Pitt County Fair Is Ready for Opening Here On Tomorrow

Fourth Annual Fair Sold U. S. Hospital Site Promises to Be Best Held In County Ey Alleged "Pull"

Everything is ready for the grand opening of the Fourth Annual Pitt County Fair and exposition. The city is already full of strangers, and each train bringing more. By tonight the exhibits will all be located. Agricultural exhibits and live stock promises to be more varied than ever before. The swine building has been enlarged also the poultry show.

There will be, for the races, the largest number of horses ever assembled on the local track. Among them are several well known grand circuit horses that have never been south before. The races are always an outstanding feature of the fair and they promise to be of greater interest this year than ever before.

The fireworks program will be presented as heretofore only it will be more varied and far more beautiful than on the previous years. This feature of the fair will be given each evening of the week at 8 o'clock and is a wonderful free attraction.

The Sheesley's Greater Shows will form the midway. These shows are considered among the best on the road and have attracted considerable interest in the large cities of the country.

The merchants and manufacturers exhibits will play an important part and the main building will resemble the Made in Carolina exposition.

The managers of the fair stated today that free attractions would be enjoyed both afternoon and evening throughout the four days.

The fair will be for everybody in Eastern Carolina and it is a settled fact that Pitt county people will have something well worth while to show the rest of the state.

Death-Defying Air Races By Navy Men Barred, Report Says

A new world's speed record was established yesterday when Lieut. A. J. Williams established a record of 266.6 miles per hour over a three-kilometre course and Lieut. H. J. Brown a record of 259.16 miles per hour. Over one leg of the flight, Lieut. Brown flying the fastest that mortal man has ever traveled attained a speed of 274.2 miles per hour.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—Further speed contests by naval aviators such as those took place yesterday at Mitchell Field New York, were today prohibited for an indefinite period according to an order issued by Rear Admiral W. A. Moffit, chief of aeronautics. It is the opinion of the technical staff, he stated, that the naval fliers had achieved the maximum speed in the air and that further efforts would be hazardous and may mean loss of life.

TRIAL OF LOUISIANA KLANSMEN OPENED TODAY

BASTROP, La., Nov. 5.—The trials of klansmen charged with hooded mob operations in Moorehouse parish last year were started here this morning before Fred M. Odom, judge of the 6th district court.

Bastrop was crowded with citizens from all parts of the parish and the court house square was lined with automobiles from the surrounding country. W. G. McIntosh, charged with carrying fire arms on the premises of another was the first case to come up. District Attorney Guion suggested that all cases of this nature be heard collectively in order to save time and the counsel for the defense agreed to the suggestion.

This charge was the outcome of a raid upon the place of Alonzo Braddock, alleged bootlegger. Braddock was brought to Bastrop by the raiding party.

Additional sensations were created in the Senate investigation, in Washington, into the affairs of the United States Veterans' Bureau during the administration of Colonel Porter, E. J. Morse, Republican political leader in Missouri. He was alleged, cleared nearly \$100,000 on the sale of his home at Excelsior Springs, Mo., as a site for an army hospital for tubercular patients. The place had previously been rejected as unfit for hospital purposes, but alleged "pull" was exerted, according to the charge, in order that Morse might reap the benefits of the site.

Annual Meeting Livestock Growers To Be Held In Hickory

HICKORY, Nov. 5.—With leaders in the state and south in agricultural work present the annual meeting of the livestock growers of North Carolina will open here tomorrow night. The session will last through Wednesday.

C. A. Cobb will open the convention with a speech on agricultural and stock conditions in the South. Mr. Cobb is editor of the Southern Ruralist and is said to be an authority on the subject which he will discuss.

Wednesday morning a trip will be made to nearby poultry and dairy farms and then a business program will be carried out. The beef cattle, sheep, and swine people will meet in one auditorium and the dairy cattle and poultry growers in another.

Wednesday night the North Carolina Jersey Cattle Club will take charge of the meeting and the annual meeting and banquet of the Club will be held. The following day a sale of pure bred Carolina grown Jerseys will be undertaken.

