BOILER EXPLODES NEAR STANTONBURG TWO ARE KILLED

Four Others Painfully Injured Are Now In Hospital

STANTONBURG, N. C., Nov. 23.—One man was instantly killed, another so badly injured that he died shortly after reaching a Wilson hospital, and four others were painfully scalded when a boiler of a steam shovel on the Norfolk Southern Railroad exploded near here yesterday afternoon.

The dead: J. E. Lan, Edenton N. C., and James Thomas, Jack on Springs, N. C. The injured are: W. R. Wingate, Ivey Cooper, John Proctor, all white men, and John Ward, negro. The cause of the explosion is being investigated by railroad officials.

M. McIver Center U. N. C. Football Team Great Athlete

CHAPEL HILL, Nov. 23.—Herman Martin, McIver, center on the University of North Carolina varsity eleven, is a versatile athlete. In him the Fetzer have a man who can play equally well at center and at tackle. This year he is playing center.

This year he started off at tackle with Robinson at center, but soon after the season opened the coaches shifted him to the pivot position and announced that in the future he and Robinson would alternate at center. About that time Robinson was injured and since then McIver has played pretty steadily at center. It is fairly safe to say he will start at that position when Carolina meets Virginia Thanksgiving day.

McIver was the only sophomore to land a berth on the southern championship team last year. He is one of the strongest men in the line on both offense and defense. Last Saturday's game with Davidson provides a good example of that. Just before the final whistle blew in the last quarter, with the ball on Carolina's six yard line, Davidson was thrown for a loss when Wildcat attempted a play through center. That is typical of the sort of football he played throughout the game.

McIver is a Chapel Hill boy. Four years he played center on the Chapel Hill high school team. During that time Chapel Hill was state champion twice, was runnerup the other two years and lost only two games. He also is a member of the University's varsity track squad.

This year McIver is a junior, which means he will be available for the Carolina team of next season. He is vice president of his class. Modest and unassuming, he is one of the most popular men on the campus. Incidentally, he is working his way through the University.

Berlin Doubts Cop's Tears in the Jackie Coogan Picture

BERLIN.—The weeping policeman in Jackie Coogan's film, "My Boy," is too much for German imagination. The German film fans know that a German policeman couldn't weep and are very skeptical about the ability of an American "cop" to shed tears. They even doubt whether one of the brass-buttoned bluecoats across the Atlantic could be moved to tears by Jackie Coogan's many trials and tribulations.

If the policeman in America are as tender-hearted as the big fellow who weeps when he is forced to arrest Jackie Coogan for law-breaking, one of the Berlin newspapers says it must be a fine place for criminals.

But the weeping American policeman doesn't keep the crowds away from "My Boy," and thousands of German women are going to see Jack again and again for the purpose of having a good cry over his plight. Some of the film critics have some hard things to say about American sentimentality, but the German public seems to enjoy it, immensely.

Society Beauty Sails; Divorce Rumored

Council Religious Interests Named New Organization

TRINITY COLLEGE, DURHAM, N. C., Nov. 23.—The Council of Religious Interests is the name of a new organization at Trinity which is an executive body made up of officers of the Y. M. C. A., Y. W. C. A., Volunteer Band, and Ministerial Band; as well as the officers of the Bible classes in the various churches in Durham, and faculty committee on student life.

At the recent formation of the organization the following officers were elected: Chairman, Prof. James Cannon, Ill., of the department of Religious Training; Vice-Chairman, W. A. Kale, president of the Student Volunteer Band; Secretary, Miss Mary King Ellison, vice-president of the Y. M. C. A. The executive committee is composed of the presidents of the four religious organizations at the college, Y. M. C. A., Y. W. C. A., volunteer band, and ministerial band.

The purpose of the organization is to correlate the work of the various religious organizations and to prevent duplication of such work.

Boys Best By Test Do Well in Business

EVANSTON, Ill.—Standard intelligence tests given three and one half years ago to 111 boys under 18 years of age, employed by one of the largest American industries, and who were re-examined in another year, evidence the fact that boys making high scores are more likely than others to become permanent employees.

