ANDREW BONAR LAW THE FORMER BRITISH PREMIER IS DEAD

Death Great Shock To Great Britain; Funeral Arrangement Later

LONDON, Oct. 30.—Andrew Bonar Law, former Prime Minister of Great Britain, died at his modest home in London shortly before 3 o'clock this morning. The official bulletin of the attending physician stated that death came as a result of an acute attack of Septic Pneumonia. The death of Bonar Law is a great shock to Great Britain. While it was known that his condition was very serious, the end was not expected so soon. On May 20, Law resigned as Prime Minister on account of a throat malady from which he had been suffering for some time and since that time he had practically retired to private life.

His daughter, the only near relative in England, has been with him during his last days. His only two sons were killed in the late war.

No funeral arrangements have yet been made but it is thought that it was the wish of Mr. Law that services be as simple as possible.

Born in Canada.

Law was born in New Brunswick, Canada, Sept. 16, 1858. Upon the death of his mother, when he was 12 years old, he was sent to Scotland, to the care of an uncle, and thereafter he lived and worked in Scotland and in England.

Andrew Bonar Law was the first Colonial to become premier of Great Britain. Law was a colonial by birth only, however, for all of his mature years, were spent in the homeland and a great part of them were devoted to service of the British Empire.

Unlike many statesmen, Law did not enter the realm of public affairs until he had attained middle age. His earlier years were devoted to business. Once he turned his hand to politics, however, his rise was rapid and he held a place in the front rank of British statesmen for more than a score of years.

Friend of America.

Law was a bitter foe of the movement to establish a republic in Ireland and spoke uncompromisingly in opposition to separation of Ireland from the British Empire. When the agreement establishing the Irish Free State was adopted, however, Law favored it and urged its ratification by Parliament.

Throughout his political career Law manifested considerable friendship for America and both during and after the war frequently praised openly the part the United States played in that historic struggle.

Law was the son of James Law, a clergyman. He was married in 1891 to Miss Annie Pitcairn Robley, of Glasgow who died in 1909. They had four children two sons and two daughters. One daughter was married to Sir Gen. Frederick Sykes in London in 1920. Both sons, Anthony and Lieut. G. T. Bonar Law, gave their lives while fighting with British army during the world war.

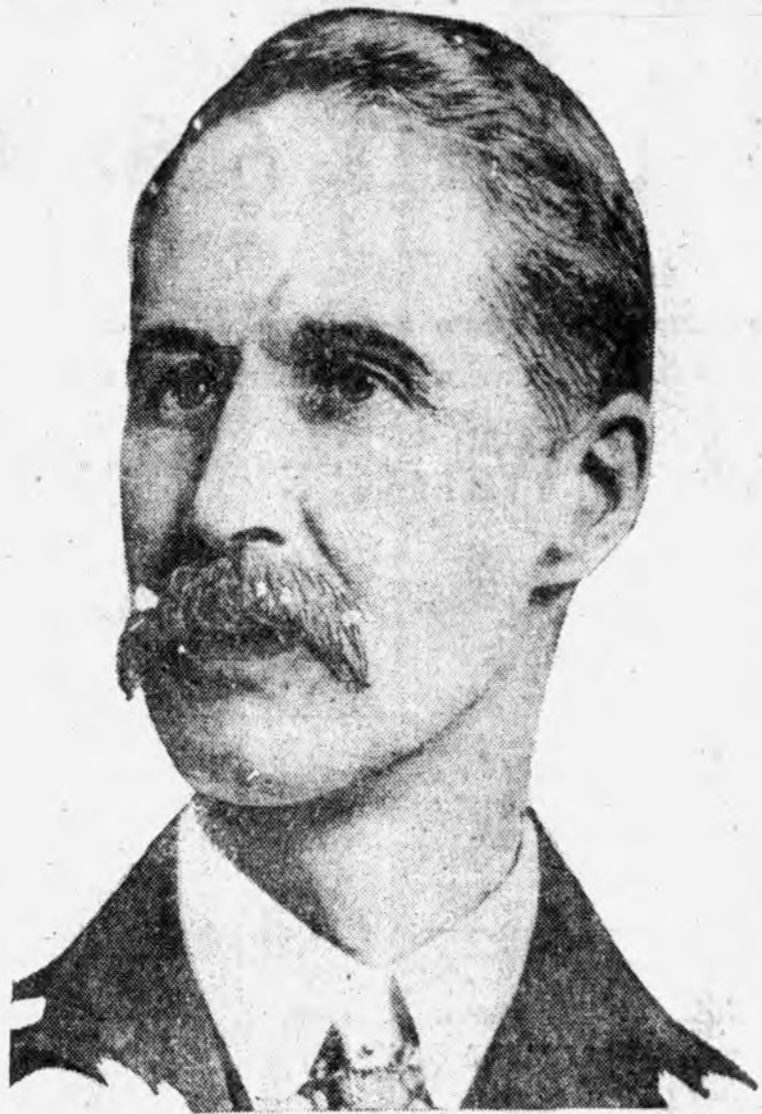
The Law home in England was at Parkbrooke Lodge, Kensington. The only recreations of the noted statesman were chess and golf.

