BUDGET SYSTEM IS SAVING BENEFIT TO U. S., MELLON SAYS

Treasury Head Holds Bonus Would Defer Tax Reduction Plan

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7.—Secretary Mellon, in his annual report transmitted to congress today, described treasury operations under which the nation's foreign debt had been reduced \$613,674,343 in the fiscal year 1923, and again urged a sharp reduction in taxation based on rigid economy and barring "authorizations for new and unexpected expenditures." The report contained a copy of Mellon's letter to Acting Chairman Greer, of the House Ways and Means committee, in which the Secretary said "a soldier's bonus would postpone tax reduction not for one but for many years to come."

To the usual review of official activities under his direction, Mellon attached additional argument for the federal reduction in income taxes, which he has urged. He particularly stressed the advantage which he has predicted would come from cutting the surtax rates upon large incomes to a maximum of 25 percent, on the ground that it would actually increase government income, as well as indirectly benefit the public at large by reducing burdens on productive operation.

Value of Budget.

The government, "firmly established on the basis of balancing its budget each year," Mellon said, brought the national debt, once at a figure of over \$26,000,000,000, down to a total of \$22,082,209,000 on October 31. The record, he said, was one brought about "only by the most rigid economy and the application of business principles to the government's finance." On the present basis of taxation and expenditure, he cited an estimated treasury surplus next July of about \$329,000,000, and a possible surplus in the year after of \$305,000,000.

"High taxation," the report continued, "even if levied upon an economic basis, affects the prosperity of the country, because in its ultimate analysis the burden of all taxes rests only in part upon the individual or property taxed. It is borne by the ultimate consumer. High taxation means a high price level and high cost of living. It can safely be said that reduction in the income tax reduces expenses not only of the 7,000,000 income tax payers but of the entire 110,000,000 people of the United States."

Rich Dodge Taxes.

As to the reduction in the surtax rate, Mellon said that the history of taxation throughout the world indicated that "means have always been found by the ingenuity of the citizen to avoid taxes, inherently excessive." It was significant, he said, that the large incomes reported for taxation were decreasing in number each year, those over \$300,000 being 246 in 1921 as compared with 395 in 1922. The estates of the wealthy, he pointed out, were flowing into tax exempt securities. The treasury secretary, he continued, estimated that the reduction of the surtax to the 25 percent maximum, against a present maximum ranging up to 50 percent, would actually increase by 1926 the amounts which the government receives, the lesser rate being more than compensated for by the additional volume of tax paid.

Mr. Mellon advocated also the reduction of federal taxation on estates after death, on the ground that this tax was taken "not out of income but out of capital," with cumulative confiscatory effect.

Business Outlook Good.

To general business aspects Mellon directed the comment that improvement from the 1921 depression had been not for a year. Sufficient credit at reasonable rates had been available through banks, and he con-

Morrison Says He Will Use Power To Prevent Lynchings

RALEIGH, Dec. 7.—In a letter to J. G. Boddie, one of the commissioners of Nash county, N. C., Governor Morrison today stated that he was "determined to use every particle of power given me under the constitution of the state to prevent lynchings."

The governor expressed regret that he had ordered troops to Nash county recently, but explained that it is not advisable to wait until violence manifests itself.

He stated that present activity present the appearance of being "sound and stable." The failure of agricultural sections to share in the betterment, however, was noted.

TOBACCO MARKET HOLIDAY IS SET

Will Close Dec. 19, After Sale; To Resume Business January 8

The Greenville Tobacco Board of Trade today fixed the holiday period of the market today. It was decided to close Wednesday Dec. 19, following sales and re-open for business on Tuesday, Jan. 8.

According to war-torn men the market has been holding up well and approximately 30 million pounds have been sold up to the present time. Recent official reports indicate that the prices paid on the Greenville market average better than other adjoining places.

Growers from various counties heretofore outside of this district still continue to patronize this market in increasing numbers. Altogether the season so far has been satisfactory to the large and growing patronage of the Greenville market, it was stated.

Cox Won't Say He Is Backing McAdoo

TUSKEGEE, ALA., Dec. 7.—Former Governor James E. Cox, of Ohio, and Democratic Presidential candidate in 1920, said that he had "nothing to say" when asked of the present current in the east that he was favorably disposed to William G. McAdoo for the Democratic nomination next year and would do nothing to control Ohio's votes to the party convention.

