MILD REVOLT PUT DOWN QUICKLY IN PORTUGUESE CITY

Uprising In Lisbon Halted Without Bloodshed; Order Is Restored

LISBON, Portugal, Dec. 11.—A revolutionary movement which broke out last night in Lisbon was promptly put down.

The energetic action of the government forced the revolutionists to surrender and order was restored without bloodshed.

Later the President visited the Lisbon barracks and naval arsenal. While conditions today are normal, government officials are by no means satisfied whether trouble may be renewed and preparations are being made to meet any emergency that might arise.

Mrs. Tompkins Lived In Constant Terror Of Husband, Report

MILWAUKEE, Dec. 11.—Mrs. Ora Belle Tompkins, whose nude, decapitated body was found in a ravine here Saturday and for whose death her husband, E. Ray Tompkins, is under first degree murder charges, lived in fear of her life for more than a year, a diary alleged to have been kept by her revealed today.

According to Mrs. Tompkins' diary her husband attacked her on several occasions. Once, the diary read, he took her into the country and stopped at a secluded spot, where he told her he was going to dig her grave and wanted her to do the work. The diary recites Mrs. Tompkins' knowledge of her husband's meetings with "F. W."

Live Stock Breeding Shows Improvement

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11.—The improvement of all kinds of farm livestock through breeding and selection, the development of better methods of feeding, the study of animal diseases and parasites, the protection of the industry from plagues which menace it from other countries, and the search for new facts concerning food values of animal products, in all these directions progress has been made during the last year, according to the annual report made to the Secretary of Agriculture by the Bureau of Animal Husbandry and made public here today.

Gov. Preus Denies He Will Quit Job

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11.—Governor J. A. O. Preus, Minnesota, denied today the report that he was about to resign as governor of his state to enter private business.

Preus declared he had no intention of leaving Minnesota until his term expired. After that, however, he explained his plans were somewhat indefinite.

Kellogg's Name Is Reported Favorably

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11.—The nomination of Frank B. Kellogg, to be ambassador to the court of St. James, England, was reported favorably today by the Senate committee on foreign relations.

Manila Not Taking Chances

Manila, Dec.—The authorities have redoubled their watchfulness at public meetings, and especially at sporting events, as a precaution against disorders. This step is taken because of the feeling engendered by the recent campaign and election.

MORE WOMEN IN BRITISH PARLIAMENT.

The British House of Commons, at its next session will have more women members than ever before, a total of seven having been elected. The American-born Lady Nancy Astor, first woman ever to sit in Parliament, was re-elected as a Conservative. The Duchess of Atholl was also returned as a Conservative. Miss Margaret Bondfield, first woman ever to head British Labor, was elected as a Laborite. Lady Terrington, peeress and first woman ever to manage a man's football team, was elected as a Liberal, and hitting at Lady Astor said she intended wearing her prettiest gowns and jewels in the House. Miss Susan Lawrence, long Labor-Socialist member of the London County Council, was elected as a Laborite. Mrs. Thomas Wintringham was re-elected as a Liberal.

EUROPE WOULD DUMP WORTHLESS CLASS ON SHORES OF U. S., KEEPING REAL WORKERS, REP. ASWELL SAYS

The Government officials of central European countries frankly state that their purpose is to prohibit the issuing of passports to the real workers in their country, but to dump their undesirable citizens upon American shores, according to Congressman J. B. Aswell, Louisiana, who spoke to a large audience of townspeople and students in the Teachers College auditorium last night on the subject, "Selective Immigration or Alien Rule—Which?"

Mr. Aswell has been a member of congress for twelve years. Prior to that time he was president of Louisiana State Normal College, and Superintendent of Public Instruction for that state. Since becoming a member of congress he has been very much interested in the immigration problem, and was the only congressman invited to accompany Secretary Davis on his recent tour of Europe.

