METHODISTS HOLD
FINE CONFERENCE
IN ELIZABETH CITYBishop Collins Denny of
Richmond, Presiding
Over the Sessions

The North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Episcopal church, South, convened in the Elizabeth City Methodist church today for its 88 annual session with Bishop Collins Denny of Richmond, Va., presiding.

Rev. V. P. Scoville, the local pastor left yesterday for the conference carrying with him a splendid report from the local church.

When the conference assembled today more than 400 preachers and lay delegates were in attendance with many visitors. This is the fourth session of the conference held in Elizabeth City but the first since 1910. An illustration of the growth of the conference during the intervening years since its earlier meetings is seen in the fact that in 1895 when its session was held in Elizabeth City it represented a membership of 63,310 while this year's conference will represent a membership of more than 100,000.

Matters of organization and business routine took up most of the time at the opening session today. The chief interest this year is expected to center around the opening work of the endowment plan which is expected to raise ten million dollars as an endowment fund for aged preachers and their dependents. Bishop U. V. W. Darlington, who for four years presided over the conference, will present the plan to the delegates and laymen.

Rev. R. H. Willis was re-elected conference secretary. Rev. T. M. Grant and Rev. W. H. Brown were elected assistant secretaries and Rev. Rufus Bradley was elected conference statistical secretary.

Announcement was made of the transfer to the conference of Rev. E. L. Hendricks from the North Georgia conference and Reverends H. M. Wellman, M. G. Ervine, J. A. Snow, W. L. Dawson, Jr., and W. F. Elliott from the Western North Carolina conference.

Nest Sunday, the last day of the conference, all the pulpits of the local churches will be filled by ministers attending the conference. Sunday afternoon a memorial service for those who have died during the past year will be held, these being the Rev. G. D. Langston and the Rev. H. E. Tripp, and Dr. T. N. Ivey, late editor of the Nashville Christian Advocate.

Appointments of the conference are expected to be made public next Monday morning. Nearly three hundred men will learn what assignments have been made for them for the next year and it is said that many important changes in the field will take place.

The North Carolina Conference has been outgrown by its offspring, the Western North Carolina Conference, but it still is among the larger of 48 conferences in Southern Methodism. The roll shows 252 traveling preachers, 92 local preachers, 22 of whom are serving as supply pastors, and 14 young preachers on trial and not yet admitted to the traveling connection. There are 72 lay delegates who have the privilege of the floor at the conference. Under the Methodist plan of organization many laymen attend the conference as committeemen without having privileges.

FORBES DECLARES
MORTIMER A LIAR

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14.—Piecing out the details in denying the charges against him former director of the veterans bureau, Forbes, put new thrills into the veterans bureau investigating committee by flatly contradicting the testimony offered by several previous witnesses. He passed the "lie" straight to E. H. Mortimer, of Philadelphia, who had testified that under Forbes administration confidential information had been furnished certain contractors regarding hospital sites.

"If Mortimer states that," said Mr. Forbes, "he states a lie" then turning to Mortimer he said, "Mortimer you laugh."

"Chairman Reed of the committee interposed, 'You are testifying to the committee and it is not necessary for you to address other persons.'" Forbes also flatly contradicted the testimony of Dr. Charles E. Sawyer, personal friend and physician of the late President Harding. Sawyer had told the committee that Forbes had been fired by Harding because he failed to obey his orders by refusing to stop certain surplus property sales at Perryville, Md., but the former director declared that Harding had given him authority to release loaded cars after the first stop order had been issued.

Council Takes No
Action Return Of
Ex-Crown Prince

PARIS, Nov. 14.—The Allied Council of Ambassadors failed to consider at the meeting today the question of what action should be taken concerning the return of Ex-Crown Prince Frederick William to Germany and the German attitude regarding the resumption of allied military control.

The session was taken up with routine matters and it is understood that the ambassadors avoided mentioning these questions because the allies were not in accord as to the action to be taken. Great Britain who in the beginning took the initiative step by sending a note to Germany protesting the return of the exile is now understood to be desirous of dropping the whole matter while France who at first was indifferent in the matter later favored the protest and is now ready for such action as should be taken.

Wheat Commission
Advocated by Wallace

CHICAGO, Nov. 14.—A wheat commission plan to handle the American surplus of wheat on foreign markets was advanced by Henry G. Wallace, secretary of agriculture, at a meeting of the chamber of commerce here today. Such a commission and the tariff stated Mr. Wallace will greatly aid the wheat farmers and help to raise the price of wheat in this country. He said, however, that price fixing must be avoided and government interference with the elements of supply and demand would greatly hamper the readjustment.

Opening Session

TAMPA, FLA., Nov. 14.—Delegates from six southeastern states will attend the annual convention of the National Electric Light Association here Nov. 19-22, inclusive. The organization embraces representatives from virtually every electric lighting company in the Carolinas, Tennessee, Georgia, Alabama and Florida.

One general session is scheduled for each day of the convention, with sectional meeting for technical discussion.

Discussion of the electrical business will feature the opening session of the convention, with reports of association officers and an address by S. A. Chase, of New York, on "Getting the electrical idea to the public."

