## FIVE REASONS FOR LIFE SAVING CORPS IN PITT COUNTY

### A. B. Corey Sets Forth Reasons in Most Interesting Manner

Greenville, N. C., November 8, 1923.

Dear Sir:

As chairman of the Life Saving Corps of the Pitt County Chapter of the American Red Cross, and at the solicitation of Mrs. Louisa Hubbard, one time secretary of the local chapter, I am submitting the following showing the benefit of a Life Saving Corps to Pitt County:

#### Five Reasons for Red Cross Life Saving Corps in Pitt County.

The Life Saving Corps of the American Red Cross is one of the most valuable things the Red Cross can really do for a community. Of course, the invaluable assistance it renders along these lines cannot be put down in dollars and cents, but are rather to be put down as an asset in point of value greater than money—as a great human agency working for and with humans for the improvement of these humans along a certain line that is worked by no agency other than the Life Saving Corps of the American Red Cross. The benefits of the Life Saving Corps might well be divided into five divisions, viz:

First. Stimulation of interest in aquatic sports: Through the competitive meets and the offering of prizes to those who show the greatest proficiency and expertness in water sports and in life saving, and thus encouraging the young manhood and womanhood to put forth greater efforts to attain that state of expertness as will give them an edge on their competitors, and the race with the drowning waters in an emergency.

Second. Brings about healthy bodies: There is no sport which gives as good, as cleanly and as healthy exercise as that furnished water sports. All expiration as soon as on the surface of the body is immediately removed by the water, and thus gives to skin a glow not otherwise attained. Then to attain a degree of proficiency and endurance in diving, the diver has to be in good training, must abstain from smoking, drinking, over-eating, late hours and such other bad habits, all of which abstinence insures to a healthy body.

Third. Creates quick thinking and initiative: This phase of life saving is one that might be frequently overlooked for the reason that it is not apparent to the spectators or news-reader. But it is nevertheless, a phase that no member of a life saving corps can afford an oversight. In case of some one about to drown, the would-be-rescuer's mind must function promptly, he must see all surroundings, the best place to take off from, the point at which to land the subject, and the manner in which to handle the subject. And then the most important thing is not to look about to ascertain if some other person is going to the rescue, but to immediately go to the succor of the person in distress. A really true member of the Life Saving Corps is a person of undoubted action and quick thinking.

Fourth. Gives good exercise to its followers: There is no exercise or set of exercises which give the variety of muscle building or strengthening stimulation as swimming and diving. Every muscle in the human body is called into play while swimming and diving. Diving from a spring board or platform gives excellent exercise to the lower limbs, and in doing flips, jack knives and other fancy diving, the muscles of the stomach and back receive quite a deal of attention. While in swimming the muscles of the chest, arms, legs and practically the whole body are called into play. And it is repeated that swimming is a 100 per

ROCKY MOUNT, Nov. 9.—Word has just been received here of the death in China on October 8 of Kan Cheu Nam, president of the Nanyang Brothers Tobacco Company, Limited and said to be one of the foremost figures in the tobacco industry of China.

Mr. Kan was one of the largest stockholders in the China American Tobacco and Trading Company of Rocky Mount of which Captain J. O. W. Gravelly is president. His company in China is said to be among the largest being an active competitor of the British American Tobacco Company. He was known in China as the "Tobacco King of China."

In 1918 Mr. Kan, with his son Kan Sat Hing, visited America and while in this country made an extensive inspection of the North Carolina tobacco manufacturing plants. His concern for years has purchased heavily on the North Carolina tobacco market in the Virginia market also.

The members of the cabinet are in continuous session in Berlin and are determined to protect the republic. It is believed in the capital that Reichswehr will remain loyal to the Central government.

## Armistice Day Celebration Will Be Held Charlotte

CHARLOTTE, Nov. 9—Armistice Day celebration will take place in Charlotte tomorrow according to an announcement made here today by Paul R. Younts, chairman of the committee on arrangements from Hornets Nest Post No. 9, American Legion, which has charge of the celebration. However, two of the features of the celebration will occur tonight with an informal ball at the city auditorium and a formal ball at Myers Park Club.