"I know nothing of it and I haven't anything to say concerning it," was the substance of Mr. Cox's statement. Former Governor Cox is here on an annual hunt with friends.

Everett Speaks in New York.

RALEIGH, Dec. 7.—Secretary of State W. N. Everett has been invited to address the New York City chapter of the University of North Carolina at its informal winter dinner in that city next Thursday and has accepted the invitation. President Chase of the University also is scheduled to speak at the meeting.

NATIONAL DEFENSE SYSTEM OFFERS SERIOUS PROBLEM, SAYS PERSHING

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7.—The condition of the national defense system "presents a serious problem which should receive thoughtful consideration from every responsible citizen," General Pershing declared today in what will be his last annual report as Chief of Staff of the Army. By the time the next report is due, the former commander of the American Expeditionary Forces will have reached the retirement age of 64.

"We have made progress in the organization of the framework of a great citizen army," he said, "but the total number of individuals under military supervision has decreased by 15,000 during the past three years. This decline presents a serious problem which should receive the thoughtful consideration of every responsible citizen."

Temporary Disruption.

There has been "temporary disruption" in the regular army as was to be expected, he continued, due to reorganization under the national defense act. He added, however:

"I wish to emphasize the fact that this can be but a temporary phase. Our regular organizations must once more receive the training necessary to make them models of efficiency and to prepare them to take the field at any moment."

PREMIER BALDWIN IS AGAIN RE-ELECTED

Surprises Election; Lady Astor's Majority Is Reduced

LONDON, Dec. 7.—The conservative majority over all other parties in the house of commons was definitely wiped out at yesterday's election. Premier Baldwin's government stands practically defeated. Former Premier Lloyd George was re-elected from the Carnarvon, Wales, district.

LONDON, Dec. 7.—Premier Stanley Baldwin has been re-elected to parliament by an increased majority over last year's election, according to recently compiled returns.

All the results in the 252 polls reported up to an early hour this morning in the election to decide whether the British people are to give Stanley Baldwin the mandate to carry out a policy of limited protection in this country show a decided majority against the Premier's proposal.

But whether, and to what extent, this partial verdict may be modified by the returns yet to come in will not be known until this afternoon.

Thus far the polling has been marked by a great turn over of votes from the Conservatives, who stand for protection, to the Liberals and Laborites, who oppose protection. The two latter parties now count 136 seats, against 110 for the Conservatives, while there are six seats which belong to neither party.

The polling up to the present has produced some sensational surprises. Indications beforehand appeared to point much more strongly to victory for Winston Churchill in Leicester than for Mr. Asquith in Paisley, but Churchill was turned down and Asquith was elected.

The women candidates have scored only two successes—Lady Astor who was re-elected with a reduced majority, and the Laborite Miss Susan Lawrence, who ousted the Conservative member for East Ham.

OBREGON SAYS HE WILL SUPPRESS MEXICAN REVOLT

MEXICO CITY, MEX., Dec. 7.—"The country will be pacified and the reported rebellion will be put down with an iron hand," said President Obregon, on his return to the city today from his country home where he has been canvassing. This was the only comment Obregon would make on the reports of the movement against his government.

VERA CRUZ, Dec. 7.—Five Mexican states are in open rebellion against President Obregon and General P. Elias Calles, Obregon's candidate for the Presidency, according to information reaching here.

The military in the states of Vera Cruz, San Luis Potosi, Chihuahua, Michoacan and Tamaulipas, are said to have repudied the federal government, ousted all the federal office holders and substituted their own men.

The commander of the Gulf fleet, the chief of marines and several leading generals at midnight last night forwarded a message to President Obregon declaring they had resolved to "assume the defense of the institutions of the country" for the good of the country.

Anti-Klan Leaders Meet Crushing Defeat

OKLAHOMA CITY, Dec. 7.—Like their colleagues in the Senate, anti-Ku Klux Klan leaders in the lower house of the legislature met a crushing defeat today in their attempt to make public the membership lists of secret organization by legislation.

CHERRY HILL CEMETERY TO GET REGULAR CARE; WOMAN'S CLUB AND ALDERMEN PROVIDE MEANS

The long and wanton neglect of Cherry Hill cemetery is to be remedied. As a result of the activity of the Greenville Woman's Club and the Board of Aldermen sufficient money has been guaranteed to insure a permanent caretaker.

