TOBACCO SALES THURSDAY LARGEST OF ENTIRE SEASON

Over Half Million Lbs. Sold at Auction; The Prices Were Strong

The Greenville warehouses for the sale of tobacco at auction had the largest break yesterday of the entire season having on all six floors around 900,000 pounds with practically 650,000 pounds being sold during the day.

The market has sold several days between four and five hundred thousand pounds, but yesterday the number of pounds far exceeded the half million mark.

One of the outstanding features connected with the Greenville market is the triple sales method which was inaugurated last year.

Prices are holding up well on all grades with some grades having a tendency upward in price.

DR. C. P. STEINMETZ ELECTRICAL WIZARD CLAIMED BY DEATH

Modern Jove Failed To Rally From Strain of Nervous Collapse

SCHENECTADY, N. Y., Oct. 26—Dr. C. P. Steinmetz, electrical wizard, died suddenly at his home here today of heart disease.

A modern Jove who sat on the throne of science and played with thunderbolts was Dr. Charles Steinmetz. This Jove, however, hurl'd not his bolts to destroy but harnessed their tremendous power for the good of industry and the human race.

Gifted with the cool head of an engineer and the bold imaginings of an artist, Dr. Steinmetz dreamed of a world where electricity would lessen the labors of man and stamp out economic waste and probably did as much or more than any other man to make his dreams reality.

It was said of Steinmetz that he knew more about electricity than any living man not excepting his great contemporary scientist, Thomas A. Edison.

Example of Wizardry. An illustration of his wizardry in things electrical is found in his invention of a lightning generator that produced a thunderstorm indoors without the attendant deluge of rain.

Plans Municipal Parks. GREENSBORO, Oct. 26—Negotiations have been completed by the Greensboro city council for the possession of a tract of about 40 acres of land in the western part of the city, now rapidly becoming a thickly populated residential section, and plans are under consideration for the development of the property into a municipal park with a large lake surrounded by drives.

COOLIDGE PLAYS HIS GAME

President Coolidge, by all signs, should make a formidable opponent at the game of draw poker. He possesses the stoicism, the immobility of countenance and the ability to hide successfully from his opponents any indication of his intention that make good poker players. Indeed, it is not difficult to arrange a simile between Mr. Coolidge's actions and a poker game.

Mr. Coolidge is playing a game of politics, and he has his opponents worried. He plays all his cards "close to his vest," while the cards of his opponents are necessarily open to conjecture, at least. That gives him the advantage that a "close player" always has. His expression never changes, and he speaks never a word. He never tips his hand. He might well be compared with the Three Wise

Monks who neither hear, nor see, nor tell, were it not for the fact that he probably sees and hears better than anyone with whom he has to deal.

What the cards are that make Mr. Coolidge's hand, with which he seems well satisfied, no person knows. They may include opposition to or support of Secretary Hughes's economic conference plan; they may be for or against President Harding's World Court policy; they may favor or oppose the railroad consolidation policy; they may oppose or favor agricultural relief; they may be played one way or the other on questions of the tariff, taxes, excess profits tax, soldiers' bonus, foreign policy, prohibition, or any of the hundred and one other things that are stakes in the game.

But Mr. Coolidge plays "the cards close to his vest" and his face is inscrutable. Any guess that is voiced concerning his hand is handily met with the statement that it is unauthorized and incompetent. It makes the same highly nervous and disconcerting.

Unfortunately, the game that Mr. Coolidge plays concerns more than the politicians that are "sitting in." It begins to look as if he only stake for which Mr. Coolidge plays is a renomination.

"Playing 'em close to the vest" is not going to win for Mr. Coolidge. Already Governor Pinchot has taken a trick. The do-nothing, say-nothing policy won't work in the face of the Pinchot logic. The President is not to be permitted to draw "wet" cards with one hand and "dry" cards with another.

BRITISH LABOR PARTY POWER BY 1926, MEMBER'S PREDICTION

WALLESEND, Eng.—There will be a Labor government in this country in 1926 and Ramsay MacDonald will be prime minister, said Patrick Hastings, King's counsel and Labor member of Parliament, in the course of a speech to his constituents here recently. He deduced this from the fact that before 1910 Labor votes could be counted by a few thousands, but in 1918 this number was two and a quarter millions, while last year it was four and one-half millions. At that rate of progress, he said, there would be a Labor government in power by 1926.

GERMANY DEDICATES HUMBLE MONUMENT IN MEMORY WOMAN

Ancient Craft Is Unearthed in Harbor On Pacific Coast

MUNSTER.—Every school girl and every woman in Germany knows the name of Henriette Davids, but it was not until recently that the government officially acknowledged her as one of the country's benefactors. Numerous monuments to the memory of Empress Victoria, Queen Louise and Kaiserin Augusta Victoria, the former Kaiser's late wife, have been erected in Berlin, Hamburg and other centers but in the old days the government never gave Henriette Davids even a passing thought—Henriette came from very humble parentage, and it is said she did not care a snap about royalty and pomp and running up to Berlin to see what the "y" folks were doing. Instead, she devoted her efforts toward the education of young women, and compilation of a cook book which was her chief aim in life.