These are the conclusions of Walter Dill Scott, president of Northwestern University, and Robert C. Clothier, Haverford School for Boys, who conducted the experiment. Each boy was tested and the charts filed away, and no attention was paid to them as each boy went his way, succeeding or failing according to the merit of his work.

Guard Against Flat Jumpers

Berlin, Nov. 23.—Apartments are so scarce in Berlin these days that, when people do move, they are most careful never to leave their premises empty for a moment. Flats are liable to be "jumped" by designing persons who operate much as did claim jumping in the mining sections of America: get possession, and then fight it out afterwards.

Cement Shipments Increase

WASHINGTON.—An index of building activity, and consequently of business in general, is shown in production and shipments of Portland cement for the first nine months of this year. September production was a record. Shipments also exceeded those of the first nine months of last year.

WALTON INDICTED SEVERAL COUNTS

OKLAHOMA CITY, OKLA., Nov. 23.—J. A. Walton removed from office as governor last Monday was indicted by the Oklahoma county grand jury here today on seven counts. All but one count charges diversion of public funds. Dr. E. A. Daveport, state health commissioner and T. P. Edwards, personal chauffeur to the former executive were also indicted on five counts each, charging diversion of public moneys. Bonds were fixed at \$6,700. All the indictments against Walton allege a felony except one that of intimidating an officer of the state.

Woman Party Worker Sees Sweeping Victory For Democrats In 1924

ATLANTA, Nov. 23.—The political pendulum will swing back to the democratic party next year said Mrs. Benton McMillan, Nashville, Tenn., prominently identified with party activities here today. Mrs. McMillan pointed out that the election was less a year off and "it is going to be a democratic year." "The eyes are upon the women of the party," she declared and there will be no faltering in making the women's branch of the party organization effective. She stated that the women of the country were against "doling out political patronage for campaign contributions; flagrant disregard of the civil service laws and the return to the spoils system. Women favored, she asserted, "the peace of the world; judicious child labor laws, revision of the tariff downward and strict enforcement of laws. We stand for recognition as an integral part of the democratic organization, and not as an ornamental or silent partner."

Former S. C. Governor Accused In Failure Of Bank On Trial

CHARLESTON, Nov. 23.—The trial of W. J. Harvey, former governor of South Carolina charged with violating the state banking laws in connection with the operation of the Enterprise bank here of which he was president opened here today in the court of general sessions. Judge I. W. Bowman, presiding. Many spectators were on hand.

France and Belgium Always In Accord On Ruhr Problems

PARIS, Nov. 23.—Premier Poincare began his statement on foreign affairs in the chamber of deputies today with the declaration that France and Belgium had been always in accord on the Ruhr problem. He declared that no differences ever existed between Paris and Brussels on the subject.

American Artists Turning to Portraits And Figures Now

CHICAGO.—The paintings of today are doing more figure and portrait work and apparently getting away from the pure landscape as indicated in the present exhibition at the Art Institute here of American painting, and sculptures, in which is represented the works of artists and sculptors from all parts of the United States.

Another notable absence in the 292 pieces of art selected for the exhibition, in the opinion of the jury, is any marked influence of the so-called modern or post-impressionistic school. While many of the paintings show a progressive broadening of treatment and technique, at the same time there are none that speak an unintelligible language.

"A comparison of the paintings of today with the work of the masters of one or two centuries ago, shows that our artists are using much brighter colors and many more of them," members of the jury declare. "They are painting in a much higher key which is said to be an indication of joyousness. If so, it is a good sign, for the world today needs all the joy it can possibly assimilate." There were more works of art submitted by eastern artists for the annual exhibition than by artists of the west and mid-west. Forty-two of the pieces exhibited are sculpture.

SHARP QUAKE FELT NEAR TOKIO, FOLKS FLEE IN TERROR

TOKIO, Nov. 23.—A sharp earthquake was felt here at 11:30 this morning. There was no damage according to reports, but the people rushed into the streets in terror. The tremor centered about 225 miles west of Tokio and lasted three minutes. Many people have left the city or taken other precaution for fear of another tremor, which it was said by some to be due this week.