The matter was definitely decided last night when it was announced at a meeting of the Board of Aldermen that the Woman's Club had reached an agreement with a group of lot owners which provided the basis of the fund to give proper attention to the cemetery. The board appropriated \$100 monthly which will be disbursed by the cemetery committee of the board and the Woman's Club.

Lack of attention to the cemetery has been agitated for more than three years and the action of the Woman's Club in taking the initiative in correcting the condition is another evidence of what that energetic and progressive group of women can accomplish once they attempt a project.

A permanent attendant will be employed at once, needed repairs will be made, and in a short time the place will present an altogether different appearance from its present condition.

GAS PLANT LIKELY FOR GREENVILLE IN NEXT FEW MONTHS

The Proposed Franchise Passes First Reading Board of Aldermen

If the proposal of R. A. Blackwood, who owns gas plant in Washington, N. C., and Kinston is accepted Greenville will have a plant within the next few months. The matter was presented at a meeting of the Board of Aldermen last night by Mr. Blackwood and his assistant, J. T. Bland. The first formality was complied with by the first reading and passage of the proposed franchise. Before the proposition is assured the franchise must be considered at three regular sessions of the Aldermanic body.

Blackwood explained to the aldermen that he would use the gas mains already laid under paved streets of the city, which he agreed to take over at the cost of the work and in addition pay six per cent interest on the amount of the investment from the time the work was completed.

If the proposition was accepted by the city, Blackwood said, residents of Greenville could be assured of a gas supply for cooking, fuel and illuminating purposes within six months after the negotiations were settled and a bond of \$15,000 guaranteeing its operation would be offered. In order to obtain the views of the Water & Light commission on the proposal, an adjourned meeting of the board will be held next Thursday night when Manager Edward Williams will be asked to express his opinion on the merits of the offer. The public is also invited to attend this session. It was pointed out that the action of the board was not conclusive, and it could be revoked if deemed advisable and of benefit to the city.

Negotiations for a gas plant were opened more than three years ago by Mayor D. M. Clark. Various plans were discussed but all failed of reality. However, within the last three months Blackwood and his representatives frequently conferred with Clark, inspected sites for the location of the plant and discussed various other details covering its possible installation.

State Ranks Eighth In Building Hard Surfaced Highways

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7.—North Carolina ranked eighth among the states of the Union on January 1, 1922 with regard to the mileage of surfaced roads in the State according to a report of the department of agriculture made public here today. At that time 16,755 miles had been surfaced. At that time only one state in the south had a larger mileage than the North State, it being Georgia with 18,000 miles of improved highways.

During the year 1922, according to the report North Carolina with 2,115.9 miles of highways constructed was third in the Union only to Michigan and Indiana respectively.

The mileage of surfaced roads in the country including sand, clay, gravel, macadam as well as those which had been paved was well over 400,000 miles at that time, according to the report.

Negro Executed For Attack On Woman

RALEIGH, Dec. 7.—George Goss, negro, convicted of an attack on an aged white woman in Mitchell county last September paid the death penalty in the penitentiary here today. Before being taken to the death chair Goss made a complete confession of the crime to a negro preacher.

Four shocks were required before physicians pronounced Goss dead.

THE PROPOSED GAS PLANT

The proposal submitted to the Board of Aldermen last night with the objective of establishing a gas plant in Greenville sounds good. The offer to have in operation within six months a plant furnishing illuminating, fuel and cooking gas would undoubtedly prove a welcome to hundreds of housewives. The advantages of the improvement are manifold. Those who are behind the proposal offered pay the city the cost of the work of laying out mains under the paved streets together

with six per cent interest on the investment dating from the time the work was finished. A franchise granting the privilege was passed on the first reading. It cannot become effective until it has passed through the same legislative process at two subsequent regular meetings of the board.

An adjourned meeting of the board is scheduled for next Thursday evening when the managers of the Water & Light Commission will be heard on the matter. Citizens generally are also invited to attend the session and express views on the subject.

If negotiations are concluded to accept the offer considerable credit is due Mayor D. M. Clark for his efforts in bringing the project to successful culmination. He has worked for some time in the interest of locating a gas plant in Greenville.

