REBELS MARCHING ON MEXICO CITY READY FOR FIGHT

Battle Between Insurgents and Obregon's Troops Near, Report

VERA CRUZ, Mexico, Dec. 13.—Newspaper correspondents accompanying the revolutionary army on its advance on Mexico City, telegraphed early this morning that the situation in the state of Puebla was unchanged, but that a battle was imminent.

The body of insurgent troops has joined the advance guard now entrenched in a line that runs from Esperanza northwest to Oriental for 35 miles and west to Apizaco, a stretch of 30 miles.

Obregon's forces located near Andre, 35 miles south of Oriental are reported to be under the command of two generals. About 3,000 men comprise the military body, it was said.

E. C. T. C. To Close For Xmas Holidays Thursday, Dec. 20

Dr. Gregory was to be the patient. He came from Manitowac, Wis., accompanied by his daughter. They drove to the hospital. The young woman escorted him to the door and drove off.

It was then the great fear struck the doctor. He had operated hundreds of times himself, but never had been operated on.

Passport Regulations Exiles Young Alien

NORFOLK, VA., Dec. 13.—Bared in America and educated at the Holy Ghost Academy at South Bethlehem, Pa., where he was a star athlete, Jos. Pfer, aged 20, sailed today on the Italian steamer Caleneris, exiled from the United States through passport regulations.

Born in Hungary, young Pfer came to this country with his parents when two years old. His father was a steel worker employed at the Bethlehem Steel Works.

FUNERAL FOR MRS. J. ALLEN, KILLED IN AUTO ACCIDENT TODAY; NEGRO DRIVER HELD IN JAIL IS BLAMED

The funeral services of Mrs. John I. Allen, who was killed in an automobile wreck yesterday, were conducted this afternoon at 2:30 o'clock by the Rev. C. J. Harris, interment following in the Allen burying ground.

Mrs. Allen, nee Miss Lina Flake, was born on September 10, 1884. She was a daughter of the late Louis Flake and Mrs. Pennie Flake of this county and the twin sister of J. W. Flake. Mrs. Allen possessed an attractive personality and was beloved by a host of friends.

The accident occurred yesterday afternoon about 5 o'clock, two miles from this city. Mr. Allen accompanied by his wife and three children were returning home from Greenville, when a car driven by Willie Hines, a negro, from Ballard's Cross Roads, collided with the Allen car causing the car to overturn in a ditch. Mrs. Allen was caught under the car.

death being instantaneous. The youngest child, aged three months, was thrown some distance from the car and escaped uninjured while Mr. Allen and a four year old daughter suffered minor injuries.

Immediately after the wreck Mr. S. G. Wilkinson held a coroner's inquest the verdict being that the deceased came to her death in an auto wreck caused by the reckless driving of a Ford Roadster in the hands of Willie Hines. Hines was bound over to the January term of criminal court with the privilege of giving a \$2000 bond. In default of the bond he was placed in the county jail. Chester Nobles, an occupant of the Hines car, in default of a \$1,000 bond, is being held as an accessory after the fact and is also in jail.

Mrs. Allen is survived by her husband, five children, her mother, and several brothers and sisters.

CONTINUE FIGHT AGAINST RAVAGE OF BOLL WEEVIL

RALEIGH, Dec. 13.—Continuing its policy of waging a relentless fight against the depredations of the cotton boll weevil, the agricultural extension service of state colleges and the department of agriculture will hold a series of meetings about the state during January and February, according to an announcement made here today by department officials. The meetings will be held in territory where the weevil did little damage this season but where much damage is expected during the 1924 season. The announcement stated:

The division of entomology will be in charge of the meetings with W. Bruce Mabe, extension entomologist, in charge of the work. The division of agronomy will co-operate in the work. Men of experience in the work will give information about crops, soils and methods of farming that indirectly help to control the weevil.

According to Mabe, several organizations will assist the extension specialists at the meetings. One for two commercial concerns have expressed a desire to be of service and representatives of the Soil Improvement committee of Atlanta have requested that they be allowed to co-operate in the work.

Says 20 Pct. Farmers of N. C. Averaged Bale of Cotton Per Acre

RALEIGH, Dec. 13.—Twenty percent of the farmers of the State this season averaged one bale to the planted acre of cotton according to a statement issued here by Frank Parker, agricultural statistician for the state. In commenting on this report Mr. Parker said that it was a remarkable record and one which had been possible only because of unusually favorable conditions and care.

