## GILLETT RE-ELECTED SPEAKER OF HOUSE; BLOC GAINS DEMAND

### Contention for House Rules Revision Pledged By "Old Guard"

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5.—Representative F. H. Gillett, Massachusetts, was re-elected speaker of the House today when representative insurgents voted for him for the first time since the deadlock last Monday.

Gillett's election completes the organization of the House and paves the way for President Coolidge to deliver tomorrow his first annual message before a joint session of the senate and house.

The insurgents only agreed to abandon their fight after they had been assured by Representative Longworth, Ohio, floor leader, that opportunity would be afforded later to freely offer amendments to the rules of the body.

From the start the insurgent group has maintained that its real fight was for a revision of the rules. The choice of Gillett came on the first ballot today, the ninth taken for speaker since Monday. From the outset 17 votes were cast by the insurgents for Cooper, Wisconsin; one of their leaders and five for Madden, Illinois.

On the final ballot Gillett received 215 votes, Garrett, democrat, 197, and two voted for Madden. Gillett had a bare majority of seven. The democrats voted solidly for Garrett.

## British Interest In Outcome of General Election

LONDON, Dec. 5.—This is the last day of speech making preparatory to casting of ballots in the most puzzling general election of recent years. The energy thrown into the campaign by all parties in the last few days has been doubled as the drive for votes draws near.

The outpouring of words on platforms and the house-to-house solicitation will reach the maximum of about 20 million voters in England, Scotland, Wales and Ulster, who will go to the polls to choose 564 members of the house of commons.

## Bishop Atkins Near Death, Doctors Say

LITTLE ROCK, ARK., Dec. 5.—Bishop James Atkins, of the Methodist Episcopal church, south, who suffered a stroke of paralysis here yesterday was still unconscious today. Physicians say there is no change in his condition and little hope is held out for his recovery.

## Monroe Doctrine Celebration Ceases

RICHMOND, VA., Dec. 5.—The celebration of the Monroe Doctrine centennial was brought to a close here late yesterday with addresses on industrial subjects before the Southern Commercial Congress, under whose auspices commemoration of the great American declaration of primacy in the Western Hemisphere was held.

## CHORUS GIRL ROBS HOTEL GUESTS TO BUY FINE CLOTHES

NEW YORK, Dec. 5.—Pretty red-haired Helen Paxton drew her expensive cloak about her today and told the police how hard it was to get along on the salary of a chorus girl. She is in the Police.

"It simply can't be done," she told them. "On Broadway one gets along on one's good appearance—one's clothes."

So she became a high-fingered hotel maid between appearances. She kept each job just long enough to fill her pockets with something from a guest's jewel box.

"I had to have good clothes," she said. "That's why I did it."

Miss Paxton exhibited her seal skin coat, a goodly sized rope of pearls and several diamonds.

"Days when we did not go to a matinee I would hire out to hotels as a maid, wait my chance and enter a guest's room, taking jewelry I found," she said.

## Simplified Income Tax Blanks Will Tax Temper Less

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5.—The time has arrived when taxpayers must again delve into the mysteries of the income tax form, but according to M. L. Seidman, tax expert, the forms will be much simpler than those of previous years.

The new income tax for those of an income of \$5,000 or less, derived chiefly from wages, will consist of only one sheet, one side of which will be devoted to the brief statement of income deductions and the other side will set forth instructions for making the return.

Formerly taxpayers in this class had to state their income on a return that consisted of six pages, on which questions appeared pertaining not only to salaries, but to income from business, sale of real estate, and the like.

## Institute Spiritual Science is Formed

NEW YORK, Dec. 5.—The Spiritual Science Institute, Inc., was today granted permission by Supreme Court Justice Platzek to apply for a charter of incorporation.

Organizers of the institute told the court they purposed to promote systematic examination of the laws of being as they affect the spiritual man; interpret psychic phenomena; investigate claims of mediumship and other super-normal capacities; and assist its members in the order development of their spiritual qualities.

## Bill Would Reduce Press Postal Rates

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5.—Postal rates on newspapers and periodicals would be reduced under the terms of the bill introduced in the House today by Representative M. Clyde Kelly, of Pennsylvania. The measure has the endorsement of all elements in the publishing industry. The claim is advanced that the present high rates imposed as a war revenue seriously handicaps the transportation of publications through the mail.