Among speakers who will attend the sessions are the following: Dr. B. W. Kilgore of Raleigh, J. H. McLean of Washington, D. C., W. G. Randolph of the American Jersey Cattle Club, and members of the state agricultural department. County agent J. W. Hendricks of Catawba county will preside over the general meetings.

Plan Big Memorial To Bishop Tuttle

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 5.—Plans to erect a national memorial valued at \$1,200,000 in honor of the late Daniel Sylvester Tuttle, presiding bishop of the Episcopal church was announced here yesterday by the Rev. William Scarlett, dean of Christ Church Cathedral. The building he stated will be for community and church use and will be constructed at a cost of three quarters of a million dollars. The balance of the \$1,200,000 will be used as an endowment.

GERMAN STEAMER STILL IN HARBOR AT WILMINGTON

WILMINGTON, Nov. 5.—German steamer Hans Hensforth, ready to steam away for several days, still remains in the harbor, delayed in leaving according to officials by a wholesale desertion of the crew. In addition, the steamship has been up against it because of the escape of six stowaways, who landed here with the ship. One returned to the ship and two others were captured but the remainder are still at large.

Trouble with the crew developed shortly after the steamer's arrival when some of them left without leave. However, enough remained to operate the vessel and it was prepared to leave ten days ago when the balance of the crew departed. Only the officers now remain on the ship.

The crew, it is believed, will ship out of the country on other vessels where the scale of pay is higher. The laws prescribe that if they land here they shall make a trip back also but nothing is said as to what vessel they shall depart on so that it is not necessary for them to return on the Hensforth so long as they ship on some other vessel.

The captain of the unfortunate steamer is faced with a delicate situation in hiring a crew of Americans. The rate of pay of an American sailor is higher than that of the officers of the Hensforth and the skipper believes if he attempts to make up an American crew and has to pay them at their scale that the officers of the ship will also desert. The steamer therefore, will remain here until some solution of its problems is found.

WAR DEPARTMENT WILL RENEW ALABAMA POWER PLANT LEASE

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—The renewal of the lease of the government power plant at Wilson dam, a unit of the Alabama Muscle Shoals project, to the Alabama Power company will be approved by the War Department according to announcement by Secretary Weeks today after receipt of an inquiry from the power company concerning its position relative to a renewal of the lease. The plant was leased to the power concern about two years ago and the operation has made returns to the government of about \$500,000. The terms of the contract if renewed will contain the same provisions and will be revocable at any time.

EIGHT ARRESTED IN NEW YORK FOR FRAUD

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—Albert E. Gulkers, who figured prominently in the police investigation of the Dorothy Kiernan murder mystery in this city some time ago, was indicted today with his brother, Henry, and six others, by the federal grand jury on charges of using the mails for the purpose of defrauding stock investors.

EASTERN CAROLINA SHIPPERS TO MEET WILSON, THURSDAY

WILSON, Nov. 5.—Fearing that by the forthcoming action of the Virginia cities, whose shippers are petitioning the Interstate Commerce Commission to reopen the Carolina freight rate case, will lose to them the fruits of the victory won by the chambers of commerce two years ago, representatives of shippers of Eastern Carolina met here today in the rooms of the chamber of commerce and organized the Eastern Carolina Shippers' association, a temporary organization which will be perfected this week when shippers from all points in the east will meet here to determine upon specific action.

The meeting on Friday afternoon was called by W. N. Harrell, a Wilson wholesaler, in order that the shippers could hear the report of Maurice R. Beaman, who had just returned from Richmond, whether he was sent by representative shippers of Rocky Mount and Wilson and the Wilson Chamber of Commerce, of which Mr. Beaman is secretary.

Mr. Beaman went to Richmond Thursday, following the meeting of Virginia shippers Wednesday, to confer with Major Alexander Forward, of the Virginia Corporation Commission, and representatives of various Virginia associations, in an effort to ascertain just what the Virginia interests purpose to do. He discovered that a compact, well-financed organization had been perfected in Virginia and that its efforts would be directed toward tearing down the rate structure which, it is held, gives to North Carolina the nearest approach it has ever had to just freight rates as compared to those of the Virginia competing cities.