The cotton crop in North Carolina as of December first was more nearly completely ginned than in any previous season, according to the report. It also was the cleanest picked and graded in the history of the state, and second, if not the best, in yield per acre.

This season, according to Mr. Parker, was the first time that the crop on this date had been practically entirely ginned. With the value of the lint and seed laced at \$175,000,000 the crop for the first time took second rank among the cotton states in crop value, Texas, an Empire in itself, being the only state to lead North Carolina.

Pullman Company Offers To Name Cars After Clean Plays

NEW YORK, Dec. 13.—Naughty plays when they die will go to limbo, and be forgotten, but good plays when they wind up their entertaining careers will have Pullman cars named after them and will long be remembered. At least such will be the fate of the "good and bad" if a suggestion forwarded by the Pullman Company to John Golden, theatrical producer, is acted on.

"In this climactic moment of fifth or decency which confronts the stage" the carmakers say, "we wish to do our bit in showing the public that even a commercial business stands back of cleanliness and decency."

Want Improvement In Cotton Reports

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13.—A sub-committee of the "cotton bloc" in congress will meet Friday to consider legislation designed to improve the estimation of cotton crops by the Census Bureau. Headed by Senator Harris, Democrat, Georgia, the committee includes Representative Wingo, Democrat, Arkansas, and Representative Bulwinkle, Democrat, North Carolina.

GREENVILLE MARKET SECOND IN POUNDS, PRICE FOR TOBACCO

Sales Expected to Reach 35 Million Mark Before the Holidays

According to the state crop reporting service for November, Greenville still holds second place in Eastern Carolina as a tobacco market. It is only exceeded by Wilson in sales and by average price a shade by Farmville.

Here is the comparative statement of sales of farmers' tobacco and average price in this territory for the month indicated: Greenville, 8,971,04 pounds, average price, 26.10; Farmville 2,710,788, average, 28.15; Robersonville, 652,572, price, 23.87; Rocky Mount, 5,584,582, price, 10.84; Washington, 754,186, price, 23.10; Wilson, 12,532,578, price, 24.64; Kinston, 7,257,148, average, 16.40.

At cursory study of the prices offered on various other markets on the average here explains one of the reasons why the Greenville market is constantly reaching out. Up to the present it was reported that 32,000,000 pounds of tobacco have been handled here, while it is confidently expected among warehousemen and others who are in position to forecast conditions that 35,000,000 pounds will be sold on the local market before sales close for the Christmas holidays Wednesday, Dec. 19.

Another important factor in connection with the trade expansion of the market is the fact that it is drawing new customers scattered over a larger territory than in its history.

An outstanding feature of the statement of the state reporting service is that last month's auction sales were 214 per cent as compared with a year ago. Here are the figures: November 1922, sales, 40,251,934; this year, corresponding month, 85,281,281.

Soldiers' Bonus Bill Introduced in House

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13.—The soldiers' bonus bill vetoed by President Harding at the last session of congress was re-introduced by Representative McKenzie, Illinois at the request of republican veterans in the House. Only a few minor changes are made from the original provisions of the bill.

Baptist Committee To Collect Funds

GASTONIA, Dec. 13.—The North Carolina Baptist at its session today named a steering committee of nine to direct the collection of the state's share in the \$75,000,000 nationwide campaign. The time limit for closing the campaign closes Nov. 30, 1924.

The state's share is more than \$2,000,000 short, it was announced.

Stock Transactions Gets Him 7 Years

WINSTON-SALEM, Dec. 13.—Following a plea of guilty L. A. Mayhew, was sentenced to from seven to 10 years in the penitentiary today in the Forsyth superior court. Mayhew was indicted for embezzling \$4,500 in a stock transaction.

CRUEL RECKLESS AUTO DRIVERS

With a sickening sense of loss of faith and humanity that one reads these days of the toll of life and limb that is being taken on streets and highways as a direct result of reckless automobile drivers.

Less unfeeling than Juggernaut, the mad motorists grind down their victims, without warning or punishment appears to their mad course. The mounting casualties from motor accidents is a constant reminder to officials of law and order who, by inaction, have failed to erect a sufficient warning to violators of the law.