Tomorrow morning a parade will be held with the national guard companies, American Legion and other organizations represented in the line of march. The parade will be so timed as to be in progress at 11 o'clock. At that hour, the hour of the signing of the Armistice five years ago on Sunday next, the procession will be halted while silent tribute to those who fell will be paid and the memorable occasion of the ending of the war will be called to mind. At midday a number of speakers will address the crowds at the corner of South Tryon and Third street, opposite the court house.

The afternoon program will begin with a luncheon at one o'clock at the manufacture club. At 1:45 there will be auto races at the polo grounds and later an auto polo game. At three o'clock there will be a football game at Wynn Field.

Simultaneous concerts will take place at Independence Park, court house park, and in Dilworth at four o'clock and at 6 o'clock the crowning event of the day's exercises will be a reproduction of a trench battle such as was fought in France will be staged in Myers Park. The exercises will conclude with a dance in the Exposition building tomorrow night.

## Stacey Declines Deanship of Law School University

RALEIGH, Nov. 9—W. P. Stacy, associate justice of the Supreme court, yesterday formally declined election as dean of the Law School of the University of North Carolina. He tendered him by the executive committee of the board of trustees of the institution last Saturday.

His letter, addressed to Governor Morrison, chairman ex-officio of the executive committee, follows: "My dear Governor: "On last Saturday, the executive committee of the trustees of the University of North Carolina honored me with the tender of the deanship of the University Law School. I acknowledge with grateful thanks this expression of confidence and all the tributes it will ever remain as one of the cherished memories and happy recollections of my life. "Mr. B. Mewi cmfwyp shrdl shrdlu which incline me to Chapel Hill; but, after earnest reflection, these it seems to me are outweighed by the cogent reasons why I should remain on the Supreme court bench. This conclusion may not meet with universal approval, but it is the result of my best thought, guided by the lights now before me. "I have an abiding faith in the great mission of the University Law School and a confident hope of its fulfillment. It shall ever have my loyal and enthusiastic support. "With many thanks to you and to the committee whose judgment was committed whose judgment was kind to me, I am, with great respect, "Yours very sincerely, "W. P. STACY." It was stated by members of the executive committee yesterday that no further meeting of the committee will be held for several weeks.

## Reactionary Forces Of Germany in Control of Bavarian Gov.

BERLIN, Nov. 9.—The fifth birthday of German republic finds the forces of reaction in control of the government of Bavaria with Gen. Ludendorff, as commander-in-chief of the army and Adolf Hitler, who proclaimed the overthrow of the state regime, established as his political adviser. Several of the Bavarian ministers including Premier Von Knilling are reported under arrest. The first fragmentary advices from Munich were to the effect that the rebellion was only against the Von Knilling government but as other reports were received the impression grew that the revolt was also aimed at Central government and that leaders of coup had proclaimed the overthrow of the Ebert-Stresemann regime.

## J. E. Winslow Very Much Interested In County Creamery



Sets Forth Facts Essential to Having Successful Dairy Here

A great deal has been said recently about a creamery for this section and as a result some fine ideas are being obtained. To have men like J. E. Winslow speak enthusiastically about the proposition makes it the more important, that every resource be exhausted or have it. A recent interview with Mr. Winslow discloses the following encouraging information:

**Practice, Absolutely Necessary.**  
"Running a successful dairy or creamery is utterly impossible without good permanent pastures. At present have in Beaufort county 75 to 80 acres in permanent pasture, clover, blue grass, orchard grass, lespedeza, etc. Hogs and cows thrive on this pasture without any other food, that is during the main growing season. Our immediate plans, as soon as they can be executed, will give us 300 acres in permanent pasture. Our people just as well become convinced that if they are to have cows they must raise their own feed. Our land will produce it and it is necessary for the maximum success with cows, whether we have the family cow or whether we have a large number for a commercial purpose.