"The Virginians admit that they are out to make a stiff fight," said Mr. Beaman; "the victory we won two years ago, they say, is costing the Old Dominion millions of dollars a year in North Carolina trade. They look upon us as their own and they will make every effort to recapture a territory whose merchants for years were forced to bow to a Virginia monopoly by a discriminatory freight structure which stifled Carolina commerce and built up the cities of Virginia at the expense of North Carolina."

The Virginians will ask either that the Carolina intra-state freight rate be raised so that the Virginia rate to Eastern Carolina ports be lowered, Mr. Beaman stated, "and in either case we lose unless our shippers fight for justice."

Prior to the decision of the Interstate Commerce Commission in the hearing affecting the discriminatory rates, North Carolina shippers were forced to pay approximately one hundred per cent higher freight rates from New York and other Eastern points than Richmond, for instance did, and their own rates to points outside of North Carolina were the same as those of Richmond. Under the present structure North Carolina cities have a lower rate and can extend their territory to all parts of the country. Before their average shipping territory was within a radius of eight miles of their base. Now it is unlimited.

George S. Edwards, of Rocky Mount, was made temporary head of the shippers' association. M. R. Beaman was made secretary. Invitations are being extended all shippers in Eastern Carolina to attend the meeting here next Thursday.

MUSCLE SHOALS PROJECT MAY BE ENTIRELY REVISED UNDER PLAN OF CONGRESSMAN MADDEN, ILLINOIS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—Outlines for a new proposal for the disposition of the Muscle Shoals project, duplicating the Gorgas steam plant recently sold to the Alabama Power company was submitted to President Coolidge by the Representative Martin Madden, chairman of the House appropriations committee. Under the plan outlined the government will build or authorize to be built a new plant on site 15, 16 or 17 southwest of Gorgas. The Illinois representative told President Coolidge that he would soon begin the preparation of a bill embodying his plan and that he would have it ready for presentation at the opening of the next session of congress next month. Madden stated that it was his belief that there was a unity of opinion in the house for a speedy disposition of the Muscle Shoals question. President Coolidge

It is understood informed Madden that he favored an early settlement of the question.

The sale of the Alabama plant recently brought forth from Mr. Ford a statement that he would not qualify his offer for Muscle Shoals without the Gorgas plant.

Advocates of the Ford proposal have recently held conferences here to work out such a program as that presented by Madden.

It was declared that if the southern states could be made more productive by the manufacture of nitrate for fertilizer that such would mean increased riches and prosperity for the whole United States and that taking that view of the matter the government could well afford to make a contribution to national prosperity amounting to that originally spent on the Muscle Shoals project.

Rev. J. E. W. Cook Accepts Call to the St. Paul's Church

The Rev. James E. W. Cook, of Wilmington, archdeaconary has accepted the call to become the pastor of St. Paul's church of this city and will assume his duties here on December first.

Mr. Cook is acknowledged as a great leader and as a Bible student. He is a Virginian, having been one of the charter members of the Wilmington Club. He has also been actively associated with Sigma Gamma, order of the Eastern Star, the North Carolina Educational League, the Sons of St. George and St. Andrew, and the Welfare Federation.

Mr. Cook went to Wilmington to hold an official position with the George A. Fuller Company. He was made a deacon of the Episcopal church October 7, 1921 and ordained a priest on May 4, 1922, the Right Rev. Thomas C. Darst, D. D., officiating in each ceremony.

He had charge of the church of the Good Shepherd, when the bishop called him to the work of the archdeaconry, which he has carried on successfully for the past two years.

Mr. and Mrs. Cook will receive a hearty welcome to Greenville.

INDIANAPOLIS, IND., Nov. 5.—Three women and one man were killed last night when a Pennsylvania railroad train struck the automobile in which they were riding at a crossing about 10 miles west of this city.

Large Surplus Is Indicated Current Fund of the State

RALEIGH, Nov. 5.—A surplus in the current fund of the State of North Carolina is indicated in a statement submitted to the Governor here tonight by the state treasurer and the state auditor and made public by the executive, the figures being through September 30, 1923 and showing a surplus of \$409,369.04, based on the budget commission's estimate of revenue for the nine months ending September 30, 1923 and the legislative examining committee's report of December 31, 1922.

