MELTING POT IDEA OF IMMIGRATION WRONG, HE SAYS

Congressman Aswell Declares the Selective System Best

Representative Aswell, Louisiana, does not have much faith in the melting pot idea of immigration. He believes that the selective system will prove the salvation of America in solving the immigration problem, he told The Reflector.

Mr. Aswell is in Greenville today and will speak at the Teachers College tonight at 8 o'clock. He accompanied Secretary of Labor Davis on a recent tour of Europe, traveling more than 6,000 miles visiting several countries, and gained first hand information on conditions.

The representative returned imbued with the idea of selective immigration. He believes that immigrants should be selected at the source and undesirable excluded. He discovered that government officials of Europe are endeavoring to restrain the real workers and the worthless types to America.

Mr. Aswell is championing a bill before congress which provides for selecting immigrants on free shores and rejecting those are considered unfit to become American citizens.

His friendship for the American Legion is generally known. During the war he spent three months with the American army in France, studying conditions at the request of former President Wilson. He introduced the resolution which permitted service men to retain their uniforms, and is very much interested in their present welfare.

The lecture tonight is free to the public. Mr. Aswell since his return from Europe has spoken in 15 states. He returns to Washington tonight.

BITTER BATTLES BREWING BOTH SENATE, HOUSE

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10—Congress reconvened today with the Senate facing a re-organization fight and the house unable to function because its committees still are unorganized. Republican and Democratic leaders of the Senate completed today their assignments to the regular standing committees. They will be presented on the floor but beforehand the Republican selections will be passed upon at a party conference.

At its final session today the Republican committee on committees is understood to have selected Senators Leuroot, of Wisconsin; Willis, of Ohio, and Papper, of Pennsylvania for the three Republican vacancies on the foreign relations committee. This committee is to act upon President Harding's World Court proposal, which has the endorsement of President Coolidge. Senator Owen, of Oklahoma, is understood to have been selected by the Democrats for the fourth minority vacancy on the committee, the other three to be filled by Senators Robinson, of Arkansas; the Democratic leader; Underwood, of Alabama; and Walsh, of Montana.

Cleveland In Lead G. O. P. Convention

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10—Selection of Cleveland for the 1924 Republican National convention is expected to be followed this week by other important political developments.

Republican leaders are here in force for the national committee's annual meeting Tuesday and Wednesday, when the place and date of the 1924 convention will be definitely fixed, and many conferences of political imports will be held.

He Wants Foreign Services Overhauled

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10—Hearings on the bill by Representative Rogers, Republican, Massachusetts, to reorganize the foreign service of the United States will begin before the House Foreign Affairs Committee as soon as it is organized. Chairman Porter is hopeful that the committee will be ready to function by Wednesday, and has invited Secretary Hughes to appear as the first witness.

COSTS OF RETAIL DISTRIBUTION OF FARM PRODUCTS PLACES BURDEN ON CONSUMER, SAYS SECY. WALLACE

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10—The general farm income of the country will be considerably greater for 1923 than for last year, probably by more than one and a quarter billion dollars, and farmers generally are better off actually and relatively, Secretary Wallace of the Agriculture Department informed President Coolidge today in his annual report.

There was marked improvement in agriculture during the year, higher prices for crops, lower cost of production, and some reduction in the prices of the things farmers buy, Secretary Wallace said, but at the same time he told of many adverse conditions facing the farmers and made recommendations for their betterment. He discussed the wheat situation at some length and outlined his plan for a government agency with broad powers to buy and export surpluses not only of wheat but of pork and other farm products.

Gratifying Improvement. "The general agricultural improvement is most gratifying to everybody and gives renewed hope to millions of farmers who have struggled against most distressing conditions," Mr. Wallace told the President. "This does not warrant the assumption, however, the state of agriculture in all sections is now satisfactory. In many regions, agriculture still is at a disadvantage."