Twenty-Sixth Annual Meeting U. S. Service Elevens Saturday

NEW YORK, Nov. 23.—The twenty-sixth annual meeting of Uncle Sam's service elevens at the Polo Grounds tomorrow afternoon, will bring together two of the sturdiest combinations ever to represent the respective schools notwithstanding the fact the Cadets have suffered two defeats and the Middies one defeat and one tie.

On their season's records to date Army shows to an advantage in the offensive phase of the game, while Navy holds a slight edge in defensive play.

The Cadets have rolled up a total of more than 200 points in games played thus far, with the 73 to 0 count against Lebanon Valley as the largest single contribution to this point total, whereas a half hundred points have been scored against them. The Middies total is 155 points for, and 48 points against. The 61 to 0 victory over St. Xavier was the largest single contribution to the point total.

A review of Army games discloses that the Cadet attack has produced one or more touchdowns against all foes except Notre Dame. The Middies did not score touchdowns against either Penn State or Princeton. The Cadet defense however has yielded seven touchdowns and one field goal; whereas the Middle defense has yielded six touchdowns and two field goals.

Literal Translations Often Bring Forth Ridiculous Ideas

WASHINGTON.—"Harness full of bugs, for a bachelor horse," was the true literal translation for a single horse buggy harness, which a Spanish translator used in an American exporter's advertisement according to the department of commerce. The department used that as an illustration of how faulty and incorrect translations of circulars and advertisements not only fail to convey the meaning intended, but frequently make a company ridiculous in the eyes of prospective purchasers.

Other translations have been as ridiculous, the department says. Vacuum cleaners have been made "cleaners of emptiness," monkey-wrenches, "wrenches for monkeys," and iron washers, "machines to clean iron."

UNITED STATES DROPS TO 6TH PLACE WORLD SHIPBUILDING

Washington.—The United States has dropped from first to sixth place among the shipbuilding nations of the world in the last four years, the department of commerce states. Not only Great Britain and Germany but also Italy, France and the Netherlands are building more tonnage than the United States, according to returns for the quarter ended with September. World construction at the close of that quarter was smaller than at any time since the war and represents a decile of 165,000 gross tons in comparison with the quarter ended with June.

CROKER'S SON WINS SUIT FROM WIDOW

A jury in a New York court has decided in favor of Richard Croker, Jr., in his suit against his stepmother, the "Indian Princess" bride of the late Tammany leader, for \$160,000. The suit was brought by young Croker in behalf of his sister Ethel, and his brother Howard. He charged that his father failed to keep an agreement by which the older Croker was to give \$75,000 each to Ethel and Howard on the promise of Richard, Jr., to give a like amount. The verdict of \$160,000 includes interest.

Literary Societies High School In Interesting Debate

The literary societies of the Greenville High School held two interesting debates yesterday afternoon. The query of the Senior class was "Whether Lady Macbeth did or did not faint." The query of the Junior class was "Whether the Postal Savings Bank should or should not be established in the United States." The negative side won in both debates.

The two sides of the Senior class were represented by negative, Clifton Duke, and Esther Wayne. Affirmative, D. S. Smith and Henry Fleming. The Junior class affirmative, Gertrude Gagey, Annie Turner; negative, Bessie Summrell and Ruth Gardner.

The Senior class has been studying Shakespeare's "Macbeth," and the argument over Lady Macbeth resulted in the debate.

U. S. Marshal In S. C. Quits, Ending Quarrel

WASHINGTON, Nov. 23.—President Coolidge has received and accepted the resignation of Joseph Culvert as United States marshal for the western district of South Carolina thereby ending a controversy which raged in the last senate over Culvert's confirmation and over the reappointment given him by President Harding, after he had failed of confirmation.

E. F. Cochran, was given a recess appointment today by President Coolidge to be United States district judge of the eastern district of South Carolina. He succeeds Judge H. M. Cobb, who has retired from the bench.

