PROGRESSIVE BLOC TIES REPUBLICANS HANDS IN CONGRESS

Fail To Elect Gillett As Speaker After 6 Bal- lots; Fight Rages

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4.—Another ballot in an effort to break the deadlock caused by the insurgent bloc and elect a speaker of the House failed today. On the fifth ballot Representative Gillett and Representative Garrett, Tennessee, democrat, each received 197 votes; Cooper 17 and Madden 5. There was no election on the sixth ballot. The vote stood, Gillett, 195; Garrett, 197; Cooper 17. Garrett lacks 11 votes of election.

The insurgent bloc has tied the hands of the new congress by refusing to support Gillett for speaker. Leaders of the insurgents declare they are prepared to carry forward their opposition indefinitely.

Compromise Talked.
Many reports of compromise are heard. Insurgents meet such statements with the declaration that they are as far apart from the Gillett supporters as ever. Gillett, the choice of the republicans and Garrett, the choice of the democrats, were almost equal in today's balloting. The total of each remained about 10 of the necessary majority. The bulk of the insurgents strength is for Cooper of Wisconsin.

Representative Longworth floor leader, has indicated no disposition to yield. In the meantime both sides are marshaling forces for a renewal of the conflict.

The senate is ready to proceed to business, but the deadlock in the house has added the indefinite postponement of President Coolidge's first annual message to congress, which he was expected to deliver in person, tomorrow.

Other Precedents.
The situation developed today in the House by the Speakership row has two precedents.

The first was in the Thirty-Sixth congress, the House taking 54 ballots between December 5, 1859, and February 1, 1860, before the deadlock was broken.

Spectacular Fight.
The second was in the fifty-second congress, which convened in 1891. The House failed to organize on the first day, but elected a Speaker on the second day of its session.

Probably the most spectacular fight ever waged in the House was that in 1910 which resulted in the shearing of many powers from Speaker Cannon.

"Our system of municipal government," stated Mr. Bryan, "is by no means a good business government, generally speaking but the municipalities are making some progress and the counties are in the main doing business under the same antiquated system established long ago, when there was little public business."

Industry Hampered By False Social Ideals, Engineers Society Told

NEW YORK, Dec. 4.—False social ideals are hampering industry and the dominance of the lawyer is hampering political development in this country, John L. Harrington, of Kansas City, Mo., president of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers told that body.

"Our country," he said, "is still governed by the military and the legal professions, influenced somewhat by the business man. The lawyer not only occupies his peculiar field, the judiciary, but dominates in the legislative and in the executive branches of the government."

RUM SMUGGLING HUGE CRIMINAL PROBLEM, SAYS U. S. GENERAL; WAR FRAUDS REVIEWED IN REPORT

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4.—Litigation over violations of federal laws on the increase in the United States according to the annual report of Attorney General Daugherty made today to congress.

In a volume replete with statistics of the government's work in law enforcement, against criminals ranging from big business to bootleggers, the Attorney General and his staff detailed increase in prosecutions, civil as well as criminal, running the gamut of the federal statutes. Increases in convictions also were recited in the story of the vast work of the department of justice to secure observance of the law.

Enforcing Dry Laws.
Prohibition cases formed a large part of the department's work but there were large increases also in prosecuting violations of white slave, tax, public land, postal, banking and other federal regulations. Activity also was reported in pressing the war frauds case.

New Safety Device Will Decrease Rail Accident, Report

CHICAGO, Dec. 4.—New safety device that will automatically stop a speeding train against which a block has been set even though the engineer may not be in the cab, was announced by officials of the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific Railway Company, who have installed the device on its double track main line between Chicago and Rock Island, Illinois.

The appliance, known as the Reagan device, railroad officials declared, makes the operation of trains 100 per cent safe as far as the danger of collision is concerned.

Charges Against the Police Ruled Out In The Trial of Enoch

RICHMOND, VA., Dec. 4.—Declaring that the testimony concerning alleged police methods in obtaining a confession from Joseph Enoch reads like a page from the Spanish Inquisition, Judge Richardson in Hustings court here today, refused to allow the document in evidence in the trial of Enoch for the alleged slaying of Celia Savick, April last. The court said it was easy to understand why Enoch would sign such a statement in the circumstances.