The revenue collected in the first nine months of 1923 exceeds that estimated by the legislative committee as to be collected but applicable to the period prior to December 31, 1922 by \$601,222.33. This added to the \$222,805.25 which the legislative committee estimated as the surplus last December 31, made, according to the statement, a total surplus applicable to the date December 31, 1922 of \$824,027.58 in the current fund of the state.

WALTON WAS PAID \$6000 BY CITIZENS FOR SCHOOL PERMIT

Fifth Impeachment Of Court is Confirmed By the Witness

OKLAHOMA CITY, Nov. 5.—Val Gardner, former citizen of Tonkawa, Oklahoma, appeared before the house investigating committee of the Oklahoma legislature yesterday in corroboration of the charges in the fifth county of the impeachment bill against J. C. Walton, suspended executive, according to information made public by the investigating committee.

That count alleges that Walton received \$6000 from the citizens of Tonkawa in return for which he permitted an appropriation for the Tonkawa school to spend. Members of an investigating committee said that Gardner testified that the money, \$1000 bill, was drawn from the Second National bank of Tonkawa and given him in an envelope. He delivered the money, he stated, to A. V. Snodgrass an employee of the state highway commission.

The legislative committee said that the transaction took place the morning of the day that the governor approved the appropriation for the Tonkawa school which was early in April Gardner, according to the committee, stated that the money was raised by citizens of Tonkawa.

Gardner came to this city from Missouri with Tom Gardner, sheriff of Oklahoma county, who was sent to search for him. The grand jury investigating the charges against the governor will resume its action today.

NERVY WIFE HOLDS GUNMAN IN VISE GRIP FOR POLICE

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—Mrs. Frances Reynolds today put to route three gunmen who had held up and shot her husband. After Reynolds had been shot Mrs. Reynolds leaped upon the leader of the trio and pinned him to the floor.

She managed to wring the pistol from his hand and held it in prison until the police arrived. In the meantime the other two members of the trio becoming alarmed at Mrs. Reynolds' bravery and fearlessness had run away. Reynolds is reported to be seriously injured.

Hertford County Man Convicted of Murder

HERTFORD, Nov. 5.—Herbert Chappell, Perquimans county man, was today convicted of a cold blooded murder in superior court here for the murder of Elisha B. Goodwin, of Hertford, on Sept. 24. The killing occurred when Goodwin made an effort to invade Chappell who had threatened Mrs. Chappell. Chappell entered a plea of self defense.

The jury returned their verdict after deliberating all day Sunday. A motion by the defense for the setting aside of the verdict was overruled by the court.

Chappell was sentenced to 10 years in the penitentiary.

STACY HAS NOT DECIDED ACCEPT UNIVERSITY OFFER

RALEIGH, Nov. 5.—Associate Justice W. P. Stacy had made no decision up until this afternoon relative to his possible acceptance of the offer of the position of dean of the law school of the University of North Carolina. He expressed himself as feeling highly complimented by the offer but that he had not yet sent his decision to the board of trustees of the institution.

He said, "there is nothing to it" when questioned regarding the rumor that he would shortly resign his present position in order to enter into the gubernatorial race in 1924.

"BLAME FOR GRADE CROSSING FATALITIES"

If the killing of 14 persons, eight of them school children, and the injuring of eight others, some of whom may die, in two grade crossing mishaps, one in Ohio and the other in Pennsylvania, at about the same time recently, will not set the people to thinking hard on this form of recklessness and thoughtlessness that is wasting hundreds of lives yearly, what will?

Neither of these terrible tragedies can be classed as an accident in the strict sense of that term; for an accident is an occurrence that could not be foreseen. It can always be foreseen that driving an automobile or a horse-drawn vehicle upon a railroad crossing without first stopping, looking and listening is full of danger. Every grade crossing tragedy is preventable. No person who stopped, looked and listened when approaching a railroad crossing was ever injured at such a point.