Poultry, A Billion Dollar Crop.

"In the United States in 1922 there were 360,000,000 chickens. They produced 1,556,000,000 dozen eggs.

"The chickens and eggs sold during the year 1919 brought \$1,048,000,000. This was 39 per cent of the total value of all live stock product.

"Poultry is worth one-third as much as corn, half as much as wheat, as much as cotton, and more than oats. It falls only a little short of being worth as much as hogs.

"A farm without some poultry, a garden, and a little fruit is not a real farm. When farm business is good the poultry and garden products more than feed the family and leave the money crop clear profit; when farm business is bad, they feed the family and save the day.

"Let us help mother make good with the hens. Let us give her decent equipment, encourage her to get better stock, lend her a hand with the heavy work.

Outbreak Montenegro Reported in Dispatch To Rome Newspaper

PARIS, Oct. 30.—Insurrection has broken out in Montenegro and is reported to be spreading, says a message from Rome quoting from a dispatch to one of the Rome newspapers from an Italian port on the southern Adriatic. The correspondent says that the insurgents were reported descending upon the towns and the movement seems to be connected with the activities of the Macedonian irregulars.

CRIMINAL COURT CONVENS IN CITY

Grand Jury Does Not Find a True Bill Oglesby, Corey

The regular October term of Pitt County Superior Court for the trial of criminal cases convened here yesterday morning, with Judge J. Lloyd Horton presiding. The calendar for this term although not containing many cases of especial importance is very large and much interest is centered around the week's term.

The following cases were heard yesterday: True bills were found against Dudley Williams, larceny; W. E. Winan, burglary; Frank Vines, larceny; Elliot Patterson, murder. The grand jury failed to return a true bill in the case against Kirk Corey and D. E. Oglesby for manslaughter.

Newton Clemming and Jack Clemming were tried for larceny each being fined \$20 and costs, and 60 days in jail to be served to R. D. Harrington. Newton Clemming was also found guilty of operating car without license and fined \$12.50 and costs.

James Ball who was tried on a charge of selling liquor was found not guilty.

The following cases were not prosecuted: John Williams and Israel Hardy for forcible trespass; Silas Nobles, Sr., assault with deadly weapon and Aroy Brown, larceny.

Jesse B. Hill, charged with manufacturing liquor was found not guilty.

Louis Williams, was found guilty of carrying concealed weapon and given 10 months in county jail.

Levy Harde, manufacturing liquor was found guilty while Roy Harris charged with seduction was also found guilty. Judgment has not been returned.

C. L. Perkins charged with speeding found guilty. Judgment not returned.

The police have arrested several persons but announce that none of them have been the real culprit. The Wilhelm entourage and the entire village of Doorne is greatly excited over the incident.

Republic of Rhineland Agrees Pay Its Part Of War Reparations

WIESBADEN, GERMANY, Oct. 30.—The Provisional Government of the Rhineland Republic has sent the following message to all the nations of the world. "The Rhinish people have taken in hand the direction of their destiny. They have proclaimed full independence and definitely rejected foreign domination. The provisional government of the Rhineland Republic sends, eternal greetings to all nations of the world. It is determined to live in peace and friendship with the whole universe. The government has condemned the world war loosed by Prussia and has declared itself ready to pay its share of the reparations. The people have appealed to all nations of the world especially those who suffered from the world war to urge their loyalty in helping the republic to bring about in Europe and the world an era of peace and concord. May the nations understand the greatness of the task undertaken by the Rhinish people and help it toward the triumph of its cause."