British Politicians Bring U. S. Tariff Into Fight

LONDON, Dec. 4.—The United States, as an object lesson, comes often into the lecture speeches than any other country in references to the Hordney tariff, the American shipping industry and the Baldwin debt funding settlement. Mrs. Tedder was found guilty Saturday. She likewise was recommended to mercy, the verdict also carrying with it a sentence of imprisonment for life.

His condition is reported as critical. Attending physicians say death will be expected any time.

FEDERAL AGENT HELD FOR KILLING IN NORTHAMPTON

RALEIGH, Dec. 4.—W. E. Woodfin, of Littleton, federal prohibition agent, yesterday shot and killed Grover Bradley, prominent country merchant of Northampton county. Bradley has two brothers who are under indictment in federal court charged with operating the largest whiskey still ever captured in North Carolina. Report of the occurrence range all the way from self defense to murder in the first degree. Woodfin came to Raleigh and reported to federal authorities and was last night arrested by the Raleigh police on authority of Sheriff H. L. Joyner, of Northampton county, who issued a warrant charging Woodfin with murder in the first degree, following an inquest before Jam A. Grant, of Jackson, corner of Northampton county. High feeling against Woodfin is said to prevail in Northampton and Halifax counties where the Bradleys are influential.

President Pardons Comptroller Craig

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4.—Without condoning the offense, President Coolidge has remitted the 60 day jail sentence imposed on Charles L. Craig, Comptroller of New York City, by Federal Judge Mayer for contempt of court.

The chief executive acted in the case—one of the most widely discussed contempt cases in recent years—upon receipt of a report from Attorney General Daugherty with reference to an application for pardon for Craig made by Senator Corland, of New York, and by members of the board of estimate and apportionment for the city of New York.

Denies He Killed Man Twenty Years Ago

ASHEVILLE, Dec. 4.—A dramatic scene was enacted in the county jail here when Will Clark, alias Will Gibbs, was identified by officers from Attalla, Alabama, as a man wanted in that city for an alleged double murder committed 20 years ago. This prisoner had lived in Asheville for 18 years under the name of Clark, following the occupation of stone mason. He was turned up by W. H. Puckett, who had married Gibbs' wife after the latter abandoned her in Atlanta following the slaying.

A photograph made in Attalla about 22 years ago was produced by the Alabama officers. It portrayed Gibbs as a handsome young man, well dressed and clean cut in appearance.

Oklahoma House To Settle Klan Quarrel

OKLAHOMA CITY, Dec. 4.—The Ku Klux Klan issue again was thrown to the forefront in the Lower House of the State Legislature when the trial of Representative Murray F. Gibbons, on charges upon which his expulsion had been asked, was abruptly halted before it had fairly started by Gibbons' unexpected resignation.

BLOODED LIVESTOCK FIGURES IN PROBE OF U. S. OIL LEASE

Cattle, Hog Shipments To Secretary Fall Ex- plained by Sinclair

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4.—Harry F. Sinclair who holds the lease to Tea Pot Dome the naval oil reserve was recalled as a witness today before the public lands committee to testify regarding shipments of blooded stock from his farm in New Jersey to A. B. Fall, formerly secretary of the Interior, who signed the lease.

Auditors of the Sinclair stock farms testifying from account books declared that \$1,100 was received from Fall's business partner in May 1922 in full payment for several hogs, one registered bull and six registered dairy cattle. The stock, it was explained, had been shipped February 16, 1922, to Fall's ranch at Three Rivers, N. M.

In answer to question by Senator Walsh, democrat, Sinclair said there was no record of correspondence upon the transaction. Sinclair told the committee that while visiting Fall's ranch in January 1922 he noticed the absence of milk cows and suggested to the secretary that he be permitted to send him several head. Fall demurred, stating that he could not afford registered stock.

Sinclair said that he told the former secretary that he could unless he insisted upon "show cattle." Subsequently, he testified, Fall agreed to his proposal. Later Sinclair explained he telegraphed his farm manager to gather up a bunch of cows and hogs and ship them to Fall's ranch.

Seek Plan to End Railroad Crossings

MIAMI, FLA., Dec. 4.—Members of the National Railway and Utilities Commission association gathered here for the opening of the association's four-day convention, at which problems having a national scope will be discussed.

Considered as one of the outstanding questions to be taken up is the danger of railroad crossings and the means which should be taken to protect them, or for their entire elimination.