Credits Red-Heads With Perseverance, Ambition

BERKELEY, Cal.—Red-haired persons make the best explorers and conquerors, contends Herbert E. Bolton, professor of American history at the University of California. He credits them with great initiative and persevering ambition.

The professor cites in support of his theory Columbus, Pedro de Alvarado, the most noted of Cortes' assistants, and O'Connor, prominent in the expansion of the American southwest, all were graced with red hair.

Professor Bolton recalls that recently a tribe of cannibals, in the South Sea Islands, killed all but one of a group of explorers. The one man spared had red hair, which the primitive mind took for a symbol of extraordinary power. Underwood Scores Foreign Polick G. O. P. Administration

ATLANTA, Nov. 23.—The republican administration was criticized for its foreign policy here today by Senator Oscar W. Underwood, Alabama, in an address before the Georgia legislature.

"It is a significant fact," he declared, "not since the days when Franklin represented our government at Versailles that the United States has almost been without diplomatic influence in European affairs."

Falkland Highs Defeat Fountain In Two Games

FALKLAND, Nov. 23.—On Tuesday afternoon, Nov. 20, a double-header was staged on the Fountain High School basketball court when the boys' and girls' teams from Falkland met the Fountain teams in two interesting games. The scores stood 9-8 in favor of the Falkland boys, and 18-0 in favor of the Falkland girls. The contest was marked throughout by clean, quick playing and excellent sportsmanship — for which both schools are to be congratulated.

Restoration of Royal Palace Uncovers Valuable Paintings

Warsaw, Nov. 23.—During the restoration of the Warsaw royal palace, dating from 1632, beautiful mural paintings of the 18th century have been discovered hidden beneath papers and tapestries put on the walls during the Russian occupation of Warsaw. The paintings are of the Italian school and of great artistic value. Every endeavor is being made to restore them completely. No clue yet has been found as to the identity of the painter.

STEAMSHIP AGENT CHARGED WITH DEFRAUDING EMIGRANTS

BUCHAREST.—A sensation was caused here by the arrest of the Bucharest agents of the Baltic American Line. They were charged with selling to emigrants third class passages from Hamburg to New York as first class—charging first class rates—and thereby making an additional profit of some 8,000 lei on each ticket so sold.

RESULTS STATE EMIGRATION DISAPPOINTING GREAT BRITAIN

LONDON.—The results of state emigration, for which the government designed a scheme of assisted passages to the dominions, has been very disappointing, according to Lieutenant-Colonel Buckley, chairman of the Overseas Settlement committee. Up to September 30 a total of 31,000 government assisted emigrants had left Great Britain under the scheme.

DENTIST HELD BY POLICE IN GIGANTIC JEWEL, BOND THEFT

Search of Safe Deposit Boxes, Home Reveals Part of Loot

CHICAGO, Nov. 23.—While the grand jury was seeking information behind the jewel and bond robbery involving millions, the authorities are endeavoring to solve the finding of a \$5,000 bond, hidden in a safe deposit box in a house owned by a Dr. Brown, dentist, held in connection with the robbery.

Four other houses said to belong to Brown are to be searched and the authorities will obtain legal process to open safe deposit boxes in banks and trust companies where most of the loot is believed to be secreted.

One piece of jewel said to be worth more than \$2,000 was found in a face powder box in the vaults of a bank at Antioch, Ill. In addition 6,100 in war saving stamps were found in the home of the dentist at Antioch, police said.

A former business associate of Brown's was taken into custody today for questioning, police announced.

Bonner Dark Horse Of U. N. C. Varsity Football Team

CHAPEL HILL, Nov. 23.—Marle Dumont Bonner, halfback, has proved to be the dark horse of the University of North Carolina varsity football team.

"The University students call him 'Rabbit' and no name could better describe his flashy work on the gridiron and baseball diamond. His development has been phenomenal. Last year as a substitute he demonstrated he had the qualities of a corner and this fall he got his real chance.