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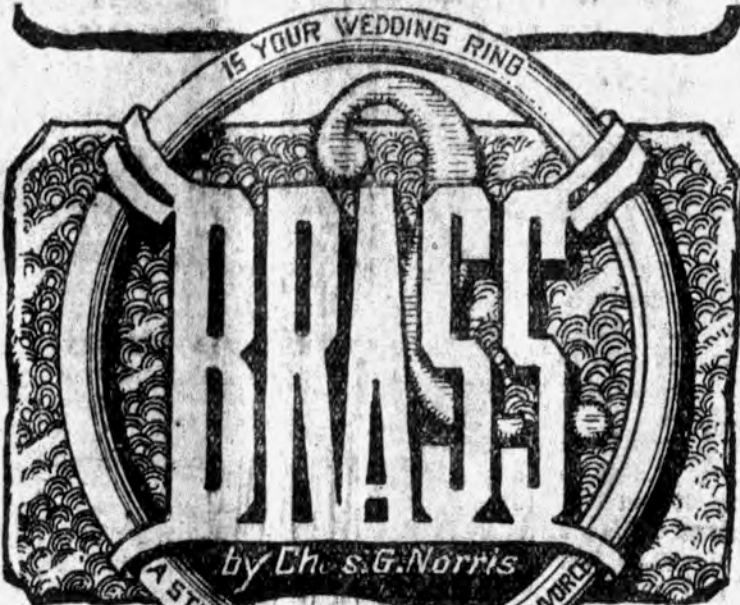