U. S. Faces Disaster
He discussed the present law, which expires next June. Before the expiration of this law, Congress must act, or the country faces disaster. Under this law the total number of admissions to this country is three hundred and fifty seven million annually, with at least an equal number coming in illegally. It is estimated that one thousand enter illegally daily through Canada, Mexico and Cuba, and through the weakness of the Seaman's Act, which provides that members of the

At a preliminary meeting, it was announced that Asheville had a chance to obtain one of the chain hospitals that Shriners plan to erect throughout the country.

Baptists to Consider Vital Church Matters

GASTONIA, Dec. 11.—Enrollment, and organization, presentation of reports and the keynote address of C. L. Graves, Raleigh, were the chief matters which will come before the opening session of the 92nd annual convention of the Baptist church here today. Many matters of importance to Baptists are on the program of the session which will continue through Thursday.

More than 500 ministerial and lay representatives of the church are here.

Want Anti-Saloon To File Accounts

NEW YORK, Dec. 11.—The state attorney general's office today took preliminary steps to force the New York anti-saloon league to file a complete account of its election expenditures in the 1922 campaign.

RECEIPTS ASKED FOR ALL INSURED PARCEL POST MAIL

Receipts for all insured parcel post packages are again exacted by the postal service. Restoration of the former custom of requiring receipts for parcels which was revoked for a time is again in force according to an order issued by Postmaster General Harry New.

Since the order will require more time, with a limited force of Christmas in handling the immense Christmas rush of business Greenville people are urged to respond promptly to the call of the delivery wagons and be prepared to sign promptly for this class of mail.

The postoffice department urges the closest unity between the public and postemployees to expedite the huge holiday volume of business, so that as many as possible of the employees may be relieved from duty early Christmas eve. The public can greatly help in this matter, it was stated, if early shipments are made, thus clearing the local postoffice of any congestion of mail on the day preceding Yuletide.

N. C. Supreme Court Holds Nation's Record For Handling Cases

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Dec. 11.—The North Carolina State Supreme Court led all others in the 48 states of the Union in the handling of its 1922 docket, according to a report compiled by John H. Denison, associate justice of Colorado Supreme Court, and made public here today by Tennessee Court officials. North Carolina had 800 cases which were disposed of with 5 at issue making an average of 160 average cases per judge. Tennessee ranked second with 650 cases disposed of, 50 at issue, and an average of 130 cases per judge. The total number of cases disposed of during the period by the State Supreme Courts was 17,700 or about 58 cases per judge per annum, considerably below the average number of cases handled by the judges of the North Carolina and Tennessee judges.

Bessie Cox, receiving and possessing liquor, \$25 and cost. Dave Boyd same offense, \$20 and cost. On the same charge Claude Jackson was assessed \$20 and cost.

Jarvis Ebron and Sarah Moore, statutory offense, latter given six months in the county home; Ebron one year on the roads. Theodore Dudley, cruelty to animals and trespass, four months on roads. Jack McGee, manufacturing liquor, judgment suspended on payment of cost.

"Sentinels of Republic" Seek Greater Power For Will of the Masses

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11.—Four resolutions urging action by Congress on "pertinent" legislative questions were adopted at a meeting here today of representatives of various patriotic societies and others, called by the Sentinels of the Republic.

One resolution recommended passage of the Wadsworth-Garrett amendment which would place greater power in the hands of the people in amending the Constitution. Another declared against limiting the power of the Supreme Court and a third urged reduction of the number of government bureaus. The other opposed Federal aid legislation generally on the ground that it is "unconstitutional, uneconomic and unnormal."

Edward J. Salsstad, a former Eau Claire (Wis.) business man, has been arrested, with Dorothy Anderson, of Chicago, known as the "Sunshine Girl," at Napa, Cal., and has made one of the most amazing confessions on record. He examined the body of his best friend and put it in his hunting lodge, in the Wisconsin woods, which he then burned, causing the belief he had perished in the flames. When he fled with the girl, on the theory that he was loved, his wife has been waging a long fight in the Wisconsin courts to collect \$77,000 insurance he carried.