Conetoe School Destroyed By Fire To Re-Open Soon

MAKING HISTORY INTERESTING

Despite Henry Ford's assertion that all history is "bunk," there may be found in the chronicles of other days as much drama, as much human interest, as much thrill and as much adventure as is held in all fiction. As a matter of fact, fiction's greatest mine of material has been in history, and from historic incidents and characters have been drawn the stories and drama that have most amused the world. In a final analysis, fiction is but transcript of human experience, and human experience, in turn, is nothing but history. It is true that not all incidents of history hold

all the elements that are deemed necessary for good fiction, but in every historic incident there are most of these elements. The motion picture makers long ago realized that their product, with a dash of historical interest, would have an appeal to thinking people; but they allowed the romantic and the merely slushy to predominate over accuracy, with the result that the so-called historical films became apologetic of their historic side.

But now Yale University, with the wisdom that is given to educated men has taken up the making of a series of films that will picture history without attempts to sugar it over with fictional inaccuracies. These films, which will be the pictured counterpart of the invaluable "Chronicles of America," will reproduce, after investigations and under the supervision of historians, famous scenes in events that have become famous in American lore and without consideration for mercenary ends.

The motion picture people were inclined to sneer when the announcement was made that Yale would enter the movie field. They scented another highbrow effort to elevate the movies. But they have received a jolt. For the first Yale film, "Columbus," proved so interesting, so filled with drama, so thrilling, and withal, so accurate to history, that fifteen hardened film salesmen, after viewing the picture, voted by secret ballot that the film could be sold anywhere on its merits as entertainment alone.

Which seems to disprove the movie people's contention that history is dry stuff and that romance and thrill must be injected into films to make them entertaining.

ROME, Oct. — The law of guarantees, passed by the Italian Parliament in 1871, almost immediately after Rome became the capital of United Italy, regulated the relations between the pope and the new kingdom, and assigned to the Pope, besides the palaces of the Vatican and the Lateran, the magnificent papal palace of Castel Gandolfo, exquisitely situated on the shores of the Lake of Albano. As is well known, the Pope never acknowledged the law of guarantees, nor could they use the great Villa of Castel Gandolfo (as it was intended that they should do) for their summer residence, as, after having been elected Pope, they never leave the Vatican.