Yesterday witnessed another tragedy when John Allen was killed, her husband seriously injured and a small child hurt when the machine, it was stated, was forced off the highway between Greenville and Farmingdale by a negro driver. Tragedy and accident becoming all too common in this sec-

tion. Proof of this statement can be confirmed most any Sunday when machines can be seen piled up along the highways leading out of Greenville. While some accidents are primarily unavoidable, yet carelessness is responsible for a majority of them.

The automobile is a part of the daily life that is recognized as necessary, and in the hands of sober and considerate men it is a boon to modern civilization. Unfortunately, there is apparently no way to restrict its use to such competent persons, and, once in the hands of the man careless of his responsibility to other men, the motor becomes a machine of DEATH, as dangerous as dynamite in the hands of an idiot.

It is becoming evident that the law must soon begin to distinguish between two classes of car owners and that the unsafe class must be denied of owning and operating cars.

Regulation of ownership will only come after a state-wide awakening to the necessity for such an act. Until then, local enforcement of traffic laws must be made more stringent. JAIL SENTENCES for offenders must be meted out by the courts, SEVERE FINES imposed for violations less important, and in every way the reins tightened until the reckless driving is stopped.

If such severe and drastic measures are not taken little hope is entertained that speed maniacs and reckless drivers will continue to collect their daily toll in death and accident.

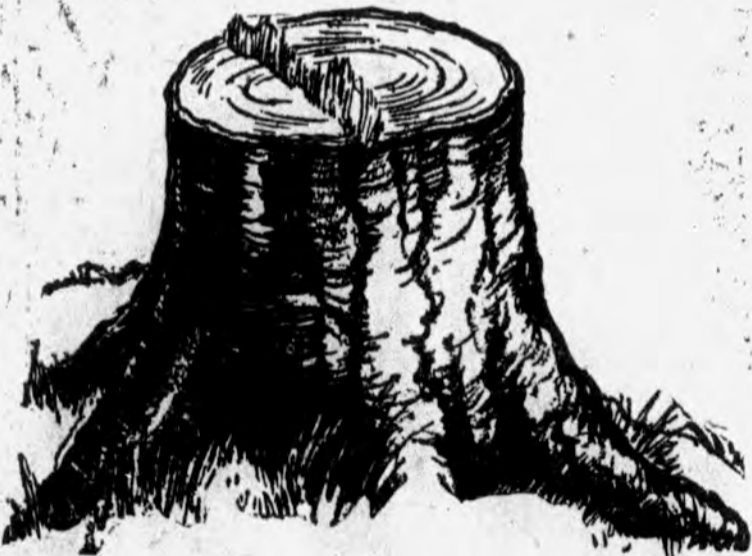

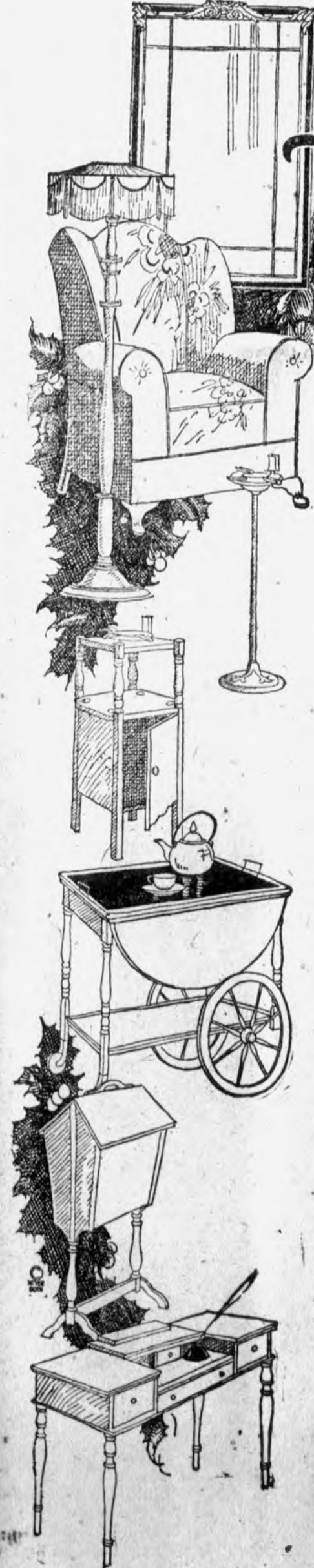