LEGISLATION TO CONTROL TRAFFIC AID SOUGHT BY SECRETARY HOOVER; U. S. NOW FIRST AS WORLD CREDITOR

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11.—Legislation for the revision of the navigational laws, for control of traffic in the air, and for stabilization of radio service were among the recommendations made by Secretary Hoover today in the annual report of the Commerce Department. The rapid growth of aircraft and radio transmission alike, he said, had created a need for administration development, while the navigation laws, long under scrutiny, required adjustment to the increased commercial expansion. Within the department itself, Mr. Hoover recommended that Congress follow the general reorganization plan prepared under the Harding administration, and make three administrative groupings to deal respectively with industry, trade, and navigation. He likewise urged congressional affirmation for the acts by which President Harding created Alaskan fisheries reserves, and suggested relief from federal taxation for American residents abroad and engaged in furthering American commerce.

Trade Balance, Visible
Much of the report dealt with the special enterprise, in which the Commerce Department has engaged during the year, designed to standardize commodity and material specifications, to collect facts about world agricultural production, and to determine the character of organizations abroad by which it has been charged that American consumers have been threatened with unduly high prices.

In this connection, likewise, the report dealt with the foreign trade situation, and the studies made under Mr. Hoover's direction for determining the financial "invisible" exports and imports. It was noted that during the period under review—the fiscal year 1923-24—commerce in general had revived, prices had firmed somewhat, and the nation had experienced prosperity.

Schulte Forms New Tobacco Corporation

NEW YORK, Dec. 11.—D. A. Schulte announced today the formation of cigarettes and smoking tobacco. The concern will issue 200,000 shares of no par value stock. Schulte, who is head of the Schulte Retail Tobacco stores, Inc., will be president of the corporation.

It was pointed out that this project is entirely separate from the reported negotiations for the consolidation of the United Cigar Stores and the Schulte retail stores.

Take Court Action to Re-Open Clegg Case

LUMBERTON, Dec. 11.—That new conditions have arisen since the decision by Judge Devin last June giving the father, Rev. I. M. Clegg and mother, Mrs. Annie McL. Clegg custody of their children at different times during the year is the complaint set out in affidavits filed with the Clerk of Superior court here in an action to re-open the case, which will begin Friday before Judge N. W. Sinclair, of Fayetteville.

INSURGENTS HOLD SENATE IN CLOSE GRIP OF DEADLOCK

Old Guard Unable To Put Cummins Over For Two Offices

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11.—The senate today was again in deadlock over the election of a chairman of the committee on interstate commerce and president pro tempore. Senator Cummins, Iowa, who now holds the dual position of chairman of that committee and residing officer of the senate received 41 votes on the first ballot; Smith, democrat, South Carolina, 39; and seven for LaFollette, Wisconsin, leader of the insurgent group.

The supporters of LaFollette are the same seven senators who brought about the deadlock yesterday after Wheeler, democrat, Montana, had forced a separate vote on the chairmanship. On the second ballot Cummins was again short three votes. LaFollette held his own and Smith retained his 39. On the next ballot Cummins dropped to 39, while Smith and LaFollette maintained their previous support.

The senate then went into executive session and then adjourned until tomorrow when balloting will be resumed with little prospect of a break.

INDUSTRIAL SHOW SIGNS THE EMPIRE ORCHESTRA N. Y.

Advices received here today say that the famous Empire State Orchestra has been engaged for the big Greenville Exposition to be held here Dec. 24-31.

This musical organization is one of the best known in the country. In addition to six versatile artists who play brass and string instruments it includes a group of splendid singers. The orchestra has played engagements at the Winter Garden, New York City, all of the leading hotels and proved one of the best attractions at Atlantic City and other places.

It required considerable negotiations before the orchestra was landed for the exposition. It is now filling an engagement in Buffalo, N. Y., and will come direct to Greenville from the Cleveland Automobile Show.

REBELS CAPTURE GOVERNOR STATE OF CHIHUAHUA

CHIHUAHUA CITY, Mexico, Dec. 11.—Governor Ignacio Enriquez of the state of Chihuahua has been captured by the Huerta forces and is being held prisoner, according to advices received here today.