The law that governs in such cases is that of ordinary intelligence. Let it be said what may about the obligation of the railroads. Suppose a train crew may be reckless. Suppose the rights of travelers of a highway may be abridged by some action of a railroad. The

public does not have to endure such action, but common sense and prudence will tolerate it until correction can be obtained in the proper way, through the courts. It would be idocy to attempt to dispute with a railway locomotive on its own ground with an automobile or wagon. It is recklessness in the extreme—because of the utter lack of necessity for the risk to take any chance of being struck on a railroad crossing.

This puts the chief responsibility for crashes at such points upon drivers of vehicles who did not first stop, look and listen before starting across the tracks. It is out of the question to expect every grade crossing to be eliminated. Even if the railroads could raise the money to do it, centuries might be required for the work. Where there are such crossings at populous centers they should be removed at any cost, and safeguards should be provided at other points to a reasonable extent. But after everything has been said and done, the obligation of reducing the grade crossing menace rests with automobilists and drivers of other vehicles, as emphasized by the number killed through the ignoring of the rules of ordinary prudence.

Particularly should operators of bus lines, offenders in these latest two tragedies, be held strictly to accounting by the law and to payment of damages as far as possible when they run passengers into a death trap. They should be treated precisely as the railroads that kill or injure passengers. Rigid application of this law would force them to pay more attention to impressing their drivers with the warning to stop, and listen before starting over a railroad crossing.

The great majority of auto drivers show their understanding of their responsibility for the lives of all who may be riding with them. They will not risk the lives of others where they might their own. How frequently some of them have remarked as a speeder has given them the dust, "He would not get away with that if I were by myself." Every autoist who risks lives on a railroad crossing is a menace to his friends or to any who may trust his driving.

The blame for the grade crossing fatalities is upon the drivers of automobiles or horse-drawn vehicles who do not stop, look and listen." — Pittsburgh, Pa. "Post."

French Athletes Urge Americans To Play Rugby

PARIS.—French Olympic officials are greatly chagrined over the report from New York that the United States will not participate in the Olympic Rugby competition. While unwilling to discuss the circumstances leading to such a decision on the part of the American Olympic committee, members of the French Organizing Committee express hope that the United States will be there with a Rugby team at the finals.

They regret that American Rugby is quite different from the European game, but at the same time they recall that during the Inter-Ally Games in 1919 the American army put a team in the field that came within a few points of defeating France's best. At a New York report in 1920, the American team also gave a very good account of itself.

"We should like America to compete, first, because we feel that Rugby is one of the best sports for the development of physical education, and second because we feel that the winner of any individual or team competition in 1924 should be universally recognized as supreme. This would not be the case for Rugby should the United States fail to compete." Thus, wrote Francis Reichel, general secretary of the French committee.

"We earnestly desire also that Rugby be not considered as exclusively a British sport, but a game of world's expansion," Reichel went on. "The friendship and admiration which we feel toward American athletes lead us to believe that, in no matter what sport they choose to compete, their methods and the class of their athletes would bring benefit to that particular game."

"If we win the Rugby event," Reichel concluded, "we want to feel that we have defeated the best in the world, which would not be the case should America abstain. The prestige of the Olympic Games demands that the United States enter every track, field and team event. I am sure we will find the boys from overseas as right there when the whistle blows."

Colonel Robert M. Thompson, president of the American Olympic Committee, has had several conferences with Reichel about the matter and has cabled New York that, in his opinion, the United States should send a Rugby team to France.

Winnetka Children Forge Ahead Under New School System

WINNETKA, Ill.—Pupils don't fail any more in the public schools of Winnetka. It is not that the school children are different, but because the Winnetka Board of Education has "thrown off the shackles of the old class lock-step system" and has provided every child with individual instruction, according to Carl W. Washburne, superintendent of schools.