Pan-American Lauds the Monroe Doctrine

RICHMOND, VA., Dec. 4.—Belief that the time is approaching when the application of the Monroe Doctrine would be locked upon rather as a subject of historical interest than as a problem of high concern was expressed by Ricard J. Altaro, minister of Panama to the United States, speaking at the centennial celebration of the Monroe Doctrine held here under the auspices of the Southern Commercial congress.

ELECTRIFYING THE FARM

Full and hearty cooperation by three great departments of the United States Government in the program of the national committee on the relation of electricity to agriculture was pledged the committee by Secretary of Commerce, Herbert Hoover, Secretary of Interior Hubert Work and Assistant Secretary of Agriculture, Howard M. Gore, at a meeting and conference of the Committee held in Washington.

Secretary of Agriculture Wallace already had approved the program and his department has undertaken a nation-wide survey of farm power. Secretary Hoover and Work each stated that some member of his staff would be delegated to represent his department on the committee, and that all data available would be furnished and additional research work done, if necessary.

It has been pointed out that, through its jurisdiction over natural resources, the department of the Interior should be greatly interested in this plan of working out an economic solution of how to furnish electric power to farms through the development of super-power and broadening the methods of application of electric power to farming operations.

COLLECTING FLEAS

In the news of the day the British Museum announces that through the bequest of the late Nathaniel Rothschild, it has acquired the largest and most complete collection of fleas in the world. Immediately the great chorus of newspaper paragraphers arise to point out that the author of the superlatives has not seen their canine pets.

The Museum's statement, made with the force of authority, will set at rest many assumptions to the title of the world's greatest

flea collector. Observation of any ordinary dog will indicate that he has at least a fair right to dispute the title.

But why should we grin unappreciatively at the thought of a man who aspired to be the collector of such an incomparable exhibit? If it had been postage stamps or Chinese jades he collected, we would have praised and admired his ambition. A collection of fleas may be valuable for research and reference purposes. There is ALWAYS a human curiosity to know what is BITING one, and now only a trip to the British Museum is necessary to make comparisons and arrive at definite conclusions.

And if we smile because Mr. Rothschild was an enthusiast on fleas, why not waste a grin on some other enthusiasts and their collections. There was Mr. Ford and the collection he assembled on his peace ship; there is Mr. Bryan and his collection of arguments to prove that he has no monkey blood in his veins; there are the professional reformers and their collections of reasons why human nature can be legislated out of existence. Editor Bok is even now collecting essays on peace. There is absolutely no reason why the man who collected so many fleas that his accumulation is ranked the largest should not be accorded honors equal with any of these.

Indeed, it appears that Mr. Rothschild deserves more credit than usually goes to a collector. For it requires agility as well as perseverance and diplomacy to capture so many vivacious and temperamental fleas. Thrice honored is the enthusiast who pursues his hobby into difficult places, and we can imagine nothing more difficult than pursuing to capture one of every species of flea in the world. We prefer to collect books; they remain still long enough to get a hand on them.

Some early American humorist discovered that a plentiful collection of fleas was healthful for a dog; it kept him from brooding on other troubles. Presumably Mr. Rothschild must have been a happy and contented man completely wrapped in the enthusiasm of his search for fleas.

Another good way to save money is to hide it in some place and forget where you hid it.

Professor Suggests Applied Psychology To Reduce Accidents

LAWRENCE, Kans.—Reducing automobile accidents by means of applied psychology is the plan of Dr. William A. McKeever, editor of numerous juvenile and psychology publications and former University of Kansas professor in charge of child welfare and "better city" projects. Dr. McKeever has prepared what he calls "A Universal Auto Creed," consisting of a pledge for the driver, the pedestrian and the motor guest, which he is to offer to automobile associations, schools, safety leagues and all others concerned in the problem of safe motor car driving. "There are not more than ten critical points for the driver, for the pedestrian and for the passenger," said Dr. McKeever. "Cover those danger spots with an advance vision in the mind of the individual, showing him specifically how to act or what to do, and the safety will take care of itself."

CEMENT PRODUCTION UNABLE TO KEEP PACE WITH DEMAND

WASHINGTON.—Cement production established another record in October exceeding the record made in September by 241,000 barrels. Production totaled 13,350,000 barrels, the highest of any month on record according to the Geological Survey. Shipments during October exceeded production by almost 1,000,000 barrels.

Supplies, which have been diminishing monthly since February, were the lowest since October a year ago. Stocks on October 31 this year totaled 4,597,000 barrels or about one-third of a month's supply at the October rate of shipments.