The relation between prices of most farm products and prices of other commodities is still far out of line. The farmers feel that their financial difficulties are due to low prices

Legion Head Makes Strong Bonus Plea; Facts Given Congress

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10—Letters in behalf of the soldiers' bonus bill were sent today to all members of congress by John R. Quinn, national commander of the American Legion. The history of the fight for the bonus was detailed by Mr. Quinn, who asserted that the plan was not initiated by the legion, but was "born in the minds of Senators and Congressmen, who realized at the close of the war how great an economic handicap the service men endured because of their service in the uniform." Elimination of the cash option feature from the four-fold bonus bill, Mr. Quinn added, operated to reduce greatly prospective annual cost during the first few years.

Man Who Killed Two Succumbs To Wounds

CHICAGO, Dec. 10—John Sheehy, who last night shot and killed two employees of the Rendezvous Cafe because of "rotten service" and wounded a policeman and himself in a pistol duel, which followed, died in a hospital here today. "Well, it is the just old law," was drunk and didn't know what I was doing," Sheehy told physicians a few minutes before he died. Sergeant William O'Malley, the policeman who was wounded in the battle in the cafe after Sheehy had shot two waiters, will recover.

American Shipping Shows Steady Gain In Foreign Commerce

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10—American flag vessels carried 40 per cent of the total foreign trade, 40 per cent of the imports and 30 per cent of the exports of the United States during the first nine months of 1923, according to figures issued by the Shipping board's bureau of research.

That ships of minor foreign countries are gaining in the movement of American foreign trade was indicated in figures showing that for the nine months ending with September, British vessels carried 28 per cent and ships of other foreign flags 42 per cent of the American dry imports, or those exclusive of petroleum in tank vessels, as against 31 and 34 per cent, respectively, the same period of 1922.

COOLIDGE ANNOUNCES CANDIDACY

MRS. S. T. WHITE IS COMMENDED FOR EFFORT IN OBTAINING PROPER CARE FOR CHERRY HILL CEMETERY

Commencing next Jan. 1, Greenville cemetery is to have a full time caretaker. The neglected graves and overgrown pathways are to be trimmed up; shrubbery and flowering plants will be set out, and benches put in place. Cherry Hill cemetery, instead of being an eyesore, will become a beautiful parklike "God's Acre."

This improvement will be brought about through the zealous efforts of a committee appointed by the Woman's Club, consisting of Mesdames S. T. White, W. H. Dail, C. W. Harvey, Albion Dunn, David James, L. G. Cooper, E. G. Flanagan, F. J. Fother, C. O. H. Laughinghouse, J. L. Fleming, Claude Grant, J. B. Smith, K. W. Cobb, R. Williams, H. A. White, and Mrs. Martha O'Hagan.

This committee met at the residence of Mrs. S. T. White Nov. 24, and formed "The Cemetery Organization" with the following officers: Mrs. S. T. White first vice chairman, Mrs. W. H. Dail, second vice chairman, Mrs. C. W. Harvey, secretary and Mrs. L. G. Cooper, treasurer.

The chairman of this organization will be the member of the board of aldermen who is chairman of the cemetery committee, at present, J. L. Hassell. With the exception of the same men, these officers will progress every two years, the said chairman becoming first vice chairman. The organization voted to assess all lot owners \$4, \$6 and \$10 yearly, according to the size of the lot, and to petition the board of aldermen for a monthly appropriation of \$100, to finance the project. Then followed two weeks of intensive activity, interviewing lot owners, and meeting with the board of aldermen, with the result that sufficient funds are now in hand or in prospect to assure the success of the undertaking. H. C. Shaffer, a well-known florist and landscape artist, formerly with the Greenville Floral Company, has been employed.

This will indeed be good news to every citizen of Greenville who has enough civic pride to desire that every institution of his town shall be kept in good condition; and to those who have loved ones buried in Cherry Hill cemetery, it must be balm to their wounded hearts, to know that no longer will the bodies of their dear ones lie in desolate and unkempt surroundings.

Mrs. S. T. White, whose enthusiasm knew no bounds, carried every one with her as she pushed ahead to accomplish the big result. The gratitude of the entire community is due her and her able assistants.