Governor Enriquez was returning from a visit to Mexico City where he had been to use his efforts to prevent a rupture between political factions.

Mrs. Vanderbilt Is Re-Elected President Of State Fair Ass'n.

RALEIGH, Dec. 11.—Mrs. Edith G. Vanderbilt, was re-elected president of the North Carolina Agricultural association here today. No other candidates were nominated for the office.

U. S. Fleet Ordered To Chinese Coast

MANILA, Dec. 11.—Five American destroyers, left here today bound for Hong Kong, China. The fleet was ordered to the Chinese coast in connection with the situation at Canton.

FRANCE AND ITS DEBTOR'S PRISON ATTITUDE

Charles Dickens inveighed at length and with justice against the absurd and ridiculous system of debtor's prisons that once prevailed in England.

With a wealth of satire and sentiment he showed the folly of incarcerating a man and forbidding him any means of accumulating the wherewithal to discharge the debt for which he was imprisoned.

Were Dickens alive today, to what uses might not his facile pen be turned if he should view the spectacle of the world imprisoning nations instead of men and demanding of them that they pay or rot in cells.

The fallacy of economics that argued incarceration was a remedy for debt has an exact analogy in the course that has been pursued by France in dealing with questions of German war reparations.

dues, nor of England's greed for commercial advantage. On the other hand, it is the broader question of a combination of interests and a unity between nations to the end that the debtors may be assisted in paying their debts, rather than being deprived of resources by which to pay.

The French policy of making the Ruhr profitable and collecting from the profits a just percentage of reparations plus the expenses incurred in administration of the occupied territory is held fair and reasonable.

The whole financial situation and adjustment of credits depends upon payment of German reparations. When these are paid, France will be able to meet her obligations to the United States, England will find commercial prosperity restored, and the way of the world will be set straight again.

UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE VALUE

Big eastern soap manufacturer has adopted a form of "unemployment insurance". The company adds to its profit sharing scheme that "guarantees full pay for full-time work for not less than 48 hours per week in each calendar year."

It applies "unemployment insurance" from within. And it adopts the right form of insurance—steady work, not "doles". Here is another example of foresight, and it is referred to manufacturers for consideration.

In a number of states unemployment insurance has been considered by the legislature. State machinery, a state system of employment offices and a compulsory insurance department were to be forced upon industry and taxpayer.

Industries must employ a fair number of men regularly, not a horde, irregularly—unless they want to witness proposals in legislature or unemployment insurance bills.

Park for Eastern States Recommended Expert

WASHINGTON.—Establishment of additional national parks east of the Mississippi was recommended today in the annual report of Setophen T. Mather, director of the Park Service. A typical section of the Appalachian should be conserved, made accessible to the public and developed by federal funds, he said. 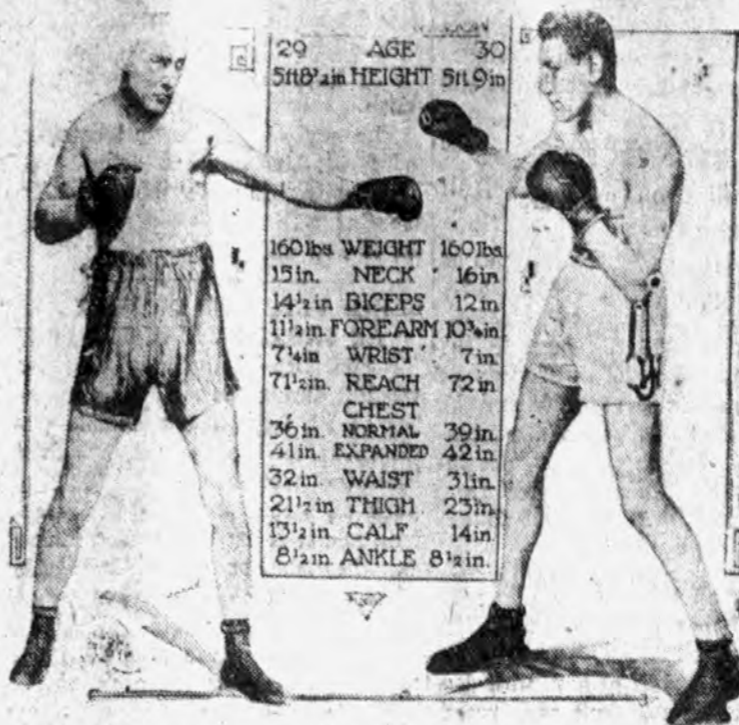