**Proposes an Enlargement.**  
"I am now planning to get enough pastures in so that I can make \$5,000 annually on my cows. This can be done with the same help that it requires to operate my regular farm work. Very little additional help will be necessary to care for these cows. Of course this \$5,000, will go a long way toward caring for the running expenses of the farm. Mr. Winslow is thoroughly interested in the subject and believes it has a great future in this section.

**Present Income.**  
"At the present time, just having common cows and without one penny of expense, I am making from \$25 to \$50 per week by sending cream to Hickory. This amount is coming in just like velvet, my regular force attending to the work.

**Help Delighted With Prospects.**  
"With the help we have, I believe they will catch step and put the project across. I am absolutely counting on my folk to help with the growth of this industry in the county. As soon as my total acreage is completed, I expect to have 100 real good cows, cows that can produce the goods.

**Now the Family Cow.**  
"What I further want" continued Mr. Winslow, "is to see a cow on every farm in Pitt county, a cow on every farm to provide that health-giving food. Every agency should be interested in this matter and talk the value of having a cow on each farm.

**Chamber of Commerce Interested.**  
The Chamber of Commerce has been agitating more cows for the past three years. It is refreshing to know that during this time of educational work several cars of dairy cows have found their way to Pitt county farms. The Pitt County Chamber of Commerce will continue its efforts in behalf of so worthy and worthwhile undertaking.

**Chamber Offer Service.**  
In the event the Chamber of Commerce can assist Pitt county folk in locating good cows to be brought in, please notify Secretary H. L. Smith who will take great pleasure in assisting in every possible manner.

## THE END OF A DYNASTY

That peculiar form of mental aberration which afflicts individuals in authority and leads to their abuse of power, appears to have seized on the coal producers in the anthracite field, if the report of the Federal Trade Commission is to be believed. Despite repeated warnings, in the face of increasing popular anger, notwithstanding immense losses to the trade through the substitution by the public of other fuels, the anthracite oper-

ators, says the report, continue to take an unjustly large profit, thus maintaining the price of anthracite coal at an unreasonably high level.

Coal has been king for many years in the Eastern States, at least, anthracite has had so absolute a sway that the slightest interference with the source of supply has caused immense suffering and led repeatedly to government action in an effort to remedy conditions. In spite of all that has been done or threatened, however, it appears that the anthracite ring is determined to exercise arbitrary power. Instead of heeding the signs of popular unrest, the autocrat defies the nation to do its worst and takes an extra profit. Rather than yield to the pleas of the consumer and lower the price of household fuel, the despot adds the crushing burden of the ordinary citizen and ignores the possibility of revolt.

### Firing Squad Punished 346 British World War

LONDON—Out of the many millions of men which comprised the British army during the late war only 346 officers and men so failed in their duty as to justify their execution by the firing squad.

Three British officers were shot—two for desertion and one for murder. One man was sentenced to death three times, each for desertion. Twice he was reprieved but he could not stand the welter of blood and mud of the trenches so he deserted again and the third time he was shot.

Forty other men, after being sentenced to death were reprieved only to offend again and be shot. In 166 cases the offence against the military code was desertion, thought 37 men were executed for murder. Eighteen were shot for cowardice, three for mutiny and two for sleeping on duty. In all, 3,080 death sentences were passed.

BERLIN, Nov. 9.—General Ludendorff and Adolph Hitler leaders of Bavarian revolt have been captured by Federal troops.

### LARGE SUPPLIES OF COTTON EXPECTED FROM THE SUDAN

MANCHESTER.—The growing of the American type of cotton in the Gezira area of the Sudan is developing rapidly and the output next year, it is estimated, will be double that of last, while in 15 years time the Sudan will be producing a million bales of cotton a year.

These statements were made recently in London by Major-General Sir L. O. F. C. Stack, Governor General of the Sudan, who explained that the increased production would result from new development work, including the construction of a dam across the Nile which would bring an additional 30,000 acres of cotton under cultivation.