The whole world, he said, grieved when President Harding was suddenly taken, but not before he had been instrumental in making at the Washington Conference what might well prove hereafter one of the greatest strides yet taken towards the lasting pacification of the world.

Events in Ruhr Affect Ariz. Copper Industry

TUCSON, Ariz. — Events in the Ruhr are reflected more profoundly in the commercial situation in Arizona than in that of any other state, according to P. G. Spilsbury, president of the Arizona Industrial Congress. He said this was because "copper is the backbone of Arizona's prosperity."

In a recent address Mr. Spilsbury stated: "On an average, Germany bought 333,000,000 pounds of copper a year before the war. Her maximum purchases in one year reached about 400,000,000 pounds, or almost as great as Arizona's annual output. Now France is not permitting Germany to export her manufactured products, with the result that Germany's purchases have ceased."

BERLIN.—Goblins haunt the Reich bank entrances every night. Messengers wrapped up in blankets stand the whole night long waiting for the bank to open at 10 o'clock so they can get an early place in the line-up for the new gold money.

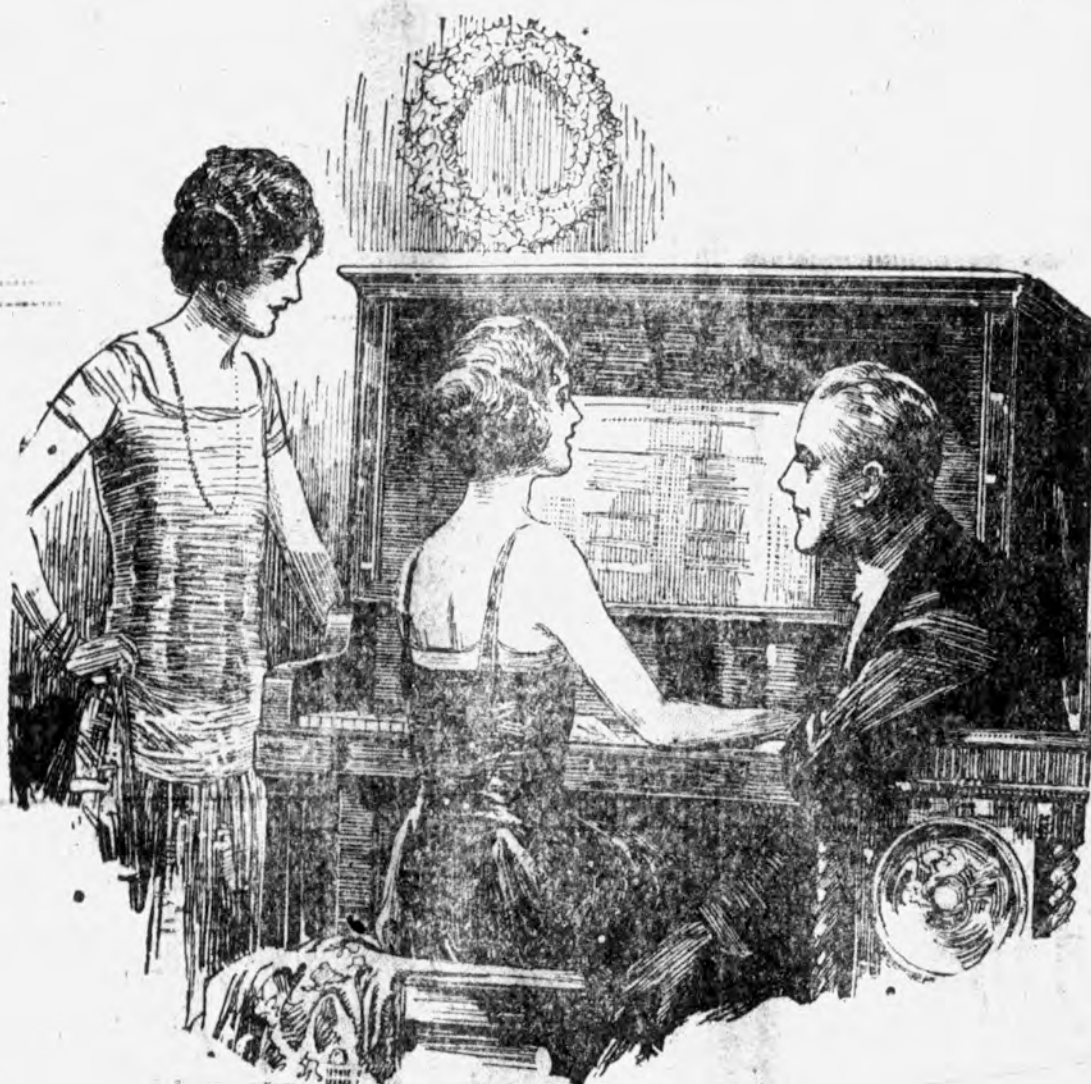

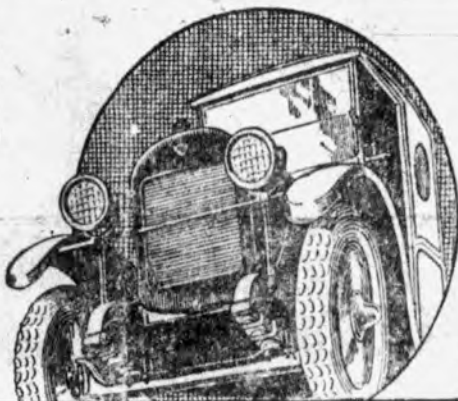

AMERICAN SINGERS FINDING FAVOR WITH N. Y. AUDIENCES NOW

NEW YORK.—American singers are beginning to vie seriously with Italians and Germans for honors on the operatic stage, according to musical critics who declare that Americans have won spurs of stardom not only with opera companies abroad, but also with the Metropolitan Opera company which for many years has been a stronghold of foreign talent.

Five American singers are making their debuts this year at the Metropolitan, which recently began its fortieth season of grand opera at the famous Broadway opera house which has heard the finest vocal efforts of Caruso, Melba, Calve, Scotti and many other internationally famous foreign singers.

Miss Nanette Guilford, 18 years old, of New York who made her debut in a part in Rigoletto, is one of the youngest sopranos ever to come to the Metropolitan. Two other American sopranos are Miss Louis Hunter, of Middletown, Ohio, who studied in Cincinnati, and Mrs. Phradie Wills who sang various operatic roles while teaching music in the State Teachers College at Kirksville, Mo.