Public relations, of which section P. S. Arkwright, of the Georgia Railway and Power Company of Atlanta, is president, will be dealt with at the second general session. "Accident Prevention" will be discussed by C. B. Scott, chairman of the National Safety committee of New York, as the third day feature. H. H. Atkinson, of Atlanta discussing interconnecting transmission systems in the southeast, and M. H. Aylesworth and H. H. Bump, of New York, also are on the program.

The final general session, Thursday, will close with the election of officers. Speakers listed for this date include F. H. Burr, chairman of the Florida utilities commission; A. J. Maxwell, chairman of the North Carolina corporation commission, and F. M. Felker, vice president of the Society for Electrical Development.

Alabama Man Slays

TUSCALOOSA, ALA., Nov. 14.—Irene Currely of Bissemas, Ala., was named by solicitor E. L. Clarkson, as the woman who was slain and her body partly cremated in a fire which destroyed a negro church near here on October 30. Announcement of the identification came at the opening of a preliminary hearing of F. W. Winchester on the charge of murder in connection with the death of the woman. She was also known as Irene Hughes the solicitor said. Tuscaloosa county and city officials were aided in solving the mystery, surrounding the slaying of the woman by Jefferson county officials. Officials of both counties were agreed as to the identity of the victim and said that they were prepared to establish identity in court. Portions of the body were found among the ashes of a negro church in an isolated section near the city. Authorities after examination stated that the remains proved to be that of a youthful woman of the white race.

Business Depression
Causes the Rumanian
Factories To Close

BUCHAREST, Rumania.—Despite its natural resources of wealth, Rumania today is in the midst of an acute economic crisis. A local newspaper, Universal, says "the internal situation is grave, especially in relation to economic and financial affairs. Large industrial enterprises, even including the oil interests, are reducing their working forces at the approach of winter. Factories are closing because they find difficulty in collecting the payments due them, and the export of wheat has been reduced to negligible proportions, in spite of recent efforts of the government to stimulate exportation."

One reason for the existing situation is the low purchasing value of the lei, which has fallen lower than the currency of any of the Balkan states.

Kansas Newspaper Will Publish Bible As Continued Story

TOPEKA, KAN.—A test of more than a year having proven the popularity of publishing the New Testament in serial form as a weekly feature, the Topeka State Journal, among the few if not the first newspapers in the United States to attempt such an innovation, has announced its plan to continue the series by printing the entire Bible in a "continued story" form.

The compilation has been prepared by Dr. Charles M. Sheldon, widely known Topeka minister and author and editor of the Christian Herald of New York. It was on Dr. Sheldon's suggestion that the New Testament serial was started by The Journal. The new serial will be known as "The Everyday Bible." It is condensed form, all passages of a controversial nature or such as might be considered objectionable for public reading being eliminated. The main historical data and teachings remain.

"This form of the Bible is designed for the newspaper reader who has not the time nor perhaps the inclination to read the Bible in its entirety," said Arthur J. Garruth, Jr., manager of The Journal. "It is really a busy man's Bible, told in interesting story form."

"The printing of the New Testament in serial form has aroused interest all over the English speaking world. We have letters from every state in the Union; from many parts of Canada, from Australia and from England. Several British newspapers not only inquired about the success of the undertaking but indicated their intention of adopting a like plan."

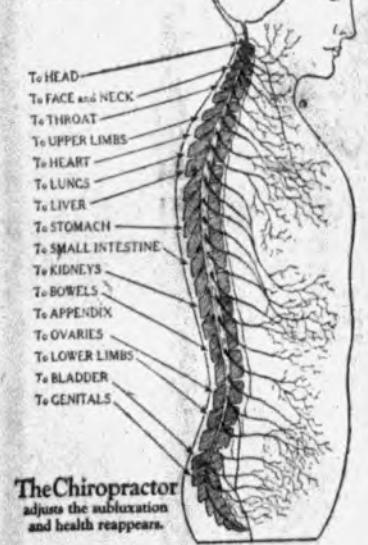

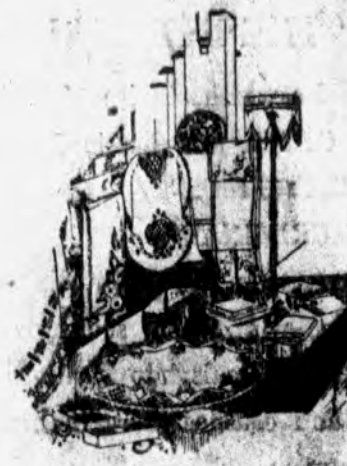

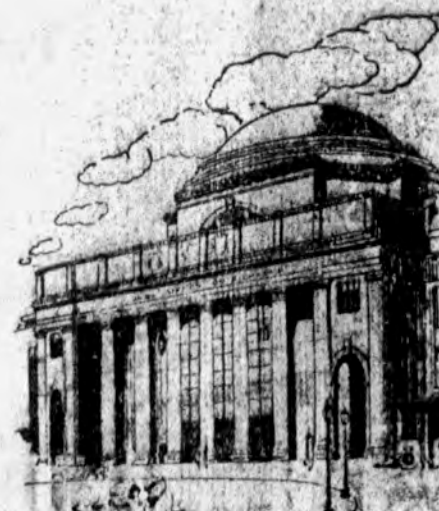