New York Provides Special Foods For Its Animal Guests

NEW YORK, Dec. 11.—New York's board bill for the beasts, birds, and fishes the city houses in the Bronx and Central Park zoos and the Aquarium in Battery Park exceeds \$50,000 a year. The upkeep of some of the captives from remote corners of the globe is especially high because of the epidemic taint they bring from their native haunts.

The board bill for the habitues of the Bronx last year was \$34,028.74, not including certain food commodities grown on the zoo farm in the park. Menus for the inhabitants of the Central Park cost \$12,250 and the board bill of the denizens of the Aquarium totals \$3,000 annually, not including sea food gathered direct from nearby waters for the more finicky guests.

Leading all other captives in the cost of his board is the big African elephant in the Bronx. His daily entree of 200 pounds of hay, with dessert of vegetables, fruit and bread, costs between \$7 and \$8 daily. His fellow countryman, the pigmy elephant, eats only half as much.

These "heavy eaters" contract sharply with the deer, which are fed on 50 cents a day, or even less. But since there is a head of 130, their upkeep is far from a negligible item.

The meat bills of each of the five lions in the Bronx average about 90 cents daily. The tigers eat about the same amount, while the leopards eat about one-third less. All these jungle beasts are now fed beef. They once were fed horse flesh, but this diet proved too rich for them.

Of all the temperamental eaters, the big python, which measures 23 feet,

holds the record. His board bill is only \$8 a month, but he has his own ideas as to how his monthly meal should be served. He insists on a live pig, but the keepers play a trick on him. Each month they take a pig to his cage, kill it outside, then placing it at once in the cage, move it about with sticks. The python thinks the pig is alive and gulps it down with relish.

The eagle is the heaviest eater among the birds, with a daily board bill of about 40 cents. He usually is satisfied with meat, although a stray cat is now and then fed to him.

BLIND VETERANS DO WELL AS SKILLED LABORERS NOW

Plain, Dec.—Men who lost their eyesight during the war, to the number of 94, today find profitable employment in the Siemens-Schuckert Electrical Works in this city. They work on boring and stamping machines, and such has been their training that they labor successfully alongside of men whose sight is not impaired. But special devices have to be attached to the machines of the blind to protect them against accident.

Foxes Fed on Whale Meat.

CORDOVA, Dr. W. W. Council a surgeon of this city who is interested in a fox farm on Green Island, 100 miles southwest of here, has ordered a whale boat built. Whales will be captured for the foxes to eat, so that feed bills on the farm may be slashed. The boat will be 26 feet long, will have a gasoline motor and carry three harpoon guns.

WARSAW.—The Warsay Nursing school has graduated its first class, composed of 16 young women. The school was established two years ago with the material and moral support of the American Red Cross. Miss Helen L. Bridge has been in charge of the school, aided by Miss Dorothy Hughes, who contributed \$10,000 to the organization.

Swedes Sail for South Seas.

Stockholm, Dec.—Packing their bear-skin coats at home along with their worries about the price of coal, a group of Swedish adventurers has just sailed away from the winter night of the North, bound for Borneo and other South Sea islands, where they will take motion pictures and write up their impressions for the benefit of their fellow citizens. They will be gone eight months.