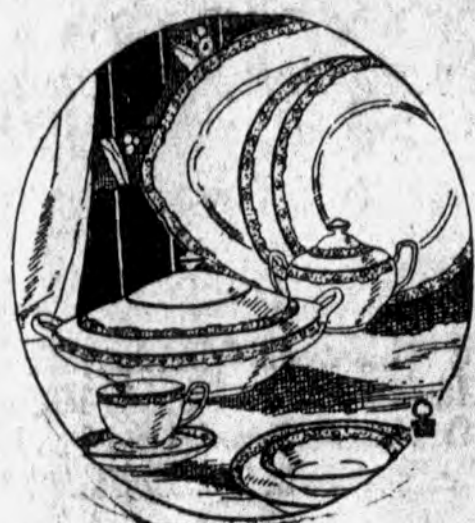

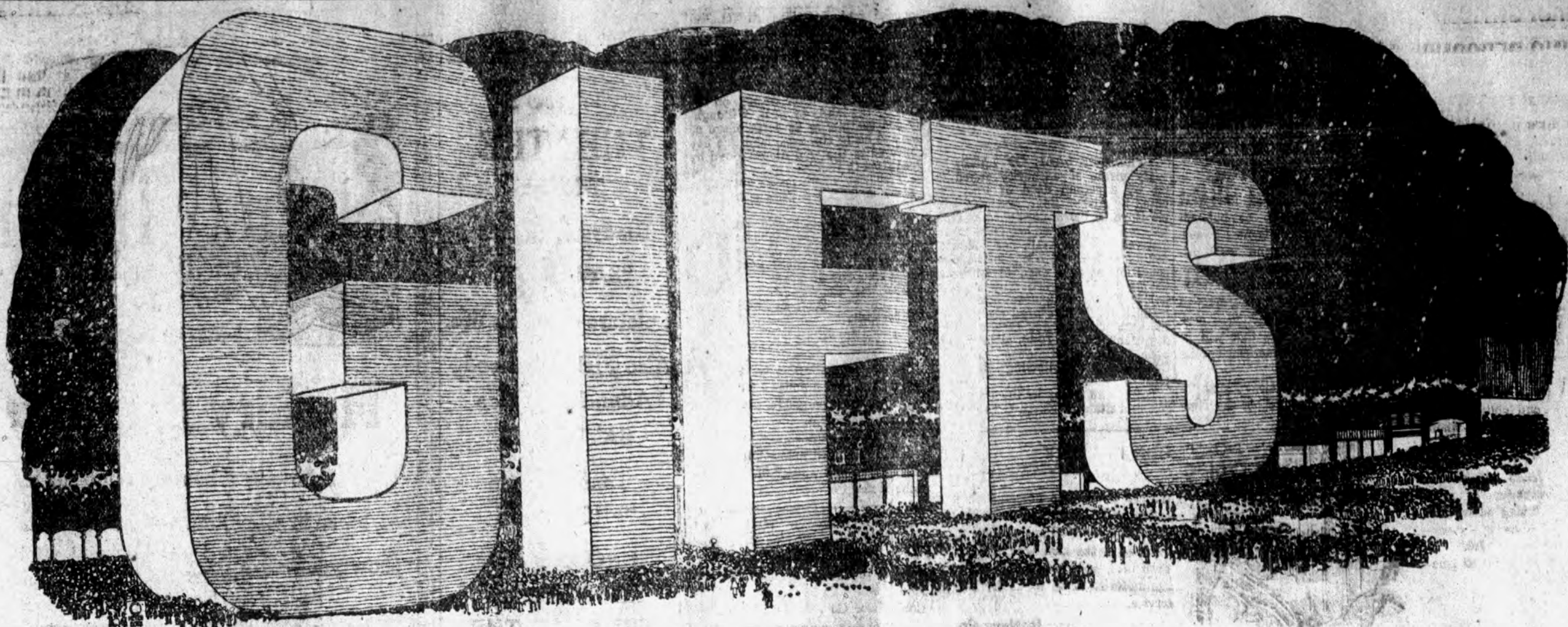

LARGE PROPORTION OF MISSING PERSONS FINALLY ARE FOUND

NEW YORK.—More than 11,000 girls and women were reported missing during 1922 by police headquarters in 33 American cities, and approximately 900 of them had not been located by December 31st. These figures were gathered by the National Association of Travelers Aid Societies of this city in an effort to estimate the number and types of persons who drop out of sight each year. Reports from 37 cities, the association said, gave a total of 31,638 men, women and children who disappeared, about 2,500 of whom were not found.

Seeking for people who disappear is a part of Travelers Aid service which protects inexperienced travelers from harm by giving advice and help at railroad stations and steamship piers, according to John R. Shillady, general director of the national association.

"Travelers Aid workers in 160 cities helped more than 2,000,000 persons last year," he said, "saving thousands of girls from being lured off by designing individuals in crowded stations. The service helps all travelers, from mere information seekers to those in dire emergency. Police reports show that in New York City, 2,446 girls and women were reported missing in 1922, 1,652 of whom were girls under 21 years. Chicago recorded 1,549; Los Angeles 1,020; Philadelphia 1,006; St. Louis had 798; San Francisco 471 and Detroit 311. About 92 percent of the missing were finally located—dead or alive—but the records show that many had undergone experiences worse than death.

Seek Chestnut Trees Resist Local Blight

WASHINGTON.—To combat the chestnut blight which is now sweeping through the east and south Atlantic States and threatening to destroy entirely the American chestnut, forestry specialists of the department of agriculture are conducting experiments to find a species that will be a substitute for the American species and resist the blight.

One of the department's agricultural explorers is searching the Him-

alaya uplands for new species and varieties of chestnut for trying out in this country. Two small plantings of a Chinese chestnut have been made on the Natural Bridge National Forest in Virginia, and two plantings of an Indian chestnut have been made in the Florida National Forest.