## Say This Legislator Bartered His Office

OKLAHOMA CITY, OKLA., Dec. 5.—Representative Guy H. Sigler of Ardmore, was ordered to trial by the lower house of the State Legislature today after the House had accepted a report of its investigating committee charging Sigler with bartering in executive clemency and asking his expulsion from the assembly. The trial will start tomorrow.

## MOTHER LOVE MAY SEND "WOLF WOMAN TO GALLOWS DAZZLES HER WITH HIS WEALTH, LATER SELLS HER GOWNS

Otto Malm, of Chicago, hardened criminal and professional safe-blower, confessed to Chicago police that he shot to death Edward Lehmann when the latter interrupted a man and a woman robbing the Denson Company's plant there. He declared the woman was his wife, Katherine Williams Malm, and that she aided him in more than 60 crimes, including murder. He told the police she was a "two gun" woman and would kill to escape. Mrs. Malm, neighbors said, was an ideal mother of her four-year-old daughter, Katherine, with whom she is shown here. Mrs. Malm fled to Indianapolis, but later surrendered, telling the police she could not leave her "kid." A strange turn was given the case by Lehmann's dying declaration that Walter Bockelman killed him. Bockelman and his common-law wife, Ethel (Blond Kitty) Beck, were arrested, and the woman, frightened, actually confessed that Bockelman did the killing, and that she was present. Her entire story was false, police say.

## "Follies" Girl Settles Heart Balm Suit Against Rich Man

CHICAGO, Dec. 5.—The \$100,000 breach of promise suit of Mary Lygo, former Fallis girl, against Golden C. Thorne, wealthy club man, and one for a similar amount against Mrs. Katharine Thorne Camp, Thorne's mother and divorced wife of William "Billy" Camp, for food were settled out of court today just as the suit against Thorne was ready to go to trial. One report was that the settlement was for \$75,000. Thorne himself said he paid Miss Lygo \$8,000 of which \$5,000 was to drop the breach of promise suit and \$3,000 to dismiss the action against his mother. He declared this was cheaper than attorney's fees. Charles Erstein, attorney for Miss Lygo, denied this, but refused to reveal the terms of settlement.

BALTIMORE, MD., Dec. 5.—A soldier giving his name as Edmund Bolling, 29 years old, of Fort Washington, Md., walked into detective headquarters and declared that he was wanted in Virginia for murder and jail breaking.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5.—The German proposal that the reparations commission authorized the floating of a loan by Germany to purchase foodstuffs is assured of the moral support of the United States.

## Demand For Help Active, Says Official

## PUBLIC INTEREST PARAMOUNT

The whole nation has heard of the much-discussed Muscle Shoals project where as a war measure our government started hydro-electric power development for purpose of obtaining nitrogen from the atmosphere and giving the United States a supply of nitric acid for the manufacture of explosives independent of foreign supplies.

Numerous propositions have been made to the government to lease or buy the property, including the one from Henry Ford which has received the most public attention on account of the Detroit automobile manufacturer's prominence and his statements that he wished to make cheap fertilizer for the farmers.

The important question for the American people is not who gets this property, but what the individual or corporation which secures the use of it will do for the public in return for vast properties which they seek to secure at nominal cost from the government.

It has been generally understood that the reason for considering Mr. Ford's extremely low offer for these properties was that they would be used to manufacture cheap fertilizer if he gets the plant but according to his own statements, he will not make fertilizer except at a profit. This is only good business.

The question of the "public interest" in this proposition is, however, of greater importance than the "individual interest" of any prospective lessee of the Muscle Shoals project.

It is from this angle that the subject should be considered. In return for a hundred-year lease such as proposed in the Ford proposition, the public rights must be fully guarded. Supposing the lessee of the property under

such a lease dispose of it? Supposing that the lessee sold out. Supposing the lessee did not consider six per cent enough profit and would not manufacture fertilizer unless he could get eight per cent. Supposing the price the lessee set for fertilizer was not "cheap" for the farmer. Supposing the lessee considered it necessary to make eight per cent on the investment represented by expenditures made by the government instead of eight per cent on the very nominal sum such as has been offered to the government for these vast properties. Or supposing the lessee claimed eight per cent on the manufacturing turnover as a reasonable profit. Then in either of the two latter events, the lessee would get an enormously large return on his actual investment.