Reputed to be the "first complete example of individual instruction in public schools," Winnetka's experiment already has gained wide attention. "Last year alone," Mr. Washburne said, "the Winnetka schools were visited by hundreds of visitors from all parts of the United States."

and from Australia, New Zealand, Japan, Sweden, England and Belgium. "This widespread interest," the superintendent continued, "shows a general awakening to the evils of class lock-step and to the need for individual instruction. For four years we have been working out the technique of individual instruction in the public schools of Winnetka. While our work is still crude in many ways, we have demonstrated beyond question that it is possible for a public school system to give individual instruction and individual promotions without changing the size of classes and increasing the number of teachers."

"The general value of individual instruction already has been demonstrated by Bark at the San Francisco State Teachers' College, Sutherland of the Los Angeles Public Schools, by Hara in Iowa, and by Courts in Detroit. Jessie MacKinder in London has shown the possibility of putting individual instruction in large city school classes, even with five and six year old children."

DR. LEIBY GIVES FACTS ABOUT WEEVIL CONFAB

RALEIGH, Nov. 5.—"Regardless of the teachings of Agricultural Workers throughout the South on the subject of boll weevil control, there is a strong tendency among cotton planters to fight the weevil by methods unsupported by facts as to the merit," declared Dr. E. W. Leiby of the Division of Entomology of the State College and Department of Agriculture, in a statement issued here tonight.

Dr. Leiby returned earlier in the week from the National Boll Weevil Menace Convention at New Orleans and in his statement suggested method which he thought might be of use to the farmers of the state in fighting the pest which is proving to be such a menace to the cotton crops of the country.

"The work accomplished by the conference should be of interest to every cotton grower," said Dr. Leiby.

One of the troubles in the weevil fight, said Dr. Leiby, is that "too much attention is given to those who think they know how to fight the weevil and too little to methods which have been found successful after careful and prolonged field trials."

"The fact," he added, "that the present method of weevil control, while effective, are not yet perfect, has created a tendency for the farmer to search for his own 'new' method of control."

The committee after much deliberation, Dr. Leiby, concluded to advise that dependence should strongly be placed primarily on such measures as have been most widely tested and have established their claim to general use by proven profitable results in a series of seasons and under a wide diversity of conditions.

"The method commonly known as the 'Florida Method' appears to give an effective control of hibernated weevils and reduces the attack in the early part of the season so that so that a profitable increase in yield may result, but this treatment alone leaves the fields subject to re-infestation which cut short the fruiting period when general migration of weevils occurs. To prolong the fruiting period late during become necessary."

The Standard Calcium Arsenate dusting method when properly used, has shown in all sections superior efficiency in weevil control, after cotton reaches the stage of growth where it blooms freely. The beginning of regular dusting must be based upon stage of weevil infestation and should be when ten percent of the squares show weevil punctures. This method of treatment has shown the possibility of cutting down weevil infestations and even checking the attack from migrated weevils for several weeks. The dusting treatment at its best may permit cotton to continue growing to the limit of its normal growing period. For this dusting suitable machinery is essential."

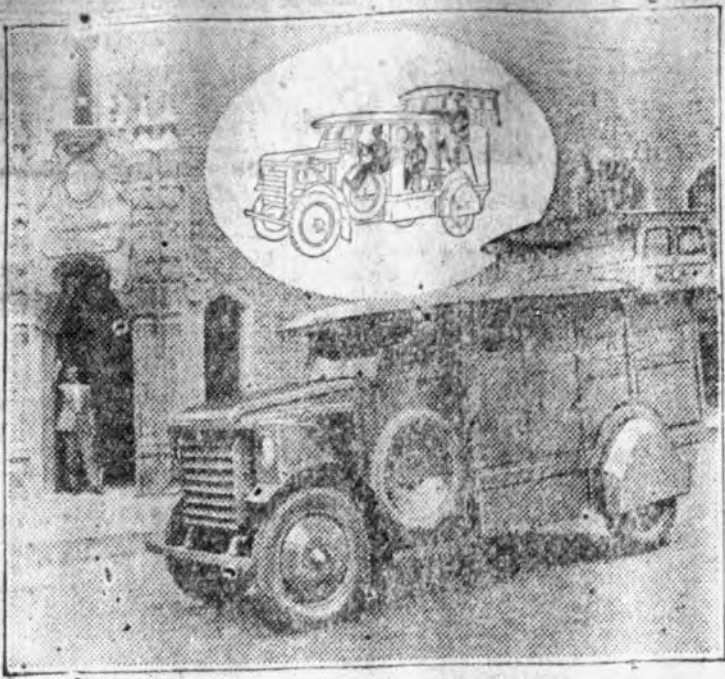
Robber, Lenient With Poor, Killed by Police

MADRID.—An Indian robber named Jambulingam, known as "Robin Hood" because of his sternness with the rich and his respect of the poor, has been shot dead by the police after an intensive campaign of day-long robberies throughout the Narmada division.