COOLIDGE FORMALLY ENTERS FIELD FOR G. O. P. NOMINATION

President Urged to Pose Johnson In California Primary

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—President Coolidge has definitely entered the race for the Republican presidential nomination next year of his friends are urging the name be placed on the primary ballot in California—the state which his opponent Senator Johnson hails.

This became known today when W. H. Cotter, republican committee man for California on the President. Cotter has been years a member of the anti-faction in California. He is to deny or confirm the result of the interview, but expressed the view the chances of the President in California with the republicans were good as those of Johnson.

Formal announcement of the president's candidacy was made last night by F. W. Stearns, friend and political adviser of the president.

The statement was made through a statement given out by James B. R. former secretary of the Republican committee, who directed campaign for Mr. Coolidge in California. William M. Butler, republican committee man for Missouri, also a close personal friend of Mr. Coolidge, stated, will "act as the personal representative" in the campaign.

REIDSVILLE, Dec. 10.—Carter, 50, Danville insurance last night shot and killed Mrs. Gertrude Moore Carter, 33, home of her father-in-law in the town of Reidsville, who turned up the gun on his in-law, John Price, 35, who was injured, and then shot Mr. Price, 30, in the right leg, to shoot his mother-in-law, bullets in his revolver were by that time.

Carter, who came here early afternoon made his escape from the shooting, in a roadster, not being captured at midnight, making every effort to locate Carter's wife with her children left him in Danville days ago, and came here to see father, L. L. Moore. They have been together since then had separated.

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THIS IS A DANGEROUS REVELATION

In a book just published, "My Letters From Heaven," which purports to be a series of automatic writings by Winifred Graham, well known novelist from her late father, there is a message that declares positively, "There is no hell. There is a Heaven, however, in which God dwells."

However encouraging such an assurance may be to guilty mortals, it borders on that anarchistic and vastly dangerous sort of propaganda that unsettles society. If there is no hell, as the spirit asserts, then the fact should be kept quiet. Persons who go about arguing and asserting that Gehenna is merely a state of mind are precisely as dangerous as those other misguided pragmatists who begin about this time of the year to asseverate loudly that there is no Santa Claus. Hell, like law, depends not so much for its salutary effect upon actual testimony of its existence as upon a traditional fear of its possibility.

In this defiant age when we impudently mock at consequences and deride ancient threats of punishment there is entirely too little emphasis upon an eternity of tortures for him who disobeys stern and righteous commands.

In this connection, it has been contended by a great many persons that if the religious organization that distributes Bibles in hotels would replace them with copies of Dante's "Inferno," with the Dore illustrations, more good would be accomplished in the way of restraining wayward men from following sinful paths. Were the graphic Dore prints in more common use as wall decorations in public and private places, it is believed by many there would be an immediate improvement in mortals.

The trouble is that we do not like to face unpleasantness, and we prefer pink-tinted angels perched on soft and easy cloud banks eternally twanging celestial ukuleles to portrays of sinful men writhing on the tines of Beelzebub's pitchfork over white hot grill.

If the Society for the Prevention of Vice should immediately suppress this book that openly and authoritatively declares there is no hell, it would perform its first act of merited censorship. However, the Society prefers to suppress the Dore illustrations because, perchance, they depict the human form in the nude.

This is contrary to all logic, for how in hell, at least, could a man attired in combustible clothing be? The world needs a little more old fashioned insistence in the belief and fear of hell.

The 17-year-old Hungarian youth may not have established a distance record for this style of travel, but he is believed to have set a new mark in dodging customs officers, having evaded six crews of them.

Ancient Wooden Images Stolen Feistritz, Austria, Dec.—Five wooden images of saints dating from the 14th century have been stolen from the parish church here. They rank among the finest and most valuable of medieval religious carvings and are well known to collectors.

It is believed that international art thieves were behind the theft as the peasantry not only revered the images, but it is doubtful if they had any idea of their value.

FRENCH WOMEN FLOCK TO HAVE HAIR BOBBED

Paris, Dec.—Bobbed hair has long been accepted as standard practice in Paris, but there has developed suddenly such a rush to the shears that it is realized now that only a small proportion of the women have had their locks trimmed.