In the interest of the farmers whose welfare is the chief argument advanced for concluding a lease on these properties for the manufacture of fertilizer, the persons responsible for leasing or disposing of the Muscle Shoals project should see that very definite obligations are assumed by the beneficiary of the government's expenditures and the people's property.

In case of non-performance of contract obligations, the property should revert to the government and not be left to the disposal of the lessee as he saw fit after failing to carry out the actual or implied intent of the promise which secured the lease of the properties.

**DISCOVERY OF COAL FIELD DUE TO LIGHTNING FLASH**

SPRINGFIELD, Ill. — A flash of lightning, well over a hundred years ago, caused the discovery of coal in the Mississippi valley according to the written word of Father Louis Hennepin, whose records are on file on the shelves of the local historical society.

The monks of La Trappe located in Madison county in 1807 and Father Lou's was their historian. That year they found themselves short of fuel, his narrative shows. Their blacksmith complained of the lack, on being informed that the earth, near the foot of a tree which had been struck by lightning, was aflame, the monks went to the spot. Digging a little below the surface they discovered a vein of coal, the first in the northwest territory.

**LUXURIES STRANDED SEAMEN IN PHILIPPINES BARRED**

MANILA. — Stranded seamen in the Philippines have been treated royally by the local governments, according to a protest of the British consulate refusing to assume responsibility for expenditures for safety razors, automobile rides and tickets to motion picture shows.

The protest passed along to the Interior department has resulted in an order to confine assistance to stranded or distressed foreign seamen to their absolute needs.

**Warns Against Eye Strain.**

NEW YORK. — The convalescents should take care not to strain their eyes by over much reading, and kind friends would do well not to send too many books to persons recuperating from the effects of a severe illness, according to the National Committee for the prevention of blindness.

**SOUTH AFRICAN FARMERS FORMING LABOR UNION**

JOHANNESBURG. — Striking evidence of the extent to which Socialist propaganda has been carried on among black in South Africa has been given by an incident in a Northern Rustenburg district, says the Daily Mail.

A number of farmers who required additional native labor went to Mochudi, across the Transvaal border in the Bechuanaland Protectorate, and put their case before the chief Isang.

**EXPERTS OF LEAGUE ISSUE ANALYSIS OF FINANCES EUROPE**

GENEVA. — In view of present plans to hasten a settlement of the reparations problem, with the co-operation, if possible, of the United States, special interest attaches to a review of the financial position of 14 countries, mostly European, together with certain remarks on the German reparations question, contained in a memorandum issued by the league of nations.

The report shows that in most countries a retrenchment policy has been adopted and considerable savings have been effected, although the ever-increasing burden of the public debt has in many cases swallowed up what may have been saved by cutting down the administration. The development of the public debt has been compared with the changes in the price level, i. e., the nominal amount of the debt has been divided by the wholesale price index number, and in this way reduced to pre-war price level. When this is done it is seen that the French debt has risen to three times, the amount of the pre-war debt, the British debt to seven times the amount, and the American debt to nearly 13 times the amount of the pre-war debt.

At the same time, it is pointed out that before the war France had, per head of her population, a much higher debt than Great Britain or the United States and also that, in these two last named countries, deflation has considerably increased the public debt. It is rather remarkable, says the report, that the two countries in which the public debt shows the greatest real increase are the only countries which have been able to make any substantial repayments of their debts.

**Vienna Thievery Exaggerated.**

VIENNA. — Thievery in Vienna was not as prevalent during the first five months of this year as was made to appear in a story sent out from this city last August in which erroneous figures, inadvertently used, created a wrong impression.