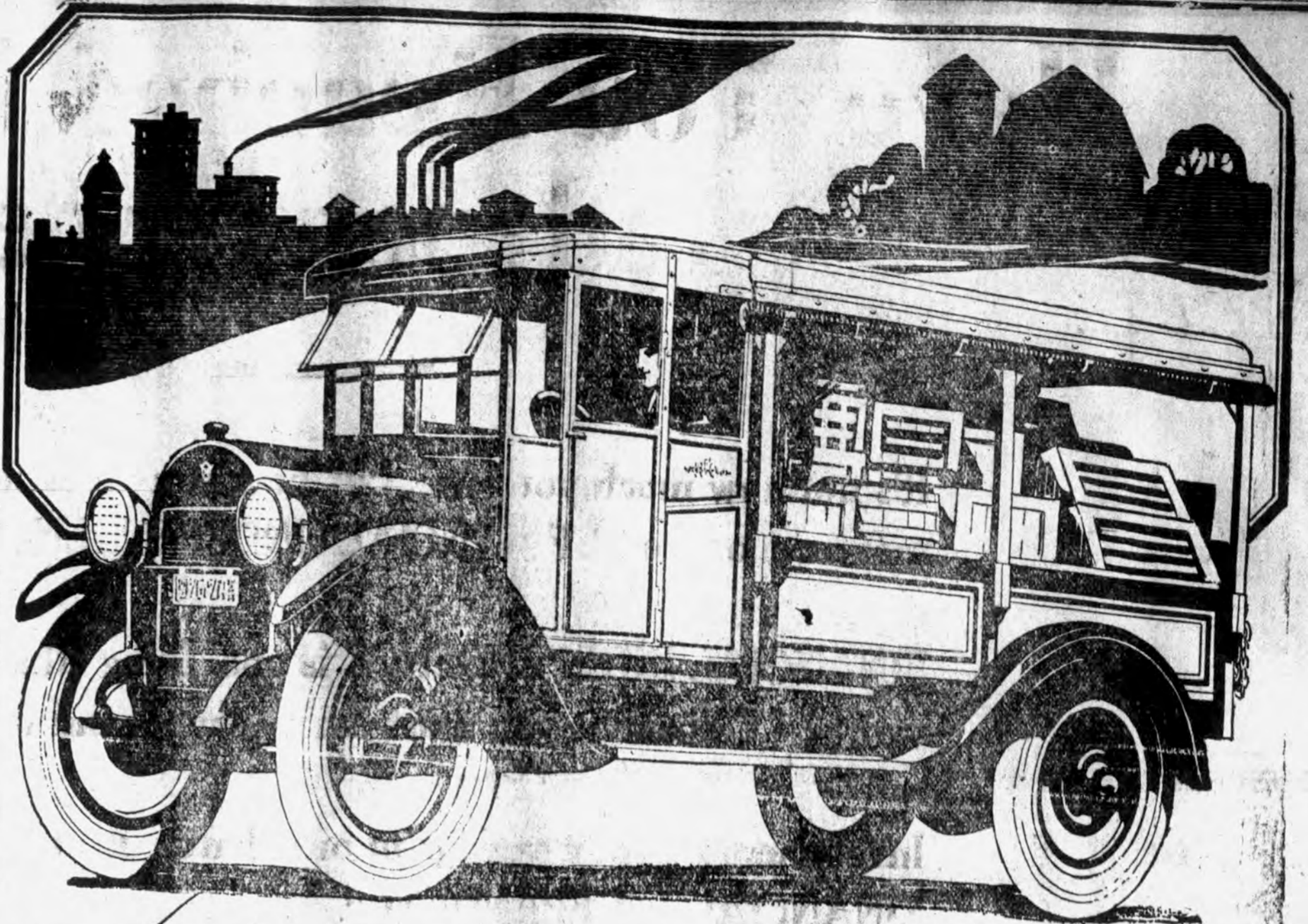

Germany Counts Millions of Motley Fugitives, Report

BERLIN. — Germany today is a land of fugitives. Every thirtieth person in the German republic is a refugee. It is estimated that there are 2,000,000 Germans who have been thrown back upon their fatherland as a result of the war and the carrying out of the Versailles Treaty.

Russian-Roumanian Relations Improve, Observers Declare

BUCHAREST. — Despite the reports frequently heard in Bucharest

of an impending invasion of Red hordes across the Dniester and down through the Bessarabian plains, competent observers—both Roumanian and foreign—who have recently had opportunities to study conditions along the frontier seem to be agreed that relations between Soviet Russia and Roumania are now better than they have been at any time during the past few years.

In Bucharest at least, it is confidently believed that Russia's formal recognition of Roumania's right to the province of Bessarabia is imminent. At the same time, however,

Roumania is not taking any chances by reducing her military strength, and, while definite information on this point is impossible to obtain, it is generally believed that there are not far from 100,000 Roumanian soldiers in Bessarabia, most of them being scattered along the more than 200 miles of frontier formed by the river Dniester.

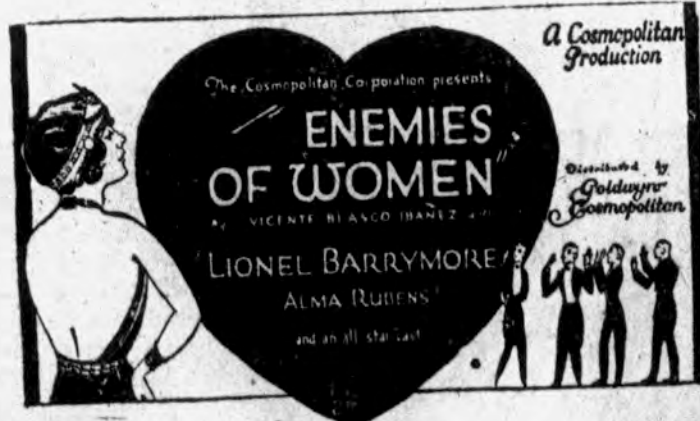
