royal reception rooms, banquet halls and living quarters for the royal family, and its retinue of retainers, court officials and servants. These quarters are separated by inflammable partitions and linked by a labyrinth of drafty hallways and a net work of old-fashioned electric wiring and heating installations.

Despite the fire risks, no English government buildings are even insured, no matter what may be their value or that of their contents. During the year ended December, 1920, the commission reports, 21 fires occurred in government buildings, eight of them being attributed to short circuits due to defects in old electrical installations.

Occupation of Ruhr Diverted American Orders Elsewhere

ESSEN.—Many orders from United States firms which have been held up because of numerous complications arising out of the Ruhr occupation have been duplicated and filled by wholesalers or manufacturers in unoccupied Germany, according to industrialists here. This applies, chiefly to tools, cutlery, smaller machinery, spare parts, nuts and bolts, and a certain amount of dress goods materials.

Some good shipments from the Ruhr reached United States ports during the summer, but only a very small percentage of the orders which were on hand when the occupation began. The chief obstacle of getting finished materials out of the district

has been the refusal of the German wholesalers and manufacturers to pay the export tax imposed by the French and Belgians as part of their plan to collect reparations. The Germans refused to pay this tax on their goods, contending that, in the first place, any such co-operation with the occupation authorities had been prohibited by the Berlin government, and on this account it would have been a violation of the program of passive resistance.

The textile center of Crefeld had on hand a lot of special orders for dress goods which the American importers found impossible to have duplicated in other parts of Germany, because the necessary machinery was not available. These goods were intended for use last spring and summer and have been reposing in warehouses all these months. Dealers say the goods will be just as serviceable and fully a fashionable next summer.

LEAGUE ASKS ALL NATIONS TO RECOGNIZE SCIENTISTS

GENEVA.—That scientists who make discoveries of benefit to humanity should no longer be robbed of the material fruit of their labor, was the decision of the League of Nations commission on social problems in a report given to the General Assembly of the League recently held in Geneva.

A resolution was adopted urging all countries to protect the property rights of the savants whose discoveries or inventions have often brought fortune to promoters but only poverty to scientists.

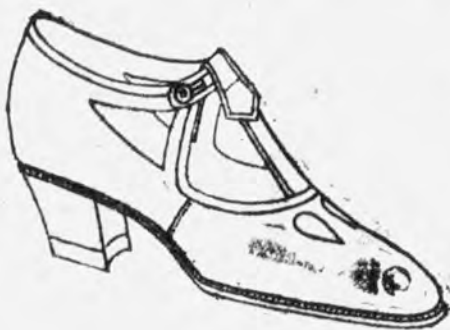

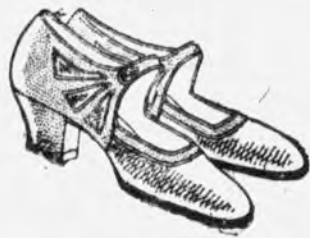