Bonner is one of those fellows who has to be watched every minute by the opposing team and even then he will get away every now and then. His greatest asset is speed. He gets started like a hurricane and aided with the Fetzer system of interference he is hard to stop.

In the art of side-stepping, twirling, dodging and squirming he is a past master. As a broken field runner he reminds one of "Big Bill" Folger, whose 48-yard run at Richmond back in 1916 put the University on the victory side of the ledger for the first time in ten years in games with the University of Virginia.

Bonner, University student, believe is likely to get away with just such a run when Carolina plays Virginia at Chapel Hill this Thanksgiving. He got loose for 65 yards in the the South Carolina game and for 25 yards in the V. M. I. contest. His work in the other games has been the same flashy sort that went for gains.

"Rabbit" is a short heavy set fellow. In weight he is only 45 pounds, and that is about his only handicap as a varsity back. He is 22 years old and is five feet seven inches in height.

Chicago Clothing Workers Insured Against Idleness

CHICAGO.—Payment of benefits to clothing workers in Chicago, insured against unemployment in an agreement between the workers and large manufacturers here, will begin about January 1, according to Dr. Willard E. Hotchkiss, director of the National Industrial Federation of Clothing manufacturers.

Approximately 35,000 clothing workers in Chicago are affected by the agreement, which has for its object the protection of the clothing workers who are out of employment because of circumstances over which they have no control. It will be in effect for two years, and is believed the first of its kind. The benefits are to be paid from a trust fund established jointly, the worker contributing one and one-half percent of his wage and the employer a like amount.

WANT COOLIDGE TO SPEAK OUT

President Coolidge's "silence" regarding governmental problems which are the subject of discussion and worry all over the country has begun to irk certain Republican politicians and not a few Republican newspapers. They are becoming persuaded that this reticence is being interpreted by the people as due to Mr. Coolidge's want of initiative at a time when imagination and aggressiveness are especially requisite.

Upon several important problems which the President has consented to talk, it is declared, he has spoken with so many qualifications that his utterances have had no positive value. In such instances, it is reported, Republican politicians are saying, his speech has been only a little less disadvantageous to his party than

his silence.

Democrats are commenting that the problems which the President faces are not new to him and should not require the time and study which he is said to be devoting to them. As vice president, democrats point out, Mr. Coolidge was consulted by President Harding, along with the members of the cabinet, in respect to every important concern of the Harding administration. Among the big problems regarding which President Harding consulted Mr. Coolidge were the condition of agriculture, the equalization of freight rates, the reduction of taxes, the collection of the foreign debt, the modification of the tariff—especially on sugar—and notably the World Court.

When President Harding was studying these questions he had the help of all the several agencies of the government. The department of agriculture, commerce and state, the treasury, interstate commerce commission, etc. provided him with data and advice which were presented also to the cabinet and presumably to the vice president, democrats remark. There is a widespread belief among politicians of both the big parties that Mr. Coolidge has had a fair opportunity to formulate some policy with respect to these urgent issues and should therefore take the public into his confidence.

It has been suggested as an explanation of the president's silence that he is withholding his views on all the major problems before him so that he may not anticipate his message to the forthcoming congress. The democratic reply to this statement is that when he was being pressed to do something for the wheat growers and was urged to call an extra session of congress to deal with this situation, he is reported to have replied that the proponents of that plan should first devise an effective remedy.