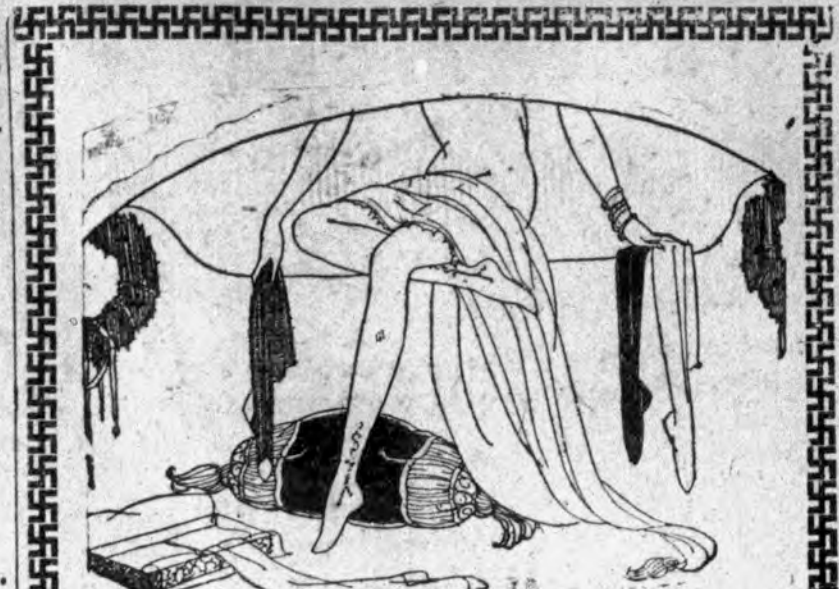

NATIONAL CONVENTION OPENS TO

NATIONAL CONVENTION DEMOCRATS GETS UNDER WAY NEW YORK AT 12:43

Thousands of Little American Flags Shower Delegates as Band Plays Star Spangled Banner; Anna Case Sings National Anthem; Cordell Hull Calls Convention to Order; Keynote Address Delivered by Senator Pat Harrison, of Mississippi

Madison Square Garden, New York, June 24. — The Democratic National Convention came to order for its first session at 12:43 o'clock. After delaying the opening for a short time to allow police to straighten out a traffic jam outside which was keeping hundreds of delegates and guests from reaching the hall, Chairman Hull, looking refreshed and apparently recovered from his heat stroke of Sunday, brought down the gavel.

In a few brief words he called the convention to order and then gave way to Cardinal Hayes who offered the invocation. The audience stood in silence with bowed heads as the voice of the prelate penetrated to the farthest corners of the arena. At the conclusion the band struck up on "The Star Spangled Banner" and from the recesses of bunting and flags upon the rafters of the structure thousands of little American flags were released and fluttered down upon the heads and shoulders of the delegates, then while the band softly played the National Anthem Anna Case, of the Metropolitan Opera Company, sang it and the audience joined in the refrain.

With a roaring demonstration for Woodrow Wilson the convention was interrupted while delegates and visitors joined in a noisy yet respectful tribute to the late president and idol of Democracy. Cheers for Cleveland, Jackson, Jefferson and Bryan had resounded through the big garden but when Temporary Chairman Pat Harrison mentioned the name of Wilson noise and enthusiasm broke loose. State standards came quickly from their rests and soon the floor was a mass of milling humanity chanting the songs that became famous during the days of the war when Wilson was at the helm of the government.

Chairman Harrison sensed from the first outburst that they wanted to give a demonstration for Wilson so he chose a chair and sat down for a rest from the rigors of his keynote speech while the demonstration was in progress.

At the conclusion of the keynote address the convention adjourned until 11 o'clock tomorrow morning.

Madison Square Garden, New York, June 24. — All the swirling cross current which is finally going to cast up a Democratic presidential nominee centered today around the great convention hall when 13,000 party warhorses, delegates and spectators packed Madison Square Garden to see the curtain rise on the first act of the great drama. For a few brief hours there was a lull in the corraling of delegates and claims of campaign managers while all assembled to hear Senator Pat Harrison, of Mississippi, temporary convention chairman, sound the clarion call of the party in the keynote speech and let the convention accomplish some of the routine preliminaries.

Probably a third as many people got in at the first session as had hoped to and probably half as many as expected to. A good number who expected choice seats stood up and in the meantime managers were explaining that there had been no funny business in the distribution of seats and declared that the great hall was not being packed for any candidate or group and partiality was not being shown.

A long list of notables in party achievement, past and present, occupied places of honor on the plat-

At the headquarters of all stage delegations there was an unsatisfactory demand for tickets and in many instances the state chairman's explanation of inability to meet the demand was interpreted to cast reflection upon the work of the national committee. PERSEVERENCE BRINGS SUCCESS

Lieutenant Russell L. Maughan is Successful in Third Attempt to Span American Continent in Single Day

San Francisco, June 24.—Lieutenant Russell L. Maughan wrote a new and spectacular chapter in the history of man's conquest of the air yesterday when he spanned the North American continent in less than a day. The hazardous and gruelling flight was his third attempt.

He left Mitchell Field, New York, at 2:59 1-2, (Eastern Standard Time), yesterday morning halted briefly at five refueling stations enroute across mountains, fought fatigue and constantly returning nausea for 21 hours, 47 minutes and 45 seconds and arrived at the aviation field at San Francisco at 9:47:15 Pacific Time last night.