Advocates of short hair have taken advantage of this situation to spread further the doctrine of the bobbed head, and newspapers are carrying interviews and comment that would lead one to suppose the movement is new.

Swiss Allots More for Army

Berne, Dec.—In the Swiss budget for 1924, which shows 256,000,000 francs receipts against 2,000,000,000 francs expenditure, military appropriations amount to 81,000,000 francs, being 4,000,000 francs in excess of 1923. The greater part of this sum is for the instruction of a number of recruits greatly in excess of the quota of previous years.

Women's Membership Rights

Tientsin, Dec.—Women's rights won a victory at the first annual meeting of the American Association of Tientsin, when it was voted 22 to 15 to admit women as members. The question of women's eligibility came up on a motion that it was the sense of the meeting that it was the intent of the constitution to include women in the term "American citizens."

England Grows Virginia Tobacco

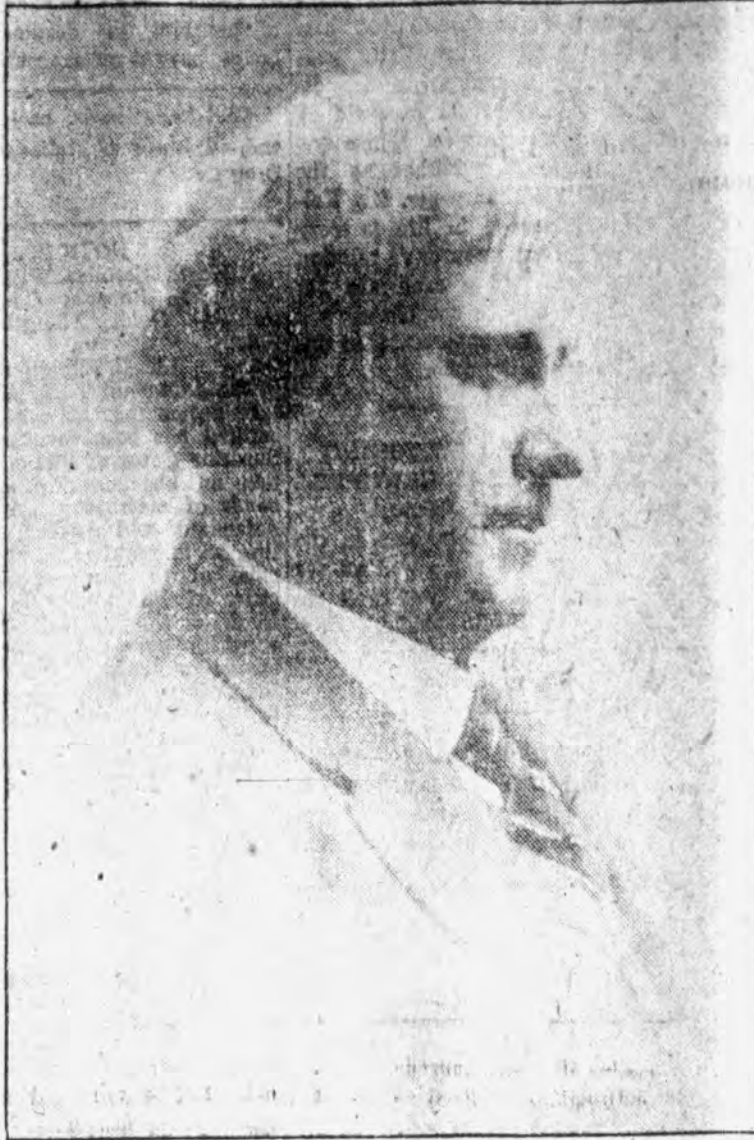

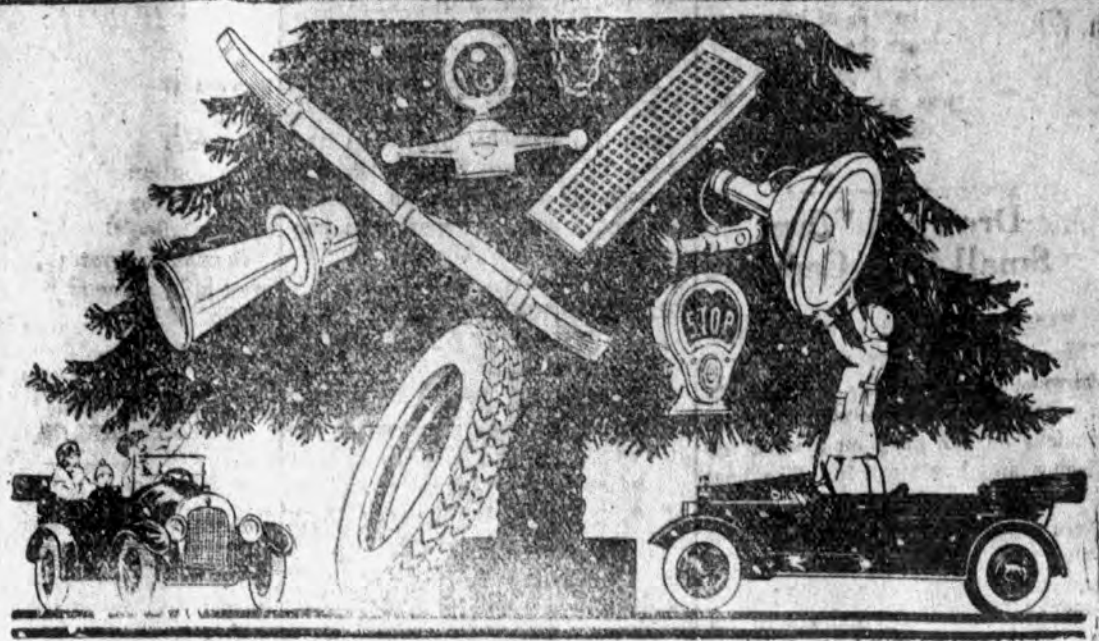

Air To Be Cleared Tonight For Radio Talk By Coolidge

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—The air will be cleared for 15 minutes tonight while President Coolidge speaks to the whole nation by radio in eulogy of Warren G. Harding.

President Coolidge, who is honorary president of the Harding Memorial association, will speak into a microphone in his study at the White House and his voice will carry by long distance telephone to various parts of the country, where it will be amplified and broadcast.

Railroads of Nation Reap Business Harvest

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—Transportation history during the current year has been marked by "unequaled performance" of railroad service, the Interstate commerce commission declared in its annual report.