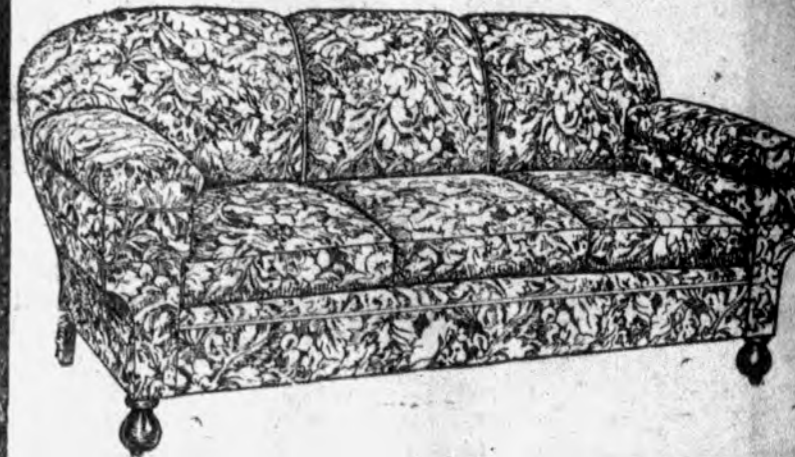

Woman Is Mentally Superior To Man Up To 25, Says College

TUCSON, Ariz. — Women under 25 years of age are more intelligent than men of the same age, but after the 25th year men gradually pass women and attain a higher mental efficiency, according to statistics compiled in the administrative and educational departments of the University of Arizona.

The university cites its local statistics to show that the average scholastic standing for women students was considerably above the general university average, while the average for men was lower than the general average of all persons enrolled. The standings were:

General university average: 1.66 per cent.
Women: 1.96.
Men: 1.50.

Professor Alva C. Neal, university registrar and professor of rural education, contends that high school and college girls usually show more aptitude for study than high school and college boys. A 14-year-old high school girl, he says, is the mental equal of a boy of 16, in line with the condition that most women equal in intelligence men two years their senior until the women reach their 25th

year. Professor Neal attributes this to the longer period of infancy in men. Women mature more rapidly, he points out, but when men become developed completely they benefit by the increased preparation of the long adolescence. Thus men as adults attain more.

He sees another factor in women's lack of necessity for competition. From this point of view, they "have suffered from too much protection." In biology, he explains, it is shown that protected animals, those that do not have to rely on their own powers to meet adverse conditions, fail to reach the high state of development attained by those forging ahead single-handed and fighting past obstacles.

In the past, he recalls, women have led a sheltered life, and therefore men, having all the opportunities, attained their supposed mental superiority. Today he sees conditions changing. With women entering the professions in continually greater numbers, competing with men in business, and "succeeding as well as men," he predicts that "men will have to step fast to maintain their standard of mental superiority over women after the age of maturity."

Eventually women may be the mental superior of men throughout life, the professor hazards.

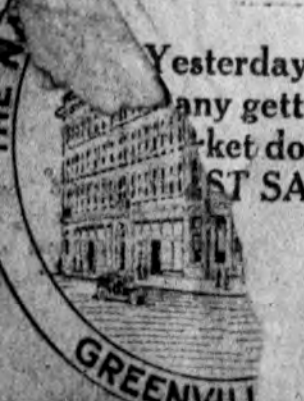

Nuns of Far Tibet Devote Their Lives To Nursing the Sick

TIENTSIN.—Miles beyond the ramparts of snowy peaks separating the two Buddhist states of Sikkim and Tibet, among the crags of the mountains that rise from the arid plains north of Gyantse, little white specks nestle in the cliffs. These are the abode of the nuns of the Goddess Dolma, "She who hears the cries of all the world."

The Goddess Dolma is the Buddhist counterpart of the Virgin Mary of the Christians. Her unsexed form forsake the world and all its pleasures and, dressed in red cloaks, barefooted with shaved heads, they go about relieving pain and sorrow. Their fare is frugal and their lives bare of material comforts.

A ball tolls. It is the call of some distressed person for assistance, perhaps miles away. The nuns gather. An old abbess, kindly and skillful in

administration from long experience in ministering to mankind, directs the nuns to their duties. With a little food and staff, to aid them in climbing up and down the mountains the nuns go forth to where duty calls. Their duties performed they return, weary and worn, but happy, to await the next call.

The paths the nuns take are beset by many dangers. Wild animals are everywhere. Storms beat down on them, but they are brave. They sleep in the open while on journeys. Stones are their pillows and the sky their only covering. Birds seem to sense

there is no danger, and follow the nuns to be fed.