As soon as the plane landed newspapermen broke through police lines holding back a huge crowd lining the field and greeted the flier. A few seconds later the mammoth throng of spectators, cheering and shouting, while automobile sirens shrieked in a bedlam of noise, surged over the field and surrounded the plane.

A telegram from President Coolidge, asking immediate news of the arrival of Lieutenant Maughan was received by Crissy Field officials early this evening.

Maughan dropped down on the field at the northeast corner, and taxied to the center of the field where he became the center of a surging, shouting wildly excited mass of spectators.

The way was cleared, however, for news photographers to take pictures of the plane and the daring flier. Apparently overcome with emotion and jubilant at the victory which he had achieved, Lieutenant Maughan seemed unable to speak when his

plane came to a stop. His face bore a serious and drawn expression. He was lifted bodily from the cockpit by his cheering comrades of the air service and carried on their shoulders through the swirling crowd to a rear door of the army headquarters.

The demonstration accorded Maughan was without parallel in the history of local aviation events. Darkness already clothed the field when the drone of his motor first was heard. The crowd began cheering.

Sen. Pat Harrison Delivers Keynote Speech Den

Mississippi Senator Declares "A Paul Revere, Not a Sphinx" Condemns Republican Administration Calls on Democrats to Unite

New York, June 24. — America informed the first office was the secretary who acted in public these investigations. In an address condemning the Republican administration—its policies, both domestic and foreign—the temporary chairman called on Democrats everywhere, "With Victory within their grasp" to unite against a common enemy.

"Oh for one in the White House," he said, "whose heart might be melted and courage aroused to sympathize and fight. Would that we once more might see in that exalted position one with the courage of a Jackson, the militant honesty of a Cleveland, the matchless statesmanship and the fine fighting qualities of a Woodrow Wilson."

Senator Harrison ran the gamut of the Harding-Coolidge administration in a series of biting criticisms. A large part of his speech was taken up with a resume of the disclosures of Senate investigating committees. The oil policies, in particular, came in for vigorous denunciation.

"Show this administration an oil well," he said, "and it will show you a foreign policy."

"America has taken the Measure of this administration," he continued. "It might have been able to free itself from the sectional idolatry and to have looked beyond the skies of New England. It might have heard the groans of the distressed farmers of the West and sympathetically responded. It might have sought markets and removed the tariff jams in the channels through which our surplus products move. It might have visualized world conditions and courageously assumed the part befitting a great nation. It might have reduced living costs, redeemed pledges to the soldier, followed a definite domestic program, and adopted a broad and statesmanlike foreign policy, but, even then, it would have availed it nothing with its carnival of corruption."

"The least that the American people expect of their public servants is common honesty. They will forgive their passivity, overlook their indiscretions, and, too often, forget their impotency, but to them corruption is inexcusable, graft is indefensible."

Referring to Senate inquiries, Senator Harrison was unsparing in his criticisms of former Secretaries Denby and Fall, former Attorney General Daugherty, Charles R. Forbes, former head of the Veterans' Bureau and former Senator Newberry, of Michigan. He paid high tribute to Senator Thomas J. Walsh, of Montana, prosecutor of the oil inquiry and others connected with the various investigations.

"Decry them as they will, the American people know that it was these investigations—conducted by Democrats but through Republican committees—that sent Albert B. Fall to Three Rivers a disgraced man. It was these investigations that compelled Edwin Denby's retirement from the cabinet. It was these investigations that drove Daugherty back to Washington Court House. SMUTS VOTED OUT

Gen. Jan C. Smuts, last of the great
figures of the world war to serve prominently
in government, has been voted out in the
Union of South Africa. He was defeated by
a Labor party man in the parliamentary elec-
tions, the general result of which is the rele-
gating of the South African party to a minori-
ty position. This party remains the largest
single body in the parliament, but the Labor-
ites and Nationalists together outrank it. The
world-wide unrest, coupled with South Afri-
can aspirations for independence, has work-
ed a political overturn in this section of the
British Empire similar to those that have been
effected in many other countries.

As an indication of tendency the result
will be considered grave. The Nationalists
and Laborites in coalition can manage the gov-
ernment according to their will, but that they
will agree upon secession remains to be dem-
onstrated. The Labor party has its own ends

ence plans of the Nationalists. The latter are
mostly adherents of the old Boer element that

the independence movement may subside.