With an unprecedented volume of traffic to handle, carriers almost eliminated car shortage, the report said, and kept equipment service able to an unusual extent. It was added that at the same time general charges placed upon the public for service were decreased.

Coolidge Appoints Negro In Spite Of Senator's Protests

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—In spite of the vigorous protest of the two senators from Louisiana, President Coolidge, sent to the senate the name of Alter J. Cohen, negro, to be controller of customs, at New Orleans.

The protest was registered a few hours before the nomination was sent to the senate.

Seventy men, scientists, cameramen, writers and sportsmen, will make the long trip on a steam yacht, leaving in December, and hope to bring back a complete set of colored pictures illustrative of Empire trade scenic wonders, animal life, and antiquities. Commander F. A. Worsley, R. N. R., will be in command of the expedition.

MOTOR COMPETITION THREATS RAILROAD LINES IN SWEDEN

STOCKHOLM.—The competition between motor omnibuses and the railroads in Sweden has become a serious menace, especially to the railroads under private ownership.

"Under the unfair competition from motor buses is checked in some way," declares the managing director of one railroad.

Police Chief Killed

HAZLEHURST, Ga., Dec. 10.—T. J. Kersey, 45, chief of police of Hazlehurst, Ga., was shot and killed here today by Warren Watts, 50, who immediately escaped in an automobile and a posse is reported in pursuit.

OLMPIC HOCKEY TEAMS WILL MEET JANUARY 25

CHAMONIX, France.—The Olympic hockey teams representing the United States and Canada will be placed at the head of the two series of teams entered for the competition here this winter, beginning Jan. 25. The total number of countries entered to date number eight and no further entries are expected.