Jambulingam, with his lieutenant, Kasli Nagan, escaped from a prison a third time and immediately proceeded to follow his usual plan of action. This included a call on prominent people to whom he disclosed his identity and purpose, at the same time demanding a fixed sum of money. At most invariably the demands were complied with as any refusal provoked the wrath of Jambulingam and his gang which took the form of assault and robbery. His last exploit was at a village wedding at Nambikurichi where the robber and his gang mixed with the guests, placed two armed guards at the exits, and then relieved the guests of their valuables.

All the police in the district set out to get Jambulingam, but in September at a place called Koriyar special police surrounded a house occupied by the gang. Police were set the roof ablaze, Jambulingam made a dash for freedom, hitting the inspector in his rush, but was himself killed by the police.

CHICAGO.—Christian education is being given 151,379 native pupils in 3,790 schools in foreign lands, under the direction of the board of foreign missions of the Methodist Episcopal church, according to a report made public here from a survey just completed by Eric M. North, education secretary of the department. Professors and teachers in the schools number 6,868, the report said.

The schools vary in type according to the needs of the locality. A large

proportion are elementary schools, next in number are secondary and others are high schools, colleges, industrial and vocational institute, medical schools and seminaries.

"In many mission fields, as in Africa," the report says, "the standard of living is so low that vocational education is necessary to provide means of earning a livelihood for the converts so they can lead Christian lives independent of the heathen superstitions about them. Sportsmen Start Drive Big Game Preserve

CHICAGO. — If a national bird, game and fish preserve is made of approximately 14,000 acres of bottom marsh lands of the upper Mississippi river, now advocated by business men, conservationists, sportsmen and the Izaak Walton League of America, one of the greatest breeding grounds in the United States will be founded, according to Will H. Dilg, president of the league.

The 300 miles of land stretching from Lake Pepin, Minnesota, the Rock Island, Illinois, on the south, constitute the most prolific spawning grounds for all warm water game and food fishes. Mr. Dilg said, as well as an exceptional breeding section for small game mammals and the greatest hatchery for birds in the country. He asserted that in 1921 nearly 24,000,000 fish were rescued from the land-locked waters of the land, of this region, which the biological survey estimated at a value of \$1,200,000.

Agitation toward setting aside this section as a preserve began after a group of real estate operators proposed to dyke and drain the Winneshiek bottoms of the Mississippi river, lying on the Wisconsin side between De Soto and Lynxville. The war department had granted permission to drain the land when it came to the attention of the league and an appeal to the supreme court of Wisconsin temporarily held up the plan, according to Mr. Dilg.

These are: lack of finances, four years of hard study instead of starting to work earlier, and the services to be made by those at home.

However, we should not let the petty obstacles which confront us undermine our determination to overcome, but we should see a vision. The requirements for catching a glimpse of the vision, and for following it, whatever the cost are: faith in ourselves, faith in our nation, and faith in God. If we have this faith we can succeed.

In conclusion, Mr. Meadows exhorted the students to adopt this as their motto, "Let us go up at once and possess it, for we are well able to overcome it."

The audience was dismissed by Mrs. Graham.

BRITISH CONCERNED OVER STATISTICS ON FALLING BIRTH RATE

LEEDS, England. — England's empty cradles continue to form a subject of animated comment among the new papers, doctors and sociologists. Not a few British officials express misgivings over the future of the race, if the present rate of decline in births continues.