Henriette Davids began her cooking experiments about a hundred years ago at her parents' home in Wögnern near Witten on the Ruhr. As a girl she became famous locally for her cookies and the people often came for miles for a taste of her home made bread and cakes. And in those days when there was an excitement in the neighborhood word was always passed around that Henriette Davids' dishes were to be a feature of the event.

RADIO CENTERS AT HAWAII

Honolulu, Today—Hawaii is destined to become the radio hub of the Pacific, according to Arthur A. Isbell, of the Radio Corporation of America. Due to its geographical location at the cross roads of the Pacific, the territory is the logical location for army, navy and commercial radio stations working with the United States and the remainder of the Pacific area.

LOS ANGELES.—The frame work and planking of a craft which has stood the stress of years and which is believed to have been used centuries ago by Chinese or Spanish explorers or pirates, have been uncovered many feet beneath the earth's surface at Los Angeles harbor in excavations for an oil storage tank. The boat, less than forty feet in length, with high sides, is built of heavy, thick wood. Some of the timbers are half round, as is the case in many old Oriental vessels. Metal nails fasten pieces of the craft together and rusted away. The construction of the ship indicated that it was not built by Indians.

MEN OF WEALTH SELL THEIR ESTATES IN IRELAND

Dublin, Today—There is today an exodus from Ireland of members of the wealthier classes. Lord Oranmore and Browne is selling his property in Mayo, and other territorial magnates are taking the same course. Their estates in land come under the operation of the Land Purchase Act, which transfer them to the tenants at a fixed price, and they have nothing left but their mansion houses and demesnes.

NEW YORK—The automobile industry of North America is not a mushroom growth, but a logical development of the American carriage industry, says the Commerce Monthly published by the National Bank of Commerce in New York, dealing with "The Motor Car in Relation to the Economic Life of the United States and Canada."

"The simple facts as to the production and use of automotive vehicles in the United States and Canada," says the article, "are so astounding that the attention not only of the business world but the general public as well has been focused on them and speculations as to the future of the automotive industry are a fruitful theme of discussion."

From the standpoint of the value of product, the industry now is third in the United States, and there are more than 400,000 workers directly dependent upon it for a livelihood, while the number indirectly dependent is much greater.

During the last twelve months the number of emigrants from the country has reached an alarming figure, so much so that the military authorities in some districts cannot obtain the necessary quotas of men for the yearly conscriptive training.

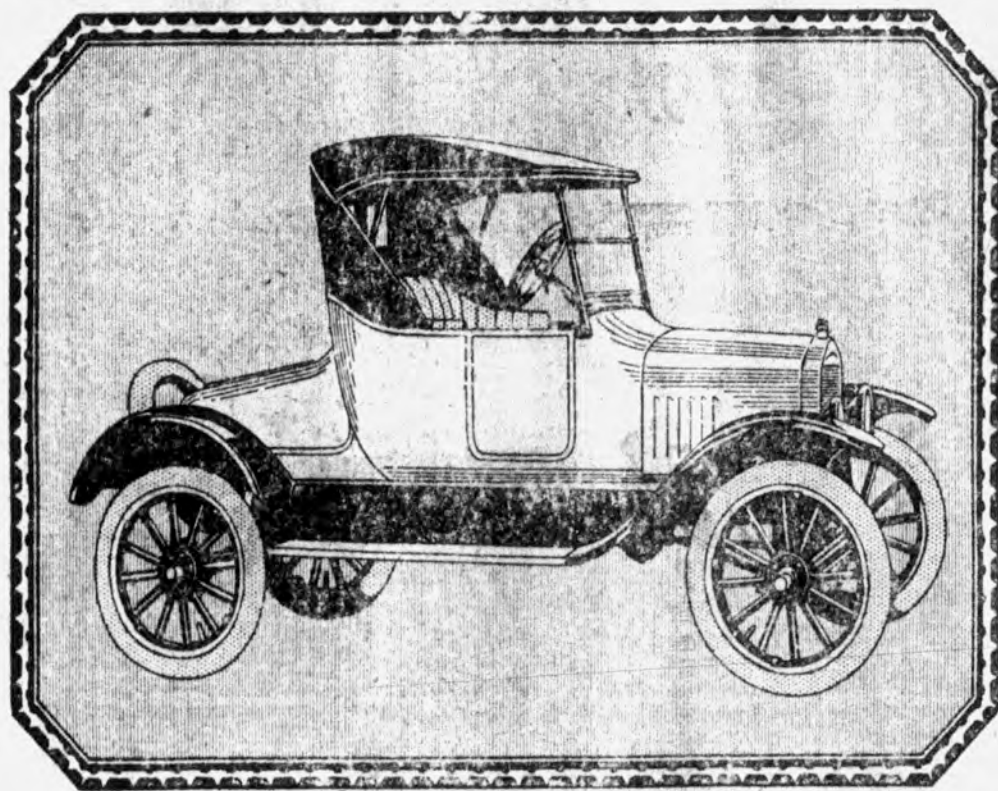