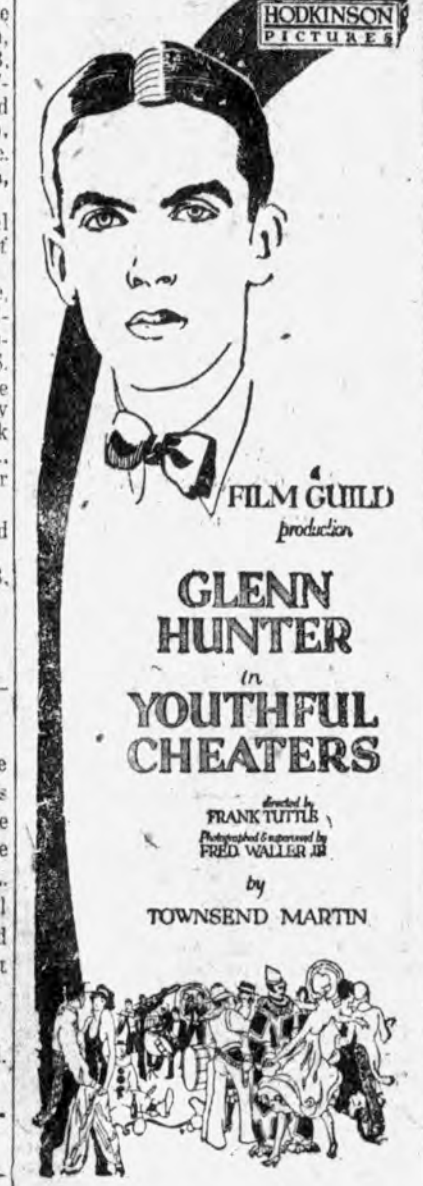

# ROBIN HOOD OF INDIA SUCCUMBS IN FIGHT WITH STATE POLICE

MADRAS, India.—Jumbalingam, a notorious bandit known for many years as the Robin Hood of India, has been shot dead with his lieutenant, Kasi, in an affray with the T. N. police. The death of this bandit, making the end of a long campaign on the part of the police, was the result of a sudden night raid. Constables surrounded the house in which Jumbalingam and other dacoits were sleeping. The inmates of the house made a spirited defense, killing the Indian police officer in charge of the party and wounding several others, but were soon overpowered by force of numbers and were shot down.

Operating in the hilly tract between the Tinnivelly district and Travancore State, Jumbalingam and his robber band became widely celebrated for their innumerable exploits and their sensational escapes from the police, even after arrest. The bandits, mad; their home in almost inaccessible mountain places, and from these points of vantage made frequent raids into the plains. Disguised as holy men or innocent beggars, they frequented the country roads, and relieved travelers of whatever valuables they possessed.

On one occasion when Jumbalingam and a number of his confederates were confined in the Central Jail at Palamcottah, he, by some means yet a mystery, obtained keys to all the cells where his men were confined, and enabled the whole party to escape, unnoticed by any of the guards or wardens set over them.

# GIRLS FLOCK TO MOVIELAND BUT FEW CAN FIND PLACES

HOLLYWOOD, Cal.—Scores of young girls, movie-struck, arrive here every week, most of them with no recommendations beyond flattering notices in home-town papers, according to the Hollywood Chamber of Commerce, which has started a campaign to warn young persons, through out the country of the futility of finding screen jobs, unless they are qualified and have been encouraged to apply at the studios.

The Chamber of Commerce estimates the population of Hollywood at 85,000, of whom, it states, less than 15,000 are engaged in the film industry.

# 800 Coins in Mayor's Chain

BUCKINGHAM, Eng.—The next Mayor's of this borough will have presented to her a chain made from 800 "threepenny pieces," which were paid as a fine of 10 pounds imposed on Councillor Roper who refused to accept the position of Mayor. # Would Check Criminals By European Methods

WASHINGTON.—International adoption of the "know book" as a means of checking criminal, eliminating much government red tape and keeping tabs generally on all members of the community, is advocated, according to private advice received here, by two Norwegian scientists, Dr. J. A. Mjoe and J. Ba. The "know book" is a suggested pocket pamphlet to be made out for every child and to be kept through his life as a permanent record of his doing. It would contain his fingerprints, photograph, passport, physician's certificate of health, and certificate of his military and civilian record.

But it turned out to be just the thing for me. Knabe cheered me up, and I braced and began to play the game. It helped me more than I can tell, that season under Knabe."

We are going to begin at the fountain head, that is, the original cost, and everyone in the clothing business is going to be given an opportunity to aid in the movement, he said.

## Porto Rico's Trade Shows Big Balance in Favor of the Island

**SAN JUAN, Porto Rico**—Porto Rico's trade for the last year increased \$17,698,835 over the fiscal year ended June 30, 1922, and totaled \$154,037,555, according to figures compiled by customs officials. Exports were valued at \$82,293,050 and imports at \$71,944,505, leaving a balance of trade in favor of the island of 10,348,545. With the exception of 1920 and 1921 when war prices still prevailed last year showed the largest trade ever recorded by the island.