Dr. J. Johnstone Jarvis, medical officer of health for Leeds, in his report for 1922, refers in some striking passages to the subject of birth control. Commenting upon the fall of the birth rate in Leeds from 21.8 to 19.8 per 1,000, he says: "How people can, in these circumstances, talk of birth control and the necessity for the reduction of the birth rate, passes comprehension. To talk of the risks of over-population with Europe depleted by war, revolution, famine, and disease, and other continents calling out for settlers to occupy their land and develop their industries, is childish folly."

"This Malthusian myth of over-population was exploded long ago, so one through, but it has been resurrected, and is again being made to do service in this anti-social campaign to reduce the birth rate. No one objects to the restriction of the family, but to interfere with the birth of the fit—and this seriously is what is intended—is to invite disaster. Let there be no mistake about it, if the British Empire falls, it will not be for lack of money, as so many seem to fear, but for lack of men, and because its sons and daughters have been influenced by the vapourings of a few sekers after notoriety and have allowed selfish interests to come between them and their duty."

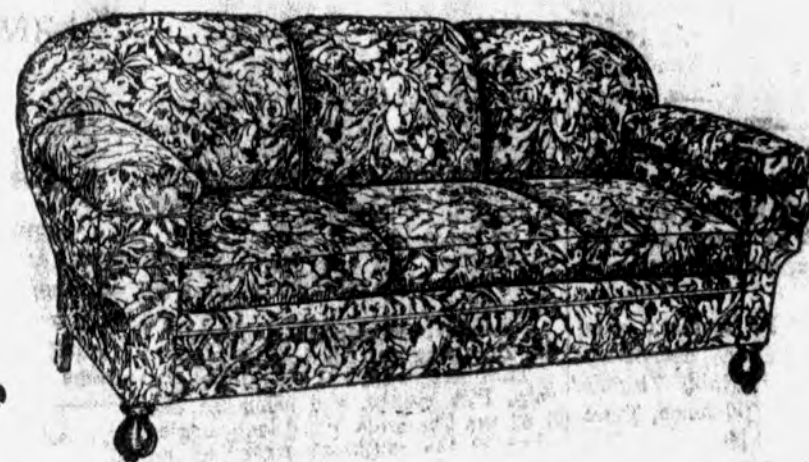

Southern Medical Association Will Meet in Washington

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 5.—At least one special train and countless special cars have been arranged to bring the cream of the medical profession of the south to the seventeenth annual convention of the Southern Medical Association here November 12-15 inclusive. Approximately 2,500 physicians will attend.

The Southern Railway will operate a special train from New Orleans, increasing in size as it nears the Capital City, until it probably becomes two or more sections by the time it reaches Virginia. It will be known as the President's Own Train in honor of Dr. W. C. Leathers, of Jackson, Miss., president of the association, who will travel on it.

Sleepers will be made up at Jackson, Birmingham, Chattanooga, Memphis, Nashville and other points for this train. Kansas City, Mo., will send its delegation in a special car leaving there November 10 and arriving here November 12 at 8 a. m.

The Texans will leave Dallas in a special car for St. Louis where they will join with several others and probably be made up into a special train. Other state delegations are in correspondence with G. P. Loran, general manager of the association, at Birmingham, Ala., relatives to the formation of car parties.

A committee of Washington physicians will meet all trains and welcome the visitors and direct them to their hotels.

The following 16 southern states are represented in the association: Maryland, West Virginia, Virginia, Kentucky, Missouri, Oklahoma, Texas, Arkansas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Tennessee, Alabama, Florida, Georgia, South Carolina, North Carolina and the District of Columbia.

French Diplomacy At Stake In the New Turn Reparations

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—State department advices today indicated that Great Britain Italy and Belgium had reached an accord for a free and full inquiry into the reparations question by experts. The position of these three governments by this decision coincides with the stand taken by the United States in opposing the restricted inquiry for which France is the only country that has held out.

This development indicates an entirely new alliance with the European allies and it is believed that France, too, will accept the unrestricted inquiry rather than risk diplomatic isolation. Heretofore both Belgium and Italy have followed France's lead in regard to the reparations question. Administration spokesmen declined today to indicate the probable attitude of the Washington government in case France maintained her position for a restricted inquiry.