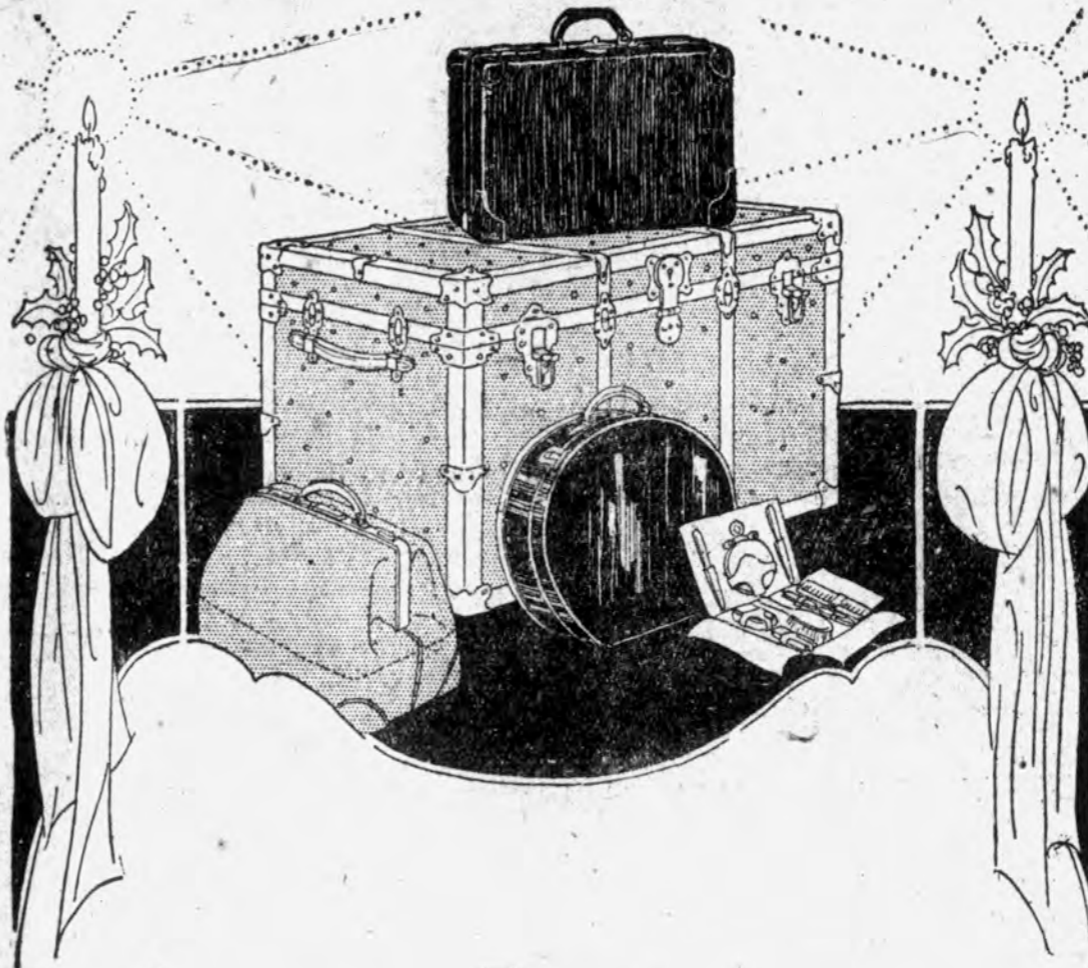

Copenhagen, Dec.—Many of the larger banks in Denmark are considering the making of a rule that no bank employe may marry unless his wage amounts to at least 4,000 crowns plus the bonus necessitated by the rise in prices since the war, says the Politiken. In one bank, this was in the ordinary course of events, is not obtained until after 14 years' service so that it would appear some Danish clerks will be condemned to years of celibacy if the suggestion is carried through.

Tokio.—Industries in all parts of Japan are feeling the effects of the decreased demand as a result of the earthquake and fire. Unemployment is on the increase everywhere except in the devastated area where there is plenty of work, especially for manual laborers.

Farmers, too, are complaining that the reduction of the duties on food products has brought down the prices of what they have to sell. Meanwhile the builders and their workmen and the people who supply building material, are reaping a harvest, charging in many cases exorbitant prices for the merest makeshift buildings.