Canada will lead the upper half of the draw, playing England in their first match and the winner of France and Norway in the semi-finals.

Ukrainians Fly German Planes

FRIEDRICHSHAFEN.—Several Dornier aeroplanes which were constructed here and taken to Russia have been operating since last summer in the Ukrainian air service and are reported to have made an excellent record in commercial work.

Would Make Crossings Safer

STOCKHOLM.—The use of mirrors at railroad crossings a new expedient for the reduction of accidents, is being tried out by the Swedish State Railways.

The first of such "warning mirrors" have just been installed at certain crossings for tests and approval by the general public.

Blind Negro Reformatory

RALEIGH, Dec. 10.—The negro reformatory, authorized by the 1923 session of the State Legislature, will be constructed in the near future if present plans materialize. This week the board in charge of the matter met to take over the land purchased for the new institution. Four hundred acres in the heart of the peach section of Richmond county have been acquired at a price of \$25 per acre.

Public School Cost

RALEIGH, Dec. 10.—Total expenditures for public schools in Wake county amounted to \$1,091,227.13 during the year ending Dec. 31, according to a statement issued by John C. Lockhart, superintendent of public instruction for the county. During the same period the collections amounted to \$1,072,623.31 leaving a deficit in operating expenses of \$18,603.87.

Reorganize Summer School

RALEIGH, Dec. 10.—Superintendent A. L. Allen of the department of public instruction has completed plans whereby the summer schools of the State will be re-organized. The number of subjects for each term will be reduced and a definite court of training instead of haphazard picking of subjects will be in force.

Durham Tobacco Average

DURHAM, Dec. 10.—An average of \$23.05 per hundred for the first three months of the selling season was made in the sale of leaf tobacco at auction warehouses in Durham according to figures announced by T. W. Scott, secretary of the board of trade. For the period ending November 30 a total of 5,689,833 pounds was sold for \$1,312,969.12.

Decline in German Youth

BERLIN.—According to the German Teachers Journal the number of persons in Germany under 15 years of age sank from 45 percent in 1910 to 29 percent in 1920.

Must Protest Crossings

CHARLOTTE, Dec. 10.—All railroads operating in Mecklenburg county must either maintain watchmen at grade crossings over county highways or equip such crossings with automatic signals, according to a resolution adopted by the Mecklenburg Highway Commission at its December meeting this month. The resolution calls for the regulation to become effective March 1, 1924.

Germans Leaving Fatherland

HAMBURG.—Passenger traffic between German ports and America continues so good that the de luxe steamers Resolute and Reliance are being continued in the service. The demand for cabin accommodations justified their retention.

German emigration has not been as great in 30 years as it was in the first half of 1923. Cheap passages are in especial demand.

ECONOMY URGED AS MEANS TO AID JAPANESE RECOVER

TOKIO.—The Tok'o Chamber of Commerce believes that Japanese generally should follow the example of self-denial of the Imperial family in foregoing all court luxuries and formalities as a mark of sympathy with the people in their stricken condition.

Learning to Love Ice Cream

LONDON.—About 20,000,000 gallons of ice cream were sold in England during the summer of 1923, or five times more than the quantity sold in the boom year of 1919, said Robert G. Reid in the course of a paper read before the British Cold Storage and Ice Association.

The expansion, Mr. Reid said, concurrent with the introduction of the American method of manufacture, was fostered by the changing attitude towards alcoholic beverages, and the fact that ice cream is nourishing and digestible.

ADVOCATE WORLD EXPERIENCE BEFORE CONFERRING DEGREES

NEW YORK.—A man should rub shoulders against life for at least three years after his graduation from a technical school before an engineers degree is conferred upon him is the opinion of William Kelly, prominent Michigan engineer, and a director of the American Institute of Mining and Metallurgical Engineers.

In a statement published by the organization's official paper, Mr. Kelly says: "Success in life is very largely dependent upon one's relation to other men, and a candidate for an engineer's degree should show a realization of the importance of his personal relation to others."