Other American newcomers are Miss Merle Alcock, also of Missouri, and Lawrence Tibbett, of Parkersville, Cal., who made his concert debut in Los Angeles and won a prize at the San Francisco exposition in 1915.

Miss Alcock is a solo contralto and Mr. Tibbett a baritone.

Carolinas Seek Good Farmers From Denmark and Holland

COPENHAGEN.—The unofficial representative of the states of North and South Carolina, Mr. MacCraig, has had several conferences with the Danish Minister of Agriculture and leading Danish agriculture experts on the possibility of introducing Danish methods and inducing a number of Danish farmers to settle in the Carolinas.

Mr. MacCraig said the Carolinas were trying to encourage emigration of good farmers and had desired principally those from Denmark and Holland.

Korea Has 17,626,761 Population. SEOUL, Korea.—The total population of Korea as registered at the end of last year amounted to 17,626,761, according to announcement just made. Of these 17,208,139 were Koreans, 386,493 Japanese and 32,129 foreigners.

Pay Increase Ordered For Railroad Laborers

CHICAGO, Dec. 4.—Increases in wages totalling approximately \$628,429.08 were awarded to track foremen, track laborers and other employees represented by the United Brotherhood of Maintenance of Way employees and Railway Shop Laborers and the Brotherhood of Railroad Way Station employees in a decision announced tonight by United States Railroad Labor Board.

The increases range from one to two cents an hour, and, according to statisticians of the board, affect approximately 22,612 employees of seven railroads.

Says Gov. McCray Big Speculator In Grain

INDIANAPOLIS, IND., Dec. 4.—Governor Warren T. McCray dealt in grain futures through account No. 201 through the now defunct Sawyers (Grain Company of Chicago and this account sustained a loss of approximately \$100,000 in 1923. William Simons, who was president of the company of which the governor was vice president, testified today at the hearing on the petition of three Fort Wayne, Ind., banks to have the executive declared a bankrupt in Federal court. The hearing was resumed today after more than a week's recess.

Japanese Cops Adopt Pistols.

TOKIO, The long sabre of the Japanese policeman, an unwieldy weapon in a "rough and tumble," is to be replaced by a revolver and short sword. The regulations announce that the revolver shall be used only for purposes of self defence against prisoners attempting to escape.