The nuns know nothing of the great world outside their mountain fastness, except what an occasional white traveler tells them. Such visitors are accorded every courtesy, and eagerly besought for tales of other countries. In departing they receive the blessing of these good folk.

The Dalai Lama, head of the sect in Tibet and believed to be the reincarnation of the Lord Buddha once made a trip to India to see the Great

Lord Saheb (Curzon). But even for the Dalai Lama such countries as England and America have no existence, except in the strange stories of occasional sojourners.

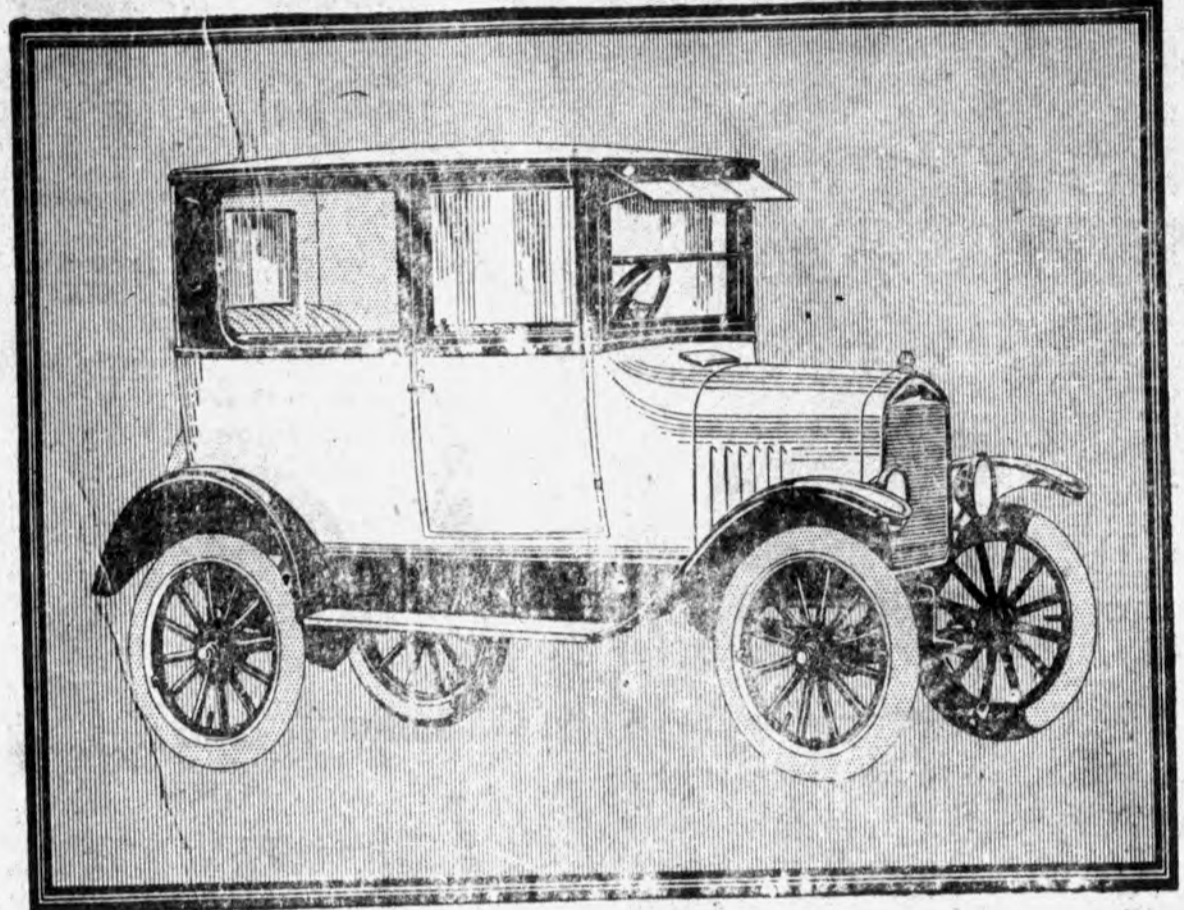
